Pampa EMS, County fund alcohol awareness program

County Agents Brandon McGinty and Joan Gray-Soria asked the county for \$500 for their Youth Alcohol Awareness Program. They got \$1,500 from the county and from Pampa EMS.

Gray County Judge Richard Peet said the county has set aside money from the state's share of a tobacco settlement several years ago for educational programs like the one that the county extension agents have been running.

The county judge noted that the money is not tax money coming from Gray County citizens' pockets and the county commission agreed that the extension project to combat drunk driving is a good use of the funds from the state.

"What we've been doing is focusing on sixth graders," McGinty said. "We've done this alcohol awareness program for the last couple of years."

He said they conduct it at Pampa and Lefors.

"McLean has not really wanted to participate in it," McGinty said. "I'm not sure as to why, but they haven't."

The class meetings are not a problem in Lefors, McGinty says, but with more numbers in Pampa, it has become more complex.

The program uses goggles from the Texas Department of Transportation office in

President emphasizes volunteerism

WASHINGTON (AP) — A retired teacher went back to a classroom in need. A barber is giving time to a child whose first years remind him of his own. A college graduate decided to help kids learn instead of helping investors on Wall Street.

When President Barack Obama called for Americans to volunteer, all three listened.

Loretta Martin, 61, a retired elementary teacher from Beachwood, Ohio, said Obama motivated her when he said it doesn't take much time to make a difference. "He really pushes it and I hear it all the time now," she said.

Martin, who volunteered for Obama's presidential campaign, started in October tutoring first-graders for about 15 hours a week through Experience Corps. The nonprofit organization places people age 55 and older into elementary schools to help students with reading and writing. "I knew that I had the skills to help and I wanted to use those skills," said Martin, who's worked as a literacy coach. "It's really rewarding to see what a little bit of time can make in the lives of kids — just a little bit of attention makes a big difference."

Since taking office in January 2009, Obama has made it a priority to bolster national service programs. Both he and first lady Michelle Obama have lectured at length on the topic, challenging others to donate their time to causes in their neighborhoods as a way to help where government alone cannot.

"We need your service right now, at this moment in history," Obama said in April, when he signed into law a \$5.7 billion bill to expand national service programs such

Wayne said he believes it is very important and beneficial to the citizens of precinct 4 to have the commissioner living in McLean near the employees and the barn. This close proximity would enable




Wayne Leathers of McLean is a candidate for County Commission, Precinct 4. The Primary Election is Tuesday, March 2.

"I believe that the commissioner should have a daily working relation ship with county employees," Leathers said. He believes he can serve well on the commissioners court.







as AmeriCorps. "I'm not going to tell you what your role should be. That's for you to discover. But I'm asking you to stand up and play your part."

The Obamas practice what they preach. They've planted trees, packed backpacks for the military and passed out Thanksgiving favorites at a food pantry. The president started "United We Serve," a nationwide service initiative to get people involved in volunteering.

They committed to a public service event on Monday, the federal holiday commemorating the birth of slain civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr.

Obama has drawn attention to community service and started a dialogue about how to help, according to organizers and nonprofit groups.

Anecdotally, they hear of people who've joined their causes because of the president. But they say it's hard to pinpoint whether service overall is up because of his call for action. High unemployment and an already eager-to-serve generation of young people also have spurred interest in lending a hand.

"He has brought a spotlight to the grass-roots efforts that have really been there for some time and now are getting traction because of his impetus," said Experience Corps' chief executive, Lester Strong.

"I think we have yet to see what the full effect will be," Strong said.

More people have become interested in the last year, Strong said, though the number of participants has remained about the same because of funding. In Baltimore, a couple dozen people are already on the group's waiting list for next fall.

Online applications to AmeriCorps more than doubled last year, reaching the highest in the program's history, according to the Corporation for National and Community Service, which oversees AmeriCorps. Almost 247,000 people applied in 2009, compared with 91,000 in 2008. The Clinton-era program has 75,000 enrollees who clean parks and build homes, among other tasks.

Some nonprofit groups have seen an increase in applicants since Obama took office. City Year, a

program in which young adults serve as tutors and mentors to kids for a year, had a record number of applicants for the 2009 school year --- nearly 7,000 for 1,550 positions. Habitat for Humanity's alternative school break program had at least an 8 percent increase in its summer participants. Big Brothers Big Sisters said it's had a slight increase in the number of black men enrolling at affiliates.

Micheal Johnson, 38, joined Big Brothers Big Sisters in October after a group of black fraternity members recruited for the program at his barber shop in Lewisville, Texas.

Raised by a single mom, Johnson had a Big Brother from third grade until he graduated from high school. With three kids of his own, he said he couldn't keep waiting until it was the right moment in his life to help another child. Now he mentors a 10-year-old boy.

"You know, I had to see a man to be a man," Johnson said. "I see myself in my little brother. It's like the same stuff that he was struggling in, I was struggling in, too."

McGinty explained that the extension service uses high school seniors to teach the class.

"Our kids teach this to sixth graders," he said.

But the attention span of sixth graders isn't very long, so McGinty is trying to find a way to make it more fun and educational.

"It's getting to the point where those kids are talking to the sixth graders and the sixth graders are beating their pencils on the desks," McGinty said. "They're having to get on to them because their attention span is 15 minute." The program is about 45

minutes. "We have to figure out a

way to make it more fun," McGinty said. McGinty and Gray-Soria

approached the county commission this month for \$500

"That \$500 would cover two pairs of drunk goggles at about \$150 each and some remote control cars," McGinty said. He says they'll set up a

small course for the remote control cars and the sixth



graders will have to stay within the course as they drive the remote control cars while wearing the goggles.

In the past, Gray-Soria said, they haven't used the remote control cars. They simply had the sixth graders walk a line in the gym while wearing the goggles. Using the remote control cars, she said, is an effort to make it more interesting for the students.

County Commissioner Gary Willoughby suggested buying enough goggles and cars for the whole program in Gray County rather than having to drive to Amarillo to get the state's equipment.

Would it behoove us not to have to go and borrow theirs?" Willoughby asked. "Why don't we expend the money for that instead of driving to Amarillo to get them?"



Rapes of elderly women terrify central Texas

YOAKUM, Texas (AP) With a serial rapist on the loose, Cassandra McGinty has developed a new routine when she arrives home: search room to room, a handgun or stun gun drawn.

The predator has been assaulting older women in central Texas over the past year, terrifying residents and frustrating investigators who have only a vague description of the suspect.

Pepper spray has been flying off the shelves in the towns where the attacks have occurred, and McGinty said her land-

lord in Marquez handed out stun guns as Christmas gifts. Nearly 200 miles away in Yoakum, elderly volunteers at the local museum have been locking its doors during business hours.

"I used to think I was too old for anybody to mess with," said McGinty, 55. "I can't say that anymore."

Beginning with the rape of a 65-year-old woman in Yoakum last January, authorities have linked eight sexual assaults or attempted sexual assaults to the suspect, who has been dubbed the "Twilight

Rapist" because most of the attacks occurred around dawn. They also believe he robbed or attempted to rob four other women.


The victims have all been women, ranging in age from 65 to 91. One rape victim played piano at her church on Sundays. An 81-year-old woman scared off an intruder with a gun, firing several rounds for good measure. A 66-yearold woman was attacked twice, despite having moved across town following the first assault.

The attacks occurred in seven rural towns, the largest of which has 6,000 residents.

lwo women were attacked - one of them twice — in Yoakum, a quiet town surrounded by wide-open ranches about 100 miles east of San Antonio.

"It does make me sick," Yoakum Police Chief Arthur Rogers said. "We all take it personal. We all visualize this could have been my mother or my grandmother." Yoakum residents say





Favre, Vikings advance with 34-3 win over Dallas

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) The now-annual waffling over retirement has made Brett Favre the butt of so many jokes, but seriously his performance this season for the Minnesota Vikings has been as masterful as ever.

Favre couldn't resist putting retirement on hold for a second straight season, to satisfy the craving of that irreplaceable adrenaline rush of winning a game when it really counts and to chase the championship he hasn't had in 13 years.

He got a little bit closer with this clutch effort.

"I guess that's what they expected when they talked about getting me," Favre said.

Four touchdown passes by Minnesota's 40-yearold quarterback, a personal playoff game record for the NFL's all-time leading passer, sent the Vikings to the NFC championship game with a determined 34-3 victory over Tony Romo and the Dallas Cowboys on Sunday.

The Vikings (13-4) will take on the Saints next Sunday at New Orleans (14-3), with the winner going to the Super Bowl in Miami.

"This is why I came back," Favre said.

Favre found Sidney Rice for three scores and put an exclamation point on the final one when his fourthand-3 pass from the 11 was caught in the end zone by Visanthe Shiancoe after the 2-minute warning. Never in 22 previous playoff games had Favre thrown for four touchdowns, and never before had he beaten Dallas in the postseason after losses to the Cowboys ended his first three play-

off experiences with Green Bay.

Favre finished 15 for 24 for 234 yards without a turnover, slapping fives with anyone in reach and rapidly pumping his right arm in celebration all afternoon. Favre even added another accomplishment as the first 40-year-old quarterback to win a playoff game.

"Probably the most fatigued or tired I got today was celebrating," he said with a smile.

All those big-game ghosts that Romo was supposed to have gotten rid of in last week's win over Philadelphia came back and haunted the Cowboys again.

"Any time you come in with the expectations and goals we set and don't accomplish them, No. 1, it's frustrating," Romo said, taking a long pause. "Right now, it's just hard to think the season is over." Romo lost two of his three fumbles and threw an interception, with two of those turnovers leading to Vikings field goals. He completed 22 of 35 passes for 198 yards, but the best season of his career was brought to a crashing halt at the hands of a fierce Vikings rush.

Romo took six sacks, three by Ray Edwards.

"They supposedly had a high-powered offense coming in, but they didn't get no points today," Vikings defensive tackle Pat Williams said. "They're on the 'L' side. We're on the 'W' side.'

The Vikings, who had last week off while Dallas whipped the Eagles, felt slighted by all the national favor building for the surg-

ing Cowboys.

"The Tasmanian devils were coming from Dallas that were about to bombard the state of Minnesota and run through us like Sherman through the South," coach Brad Childress said, exaggerating the popular opin-ion about this game. "All of us felt it quite palpably." So the Vikings played aggressively all the way to the end, enough to make Cowboys linebacker Keith Brooking angry. He confronted Childress on the sideline after Favre's fourth touchdown toss and continued his rant afterward.

"I think it was totally classless and disrespectful," Brooking said.

Both Favre and Childress claimed innocence of running up the score.
