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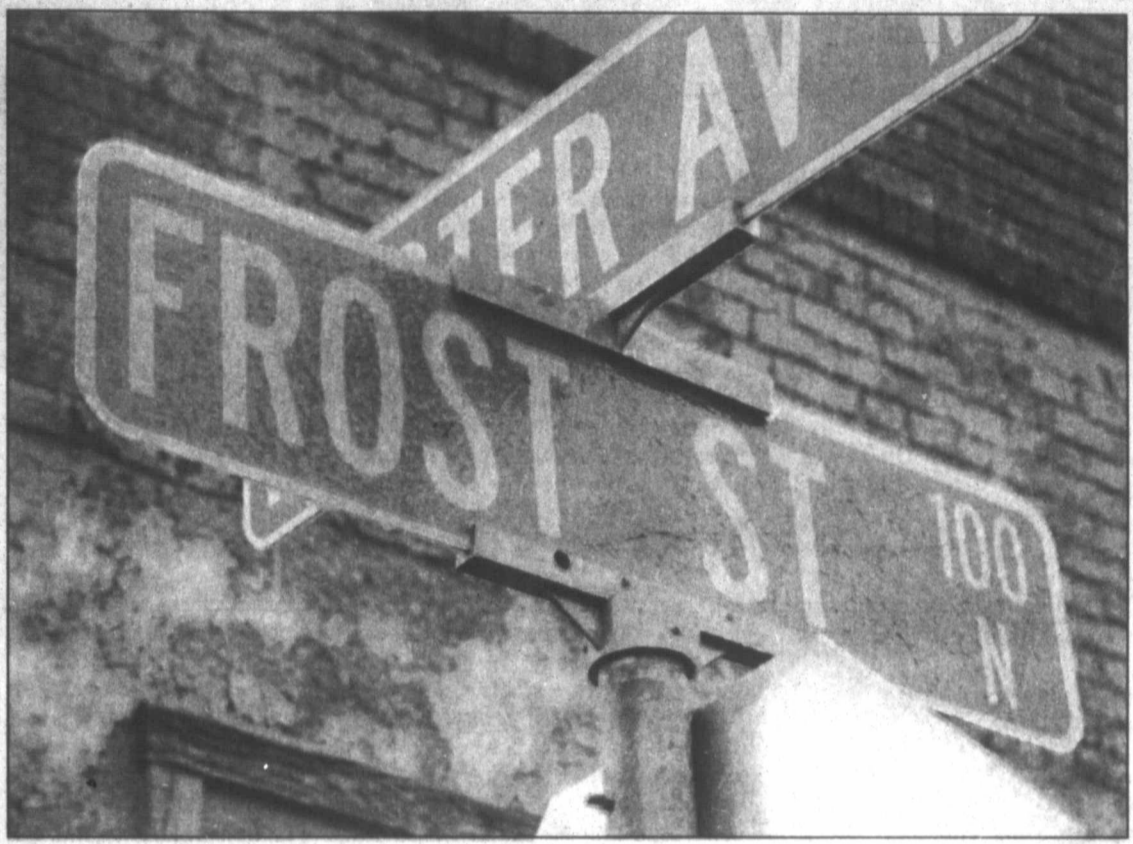

At the corner of ice and snow

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"Peggy Sue" visits Pampa library

It was 1957 when Buddy Holly's drummer had his teenage girlfriend come to a Rock 'n' Roll show in Sacramento, Calif.
At the auditorium, Jerry Allison seated Peggy Sue Gerron close to the stage. Buddy Holly performed his hit 'That'll Be the Day,' but then he introduce a new song entitled 'Peggy Sue.'
"It was the first time I'd ever heard it," she said.
Allison was the drummer for Holly's band The Crickets and went on to marry Peggy Sue.
Through the song, Peggy Sue became known to every teenager of her generation and generations of Holly fans that followed.

Peggy Sue had first met Allison in junior high in Lubbock.
It was at Lubbock High that she first ran into Holly. Automotive journalist and native Pampa Jerry Heasley met Peggy Sue about 10 years ago when she was appearing with one of Buddy Holly's cars at a car show.
"This was the lady that inspired the song," he said, introducing Peggy Sue last Tuesday at Lovett Memorial Library.
"She went to high school with Buddy Holly and married a guy in his band," Heasley said.
Peggy Sue, who recently moved back to the Lubbock area, said she was a crazy teenager in the late 1950s in Lubbock.

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



U.S. Currency seized on I-40

A trooper working patrol in Carson County near Amarillo January 26, stopped a 2001 Ford F-150 pickup traveling westbound on I-40 at 12:47 p.m. Tuesday. The pick up was towing a 1999 Chrysler passenger car on a homemade trailer. The driver was Jose Luis Macias-Herrera of Tornillo, Texas. He was traveling from Oklahoma

City, Oklahoma to El Paso. During the stop, the Trooper requested consent to search the vehicle and it was granted. A subsequent search of the vehicle revealed 7 bundles of U.S. currency located inside the tire of the towed vehicle. The currency totaled \$112,055. The driver was then arrested and booked into the Carson County Jail for money laundering.

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I am in my early 40s, and married with two daughters. I have a friend, "Sally," whom I have known since the third grade. We are like sisters. Sally has been profoundly depressed for at least 15 years. She sees a therapist and a psychiatrist on a regular basis and is on medication. My question, Abby, is what do you say to someone who calls at least once a week, for at least an hour, crying so hard I can barely understand her? She calls to tell me how sad she is and how she doesn't think anything in her life will improve. While I'm concerned for her and care about what happens to her, I don't feel I can give her any advice or guidance that her counselor/psychiatrist isn't able to give.

Short of listening and providing the proverbial shoulder to lean on, what more can I do? I feel I need to be there for her, but I also feel drained dry because this has been going on for several years. Any guidance you might offer would be greatly appreciated. — CONCERNED FRIEND IN FLORIDA

DEAR CONCERNED: You are a supportive friend, but when Sally calls crying so hard she can hardly talk, tell her that the person she needs to be talking to is her therapist. By allowing her to vent to you, you are preventing the therapist from evaluating her while she's in crisis and giving her the tools she needs to improve. Your friend may need to have her meds adjusted or changed, and seeing Sally while she is "at the bottom" could give her therapist valuable insights. If Sally isn't capable of placing the call to her therapist, offer to do it for her.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 14-year-old girl in eighth grade. I have plenty of

friends, play the clarinet and piano, and am involved in school yearbook and theater, among other things. My problem is, I get sick a lot.

No one can figure out why I can't go two weeks without picking up a virus. Because of this I am gone from school quite often. I can handle the occasional teasing I get from other kids, and my teachers are helpful. It's the two school secretaries I have a problem with.

Once, when I left school during the day because I wasn't feeling well, one of them said to me: "You need to try to be at school more. I know it's hard, but you've got to try." Other things they have said lead me to believe they think I'm faking. Now they want a note from every doctor I see. I was gone a lot last year, but they didn't enforce this.

What is appropriate in responding to their "comments"? I'd like to ask, "Is that your opinion as a secretary?" or say, "I'm doing the best I can with my situation and you're not helping." Or, I could bore them with a detailed description of my medical history, or maybe complain to the principal. What do you suggest? — SICK OF IT IN IOWA

DEAR SICK OF IT: Your medical history is not the school secretaries' business, and you do not owe them any detailed descriptions of it. However, it's possible that the woman who advised you that you "needed to be at school more" was speaking out of concern, so try not to be defensive.

If a note from your doctor is required, you should produce one after every absence. And recommend that you have your mother contact the principal if there are any questions about your medical status.

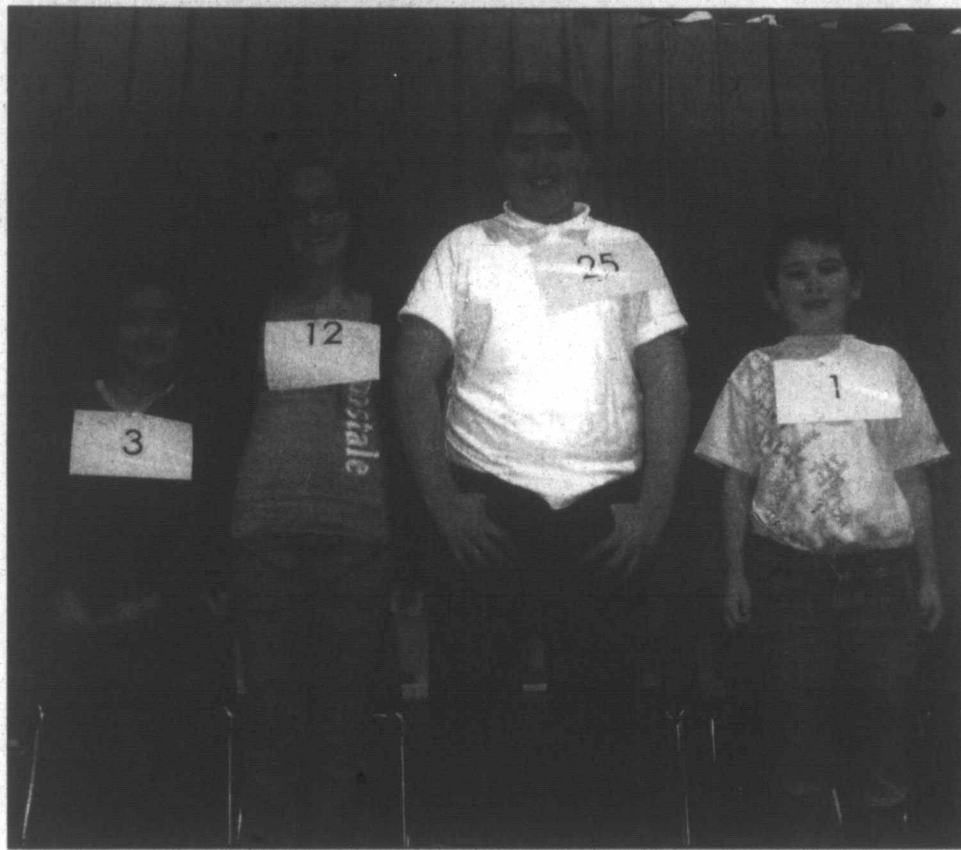

"I drove my mother nuts," she confided.

By the time Peggy Sue got to high school, Buddy Holly had just graduated.

"He was four years older than I," Peggy Sue said.

Allison was about to graduate from high school.

"Buddy Holly was one of my dearest friends," Peggy Sue said.

She said that she and Allison double-dated with Buddy Holly and his dates.

"We drove around the Hi-D-Ho to see who was dating who," she said.

Peggy Sue talked about Buddy Knox of 'Party Doll' fame and the importance of Norman Petty with his studio in Clovis, who first recorded Buddy Holly and The Crickets.

She also acknowledged the importance of Petty's wife, Violet Ann Petty, a trained concert pianist, to the rise of Rock 'n' Roll.

Peggy Sue said Petty's studio is still in Clovis, although the Pettys have long since died, and is open to the public.

"It's a fun place to go," Peggy Sue said.

She said that she and Allison eloped, and it was a big mistake.

"My mother never forgave me," she said.

About a month later, Buddy Holly married Maria Elena Santiago, a native of New York.

The two couples honeymooned in Acapulco, Mexico.

"I got us thrown out of the hotel," Peggy Sue admitted.

She had gone skinny-dipping in the hotel pool and the two couples were asked to leave the next day.

"Buddy told me, 'The next time you start to take your clothes off, call me,'" Peggy Sue laughed.

She said her marriage to Allison ended in divorce after 11 years.

Peggy Sue then married a plumbing contractor and settled in Sacramento, Calif. She's now a 69-year-old grandmother.

"If Buddy had lived, his marriage would have ended in a divorce," Peggy Sue said.

She said he had already contacted an attorney, but

Holly's death in a plane crash in Iowa ended his life before he could end his marriage.

"It was devastating to live through that," Peggy Sue said.

After Holly's death in 1959, Peggy Sue said she and Allison moved to Hollywood.

"That was a fun thing to do," she said. "We lived right off of Sunset Strip."

Allison worked for Roger Miller, a native of Erick, Okla., across the state line from Shamrock.

Unfortunately, Peggy Sue said she was in an abusive relationship and is now active in preventing drug abuse and domestic violence.

The entire story, she said, is in her new book, her first, 'Whatever Happened to Peggy Sue?' The book was written with Glenda Cameron.

The release of the book almost didn't happen.

Maria Elena had tried to block the book's release, but Peggy Sue prevailed.

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Appeals court upholds Texas' wine sales method

DALLAS (AP) — A federal appeals court has sided with Texas in a dispute over buying wine and efforts to control its quality.

The Dallas Morning News reported Thursday that the recent ruling by the New Orleans-based 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals allows Texas to continue regulating alcohol sales under its current system. The California-based Specialty Wine Retailers Association had challenged the Texas law.

The decision "chose to limit Texas consumers' ability to access the wines they want, but which they

cannot find in the state's wholesaler-controlled marketplace," said Tom Wark, association executive director.

Attorney Dee Kelly, representing Glazers Wholesale Drug Co. and Republic Beverage Co., welcomed the ruling.

It is a "good decision for consumers as well because it maintains strict control of how liquor is distributed in Texas and the quality that comes into the state," Kelly said.

The California association wanted the three-tier system in Texas, similar to other states', struck down to allow consumers to pur-

chase wine from out-of-state retailers.

Consumers can now buy wine directly from wineries, but retailers must obtain a permit from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

A lower court had ruled that the system was unconstitutional because it discriminated against out-of-state distributors unless a permit is obtained. But to obtain a permit, a retailer must buy from a Texas wholesaler.

Wark says his group is considering its next step.

The U.S. Supreme Court in May 2005 opened markets nationwide for wine shipments by mail.
