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#### OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - A storm that toppled power lines, closed major highways and buried parts of the southern Plains in heavy ice and snow began moving into the South on Friday, leaving tens of thousands of people in the dark possibly for several more days.

Winter storm warnings were in effect from New Mexico to North Carolina, and Arkansas Gov. Mike Beebe declared a state of emergency. The storm threatened to dump up to a foot of snow across the region after leaving 13 inches in the northern Texas Panhandle, where nearly all of Interstate 40 from the Texas-Oklahoma line to New Mexico was closed.

The closure stranded dozens of people at the Travel Centers of America truck stop along I-40 in Sayre in far western Oklahoma.

"There's probably 3 1/2 inches of packed ice on the road. And it's no snow, it's all ice," said David Hill of Oklahoma City, who was hauling a load of food products. "I've probably got 2 inches that covers my whole tractor. It's pure ice."

Heavy snow, ice bury

Heavy ice brought down electrical lines and trees limbs, leaving nearly 142,000 homes and businesses in Oklahoma without power Friday, according to the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management.

"In some places, as far you can see there are hundreds of utility poles on the ground," said Andrea Chancellor, spokeswoman for Public Service Co. of Oklahoma. She said it could be five days before electricity is restored to all customers.

Flights were canceled Friday morning at airports in Oklahoma City and Little Rock, Ark.

Arkansas State Police warned people who were driving to work on Friday to be prepared to be stranded. Spokesman Bill

Sadler encouraged motorists to bring blankets, water and snacks with them and to line up a hotel room within walking distance or otherwise plan for an overnight

The snow, sleet and freezing rain were expected to crawl east through Friday. In Arkansas, as much as a foot of snow could fall near the Missouri state line, northern parts of central Tennessee could see up to 8 inches and western North Carolina could get hit with a foot of snow, according to the National Weather Service.

More snow also was expected in Texas and Oklahoma, where dozens of shelters were opened for those who needed a warm place to stay, including First United Methodist Church in Hobart, about 120 miles southwest of Oklahoma City. Pastor Kyle Clark said downed trees and utility poles littered the PLAINS cont. on page 3

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

## Economy grows at 5.7 pct pace, fastest since 2003

WASHINGTON (AP) The economy's fasterthan-expected growth at the end of last year, powered by companies replenishing stockpiles; is likely in back more than a quarterton weaken cas consumers greatury,

keep a lid on spending. The 5.7 percent annual growth rate in the fourth quarter was the fastest pace since 2003. It marked two straight quarters of growth after four quarters of decline. Growth exceeded expectations mainly because business spending on equipment and software jumped much more than

Still, economists expect growth to slow this year as companies finish restocking inventories and as government stimulus efforts nation's gross domestic fade. Many estimate the cent to 3 percent in the current quarter and about 2.5 percent or less for the full year. product will grow 2.5 per-

forecast.

That won't be fast enough to significantly reduce the unemployment rate, now 10 percent. Most analysts expect the rate to keep rising for several months and remain close to 10 percent through the end of the year. High unemployment and stagnant wage growth will likely keep consumers cautious about spending.

Wages and benefits paid

to U.S. workers posted a

scant gain in the fourth quarter. And for all of last year, workers' compensation rose by the smallest amount on records going

The economic recovery could falter if consumers, who account for 70 percent of economic activity, lack the income to ramp up spending.

"That's why there's so much hand-wringing right now," said Brian Bethune, chief U.S. financial economist for IHS Global Insight. "Can the economy really sustain this? That's the big question mark sitting out there."

With hiring still weak, President Barack Obama has stepped up his focus on job creation. On Friday, he will outline the specifics of a proposal to provide tax cuts to small businesses that hire new workers. He touted the plan in his State of the Union address earlier this week.

The goal is "to encourage businesses to respond to rising demand and output by taking the plunge and hiring new workers again," said Christina Romer, Obama's top economic advisor.

About 60 percent of the fourth quarter's growth resulted from a sharp slowdown in the reduction of inventories as firms began to rebuild stockpiles depleted by the recession.

Changes to invento-

points to the fourth-quarter growth, the Commerce Department said in its report Friday. Excluding inventories, the economy would have grown at a 2.2 percent clip, the government said. That's an improvement from 1.5 per-

cent in the third quarter. Consumer spending rose 2 percent, down from a 2.8 percent rise in the third quarter. It added 1.4 percentage points to GDP growth.

A steep increase in exports also helped boost. growth last quarter. The shipment of goods overseas rose 18.1 percent, far outpacing a 10.5 percent rise in imports. Net exports added 0.5 percentage point to GDP

Government spending was actually a slight drag on growth in the fourth quarter: A small increase in federal spending was outweighed by a drop in

state and local spending. A drop in defense spending accounted for the decline. Federal government spending is likely to pick up and add to growth in the first quarter, Bethune

Business spending will likely boost economic growth for several quarters, Bethune said, though not likely enough to make up for sluggish consumer spending. Many companies are upgrading computers, cell phones and machinery

ries added 3.4 percentage as their equipment needs to be replaced just to maintain current levels of production.

In addition, many businesses have healthy balance sheets and don't need to pay off the large debts that households are struggling with, Bethune added.



slick roadways and most of the town of about 4,000 residents had no electric-

"We've got gas heat and we are illuminating the place with candles," Clark said late Thursday.

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Farther southwest in Altus, home to about 7,000 residences and businesses, power was out except at the hospital and other emergency operations with generators, said emergency management director Lloyd Colston.

More than two dozen flights were canceled Friday morning at Will Rogers World Airport in Oklahoma City following the cancellation of more than 100 flights Thursday because of concerns about ice buildup on planes,

according to the airport's Web site. In Arkansas, Little Rock National Airport reported that a number of flights were canceled.

Flights also were canceled Thursday in Tulsa and in Texas out of Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

The Texas Department of Transportation closed I-40 east and west of Amarillo on Friday and a few other major roadways. Downed power lines and icy, dangerous road conditions also temporarily closed a 50-mile stretch of I-44 southwest of Oklahoma City and parts of I-40 in far western Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico on Thursday.

his office in the basement of Pampa City Hall, said that the city and county pretty well shut down except for emergency services. A winter storm watch expired at 6 a.m. this morning.

He said many businesses were also closed.

"I know the Kiwani's meeting was canceled," Courtney said.

They expected state and county roads to remain snow packed and icy at least through mid-afternoon today.

Courtney said a conference call was scheduled this afternoon to review storm damage, but he said preliminary reports suggested that the worst of the storm was felt south of Pampa, down off the

Caprock. While no wrecks were reported in Pampa due to the storm, the Texas Department of Public Safety said Interstate 40 was shut down across the panhandle from the Oklahoma state line to the

Troy Foos with Southwestern Public Service reported several power outages across the Texas Panhandle and South Plains. Most were no more than for an hour or so, he said.

## ocal group sets priorities for 2010

The Gray County Local Work Group meeting for the 2010 Environmental **Quality Incentives Program** in Gray County was held at the USDA Service Center in Pampa on Thursday, January 21st at 6:00 PM. The purpose of the LWG meeting was to give local landowners, operators, and other stakeholders in the county the opportunity to provide input about the priority of land uses and natural resource concerns to be addressed with 2010 EQIP funding. Those present for the meeting, sponsored by the Gray County Soil & Water Conservation District, included local landowners and operators, as well as representatives from state and federal agencies including the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service & Farm Service Agency, Panhandle Groundwater District, and the Gray County SWCD

EQIP funding levels for


uses were used to determine that Grazing Lands, Dry Cropland, and then Irrigated Cropland would be given priorities 1, 2, and 3 respectively for 2010 EQIP funding levels. It was also decided that county funding allocation by land use would be: 50% - grazing lands, 30% dry cropland, and 20% irrigated cropland. These funding levels pertain only to County Base funds, which exceeded \$140,000 in 2009. Two other fund sources, the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program, and the Ogallala Aquifer Irrigation concern of EQIP, should be available for use on irrigated cropland to address improving efficiency of These funds water use. can be used for installing new pivots on previously row-watered land, replacing existing pivots at least 20-years old, installing drip irrigation systems, converting existing pivots


replacing leaky existing concrete pipe.

For Grazing Lands, it was determined that the priority resource concerns would be: Plant Condition & Health - #1, Animal Health #2, and Soil Erosion -#3. For Dry Cropland it was determined that the priority resource concerns would be: Soil Erosion -#1, Water Quality - #2, and Soil Quality - #3. For Irrigated Cropland it was determined that the priority resource concerns would be: Water Quantity #1, Soil Erosion - #2, and

Water Quality - #3. NRCS is currently taking applications for participation in the EQIP program for 2010. Some of the conservation practices that will be eligible for funding assistance through this program include livestock water development, brush management, fencing, grass establishment, well decommissioning, terraces, diversions, waterplanting.
