County Commissioners Court meets Monday

When the Gray County Commissioners Court meets Monday, they will consider paying for civil litigation involving the 31st District Attorney's office in connection with the Hank Skinner murder case.

Henry Watkins "Hank" Skinner, 47, is on death row. He is scheduled to be executed this month in Huntsville after being convicted in the murders of Twila Busby, his girl friend, and her two mentally impaired sons, Randy Busby and Elwin Caler, on New Year's Eve, 1993, in

Judge Steven Emmert signed the order setting

Skinner's execution for February 24. Skinner was convicted of the murders

Companies say Alaska gas pipeline could cost \$41B

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) The company holding an exclusive license with the state of Alaska to develop a major natural gas pipeline estimates the project will cost \$20 billion to \$41 billion, depending on the route.

The Alaska Pipeline Project seeks to move natural gas from the harsh North Slope to market in

Alaska, through Canada and to the Lower 48.

More details of the plan came in a filing Friday with federal regulators that's the first step toward an "open season," when the compa-nies behind the project will court gas producers and try to secure commitments for shipping deals.

TransCanada Corp., based in Calgary, Alberta, is working with Irving, Texas-based Exxon Mobil Corp. to advance the project. The state of Alaska has promised to reimburse up to \$500 million of the cost.

A rival project by BP PLC Britain's Houston-based ConocoPhillips is also moving ahead.

Hand pain halts Willie Nelson's NC show

KENANSVILLE, N.C. (AP) - Singer and guitarist Willie Nelson canceled a North Carolina concert because of a bum hand about an hour after several band and crew members were busted for allegedly possessing moonshine and marijuana.

Alcohol Law Enforcement spokesman Ernie Seneca said Friday that six members of Nelson's band and crew have been charged with misdemeanor possession offenses. They were issued citations before the Texas singer was scheduled to

take the stage Thursday

Longtime Nelson bass player Dan Edward "Bee" Spears, 60, Franklin, Tenn., and five others were charged with possession of non-tax-paid alcohol, Seneca said. Two of the six were also charged with marijuana possession.

The charges came after officers smelled marijuana aboard a tour bus and were given permission to search it, Seneca said.

Nelson publicist Elaine Schock declined comment.





· Toyota sends gas pedals to factories

DETROIT (AP) - The Associated Press has learned that Toyota is sending new gas pedal systems to car factories rather than dealerships who want the parts to take care of millions of customers whose pedals may stick.

Toyota spokesman Brian Lyons confirms information in a company e-mail obtained by the AP that says parts were shipped to factories. Lyons says that's how the company normally distributes parts.

But some dealers say they should get the parts first because they now have no way to fix the pedals on any of the 4.2 million recalled vehicles affecting eight U.S. models.

Toyota has halted production and sales of the models, including the best-selling Camry sedan.

Lyons said Toyota did not send the parts to dealers because it has not decided whether to have the systems in the recalled vehicles repaired or replaced. The company on Thursday presented a remedy to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration,

and it is awaiting a decision before proceeding. "We're not ready to launch this program yet," Lyons said, adding that letters must be sent to customers whose vehicles were recalled and service

technicians must be trained on whatever solution the company ultimately decides. He said he did not know if any parts had been shipped from factories to parts depots, which is the next step in the process, but dealerships don't have

Engineers and other workers were up all night

Thursday getting the process ready, he said. The company has said its highest priority is fixing the pedals for existing customers.

"Nothing is more important to Toyota than doing the right thing for our customers — and restoring their confidence in the safety of our vehicles," Toyota said in a statement.

Toyota has recalled cars and trucks in the U.S., Europe and China because of the faulty gas pedals.

The U.S. House Oversight and Government Reform Committee is launching an investigation into the problems with Toyota's accelerator pedal systems. It has scheduled a Feb. 4 hearing entitled, "Toyota Gas Pedals: Is the Public at Risk?"

"There appears to be growing public confusion regarding which vehicles may be affected and how people should respond. In short, the public is unsure as to what exactly the problem is, whether it is safe to drive their cars, or what they should do about it," wrote Chairman Edolphus Towns, D-N.Y., in a letter Thursday to Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood.

Separately, a House investigative panel is planning a Feb. 25 hearing on the Toyota recalls. In a letter to NHTSA administrator David Strickland, lawmakers requested a timeline from January 2000 until the present for NHTSA's investigations into Toyota defects and other data related to reports of sudden acceleration



1990 - Communist Party loses majority in Czech parliament, which it dominated for four decades.

1991 - Iraqi forces attack allied positions in Saudi Arabia near Kuwaiti border, holding abandoned coastal city of Khafji for a time. Eleven U.S. marines are killed, seven by friendly fire.

1992 - U.S. military announces it will halt or cut back operations at 83 additional military sites in Europe

1994 - The United States grants a limited visa to Gerry Adams, president of Sinn Fein, the Northern Irish political party that supports the outlawed Irish Republican Army.

1995 - A car bomb explodes in Algiers, killing at least 20 people and injuring about 60 in the worst bombing during a three-year insurgency by Islamic

1999 - NATO authorizes its secretary-general to launch military action against Yugoslavia if it does not negotiate an agreement for autonomy in Kosovo.

2000 - In Berlin, Germany, hundreds of neo-Nazis demonstrate at the site of a planned memorial to Holocaust victims and march through the Brandenburg Gate where Nazi troops once held

2002 - The Roman Catholic Church in Ireland agrees to pay US\$10 million to children sexually abused by clergy over the past few decades.

2003 - Richard Reid, who in October 2002 pleaded guilty to attempting to bomb a trans-Atlantic flight, is sentenced by a U.S. District Court in Boston, Massachusetts to life in prison.

2004 - U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan announces that U.N. staffers can receive benefits for their gay or lesbian partners if their country recognizes same-sex marriages or domestic partnerships.

2005 - Iraqis in 14 countries stream into polling stations for their last chance to cast absentee ballots in Iraq's first independent election in five decades, expressing hopes that the vote will bring peace and stability to their homeland.

Fiscal restraint and tax cuts key to robust economy

History has many lessons to teach us and we should be mindful not to repeat mistakes of the past. And one of the most valuable economic lessons is that you can't spend your way out of debt! However, that is exactly what President Obama's budget proposals would do. The President is putting forth massive government spending increases - and the tax hikes to pay for them. This could not be a worse remedy for our ailing economy. America needs fiscal restraint and tax cuts for families and businesses to stimulate the economy and produce jobs. With unemployment in

the U.S. hitting over 10 percent, job creation must be a priority. America's small businesses have always been the economic engine for recovery and creating jobs. However, the Administration and their congressional allies continue to put up roadblocks against small business growth - proposing to increase taxes on the private sector and escalate regulations and mandates on potential employers. The President's latest economic agenda leaves behind millions of small businessmen and women, family farmers and ranchers, and middle class families struggling to stay afloat

in this uncertain economy. The American people have stood up and said "no" to the massive big government takeover of our health care system. As Americans learn more about the tax and spending proposals and the increase to the national debt, they will again tell the President and Congress, "Stop."

Looking at modern history, we have learned some valuable lessons

on what can spur an economic recovery - fiscal restraint coupled with tax cuts. Presidents John F. Kennedy, Ronald Reagan and George W. Bush all revitalized the American economy through tax cuts. The result, history shows us, was an economic turnaround and increases in job growth and investment. Tax cuts allow businesses to grow and hire new employees. Tax cuts allow families to keep more of their money to invest in their futures. To truly stimulate the American economy and get the unemployed and underemployed back on payrolls, Congress needs to cut spending and

I have proposed legislation to permanently eliminate the marriage tax penalty. The marriage penalty tax pushes married couples into a higher tax bracket than two single wager earners with the same income. Marriage should not be taxed! It is outrageous to think that Americans should be forced to pay more federal income tax if they are married than if they remained single.

We need also to make sure that the death tax does not come back with a roar next year. The federal estate tax, referred to by many as the death tax, expired at the end of last year. But without any additional action, the death tax comes back in 2011 with only a \$1 million exemption and a tax rate of 55 percent! Death taxes can destroy small businesses, family farms and ranches. Families who have worked hard all their lives to build their farms or their small businesses could see so much of what they have worked for sold off to pay the death tax

bill. The Bush tax cuts that

spurred our economy in 2001 and 2003, and provided relief from the death tax, will expire at the end of this year if Congress and the President don't extend them. That would further threaten the economy. The Administration and

some in Congress believe that government solves all problems. It does not. As Ronald Reagan said during his first inaugural address, when America was also in a recession: "In this present crisis, government is not the solution to our problem; government is the problem." History tells us that runaway government spending, staggering national debt, and massive tax increases are a recipe for economic disaster. These lessons cannot be ignored. Spending and tax cuts will truly jump-

start the economy and put

PHOENIX (AP) -Phoenix Suns forward Louis Amundson found himself in an unfamiliar place during the fourth quarter Thursday night on the floor.

Amundson and fellow reserves Goran Dragic and Jared Dudley led an unlikely comeback with 14 fourth-quarter points and the Suns rallied to beat the Dallas Mavericks 112-106 on Thursday night.

"It was cool," said Amundson, who finished with 13 points on 5-of-7 shooting. "It was a lot of fun being out there. We call came in and gave the team something different."

Amundson was on the floor at the expense of Amare Stoudemire, who had 22 points before spending the entire fourth quarter on the bench for what he said was "the first time in my life but it's all good."

Phoenix coach Alvin Gentry said Stoudemire was sidelined not for anything he did or didn't do but because of the energy the subs brought to the

"I wouldn't read any-thing into that at all," Gentry said. "If you go in there he's the happiest guy. For all that's been said he's been a great teammate. He understands things were going well with Lou."

Steve Nash added 19 points and 11 assists, and Jason Richardson had 17 points to help the Suns snap a three-game losing streak against the Mavericks.

"We just need something to lift our spirits a little bit," said Gentry, whose team had lost seven of nine entering the game. Jason Terry led Dallas with 19 points, Dirk Nowitzki had 17 and Shawn Marion added 15. Nowitzki played in his 884th game to surpass Brad Davis as Dallas' career leader. "Their bench outplayed

us all night," Terry said. "Clear as day and it can't happen. They outplayed us. It's unbelievable to me that we've come halfway through the season and we still look like we're searching in the fourth quarter."

Dallas led by eight early


in the fourth before the Suns' reserves started the

Earl Clark hit his first career 3-pointer to pull Phoenix to 92-90 with 9:41 left. Dallas made it 98-93 on Jose Barea's driving layup with 7:25 to go, but didn't hit another shot from the field until Shawn Marion's short jumper with 3:31 left.

"We made people shoot the shots they didn't want to shoot," Dudley said.

Amundson Phoenix its third lead, 99-98, on a driving dunk with 5:25 remaining, Dudley hit two free throws, and Amundson added a free throw to put Phoenix ahead 102-98 with 4:33 left. Marion's jumper pulled Dallas within two, but Nash hit a 3-pointer, and Amundson scored on a scoop shot with 1:46 to go to make it 107-102.

"We've got a six-point lead going into the fourth quarter and we've got to do a better job of executing and defending," said Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle.




because everybody wants tickets."

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One letter stands for another. In this sample, A is used for the three L's, X for the two O's, etc. Single letters, apostrophes, the length and formation of the words are all hints. Each day the code letters are different.

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Endowments down at some universities in Texas

DALLAS (AP) — Tough economic times left some universities in Texas with losses in their endowments, part of a national trend, a new study finds.

The University of Texas System's endowment, the fifth largest of any university or college system in the country, fell from \$16.2 billion in 2008 to \$12.2 billion in 2009, The Dallas Morning News reported Friday.

Texas A&M System's slid from \$6.7 billion to \$5.1 billion while Southern Methodist University in Dallas saw its endowment shrink from \$1.4 billion to \$1 billion.

Endowment results were reported this week by the Commonfund Institute and National Association of College and University Business Officers.

Texas leaders have asked state-supported universities to submit plans to trim 5 percent from their state budgets.

Endowments, stockpiles of money that universities invest, usually do not make up a huge portion of schools' budgets. Universities look at investment changes over a few years.

For example, endowments dropped 18.7 percent nationally, but over three years, the figures are down only 2.5 percent, the newspaper reported.

"We don't plan on a big payout in good years," UT-Dallas spokeswoman Susan Rogers said. "We use a moderate amount of the proceeds and then bank some in good years for use in less good years."

The study's endowment results reflect market values from several months ago. Some markets have rebounded some since then.

At the Texas A&M System, endowment returns actually rose 25 percent from December 2008 to December 2009, said Greg Anderson, chief investment officer.

Schools are still looking at the numbers and trying to watch how their dollars are spent.

"Make no mistake,"
UTA spokeswoman Kristin
Sullivan said. "As an institution, we are trying to
be conservative with our
resources."
