## PGCD grants tax abatement for wind company

Project will bring hundreds of jobs

**WHITE DEER** — The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District granted tax abatement for a company planning to build wind power facilities in Amarillo during their monthly meeting here Tuesday.  
 Brian Jennings with the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation asked for the abatements in Potter County on AEDC land north of U.S. Highway 60 on the loop around Amarillo for the \$25 million project.  
 Jennings said that ALSTOM Power, Inc., a subsidiary of ALSTOM, a French Company, was considering building a facility next to Ben E. Keith and Pacific Cheese and the prison in Amarillo. The facility would manufacture three-megawatt wind turbines in a 180,000 square building on a 19.5-acre tract. The project is expected to ultimately provide 750

A Gray County grand jury handed up 12 indictments to the 31st District Court on February 18.  
 Tracy Lee Zeek, 39, was indicted on one count of intent to provide a person in a correctional facility with a deadly weapon, a knife. The charge is a second degree felony. The charge is enhanced by a May, 2003 conviction in Gray County of felony possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver. Bond was set at \$20,800.  
 James David Peterson, 35, was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine, less than one gram, a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$7,500.  
 Johnnie Andrew Montgomery, 29, was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine, less than one gram, a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$7,500.  
 Melvin Douglas Mitchell, Jr., 30, was indicted on one count of driving while intoxicated, third offense or more, a second degree felony. Mitchell was previously convicted in 2002 in Arkansas and 2005 in Randall County for DWI. The charge is enhanced by a 2006 conviction in Randall county on the charge of possession of a controlled substance, enhanced. Bond was set at \$25,000.  
 Jonathan Paul McNear, 18, was indicted on one count of unlawfully appropriating a firearm, a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$5,000.

## 2 die in weather related crashes

DALLAS (AP)— Widespread snow across a wide belt of the Texas midsection Tuesday prompted schools and government offices to close early and airlines to cancel flights.  
 At least two people died in traffic accidents said to be weather-related.  
 The National Weather Service reported up to 6 inches of snow accumulated in parts of Texas as widely scattered as Midland and Sweetwater in West Texas and Palestine in eastern Texas. But 3-4 inch accumulations were far more common across parts of central Texas, with 2-4 inches in the Bryan-College Station area, 1-3 inches in the Hill Country and less than 2 inches from Austin to San Antonio. The Houston area reported a trace to 1 inch of snow.  
 Scores of flights were canceled by the second winter storm to hit Texas in as many weeks.  
 Police in El Paso said a woman was struck and killed by a Jeep Cherokee as she stopped to pull someone from the wreckage of another accident. The driver of the Jeep lost control due to the slick roads, said police spokesman Michael Baranyay.  
 "She was doing something good," Baranyay said. "She was a good Samaritan. This lady died being a hero. It's unfortunate." Her name was not immediately released.  
 In the South Plains of West Texas, a 19-year-old man died when his pickup truck overturned on an icy overpass while pulling a utility trailer.  
 According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, Isaac Contreras of Tulia died when his truck went into a slide on an Interstate 27 bridge in Plainview, rolled and came to rest against a guardrail, pinning him inside the truck.





## Victim's widow sues widow of suicide pilot

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The widow of the Internal Revenue Service worker killed when a plane smashed into the agency's Austin office is suing the pilot's widow.

Authorities say 53-year-old Andrew Joseph Stack

III deliberately crashed his single-engine plane into the building last Thursday in a suicide attack. Vernon Hunter, a 68-year-old manager in the IRS office, also was killed.

Stack left behind a long Internet posting blaming

the IRS for personal problems spanning decades.

The lawsuit filed Monday in Austin says Sheryl Stack should have warned others about her husband.

Daniel Ross, attorney for Hunter's widow Valerie Hunter, says the lawsuit

against Sheryl Stack seeks to determine if the pilot left behind insurance policies or other assets.

It wasn't immediately known if Sheryl Stack has an attorney.

## Guns missing from Cleveland police evidence room

CLEVELAND, Texas (AP) — A federal investigation is under way to determine whether some 500 weapons missing from a police department's evidence room are part of an illegal firearms-trafficking scheme.

The guns were discovered missing from the Cleveland Police Department's evidence room during an inventory last year, the Houston Chronicle reported Wednesday. The U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives declined to discuss the probe, saying it is an ongoing investigation.

Court records show ATF agents recovered 112 of the missing guns while executing a search warrant at a Humble gun shop.

## Toyota: Planned Temple plant will still be built

TEMPLE, Texas (AP) — Toyota's troubles will not keep a vehicle processing plant planned for Temple from being built.

City and company officials say the project has been put on hold but that Toyota still intends to build the plant despite its ongoing recall of more than 6 million vehicles.

But Michael Owen, a vice president at Gulf States Toyota, told the Temple Daily Telegram that the company could not commit to a timeline for construction of the plant, which would employ about 240 workers.

# Lawmakers' Toyota connections

Several lawmakers on the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, which is holding a hearing Wednesday on the Toyota recalls, have Toyota factories and offices in their states or even their districts. A look at some of the automaker's ties:

— Rep. William Lacy Clay, D-Mo.: Toyota's Bodine Aluminum has a factory in his St. Louis district. Fellow Missouri Rep. Blaine Leutkemeyer, a Republican, also serves on the committee.

— California connection: Toyota's North American operation is based in Torrance, Calif., and it has several facilities in the state. Californians on the committee include Democratic Reps. Diane Watson, Jackie Speier and Judy Chu, as well as the panel's top Republican,

Rep. Darrell Issa, and GOP Rep. Brian Bilbray. Issa received a \$1,000 campaign contribution in December from the president of a Toyota dealership in California.

— Ohio Democratic Reps. Steve Driehaus, Dennis Kucinich and Marcy Kaptur and Republicans Michael Turner and Jim Jordan: Toyota has an office in Cincinnati.

— Rep. Bill Foster, D-Ill.: Toyota has a regional office in Foster's district. Illinois Democratic Reps. Mike Quigley and Danny Davis and Republican Rep. Aaron Schock are also on the committee. Schock received a \$250 campaign contribution from Toyota lobbyist Mark Johnson last July.

— Several other committee members also have Toyota offices or factories

in their states: Reps. Elijah Cummings and Chris Van Hollen, D-Md.; Republican Reps. Dan Burton and Mark Souder of Indiana; Reps. John Tierney and Stephen Lynch, D-Mass.; Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-Texas; Democratic Rep. Jim Cooper and Republican Rep. John Duncan Jr. of Tennessee; Rep. Lynn Westmoreland, R-Ga.; and District of Columbia Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton, a Democrat.

Toyota dealership in Souder's House campaign received \$1,000 in September from the president of an Indiana Toyota dealership.

— Rep. Patrick McHenry, R-N.C.: A North Carolina Toyota dealer gave McHenry's House campaign \$1,000 last April.

— Rep. Paul Hodes, D-N.H., received a \$500 contribution to his Senate campaign from the president of a Massachusetts Toyota dealership in December.

## New punishment hearing for condemned killer

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has thrown out the death sentence of a convicted killer whose case has been dogged by admissions of an affair between his trial judge and the prosecutor.

The court, in a split decision, says Charles Dean Hood is entitled to a new punishment trial because jurors were not allowed to consider mitigating evidence that could have convinced them he didn't deserve a death sentence.

Wednesday's ruling makes no mention of the affair between the judge and prosecutor in Collin County in suburban Dallas. Hood, now 40, a former topless club bouncer, insists he's innocent of the 1989 fatal shootings of 26-year-old Tracie Lynn Wallace and 46-year-old Ronald Williamson at their Plano home.

The groundwater district would be giving up \$1,780 a year out of a \$1.2 million budget for 10 years.

The AEDC is providing \$12.5 million in funding for ALSTOM. The economic development corporation is also asking other entities to abate taxes for 10 years, Jennings said.

He said the company is expected to bring 275 direct jobs to the facility and 475 indirect jobs.

## Analysis: Brown revives GOP moderates' pivot role

WASHINGTON (AP) — Massachusetts Republican Sen. Scott Brown may have crushed Democrats' spirits in winning a special election last month, but he's also helped revive them by providing critical momentum to advance a bipartisan jobs bill that had become entangled in familiar partisan wrangling.

Brown's win means that Democrats don't possess a filibuster-proof Senate majority. The new formula for victory resembles the old one: Gain the votes of New England Republican moderates, as well as old-timers who occasionally buck their leadership.

That's just what happened Monday, when Brown, along with Maine Republicans Susan Collins and Olympia Snowe, voted to defeat a filibuster led by far more conservative GOP leaders.

Also siding with Democrats in the 62-30 tally were Rust Belt Sen. George Voinovich, R-Ohio, and Christopher Bond, R-Mo., a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Both are big fans of infrastructure spending that also is provided in the bill, and both also are retiring from the Senate this year, giving them some wiggle room to challenge their party's leaders and conservative base.

For Brown, joining a GOP filibuster over a parliamentary procedural squabble clearly wasn't the best vote for a new senator from an overwhelmingly Democratic state who had campaigned on a promise to rise above partisan politics.

"I came to Washington to be an independent voice, to put politics aside and to do everything in my power to help create jobs for Massachusetts families," said Brown, whose election last month gave Republicans the 41st vote that could sustain filibusters. "This Senate jobs bill is not perfect ... but I voted for it because it contains measures that will help put people back to work."

Monday's vote cleared the decks for a far larger favorable vote when the jobs legislation faces an up-or-down final tally Wednesday.

The bill features four provisions, including a \$13 billion measure exempting businesses hiring the unemployed from the 6.2 percent Social Security payroll tax through December and giving them another \$1,000 credit if new workers stay on the job a full year.

It's undeniably modest, especially in comparison with the \$862 billion economic stimulus bill enacted a year ago. It's also significantly smaller than a rival bipartisan bill unveiled earlier this month by two senior senators.

The measure is centered on tax breaks for businesses that hire new workers this year and a renewal of highway programs through Dec. 31. Both ideas have wide support in both parties. Mark Zandi, an economist with Moody's Economy.com, estimates the tax credit could spur about 250,000 new jobs.

GOP leaders mounted a filibuster because of strong-arm tactics by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., in bringing it to the floor.

Republicans and some Democrats were unhappy that Reid abruptly dumped about \$70 billion in other tax breaks for businesses and individuals, help for the unemployed and additional Medicare payments to doctors

from a compromise measure unveiled earlier this month by Sens. Max Baucus, D-Mont., and Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, the chairman and ranking Republican, respectively, on the Finance Committee.

Reid then refused to allow Republicans to try to add them back, inviting a filibuster.

In addition to the hiring tax incentives and highway funding, the bill would extend a tax break for small businesses buying new equipment and modestly expand an initiative that helps state and local governments finance infrastructure projects.

The larger Finance Committee bill included about \$33 billion in popular tax breaks, including an income tax deduction for sales and property taxes and a business tax credit for research and development, that would be extended through 2010. Those ideas have sweeping support among lawmakers, have been routinely renewed and probably will come up for votes again soon.

Business groups say companies are unlikely to hire workers just to receive a tax break. That means most of the tax benefits would go to companies that would have hired new workers anyway.

"Obviously it's not very efficient," Zandi said. "It's something worthwhile doing as an insurance policy but it's not something one would want to do in any other circumstance."



VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Bode Miller made the kind of mistake that happens in skiing, especially for a risk-taker like him.

The gaffe made by Dutch speedskater Sven Kramer? Unbelievable.

Kramer went through the grueling 10,000-meter race in what would've been record time, but was disqualified for not switching lanes while coming out of a turn about two-thirds into the race.

Here's the craziest part: Kramer actually made the switch but his coach missed it. Thinking his star was about to make an epic mistake, the coach anima-

tedly motioned for Kramer to switch lanes. Kramer seemed to pause before deciding to follow orders.

Of all the kooky, costly mistakes made in popular North American sports, it's hard to find anything that compares. Maybe if Vikings coach Bud Grant had been the one telling defensive end Jim Marshall what to do when he scooped up a fumble and ran to the wrong end zone — and if that had been in the Super Bowl.

That's how off-the-charts this was.

Kramer certainly should've known better. This is a guy who's won the last three world cham-

pionships at 5,000 and 10,000 meters; holds the world record at both distances; and already won gold and set an Olympic record in the 5,000 at this Olympics.

"I've seen it once or twice in my career," former speedskating champion Dan Jansen said on NBC, "but never with a top skater and certainly never in the Olympic Games."

All Miller did was lose control and fail to finish his first run down the giant slalom course.

He missed his chance for a record fourth Alpine medal at a single Winter Games.
