### Lefors woman killed in accident All

Other driver airlifted to Amarillo

A Groom woman was in an Amarillo hospital today following a head-on collision that killed a Lefors

Veronica Sue Britten, 54, of Groom was airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo hospital Thursday afternoon following a two-car crash that killed Rhonda Kay Spotts, 44, of Lefors shortly after 1 p.m.

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers said Spotts was driving southbound in a white 1997 Mercury on Texas Highway 273 on the north side of Lefors near the Loop 398 intersection. Britten was driving northbound in a 2002 tan Chevrolet Impala.

Britten was airlifted to Amarillo by Pampa's LifeStar medical helicopter where she underwent surgery late Thursday.

Spotts and Britten were each alone in her respective car at the time of the accident.

Traffic on Texas Highway 273 was blocked three hours. Northbound traffic was detoured to the Bowers City highway.

### Rabies a growing concern in the region

Rabies is a growing concern in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains. A new case was reported in Randall County on Thursday.

Earlier this week, the Pampa City Commission named Animal Control Monty Supervisor Montgomery to head up the city's rabies prevention program.

Montgomery said that to date there have been no reported cases of rabies in Pampa. He added that he would like to see that con-

"There are four positive cases in the region," he

The region stretches across the panhandle and reaches as Lubbock. There have been cases

reported in Ochiltree County, Lubbock County and Childress County. While skunks were diagnosed with the disease near Perryton and Childress, a cat was diagnosed with rabies in Lubbock.

Montgomery said the

newest reported case was a skunk in Randall County.

"The skunk bit one puppy that they know of," Montgomery said, "but potentially exposed another 10.

He said that last year, Randall County reported five animals with rabies.

The biggest concern, he said, is the unvaccinated pets in the area.

"These unvaccinated animals are the ones that we come in contact with all the time," Montgomery

He said it's through the unvaccinated animals that people will become exposed to rabies.

"We are not going to get exposes to the skunks," Montgomery said. "We're not going to go play with them.'

The potential danger to humans is with the unvaccinated pets.

He said that people need to discourage animals from hanging around homes by picking up food left out for RABIES cont. on page 2

Pampa police officers serving a warrant found a woman hiding in a suitcase and carried her off to jail.

Officers received a tip shortly before noon Thursday that Pamela Woodruff, 48, had been seen driving into her driveway at 2222 Williston.

"Officers had been at the residence earlier trying to serve a warrant for her arrest," said Pampa Police Officer Stormy McCullar.

Returning to the house, police officers talked with Terry Wayne Stroud, 39, explaining that Woodruff was wanted by law enforcement authorities.

Pampa Police Sgt. Colby Brown got a search warrant for the residence. Officers found Woodruff hiding in a

suitcase that was in a closet. Woodruff was arrested on 11 municipal warrants including warrants

charging her with theft by check, issuance of a bad check, theft under \$50, failure to appear, not having a valid driver's license, displaying an expired motor vehicle registration and having an open container in her vehicle.

Stroud was arrested on charges of hindering an apprehension and prosecution of a fugitive.

### Texas ed board member walks out amid race debates

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -A longtime State Board of Education member accused her colleagues of "whitewashing" curriculum standards Thursday and walked out of the panel's meeting in frustration amid heated debates about race and the inclusion of Hispanics in

lesson plans.

The board had rejected an effort to include the names of two Hispanic Medal of Honor recipients and one black recipient in lessons for a world history class, but agreed to revisit the amendment for an American history class. It also approved an amendment that deletes a requirement that sociology students "explain how institutional racism is evident in American society."

"I mean we've already been whitewashing all of social studies up to this point and now we're doing it in sociology?" Democratic board member Mary Helen Berlanga said after Republican Barbara

Cargill's amendment was proposed. "You've got to leave some integrity in this."

The amendment was adopted on a 10-5 party line vote.

Decisions by the board - long led by social conservatives who have advocated ideas such as teaching more about the weaknesses of evolutionary theory affects textbook content nationwide because Texas is one of publishers' big-

gest clients. Berlanga, who has served on the board since 1982, walked out of the meeting after reviewing upcoming amendments involving the inclusion of Hispanic names in the standards.

"I've had it, this is it," she said. "I'm leaving. We can just pretend this is a white America and Hispanics don't exist."

Debate on the social studies standards has been marked by ideological squabbles over religion. and reflection of political viewpoints. Several people have asked the board during previous meetings to include more examples of prominent Hispanics.

Berlanga said race relations in the U.S. have progressed, but Hispanics "are still going through discrimination if we can't even put two names as recipients of the Medal of Honor."


But Republican board members argued that pinpointing three war heroes out of the thousands that have been honored "diminishes the accomplishment of other recipients."

"I would rather give teachers the academic freedom to possibly pull a winner from that school, that those children can relate to and emulate," said Terri Leo of Spring.

Geraldine Republican Miller, who was defeated in last week's primary election, took offense to claims of discrimination.

"You talk about discrimination, there are a lot of stories and it hurts," Miller said. "But we keep going and we learn tolerance.



If, after your child has been examined, you start talk ing about the sore ankle. the fever blister, etc., what you're interpreting as the 'evil eye" may be stress because the necessary amount of time was not allotted and the doctor will be behind schedule for the rest of the day.

If, however, you feel the doctor is insensitive or not meeting your child's needs, then you should change doctors.

Gray County's, Texas AgriLife Extension Service, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. The training program will be conducted on March 23 and 24 at the Gray County Annex, located at 12125 E. Frederic Ave., in Pampa,

There is a charge for the program, but the cost includes training, materials, and the State food manager certification examination. For more information, contact Joan Gray-Soria, CEA-FCS at 806-669-8033.

Under certain circumstances, every food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site. Local establishments may have already received a letter from the Texas Department of State Health Services regarding this rule. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of State Health Services must have one certified food manager. Food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

Increased customer satisfaction

•Improved relationships with health officials

Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:

·identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling

 preventing contamination and cross-contamination •teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for

employees complying with government regulations

·maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings

controlling pests

### Records link cell phone use to accidents

Cell phone use has contributed to thousands of Texas automobile accidents since 2005, according to records obtained by a San Antonio television station through an open-records request.

WOAI examined the Texas Department of Transportation database and found that investigating officers cited cell phone use as a contributing factor in more than 17,519

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — accidents with 7,519 injuries and 167 deaths. San Antonio led the state with 1,611 crashes in the past five years.

### New 4-H curriculum enrichment program will help Texas students understand local government

COLLEGE STATION What does ad valorem mean? What does a county clerk do? How are county governments in Texas structured, and what services do they offer?

These and other questions are answered in a new statewide 4-H curriculum enrichment program developed to increase awareness and understanding of local government among seventh- and 12thgrade students.

"We were looking into updating the 4-H County Government Guide, which was about 25 years old, but after extensive input the idea morphed into producing a new 4-H curriculum enrichment program," said Rick Avery, director, V.G. Young Institute of County Government, part of the Texas AgriLife Extension Service and one of the organizations developing

the program.

The result was "Keys to the Courthouse: A Curriculum Enrichment Program for Youth," a more than 170-page leadership-oriented publication on county government, produced through a partnership between the Texas Association of Counties, the County **Judges and Commissioners** Association of Texas and the V.G. Young Institute.

Each lesson includes information compatible with state-mandated Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills, TEKS, requirements and teachers may use these in conjunction with in their own lesson planning.

"The program features five lessons with associated, age-appropriate classroom and research activities," Avery said.

in addition to helping students meet requirements, the program will help them build "developmental assets," including community values and serving others, as well as life skills such as responsible citizenship, teamwork, planning and organization, he said.

Chapters of the publication address county government framework and function, services offered by county government, the justice system, local elections and voting, and financing county government. Contents include vocabulary, roles of elected and appointed county officials, county services, county legal system components, a description of the local election process, and an explanation of county funding and budgeting. There also are various age-appropriate activities, including additional vocabulary, review and note pages, fill-inthe-blank quizzes, word

The spiral-bound publication will include a foldout map of Texas counties and a DVD of program activities that may be printed separately.

cards, research projects

and a "County I.Q." test.

"The DVD also contains video tours of various county offices throughout the state which have been prepared by the Texas Association of Counties in its 'County Government: There When You Need It' video," said Gene Terry, executive director of the Texas Association of Counties.

"Unlike the counties in some other states, all 254 Texas counties have a similar form of county government, and that makes it much easier to use the curriculum statewide," Terry said. "County government is the level of government with which the average Texan will have the most interaction during his or her lifetime. Educating young people about county government will make them more familiar and comfortable with it, and help them understand how it benefits them and their

community." The program developed over a threeyear period with extensive input provided from focus groups consisting of county officials, school teachers and administrators, AgriLife Extension agents, and 4-H youth and adult leaders, explained Dr. Toby Lepley, AgriLife Extension 4-H and youth development specialist and state learning strategies coordinator.

"We received input from those who would be using the program and would have the most to offer toward determining its content and direction," Lepley said.

Burleson County Judge Mike Sutherland joined a 25-member focus group in Austin in 2008 to provide input toward curriculum development. "As a former teacher

who taught a class on government, we used to spend about two weeks on local government, about three weeks on state government and the rest of the semester on the federal government," he said. "Increasing the focus on local government and getting young people to understand its structure and limitations will help them become more well-informed and responsible citizens."

The program will "benefit society as young people learn the role of local government and how they can become more involved in it as a way to improve their community and state," added Sutherland, a member of the Texas Association of Counties and the County Judges and Commissioners

Association of Texas. "I thought it was great that they included me in a focus group," said Melanie Plemons, 18, who has been a member of Cooke County 4-H for 10 years. "It's important that young people know about voting and other things in the government. When you turn 21, government controls a lot of what you do, so you need to be informed."

An initial printing of the publication will be completed this spring and distributed statewide to county agents of AgriLife Extension involved in 4-H and youth development efforts. Agents will distribute or make these publications available to 4-H programs and county officials. They also will promote the materials directly to local social studies teachers, focusing

on seventh- and 12th-grade government classes. The publication also will be available on the AgriLife Bookstore Web site, http:// agrilifebookstore.org .

"In May, we will begin distributing these publications and also will be holding regional and district trainings to familiarize the agents with the program," Lepley said. "And in July, we plan to add the curriculum to the Texas 4-H Program Curriculum Catalog.'

In September, county AgriLife Extension personnel will begin actively marketing the program to school teachers during curriculum enrichment educational programs, he added. In November, a County Government Workshop is slated for the Texas 4-H Summit on the Texas A&M campus.

"The curriculum is also written so an elected official can use components of the curriculum with civic groups and other adult audiences to explain the role of each elected official and county government," Terry noted.

The materials also will be posted on the Texas Association of Counties public education Web site, www.TexasCounties4U. org, which includes videos showing how to obtain county services, plus other information about Texas county government, he said.

"4-H clubs can use this as part of their citizenship program, and judges and county officials can use it for educational and awareness efforts, plus we've also had 4-H parents who home-school express an interest in the program," Lepley said.

We're excited about this new curriculum enrichment program and hope it will help fill in any gaps in existing school curricula on county government, while helping young people be more aware of and involved in county government," Avery added.

### Leach deposition begins in lawsuit vs Texas Tech

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Former Texas Tech coach Mike Leach began giving sworn testimony Friday in the lawsuit he filed against the school after he was fired for allegedly mistreating a receiver suffering from the effects of a concussion.

Leach, dressed in khaki pants and a dark sports coat, arrived a few minutes early for depositions in the case. He didn't answer reporters' questions as he walked into a small basement conference room in his attorney's office build-

One of the attorneys for Texas Tech, Dicky Grigg, said he "had no idea" how long Leach would He and attorneys for Leach declined to comment on the case, citing a gag order from the judge.

deposition comes a day after Kent Hance, Texas Tech's chancellor, testified under oath and a day before the receiver, Adam James, is scheduled to give sworn testimony. His father, ESPN analyst and former NFL player Craig James, is also expected to testify Saturday.


The university fired Leach on Dec. 30, two days after suspending him amid allegations he mistreated James after the receiver suffered a concussion. Adam James said

Leach twice ordered him to stand for hours while confined in a dark place during practice.


Leach has denied he mistreated James. His lawsuit accuses the school of libel, slander and breach of con-

Leach has claimed he was fired for financial reasons. He was in the first \$12.7 million contract, and the school was to pay an \$800,000 bonus Dec. 31.

The judge in January ordered the two sides into mediation, which Grigg said is continuing.



## Providing a Technology-Rich Learning Environment

Students of today grow up in a technological world. Most of them cannot remember when their parents did not have a cell phone. They do not remember a world without microwave ovens, remote controls, and the Internet. They use computers or their cell phones to connect to others through text messaging, chat-rooms, and social networking sites such as Facebook, MySpace, and dren or grandchildren how many "friends" they have on Facebook. Chances are very good that they have hundreds of people that they communicate with on a daily basis through this or a similar site. All of these tools make their lives easier and open many

opportunities to them.

The skills that students use to socialize electronically are 21st century skills. These skills include using information and communications technology to gather and assess information, collaborate, innovate, think critically, and solve problems. These are skills that our students must have to function in the work world after they

Educators within Pampa ISD are committed to moving students into the 21st century and harnessing these 21st century skills. Our teachers, administrators, and board members work to provide students with the tools they need. However, many students do not have daily access to technology tools.

Recently, Pampa ISD has received additional funds from various sources that teachers and admin-

lowing guidelines:

istrators have used to purchase more of the technology tools to help prepare our students. One of the sources of these funds is the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act or stimulus program. Pampa ISD received an allotment of those funds that could be used at Title 1 schools. Over \$80,000 of this money went to purchase projectors and document cameras for our elementary schools. These tools help teachers incorporate digital media, Internet and other content sources in order to fully present the curriculum and engage students for learning.

Another source of funds is the Rural Technology Grant. These funds were distributed as grants to teachers within the district. Twenty grant applications were received. with requests ranging from \$5,000 to \$15,000. Of those 20 grants, four were funded, totaling \$50,000. Those funds went to purchase document cameras for seven science classrooms at Pampa High School, computers and math software for Algebra 1 classes at Pampa High School, and interactive slates and clickers for 8 classrooms at Lamar Elementary School. These interactive slates enable students to electronically participate in the lessons. Students can "write" on the slates and their work will show on the projector screen at the front of the room. The clickers allow students to respond to teachers' questions during the lesson. This provides both teachers and students with immediate feedback

the lesson content.
