## Sales tax receipts down

But year to year comparisons improving

The latest state sales tax receipts collected in Pampa reflect the financial plight of the nation, but it's better than last month's report.

The Texas Comptroller reported this week that the City of Pampa collected \$208,434.14 for sales in the month of January.

While that was about 18 percent less than the amount collected for the same period in 2009, Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes said that the report was better than last month when the comptroller reported Pampa collected 26 percent less than the year before.

In fact, for the first three months of the fiscal year, collections were down 20 percent, 25 percent and 26 percent.

Stokes said he hopes the latest report is an indication that the local economy is beginning to show signs of recovery.

"We're slowly climbing out of it," he said.

Pampa officials, preparing for an economic slow down, had cut the city's budget this fiscal year.

While the January report for November, 2009, (the comptroller's remittance reflects sales for two months prior to the report) was down 18 percent from 2009, the December report for October's sales tax was 2.51 percent above what had been budgeted and the February report for December was 1.24 percent above projec-

Four months into the fiscal year, the city is down about five percent. It had budgeted \$1,064,000.00 through this month. It has received \$1,006,634.90 in sale tax

remittances. Of the total \$277,912.10 sales tax receipts returned to the City of Pampa by the state comptroller this month, \$69,478.05 goes to the Pampa Economic Development Corporation.

Individuals at the forefront of wind energy development in the region will be the guest speakers at a luncheon in Pampa on Thursday, March 25. The seating is limited and there is a charge for the lunch, so reservations need to be made in advance.

Ken Starcher from the Alternative Energy Institute at WTA&M and Cameron Fredkin of Cross Texas Transmission will be speaking on wind industry developments in the Panhandle region.

The meeting, hosted by the Pampa Economic Development Corporation (EDC) and Class 4 Winds,

Inc., is part of an effort to get local people interested in wind energy development connected with likeminded people and with people already involved in the industry.

"The meeting is open to anyone who has an interest in wind," said Clay Rice, the executive director of the Pampa EDC. "Class 4 Winds, Inc. is an excellent organization that is doing well in promoting wind energy in our area.'

Rice said the meeting will be held at the Pampa AmericInn and will provide enough seating for about 150 people.

A. J. Swope, the executive director of Class 4 Winds, said the organization, formed under the

auspices of WTA&M, has been working primarily in Amarillo. Pampa will be its first "field trip," beginning an effort to network with outlying areas in the Panhandle region.

"Pampa has been a member of Class 4 Winds for almost a year and, with our relationship with the EDC, we thought it would be the best place to kick off this outlying effort," Swope said.

Ken Starcher is a member of the organization's Governing Board and the head of WTA&M's Alternative Energy Institute (AEI).

"Ken has been with AEI probably 30 years and is now considered one of the foremost authorities on

wind energy in this region and through the United States," Swope said. "AEI has been in existence since the mid-70s and now has an unbelievable amount of data about wind in this

"He (Starcher) has been gracious enough to serve on our board and executive committee and help shape what we do.'

Swope said attendees can expect Starcher to give a broad overview of wind energy and an update on what is happening around the state and in the Panhandle region and what can be expected in the future.

Cameron Fredkin is the director of project development of Cross Texas

Transmission LLC, a company selected by the Texas **Public Utility Commission** to construct, operate and maintain over 200 miles of double circuit 345-kV transmission lines and associated equipment in the Texas Panhandle.

"People will be able to ask questions," Swope said, adding that the idea is to help people interested in wind energy to network with people who are already involved in the industry.

### Abilene man receives prison sentence for state tax evasion

AUSTIN) — An Abilene man has been sentenced to prison for two years for trying to avoid paying motor fuel tax. Tommy Eugene Aaron, 51, pled guilty to the second degree felony offense of evading motor fuel tax on March 3 in a Travis County court. Aaron was charged with stealing dyed diesel fuel valued between \$1,500 and \$20,000, storing it without a required permit, using it in vehicles driven on the highway and failing to pay motor fuel tax.

Dyed diesel is untaxed diesel fuel intended to be used in off-road vehicles such as farm tractors and construction equipment. It is colored so law enforcers can easily tell when untaxed fuel is illegally used in highway vehicles.

In fiscal 2009, the state collected about \$3 billion in gasoline and diesel fuel

"Through the motor fuels tax, drivers pay to build

and maintain Texas highways," Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said. "We will continue to pursue tax evaders to the full extent of the law to ensure that revenue for state operations gets collected."

The Criminal Investigation Division of the Comptroller's office, Winkler County Sheriff's Office, the Loving County Sheriff's Office, the Jones County Sheriff's Office and the Vehicle Commercial Enforcement Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety participated in the investigation. The case was prosecuted by the Motor Fuel Tax Fraud Division of the Travis County District Attorney's





## Gray County awarded federal funds under Emergency Food and Shelter Program

been chosen to receive \$12,580.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U. S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal **Emergency** Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A; The Jewish Federations of North America; The Salvation Army; and United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in highneed areas around the coun-

A Local Board made up of Pampa United Way, Gray County Judge, Ministerial Associations, City of Pampa Representative, The Salvation Army, Pampa Meals on Wheels, Good Samaritan Christian Services. Southside Senior Citizens Center, Tralee Crisis Center, Good Samaritan Christian Services and the Harvest House will determine how the funds awarded to Gray County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the pro-


Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and / or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Gray County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with The Salvation Army, Southside Senior Citizens Center, Good Samaritan Christian Services, Harvest House, Tralee Crisis Center,

and Pampa Meals On Wheels participating. These agencies were responsible for providing 3,457 meals, 230 nights lodging, 18 paid utilities, and 2 rent pay-

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Katrina Bigham at the Pampa United Way office at 200 N. Ballard, suite 105 or call the office at 669-1001 for an application. The deadline for applications is March 19, 2010.

# reparing for the 'wind boom'

As we in the Texas Panhandle prepare ourselves for what some are calling the 'wind boom,' many are asking how exactly wind energy development might affect the region.

I think the number one question I get from the general public regarding the economic impacts of wind, has to do with royalties received by landowners with wind turbines on their property. It's important to realize however, that the beneficial community impacts associated with the wind energy industry are far broader than that.

Starting at the beginning, let's look at the construction process of a wind farm. According to the National Renewable Energy Laboratory, for every 100 Megawatts of a wind farm there will be a need of 90 construction workers on average.

After a wind development is complete, the owner of the wind farm must hire a staff to operate and maintain the turbines. NREL states that each 100 MW of a wind farms creates an average of 10 O&M

Aside from jobs directly related to the construction and operation of wind farms, there is the possibility of manufacturing facilities moving into the region. In fact, in the past year Amarillo has announced two wind industry manufacturers that have plans of building plants in the city. This could lead to the cre-

ation of hundreds of jobs. These jobs created by the wind industry's presence in a region can benefit other businesses in the community in different ways. For instance, when construction workers come from another region, they occupy local hotels, eat at local restaurants, buy goods from local stores, etc.

How can a community that is too small to house a manufacturing facility benefit economically from a wind development? Many small towns and rural counties have seen economic benefit in the form of an increased tax base.

Take a look at the town of Sweetwater, Texas in Nolan County. In 2008, it was reported that the money wind farms added to the county tax base was \$16.2 Sweetwater's million.

#### Flood Awareness Week

March 15-19 is Flood Safety Awareness Week. The National Weather Service and the Texas Division of Emergency Management are urging people to be aware of the dangers of driving into flooded roadways. When there's water running across a road, drivers should save their lives - and their cars - by turning around and choos-

· Six inches of water can cause tires to lose traction and begin to slide. Twelve inches of water can float many cars. Two feet of rushing water will carry off pick-up trucks, SUVs and most other vehicles.

· Flash floods are especially treacherous at night when it is very difficult to see how deep waters may be or how fast water is rising.

· Water across a road may hide a missing segment of roadbed or a missing bridge.

· Drivers often underestimate the power of rising flood-

water. In flash floods, waters rise so rapidly they may be far deeper by the time you are halfway across, trapping you in your vehicle.

 Floodwater weakens roadbeds. Drivers should proceed cautiously even after waters have receded, since the road may collapse under the weight of the vehicle.

# Scholars to discuss dust bowl at Guymon

Guymon, OK - On Sunday afternoon, April 14, 1935, a black blizzard that blotted out the sun hit the Great Plains with the biggest impact being felt in the Oklahoma Panhandle. Find out what that was like by attending the Dust Bowl Symposium planned for Guymon, OK Friday and Saturday, April 9-10.

When that storm hit people scrambled indoors or into their storm cellars. Many thought it was the end of the world. Cars were stranded on the roads due to poor visibility or dust smothering the engines. People caught outside became disoriented and day turned to night; the event has become known as Black Sunday.

The day after Black Sunday, an Associated Press reporter used the term "Dust Bowl" for the first time. "Three little words achingly familiar on the Western farmer's tongue, rule life in the dust bowl of the continent - if it rains." The term stuck and was used by radio report-

ers and writers, in private letters and public speeches.

Seventy-five years later, the memories of the Dust Bowl still define the Panhandle area, and to commemorate the event planners are bringing to Guymon "Drought, Displacement and Determination: A Dust Bowl Symposium." The two-day event on April 9 and 10 will allow survivors to recall what it was like and others to hear speakers who talk about the major impact the Dust Bowl had on area residents. Generous funding for the event has been provided by the Oklahoma Humanities Council.

On Friday, April 9, the movie "The Grapes of Wrath" and the documentary "The Plow that Broke. the Plains" will be presented at the Northridge 8 Cinema in Guymon at 3 p.m. for the Depressionera price of 35-cents in order for everyone to see the portrayal of "Okies" by Hollywood and learn how plowing up the Great Plains led to an ecological

Saturday April 10 events will take place at Draper Farms west of Guymon. Signs along Highway 54 will direct attendees to the site. Events will take place all day and there is no admission charge. Attendees may come for all or part of the events. At 8:30 a.m. everyone is invited to gather and enjoy Dust Bowl images and memories. Major funding for this event is provided by the Oklahoma Humanities Council.

There will be an open microphone during periods throughout the day facilitated by Dr. Sara Jane Richter, head of the humanities department at OPSU. Richter will give her well-researched talk, "Down and Dirty, But Not Out: Women of the High Plains During the Dust Bowl" at 11 a.m. This talk has been well-received at venues such as the Kansas Library Convention and involved hundreds of interviews with women who survived the Dust Bowl in Oklahoma, Kansas and

Richter is also the author of a readers' theatre production to be presented at 3:45 p.m., If Only It'd Rain . Cast will include Dr. Wayne Stewart of Goodwell, Dr. Brad Duren of Guymon, Kevin and Debbie Richter of Hennessey and the author herself. Dr. Matthew Saunders of OPSU has composed a musical score that will accompany the production.

The Saturday events will kick off at 9 a.m. when former Guymon mayor Jess Nelson will give the welcome and introduce Dr. Paul Bonnifield, author of The Dust Bowl: Men, Dirt and Depression. Bonnifeld will speak on the topic "The Days of the Dust Bowl" at 9:10 a.m.

Food will be available for purchase at noon catered by a local church followed by activities for school-age children arranged by the Texas County 4-Hers and Girl Scouts.

Other speakers for the day include Gary McManus of the Oklahoma

# Outlook fair for spring turkey season in Texas

per expectations for this spring's turkey season after back-to-back years of dry conditions negatively impacted nesting success across much of Texas, resulting in fewer gobblers on the ground.

The good news is 2007 produced a bumper crop of birds and that carryover of mature toms in South Texas and the Hill Country, combined with excellent nesting habitat conditions this year, could result in abovenormal breeding activity.

TPWD estimates about 72,000 hunters take part in Texas' spring turkey season and take about 25,000 gobblers. Most of the state's spring turkey hunting activity occurs in South Texas and in the Hill Country, where Texas Parks and Wildlife Department turkey program leader Jason Hardin noted timely rainfall could give the bird population a boost.

"I expect there will be enough older birds to keep the season interesting, predicts Hardin. "All of the moisture we have had this winter is setting the stage for an early hatch. If the moisture continues I expect the population to boom in these areas and get us back on track."

Rio Grande spring turkey hunting season opens in the North Zone April 3 and runs through May 16. Special youth-only weekends are set for March 27-28 and May 22-23. The South Zone opens March

20 and runs through May 2, with youth-only weekends set for March 13-14 and May 8-9.

A special one-gobbleronly Rio Grande spring season is set for April 1-30 in 8 counties, including: Bastrop, Caldwell, Fayette, Colorado, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee and Milam counties,

The spring gobbleronly eastern turkey season is open in 43 East Texas counties from April 1-30 with a 1 bird bag.

TPWD biologist Ralph Suarez in Ballinger is based along a transitional area between the northern Hill Country, southern Rolling Plains and western cross timbers. He says that they have had near record moisture this winter and that he is seeing a lot of green weeds already. Suarez is predicting an early start to the nesting season, however, he expects the overall number of gobblers to be down this season due to the past two years of drought.

Gene T. Miller, TPWD biologist in Canyon, says that production has been better in his area of the Panhandle than farther south in Texas and he expects to have a decent crop of 2, 3, and 4-year old birds in the eastern Panhandle. Miller advises the later you hunt in the

season the core productive the hunting should be. "From what I have seen in the Rolling Plains I tend to agree with Gene," says Hardin. "We have seen a fair number of jakes over

the last two years. They have not had a boom year since 2007, but they have had more moisture than the rest of the Rio range. This year is shaping up to be a boom year. We just need this moisture to continue. All this moisture should lead to great productions."

Trans-Pecos The region also looks pretty good, according to Philip Dickerson, TPWD biologist in Alpine, who commented that staff saw quite a few flocks while flying mule deer surveys and that 2008 reproduction

was pretty good. "There appeared to have been good numbers of birds in 2009 on many of the ranches I contacted about turkeys," Dickerson says. "Overall the habitat conditions are very good across the region. With decent production in 2009 and the excellent wet conditions we've had, the hens should have no problem getting into nesting condition this spring."

Hardin notes that those ranches that adapted to the recent droughts by reducing stocking rates and maintaining adequate es to the recent moisture. cover should have the most rapid and positive respons-
