Supreme Court halts Skinner execution

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — The U.S Supreme Court on Wednesday stopped the execution of condemned prisoner Hank Skinner about an hour before he could have been taken to the Texas death chamber.

Skinner asked the court and Gov. Rick Perry for the delay for DNA testing that he insisted could clear him in a triple slaying.

The brief order grants him the delay but does not ensure he will get such testing. Perry had not decided on the delay.

Skinner, 47, faced lethal injection for the bludgeoning and strangling of his girlfriend, 40-year-old Twila Jean Busby, and the stabbings of her two adult sons. The slayings occurred at their home in the Texas Panhandle town of Pampa on New Year's Eve in 1993.

The court order came as relatives of Busby were climbing the steps of the Huntsville prison to prepare to witness his punishment.

In the order, the justices said they would put off the execution until they decide whether to review his case. If the court refuses the review, the reprieve is lifted, according to the order, and that would make Skinner eligible for another execution date.



PGWCD cancels spring elections

WHITE DEER — The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District cancelled this spring's elections because candidates are unopposed.

Hathcoat jury still deliberating

A 10-woman and two-man jury were still deliberating the fate of Darren William Hathcoat

late this morning. Hathcoat, 45, is charged with assaulting an elderly person. He is accused of pushing his aunt, 73-yearold Shirley Presson, into a stove in her kitchen as she fixed supper for him last

Testimony started Wednesday afternoon, with Gray County Deputy Sheriff Bradly Christain testifying that Presson had come to the sheriff's office about 10 p.m. on May 8 to say that Hathcoat had pushed her against a stove in her home, causing bruises to her left arm.

Presson then took the stand to tell the jury that Hathcoat had insisted that she take him to buy

over-the-counter cold medicine. When she told him that she'd lost her driver's license and refused to drive him to the store, Presson said Hathcoat became belligerent and cursed her. She said he grabbed her by both shoulders and pushed her against the stove in the kitchen where she had been preparing chicken fried

steak for their supper.

Presson testified that Hathcoat threatened to push her head in a pot of boiling water on the

Mental anguish claimed in Hathcoat suit

Darren Hathcoat was segregated from other inmates in the Gray County jail after being arrested on assault and drug charges last year, but his complaint is that he has to eat off Styrofoam trays with his bare hands.

Hathcoat, 44, went on trial yesterday on charges of assaulting an elderly person. The drug charges are pending.

Last week, Hathcoat filed a lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Amarillo against Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland, Jail Administrator Shelly McCarn and Assistant Jail Administrator Lisa

Parmen, saying that they ordered all jailers and civilian kitchen workers to feed him off Styrofoam trays with no utensils.

"I had to eat with my bare hands for 11 months, Hathcoat said in his federal complaint.

Skinner, in a small holding cell a few feet from the Courts over the years since his conviction have agreed, death chamber, expressed surprise when was informed of the reprieve in a phone call from his lawyer.

"I had made up my mind I was going to die," he said. "I'm eager to get the DNA testing so I can prove my innocence and get the hell out of here.

"I'm greatly relieved. I feel like I really won today.' Rob Owen, Skinner's lead attorney and a University

of Texas law professor, said the court action suggested the justices believed "there are important issues that require closer examination." 'We remain hopeful that the court will agree to

hear Mr. Skinner's case and ultimately allow him the chance to prove his innocence through DNA testing," If the Supreme Court refuses to review Skinner's

case, a judge can set a new execution date no sooner than 30 days after the justices' decision.

Skinner, splattered with the blood of at least two of the victims, was arrested about three hours after the bodies were found. Police found him in a closet at the frailer home of a woman he knew.

The former oil field and construction worker said he was present when the three were killed but couldn't have committed the murders. Skinner said a combination of vodka and codeine left him passed out on a couch and physically incapable of clubbing Busby 14 times with an ax handle and stabbing her sons, Elwin "Scooter" Caler, 22, and Randy Busby, 20.

"I've been framed ever since," he said last week. "They're fixing to kill me for something I didn't do." Prosecutors argued Skinner wasn't entitled to testing of evidence that wasn't analyzed before his 1995 trial. cont. from page 1

rejecting his appeals.

Skinner's lawyers want to pursue in federal district court a civil case against the Gray County District Attorney, whose office prosecuted Skinner initially. That suit seeks to make evidence available for testing.

They'd made a similar appeal to Perry. Skinner's attorneys want DNA testing on vaginal swabs taken from Busby at the time of her autopsy, fingernail clippings, a knife found on the porch of Busby's house and a second knife found in a plastic bag in the house, a towel with the second knife, a jacket next to Busby's body and any hairs found in her hands that were not destroyed in previous testing. Only the hairs were tested previously and those results were inconclusive, according to court docu-

Skinner's trial lawyer, Harold Comer, chose not to test all the evidence because he feared the outcome

would be more damaging to his client. Comer said he now favors the testing but defended

his trial strategy.

"I would make the same decision with the same circumstances again," he said.

Trial prosecutor John Mann, who has since died, also did not have all the evidence tested. Current District Attorney Lynn Switzer, now the defendant in Skinner's lawsuit, declined to comment about the case as Skinner's execution neared. Lawyers representing her office challenged the suit as improper.

Skinner would have been the fifth person executed this year in Texas, the nation's most active capital punishment state. Twenty-four people were put to







Health bill hits snag

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's not quite over yet. Democrats hit a snag Thursday in their drive to rush through a package of fixes to the big health care law signed by President Barack Obama, but they still hoped for final passage in yet another late-night session.

House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer said that if the Senate finished its work by afternoon, as expected, the House would immediately take up the bill. Democrats are saying they do not expect any major problems — but they're also keeping their fingers crossed.

Senate leaders had planned to complete work on the fix-it bill by midday Thursday and get it quickly to Obama. But Republicans established that they would be able to kill some language in the bill that relates to grants for low-income college students. That meant the altered bill would have to be returned to the House — four days after House members thought they'd seen the last of it late Sunday night.

Senators who had been in session past 2 a.m. Thursday returned to work on a long list of proposed Republican amendments.

The president, who signed the separate landmark legislation into law on Tuesday, was flying to Iowa for an afternoon speech, the first of many appearances around the country to sell his health care revamp before the fall congressional elections.

Obama was appearing in Iowa City, where as a presidential candidate in 2007 he touted his ideas for health coverage for all. His trip comes as polls show people are divided over the new law, and Democratic lawmakers hope he can convince more voters by November that their support was the right move.

Meanwhile, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., voiced concern over warnings of violent reprisals against members of Congress who voted for the overhaul.

She said the response has "no place in a civil debate in our country." Republicans, too, went to the House floor to plead with opponents of the health care law to refrain from violence and threats.

The FBI is working with lawmakers subjected to menacing obscenity-laced phone messages. In some instances, bricks were hurled at congressional offices, including Rep. Louise Slaughter's district headquarters in Niagara Falls, N.Y.

As an exhausted Senate labored into the wee hours Thursday on a stack of GOP amendments to the followup bill, Jim Manley, spokesman for Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, told reporters that Republicans consulting with the chamber's parliamentarian had found "two minor provisions" that violate Congress' budget

Republicans have been hunting for such violations in hopes of bringing down the legislation. Democrats had also been consulting with the parliamentarian, Alan Frumin, and hoped they had written a measure that would not be vulnerable to such problems.

The two provisions were expected to be formally removed from the bill on Thursday. Manley said he expected the Senate to approve the measure without them and send it to the House. He said Senate leaders, after conversations with top House Democrats, expect the House to approve the revised measure.

Both chambers are hoping to begin a spring recess by

E ANONYMOUS: The circumstances of your daughter's birth were very different from those of your sons. When you look at her, you may be reminded of a chapter in your life you would prefer to forget. How sad for

both of you. The way you treat her, particularly in relation to her half-brothers -- will affect the way she perceives herself for the rest of her life. People whose parents treat them as unlovable often regard themselves as not "measuring up," and it can cause self-esteem problems that last a lifetime.

Ordinarily, I would encourage you to seek low-cost therapy through your county department of mental health for the sake of both you and your daughter. If that isn't possible, then I advise you to hold your tongue, control your temper and compel yourself to show your daughter approval and affection every day until it becomes a habit or she's old enough to leave -- whichever comes first.



Today's Highlight in History:

On March 25, 1965, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. led 25,000 marchers to the state capitol in Montgomery, Ala., to protest the denial of voting rights to blacks.

On this date:



Dems take first win in healthcare war, but long-term future on life support

The long legislative war over Obamacare now moves to larger and more contentious political battlegrounds in the House and Senate midterm elections and the federal courts.

Obamacare squeaked through the Democratic House on bare-knuckled power politics - despite recent polls showing 54 percent of Americans are opposed to it — and justified fears that its true costs will send federal spending, borrowing and taxes to unprecedented levels.

But the war against the most sweeping government power grab in U.S. history isn't over; it's just become wider and, politically, more lethal — for Democrats. Let's take these one at a time.

Heading into the final stages of the health care battle, Democrats were facing losses in November of 20 to 30 seats in the House, and perhaps four to five seats in the Senate, according to most election forecasters.

Their potential losses mushroomed after the House vote when nearly a dozen Democrats who had voted against Obamacare last year switched to the yes column Sunday under intense pressure from the White House and their party's leadership.

Many of the switchers are "freshmen" facing particularly tough reelection prospects in conservative-leaning districts, and at least 20 who voted for it are from districts Obama lost in 2008. Switchers like Reps. Betsy

Markey of Colorado and Suzanne Kosmas of Florida, who went from no to yes, are in Republican-leaning districts that voted for John McCain in 2008 and where voter anger with Obamacare is strong.

Election handicappers and pollsters say Sunday's vote has improved GOP prospects for gains in November, possibly as many as 30 seats in the House, and maybe even six to seven pickups in the Senate. Democratic Senate seats are in jeopardy in Delaware, Connecticut, Nevada, Illinois, Colorado, Arkansas, Pennsylvania and North Dakota.

A big reason behind this wave is that voter intensity is in favor of the GOP. An NBC News and Wall Street Journal poll shows Republicans with a double-digit lead over Democrats when voters were asked which party they'll support in their congressional districts.

"Obama and the Democratic Congressional leadership have dug themselves into a deep and dangerous hole, and the only question right now seems to be the severity of the drubbing," elections forecaster Stuart Rothenberg writes in The Rothenberg Political Report this week.

Meantime, another front in the war on Obamacare has opened among the states and in the federal courts where an armada of lawsuits are about to be filed to block key provisions in the new health

Legislation and constitutional amendments have been introduced in at least three dozen states that argue the government has illegally exceeded its Constitutional reach by requiring citizens to purchase health care plans or else suffer hundreds of dollars in annual tax penalties. Thousands of Internal Revenue Service agents will be hired to police this mandate and crack down on any citizen who refuses to do so.

Virginia and Idaho have enacted bans against the mandates, and many other states are expected to follow suit. State attorneys general in Virginia, Idaho, South Carolina and Florida are preparing to file lawsuits in federal court in a legal battle that is expected to go to the Supreme Court.

'While Congress has used its taxing power to fund Social Security and Medicare, never before has it used its commerce power to mandate that an individual person engage in an economic transaction with a private company," Georgetown University law professor Randy E. Barnett writes in The Washington Post this week.

The courts have usually upheld the government's regulatory powers in interstate commerce. But that is no longer a certainty in the conservative high court that for the first time has struck down bans on firearms and upheld a corporation's right to spend money in political campaigns. Further fueling the back-

lash against Obama's massive expansion of government entitlements - despite the nearinsolvency of Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid — are the Congressional Budget Office's dubious cost estimates claiming that Obamacare is paid for and, indeed, will cut the deficit.

Most of CBO's estimates are based on specious political expectations that Congress will, as its bill promises, slash \$500 billion in Medicare costs over 10 years, which will never happen. Lawmakers passed legislation to slash Medicare payments to doctors and postpone, each year, their action for another year in the socalled "doc fix."

Their real plan will eventually call for a nationwide sales tax to keep the health care plan alive and, by then, there will be another powerful special interest group lobbying for its immortality.

Meanwhile, if you want to see the future of Obamacare, look at what's happened under the very similar health care plan in Massachusetts that has turned into yet another oppressive entitlement funded by taxpayers.

'More than half of the 408,000 newly insured residents pay nothing," says health care analyst Grace-Marie Turner. Another 140,000 people were uninsured, assessed a penalty or exempted. Because of the shortage of doctors, more than half the state's internalmedicine doctors no longer accept new patients; emergency rooms are packed, insurance mandates have driven up health care costs, waiting periods to see a doctor are much longer, and three of four major insurers had operating losses last year as medical expenses soar.

That's what awaits all of us in the age of Obamacare unless it is stopped.

Farmers Branch anti-immigrant law invalidated

ACLU OF TEXAS

Yesterday, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund (MALDEF), the American Civil Liberties Union Foundation of Texas (ACLU) and the National ACLU Immigrants' Rights Project succeeded in invalidating Ordinance 2952, the latest in a series of anti-immigrant ordinances enacted by Farmers Branch, Texas. The ordinance was adopted by the Farmers Branch City Council in January of 2008. The federal court decision forbids the City from ever enforcing the Ordinance.

In a careful opinion, U.S. District Court Judge Jane . Boyle determined that Ordinance 2952 was preempted by federal law. The Court resoundingly rejected the City's claim that it had the authority to regulate the resi-dence of noncitizens within its borders. Noting that the City Building Inspector would be charged with interpreting and applying immigration information to prospective tenants, the court concluded that Ordinance 2952 "is an invalid regulation of immigration" and that the "Ordinance nds as an obstacle to the

uniform application of federal immigration law."

"Once again, Farmers Branch has wasted hundreds of thousands of its taxpayer' money enacting and defending an unconstitutional ordinance," stated Nina Perales, MALDEF Southwest Regional Counsel. "This decision sends a strong message that Farmers Branch should stop wasting vital city resources on a string of failures in court," continued Perales.

"The Court's opinion confirms what we have known from the beginning of this fight, back in November, 2006 - that Farmers Branch's effort to legislate in the realm of immigration is a quixotic attempt to circumvent federal law and clearly established precedent," said Lisa Graybill, Legal Director for the ACLU of Texas. "With this third strike, hopefully the City of Farmers Branch will get out of the immigration enforcement business and move on to address its municipal obligations through more constructive and constitutional local policies." "This decision has national

significance. It is another indication of the costs incurred on all sides by the failure of our national leaders to enact immigration reform legislation that would provide clearly and expressly that state and local laws seeking to regulate immigrants in this way are unlawful," commented Thomas A. Saenz, President and General Counsel of MALDEF.

'While our Constitution plainly preempts such laws, a clear expression by Congress would help to prevent local entities from embarking on the costly enactment of laws that will inevitably be struck down as unconstitutional." Saenz explained.

Omar Jadwat, staff attorney with the ACLU Immigrants Rights Project, added: "Local laws restricting access to housing based on immigration status have a zero-percent success rate in court, as Judge Boyle noted in her opinion. Advocates have challenged ordinances of this type in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, California, Missouri, and Texas, and the result in every case has been invalidation or repeal."

Bin Laden threatens U.S. over alleged 9/11 plotter

CAIRO (AP) - Osama bin Laden threatened in a new message released Thursday to kill any Americans al-Qaida captures if the U.S. executes the self-professed mastermind of the Sept. 11 attacks or other al-Qaida suspects.

In the 74-second audiotape aired on Al-Jazeera television, the al-Qaida leader explicitly mentions Khalid Sheik Mohammed, who was captured in Pakistan in 2003. He is the most senior al-Qaida operative in U.S. custody and is currently detained at the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

In 2008, the U.S. charged Mohammed with murder and war crimes in connection with the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks on the U.S. Pentagon officials have said they will seek the death penalty for him. Four of his fellow plotters are

"The White House has expressed its desire to execute them. The day America makes that decision will be the day it has issued a death sentence for any one of you that is taken captive," Bin Laden said, addressing Americans.

A U.S. counterterrorism official said it is absurd for al-Qaida to suggest it is going to start treating captives

"They may have forgotten Danny Pearl and all the others they ve slaughtered, but we haven t," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity in order to discuss classified information.

After his March 2003 capture in Pakistan, Mohammed described himself as the architect of numerous terrorism plots and even claimed that "with my blessed right hand," he had decapitated Wall Street Journal reporter Daniel Pearl. Pearl was found beheaded in Pakistan in 2002.

The U.S. is still considering whether to put Mohammed and the four fellow plotters on military tribunal. The Obama administration is also looking into recommendations for civilian trials, and is expected to announce a decision soon.

Al-Qaida is not known to be holding any Americans captive now. But the Haqqani group — the Pakistanbased Taliban faction closest to al-Qaida — is holding American soldier Pfc. Bowe Bergdahl who was captured in eastern Afghanistan in June 2009. It released a video of him in December.

Bin Laden also said President Barack Obama is following in the footsteps of his predecessor George W. Bush by escalating the war in Afghanistan, being "unjust" to al-Qaida prisoners and supporting Israel in its occupation of Palestinian land.

"The politicians of the White House were and still are wronging us, especially by supporting Israel and occupying our land in Palestine. They think that America, behind oceans, is safe from the wrath of the oppressed, until the reaction was loud and strong in your homeland," he said of the Sept. 11 attacks. "Equal treatment is only fair. War is a back-and- forth."

Bin Laden is believed to be hiding somewhere in the rugged, lawless border region between Afghanistan and

Pentagon changes discharge rules

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Robert Gates Thursday approved new rules that will make it harder to discharge gays from the military, calling the changes a matter of "common sense and common decency."

Gates announced new guidelines for how the Pentagon carries out the 1993 law banning gays from serving openly in the military — rules which essentially put higher-ranking officers in charge of discharge proceedings and impose tougher requirements for evidence used against gays.

The new guidelines go into effect immediately and will apply to cases already open. They are considered a stopgap measure until Congress decides whether to go along with President Barak Obama's call for a repeal of the "don't ask, don't tell" law.

"I believe these changes represent an important improvement in the way the current law is put into practice, above all by providing a greater measure of common sense and common decency for handling what are complex and difficult issues for all involved," Gates told a Pentagon news conference.

The changes raise the level of officer authorized to initiate a fact-finding inquiry into a case, the level of officer who can conduct an inquiry and of the one that can authorize a dismissal.

Mexico's King of Heroin' nabbed

MEXICO CITY (AP) -Mexican authorities say they have arrested a major drug trafficker known as the "King of Heroin" for the massive amounts of drugs he moved into the U.S. each year.

Police say that Jose Antonio Medina, nicknamed "Don Pepe," was arrested in the western Mexican state of Michoacan on Wednesday.

Ramon Pequeno, head of the anti-narcotics division for Mexico's federal police, said Thursday that Medina worked for the La Familia cartel running a complex smuggling operation that hauled 440 pounds (200 kilograms) of heroin each month across the border.





New NFL playoffs' OT rule still has same concept

Last Tuesday, 28 of 32 NFL owners approved the new overtime format for the playoffs. In the new format, if the team that receives the ball first only scores a field goal, then the other team will also get the ball. If the second team only kicks a field goal, then the rest of overtime would be the original sudden death format.

However the question is did it really change anything?

The reason this debate came about was because so many teams that won the coin toss in overtime won the game on their first possession. According to an article on the NFL's Web

site, the team that correctly called the coin toss won the game 60 percent of the

The coin toss doesn't determine the winner at all. If that was the case, then all the teams would have to do is watch a coin get flipped. The team that lost the coin toss has the opportunity to stop the other team and get the ball back. Just like regulation, all a defense has to do is stop the opposing team on three or four downs or force a turnover before that.

In other words, the 60 percent that won the game that happened to correctly call the coin toss didn't win because they correctly called the coin toss. They won because the oppos-

ing defense couldn't stop them.

For example, last year if the Minnesota Vikings would have stopped the New Orleans Saints on their first overtime possession and then won the game, this debate may have never surfaced.

Under the new overtime rule for the playoffs, the concept is still the same. You have to play defense. The team that loses the coin toss under the new rules would still have to stop the opponents at some point on the field. If the other team scores a touchdown the game is over just like it would be under the old rules.

So all the new rules allow is the chance for both teams to stop the other from scoring. If both teams only make field goals, they are still going to have to make one more defensive

The Atlanta Falcons President Rich McKay, told NFL.com the old rules weren't producing

the fairest result. Not true; the defense had the same opportunity to stop the offense and get the ball back as the offense did to score on the other team.

Additionally, teams can avoid overtime if they execute on offense and defense. So the questions I have for the 60 percent of teams that have lost games in overtime on the first possession are: Why didn't you score more in regulation? Why didn't you allow less points? If a team scores on every possession and stop the opponents on every possession, they won't go to overtime.

I also heard on ESPN the scenario that under the old rules all the team would have to do is have a long

kickoff return, do nothing on first and second down, get defensive pass interference on third down and win the game with a field goal.

Let me shatter that scenario or alter it. Don't allow a long kickoff return, do allow nothing on first and second down, and just play good defense on third and not commit a penalty. There you have it: It's fourth down and long and the offense is far from field goal range. So congrats you get the ball back and have a chance to win the game.

So all in all, the rule change only will provide a more exciting way for one team to stop the other team in the playoffs next season.

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) - Chad Tracy hit a threerun double and Sean Marshall threw four strong innings to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 12-1 win over the Texas Rangers on Wednesday.

Marlon Byrd added an RBI single and Kosuke Fukudome was 3 for 3 with an RBI double, a walk and two runs scored for the Cubs. Marshall, battling for a

"My attitude is always to keep a positive attitude whatever role I'm in and help the team win some games," Marshall said. "We'll see what happens."

Texas starter Brandon McCarthy allowed four runs on four hits in a 45-pitch first inning. The right-hander lasted 3 1-3 innings, giving up eight hits with four walks and a strikeout.

"I'm definitely not happy with the results," said McCarthy, who also opened with a 40-pitch first inning in his last start. "It comes down to outs and keeping runs off the board and in that area I was lacking."

Rangers manager Ron Washington said it was unlikely McCarthy, whose ERA ballooned to 8.03, would move to the bullpen.

"He's a guy who's got routines," he said. "I'm not going to say absolutely no but it's not something we've talked about."

The Cubs added six runs in the sixth off Rangers reliever Luis Mendoza and two more in the seventh. Chicago finished with I

Harden spurs Thunder past Houston Rockets

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — James Harden let loose his first 3-pointer after two weeks away, then bounced a couple times as the ball sailed toward the

When the ball splashed down, the Oklahoma City Thunder's missing piece had returned with a flourish to lead the way in a dominating win with implications on the Western

Conference playoff race. Harden returned from an injury to supplement Kevin Durant's 25 points with 23 of his own, and the Thunder ended a string of futility against the Houston Rockets with a 122-104 victory on Wednesday

"I just wanted to come out and get my swag back like it was before I left," said Harden, who had his fourth 20-point game of the season and his first since Dec. 7.

The Thunder got out to a sizzling start and opened a 23-point lead within the first 14 minutes. Their lead was never in jeopardy against a Houston team desperately needing a late charge to make the play-

Instead, Oklahoma City used its second-best shooting performance of the season to take a big step toward solidifying its spot in the postseason. In moving to 43-27, the Thunder matched their win total from the past two seasons

combined.

Luis Scola scored 25 and Trevor Ariza added 20 points for Houston, which fell seven games behind Oklahoma City and 5½ behind eighth-place Portland in the Western Conference with a dozen games left.

"We've just got to go play," Rockets reserve Kyle Lowry said. "We've got to finish strong and see what happens."

Oklahoma City snapped a 13-game losing streak against Houston that had been the Rockets' longest against any opponent in franchise history. Houston's last loss in the series came on April 4, 2006, in Seattle.

The return of Harden provided a huge boost for the Thunder, who went 3-3 while their top-scoring bench player was out with a strained right hamstring and dropped into the seventh spot in the West.

"James brings a dynamic to our team," Thunder coach Scott Brooks said. "He's a playmaker. He scores, he can play off the ball, he can play on the ball and he makes plays for our

Harden poured in 13 points in his first 5 minutes off the bench, including the final eight points in a 14-0 surge by the Thunder that ed the break between the first and second quarters. Harden converted

then added back-to-back 3-pointers and a pair of free throws.

His 3-pointer a few moments later completed his 4-for-4 start and put Oklahoma City up 50-27 with 10:18 left before half-

"He came in and provided a big-time spark for us on the offensive end and he was defending also," fellow reserve Eric Maynor said. "It was good to have him back."

Harden was hurt in a win against New Orleans on March 10 and had to sit out for the first time in his rookie season.

"It was tough because I didn't touch a ball for a few days," said Harden, who was expected to miss two to four weeks and returned on the early end of that window. "It was tough having to just do rehab and just sticking with the program. These last few days, I've been shooting the ball well.

"I think that taking the time off really helped me just get my form ready and my shot really ready."

The Thunder made 25 of their first 30 shots, for an 83 percent conversion rate, and led by as many as 24 during their highest-scoring half of the season. Houston closed back within 13 following a 16-5 response and trailed 74-57 at halftime, but never got closer than 15 in the second




