Events announced for Child Abuse Awareness Month

"No Excuse for Child Abuse" is the theme for this year's observance of April as Child Abuse Awareness Month with events co-hosted by CASA of the High Plains and The Bridge children's advocacy center.

A sign with the "No Excuse" slogan will be placed at a different location for each week of April. A blue T-shirt cutout for each of the 131 confirmed victims of child abuse and/or neglect in the Pampa area this year will accompany the

"We think that it will be a pretty powerful visual image of kids that are victims," said Janet Watts, CASA executive direc-

The sign and cutouts will be at the office of Dr. Gregory T. Kelly, DDS, 1835 N. Hobart, during the first week of April; United Supermarket, 1420 N. Hobart, second week; City Hall, 200

W. Foster, third week; and Wal Mart Supercenter, 2801 Charles, fourth week.

An informational fair will be from 3 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. April 13 at United Supermarket. The fair will provide organizations with the opportunity to provide information to the public concerning child safety and abuse/neglect, and also

activities for children. At least 18 agencies are scheduled to participate, and many will provide free products and/or activities for children.

Participating agencies in the informational fair include Blue Bell Creameries, which will provide free ice cream; Pampa Emergency Medical Service, coloring books; Kool Smiles, coloring contest; Pampa Fire Department; Pampa Independent School District; Pampa Police Department, child ID and fingerprinting; Plains Dairy and Pokey the Clown, barrel train and milk; Girl Scouts; Crosspointe; Tralee Crisis Center; WIC Women's, Infants' and Children's program; Clarendon Child Welfare; Accolade; CASA, AWARENESS cont. on page 3

Seven make guilty pleas, given sentences in District Court

Seven defendants pleaded guilty to a variety of charges this week in 31st District Judge Steve Emmert's courtroom. Judge Emmert ordered sentences Thursday ranging from 16 months to 18

years in the unrelated cases. Charles Berry, accused of unlawful possession of a firearm, was sentenced to two years deferred adjudication probation and ordered to perform 240 hours of community service.

Larry G. Caviness, accused of driving under the influence, third offense, was sentenced to four years in the Texas Department

of Corrections and fined \$4,000.

Steven Roger Banville, accused of possession of marijuana, was sentenced to five years deferred adjudication probation, fined \$2,500 and ordered to pay \$140 in restitution and perform 160 hours of community service.

Erik Encontrias, accused of theft of a firearm, was sentenced to 16 month in a state jail, fined \$500 and ordered to pay \$1,500 in restitution.

David Ray Burrow, accused in two indictments of possession and transportation of chemicals with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance, was sentenced to 10 years and fined \$2,500 on one indictment and sentenced to 18 PLEAS cont. on page 5





Texas Agri-Life Extension Service to host diabetes class

TEXAS AGRI-LIFE EXTENSION SERVICE Special to The Pampa News

Do you feel like you need to know more about how to take care of your Type 2 diabetes?

Individuals recently diagnosed or who have had diabetes a long time can benefit from learning the latest care techniques and ways to reduce risks of complications, such as reduced vision or nerve pain, said Joan Gray-Soria, Texas AgriLife Extension Service family and consumer agent in Gray County.

A five-class series with nine topics called Do Well, Be Well with Diabetes will be offered beginning at 6 p.m. April 6 by AgriLife Extension-Gray County, along with Accolade Home Health and Family Medicine Clinic, Gray-Soria said.

These classes are being taught by a team of volunteer nurses, dietitians, pharmacists and other health professionals to provide the latest information on how to better manage Type 2 diabetes, she said.

Self-management of Type 2 diabetes has changed a lot, Gray-Soria said. An important tool for managing diabetes is the glucose meter.

Some people avoid checking their blood glucose because pricking their fingers for a sample hurts too

much, she said. Some people were taught the best place to get a blood sample is the central part of their finger tip, which is actually the most sensitive part of the fin-

Pricking your finger there is going to hurt more than the side of your fingertip, Gray-Soria said. Learning how to test on the side of the fingertip instead significantly

Today, most meters and strips allow blood glucose to be checked in other sites, such as the arm between the elbow and wrist, she said. New lancet sets allow a reduction of the depth of the needle prick and use of a thinner needle because smaller drops of blood are required to get a good reading.

Many people report their pain and discomfort are reduced to almost nothing once they get new equipment and learn how to use it properly, Gray-Soria said.

That is just one of the tips attendees will learn through the Do Well, Be Well with Diabetes series, she said.

"Have you heard about insulin pens or new insulins that control your blood glucose with no peaks over a 24-hour period?" she asked. "Just what is rapid acting insulin, and why do so many people like to use it? There are many new oral medicines, too. Do you really have to use alcohol when you prick your finger or give your insulin injection?

"Do you understand what your doctor is telling you when she says your hemoglobin A1C is too high? Is 8 percent too high when less than 7 percent is the recommendation by the American Diabetes Association?"

Gray-Soria said while taking care of diabetes is not easy, some might be surprised to learn that there are many new tools and methods to help them keep their blood glucose in the recommended ranges.

"Come to these classes and learn how to not only make your life with diabetes easier, but how to reduce your chances for complications," she said.

Classes are \$10 per family, but scholarships are available if needed. For more information or to enroll in the class, call the AgriLife Extension office in Gray County

FBI: Letters to governors could stir violence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI is warning police across the country that an anti-government group's call to remove governors from office could provoke vio-

The group called the Guardians of the free Republics wants to "restore America" by peacefully dismantling parts of the government, according to its Web site. It sent letters to governors demanding they leave office or be removed.

Investigators do not see threats of violence in the group's message, but fear the broad call for removal of top state officials could lead others to act out violently. At least two states beefed up security

Minnesota Gov. Tim Pawlenty said he received one of the letters but wasn't overly alarmed.

"We get all kinds of, shall we say, 'interesting' mail, so it's not out of the norm," Pawlenty said Friday. "It got more attention because it went to so many governors."

As of Wednesday, more than 30 governors had received letters saying if they don't leave office within three days they will be removed, according to an internal intelligence note by the FBI and the Department of Homeland Security. The note was obtained by The Associated Press.

The FBI expects all 50 governors

will eventually receive such letters. Governors whose offices reported getting the letters included Jennifer Rick Perry of Texas, Granholm of Michigan, Bobby Jindal of Louisiana, Chet Culver of Iowa, Dave Heineman of Nebraska, Jim Gibbons of Nevada, Brad Henry of Oklahoma, Mike Rounds of South Dakota, Bob McDonnell of Virginia, and Gary Herbert of Utah, where officials stepped up

security in response to the letter. The FBI warning comes at a time of heightened attention to far-right extremist groups after the arrest of nine Christian militia members last weekend accused of plotting violence.

bouncer inflated activity area provided by Frank's True Value Hardware; The Bridge, slap bracelets; Lovett Memorial Library, face painting; the Eastern Texas Panhandle Chapter of the American Red Cross; and Community Day Care Center.

Hot dogs and soft drinks will be available during the fair, provided by United Supermarket. Proceeds from sales of the hot dogs and soft drinks will be

donated to a local agency. Door prizes will be awarded by organizations at the fair. One door prize will be a child's car seat, provided by Pampa EMS.

"Shine the Light for Youth" will begin at 8:30 p.m. April 21 at City Hall. The event will include the story of Mary Ellen, a child who in 1874 became the first publicly acknowledged victim of child abuse/neglect in the United States and whose case sparked the beginning of public concern for abused and neglected children.

After Mary Ellen's story is presented, a moment of silence will be observed, followed by each person shining a light on the blue T-shirts of the traveling display as a way to "illuminate" the presence of child abuse and neglect.

"It's an opportunity for the youth of our community to make a statement saying they stand up against child abuse and neglect," said Ofelia Marszal, CASA volunteer coordinator.

Youths, including youth groups, and adults are welcome to attend the "Shine the Light" event. Participants are asked to bring a non-flammable light source such as a small flashlight or cell phone.

Blue Sunday will be observed by participating churches on April 25. Churches are asked to acknowledge child abuse and neglect during their services that day. A balloon release will follow at 2 p.m. at Recreation Park, east of Pampa off Highway 60. The balloon release will honor the 131 current area child abuse/neglect

"Thankfully, we will release 131 blue balloons but no white ones for the first time in a few years. We are very thankful for that," Watts said.

White balloons repre-

sent deaths of child abuse/ neglect victims.

'We need the community to come out to these events so that their presence will show these kids that they are valued," Marszal said. "We should all be a part of the solution to the problem of child abuse and neglect.


"We need to keep in mind that these children are right here in our communities. We want to believe that this kind of abuse and neglect doesn't exist here, but the reality is that it exists in every community, and we can all be a part of the solution."

CASA and The Bridge, both non-profit United Way agencies, provide community services concerning child abuse and neglect. CASA, or Court Appointed Special Advocates, trains volunteers to become court-appointed advocates for children who have

been removed from their homes due to abuse and/or neglect. These volunteers work to help the children, who range in age from birth to 18 years, secure permanent placement.

CASA volunteers interview people who have information regarding child abuse and neglect cases, monitor the family's compliance with service plans, and advocate for services for the child. The local CASA chapter serves



Today in History

Today is Easter Sunday, April 4, the 94th day of 2010. There are 271 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 4, 1968, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., 39, was shot to death at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn. (James Earl Ray later pleaded guilty to assassinating King, then spent the rest of his life claiming his innocence before dying in prison in 1998.)

On this date:

In 1818, Congress decided the flag of the United States would consist of 13 red and white stripes and 20 stars, with a new star to be added for every new state of the Union.

In 1841, President William Henry Harrison succumbed to pneumonia one month after his inaugural, becoming the first U.S. chief executive to die in office. In 1850, the city of Los Angeles was incorporated.

In 1945, during World War II, U.S. troops on Okinawa encountered the first significant resistance from Japanese forces at the Machinato Line. In 1949, 12 nations, including the United States,

signed the North Atlantic Treaty in Washington, D.C. In 1960, the Biblical-era spectacle "Ben-Hur" won 11 Academy Awards, including Best Picture. Elvis Presley recorded "Are You Lonesome Tonight?" in Nashville for RCA Victor.

In 1975, more than 130 people, most of them children, were killed when a U.S. Air Force transport plane evacuating Vietnamese orphans crash-landed shortly after take-off from Saigon.

In 1983, the space shuttle Challenger roared into orbit on its maiden voyage.

Ten years ago: In a volatile day on the U.S. stock market, the NASDAQ composite index and the Dow Jones industrial average each plunged more than 500 points before reversing course as buyers flooded back into the market.



Many fallow fields likely in North, Central Texas regions

COLLEGE STATION - - There likely will be a lot of fallow fields in the North and Central Texas regions this year, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service reports.

"We are very, very, very wet still at this time," said Rick Maxwell, AgriLife Extension agent in Collin County, northeast of Dallas. "Because of this wet weather we've got very little of our corn in."

Maxwell said very little wheat got planted in Collin and neighboring counties as well. He estimates only about 5 percent of the 30,000 acres of corn that are typically planted went in this year. Wheat is planted in the fall, but only about 30 percent of the usual acreage of wheat was planted last fall.

The planting window for corn closed about March 15 in North Texas. Sorghum is an option some years, but this year, Maxwell expected most Collin County growers will elect to take prevented planting provisions of their crop-insurance policies.

"We're basically a two-crop system here in Collin County - - corn and wheat," Maxwell said. "We're just now getting into the normally wet period of our year. And they think -- at least the ones I've talked too -- it's going to be more of the same."

The situation is a lot better in the Panhandle, where 30 percent or more of Texas corn acres are generally planted, said Dr. Brent Bean, an AgriLife Extension agronomist based in Amarillo.

The planting window opens and closes later in the Panhandle, Bean said, and though corn planting may be a little later than normal this year, he predicted 2010 will be a good corn year.

"We're in very good shape from a moisture standpoint," Bean said. "We're not going to have to be preirrigating this year."

Bean said he believes planting will be a little late, perhaps a week on the average, because of the wet weather. Most Panhandle growers strip-till, a soil and moisture conservation method where only a narrow strip that is to be seeded is tilled and fertilized.

Most growers haven't had a chance to either till the strips or fertilize yet, but Bean didn't expect more than a short delay in operations.

"As soon as the soil temperatures get above 50 degrees, they'll be starting to plant," he said.

Bean also noted that because nearly all corn is irrigated in the Panhandle, yields are generally a lot higher than in North and Central Texas, so the 30 percent of acreage generally represents 50 percent of the bushels grown in the state.

The following summaries were compiled by AgriLife Extension district reporters:

PANHANDLE: The northwest portion of the region received another 6 to 8 inches of wet snow, bringing their winter total to 40 to 45 inches. Soil moisture levels in most of the region were better than in previous years. Some field work was done on

wheat that dried out some. Only light insect activity was reported. Some cattle were removed from wheat fields and placed on other grazing fields and pastures.



Rangeland cool-season grasses emerged, and it was expected that warmer grasses should coming out of dormancy soon. Until then, most producers were still feeding from hay stocks, which were becoming very low. Cattle were generally in good condition.

ROLLING PLAINS: Though spring officially arrived, temperatures dropped to 30 degrees and storm systems brought snow, rain and high winds. Later in the reporting period, days were sunny and temperatures rose to about 70 degrees. With high soil

moisture and the warmer days, winter wheat and grasses really began to green up and grow. Livestock were in good to excellent condition and required less supplemental feeding. The warmer weather dried fields out, and farmers were beginning to plow, put out fertilizer and kill winter weeds. The spring calving season was coming to an end, and cattle were in good shape considering the harsh winter. Most trees were blooming.

SOUTH PLAINS: The region had windy days with highs in the 60s and lows in the 30s. Soil moisture was adequate. Producers were applying chemicals and listing seedbeds. Wheat was in fair to good condition and

continuing to mature. Pastures and rangeland were in fair to good condition. Cattle were in mostly good condition.







Ex-Texas deputy sentenced 10 years


LUBBOCK (AP) - A federal judge has sentenced a former Hockley County chief deputy to 10 years in prison for his role in a methamphetamine trafficking con-

U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings sentenced 53-year-old Gordon Bohannon in Lubbock on Friday. Bohannon was charged with one count of conspiracy to distribute and possess with intent to distribute 500 grams or more of methamphetamine. Bohannon pleaded guilty in December.

Last week, Bohannon testified against his former boss before a Hockley County civil jury that decided David Kinney won't be reinstated as sheriff.

Another deputy under Kinney, 39-year-old Jose Jesus Quintanilla, was sentenced to three years in prison after pleading guilty to one count of misprision of a felony, or failure to report a felony.

Quintanilla admitted providing the meth ring with sensitive law enforcement information and deterring investigations.



Former south Texas teacher guilty of marijuana trafficking

McALLEN (AP) — A former south Texas fifth-grade teacher who coordinated the transportation of tons of marijuana from the border to Houston faces at least 20 years in federal prison after pleading guilty to conspiracy.

Federal agents arrested David Rey Ramirez, 30, at Rio Grande City's General Ricardo Sanchez Elementary School in late January, a month after his indictment, stunning officials in the district where he'd worked for

He admitted in a plea agreement signed last Friday to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute at least 1,000 kilograms of marijuana.

The plea agreement says Ramirez, nicknamed Devil, recruited truck drivers and scouts and supervised the transportation of tons of marijuana at a time from Rio Grande City to Houston. In all, prosecutors attributed 44 tons of shipped marijuana to Ramirez and his co-defendants.

Among the shipments Ramirez is alleged to have overseen was more than 10 tons of marijuana seized by Houston police from a tractor-trailer on Dec. 27, 2006, and more than four tons of marijuana seized by Texas state troopers from a tanker truck near Hebbronville on April 9, 2007.

The tanker had been used successfully to carry loads to Houston at least three prior times in 2007 with Ramirez involved each time, the plea agreement said.

Ramirez also recruited a driver

and supervised transportation of 10

tons of marijuana in a tractor-trailer

seized by Border Patrol agents at a south Texas highway checkpoint on June 2, 2007, according to the document.

In 1996, Ramirez pleaded guilty to felony cocaine possession and received three years probation, according to court documents. With that conviction, he faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 20 years in prison with a maximum of life, according to the plea. Ramirez remained free on bond while awaiting sentencing.

A woman who answered the phone at Ramirez's home Friday said he was not available. She offered to have his lawyer speak on his behalf. Attorney Eduardo Ray Ramirez did return calls from The Associated

UT recalls students from northern Mexico

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -The University of Texas at Austin, citing the raging violence in northern Mexico, has ordered its foreign exchange students in Monterrey to return home, officials confirmed Friday.

It's the first time UT, which had more than 2,200 students in study-abroad programs around the globe in the 2008-2009 school year, has ever recalled students, officials said.

UT Executive Vice-President and Provost Steven Leslie issued the order March 23, said Christian Clarke Casarez, director of international public affairs. The order only applies to students enrolled at the Monterrey Institute of Technology and Higher Education.

"Due to the deteriorating security situation in Monterrey, the university recalled students in the program," Clarke Casarez said. The university is committed to securing the safety of our students wherever they are in the world."

At least two other Michigan State University and the University of Wisconsin at Eau Claire — also have canceled programs in Monterrey in recent days, according to The Chronicle of Higher Education.

UT officials cited a U.S. State Department travel advisory issued March 14. It warns of violence in the states of Chihuahua, Coahuila and Durango, along the border and in Monterrey, a bustling industrial city about 280 miles south of San Antonio. UT also relies on third-party security experts to assess the safety of its students in foreign study programs.


The State Department warning mentioned violent shootouts between drug cartels and Mexican authorities, and it said U.S. citizens had been harassed in their vehicles and subjected to "robbery and violence" on the highways between Monterrey and various cit-

ies along the border. Two students - not from UT — were killed March 19 on the Monterrey campus when they got caught in the crossfire of a shootout between the Mexican military and drug gangs, according to a report in El

Norte newspaper. Out of the 63 UT students enrolled in Mexicobased programs in the last school year, six were in

Monterrey, Clarke Casarez said.

The recall order will stand throughout the approaching summer and fall semesters. Officials say UT students in other programs in Mexico aren't affected by the decision.





Four dead, three hurt in Washington refinery blast

ANACORTES, Wash. (AP) — A Washington state oil refinery hit by a deadly blast and fire early Friday was recently fined for safety violations amid what federal watchdogs call a troubling trend of serious accidents at refineries.

The blast struck the Tesoro Corp. refinery in Anacortes, about 70 miles north of Seattle on Puget Sound, around 12:30 a.m. Employees were doing maintenance work on a unit that processes highly flammable liquid derived during the refining process, the company said.

The blast shook houses and woke people miles away, shooting flames as high as the refinery's tower before the blaze was extinguished about 90 minutes later.

"We could tell this was horrific, this was huge," said Jan Taylor of La Conner, Wash., who felt the blast rock ther motorhome at the RV park across the bay.

Three men died at the scene and a woman died later at a Seattle hospital. Three others were hospitalized with

major burns over the majority of their bodies. It was the largest fatal refinery accident since a 2005 explosion at a BP American refinery in Texas killed 15 people and injured another 170.

Six investigators with the U.S. Chemical Safety and Hazard Investigation Board were dispatched to the scene, and the Washington Department of Labor and Industries launched an investigation.

The agency fined the San Antonio-based company \$85,700 last April for 17 serious safety and health violations, defined as those with potential to cause death or serious physical injury.

Inspectors found 150 instances of deficiencies and said the company didn't ensure safe work practices and failed to update safety information when changes where made to equipment.

In November, the state reached a settlement with Tesoro, requiring in part that the company correct the hazards and hire a third-party consultant to do a safety

audit.

"We don't know if any of those hazards were involved in the incident that happened today," said Hector Castro, spokesman for the state labor department.

Jeff Haffner, associate general counsel for Tesoro, said the third-party audit was completed in the past few weeks, but the consulting firm hired had not yet issued its report.

Most of the items involved requirements for managing safety, he said.

"There's no way for us to know whether the subject matter of any of those items were related, if at all, to this incident, because we don't know what caused the incident," Haffner said.

The company is conducting its own investigation into the fire, he said.

The blast occurred in a unit that was in the dangerous process of returning to operation, turning up heat and pressure, said Tesoro spokesman Greg Wright.

Man gets 10 years after wife drowns infant son

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A Texas man has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for leaving his baby alone with his psychotic wife, who drowned their son in a hot tub.

Michael Maxon appears to be the first husband held criminally responsible in Texas cases involving mentally ill women who have killed their children, said prosecutor Alana Minton.

Maxon, 56, was convicted earlier this year of intentionally abandoning his 1-year-old son when he left the couple's Mansfield home in 2006 to run errands. According to trial testimony, doctors and relatives had warned him not to leave his son Alex alone with his wife, who had been having delusions that her son was the anti-Christ who would be tortured before causing the Apocalypse.

In 2008, a judge found Valeria Maxon innocent by reason of insanity in the baby's death. She was sent to a state mental hospital, as required by Texas law with such verdicts.

During Michael Maxon's sentencing Thursday, state District Judge Wayne Salvant said he was disturbed that Maxon still believed he was not responsible for the baby's death. Maxon faced from two to 20 years in prison.


How do I tell the man I love that I have fallen for him when he considers me like a little sister? Is what I'm feeling even appropriate? — UNSURE IN NEW YORK







TPWD Finalizes List of Hunting and Fishing Regulations Changes

of mule deer hunting opportunities tops a short list of regulatory changes adopted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission as part of the 2010-2011 Statewide Hunting and Fishing Proclamation.

The commission approved an open general hunting season for mule deer in Dawson and Wheeler counties, and added a day to the mule deer season across the Trans Pecos region. The change addresses a priority goal in Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Land and Water Resource Conservation

AUSTIN — Expansion Recreation Plan to increase access to and participation in the outdoors.

The commission finalized a nine-day, buck-only season in Dawson County and a 16-day, buck-only firearm season in Wheeler County and a 35-day archery-only season to offer increased hunter opportunity without adversely impacting mule deer reproduction or distri-

The extra day of hunting for mule deer in the Trans Pecos region is being tacked onto the front end where the season will now begin the Friday immediately following Thanksgiving and con-

According to TPWD wildlife biologists, mule deer populations in these counties are limited, but are present in some areas having suitable habitat and implementation of a buck-only season will not have any measurable impact on herd productivity or expansion.

The Texas Outdoor Annual, a complete digest of all Texas hunting and fishing regulations, including seasons and bag limits, will be available Aug. 15, 2010 wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold and on the TPWD Web site www. tpwd.state.tx.us.
