proceedings at the Medical Center. "These are people who we share the road with and who help us in our times of need. They throw themselves out in harm's way for everyone, so we feel like we can help them with prayer."

Many of the EMS technicians and firefighters on hand were flattered and grateful for the CMA's show of support.

"I'm all for it," said Capt. Jerry Tomaschik of the Pampa Fire Department. "The guys are big fans of it. It keeps us coming to work everyday."

"It just sort of qualifies what we do. It's one of those moments where it's almost like someone brought something to the station to show their appreciation. We never want to take for granted the support of the community."

The blessing was the second of its kind for the Kingdom Cruisers. The group came out last year to give a similar prayer for area helicopter crews. Also, after Saturday's blessing, the Kingdom Cruisers reconvened at Recreation Park to have a Blessing of the Bikes for area motorcyclists.

Pshigoda said that he hopes that the blessing becomes an annual tradition.

"We had a real good reception last year, too. We want to do more and more each year. This is the kind of thing that we want to be doing out in Pampa."

Foreman and Pshigoda said that the emergency vehicle blessing represents a community outreach that the Kingdom Cruisers are looking to expand upon in the future.

"We do minister to bikers, that's our main purpose," said Pshigoda. "But we do minister to other groups as well. We feel like this is a good way for us to be out here, since this is our town."

"We definitely owe them all a great big thank you."

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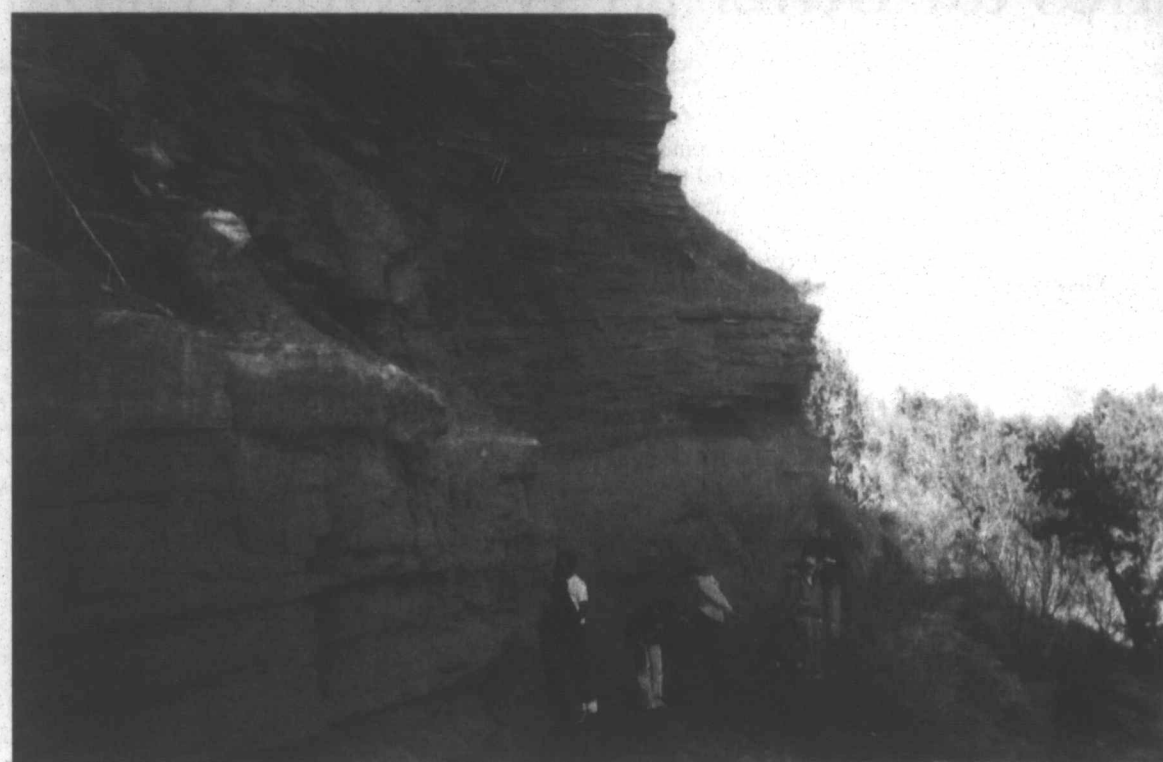
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Pampa 8th graders take Palo Duro Canyon field trip

Pampa Junior High 8th Graders recently took a field trip to Palo Duro Canyon. The girls went to the Canyon on February 24 and the boys took the trip on February 25.

The purpose for this trip was for the 8th graders to get hands-on knowledge about Earth Science. The Canyon is filled with history and great examples of the types of knowledge the students were gaining. This was done in preparation for the Science TAKS test that is taking place on April 29. The students had a great time hiking down trails while looking at examples of the types of rock, weathering, erosion, and fault lines. The students also gained knowledge of Hoodoos (a tall thin spire of rock that protrudes from the bottom of an arid drainage basin or badland) and how they are formed. When the students got back to class, they put their knowledge to use by creating projects based on the Canyon.

Wichert said he felt that getting the program was something his students would benefit from.

"We were able to purchase the software through Tech Prep funding," he said.

Pampa Independent School District sent Wichert to Austin for some training on the program.

"That was our part of it," he said.

The software was installed in the computers in Wichert's program just a few days ago.

"I've got a lot to learn on it yet," he admitted, "but the best way to learn the software is to get out and do it."

Wichert said that when he has 25 kids all encountering the same problems, they all sit down together and work it out.

"The great thing about this software is that it is not new," Wichert said. "It's been around for a long time."

That means that all the bugs have been worked out and the software that the students are using is one of the industry standards.

"It's so easy to use," Wichert said. "It's user friendly."

He said the software does a lot of things for the user.

"A lot of builders use it," Wichert said, "and a lot of interior designers use it. Architects use it."

This software is very relevant for students going into the building trades, he said.

Several classes will be using the computer program, Wichert said.

"We will use this in my computer applications class, which is an introductory class," he said. "We do some basic drafting, desktop publishing

and animation."

Wichert teaches three classes of animation, which students enjoy.

"A lot of students are geared toward video games," he said. "It's really appealing to them."

While it's a fun class, Wichert said it takes a lot of work to animate something.

He said the students are starting to use in their architectural classes.

"They're going to get a taste of it for about six weeks," Wichert said.

He's using the program in his architectural graphics class to complete a full set of house plans.

Wichert also has an engineering graphics class that will use the program for drawing and designing.

"We do very little of

the old hand drawing anymore," he said. "It's pretty much all geared to computers."

Wichert said, however, that they still expose the students to the hand drawing experience.

"We do just enough of it to let them know they still can do it that way and it's possible to do it that way," Wichert said, "but we can improve the efficiency and the quality with computers."

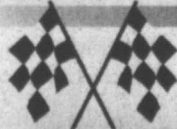

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 26, 1785, American naturalist, hunter and artist John James Audubon was born in present-day Haiti.

On this date:

In 1607, English colonists went ashore at present-day Cape Henry, Va., on an expedition to establish the first permanent English settlement in the Western Hemisphere.

In 1865, John Wilkes Booth, the assassin of President Abraham Lincoln, was surrounded by federal troops near Bowling Green, Va., and killed.

In 1909, Abdul Hamid II was deposed as sultan of the Ottoman Empire.

In 1937, planes from Nazi Germany raided the Basque town of Guernica during the Spanish Civil War.

In 1945, Marshal Henri Philippe Petain (an-REE' fee-LEEP' pay-TAN'), the head of France's Vichy government during World War II, was arrested.

In 1964, the African nations of Tanganyika and Zanzibar merged to form Tanzania.

In 1968, the United States exploded beneath the Nevada desert a 1.3 megaton nuclear device called "Boxcar."

In 1970, the Stephen Sondheim-George Furth musical "Company" opened at the Alvin Theatre in New York.

In 1980, following an unsuccessful attempt by the United States to rescue the U.S. Embassy hostages in Iran, the Tehran government announced the captives were being scattered to thwart any future rescue effort.

In 1986, the world's worst nuclear accident occurred at the Chernobyl plant in the Soviet Union.

Ten years ago: Vermont Gov. Howard Dean signed the nation's first bill allowing same-sex couples to form civil unions.

Five years ago: Syria's 29-year military presence in Lebanon ended as Syrian soldiers completed a withdrawal brought about by international pressure and Lebanese street protests. Actress Maria Schell died in Preitenegg, Carinthia, Austria, at age 79.

One year ago: The United States declared a public health emergency as more possible cases of swine flu surfaced from Canada to New Zealand; officials in Mexico City closed everything from concerts to sports matches to churches in an effort to stem the spread of the virus. U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton made an unannounced visit to Lebanon, where she met with President Michel Suleiman. Salamo Arouch, a Jewish boxer who'd survived the Auschwitz death camp by fighting exhibition bouts for Nazi officers, died in Israel at age 86.

Parties tar other as Wall Street's pal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans and Democrats are furiously casting each other as Wall Street's handmaiden, playing to election-year anger surging on Main Street. But neither party has clean hands when it comes to the financial industry.

Both parties have accepted huge amounts of campaign cash from companies such as Goldman Sachs, the investment bank facing fraud charges from the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Both parties welcomed big business' chief executives to the White House when in power. Both share the blame for deregulating the industry in the 1990s and bailing out Wall Street when the financial sector was on the brink of collapse.

Not that either side will acknowledge it.

Instead, Republicans and Democrats are using President Barack Obama's push for tighter controls on the industry to try to gain the political advantage with voters ahead of November's congressional elections, when the balance of power in Washington is at stake.

"We need to enact a set of updated, commonsense rules to ensure accountability on Wall Street and to protect consumers in our financial system," Obama said Thursday in New York, tapping into public outrage over excesses that led to the economic meltdown.

With polls showing more voters favoring tighter controls on Wall Street than not, everyone wants to be seen as siding with the little guy.

"Far from protecting consumers from Wall Street excess, this bill would provide endless protection for the biggest banks on Wall Street," said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky. Looking to energize their voters and boost fundraising, the national parties are trading charges.

"For years, Republicans stood by while Wall Street ran wild," says a Democratic National Committee television spot. "Risky bets. Lax regulation. When the economy collapsed, Republicans looked the other way. ... Now Republicans are working with Wall Street lobbyists to block reform" that would "protect consumers and prevent a future bailout."

Countering, the Republican National Committee rolled out a video claiming the legislation rewards Wall Street with a "permanent bailout fund. ... Propping up Wall

Street is what Obama does, and Obama does it well."

The Center for Responsive Politics found that both sides raked in cash from the industry they're vilifying.

In the current election cycle, the DNC collected \$6.2 million from the financial services, real estate and insurance sectors and \$3.7 million from other business interests. The RNC has raised \$2.5 million from the industry and \$2.7 million from other business interests.

During the 2008 presidential campaign, Obama raised \$40 million from the industry and \$37 million from other business interests while Republican John McCain collected \$29 million and \$16 million.

Deregulation is faulted for the financial industry's crisis — and both parties played a role.

The Depression-era Glass-Steagall Act separated commercial from investment banking, but in 1999 most of its restrictions were repealed by a Republican Congress and Democratic President Bill Clinton. In the fall of 2008, President George W. Bush and the Democratic Congress backed a massive bailout of the financial industry amid signs of impending economic collapse. Obama signed off on the second infusion of cash shortly after taking office.

Such coziness with Wall Street and politicians' lack of candor about it are likely factors in low job approval ratings for Congress and an overall cynicism about politics.

A recent Pew Research Center poll showed trust in government at one of the lowest points in a half-century, with nearly 80 percent having little confidence in Washington. Just a quarter of people say the federal government and Congress have a positive effect on the country's direction. The ratings are similarly low for large corporations, banks and other financial institutions.

Still, the public is conflicted.

More than half — 58 percent — say that "the government has gone too far in regulating business and interfering with the free enterprise system," and roughly half oppose government exerting more control over the economy. But, perhaps because their own pocketbooks are at stake, people make an exception for regulating the financial industry: Sixty-one percent say it's a good idea for the government to more strictly limit the way major financial companies do business.

A recent Gallup poll showed that voters' ire was directed toward Wall Street on the issue of giv-

ing Washington new powers over the industry. In the survey, 50 percent favored more regulation of Wall Street banks while 36 percent opposed. When the question was asked more broadly — regulating large banks and major financial institutions — 46 percent favored and 43 percent opposed.

All that — combined with the fact that about two-thirds of likely voters own stock, many of whom invest in tax-deferred retirement accounts, underscores why the White House as well as Republicans and Democrats are competing to be the most populist. It also helps explain why Democrats and Republicans are trying to agree on a bipartisan bill even as they publicly castigate each other.

"On one side are consumers and investors, families and businesses and the vast majority of Americans who want us to make sure the financial crisis they just lived through can

never happen again," said Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada. "Democrats are on their side, and we're ready to act."

House Republican leader John Boehner of Ohio offered a different take.

"The president says that he wants to clean up Wall Street, but when you look at this bill, what he actually does is protect them from ever having a financial problem," he said. "This is a bad bill and Republicans are going to stand with the American people, who are standing on their tiptoes yelling, 'Stop.'"

The voters will have the last word — in November.

Hereford holds off Pampa with four-run seventh

A great way to end the home season for seniors Braden Hunt, Mitchell Killgo and Anthony Allen would have been beating Hereford and their ace Parker Bridwell to close out the home season. Unfortunately, that's not the ending they would get, as Pampa lost 9-4 to the Hereford Whitefaces Saturday at Harvester Field.

Head coach Kaleb Snelgrooves said they did not make enough plays to win the game.

"We played great," Snelgrooves said. "Against any team, I've said this all year, I feel like a broken record. If you don't make consistent plays you don't win. We went toe-to-toe with one of the better pitchers in this district. When you have to get five or six outs an inning, you're not going to beat anybody."

Allen started for the Harvesters and hit the first batter of the game. After that, Allen quickly got out of the inning. Ely Castillo flied out to center and Miklo Murillo was thrown out at first because he didn't make it back after the ball was caught. Brandon Espinosa walked and was thrown out at second to end the inning.

Allen led off the game by reaching second on an error by Castillo and advanced to third on a wild pitch. Hunt struck out but the catcher could not hold on to the ball and Allen scored. The inning ended with Hunt stranded at second and Pampa led 1-0.

The Whitefaces took the lead in the top of the second. After the Harvesters got the first two outs of the inning, Dustin Green reached on an error by Reid Miller. A passed ball advanced Green to second. Vince Barnes brought home Green and Mark Mays on a double to right. Barnes would be stranded at second as the inning ended with Hereford on top 2-1.

The Harvesters responded in their half of the second. Zach Murray led off with a single and Doug Smith followed with a one-out single. While Reid Bradley was batting, Smith led off first drawing a throw and got involved in a run down, Murray stole home while that was going on to tie the game at two.

The Whitefaces regained the lead in the third. Espinosa led off with a single and Jonathan Davis followed with a single advancing Espinosa to third. A ground out to short by Bridwell brought home Espinosa to give Hereford a 3-2 lead. The next two batters struck out and grounded

out to end the inning.

Pampa would again tie the game in their half of the third. Hunt singled with one out and advanced to second on a wild pitch. Tyler Malone scored Hunt with a single with two outs. The inning ended with the score tied at three.

Both teams were held scoreless in the fourth. Hereford only reached base on two hit batsmen and Pampa went down in order. The Whitefaces took the lead for good in the top of the fifth. Davis led off with a walk and advanced to second on a stolen base. Ryan Marquez singled and advanced Davis to third. Davis scored when Green grounded out to third putting Hereford ahead 4-3. Mays reached on a throwing error by Engle which scored Geoffrey Gonzalez, who was courtesy running for Marquez. The Whitefaces led 5-3 after the fifth.

The Harvesters again went down in order in the fifth but cut into the deficit in the sixth. With two outs in the inning, Murray was hit by a pitch and advanced to second on a wild pitch. Cole Engle singled and scored Murray cutting Hereford's lead to 5-4. That's all Pampa would get as Smith grounded out to first to end the inning.

Hereford put the game out of reach in the seventh. With Garrett Ericson pitching Bridwell walked and advanced to second on an error. Bridwell and Gonzalez would steal second and third. Green scored both runners with a double, increasing Hereford's advantage to 7-4. Murillo singled and scored Mays and Barnes stole home to score the game's final run.

Pampa wasn't able to rally as they were set down in order. Bridwell pitched a complete game and earned the win for the Whitefaces. In seven innings, Bridwell allowed four runs on four hits, walked none and struck out 16.

Allen (0-2) took the loss, allowing five runs on three hits, walked eight, and struck out four. Malone pitched the sixth and struck out one. Ericson pitched the seventh and allowed four runs on three hits and walked one. Snelgrooves said his pitchers gave a good effort.

"The guy (Allen) hasn't pitched in months," Snelgrooves said. "Comes out and gives me five solid and pitches his rear off. Tyler Malone, we used him last night to pitch and he gives me an inning (today). Garrett Ericson pitches the other night and throws a 117 pitches and gives us an inning."

The Harvesters (7-18, 2-9) close the season Friday

at Canyon. Hereford (11-15-1, 6-5) finishes the season hosting Dumas (13-14, 6-5), and will compete in the bi-district playoffs next week.

Are we being "too uptight," as my family says, and is this behavior on the part of my family normal? Are we right to ask them to stop? And how do we convey this to them without hurting their feelings again? — MOURNING MOTHER IN BIG SPRING, TEXAS

DEAR MOURNING MOTHER: The practice of taking gifts to the deceased does occur in other cultures, and is considered normal in those cultures. However, for your mother and sister to insist upon doing so when you and your husband have told them that it causes you pain is wrong. Tell them before the next party that you do not want it to happen, and exactly why. If they disregard your wishes, follow your husband's lead and skip the parties, too.

DEAR ABBY: I can't seem to grow up. I think I may have something similar to a Peter Pan complex. I often fantasize about my childhood. I miss it more than I should. I am a 25-year-old female.

I also do things that people usually do at younger ages. I put stickers all over everything. I like coloring books, and feel

comfortable in kids' clothing. I watch youth-oriented TV shows people my age are not interested in.

I'm in college, and try hard to put these things behind me, but it's a constant battle. They stay in the forefront of my mind. With each passing year it gets harder to hide.

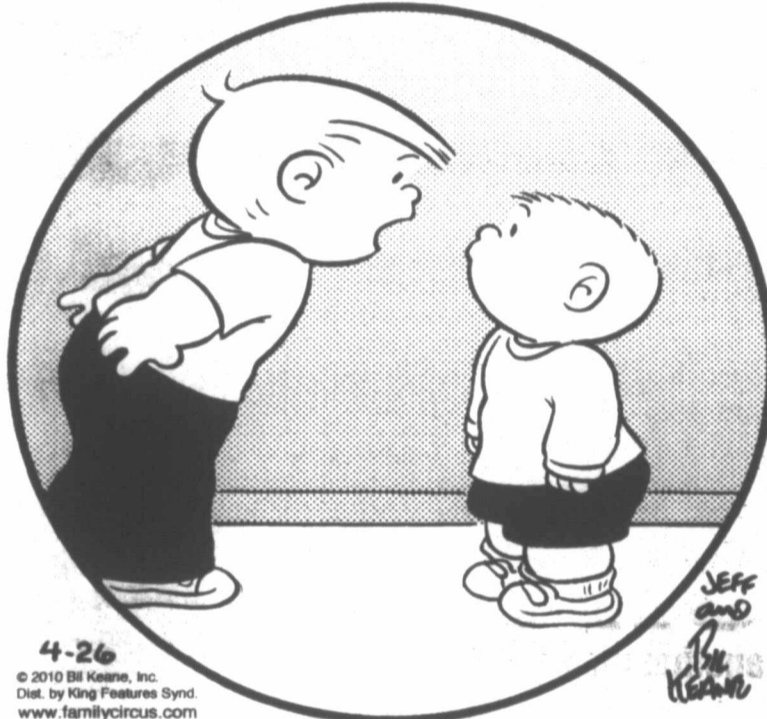

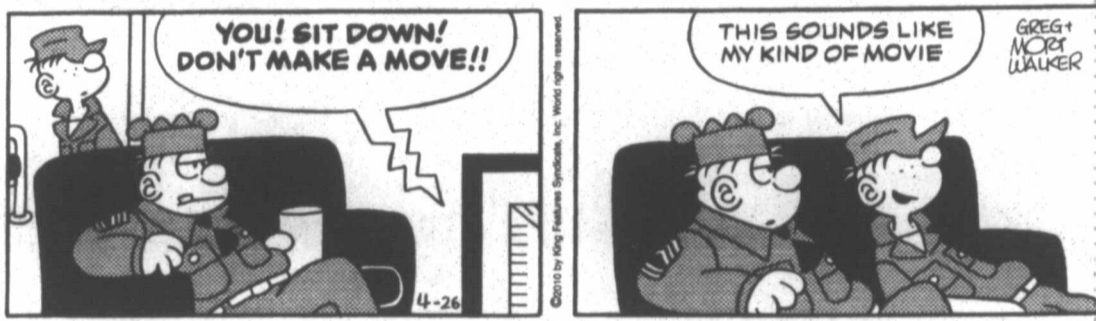

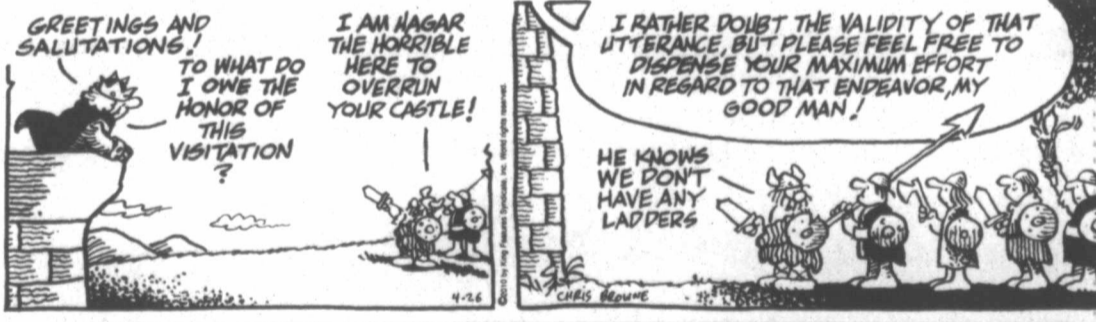
