Many items on Pampa ISD Board agenda

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a Family Bike Ride next month.

Joe Weaver, Executive Director of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber will sponsor a bicycle tour of Pampa beginning at 10 a.m., Saturday, May 22.

The tour will highlight the outdoor art and architecture in town, he said.

According Weaver, the cyclists will gather at 10 a.m. in the parking behind the Pampa Chamber of Commerce building, 200 North Ballard.

From there, they'll proceed to Lovett Memorial Library, past the U.S. Post Office, the White Deer Land Museum and down Million Dollar Row in downtown Pampa. Then, the cyclists will pedal up Cuyler across Red Deer Creek and into the Mary Ellen residential area, past homes that were built in the 1920s and 1930s.

Pampa High School, Fairview Cemetery, Central Park and Clarendon College-Pampa Center are also on the tour, he said.

"Where can you find cowboys and Indians, bee hives, a musical score and a big lizard?" Weaver said of the bicycle tour of Pampa

Most of the tour, he added, is composed of areas of easy riding, although there will be some uphill pedaling at times.

Weaver said they'll take a leisurely pace along the 10-milesround trip tour with plenty of stops.

He expects the tour to last about two hours.

Weaver said the Tourism Committee of the chamber is talking about publishing the tour in brochure form so cyclists can take the tour on their own in the future.

Those on the tour should bring water and snacks, Weaver said. Helmets will be required of all

Residents voice parking concerns at public hearing

Several area residents came out to address the Pampa City Commission Tuesday afternoon during its public hearing on the proposed new ordi-

nance that would restrict front yard

parking within the city limits. Director of Public Works Donny Hooper addressed the Commission and distributed a Frequently Asked Questions sheet outlining the basics of the proposed ordinance. In a nutshell, the new regulation would require vehicles (cars, trucks, boats, trailers, etc.) to be parked on an "improved parking surface," which is being inter-

Danny Winborne as a surface at least as large as the vehicle parked upon it. The surface must be constructed of concrete, asphalt, paving stones or another hard material.

The ordinance will apply to all residential single family, duplex or townhouse lots in Pampa. A violation of the ordinance would be classified as a Class C misdemeanor, carrying a maximum fine of \$500.

Some Pampa citizens voiced their concerns over the repercussions of the proposed new ordinance.

Tommy Parks had some apprehensions on whether enforcing the ordinance would take the local police

preted by Pampa Building Official away from more important law enforcement issues.

"We want (the police) to keep us safe, and now we're going to make them keep the city clean," he said. Linda Miller added that requiring

a paved parking area represents an added financial burden for Pampa

"(Adding an improved surface) costs money, and people on fixed incomes would do good to save money," Miller said. "It's difficult for some people to have an improved surface."

Miller also commented over a potential safety hazard that the new law would create.

"If all those vehicles are parked

along the street in the summertime, children are outside and playing," said Miller. "There's nothing more dangerous to me - and it's happened so many times — than to see a young child dart between two vehicles into the road... I worry about the fact that drivers' vision would be impaired to watch the children during the sum-

Hooper stressed that the ordinance is still in its preliminary stages and that all public feedback would be taken into consideration before the law takes full effect.







How the proposed ordinance would affect you




Normal Lot

Shaded areas (grass front yard areas) would require improved surface if vehicles were to park there.



Corner Lot With Fence

Both the front yard and the side yard adjacent to the adjoining streets (shown in the shaded areas) would require improved surfaces for parking.



Corner Lot, No Fence

The front yard, side yard adjacent to the adjoining street and the rear yard all would require improved surfaces for parking. The rear yard is included because vehicles parked there are visible from a public right-of-way.

and listen to what the citizens have to say," said Hooper. "We're still going to work on it until it either goes or it doesn't. We're in the middle of the process.

Many of the comments made by the public during the hearing, Hooper said, were issues that the city has already taken into account and will be further investigating in the coming weeks.

He added that the city has conducted extensive research on similar ordinances enacted by nearby communities in order to draft the best pos-



Perryton's went real smooth when they did it, so we based a lot of our information on what Perryton has done, because it seems to me they did it right."

the proposed ordinance was spurred from the voice of the public.







Today is Wednesday, April 28, the 118th day of 2010. There are 247 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 28, 1758, the fifth president of the United States, James Monroe, was born in Westmoreland County, Va.

On this date:

In 1788, Maryland became the seventh state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1789, the mutiny on HMS Bounty took place as the crew of the British ship set Capt. William Bligh and 18 sailors adrift in a launch in the South Pacific. (Bligh and most of the men with him managed to reach Timor

In 1918, Gavrilo Princip, the assassin of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and the archduke's wife, Sophie, died in prison of tuberculosis.

In 1945, Italian dictator Benito Mussolini and his mistress, Clara Petacci, were executed by Italian partisans as they attempted to flee the country.

In 1958, the United States conducted the first of 35 nuclear test explosions in the Pacific Proving Ground as part of Operation Hardtack I. Vice President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat, began a goodwill tour of Latin America that was marred by hostile mobs in Lima, Peru, and Caracas, Venezuela.

In 1967, heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali refused to be inducted into the Army, the same day General William C. Westmoreland told Congress the U.S. "would prevail in Vietnam."

In 1988, a flight attendant was killed and more than 60 persons injured when part of the roof of an Aloha Airlines Boeing 737 tore off during a flight from Hilo (HEE'-loh) to Honolulu.

Ten years ago: Five people, targeted for being minorities, were killed in a shooting rampage in suburban Pittsburgh; a suspect, Richard Baumhammers, was arrested. (He was later convicted and sentenced to death.)

Five years ago: More than 100 volunteers joined police in Duluth, Ga. in searching for Jennifer Wilbanks, a bride-to-be who had vanished two days earlier. (Wilbanks turned up in Albuquerque, N.M., having run away on her own.)

One year ago: Kansas Gov. Kathleen Sebelius won Senate confirmation, 65-31, as health and human services secretary, thrusting her into the middle of the nation's swine flu scare. Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania defected from the Republican Party, joining the Democrats.
