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

## Water group rolls out plan for Panhandle

AMARILLO - The Panhandle Water Planning Group opened a 60-day comment period with a review of their proposed water plan for the region earlier this week.

C.E. Williams, executive director of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District and chairman for the Panhandle Water Planning Group, said the plan is the result of five years of discussions by the 22-member panel that represents groups from counties, water distributors, municipalities, utilities, environmentalists, industry, business and agriculture in the Texas Panhandle.

Simone Kiel, a consultant with Freeze-Nichols Inc., outlined the proposed water plan, which must be updated by law every five years.

The water planning process began with the passage of a mandate by the Texas Legislature in 1991. The legislature also broke the state into 16 different regions for planning purposes. Each region is to present a revised water plan every five years. The 16 regional proposals are then combined into one state water plan.

While the state water planning group is different than Groundwater Management Areas, both involve many of the same interested parties and to a great extent overlap a lot of the political boundaries.

can be read in full at most county libraries, county clerks offices or online at http://www.panhandlewater.org, Wednesday night's discussion centered on the targeted amount of water to be kept in the giant Ogallala Aquifer that lies beneath the Texas Panhandle and extends across much of the Great Plains of the nation.

In the past, the water planning group based their goals on keeping 50 percent of the water in place in the aquifer for the next 50 years. Because of the state's mandates that individual water conservation districts establish Desired Future Conditions as part of their planning process, the water planning group also adopted the Desired Future Conditions that have already been accepted, at least for now, by the Texas Water Development Board as the water planning group's basis.

Of the four groundwater districts in the panhandle, two - the Panhandle Groundwater District, which includes Pampa, and the High Plains Underground Water District — have adopted a rule WATER cont. on page 7

Highlights in history on this date:

1657 - English fleet defeats Spanish fleet off Santa Cruz, Bolivia.

1789 - George Washington is inaugurated as the first president of the United States.

1803 - The United States doubles in size with the purchases of the Louisiana Territory and New Orleans from France.

1824 - Crete, in rebellion against Turkey along with the rest of Greece, is captured by Egyptian allies of the Turks.

1881 - France invades Tunisia from Algeria on a pretext, and later establishes a protectorate. 1900 - Hawaii becomes a territory of the United States.

1919 - World War I peace conference grants German concession in Shantung, China, to Japan, whereupon China leaves the conference.

1945 - Adolf Hitler commits suicide in his Berlin bunker with his new wife, Eva Braun. 1948 - The Organization of American States holds

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its first meeting, in Bogota, Colombia. 1953 - People's Progressive Party wins firselection

in British Guyana. 1970 - U.S. President Richard Nixon announces he has ordered American troops into action against Vietnamese Communist sanctuaries inside Cambo-

dia, a move that sparks widespread protests. 1973 - U.S. President Richard Nixon announces the resignations of his aides H.R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman, along with Attorney General Richard Kleindienst and White House counsel John Dean. 1975 - Vietnamese Communist troops take over

Saigon, ending Vietnam War. 1977 - Argentina's Mothers of the Plaza de Mayo hold first weekly march to demand return of their disappeared children.

1986 - Soviet government says 197 people were hospitalized following Chernobyl nuclear power plant disaster, that plant's reactor has been shut down and radiation levels are dropping.

1988 - College student hurls three homemade bombs into headquarters of President Roh Tae-Woo's governing party in Seoul, South Korea, and is arrested.

1990 - American hostage Frank Reed is released in west Beirut, Lebanon, after 3 1/2 years in captivity. 1991 - Cyclone hits Bangladesh, killing at least 125,000 people.

1993 - Tennis star Monica Seles, the world's No. 1 player, is stabbed with a kitchen knife in Hamburg, Germany, by a supporter of her German rival Steffi

1994 - Bosnian Serb soldiers attack British peacekeepers twice near Gorazde.

1995 - U.S. President Bill Clinton ends U.S. trade and investment with Iran, accusing the Tehran government of supporting terrorism.

1996 - In Liberia, shells and gunfire rip throug central Monrovia and a diplomatic enclave. U.S. Marines shoot and kill three Liberians firing toward the U.S. Embassy.

1997 - An airlift starts to ship Rwandan refugees, trapped in Zaire and hunted by rebels, back to Rwanda.

1998 - Argentine police arrest Dinko Sakic, accused of committing atrocities while the commander of a concentration camp in Croatia during World War II. 2002 - The International Skating Union, figure skating's world governing body, suspends two French skating officials from the sport for three years after the two are implicated in a judging scandal at the Winter Olympic Games in February.

2004 - Ten countries join the European Union bloc in a historic enlargement that brings in a region separated for decades from the West by barbed wire and Soviet ideology. The EU's biggest expansion in its 47-year history adds the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia - along with Cyprus and Malta. Together, they boost the EU's population to 450 million people.

2005 - Insurgents unleash another day of deadly bombings in Iraq's capital and beyond, staging a series of assaults that kill at least 65 people over two days and appear timed to deflate hopes that the installation of the nation's first democratically elected government would curb spiking violence. 2006 - Nepal's Parliament calls for a cease-fire with communist rebels and elections for an assembly to rewrite the constitution.

2007 - A gasoline tanker crashes and bursts into flames near the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge in the U.S. state of California, creating such intense heat that a stretch of highway melts and collapses. The driver walks away from the scene with second-



What our code enforcement officer said when adding his words to the discussion highlighted part of Pampa's problem. He said that if his office got a call about a code enforcement issue, that they act on the call post haste, and that is true.

However, he noted if they do not know a code is being violated, nothing will be done.

Acting on citizens complaints is always good for squeaky wheels. My question is why isn't he driving around the city seeking code violations and citing those offending existing ordinances?

I mean after all, Pampa is just one, possibly two yawns wide in any direc-

So, for a third time, I must imply, with the city ordinances that are and have been law for years -(ie, litters laws, parking on sidewalks, derelict vehicles on streets and lawns, run down houses and buildings, etc.) - why aren't they being enforced? What has city government accomplished to date to make us think any new ordinance on the books will ever be - continually enforced?

## Crist's move ominous political trend

WASHINGTON (AP) -Charlie Crist's departure from the Republican Party is not just a Florida story, it's an American story - a tale of two parties driven by their ideologues, squeezing out moderate candidates, alienating independent voters and isolating the place in U.S. politics where most things get done: the middle.

Crist, a populist governor with a history of bipartisanship, bolted the GOP on Thursday to run for the Senate as an independent. He did so only after it became clear that he would lose his party's primary to conservative purist Marco Rubio.

No matter who wins a three-way race in Florida, the factors that drove Crist from the GOP are a microcosm of broader political and social changes contributing to polarization.

"We have a deadlocked democracy," said Pat Buchanan, a conservative commentator and threetime presidential candidate. "Both parties, held hostage by their extremes, are incapable of tackling the issues that threaten this country."

Buchanan left the GOP for the Reform Party after he twice failed to win his party's presidential nomination.

Moderate Sen. Joe Lieberman of Connecticut left the Democratic Party after losing a 2006 nomination fight to liberal Ned Lamont. He won re-election as an independent.

Sen. Arlen Specter quit the GOP last year as he faced a conservative challenge in Pennsylvania. He found a more welcoming home in the Democratic Party.

And now Crist. True, they abandoned their parties for purely

political reasons - to save Compromise become get political information their skins. But Lieberman, Specter and Crist had viable options outside their parties because so many voters feel disconnected from the Democratic and

Republican establishments. "Unfortunately our political system is broken," Crist said in an appeal to independent-minded voters in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Democratic consultant Steve McMahon calls these voters the "invisible middle" because parties care far less about them than hard-core liberals and conservatives. This is especially the case in nonpresidential election years like 2010, which tend to draw high percentages of partisan voters.

"Politicians are responding to the noisemakers of their party," said McMahon, who helped engineer the 2004 presidential campaign of liberal Howard Dean.

Dean's unsuccessful campaign brought to light one of the factors contributing to polarization: new technologies and media.

He launched his bid when the war in Iraq was highly popular. That was a political problem for the anti-war candidate until like-minded people began finding and organizing each other through websites such as Meetup.org.

Soon the anti-war minority became a vocal, unyielding majority. A generation ago, it would have taken much longer for people opposed to the war to realize they were hardly alone and could reshape the campaign agenda if they banded together.

Fast forward a few years to the explosion of blogs and the rise of partisan cable news channels and we're a national people who increasingly get their information from people who already agree with us. Facts become fungible.

As the year progresses, they get to know you a little more and you get to know them. Get to really enjoy the differences in personalities and how they interplay with one another."







Beckham, the self-described mechanic, owner and 'head coach,' says his business philosophy is simple: Be as fair as possible at a competitive price.


"It's customer service, basically," he says. "People want to communicate. They don't want to just come in and hear, 'Here's my bill or here's my card.' They want it explained."

sen," Dyer said.





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

One, the North Plains Groundwater District, adopted a rule that would leave 40 percent of the water in the four western counties of the district at the end of 50 years, and would leave 50 percent of the water in the eastern counties of the district at the end of 50 years.

dis-The fourth trict, Hemphill County Underground Water District, would retain 80 percent of their water at the end of 50 years.

Marty Jones, an Amarillo lawyer representing Dallas billionaire and Roberts County rancher T. Boone Pickens and Hemphill County ranchers George Arrington in a lawsuit against the Texas Water Development Board over Desired Future Condition of the aquifer in Hemphill County, suggested the water planning group retain their 50-50 rule rather than change it to an 80-50-40 rule, the three different Desired Future Conditions the Groundwater Management Area.

Jones said that the Texas Water Development Board figures show an average of all the Desired Future Conditions in the counties in the panhandle water planning group would be 49 percent of the water left at the end of 50 years.

## New drilling on hold due to oil spill

MOUTH OF THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER (AP) — Oil from a massive spill in the Gulf of Mexico oozed into Louisiana's ecologically rich wetlands Friday as storms threatened to frustrate desperate protection efforts. The White House put a hold on any new offshore oil projects until safeguards are in place to prevent rig explosions like the one that caused the spill.

Boats patrolled coastal marshes early Friday looking for areas where the oil has flowed in, the Coast Guard said, and the state of Louisiana diverted thousands of gallons of fresh water from the Mississippi River to try to flush out the wetlands, though that effort was being hampered by wind.

The Louisiana National Guard prepared to send communication equipment, boats, all-terrain vehicles and other equipment to help.

The National Weather Service predicted winds, high tides and waves through Sunday that could push oil deep into the inlets, ponds and lakes that line the boot of southeastern Louisiana. Seas of 6 to 7 feet were pushing tides several feet above normal toward the coast, compounded by thunderstorms expected in the area Friday.

An animal rescue operation at Fort Jackson, about 70 miles southeast of New Orleans, had its first patient Friday, a young northern gannett found offshore.

The bird is normally white with a yellow head and long, pointed beak but was covered in thick, black oil. Workers with Delaware-based Tri-State Bird Rescue and Research used Dawn blue dishwashing soap to scrub it.

Volunteers started arriving in Venice, La., though there wasn't much for them to do because the weather was so bad. About two dozen workers in hard hats and lifejackets were stuck on shore at a marina, lounging on small work boats, some laden with boom, ready to go to work. Some smoked cigarettes and spat sunflower seeds as they waited for assignments.

Volunteer Valerie Gonsoulin, a 51-year-old kayaker from Lafayette who wore an "America's Wetlands" hat, said she hoped to help spread containment booms to hold back the oil.

"I go out in the marshes three times a week. It's my peace and serenity," she said. "I'm horrified. ... I've been sitting here watching that NASA image grow and it grows. I knew it would hit every place I fish and love."

President Barack Obama on Friday directed that no new offshore oil drilling leases be issued unless rigs have new safeguards. Obama ordered Interior Secretary Ken Salazar to report within 30 days on what new technologies are needed.

"We are making sure any leases going forward have those safeguards," said Obama at a White House Rose Garden event. He recently lifted a drilling moratorium for many offshore areas, including the Atlantic and Gulf.

Meanwhile, the Pentagon approved the use of two Air Force planes to dump chemicals on the oil spill, which civilian planes have already been doing.

The Navy also sent equipment for the cleanup, and Pentagon officials were talking with the Department of Homeland Security to figure out what other help the military could give.

Obama reassured Gulf Coast communities that the federal government is "fully prepared" to meet its responsibilities to them as the spill gets worse. The leak from a blown-out well a mile underwater is

> River delta late Thursday, lapping the Louisiana shoreline in long, thin lines. Thicker oil was farther offshore. Officials have said they would do everything to keep the Mississippi River open to traffic. The Coast Guard defended the federal response so far.

> Asked on all three network television morning shows Friday whether the government has done enough to push oil company BP PLC to plug the underwater leak and protect the coast, Coast Guard Rear Adm. Sally Brice-O'Hara said the response led by the Coast Guard has been rapid, sustained and has adapted as the threat grew.

> Brice-O'Hara was also asked on ABC's "Good Morning America" about the possibility of dispersing chemicals about a mile beneath the surface to break up oil. She replied: "That is a technology that is in new stages. We are working closely with our scientific support from NOAA, and there will be careful scrutiny. But if it has applicability, which we think it does, we want to get that in place very quickly."

Pampa lawyer Ken Fields asked Fredkin whether care was being taken to protect the Lesser Prairie Chicken, a candidate species for listing as an endangered or threatened species.

One of the routes proposed by Cross Texas Transmission would County, a prospect to which Fields objects.

Fredkin said that the Public Utility Commission would take such questions into consideration in deciding upon a final route for the power lines.

Mark Meyer with Sharyland Utilities outlined routes his company is proposing from White Deer, Silverton, Nazareth and Hereford to the downstate electrical grid.

Pat Bourne with the Southwest Power Grid said there are alternative routes to take the wind-generated electricity in the panhandle to Oklahoma and Kansas.

Frank Barbera with Tres Amigas explained that the three major power grids in the nation all come together in this area.

Tres Amigas is a proposed power super station near Clovis, N.M., that could connect the three national grids. It would have the ability, Barbera said, to convert direct current to alternating current and back again and make the current in one

"The Colbert Report," mock news shows with a liberal

"As a Democrat that sounds great," McMahon said, "but as an American, that's scary, because a lot of them

think those shows are news." Another contributor is the fact that both parties work hard - often in concert - to draw congressional districts so that most lawmakers represent areas that are heavily Republican or Democratic. This gerrymandering is designed to protect incumbents but, as technology makes the practice more precise, it also favors hyper-partisan

candidates. Also fueling the trend: Money.

Special interest groups on both sides of the partisan divide -say, anti-tax groups on the right and abortionrights groups on the left - raise the most money when there is a fight over their issue. So they pick fights.

Incumbents who cross swords with their party's interest groups will find their fundraising drying up or even face a well-funded primary rival.

Record numbers of people tell pollsters they are independents. The public's approval of both parties is at an all-time low. Will more politicians follow voters out of

the major parties?

Yes, said McMahon: "There is a market for independent candidates that Joe Lieberman capitalized on and Charlie Crist seized, so there will be others who explore that market."

To be sure, Republicans seem more likely than Democrats this year to impose purity tests and struggle through divisive primaries. And Democrats can point to more moderates in Congress than the GOP could.

But there is no doubt that both parties are drawing ideological lines in bright colors.

Take one of the nation's most pressing issues - the debt. The two most logical ways to avoid a financial collapse like the one facing Greece is to raise taxes and/or slash entitlement programs. Conservatives won't do the former and liberals won't do the latter.

And so it's a fair question to ask in the wake of Crist's decision: Is there a will or a way for compromise? In this political climate, is America willing - much less able - to make hard choices and sacrifice?

"It's much bigger than Florida. It's much bigger than politics," said McMahon, a concerned Democrat and citizen. "It's what's happening in America."


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
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
