arts are dying, you can consider Pampa's Ruth Riehart a stalwart for the cause.

"It's so unfortunate," said Riehart, "but in many ways, it's true. It seems that the importance placed on the arts isn't as big as it used to be, which disturbs me in more ways than I can tell you."

That's partially why Riehart has devoted most of her life to the advancement of the arts in her community. It's a calling that she has cherished from the beginning, and apparently, her dedication has been noticed: Riehart has been nominated for the Golden Nail Award, given out by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce's art committee to recognize area people and organizations for their financial or volunteer contributions to local fine arts.

Riehart is being recognized for her work with Pampa's Community Concert Series, which for years has brought noted musicians and groups into Pampa for affordable public per-

formances.

"I'm absolutely flabbergasted," said Riehart of her nomination. "I'm just blown away. I don't know what to say. I feel deeply honored and humbled just to be nominated.

"I never dreamed that just doing what I love to do anyway would get me nominated for something this prestigious."

According to Riehart, she has been involved with the Community Concert Series "for further back than (she) can remember." A longtime musical enthusiast, she said that her artistic leanings helped her find a place to belong in Pampa shortly after she moved into the community almost six decades ago.

"We moved here 57, almost 58 years ago from Tulsa," recalled Riehart. "Now, growing up in a

fairly large city, I was really quite lost in a small town.

"Well, I was a voice major and I had sung with the Tulsa Philharmonic years ago, and eventually, I met other friends here who were also musically inclined and they persuaded me to join the music club here in town.

Riehart said that one thing led to another and, eventually, she found herself immersed in the Community Concert Series.

"I have been doing this for a long time and all these years have been a joy," said Riehart. "I have served as every office on the board more than once, except for treasurer.

"My husband (Bruce) is a CPA, and he told me, 'You can be whatever you want so long as it's RIEHART cont. on page 3





not treasurer," she added with a laugh. "He didn't want any more accounts being brought back to the house.

Riehart reminisced about some of the many noteworthy acts she has heard at Pampa venues because of the Community Concert Series.

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"Back in the day, where the Bank of America drivein is now, we had the old junior high building, and they had a great big old auditorium where people used to perform," said Riehart. "We've had the London Philharmonic here, the Boston Philharmonic, Guy Lombardo and his band... they all came through at one time. Later, we had Van Cliburn, too. We've had some wonderful groups here, and boy, have we had some wonderful times."

Just as important as the performances that Community Concert Series

artists deliver, Riehart said, is the opportunity they bring with them to educate the city's youth.

"That's one of the first questions we ask," said Riehart. "We ask them if they're going to do what we call outreach, which is teaching a class of some sort to the kids in the community. We want to make them available to the kids so that they can help educate as well as entertain."

Riehart's arts involve-

ment doesn't end with the Community Concert series, either. While she no longer sings — "Voices don't age real well," she joked — she spent many years gracing Pampa with her vocal talents.

"I have soloed in every major church in town,' said Riehart. "Wedding, funerals, cantatas, concerts. I used to sing every chance I got.

"Years ago, it must have been 20 or 25 years ago now, we also put together a madrigal group in town, and I loved that. Everyone would have their own parts and we sang without accompaniment. I loved that. It was just so much

fun.' After a life so involved in the arts community, Riehart said that she can't possibly fathom any other way to be. She said that the arts are a gift that she received early, and they are a gift that she intends to cont. from page 1


keep sharing with others. "I can't imagine a life without it," said Richart. "It would be so boring and dull. (The arts) are my lifeblood. I've experienced so much joy from them all my life, and if you've experienced that joy for yourself, you want it for your community.



Today is Saturday, May 15, the 135th day of 2010. There are 230 days left in the year.

Highlights in history on this date:

1536 - Anne Boleyn, wife of king Henry VIII, and her brother, Lord Rochford, are tried and found guilty in England of adultery and incest.

1602 - Bartholomew Gosnold, English navigator, discovers Cape Cod, on the U.S. coast of what is now Massachusetts.

1767 - Genoa sells island of Corsica to France.
 1916 - Sykes-Picot agreement between Britain and France carves up Arab regions of former Ottoman empire.

1918 - The first experimental airmail route in the U.S. starts between Washington, Philadelphia and New York.

1923 - Britain formally recognizes Transjordan as independent state under Emir Abdullah.

1924 - U.S. Congress passes bill instituting

1924 - U.S. Congress passes bill instituting immigrant quotas based on nationality.

1928 - The Royal Flying Doctor Service, originally called the Australian Inland Mission Aerial Service, is inaugurated in Cloncurry, Queensland. 1930 - Ellen Church, the first airline stewardess, goes on duty aboard a United Airlines flight

between San Francisco and Cheyenne, Wyoming. 1940 - The Netherlands surrenders to Germany in World War II; nylon stockings go on general sale for the first time in the United States.

1942 - Gasoline rationing goes into effect in 17 U.S. states, limiting sales to 11 liters (3 gallons) a week for nonessential vehicles.

1948 - The state of Israel, one day old, is attacked by Egyptian planes and invaded by troops from Lebanon and Transjordan.

1955 - Austrian state treaty is signed, ending 10 years of Allied occupation.

1957 - Britain explodes its first thermonuclear bomb in central Pacific.

1962 - President John F. Kennedy orders 4,000 more U.S. troops to be stationed in Thailand to counter threat in Laos.

1970 - Phillip Lafayette Gibbs and James Earl Green, two black students at Jackson State University in Mississippi, are killed when police open fire during student protests.

1975 - After a referendum, the mountain principality of Sikkim becomes the 22nd state of India.

1988 - Ethiopian government declares state of emergency in war-torn northern provinces of Eritrea and Tigre; the Soviet Union begins the process of withdrawing its troops from Afghanistan, more than eight years after Soviet forces had entered the country.

1989 - Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in Beijing declares an end to Sino-Soviet split.

1990 - Thousands of Soviet soldiers try to break into Latvia's parliament during anti-independence demonstration.

1991 - French Prime Minister Michel Rocard resigns and President Francois Mitterand replaces him with Edith Cresson.

1992 - Thousands of opposition supporters seize Azerbaijan's parliament building and presidential palace.

1993 - An overwhelming majority of Bosnian Serbs vote against a peace accord which would have forced them to surrender some of the 70 percent of Bosnia they control.

1994 - Aid officials report that the death toll may have reached 200,000 in Rwanda, where Hutus are on a campaign of genocide against minority Tutsis since April 6.

1998 - To international condemnation, India declares itself a nuclear nation after five bomb tests the same week.

1999 - A Communist-led attempt to impeach Russian President Boris Yeltsin for the war in Chechnya fails.

2001 - World Health Organization announces a plan to halt the spread of tuberculosis —which kills 2 million people each year — for less than half a billion dollars annually.

2002 - A former Croatian Serb rebel leader Milan Martic and an ex-Yugoslav army officer Gen. Mile Mrksic, turned themselves in to the U.N. war crimes tribunal in the Netherlands.

2005 - Insisting on obedience and missionary zeal, Pope Benedict XVI gives his church new priests in an elaborate ceremony in St. Peter's Basilica, where nearly half of those ordained are from Africa and Latin America.

2006 - The African Union agrees to transfer its peacekeeping force in Sudan's Darfur region to the United Nations, but Khartoum appears to backtrack on earlier indications that it would allow a U.N. force after a peace treaty with rebels was agreed.

2007 - Irish Prime Minister Bertie Ahern becomes the first leader from Ireland to address the joint houses of the British Parliament, praising Britain and its departing leader, Tony Blair, for promoting peace in Northern Ireland.

2008 - Myanmar government says military-backed constitution has been overwhelmingly approved by voters — a claim that has come under fire for being held while the country responds to a massive cyclone that has killed tens of thousands of people.

2009 - President Barack Obama says he would reform and retain the military tribunals he once reviled for Guantanamo Bay detainees, jeopardizing his timetable for closing the naval prison in Cuba by January 2010.

Obama promotes smallbusiness agenda in Buffalo

— President Barack
Obama asked Congress on
Thursday to act quickly on
a new round of jobs legislation, arguing that "fancy
formulas and mathematical equations" from economists mask the continuing
pain in American households.

"It's great that the stock

"It's great that the stock market has bounced back," Obama said during a threehour stop in western New York, a region already in decline long before the economic downturn. "But if you're still looking for a job, it's still a recession. If you can't pay your bills or your mortgage, it's still a recession. No matter what the economists say, it's not a real recovery until people can feel it in their own lives." Citing last week's eco-

nomic reports showing job growth in the U.S. for the fourth straight month, the president argued that his steps to rescue the economy are working. He focused on his administration's efforts to help small businesses.

But given an unemployment rate that continues to hover near 10 percent, Obama urged Congress to act on new job creation measures that could further strengthen small businesses.

The president also took a swipe at Republican law-makers, accusing them of sitting on the sidelines as the economic crisis unfolded.

"If we had taken that position, just thinking about what was good for my politics, millions more Americans would have lost their jobs," Obama told workers at Industrial Support, Inc., a small manufacturing company.

Obama began his White House-to-Main Street tour in December with a trip to Allentown, Pa. He has also made stops in Charlotte, N.C., Savannah, Ga., and Quincy, Ill. He'll travel to Youngstown, Ohio, next week.

The president long has said he believes the success of small businesses will be vital to the nation's economic recovery. Last week, the president sent Congress a proposal to create a \$30 billion support program to unfreeze credit for small businesses. The health care overhaul he signed into law in March also included tax credits for small businesses, and the president has said those already are reaching some companies.

On Thursday, Obama said he has asked the Small Business Administration to become more proactive in helping small business owners, or those who want to start small businesses, get the training they need to be competitive.

Help for small businesses would be especially welcome in cities like Buffalo, where large corporations have downsized and manufacturing jobs have been shipped overseas. Western New York long has suffered from a lack of job growth and population losses. Two New York state residents who've started a website to draw attention to unemployment and other problems they blame on Washington put up a billboard along Interstate 190 that reads: "Dear Mr. President. I need a freakin' job. Period."

The manufacturing company he visited Thursday added workers last fall after receiving a loan offered to small businesses through the president's \$862 billion stimulus plan. That type of success, Obama said, makes him "want to double-down and work harder."

Obama also met briefly with several people who lost family members in a 2009 plane crash in a Buffalo suburb. The families have been pushing for changes in aviation safety regulations in the wake of the crash, which killed 50, and Obama told them during the 10-minute private talk that their advocacy will help the cause move forward.

From Buffalo, Obama traveled to New York City, where he thanked police officers who responded to the May 1 attempted bombing in Times Square. He spoke later at a

Democratic fundraiser, where he was joined by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif.

Obama told the 185

donors in attendance that he's seen polls suggesting that while some Americans are starting to see signs of an economic recovery, there's a disconnect over how it happened.

"The reason is because Nancy Pelosi and every Democrat here embraced the responsibility to lead," Obama said, citing congressional votes on the stimulus bill and automobile industry bailout.

D e m o c r a t i c Congressional Campaign Committee aides said the event would raise about \$1.3 million for House candidates. Couples paid \$50,000 to attend a VIP reception with the president. The dinner cost \$15,000 per person.

— Businesses boosted their inventories for a third straight month in March, a further sign that they are gaining confidence in the strength of the recovery.

The Commerce Department said Friday that businesses increased inventories by 0.4 percent in March, matching expectations. Total business sales rose 2.3 percent, the best showing in four months and the sixth straight gain in sales.

Tech seeks to hamstring Leach lawsuit sue the school because it is "Why give him the

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)

— Attorneys for Texas
Tech asked a judge Friday
to essentially throw out a
lawsuit by former football
coach Mike Leach, saying
it has legal immunity under
state law.

State District Judge William C. Sowder said he would issue a decision later and expected an appeal to the 7th Court of Appeals in Amarilla on any event.

"The sooner we get it up there the sooner we'll resolve things," Sowder told the attorneys.

The university fired Leach on Dec. 30, two days after he was suspended following a claim from the family of receiver Adam James that the coach mistreated the player after he got a concussion.

Leach, who is now living in Key West, Fla., has denied that he mistreated James and said he suspects an \$800,000 bonus he was to have received Dec. 31 was the reason he was fired one day earlier.

Leach's lawsuit includes a conspiracy claim, alleging that school officials had wanted him gone since he signed a five-year, \$12.7 million contract extension Feb. 19, 2009.

Tech's attorneys told the judge that Leach cannot

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sue the school because it is a state entity that can only be sued with permission from the state legislature or a waiver based on a defendant's conduct. Sowder said his decision would take time, given the complex legal issues involved.

Leach's attorneys have suggested previously that there was a conspiracy to fire the outspoken and highly successful coach. That issue came up again Friday.

Paul Dobrowski, one of the former coach's attorneys, told the judge that school president Guy Bailey and athletic director Gerald Myers had decided to issue Leach a reprimand and to fine him \$60,000 over the incident.

"If Guy Bailey and Gerald Myers weren't coerced then Mike Leach would be the head football coach at Texas Tech today," Dobrowski said. "This was cabal. They were out to get him."

An attorney for the school, Dan Perkins, said Tech wanted to resolve the complaint brought by the player's father, former NFL player Craig James. He said Tech officials tried to get Leach to agree to a list of how players needed to be treated when injured and to have him write an apology letter.

"Who could have known that Mike Leach would put Adam James in a shed?"



Tigers down Harvesters 7-2; decisive game today

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



LUBBOCK (AP) Attorneys for Texas Tech asked a judge Friday to essentially throw out a lawsuit by former football coach Mike Leach, saying it has legal immunity under state law.

State District Judge William C. Sowder said he would issue a decision later and expected an appeal to the 7th Court of Appeals in Amarillo in any event.

"The sooner we get it up there the sooner we'll resolve things," Sowder told the attorneys.

The university fired Leach on Dec. 30, two days after he was suspended following a claim from the family of receiver Adam James that the coach mistreated the player after he got a concussion.

Leach, who is now living in Kev West, Fla., has denied that he mistreated James and said he suspects an \$800,000 bonus he was to have received Dec. 31 was the reason he was fired one day earlier.

Leach's lawsuit includes a conspiracy claim, alleging that school officials had wanted him gone since he signed a five-year, \$12.7 million contract extension Feb. 19, 2009.


Tech's attorneys told the judge that Leach cannot sue the school because it. is a state entity that can only be sued with permission from the state legislature or a waiver based on a defendant's conduct. Sowder said his decision would take time, given the complex legal issues involved.

Leach's attorneys have suggested previously that there was a conspiracy to fire the outspoken and highly successful coach. That issue came up again Friday.

Paul Dobrowski, one of the former coach's attorneys, told the judge that school president Guy Bailey and athletic director Gerald Myers had decided to issue Leach a reprimand and to fine him \$60,000 over the incident.
