Brainard takes home GNA award

When Pampa's Sena Brainard was young, her parents made sure to impress on her the importance of volunteering for your community.

"When most kids were goofing off in the summer, my brother and I were delivering Meals on Wheels," said Brainard. "And not in the nice part. We learned right then about the importance of giving back."

On Saturday night, Brainard was recognized for a lifetime of giving back when she was awarded the prestigious Golden Nail Award. Established in 1982, the Golden Nail is given out annually to honor significant contributions to the fine arts in Amarillo and the Panhandle Area.

Brainard was nominated by the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation and the Pampa Fine Arts Association for her support to "Texas," the long-running outdoor musical held in Palo Duro Canyon, as well as for her involvement in Pampa's Chautauqua, Festival of Trees and Arts and Crafts Fair.

For her part, Brainard was thrilled to be nominated, much less awarded.

"It's a very prestigious award," said Brainard of the Golden Nail. "You look at the list and it's people from all over the Panhandle who have done so much for the arts. Just to be part of that list is a great honor."

Brainard said that each of the artistic endeavors she has a hand in around the community are very dear to her heart.

"The 'Texas' musical, that's something I'm very proud to be a part of," said Brainard. "I think it's important to continue the tradition of the Panhandle and not let it die out."

"That 'Texas' musical, that's the heritage of the panhandle. It's all about our history and it's

important we keep it going. "My grandparents were part of the founders (who helped fund the amphitheater at Palo Duro), so it's something that's important to me in that sense," Brainard added.

Brainard went on to say that it has been rewarding to see the growth of Pampa's annual Chautauqua, an event that she currently chairs.

"It was an event for Pampa that was born in a hair salon and just got bigger from there," she said. "It's something that has helped revitalize Central Park and has attracted many, many people every year."

"Put it this way: Everyone who came to Chautauqua had a wonderful time, and it was all non-profit. Everyone is down there raising money for their activities. It's a win-win."

The continued support of the community for Chautauqua, Brainard said, is proof that arts are alive and well in the Panhandle area.

"People allude to the arts dying sometimes, and you know, I disagree with that," Brainard said. "Attendance is up at the musical, and then there's the massive success of Chautauqua. You see that people support those things."

Two nabbed after drug raid on social club

Two men were in jail today after a search warrant was served at a Pampa social club early Sunday morning.

Clayton Durand Johnson, 46, was in Gray County jail today in lieu of \$10,500 bond, set by Gray County Justice of the Peace Curt Kurfman, on charges of possession of a controlled substance and for non-payment of child support.

Frederick Anthony Jackson, 33, was being held in Gray County jail today for parole violation.

Officers said the two men were arrested at a social club in the 600 block of South Gray as Pampa police officers, Gray County deputies and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers swooped down about midnight Saturday, according to records, on a drug raid.

A Pampa man was in Gray County jail today in connection with a reported domestic dispute early Sunday morning.

"Yeah, it was a little windy out there," said Joe Weaver, director of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, about the conditions for this past Saturday's Family Bike Ride.

"But the sun was shining and we all had a great time. It was good bike riding weather."

It wasn't hard to tell from the smiles on the riders' faces that they all agreed. Weaver led a group of enthusiastic cyclists on a whistle-stop tour through town, stopping at many Pampa landmarks to offer a little insight on their history.

"You know, I was actually pleasantly surprised," Weaver said. "I'd give my little spiel at all the places we stopped, and some people were saying, 'Oh, I didn't know that.'"

Many of the stops on the tour, Weaver said, helped out by allowing the riders access that they normally wouldn't have had on a weekend.

DEAR ABBY: My brother passed away a year ago, leaving a wife and five children. They are wonderful, well-behaved kids. Unfortunately, my brother appears to have been the one who kept everybody on schedule and made all the decisions. My sister-in-law just did whatever he said, deciding nothing on her own. Now that he's gone, the family seems to be falling apart.

The kids spend very little time at home, and they never eat together as a family anymore -- something I know is necessary these days to keep tabs on what the kids are up to. I could go into detail about how things have gone to pot, but I want to keep this brief. It breaks my heart to see it happen.

I would love to have a little chat with my sister-in-law to explain to her that she must step up to the plate and be the adult. How does one broach the subject without alienating her? —LOVING AUNT IN NEW JERSEY

DEAR LOVING

AUNT: Start by telling this widowed mother of five that you are worried about her, that you're concerned she may be chronically depressed over her husband's death, and you think she may need to talk to her doctor.

A woman in her situation, someone who has never made a decision for herself since the day she was married (or maybe longer), is in a terrible pickle. She needs a mentor because she will have to learn self-sufficiency from the ground up. So be prepared to share every bit of wisdom you can with her.

DEAR ABBY: A child was found dead in our area. He died from blunt force trauma to his head. His mother had reported him missing, and 12 hours later his younger brother found his body. It's not being called murder, although everyone around here suspects it was.

I went to the visitation the first night, and I have never seen so many kids attend a funeral without

a parent. I was appalled. You don't send children to a child's funeral alone. I felt terrible for them. They lost a good friend and didn't have their parents there to help them cope.

I realize that people have to work, but the visitation was from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. The funeral was at 11 a.m. the next day. One adult I spoke with said she didn't go because she couldn't stand to see the child that way. She couldn't take it, so I had to be there for her daughter.

Don't people understand it's not about them? Parents need to realize their kids may have a lot of questions and mixed-up emotions and need to talk. What do you think of this? — SAD MOM IN THE U.S.A.

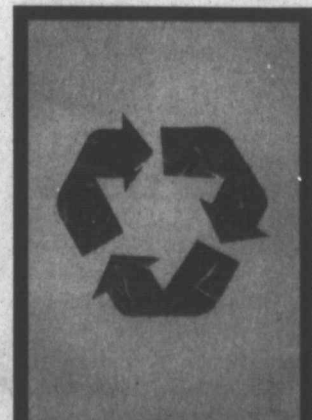
DEAR SAD MOM: I think you have written an important letter. Parents, if this letter strikes a familiar chord, please wake up and reprioritize. Your children need you -- especially at a time like this -- to help them talk

through any fears and anxieties they are experiencing.

Today is Monday, May 24, the 144th day of 2010. There are 221 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 24, 1844, Samuel F.B. Morse transmitted the message, "What hath God wrought" from Washington to Baltimore as he formally opened America's first telegraph line.

On this date:

In 1819, Queen Victoria was born in London. In 1883, the Brooklyn Bridge, linking Brooklyn and Manhattan, was dedicated by President Chester Alan Arthur and New York Gov. Grover Cleveland, and opened to traffic.

In 1941, the German battleship Bismarck sank the British dreadnought Hood in the North Atlantic.

In 1962, astronaut Scott Carpenter became the second American to orbit the Earth as he flew aboard Aurora 7.

In 1976, Britain and France opened trans-Atlantic Concorde supersonic transport service to Washington.

In 1977, in a surprise move, the Kremlin ousted Soviet President Nikolai Podgorny from the Communist Party's ruling Politburo.

In 1980, Iran rejected a call by the World Court in The Hague to release the American hostages.

Ten years ago: Israeli troops pulled out unilaterally from south Lebanon, ending 18 years of occupation. Gunmen killed five people and wounded two others in a robbery attempt at a Wendy's restaurant in Queens, New York. (The gunmen, Craig Godineaux and John Taylor, are serving life prison sentences.) The state of Maryland dismissed its wiretapping case against Linda Tripp after judge disallowed most of Monica Lewinsky's testimony.

Five years ago: Breaking years of gridlock, the Senate cleared the way for confirmation of Priscilla Owen to the U.S. appeals court following a compromise on President George W. Bush's current and future judicial nominees. Ignoring President Bush's veto threat, the House voted to lift limits on embryonic stem cell research.

One year ago: Space shuttle Atlantis and its seven astronauts returned to Earth, ending a 13-day mission to repair and enhance the Hubble Space Telescope. Brazil's Helio Castroneves became the ninth driver to win the Indianapolis 500 three times.

Today's Birthdays: Comedian Tommy Chong is 72. Singer Bob Dylan is 69. Actor Gary Burghoff is 67. Singer Patti LaBelle is 66. Actress Priscilla Presley is 65. Actor Jim Broadbent is 60. On a local note, these students have seen the voters and taxpayers of this school district approve a \$47,000,000 bond issue to renovate Pampa High School and build a new junior high school. This class has been able to benefit from new science labs, up-to-date classrooms, and a new commons area.

The new junior high school is days away from being finished and will be in use for this coming school year. In addition, the taxpayers of Gray County approved a \$0.05 maintenance tax for use by Clarendon College to upgrade the facilities here in Pampa and to expand their curriculum. Ground has been broken for new vocational buildings that should be completed in the near future.

Cooperation between the Pampa Independent School District and Clarendon College continues to grow. For those students from the Class of 2010 that will be entering a four year college, some will be able to enter college as sophomores. With the advent of dual credit courses, students can obtain

high school credit and college credit for the successful completion of these classes.

In the future, high school students may be able to accrue up to 60 semester hours of college work before graduating from Pampa High School. Currently, the Pampa Campus of Clarendon College also provides courses for college freshmen and sophomores.

In fact, with the high school students that are currently enrolled in dual credit courses and the normal enrollment at the Pampa Campus of Clarendon College, the Pampa Campus of Clarendon College now has more students enrolled than at the main campus in Clarendon. None of this would have been possible if the taxpayers of our district and county had not made a commitment to the quality education for our youth.

As the Class of 2010 goes forth into our world to make their mark, I am convinced that the teachers, administrators, and staff of the Pampa Independent School District has provided them with the skills and knowledge that they require to overcome the challenges that they will face. Leadership from this class will almost certainly be involved with solving some of the most pressing challenges that we have seen in many years. Graduating Seniors, please know that the community of Pampa and Gray County love you, cherish you, and wish only the best for your future.

Pampa's Holt earns NASA internship

James Holt of Pampa High School has been selected to travel to NASA's Johnson Space Center (JSC) in Houston, Texas, this summer to participate in a one-week summer internship.

Nominated by State Representative Warren Chisum, he has been selected as one of 368 high school students from across Texas to be part of High School Aerospace Scholars (HAS) Program. Students completed 10 Web-based assignments during the school year maintaining a 90 average or above to qualify for the internship. Holt has a 99 average and is number eight in this year's HAS class. He will apply what he has learned during the year to work with NASA engineers and design a mission to Mars while at JSC. The week long experience at JSC includes a tour

of JSC facilities and briefings by noted NASA employees—including astronauts. These students will conclude their experience by presenting their proposal at a closing event to their parents, members of the Texas Legislature, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Rotary NASA, and JSC senior management.

The State of Texas, in partnership with JSC and the Texas educational community, developed HAS in 1999 to encourage more students to pursue studies and careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). More than 2000 students from across Texas have participated in the program since its inception. With this program, NASA continues the Agency's tradition of investing in the nation's educational programs. It is directly tied to the Agency's major education goal of attracting and retaining stu-

dents in STEM disciplines critical to NASA's future missions, which include missions returning to the moon, on to Mars and beyond.

Holt is the son of Tina Holt, and brother of Trey, Christa and twin sister Paige Holt. He is graduating Pampa High School in only three years. He is number 16 out of 226 in the Pampa High School graduating class of 2010 with 21 college hours from Clarendon College.

He has been accepted to Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach, Florida and will work towards a dual-degree in Aerospace Engineering and Mechanical Engineering. He also plans to earn a pilot's license and co-op at NASA's Johnson Space Center. His goal is to be an engineer at NASA and potentially become an Astronaut.

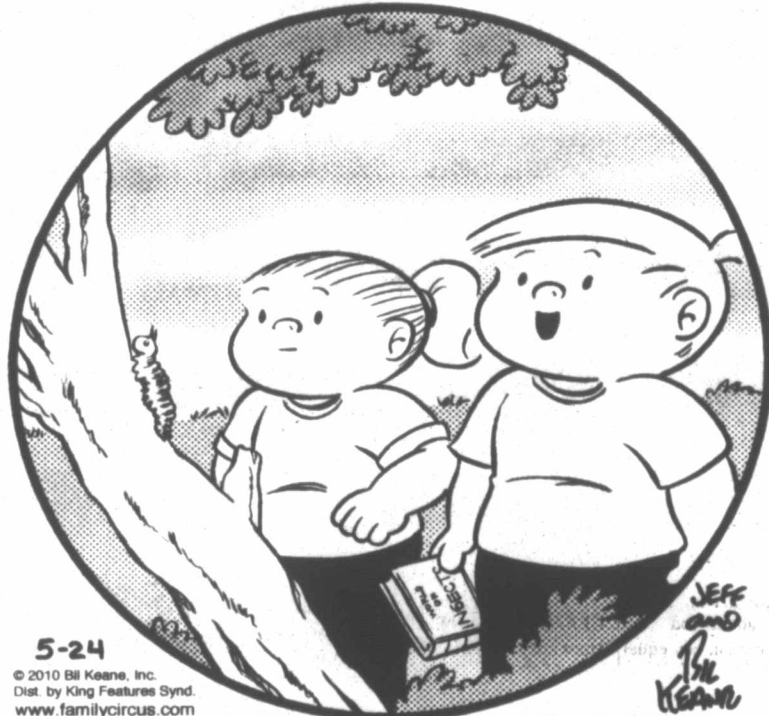

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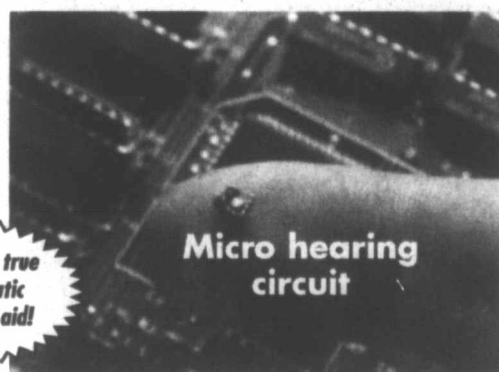
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
