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Skinner case escalates to Supreme Court

The ongoing Hank Skinner saga took a new turn Monday as the U.S. Supreme Court decided to take the case up in its next term, further postponing the execution of the man convicted for killing Twila Busby and her two sons.

Skinner, 47, was originally convicted of the three murders in 1995.

Skinner had finished his last meal and was in a holding cell next to the execution chamber in Huntsville when the U.S. Supreme Court blocked the execution in March.

This week the Supreme Court said it will decide whether Skinner and other death row inmates should have access to DNA evidence under federal civil rights laws.

For their part, a handful of former law enforcement officers involved in

the case more than a decade ago indicated their frustration with the ongoing nature of



Former Gray Country Sheriff Randy Stubblefield, former District Attorney Investigator Bill McMinn and former Pampa Police Detective Terry Young all said today that they have no comments at this time.

McMinn and Stubblefield followed Pampa Police Lt. Alan Smith into a darkened room in a Pampa woman's trailer house in the early morning hours of Jan. 1, 1994, where they found Skinner amid clothes hanging in a closet.

Municipal pool to open this Sunday

Summer fun seekers will have a new local option this weekend when the M.K. Brown Swimming Pool officially opens for the 2010 season.

According to Pampa Recreation Superintendent Enrique Cabrales, the pool's opening "Splash Day" will be Sunday, coinciding with the formal closing of the 2009-'10 school year. The pool will be open from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m.

"We're excited to get started," Cabrales said. "We're looking forward to our summer season. That 'Splash Day' is a big day for us, and we want to make sure that everything goes all right."

Cabrales said that regular maintenance for the pool's opening is proceeding on schedule.

"There's water in the pool, our chemicals are balanced and the heater's up and running," he said. "We've still got the usual things to double check on between now and when we open, but everything is moving along.

"The main thing is that we always think about what the customer can complain about, anything that could make the customer's experience at the pool any worse than it should be.

"First priority is to make sure the visitors are safe. Of course, we also want to make sure the facility is clean. We want to make sure that everything is just right so our visitors can enjoy a fun day at the pool."

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



Gulf plume getting darker

WASHINGTON (AP) - Live video of the Gulf of Mexico oil spill shows the underwater plume getting significantly darker. A top oil engineering expert says that suggests heavier, more-polluting oil is spewing out.

The color of the oil gushing from the main pipe has changed in color from medium gray to black. Two scientists noticed the change, which oil company BP downplayed as a natural fluctuation that is not likely permanent. But engineering professor Bob Bea at the University of California at Berkeley says the color change may indicate the BP leak has hit a reservoir of more oil and less gas. Gas is less polluting because it evaporates.

Oil has been spewing from the site of the Deepwater Horizon oil rig that exploded April 20.

Accident leaves two kids dead

ROCKDALE (AP) — The Department of Public Safety says two children from Rockdale died and two other people were hurt after their car was hit by a train in Milam County.

DPS spokesman Tom Vinger on Tuesday identified the children who died as 9-year-old Monterious Hancock and 8-year-old Ahkeem Williams.

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DPS says the woman driving the car and a 4-year-old passenger also were hurt in the accident Monday afternoon about two miles east of Rockdale. Further details on their conditions were not immediately available.

DPS says the driver was the only person in the vehicle wearing a seatbelt.

Obama, GOP to talk immigration

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Republicans are talking immigration reform with President Barack Obama, including plans to deploy thousands of National Guard troops and drones to tighten border security.

Republicans expect to try to attach the proposals to an almost \$60 billion war spending bill. The subject was expected to come up Tuesday during a closed-door session with the president. The administration's response to the Gulf Coast oil spill, as well as the economy and jobs also are expected to be discussed.

During his presidential campaign, Obama promised to push legislation paving the way to citizenship for some 11 million illegal immigrants. He has said more recently, though, that Congress has little appetite for a massive bill on the subject this election year, so lawmakers are looking at ways to enact more incremental changes.

Perry to blast D.C. in new book

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry has long criticized the federal government, and now he's writing on the subject in a new book called "Fed Up."

Perry's office confirmed and book publisher Little, Brown and Company announced Tuesday that the GOP governor is writing the book. It's due out in the fall, in time for the midterm elections.

The book will further push Perry into the national spotlight. Last year he made national waves by flirting with the subject of secession. He said he can understand why citizens might get so fed up with the federal government that they would consider the idea, though he stopped short of endorsing secession.

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

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 25th, 1810, Argentina began its revolt against Spanish rule with the forming of the Primera Junta in Buenos Aires.

On this date:

In 1787, the Constitutional Convention began meeting in Philadelphia after enough delegates had shown up for a quorum.

In 1895, playwright Oscar Wilde was convicted of a morals charge in London; he was sentenced to two

years in prison.

In 1916, the Chicago Tribune published an interview with Henry Ford in which the American industrialist was quoted as saying, "History is more or less bunk.

In 1935, Babe Ruth hit the 714th and final home run of his career, for the Boston Braves, in a game against the Pittsburgh Pirates. In 1961, President John F. Kennedy, addressing

Congress, called on the nation to work toward putting a man on the moon by the end of the decade. In 1968, the Gateway Arch in St. Louis was

dedicated by Vice President Hubert Humphrey and Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

In 1979, 273 people died when an American Airlines DC-10 crashed on takeoff from Chicago's O'Hare airport.

Ten years ago: The government proposed a fivestar rating system telling consumers how prone vehicles were to rolling over. Iranian state radio announced that former President Hashemi Rafsanjani had resigned from the incoming parliament, depriving hard-liners of a leading figure in the power struggle between conservatives and reformists.

Obama needs to talk to GOP leaders - soon

It's understandable why President Barack Obama wouldn't want to play golf with Rush Limbaugh, but he needs to start talking to Republican leaders Mitch McConnell and John Boehner.

Elected on a promise to end toxic partisanship, Obama has not had any one-on-one contact with Republican congressional leaders during his presidency and has failed to develop personal relationships with them.

As Roll Call's Emily Pierce reported earlier this month, "The last time Obama and McConnell spoke privately, one-on-one, was prior to Obama's January 2009 inauguration."

Obama did call the Senate Minority Leader briefly to advise him he was nominating Solicitor General Elena Kagan for the Supreme Court — "something we already knew," the Kentucky Republican's spokesman

House Minority Leader Boehner's office confirmed that the Ohio Republican has had no contact with Obama, either, outside of group sessions such as White House leadership meetings.

It's not clear that personal contact would have resulted in any Republican support for his policies there's been precious little, of course — but it might have, assum-

ing conversations led to compromise. Arguably, Obama hasn't needed bipartisanship to get his programs through Congress. Democrats had a 70-seat margin in the House and, until recently, 60 votes in the Senate.

But every indication is that Republicans will be stronger in the 112th Congress that takes office in January, so Obama will either be forced to deal with the GOP leadership if he wants to get anything done in the next two years, or be thwarted.

And as primary elections so far indicate, the GOP center of gravity will be further right than it is now, and the Democrats' will be further left — with stalemate in the offing unless Obama can break it.

One top Obama aide told me that the White House considers McConnell to be a "hard-line partisan," implying that there was no dealing with him but the Kentuckian is a far cry from the Limbaugh-Tea Party school of conservatism that's now ascendant.

According to accounts of a forthcoming book, Zev Chafets' "Rush Limbaugh: An Army of One," when a high-ranking Democratic operative conveyed the author's proposal of a golf game, Obama replied: "He can play with himself."

McConnell has criticized Obama's

policies as "big government takeovers" and has used his considerable political and parliamentary skill to unify his GOP colleagues obstruct and Democratic legislation. But he's

The No. 3 Senate GOP leader, Sen. Lamar Alexander of Tennessee, says that Obama's lack of contact with Republicans constitutes a tale of "missed opportunities."

He cites a Jan. 23, 2009, speech to the National Press Club in which McConnell characterized Obama's 'promise of post-partisanship" as opening "the possibility of a new era of cooperation."

McConnell blamed both parties for lack of comity, lamented that "vulgar insults hurled from overcaffeinated activists can pass for legitimate political discourse" and offered to help Obama reform Social Security, lower the national debt and increase energy

independence. In the speech, McConnell also recalled times when "working on a bipartisan basis to achieve big things for the nation didn't mean exposing oneself to attack ads by one's own colleagues," and when "real friendships across party lines were common," citing examples such as the late Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., and former Senate GOP

leader Bob Dole of Kansas. Did McConnell mean it? Obama should have tested him out — face to face - but never did.

Alexander told me that, had Obama and McConnell had a personal relationship, they might have worked out a way to get 60 votes to establish a bipartisan debt commission and even compromise on health care.

"It would have been really hard, but (Obama) would have had to sit down with Mitch McConnell at the beginning of the process and said, 'OK, Mitch, what can we do here?"

Instead, Alexander said, Democrats opted for the "shooting-gallery approach" to GOP senators, "trying to pick off one here and one there. To negotiate with Republicans, you've got to start with the leader.

"My conclusion," Alexander said, "is that (Obama) either doesn't know how to be bipartisan or he doesn't want to — or some of both. He spent so little time as a senator, maybe he does not understand this place.

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"And then, he had 60 votes and his left wing was saying, 'We won the election. We'll write the laws.' And he let them. But that won't work next

That's for sure. A White House aide said Democrats would be "lucky" to limit their House losses to 30.

And on Tuesday, McConnell was humiliated in his home state for being "too Washington," his choice for the Senate (also Dick Cheney's and right-wing former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum's) trounced by Tea Party favorite Rand Paul.

Republicans could have five, six or eight more Senate votes in the next Congress — but, as developments in Kentucky, Florida and Utah suggest they may be more loyal to superpartisan Sen. Jim DeMint, R-S.C., than to McConnell.

In Utah, Republicans rejected Sen. Bob Bennett because he cooperated with a Democrat, Oregon Sen. Ron Wyden, on model health care legislation and because he voted for President George W. Bush's rescue package that saved the U.S. economy from catastrophe.

One sad possibility is that, had Obama and McConnell developed a strong relationship - say, like Lyndon Johnson's with Senate GOP leader Everett Dirksen (Ill.) or Ronald Reagan with Speaker Tip O'Neill, D-Mass. - McConnell might be even weaker politically than he is

Or, as Alexander suggests, they might have been able to produce bipartisan results that would have countered the discontent raging in the country.

But what now? The best suggestion I've heard — from Illinois Rep. Mark Kirk, the Republican Senate nominee is that Obama invite McConnell and Boehner to Camp David for a weekend.

Given the level of paranoia rampant among the tea party set, maybe the confab had best be secret.

But, if they want to get anything done, they'd better talk. Otherwise, they will spend the next two years maybe four, maybe six - in nonstop combat, and the nation will fall deeper into debt and oil dependency, its standard of living and world standing jeopardized.

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Food manager certification offered

Statistics indicate food-borne illness continues to be a health issue in the U.S., causing one in four Americans to become sick, one in 1,000 to be hospitalized and 5,000 to die annually, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service agent.

Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Gray County is offering a professional food manager certification training course called "Food Safety: It's Our Business," to help food establishments meet a Texas Department of State Health Services requirement, said Joan Gray-Soria, AgriLife Extension family and consumer sciences agent for Gray County

The program will be offered on June 15 at the Gray County Annex, located at 12125 E. Frederic Ave. in Pampa. The \$100 fee covers training, materials and the state food manager certification examination, Gray-Soria said. Deadline to register is Tuesday, June 8, 2010.

Under the Texas Department of State Health Services jurisdiction, each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site. Food manager certificates will be valid for five years. This program is designed to not only prepare food-service managers to pass the certification examination, it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food, Gray-Soria said.

According to statistics, Gray-Soria said almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied. Food-borne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills.

She outlines some of the know benefits of improved food safety, including increased customer satisfaction, improved relationships with health officials, and prevention of bad publicity and lawsuits due to food-borne illness

By attending the course, Gray-Soria said, food-service managers will learn to: identify potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling; prevent contamination and cross-contamination of food; teach and encourage personal hygiene for employees; comply with government regulations; maintain clean utensils, equipment and surroundings; and control pests.

Food-borne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices, she said.

Suburban Dallas man to be executed

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Convicted killer John Alba was headed to the Texas death chamber Tuesday evening for barging into a suburban Dallas apartment almost 19 years ago and fatally shooting his estranged wife while she was trying to evade him. Alba, 54, would be the 11th prisoner executed this year in the nation's busiest death penalty state.

Another execution is set for next week Alba and his wife, Wendy, 28, had a rocky marriage marked by alcohol abuse and infidelity and repeated visits from police responding to calls of domestic violence, according to trial testimony. At the time of the 1991 shooting in Allen, in Collin County northeast of Dallas, Alba had just posted bond after being jailed on a charge of molesting a 12-year-old girl.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals rejected a request for a reprieve Monday in an appeal that argued that Alba's sentence was improper because he wasn't eligible for life without parole under a law passed just a few years ago, that his Hispanic race illegally figured into his sentencing, that he shouldn't have been charged with capital murder and that his sentencing was unconstitutional.

Alba's lawyer took the appeal Tuesday to the U.S. Supreme Court. The justices had refused to review Alba's case last week.

The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles denied a clemency request.

Alba declined to speak with reporters as his execution date neared.

In 2010, the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, upheld Skinner's conviction and agreed with lower courts that Skinner had failed to demonstrate that the blood spatter evidence was critical to Skinner's conviction.

More than 300 pieces of physical evidence were introduced at Skinner's trial. The trial was moved from Pampa to Fort Worth on a change of venue.

In March, as Skinner awaited his execution in a holding cell next to the execution chamber, Judge Antonin Scalia of the U.S. Supreme Court stayed the

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
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
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
