### Police department looking at EMD program

The Pampa Police Department is applying for an Amarillo Area Foundation Grant that will fund a one-year pilot emergency medical dispatch program, said Pampa Police Chief Kelly Rushing during a report to the City Commission Tuesday afternoon.

The EMD program, according to Rushing, will give the police department's dispatchers access to a medical database that will allow them to provide pre-arrival instructions to callers in emergency medical situations.

"After receiving training, what the dispatchers will do is access this software in times of medical emergency... in times where it may not take an ambulance three of four minutes to get there but when it may take 30 or 40 minutes for an ambulance to get there," explained Rushing.

The database will supply the PD's dispatchers with directions to relay to the caller. Those directions, Rushing explained, will help the caller provide necessary medical attention to the victim until emergency medical technicians arrive.

The level of telephone assistance can vary


from just simple advice to complete instructions for CPR.

If the AAFG grant is approved, Rushing said, the program's first year — a cost of approximately \$33,000 — would be totally funded by the grant.

Rushing stressed that this first year for police dispatch EMD involvement will be a pilot program, mostly so that the department can gauge the number of calls it receives and the added burden placed on its dispatchers. The police department currently has eight full-time dispatchers.

### Click it or Ticket now in full force

The Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) 9th annual Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement campaign is now taking place and will run through June

Transportation officials say state laws enacted in 2009 could result in more citations this year if drivers and passengers fail to heed new safety belt requirements.

This year's campaign emphasizes two new laws implemented in 2009: 1) adults in the back seat can now be ticketed for not wearing their safety belt, and 2) children younger than 8 years old have to ride in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches.

During the current Click It of Ticket push, law enforcement officers will be out in full force throughout Texas, ticketing drivers and passengers for not wearing their safety belts or not properly buckling up their children. Fines range from \$25 to \$250 plus court costs.

TxDOT has been heavily promoting this year's Click It or Ticket program. Last Wednesday, a 20-foot replica of one of Texas's most famous citizens appeared at the Texas Travel Information Center in Amarillo to announce the 9th annual Click It or Ticket campaign.

"Big Tex," well known for welcoming visitors to the State Fair of Texas, appeared at a press conference in Amarillo alongside other safety belt proponents to kick off the drive.



ABBY: Regarding your column of April 12, 2010, and the letter about the man who refuses to file tax returns, your answer was only partially correct. In addition to enrolled agents, tax returns are also prepared by other licensed professionals.

Certified public accountants are regulated by the various states and do a great deal of tax prepara-

Some tax attorneys may prepare income tax returns. The failure to file a tax return could be a crime, in which case the individual would need a tax attorney to represent him in trying to avoid a jail sentence. Communications to tax attorneys may be covered by the attorney-client privilege.

In addition, there are practitioners who are qualified both as attorneys and as CPAs. While many enrolled agents may also be CPAs, or even attorneys, you should not have restricted your recommendation to enrolled agents only. — SYDNEY S. TRAUM, JD-CPA, MIAMI BEACH, FLA.

standing tax practitioners who are attorneys or CPAs, some of whom are members of NAEA. We do not wish to imply in any way that they are less qualified or capable in the field of taxation. We just want to call attention to the profession of enrolled agents and let the public know that they are the only tax practitioners SPECIFICALLY licensed by the Department of the Treasury."

Readers, I hope this straightens out any confusion. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I was intrigued by the letter from the woman whose boyfriend has refused to file tax returns for eight years. In addition to the civil ramifications of refusing to file the tax return as articulated in your response, it is a federal crime not to file one.

An individual who has the requisite income is punishable for up to three years in prison for failure to file a tax return for each year in which he or she is responsible for filing one. Additionally, it can be construed by the government as tax evasion, for which the maximum penalty includes five years imprisonment for each year in which the tax is evaded. DENNIS C. 
DEAR ABBY: I have been dating "Luke" for about three months. He's a sweet and thoughtful guy who cares about me, and I care for him as well.

Today is Wednesday, May 26, the 146th day of 2010. There are 219 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 26, 1940, the evacuation of more than 338,000 Allied troops from Dunkirk, France, began during World War II.

On this date:

In 1521, Martin Luther was banned by the Edict of Worms (vohrms) because of his religious beliefs and

In 1868, the impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson ended with his acquittal on the remaining

In 1908, the first major oil strike in the Middle East occurred in Masjid-i-Suleiman, Persia (Iran).

In 1913, Actors' Equity Association was organized in New York.

In 1938, the House Un-American Activities Committee was established by Congress.

In 1960, U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge accused the Soviets of hiding a microphone inside a wood carving of the Great Seal of the United States that had been presented to the U.S. embassy in Moscow

In 1969, the Apollo 10 astronauts returned to Earth after a successful eight-day dress rehearsal for the first manned moon landing.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev signed the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty in Moscow. (The U.S. withdrew from the treaty in 2002.)

In 1981, 14 people were killed when a Marine jet crashed onto the flight deck of the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz off Florida.

In 1994, Michael Jackson and Lisa Marie Presley were married in the Dominican Republic. (The marriage, however, ended in 1996.)

Ten years ago: Barry Grunow (GROO'-noh), 35, an English teacher at Lake Worth Community Middle School in Florida, was shot to death by Nathaniel Brazill, a seventh grader, after the teacher refused to let him talk with two girls in his classroom. (Brazill was convicted of second-degree murder and is serving a 28-year sentence.)

Five years ago: President George W. Bush received Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas at the White House; Bush called Abbas a courageous democratic reformer and bolstered his standing at home with \$50 million in assistance. Investigators confirmed five cases in which military personnel mishandled the Qurans of Muslim prisoners at Guantanamo Bay, but said they had found no "credible evidence" that a holy book was flushed in a toilet. Actor Eddie Albert died in Los Angeles at age 99.

One year ago: President Barack Obama nominated Sonia Sotomayor to be the first Hispanic justice on the U.S. Supreme Court. California's Supreme Court upheld the Proposition 8 gay marriage ban but said the 18,000 same-sex weddings that had taken place before the prohibition passed were still valid.

### Social security strives to be open book

President Obama has called for greater transparency in government. In response, Social Security has released its Open Government plan, which you can read online at www.socialsecurity.gov/open.

Security's Social Spanish-language Retirement Estimator will be the federal government's first non-English interactive Internet application — a tool that furthers transparency by offering the Spanishspeaking public an opportunity to get instant, personalized estimates of future retirement benefits. Last year, more than three million people used English-language version of this popular online service available at www.socialsecurity. gov/estimator.

As part of its Online Service Enhancement initiative, Social Security will unveil a new servicechanneling tool that will help people more easily find the information and services they seek

on the agency's website, www.socialsecurity.gov. A key feature will be the opportunity to go online to schedule an in-office appointment for those who are unable to use our online services to conduct all of their business.

The agency also is developing an Online Life-Expectancy Calculator — a simple, but important tool to assist the public with retirement planning. Many people substantially underestimate their life expectancy. This new online service will add a measure of accuracy to retirement planning by providing average life expectancies at different ages based on the person's gender and date of birth, and drawing on assumptions provided in the annual Socia Security Trustees' report
