Howard, 26, to come home after wreck

All you needed to hear to understand the severity of the accident was the tone of David Howard's voice.

David's 26-year-old wife, Olivia, was injured at about 6:30 p.m. on Saturday when the motorcycle carrying her and 42-year-old Shawn "Cowboy" Eastep blew its front tire on the Bowers City highway. Eastep attempted to lay the motorcycle on its side to mitigate the damage, but the bike's tire hit a fence, launching Eastep upwards. Olivia (nickamed Dolly) went into the fence and tumbled into a ditch.

The two were brought via LifeStar helicopter to Amarillo Northwestern. According to David, Eastep was treated for his injuries and was released the following day, but Dolly wasn't as lucky. Dolly broke her collarbone, wrist, ankle and hip in several places and was left with a laceration from the base of her hairline on the back of her neck down to her chest.

"She had her last surgery yesterday," said David on Wednesday. "The doctors said that it's still early to tell, but they said that if her hip doesn't heal right, she may need a hip replacement, and if her ankle doesn't heal right, she may not be able to walk. It's about 50/50 that she's going to walk right now." While David said that doctors need more time before make any further projections, the couple got some encouraging news on Friday: Dolly is coming home. "Right now, she's progressing at least well enough for them to release her to home care," Howard said. "It'll be at least another week or two before the doctors know anything officially, but for now, she's going to be able to come home.' David said that Dolly is currently doing well considering the severity of her injuries. "She's in good spirits," he said. "She's still not eating real well and not talking real well, but she's in good spirits." The couple, who own Dolly's Bar and Grill, are thankful for the support the community has given them since the accident. 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Ripken baseball tourney could bring \$500K into Pampa

Some little ballplayers are about to help the city in a big way. The Cal Ripken 10-year-old Southwest

Regional Tournament, scheduled to descend into Pampa from July 22 to 28, could bring in a windfall of at least \$500,000 for the city, according to Assistant Manager Shane Stokes.

"We are going to have 10 teams and nine of them are out of town," Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes said. "Eight of those teams are out of state. We will have a total of 120 players and families here from out of town for the better part of six days."

Stokes broke down the potential income in a chart based on a similar tournament in Amarillo. The chart lists an estimated cost in lodging,

food and gas depending on how long the teams stay in the city. Lodging was estimated at 15 rooms per team at \$90 per night.

Food and gas was placed by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce at \$85 per child.

The estimates given by Stokes project the total money generated for Pampa over the six-day tournament at \$588,525

Stokes said they are currently raising funds to offset tournament costs by seeking business sponsorships. The Optimists club is offering five tiered sponsorship packages, each with an increasing set of rewards.

"We have the Grand Slam packet for a \$5,000 donation," Stokes said. "The home run package is a \$2,500 donation, the triple is \$1,000 dona-

tion, the double is \$500 donation and the single is \$250 donation." tion, the double is \$500 donation

Sponsorship benefits include prominently displayed logos on the outfield and on signage, tournament passes and ads in the souvenir program.

Surplus funds from the sponsorship packages will be dedicated to Optimist baseball projects identified in a five-year-plan issued by the club. Such projects include new

lights for the various baseball diamonds, paving the Pampa Optimists Youth Baseball Club's south parking lot, adding a security system, reroofing the main building and refurbishing the building's interior offices, meeting room, and bathrooms in the main building. GOP nominee to Texas high court

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry has appointed state District Judge Debra Lehrmann to the Texas Supreme Court, filling the seat of Justice Harriet O'Neill when she leaves June 20.

Lehrmann is already the Republican nominee to replace O'Neill in the November general election when she will face Democrat Jim Sharp. Perry's appointment allows Lehrmann to join the court on June 21 and finish O'Neill's term.

Republicans hold all nine seats on the state's highest court for civil cases.

Aggie killings lead to death penalty

BRYAN (AP) — A jury in Bryan has decided on execution for a man convicted in the 2009 shooting deaths of his 'ex-girlfriend and her brother.

Jurors on Friday ordered the death penalty for 26-yearold ex-Marine John Thuesen.

Thuesen was convicted May 20 of capital murder in the slaying of Rachel Joiner and her brother, Travis Joiner, in an attack at the College Station home that the siblings shared. Both victims were Texas A&M students.

The defense said Thuesen, who served in Iraq, suffered from post-traumatic stress syndrome.

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Prosecutors say Thuesen was angry and jealous that Rachel Joiner was dating another man.

American Airlines, union reach pact

DALLAS (AP) — American Airlines said Friday it has reached a tentative contract agreement with about 10,600 ground workers.

A union official said workers will have to weigh the economy, past wage concessions and terms of the deal before deciding whether to ratify the agreement.

The union said the proposed contract includes pay raises, a signing bonus and retiree health benefits for workers over 50, and would keep a traditional pension plan for current workers. In negotiations with other workers, American has proposed that new hires get 401(k) retirement plans instead of pensions.

The deal faces a July ratification vote by the employees, who handle baggage, clean aircraft and do other ground chores. They are represented by the Transport Workers Union, or TWU.

Texas GOP leaders seek agency cuts

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Republican leaders asked state agencies Friday to find more savings to prepare for a budget shortfall of up to \$18 billion.

The request for agencies to lower their future state funding requests by 10 percent comes on top of an earlier plea to cut 5 percent out of their existing budgets.

Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus said they want state agencies, with some exceptions for critical programs, to lower what they will ask for in the 2012-2013 budget. Officials say the funding requests are due by Aug. 30. The shortfall will top the agenda when legislators reconvene in January.

"As we move into the upcoming budget cycle, state leadership will continue to identify ways to trim spending, just as families and businesses across the state have done, in order to balance our budget," Perry said.

Creation of a new planning group will be considered by the Gray County Commissioner's Court when they meet after Memorial Day.

Commissioners will consider the creation of a Panhandle Rural Transportation Planning Organization and the appointment of the Gray County Judge as a voting member will be discussed when they meet at 9 a.m. Tuesday in the county courtroom of the Gray County Courthouse.

The commission will also hear a report from the Gray County Youth Leadership Advisory Board on the Alcohol Awareness Program.

Commissioners will consider replacing signatures on the Gray County Sheriff Inmate Fund 2 checking account and the Gray County Sheriff Commissary account.

They will also consider a new copier contract for the sheriff's office.

Commissioners will consider allowing Gary Willoughby, com-

missioner precinct 2, to adjust his budget in order to hire a temporary employee.

The commission will also consider renewing the maintenance grant contract with Texas Statewide Automated Victim Notification Service.

The commission is expected to recognize the continuing education and investment training of Gray County Treasurer Scott Hahn and the continuing education of Judge Kurt Curfman, Justice of the Peace for Precinct 2.

J.S. casualties in Afghanistan hit 1,000 mark

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — More U.S. military deaths in the last 10 months of the Afghan war than in the first five years of the conflict. More boots on the ground than in Iraq.

As the U.S. military death toll in the Afghan conflict reached the 1,000 mark, a fight that has become "Obama's war" now faces its greatest challenge — a high-risk campaign to win over a hostile population in the Taliban's southern heartland.

More casualties are expected when the campaign kicks into high gear this summer. The results may determine the outcome of a nearly nine-year conflict that has become the focus of America's fight against Islamist militancy.

The 1,000 U.S. military death occurred in a roadside bombing Friday — just before the Memorial Day weekend when America honors the dead in all its wars.

A NATO statement did not identify or give the nationality of the victim. U.S. spokesman Col. Wayne Shanks said the trooper was American — the 32nd U.S. war death this month by an Associated Press count.

The list of U.S. service members killed in combat in Afghanistan begins with Sgt. 1st Class Nathan Ross Chapman of San Antonio, Texas, a 31-year-old career Special Forces soldier ambushed on Jan. 4, 2002, after attending a meeting with Afghan leaders in Khost province.

He left a wife and two children. The base where a suicide bomber killed seven CIA employees last December bears his name.

The AP bases its tally on Defense Department reports of deaths suffered as a direct result of the Afghan conflict, including personnel assigned to units in Afghanistan, Pakistan or Uzbekistan. Other news organizations count deaths suffered by service members assigned elsewhere as part of Operation Enduring Freedom, which includes operations in the Philippines, the Horn of Africa and at the U.S. detention facility at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

The grim milestone reflects the acceleration in fighting since President Barack Obama shifted the focus from

Iraq to Afghanistan, where al-Qaida plotted the Sept. 11, 2001 terror attacks in the United States.

Yet Obama's decision brought a heavy price.

In the last 10 months, at least 313 U.S. service members have been killed in the war — more than the 295 who died in the first five years of the conflict. More than 430 of the U.S. dead were killed since Obama took office in January 2009.

The number of U.S. troops in Afghanistan has now surpassed the total in Iraq — roughly 94,000 in Afghanistan compared with 92,000 in Iraq. In 2008, the U.S. force in Afghanistan numbered about 30,000.

For many of the U.S. service members in Afghanistan, the 1,000-mark passed without fanfare.

Capt. Nick Ziemba of Wilbraham, Massachusetts, serving with the 1st Battalion, 17th Infantry Regiment in southern Afghanistan, said 1,000 was an arbitrary number and would have no impact on troop morale or operations.

"We're going to continue to work," he said.





Support staff does much behind scenes

I have known that this columnwas due this week for the last nine months. Throughout the school year, as issues have come across my desk, I have often thought "This would be a good topic for my column." Then the immediacy of the issue wanes and

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other topics take the day - all of them would be good ideas for this article.


There have, however, been currents of the same theme running through most of the topics - the day to day issues of running a school "business," and the under- the- radar things that keep the district running smoothly. Below are some random facts you might not know about Pampa ISD the business.

Pampa ISD is required to have an issuer credit rating (ICR) to sell Unlimited Tax School Building bonds. After a credit review analysis earlier this year, the school district's rating was raised by three rating agencies. Standard & Poors raised the ICR from "A-" to "A+." Fitch Ratings recalibrated the long term rate from "A-" to "A+." And Moody's recalibrated the District's rating from "A3" to "A1." These changes reflect the strong financial position of Pampa ISD.

Pampa ISD is the largest employer in town with over 500 employees and close to 3,400 direct "customers"; and probably, another 7,000 indirect "customers." With a total budget of over 30 million dollars, Pampa ISD injects a payroll of close to \$1.5 million into the Pampa economy monthly. In fact, 80% of the school district's budget is payroll.

A little more than half of the staff is involved in the instruction of students in the classroom. These are the faces you know, that your children admire and that cause learning to happen in Pampa ISD.

The rest of the employees comprise a large group of support staff that keeps the organization running. They clean the buildings; they cook the meals; they drive the buses; they repair the buildings; they mow the lawn and care for the athletic fields; they keep the technology equipment

lunch, reliable technology and the comfort of knowing you will be paid on time and the check won't bounce, make the experience much better for the teacher and the student.

On any given morning, there are bus drivers at the bus barn going through the check list on their buses by 5:15 a.m., and on the road by 5:30 a.m. Custodians are opening buildings and preparing for the day at 5:30 each morning, along with the cafeteria staff who are arriving to begin breakfast and lunch for the students of Pampa ISD.

These same groups are usually the last to leave the building at night. They clean classrooms and halls after the teachers leave, and straighten up after the night meetings or athletics events and prepare the building for school the next morning. They bring students safely back from out of town school events late at night, and then check their buses to ready them for the next day's route.

On cold, snowy mornings the process starts even earlier. About 4:00 a.m., every route is driven to make sure it will be safe for students to be bused to school. The Superintendent uses this information to make the decision on whether or not to have school that day. The technology department is up early getting information on the website and sending

These same groups of support staff often work on weekends preparing for meetings and athletics events, or driving students to and from competitions. They check all buildings each weekend. They do work on the loca technology network. They have ever spent Sunday afternoons cleaning graffiti off of school buildings.

This time of year when students and teachers are giddy with the anticipation of summer, counting dowr the days; I find myself a little envious of them all, and irritated with those who ask me what my plans for the summer are "since I have the summer off." That belief - that everyone that works for the school has the summer off — is a commor misunderstanding.



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

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Records of Permian impostor hoops star kept secret

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Documents that might show how a 22-year-old Haitian immigrant duped coaches and administrators into thinking "he was a 15-year-old student and basketball star will not be released, attorneys for state and local school officials say.

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Lawyers for Ector County schools and the University Interscholastic League say the records for Guerdwich Montimer, who is charged with felony sexual assault and false documentation, are protected under federal student privacy laws.

The Associated Press sought records of Montimer's request to be eligible to play basketball at Odessa Permian High School, whose football team and backers inspired the book "Friday Night Lights." The request, which sought letters from Permian coaches and himself to UIL officials, was denied.

A First Amendment and open records expert says the documents should be released to the media because Montimer was not a legitimate student.

"These aren't educational records, these are records of a crime," said Houston attorney Joe Larsen, a board member of the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas.

Montimer enrolled in junior high and later at Permian High last year using a fake birth certificate from Haiti. Because he was living with Odessa coach Danny Wright and not a parent or guardian, Montimer had to apply to the UIL in Austin to play high school basketball. A waiver was granted and he was the star of the team,

leading Permian to the state playoffs.

Suspicions were raised recently after coaches at an amateur basketball tournament said they recognized Joseph as Montimer, a 2007 graduate of a Florida high school and a naturalized U.S. citizen from Haiti.

The AP initially received a copy of Montimer's waiver application and approval from the UIL's district committee, before an attorney stopped the release of more documents. Citing Texas open records laws, the AP requested copies of all supporting documents for the waiver, including the letters from coaches and Montimer himself explaining his story and why he should be allowed to play.

Attorneys for the school and the UIL said the records are protected by the federal Family Educational and Protection Act and would not be released.

The AP has also requested copies of the school district's internal investigation, but no formal ruling has been made.

In 2006, federal education officials said school districts could not even ask the state attorney general's office for a legal opinion on what records to release. Such a request would include a student's name and would violate the law, the memo said.

Leo Barnes, associate vice president for legal affairs at the University of Texas, which handles all public records requests for the UIL, said attorneys questioned whether Montimer would qualify for protection if he enrolled in school using fraud.

Grade transcripts, course schedule and other specific information about a student's academic career are legitimately protected, Larsen said. He said the the school district's investigation into how Montimer enrolled and was allowed to play should be made public.

"It's not a real education record." Larsen said. "It's just a fraud."

Montimer is in the Ector County jail awaiting trial. Originally arrested on a misdemeanor charge of failure to identify himself to a police officer, he also faces charges of having sex with a 15-year-old girl when he was 21 and with tampering with a government document.

Montimer's attorney, Dusty Gallivan, did not immediately return a telephone message Friday.

GOP leaders order agencies to find more cuts

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Texas Republican leaders asked state agencies Friday to find more savings to prepare for a budget shortfall of up to \$18 billion.

The request for agencies to lower their future state funding requests by 10 percent comes on top of an earlier plea to cut 5 percent out of their existing budgets.

Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Joe Straus said they want state agencies, with some exceptions for critical programs, to lower what they will ask for in the 2012-2013 budget. Officials say the funding requests are due by Aug. 30. The shortfall will top the agenda when legislators reconvene in January.

"As we move into the upcoming budget cycle, state leadership will continue to identify ways to trim spending, just as families and businesses across the state have done, in order to balance our budget," Perry said. The Republican governor is seeking another term in November and is being challenged by Democrat Bill White.

Perry said the request for spending reductions will help the state keep taxes low and attract businesses that create jobs.

The earlier 5 percent budget reductions from the current budget were expected to save \$1.2 billion, according to state leaders.

Texas leaders have asked state agencies to identify spending cuts heading into past legislative sessions. This time the request takes on added importance because the state is expected to face such a large shortfall.

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
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Pampa Optimist Club hosts Little League regional

aglover@thepampanews.com For the first time in 20 years, Pampa will host the Cal Ripken Little League Southwest Regional tournament at the Optimist Club.

The tournament will be July 22 through July 28. Kevin Davis from the Optimist Club said they put their name in a hat a year and a half to two years ago.

"Traditionally they rotate the tournament between states in our region: Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, and Louisiana,' Davis said. "They selected us this year."

Two state champions from Arkansas, Louisiana and West Texas and one state champion each from Missouri and Oklahoma will play in the tournament. The teams are playing for a shot at the Ripken World Series in Ocala,

the games. Davis said the cost of the tournament is \$15,000 which includes: the speaker, the banquet, hotel rooms for Babe Ruth officials. The Optimist Club is looking to businesses to provide sponsorship.

"We already have two," Davis said. "We are sending out packets today to businesses explaining what's going on. If they are interested they can get in touch with me.

Davis said several volunteers will be needed for the

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tournament.

"We need field crew personnel," Davis said. "If people can volunteer an hour or two that would be great.'

Davis said people should see some exciting baseball. "I'm 30 years old and I

still get excited every year when the season comes around," Davis said.

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PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND APPEALS PROCEDURES

The Law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow the appeals procedures if you have a concern about:

*the values placed on your property

*any exemptions that may apply to you

*the cancellation of an agricultural exemption

*the taxable status of your property

*the local governments which should be taxing your property

*any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affects you

Informal Review

The first option a taxpayer may use to protest a value is to visit with the chief appraiser of a staff member. Records on individual properties are available for review by every taxpayer. This informal review is to the benefit of the taxpayer, as many protests are resolved at this level.

Review by the Appraisal Board

If you cannot resolve your problem with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the Appraisal Review Board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a note of protest) before the deadline the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You will receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make a decision based on the presented evidence. NOTE: You should not try to contact ARB members prior to the meeting. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not discussed your case prior to the ARB meeting.

Review by District Court

After the ARB decides your case you will be sent a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's decision.
