Stuck saw stalls spill cleanup

PORT FOURCHON, La. (AP) — The risky effort to contain the nation's worst oil spill hit a snag Wednesday when a diamond-edged saw became stuck in a thick pipe on a blown-out well at the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico.

Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen said the goal was to free the saw and finish the cut later in the day. This is the latest attempt to contain — not plug — the gusher; the best chance at stopping the leak is a relief well, which is at least two months from completion.

"I don't think the issue is whether or not we can make the second cut. It's about how fine we can make it, how smooth we can make it," Allen said.

If crews make the cut, they will try to place a cap on top of the oil spewing out. This cut-and-cap effort could temporarily increase the flow of oil by as much as 20 percent, though Allen said officials wouldn't know whether that had happened until the cut could be completed.

Flooding causes computer crisis

DALLAS (AP) — A computer crisis that crippled most of Dallas County's government operations Tuesday might have been avoided had officials heeded a consultant's warning two years ago.

The Dallas Morning News reports Wednesday that a 2008 consultant advised the county to have a backup plan for its computer systems. Such an offsite location could keep the county up and running when there is a calamity.

A broken water main near the Dallas County records building Monday night flooded the downtown facility's basement and subbasement. The floodwaters have shut down the county's computer system, forcing officials to book inmates into the county jail manually.

The building houses deeds to properties and other critical records.

Officials say no county data was lost but they learned a costly lesson.

Perry vs. EPA goes to next round

DEER PARK (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry is headed to the heart of the Houston-area petrochemical complex to discuss what his office calls "EPA overreach."

Perry is scheduled to hold a news conference Wednesday in the Houston suburb of Deer Park to discuss a growing spat between state and federal environmental regulators. That's after the Environmental Protection Agency's regional director last week threatened to remove Texas' regulatory authorities by midsummer if the state fails to comply with the Clean Air Act.

The EPA says the Texas permitting program makes regulating pollution impossible.

Perry sent a letter to President Barack Obama last week asking him to prevent federal environmental regulators from taking over. The governor says the Texas program for permitting pollutants released by petrochemical plants has helped improve air quality.

Shooter headed to death chamber

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Condemned prisoner George Jones is headed to the Texas death chamber for a fatal shooting during a Dallas-area carjacking 17 years ago.

The 36-year-old Jones has exhausted his court appeals, and his lawyer is planning no last-day attempts to block the lethal injection.

The punishment Wednesday evening would be the 12th this year in Texas, the nation's busiest death penalty state.

Jones has insisted he wasn't present in April 1993 when 22-year-old Forest Hall was gunned down along a rural road near Lancaster, about 15 miles south of Dallas. Testimony showed Hall was abducted from a Dallas mall parking lot.

Jones was arrested about five months later after an accomplice implicated him in the shooting.

Cancun mayor tied to cartels

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The mayor of Cancun has been charged with having drug trafficking ties, forcing him to end his campaign for governor in a scandal that has shaken Mexico's upcoming state elections.

A federal judge indicted Gregorio Sanchez Tuesday on charges of organized crime and money laundering a week after he was arrested in Mexico's most important tourist resort. Prosecutors say he protected two of Mexico's most brutal drug gangs and lived beyond his means.

The formal charges bar Sanchez from participating in politics, ending his run for governor of the Caribbean coast state of Quintana Roo.

Also Tuesday, authorities say a 3-year-old girl was killed together with her father by gunmen who opened fire on their car in the border city of Ciudad Juarez, across from El Paso, Texas.

Arturo Sandoval, a spokesman for the Chihuahua state prosecutors' office, said the girl was shot once in the neck.

signatories on the Sheriff's Inmate Fund 2 checking account and Commissary account.

The commission also approved a change in the sheriff's contract concerning a copier in his office. It will lower the payment for a leased copier.

The commission also recognized the continuing education of Gray County Treasurer Scott Hahn and Gray County Justice of the Peace for Precinct II Kurt Curfman.

"It was an enormous show," Cota said. Cota described the trade show as tremendously helpful.

"We came back with a stack of business cards and a stack of information that we'll be going through," Cota said. "We'll contact these people and set up appointments."

Cota said Rice was able to go around and meet people with a lot of the other exhibitors.

"Now the real work begins," Cota said, "because we're going to come back and compile the information we gathered and contact these people, send them information and try to get them to come to Pampa."

"It allowed us to get out on the floor and introduce ourselves to businesses in the wind energy industry," Rice said of the trade show, "which we believe will be very, very beneficial for us."

Rice added that the trade show gave him a chance to meet many of the people face to face that he'd previously spoken to only by phone.

"I thought that was very beneficial," he said. "I'm glad that we went."

The PEDC, according to Cota, worked with Dallas-based World Economic Development Alliance in marketing the Pampa area.

"We're working with them," Cota said. "They're sending us leads."

She said they are a great resource and have been very, very helpful. The Alliance is just one of many resources, Rice said, that the PEDC intends to take advantage of in getting Pampa recognized.

Rice said that as the wind energy industry develops, he wants people to know Pampa and Pampa's interest in the industry.

Their work, it seems, is already starting to pay off, in a way. With a big smile, Cota said a lot of the people she saw at the trade show saw the green and gold of the PEDC's booth and commented on it.

"A lot of them knew where Pampa was," she grinned. "We even had a couple of them go, 'Support those Harvesters.'"

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 2, 1953, Queen Elizabeth II of Britain was crowned in Westminster Abbey, 16 months after the death of her father, King George VI.

On this date:

In 1897, Mark Twain, 61, was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London that "the report of my death was an exaggeration."

In 1924, Congress passed a measure that was then signed by President Calvin Coolidge granting American citizenship to all U.S.-born American Indians.

In 1941, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, died in New York of a degenerative disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis; he was 37.

In 1946, Italy held a referendum which resulted in the Italian monarchy being abolished in favor of a republic.

In 1979, Pope John Paul II arrived in his native Poland on the first visit by a pope to a Communist country.

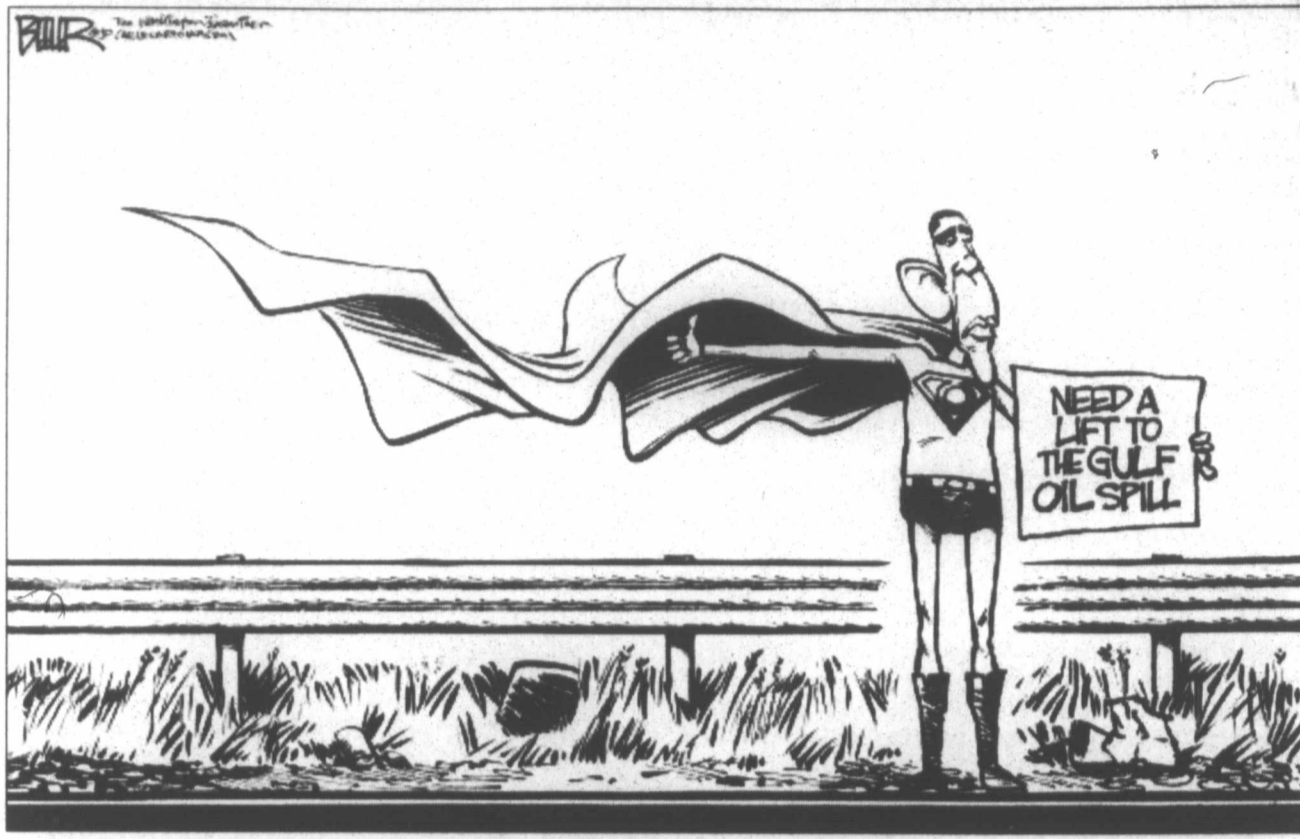
In 1986, for the first time, the public could watch the proceedings of the U.S. Senate on television as a six-week experiment of televised sessions began.

May has been a busy month for the Chamber.

The Retail Committee hosted the Pampa Partnership Golf Tournament, which involved selling tee box sponsorships, getting the sponsors signs made, and getting the signs to the golf courses. Thanks to all the sponsors, committee members, office staff, and golf course personnel that helped make this a success.

The Panhandle Peace Officers Association met on the 20th. The Tourism Committee prepared and passed out goody bags to the 60 or so law enforcement professionals who attended from out of town.

Twelve people showed up to tour Pampa on the Family Bike Ride—a family of five, two couples, and three individuals braved the wind to tour the historical district and the sculpture trail. A great turnout for the first time and with the wind so strong.

One of the chief things we have been working on this month is cleaning up some of the neglected areas of the building—determining what needs to be thrown away and organizing the rest. It is a big job, but it will be great when we finish.

A number of years ago, I became convinced of the principle that effort is rewarded—thought not in the way one might expect. When I actively visited prospective members for church, my civic club, or Toastmasters, I found that the organization grew—but the new

It works in other ways, too. The Tourism and Leadership Committees have been busy working on making Pampa a "conference destination". This involves determining what Pampa has to offer, and what groups would like to meet here. We have deduced that with the lodgings, the dining establishments, the meeting capabilities, and attractions, we could easily handle conferences of 200-300 attendees. Now comes the problem of letting those who make the decisions know what we have to offer. In other words, who represents the organizations that have regular meetings that could meet in Pampa? This is obviously an ongoing consideration, but a funny

thing happened last week.

I attended the "stamp cancellation" last Wednesday at the Pampa Post Office. A number of out-of-towners were there, all of them marveling at the beauty of that structure. We presented them with "goody bags" full of gift items and information about Pampa. One of the attendees was Tai Kreidler with the Southwest Collection on the campus of Texas Tech and Director of the West Texas Historical Association. Out of the blue, Tai asks me, "Would Pampa be a good place to have our annual conference?"

I was amazed, since the very evening before, the Tourism Committee had discussed attracting these sort of meetings.

With that being said, here's your assignment.

Think of the organizations you are associated with. Be creative—think professional associations, civic clubs, social clubs, church, special interest groups—if they have workshops, conferences, continuing education classes, or what have you.

If they meet as a group, we would like them to host them here. Find out who the decision-maker for the group is, and maybe even what their needs would be. Let us know here at the Chamber, and we'll see if we can get them here.

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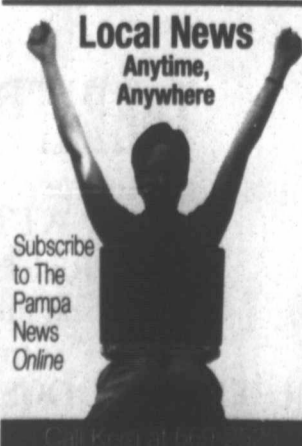

wake up in the morning, I'm ready to go. No problem."

He has a new pair of shoes now, thanks to his wife and sister-in-law. The heel of one of his shoes is almost completely gone.

"I drag my left foot," he said.

Brandy has been in a number of marathons, but this is the first time he's tried walking across the county.

He explained that back in 2004, he got a card in the mail from the Heart Association.

"They invited me to come down and train for a marathon," he said. "I went to one of their information sessions and told them I didn't think I could do a full marathon. Maybe I could do a half."

They explained that it was the San Diego Rock and Roll Marathon, and they didn't have a half marathon. They told him that if he couldn't do the whole marathon, they'd come pick him up.

"My wife and I both trained for the San Diego marathon in 2005," Brandy said. "We both completed the San Diego Rock and Roll Marathon."

Since then, he's completed eight other marathons.

"I've done nine so far," he said. "The last one I did was in December. It was the Las Vegas Rock and Roll Marathon."

Doing the marathons, he's raised money for the Heart Association.

"I decided I wanted to do the marathon in Athens, Greece," Brandy said. "I wanted that to be my tenth marathon."

The marathon in Athens is Oct. 31, 2010.

It was during an interview with the Orange County Register in California earlier this year at the gym where Brandy was working out, that Brandy

announced what his plans were.

"I'll just walk across America," he said.

Brandy hadn't even brought up the idea with his wife.

"My wife didn't talk to be for two days," he said.

But she came around, Brandy said, and now she's his staunchest supporter.

Brandy earned a degree in music in 1990 and his paralegal certificate in 1992.

He got his law degree in 1994 from Western State University.

"I've been disabled for many years," Brandy said. "I haven't worked in a long time."

Brandy was born on Valentine's Day in 1951, in San Diego.

"My father was in the Navy," Brandy said, "so I was a Navy brat."

Over the years, Brandy's had a series of strokes.

"The last stroke that I had really affected my right side," Brandy said. "That's why I use a cane."

While he's taken up marathons, the long distance hiking is something new for him.

He said he walked on frontage roads on Interstate 10 coming out of California. He took California Highway 62 up into Yucca Valley and eventually Parker, Ariz.

"It took me actually north of where I wanted to go," Brandy said.

Once he got to Parker, Ariz., he had to go back down south to U.S. 60, which he took toward Phoenix.

From there, he took Arizona Highway 87 north into the mountains of Arizona.

"At first," he said, "I didn't think I was going to be able to do many mountains because mountains are difficult. With my stroke, I just didn't think I was going to be able to do it."

Mycle's Map

Mycle Brandy has been walking from Newport Beach, Calif., since Valentine's Day and aims to make it to D.C. by October. Averaging 13 or 14 miles a day, he has so far traversed across three whole states and will cross the Panhandle into Oklahoma this weekend.



He got to Sunflower, Ariz., where he faced a six percent grade for six miles.

"I looked at it," Brandy said, "and I said either I'm going to do it now or I'm not going to do it now."

He started walking up the hill, taking a break every half hour or so to catch his breath.

"The altitude was increasing," he said, "so it was getting a little more difficult for me to breath."

But he made it.

"I made it all the way through that," he said, "and I got to Payson, Ariz., which is up in the mountains."

From there, he took Arizona Highway 260 and walked in the snow.

"There was snow on the ground," Brandy said. "It snowed a couple of times when I was walking."

He walked on to Show Low and then on to Springerville, Ariz.

Brandy made it to New Mexico on April 18.

He arrived in Texas on May 20.

Brandy had made it to Texico, and the Elks Lodge gave him a ride back to Clovis so he could meet his wife for their anniversary.

"We were invited to the Elks Lodge

in Clovis for anniversary dinner," Brandy said.

His wife stayed with him to Hereford, then she had to leave to go back to work.

Brandy walked on to Canyon and Amarillo and Pampa.

His trip will cover a little over 2,700 miles. To date, Brandy figured he's covered a little over 1,200.

"By the time I get to Arnett, Okla.," he said, "I'll be at 1,300 miles."

Since he started his journey, Brandy said he's met some wonderful people.

"I have no doubt that I can physically do this," he says, "but I need to get a sponsor. That's kind of the hardest thing for me right now."

He said that what he needs is for someone to follow him.

"Let me walk my mileage," he said, "and give me a place to sleep at night and take a shower."

He said an RV would be perfect because when he gets done walking, he can go and visit hospitals.

"If I have a sponsor and I have someone following me," Brandy said, "it's going to make it easier for me to get around."

DEAR ABBY: My friends and neighbors thought I had the best husband, and our children thought he was the greatest dad. But on the day he died, I found out he had been having sex with another woman.

I went to visit him in the hospital and overheard the whole thing as he was talking to her. Abby, she was a prostitute. I knew money had been disappearing, but I never imagined anything like this.

DEAR HURTING: I see nothing positive to be gained by shattering your children's image of their father at this point. I'm sorry he failed you as a husband. However, for you to spend more of your life nursing hurt and disappointment is a waste of your precious time. Talk to your religious adviser or confide in a therapist. But do not bring this up with your children.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 76-year-old father of three sons and grandfather of five. The other night, I was dining out with my brother, one of my sons, his 31-year-old wife, and their two children, ages 5 and 2.

The server was standing next to me and the 5-year-old, poised to take our orders. My daughter-in-law was distracted by the 2-year-old, so I placed my order so the server would not be kept standing there.

DEAR TRYING TO BE HELPFUL: Consider it done. Now I'll offer another suggestion: Always proofread what you have written to ensure there are no spelling or transposition errors.

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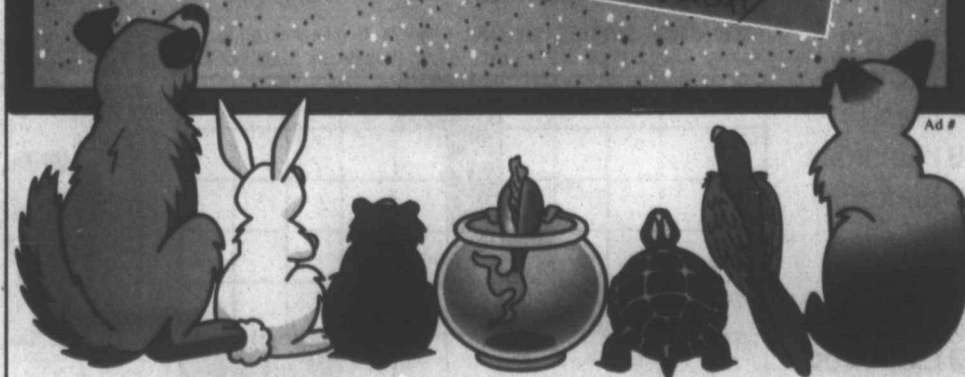
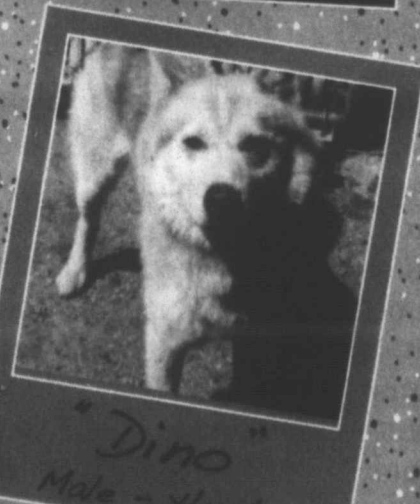
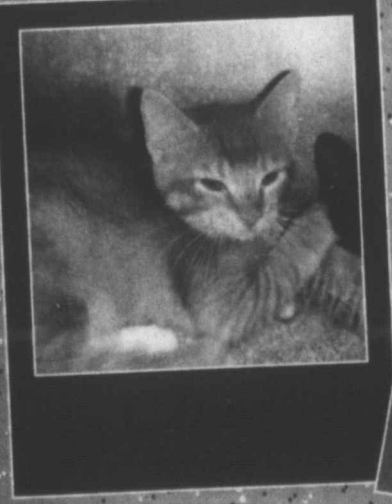

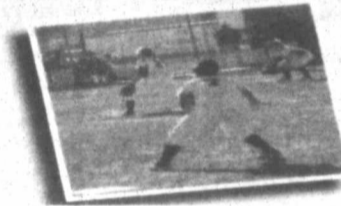

DFB's Keown was the leading hitter in the game going three for three with two runs scored.

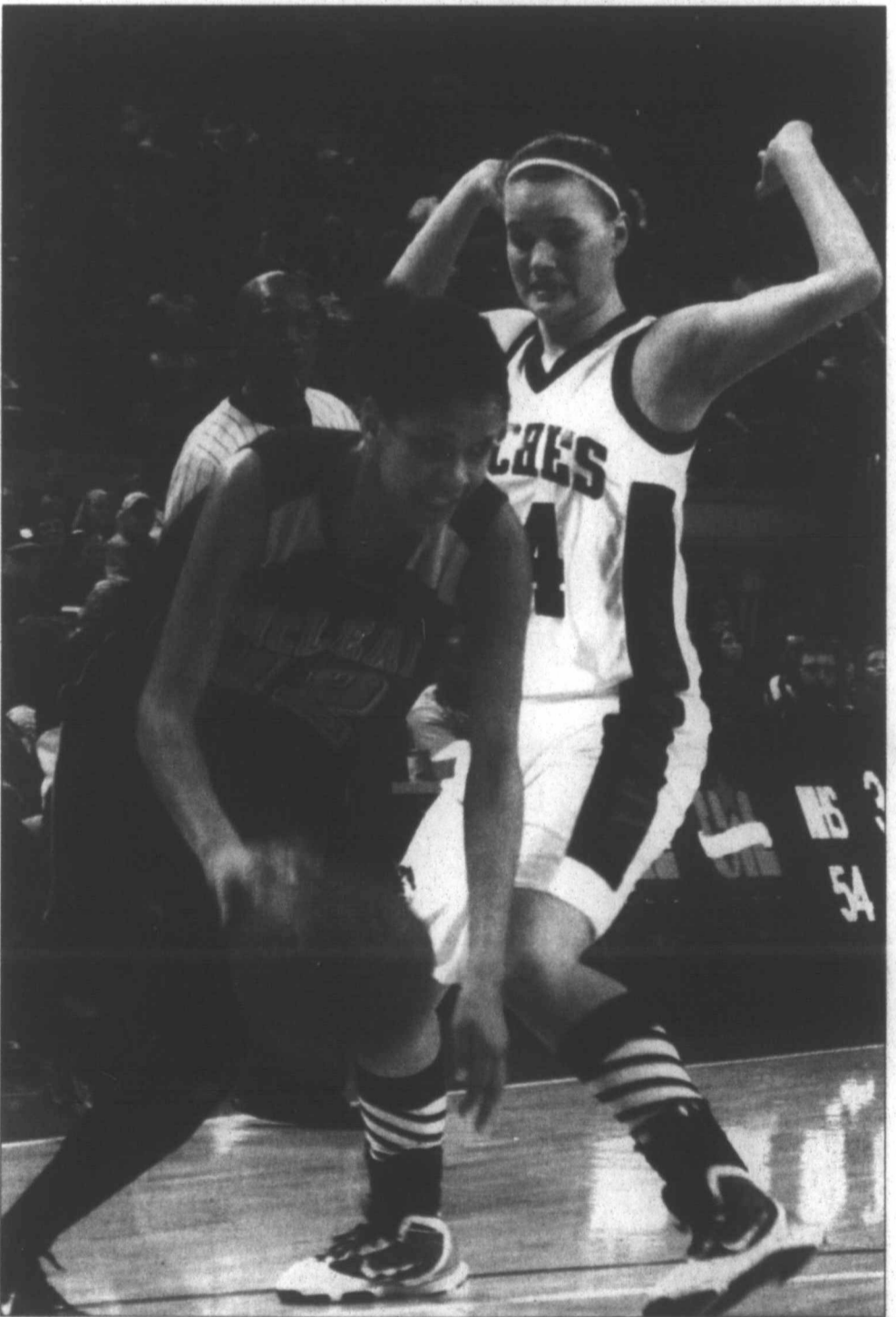
Landon Taylor, playing first base for DFB, threw a runner out at home to Harden, who blocked the plate for the outstanding defensive play of the game.
