Saturday morning, Central Park will be cast back to a time before buffalo hunters, before mounted Indian warriors of the plains, back to a Medieval Fair when knights of old were chivalrous and bold.

The Noblesse Oblige Society, a medieval recreation group from White Deer, will use Central Park as a setting for their pavilions of brightly colored tents and light sword play in a setting dating to between 800 and 1600 A.D.



Callon has wells in Gulf of Mexico

NATCHEZ, Miss. (AP) Officials with Natchezbased Callon Petroleum, which has deep-water wells in the Gulf of Mexico, say they don't have immediate plans that will be affected by the six-month moratorium on offshore drilling.

Callon spokesman Terry Trovato tells The Natchez Democrat that the company has not drilled any offshore wells in the Gulf in the last 18 months and has no plans to do so for the remainder of the year.

Trovato says operations at its two major oil-producing wells, Medusa and Habanero, have not been affected by the continuing BP oil spill.

He says 94 percent of Callon's budget for capital expenditure for 2010 is being spent in the onshore Permain Basin of west Texas and in the Haynesville Shale in northern Louisiana.


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



Democrats propose further tax hike on offshore oil

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democrats are moving to quintuple the tax that oil companies pay into an oil spill liability fund.

The move would raise \$15 billion over the coming decade as Congress seeks to shore up the fund in the wake of the cata-

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
strophic spill in the Gulf of Mexico. But it's also being used to ease a tax hike passed by the House on

investment fund managers. The new legislation would raise the tax on oil produced offshore from 8 cents to 41 cents per barrel. That's nine cents higher than legislation that passed

the House last month.


The tax changes are being made as the Senate again takes up grab-bag legislation extending unemployment benefits and a variety of expired tax breaks enjoyed by both individuals and businesses.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 8, 1967, during the Six-Day War, 34 U.S. servicemen were killed when Israeli fighter jets and torpedo boats attacked the USS Liberty, a Navy intelligence-gathering ship stationed in the Mediterranean. (Israel later said the Liberty had been mistaken for an Egyptian vessel.)

In A.D. 632, the prophet Muhammad died in Medina.

In 1845, Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States, died in Nashville, Tenn.

In 1861, Tennessee seceded from the Union. In 1864, Abraham Lincoln was nominated for another term as president during the National Union

(Republican) Party's convention in Baltimore. In 1905, President Theodore Roosevelt offered to act as a mediator in the Russo-Japanese War.

In 1915, Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan resigned in a disagreement with President Woodrow Wilson over U.S. handling of the sinking

In 1948, the "Texaco Star Theater" made its debut on NBC-TV with Milton Berle guest-hosting the first program. (Berle was later named the show's permanent host.) In 1966, a merger was announced between the

National and American Football Leagues, to take effect in 1970. In 1978, a jury in Clark County, Nev., ruled the

so-called "Mormon will," purportedly written by the late billionaire Howard Hughes, was a forgery. In 1995, U.S. Marines rescued Capt. Scott

O'Grady, whose F-16C fighter jet had been shot down by Bosnian Serbs on June 2. Ten years ago: Two gunmen shot to death

Brig. Stephen Saunders, a British defense attache, in Athens, Greece; the elusive terrorist group November 17 claimed responsibility, saying it killed Saunders because of his role in NATO airstrikes against Yugoslavia. Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonist Jeff MacNally died in Baltimore at age 52.

Five years ago: The Senate confirmed California judge Janice Rogers Brown for the federal appeals court, ending a two-year battle. Former Boston Bruins star Cam Neely, the late Valeri Kharlamov and Murray Costello were named to the Hockey Hall of Fame.

One year ago: North Korea's highest court sentenced American journalists Laura Ling and Euna Lee to 12 years' hard labor for trespassing and "hostile acts." Laura Harlin, a resident of nearby Granbury, said around the time of the blast she heard a "huge rumbling" that initially sounded like thunder and then like a tornado because it lasted so long.

"For about 10 minutes, it was so loud that it was like there was an 18-wheeler rumbling in your driveway," she said.

The explosion caused confusion among officials in its immediate aftermath, with one city official initially saying three people had been killed.

Heat from the blast forced firefighters to stay about a half-mile away until the gas flow was shut off, and they were unable to douse the flames.

A control room at Houston-based Enterprise Products Partners LP, which owns the gas line, immediately identified a break in the line near Cleburne, said company spokesman Rick Rainey. The 36-inch line was

Texas natural gas line explosion automatically shut down gas to that section of pipe, and the fire was out about two hours after the exploThe

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
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The pipeline helps carry gas from West Texas across the state to utilities, distribution companies and commercial users on the eastern end of the state. Rainey said the company would work with customers to avoid any disruption to their service from the fire.

The injured workers were digging for a subcontractor hired by Wacobased Brazos Electric Cooperative, Johnson County's emergency management coordinator, Jack Snow, said. A message seeking comment from that company was not returned. A spokesman for the subcontractor, Oklahomabased C&H Power Line Construction Services, did not respond to a call for comment either.

The Texas natural gas blast followed one in West Virginia earlier Monday. Seven workers were burned when a drilling crew hit a pocket of methane gas, triggering an explosion in a rural area about 55 miles equipped with valves that southwest of Pittsburgh.

MEXICO CITY (AP) Mexico's state-run oil company filed a lawsuit Monday against five companies, including the U.S. subsidiary of German chemical maker BASF, for allegedly buying stolen Mexican petroleum prod-

companies

Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, says in the lawsuit filed in a Houston court that the companies allegedly profited from the theft of natural gas condensate. It claims at least \$300 million worth of condensate from the Burgos basin in northeast Mexico has been stolen since 2006.

Pemex is asking for at least \$900 million in damages. The suit also names Murphy Energy Corp., Trammo Petroleum Inc., U.S. Petroleum Depot Inc., Valley Fuels and five individuals.

Pemex said the companies have encouraged the theft by "actively participating in the smuggling of stolen condensate into the United States and/or purchasing it for use in

Arthur, Texas. Pemex said the company allegedly purchased at least \$2.4 million worth of stolen condensate from other defendants named in the suit.

Daniel Pepitone, a U.S. spokesman for Germanybased BASF, didn't immediately respond to an e-mail seeking comment.

The Mexican government says drug cartels and criminals tap into remote pipelines, sometimes building pipelines of their own, and siphon off hundreds of millions of dollars worth of oil and petroleum products each year.

In the lawsuit, Pemex said gangs have also hijacked tanker trucks on their way to its refineries.

It said the investigation har resulted in the arrest of at least 40 people, including two Mexican customs officers who allowed the trucks to cross into the U.S. with false documents.

The lawsuit filed by Pemex is the first of its kind in the United States and is the result of an investigation being led with cooperation from the U.S. government," Pemex said in a statement.

DEAR ABBY: As a teacher, I would occasionally have a student I didn't like. I gave myself the "Ten Rule." I'd make 10 positive comments about the student before I allowed myself to make a negative one. The process worked miracles.

I don't know if I changed because I made the effort to find good qualities, or if the child changed because of the positive input. Before long, I found myself liking and enjoying that student as much as I did the others. -- NANCY IN BROUSSARD, LA.

DEAR ABBY: I suffered physical and verbal abuse from my mother, who told me often I was her "ugly" child. The day I checked out of the hospital for depression she told me she had never bonded with me as an infant and that I annoyed her. I suffered from low self-esteem for as far back as I can remember

I'm almost 40 now, and after thousands of hours of therapy and hard work, I choose to believe that I am worthy and loving. I'm in a healthy marriage and have a 2-year-old daughter. The thought of repeating the pattern of abuse makes me ill. I hope "Anonymous" will do whatever she can to change her attitude toward her daughter. — J.H., LONG BEACH, CALIF.

DEAR ABBY: Children mimic what they see. "Anonymous" has two sons who are watching and learning how to treat people, especially women.

NEW YORK (AP) — Alarmed by the use of hard-to-track prepaid cell phones by terror suspects, New York Sen. Chuck Schumer and Texas Sen. John Cornyn have introduced legislation requiring consumers to produce identification before buying such phones.

The bill has been praised by law enforcement and has bipartisan support, even as civil liberties groups have raised privacy concerns and some terror experts say it won't deter bad behavior.
Schumer, a Democrat,
and Cornyn, a Republican,
are hoping to schedule hearings on the bill
through the Judiciary
Committee. Schumer has
urged Attorney General
Eric Holder to back the
measure.

Phone companies sold \$16 billion worth of prepaid cell phones last year, and the devices are hugely popular in both the U.S. and countries around the world. But since the phones can be purchased anonymously and are thrown away after use, they've long been a favored tool of drug dealers, gang members and even white-collar criminals looking to cover their tracks.

In recent years, such phones also have been linked to suspected terror activity — including that by Faisal Shahzad, the Pakistani-American accused of plotting to bomb Times Square. Law

enforcement officials said Shahzad had used a prepaid cell phone to purchase a car in which to hide the bomb and to communicate with co-conspirators in Pakistan.

A handful of states and several countries require registration to purchase a prepaid cell phone. In an interview, Schumer said the Shahzad case, combined with the growing use of prepaid cell phones in criminal cases, had persuaded him that federal regulation was needed.


