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## Prison chapel groundbreaking marks decade of effort by local volunteers

dbowser@thepampanews. A project a decade in the making, and involving dozens of local volunteers, was formally kicked off Tuesday afternoon at the Rufe Jordan Prison Unit near Pampa. The project's goal - to construct a new chapel onsite for the pris-

Supporters gathered at the construction site to thank volunteers and officially break ground on the new construction.


Among the leaders asked to speak during the ceremony was State Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa, who evoked the Apostle Paul's teachings. Paul wrote in the Bible that when people gathered in Jesus' name, he would be there also.

"That fits this occasion perfectly," Chisum said. 'He wrote that in prison."

Now, Chisum said, prisoners at the Jordan Unit will have a place to meet.

"For the last 10 years," he added, "we've had people coming out here and working with these prison-

Chisum commended the volunteers who have worked in the prison min-

jobs in the church for them to do," Chisum said, "but they come out here and do this. We do appreciate

Pampa Mayor Lonny Robbins said that the organizers of the chapel project had a vision that began "They could find other Schlewitz, when the Jordan vision. It takes longer than

Unit first opened.

"It was in his heart to see something happen and transpire out here that had not happened very often in the State of Texas," Robbins said, "but it has taken a longer time than he had anticipated, and that's

we anticipate for it to be fulfilled and completed."

Tom Mechler, a former Pampan and a vicechairman of the Board of Criminal Justice, said that the building of the chapel is only the beginning. He noted that "there will be with Prison Chaplain Dave the only question about many tears spilled on the floor of the new chapel."

He said the prison ministry in the chapel provides God a chance to change lives.

"I was a volunteer prison chaplain for two-anda-half years before I was on the Board of Criminal Justice," Mechler said.

Michael Savers, warden of the Jordan Unit, said the prison chaplains and the Jordan Chapel Builders had done a great job with regard to the new chapel.


'Ya'll have done real hard work and put a lot of dedication into it," Savers

Savers opened the Jordan Unit in 1992, and watched it and the Bill Bates Unit

The new chapel will be a 7,800 square foot metal building in the northeast corner of the Jordan Unit.

Planning for the chapel started in 2000. Jack Reeve with the Jordan Chapel Builders group, served as master of ceremonies at the groundbreaking and said it largely came from Schlewitz, the prison chaplain at the time, and Reed Kirkpatrick, a retired Pampa Parks and Recreation Department supervisor.

## Two Pampa men killed in gas pipeline explosion

Two Pampa men were killed in a pipeline explosion Tuesday in the northeast corner of the Texas Panhandle.

Johnnie Mike Renner, 44, and Steven Douglas Odell, 32, both of Pampa, were killed when a natural gas pipeline was ruptured Tuesday afternoon near Darrouzett.

The driver of a bulldozer was airlifted to Oklahoma City. Lipscomb County Sheriff James

Robinson said the man was seriously injured, but his injuries were apparently not life-threatening.

A fourth man at the scene of the explosion was taken to Hemphill County Hospital and another was treated for minor injuries. A sixth man at the site was not injured.

The explosion was the second deadly blast in two days involving workers who accidently hit natural gas pipelines. Monday, a ruptured natural gas pipeline killed a man southwest of Dallas.

The blast north of Darrouzett involved a Canadian-based dirtcontracting crew that was removing caliche from a pit. Sheriff Robertson said the accident happened about 4 p.m. Tuesday about two miles northeast of Darrouzett when a bulldozer struck a natural gas pipeline.

Crews from DCP Midstream shut off the valves on the company's 14-inch natural gas pipeline. The fire burned itself out about 8 p.m., according to authorities.

Roz Elliott with Denverbased DCP Midstream told the Associated Press the pipeline fed one of the company's processing

Lipscomb County deputies and emergency crews from Darrouzett; Booker; Canadian; Slapout, Okla., and Shattuck, Okla., responded to the blaze.



### Feds proposing new immigration fee hikes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal immigration officials are proposing to increase the fees to apply for legal U.S. residency to nearly \$1,100, but would leave existing citizenship application fees intact.

The Citizenship and Immigration Services has scheduled a news conference later Wednesday to announce the fee increases. It now costs a total of \$1,010 to apply for legal residency and get required fingerprinting, and that cost would rise to \$1,085

The agency is required by law to review its fees regularly and decide whether they are covering the cost of doing business.

The CIS had a major fee hike in the summer of 2007, helping to trigger a flood of citizenship applications that were filed in advance of the increases.

## Fritch ramp closed

FRITCH -- National Park Service representatives say the Fritch Fortress boat ramp is closed for maintenance and repairs.

'We needed to close the boat ramp so that we could make some necessary repairs," said Jimmy Muncy, chief of maintenance for the National Park Service at Lake Meredith. "We want to ensure that everyone who uses the ramp can do so in a safe manner."

Rozanne Pfeffer with the National Park Service said that with the Fritch Fortress ramp closed, the only available boat ramp is the Marina boat ramp at Sanford-Yake.

"Boaters need to be aware that they will have to back farther out into the water in order to launch their boats," Pfeffer said.

With only one ramp open, Pferrer said that boaters should be prepared for congestion and longer wait times for launching and loading their boats.

Muncy said that 46 feet is the minimum water level needed for boaters to be able to launch at Fritch Fortress. The current lake level is 45.34 feet.

"Once the repairs are made," he said, "the ramp may remain closed temporarily until the lake returns to a 46-foot level.'

A newsreel featured Perot as president of his class at the U.S. Naval Academy, shaking hands with President Dwight Eisenhower.

A video clip of actor Dana Carvey, who has done impersonations of Perot, included the comedian praising the Texan as "an American original."

### Man who posed as Texas student faces 6 felonies

ODESSA, Texas (AP) -A 22-year-old man accused of posing as a high school basketball star in West Texas has been indicted on six felony charges, including sexual assault and tampering with government records.

Ector County District Attorney Bobby Bland said Tuesday the indictment also alleges Guerdwich Montimer, who used the name Jerry Joseph, committed identity theft. Bland declined to discuss details of the identity theft count or comment on the case.

Montimer, who was indicted Monday, played basketball last year at Odessa Permian High School, whose football team and backers inspired the book "Friday Night Lights."

Montimer led Panthers to the first round of the playoffs last season and was named the District 2-5A Newcomer of the Year. That honor was stripped in recent weeks, and the Panthers forfeited their 16 wins.

Mickey Gaines, speakfor Montimer's court-appointed attorney, declined to comment.

Bland said the two counts of sexual assault pertain to alleged attacks

girl on one day in August. Jabari A. Caldwell, who enrolled Montimer at a junior high school two years ago using a fake birth certificate from Haiti and claimed to be Montimer's half brother, faces four felonies.

Montimer and Caldwell each face three counts of tampering with government records and one count of fraudulent use of identifying information. If convicted on the tampering charge, each man faces up to 20 years in prison.

## Mexico anger high in wake of teen's shooting at border

JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) - Mexicans are seething over the second death of a countryman at the hands of U.S. Border Patrol agents in two weeks, an incident near downtown El Paso that is threatening to escalate tensions over migrant issues.

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U.S. authorities said Tuesday a Border Patrol agent was defending himself and colleagues when he fatally shot the 15-yearold as officers came under a barrage of big stones while trying to detain illegal immigrants on the U.S. side of the Rio Grande.

About 30 relatives and friends gathered late Tuesday to mourn Sergio Adrian Hernandez Huereka, whose shooting Monday evening came along the border with Texas. He died on the Mexican side of the river.

"Damn them! Damn them!" sobbed Rosario Hernandez, sister of the dead teenager, at a wake in the family's two-room adobe house on the outskirts of Ciudad Juarez.

Preliminary reports on the incident indicated that U.S. officers on bicycle patrol "were assaulted with rocks by an unknown number of people," Border Patrol Special Operations Supervisor Ramiro Cordero said Tuesday.

"During the assault at least one agent discharged his firearm," he said. "The agent is currently on administrative leave. A thorough, multi-agency investigation is currently ongoing.'

The shooting happened beneath a railroad bridge linking the two nations, and late Tuesday night a banner appeared on the bridge that said in English: "U.S. Border Patrol we worry about the violence in Mex and murders and now you. Viva Mexico!"

Less than two weeks ago,

Hernandez, 32, died after a Customs and Border Protection officer shocked him with a stun gun at the San Ysidro border crossing that separates San Diego and Tijuana, Mexico. The San Diego medical examiner's office ruled that death a homicide.

Mexican President Felipe Calderon said Tuesday that his government "will use all resources available to protect the rights of Mexican migrants.'

The government "reiterates its rejection to the disproportionate use of force on the part on U.S. authorities on the border with Mexico," the president added in a statement.

On an unpaved street, gathered around Hernandez's gray metal casket, the teen's family called for justice.

"There is a God, so why would I want vengeance if no one will return him to me. They killed my little boy and the only thing I ask is for the law" to be applied, said the boy's father, Jesus Hernandez.

His mother was less hopeful. "May God forgive them because I know nothing will happen" to them, Maria Guadalupe Huereka

Above the casket was a photo of the youth wearing his soccer uniform and his junior high school grade cards, which showed A's

His mother said he was a good student who never got in trouble. He was the youngest of five children, played on two soccer teams and had just finished junior high school, she said.

The case took a testy turn when U.S. and Mexican officials traded suggestions of misconduct in the inci-

spent .40-caliber shell casing was found near the body - raising the question of whether the fatal shot was fired inside Mexico, although he did not explicitly make that allegation. That would violate the rules for Border Patrol agents, who are supposed to stay

A U.S. official, meanwhile, said video shows the Border Patrol agent did not

enter Mexico. The official, who agreed

to discuss the matter only if not quoted by name, said the video also shows what seem to be four Mexican law enforcement officers driving to the edge of the dry but muddy bed of the Rio Grande, walking across to the U.S. side, picking up an undetermined object and returning to Mexico near the area where the boy's body was. Like their U.S. counterparts, Mexican law officers are not authorized to cross the border without

permission. According to the FBI, Border Patrol agents were responding to a group of suspected illegal immigrants being smuggled into the U.S. near the Paso Del Norte bridge, across from Ciudad Juarez around 6:30 p.m. Monday.

One suspected illegal immigrant was detained on the levee on the U.S. side, the FBI said in a statement. Another Border Patrol agent arrived on the concrete bank where the now-dry, 33-foot (10-meter) wide Rio Grande is, and detained a second person. Other suspects ran back into Mexico and began throwing rocks, the FBI said.

At least one rock came from behind the agent, who was kneeling beside a suspected illegal immigrant whom he had prone on the ground, FBI spokeswoman Andrea Simmons said.

The agent told the rock throwers to stop and back off, but they continued. The

agent fired his weapon several times, hitting one who later died, said the FBI, which is leading the investigation because it involved an assault on a federal officer. The agent was not injured, Simmons said.

Chihuahua state officials released a statement demanding a full investigation into the death.

The boy was shot once near the eye, Sandoval said. Authorities were still investigating the bullet's trajectory, he said.

Sandoval said he couldn't comment on the video reported by the U.S. official because he didn't know anything about it. "I am unaware about those hypotheses," he said.

Sandoval said Mexican investigators were questioning three teenagers who were with the victim at the time of the shooting.

The boy's sister, Rosario, told Associated Press Television News that her brother was playing with several friends and did not plan to cross the border.


"They say that they started firing from over there and suddenly hit him in the head," she said.

The boy's mother said he had gone to eat with his brother, who handles luggage at a border customs office. While there, he met up with a group of friends and they decided to hang out by the river, she said.

"That was his mistake, to have gone to the river, she said in an interview with Mexico's Milenio TV "That's why they killed him."

Mexico's Foreign Relations Department said its records indicate the number of Mexicans killed or wounded by U.S. immigration authorities rose from five in 2008 to 12 in 2009 to 17 so far this year, which is not half over.

T.J. Bonner, president of the union representing Border Patrol agents, said rock throwing aimed at Border Patrol agents is common and capable of causing serious injury.



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
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

## Medical device makers: Health care law excise tax will cost jobs

BOSTON (AP) - Medical there is going to be an able to do business. device manufacturers are bristling over a key provision in the nation's new health care law which they say forces them to shoulder an unfair cost of expanded insurance coverage.

A 2.3 percent excise tax on companies that supply medical devices like heart defibrillators and surgical tools to hospitals, health centers and ambulance services will cost medical device manufacturers an estimated \$20 billion in new taxes over the next decade. And they say that will force them to lay off workers and curb the research and development

of new medical tools. "Many small to midsize medical device companies will owe more to the federal government in taxes than they make in profits," said Mark Leahy of the Medical Device Manufacturers Association. "We're talking about a 2.3 percent tax on total sales irrespective of whether a company is making a profit."

It could have been worse: the initial proposed tax was

\$40 billion. Brett Loper, a senior vice president for Advamed, the world's largest medical device trade group, said the organization was looking for ways to bring the levy down even more before it takes effect. He also dismissed arguments that the higher tax would be offset by increased demand as tens of millions of more Americans are insured as a result of the health care overhaul "It's hard to argue that enormous swell of those products," he said. "Is there going to be a huge new demand for those products?

"The medical device people were at the table. They agreed to this. They helped to write it and we need to just move forward," he said.

He pointed out the tax doesn't apply to eyeglasses, contact lenses, hearing aids, or other retail medical devices purchased by the public. Republican Sen. Scott

Brown, who won a special Senate election in part by vowing to block the national health care bill, made the medical device tax one of his first issues after taking office. Brown condemned the tax, calling it threat to a local industry.

"For a lot of them, that's their profit that's going to be eaten up by this tax," Brown said, faulting President Barack Obama for failing to acknowledge problems in the health care bill. "The problems are the medical device companies are going to be whacked."

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., agreed to slash the tax from \$40 billion to \$20 billion in part to win backing for the health care bill from Democratic

Sen. Evan Bayh of Indiana, a state with a significant

medical device industry. California has the highest number of medical device workers with more than 72,400 followed by Massachusetts with nearly 22,000, Florida with nearly 20,000 and Minnesota with more than 18,000, according to industry estimates. Other states with significant medical device hubs include: New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Texas and Ohio.

Richard Packer, CEO of Chelmsford, Mass.-based Zoll Medical Corp., which employs 650 workers in Massachusetts, said the tax will put his company, which produces defibrillators, "at a break-even position" and dismissed the idea that companies should be grateful the tax wasn't higher. "When the negotiations

started it was going to be \$40 billion and our industry negotiated it down to \$20 billion," he said. "We would be losing money instead of just breaking even, that's not my definition of a fair negotiation."

## Panel could expand Texas public defenders office

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) ΓÇö Steven Phillips was too poor to pay for his own lawyer during his sexual assault trial and had to rely on court-appointed attorneys, whom he says failed to press police harder for information about another

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Phillips spent 25 years in prison before being exonerated by DNA evidence in 2008. That experience is why Phillips, 52, supports a statewide public defender's office for capital murder cases in Texas.

"We need people who know just what is needed," Phillips said. "Way to go. That is a good idea."

Members of the Task Force for Indigent Defense will vote Wednesday in Austin on whether to approve a \$27.7 million grant that would expand statewide a pilot program that's been operating in

West Texas for 2— years.

If approved, 240 of the state's 254 counties would not be liable for the cost to defend those facing lethal injection. Only counties with populations under 300,000 are eligible to participate.

Together, the 70 counties of the 85 now participating in the West Texas pilot program saved \$637,000 in the first two years, officials

"It's been a tremendous savings for counties that have had cases," said Jack Stoffregen, the chief public defender for the West Texas program, which has offices in Midland, Amarillo and Lubbock. "I think it's been a great success."

statewide system would have 88 staffers in 10 offices, including the three now operating. It would be centrally managed from Lubbock.

Judge Sharon Keller, presiding judge of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and chairwoman of the Task Force on Indigent Defense, said she was impressed with what the West Texas office has

"I appreciate the willingness to try to make this work statewide," she said.

Texas, the nation's most active death penalty state, often has been criticized for not providing adequate defense for those facing

lethal injection, including an instance in the 1980s when an attorney fell asleep during crucial stages of testimony.

On Tuesday, Texas is scheduled to execute its 460th inmate since it resumed carrying out capital punishment in 1982, six years after the U.S. Supreme Court allowed it.

If the grant is approved, counties over six years will take over funding using a cost-sharing approach.

Under the proposal, state funding to the office would gradually decrease over six years, and counties' contributions would increase commensurately. Each county would contribute using a formula based on population and a 10-year average of capital cases.

Once counties fully fund the office, the cost per county will range from \$1,000 to \$350,000. Conservation estimates place the cost of trying one death penalty case at \$250,000.

He pleaded not guilty, but if he's convicted, Jeffs faces up to life in prison.



The completed project is estimated to cost \$915,000. Reeve said all construction costs will be covered by money that's already been collected and is in the bank.



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

## Former Pampa wrestler Burns seeks higher goals

Burns finished his freshman season with a 4-5 record and recorded one pin. He said his first season was tough but is glad he is wrestling.

"I took a lot of beatings," Burns said. "Every match I'm going against the top

ranked wrestlers in the to come up. So I dropped state. I'm not that excited about my record but I'm just glad to be wrestling again.'

Burns said he ended up at Great Falls because of his former Pampa teammate Richard Leal.

"I was working full time in Amarillo and went back to Pampa," Burns said.
"Richard Leal was there and told me that I should come up to Great Falls. I talked with Coach (Caleb) Schaeffer and he told me everything and came up.' Leal and Burns are cur-

rently teammates at Great Falls University. Burns said it's nice to have someone he knows up there.

"We've wrestled together since we were in club wrestling when we were eight," Burns said. "We grew up across the street from each other."

Caleb Schaeffer is the head coach of the Great Falls wrestling team and Burns said he enjoys playing for him.

"He (Schaeffer) really knows what he is doing, Burns said. "He's really big on grades. He tells us you're here to go to school and wrestling is a privilege. He's a national champion so I'm excited to have him as a coach."

Burns said next year he wants to place at nationals. "Ideally I want to be a

national champion," Burns said. "I'm hoping I can be an all-american which means placing in the top eight at nationals."

Burns said he has been wrestling nearly his whole life and his dad got him interested.

"Any sport my dad played it," Burns said. "My dad and cousins would wrestle around the house all the time. The only difference to wrestling in high school is getting some headgear and representing a school."

At Pampa High School, Burns had a career record of 96-13. Burns won a tournament in Vernon three years

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


