With almost 30 separate categories, there will be plenty of winners in Saturday's car show.

Judging for the car show will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday with winners announced at 3 p.m.



Rick Perry endorsed by former rival

DALLAS (AP) — U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison is publicly patching things up with her former rival, calling Gov. Rick Perry the "personification of Texas" and urging voters to re-elect him for another four years.

The two duked it out in a bruising GOP primary that ended with a resounding Perry victory in March. At the state party convention in Dallas Friday, Hutchison used a bit of humor in an endorsement of her former foe.

"I had hoped that you would be introducing me," she told Perry at a Republican women's event. "But I can count." She also said she had hoped to be governor "in the worst way" but instead wound up waging the "worst"

Perry accepted the embrace and thanked Hutchison for "fighting the good fight" in Washington.

Texan pleads guilty to plotting murder

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)- A West Texas jail inmate has pleaded guilty to federal charges in the alleged murder-for-hire attempt against a Texas judge.

According to a statement from the U.S. Attorney's office in Dallas, 49-year-old Jeffrey Dwayne Harrison pleaded guilty in Lubbock to two counts of using interstate commerce in the commission of murder-for-hire. Each count carries maximum penalties of 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. No sentencing date has been

Prosecutors say Harrison was in the Brown County Jail in Brownwood, Texas, on drug charges when an informant referred him to an undercover federal agent posing as a contract killer. Prosecutors say Harrison now admits to arranging the slaying of state District Judge Stephen Ellis of Brownwood.

Ellis was not injured.



Texas gas prices slide for 7th week

IRVING, Texas (AP)- Retail gasoline prices fell again across Texas for a seventh consecutive week.

The weekly AAA Texas survey released Thursday shows regular unleaded gasoline is selling for an average of \$2.59 per gallon across Texas, 3 cents less than last week. Nationally, the average price is \$2.71 per gallon, a penny less than last week.

The cheapest gasoline in Texas is, again, found in the Fort Worth-Arlington area where regular is averaging \$2.53 per gallon, 3 cents less than last week. The most expensive gasoline is in Corpus Christi, where the average price remained unchanged at \$2.68 per gallon

A Mohave County judge granted a prosecutor's motion Wednesday to dismiss the four charges of being an accomplice to sexual conduct with a minor. The charges stemmed from two arranged marriages between the then-teenage girls and their older male relatives.

The women's attorney, Roger Hoole, says they agreed with the dismissal so that Jeffs could be brought to trial in Texas on more serious charges.

He says the women expressed appreciation to the Mohave County attorney and a county investigator for their work on alleged sex crimes arising from underage spiritual mar-

Texas prison employees set for random drug tests

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AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - For the first time in the Texas prison system, most of its 41,000 corrections employees will be subject to random drug tests - including guards and

Bryan Collier, deputy director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, says the policy will be unveiled next week. It's designed to bolster security and curb contraband for the massive prison system.

Collier also says the policy is designed to raise staffing

The Austin American-Statesman reports the correctional employees union, representing about 6,000 workers, resists the testing and suggests it could cost hundreds of thousands of dollars. Prison officials say the costs are still being cal-

Comptroller Susan Combs today announced that the state collected \$1.78 billion in sales tax revenue in May, a 0.1 percent increase compared to May 2009.

"Total sales tax collections have met or exceeded year ago levels for a second month in a row, following 14 months of decline. This may indicate that a bottom has been reached," Combs said. "May sales tax collections from retail trade, oil and gas, and restaurant activity outpaced those of May 2009. Remittances from other sectors, however, such as construction and manufacturing, fell below last year. While overall economic conditions and sales tax revenues appear to be stabilizing, there remains a risk of further deterioration, before a sustained recovery is underway."

On Friday, Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$437.3 million in June local sales tax allocations, down 0.9 percent compared to last

Combs will deliver June sales tax allocations of cities, down 1.5 percent compared to June 2009. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are down 4 percent compared to the same time period last year. Texas counties will receive sales tax payments of \$26.7 million, up l percent compared to last June. So far this year, sales tax allocations to counties are down 7.9 percent compared to 2009.

In addition, \$18.6 million goes out to 169 special purpose taxing districts around the state, up 8.7 percent compared to last June. Ten local transit systems will receive \$99.2 million in sales tax allocations, down 1.2 percent compared to a year ago.

June's sales tax allocations represent sales that occurred in April.

Today is Friday, June 11, the 162nd day of 2010. There are 203 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On June 11, 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence calling for freedom from Britain.

On this date:

In 1509, England's King Henry VIII married his first wife, Catherine of Aragon.

In 1770, Captain James Cook, commander of the British ship Endeavour, discovered the Great Barrier Reef off Australia by running onto it. In 1910, voters in Oklahoma chose Oklahoma City

to be the state's capital over Guthrie (which had been the territorial capital) and Shawnee. French ocean explorer and environmentalist Jacques-Yves Cousteau was born in Saint-Andre-de-Cubzac, France.

In 1919, Sir Barton won the Belmont Stakes, becoming horse racing's first Triple Crown winner. In 1947, the government announced the end of household and institutional sugar rationing, to take effect the next day.

In 1959, the Saunders-Roe Nautical 1, the first operational hovercraft, was publicly demonstrated off the southern coast of England.

In 1963, a Buddhist monk (Thich Quang Duc) set himself afire on a Saigon street to protest the government of South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh

In 1970, the United States presence in Libya came to an end as the last detachment left Wheelus Air Base. (The anniversary of this event is celebrated as a holiday in Libya.)

In 1977, Seattle Slew won the Belmont Stakes, capturing the Triple Crown.

In 1985, Karen Ann Quinlan, the comatose patient whose case prompted a historic right-to-die court decision, died in Morris Plains, N.J., at age 31.

Ten years ago: A day after the death of Syrian President Hafez Assad, his son, Bashar, was unanimously nominated by Syria's ruling Baath Party to succeed his father. An unruly group of men doused women with water and groped them in New York's Central Park; some of the assaults were captured on home video. Gustavo Kuerten of Brazil won his second French Open title, beating Magnus Norman 6-2, 6-3, 2-6, 7-6 (6).

Five years ago: The first tropical storm of the 2005 season, Arlene, sloshed ashore in the Florida Panhandle. The world's richest countries agreed in London to write off more than \$40 billion of debt owed by the poorest nations. French journalist Florence Aubenas and her Iraqi assistant were freed after more than five months as hostages in Iraq. Afleet Alex won the Belmont Stakes by seven

One year ago: With swine flu reported in more nations, the World Health Organization declared the first global flu pandemic in 41 years. Think you can do without oil?

WASHINGTON (AP) -So the Gulf oil spill has you ready to quit petroleum cold turkey? Louisiana's brown pelicans have more of a chance of avoiding Big Oil than you do.

Merely parking the car and riding a bike won't cut it. Your sneakers and bike have petroleum products in them. Sure, you can shut off the AC, but the electric fans you switch to have plastic from oil and gas in them. And the insulation to keep your home cool, also started as oil and gas. Without all that, you will sweat and it'll be all too noticeable because deodorant comes from oil and gas too.

You can't even escape petroleum products with a nice cool fast-food milkshake - which probably has a petrochemical-based thickener.

Oil is everywhere. It permeates our daily lives in ways we never think about. It's in carpeting, furniture, computers and clothing. It's in the most personal of products like toothpaste, shaving cream, lipstick and vitamin capsules. Petrochemicals are the glue of our modern lives and even in glue, too.

And because of all that, petrochemicals are in our blood.

When the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention tested humans for environmental chemicals and metals, it recorded 212 different compounds. More than 180 of them are products that started as natural gas or oil.

"It's the material basis of our society essentially," said Michael Wilson, a research scientist at the University of California Berkeley. "This is the Petrochemical Age."

Louisiana State University environmental sciences professor Ed Overton, who works with the government on oil spill chemistry, said: "There's nothing that we do on a daily basis that isn't touched by petrochemicals."

When in the movie "The Graduate" young Benjamin is given advice about the future, it comes in one word: plastics. About 93 percent of American plastics start with natural gas or oil.

"Just about anything that's not iron or steel or metal of some sort has some petrochemical component. And that's just because of what we've been able to do with

it," said West Virginia University chemistry professor Dady Dadyburjor.

Nothing shows how pervasive and malleable petrochemicals are better than shampoo, said Kevin Swift, director of economics and statistics for the American Chemistry Council, the chemical industry's trade association. The bottle is plastic. The cap is plastic. The seal and the label, too. The ink comes from petrochemicals and even the glue that holds the label to the bottle comes from oil or gas.

"The shampoo - it's all derived from petrochemicals," Swift said. "A bottle of shampoo is about 100 percent chemistry."

Often, some natural fragrance is thrown in.

What makes oil and natural gas the seed stock for most of our everyday materials is the element that is the essence of life: carbon.

The carbon atom acts as the spine with other atoms attaching to it in different combinations and positions. Each variation acts in new ways, Dadyburjor

John Warner, a for-Polaroid scientist and University of Massachusetts chemistry professor, called petroleum "fundamentally a boring material" until other atoms are added and "you unleash a textbook of modern chemistry."

"Take a very complicated elegant beautiful molecule, bury it in the ground 100 million years, remove all the functionality and make hydrocarbons," said Warner, one of the founders of the green chemistry movement that attempts to be more ecologically sustainable. "Then take all the toxic nasty reagents and put back all the functional groups and end up with very complicated molecules."

The age of petrochemicals started and took root shortly after World War II, spurred by a government looking for replacements for rubber.

"Unfortunately there's a very dark side," said Carnegie Mellon chemistry professor Terry Collins. He said the underlying premise of the petrochemical industry is that "those little molecules will be good little molecules and do what they're designed for and not interact with life. What we're finding is that premise is wrong, profoundly wrong. What we're discovering is that there's a whole world of low-dose (health) effects."

Many of these chemicals are disrupting the human hormone system, Collins said.

These are substances that don't appear in nature and "they accumulate in the human body, they persist in the environment," Berkeley's Wilson said. The problem is science isn't quite sure how bad or how safe they are, he said. But plastics also do good

things for the environment, the chemistry council says. Because plastics are lighter than metals, they helped create cars that save fuel. A 2005 European study shows that conversion to plastic materials in Europe saved 26 percent in fuel.

"Compared to the alternatives, it reduces greenhouse gases (which cause global warming) and saves energy; that is rather ironic," Swift said.

Still, chemists who want

more sustainable materials are working on alternatives. Another founder of green chemistry, Paul Anastas, an assistant administrator for the Environmental Protection Agency, said: "We can make those things in other ways."

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LSU's Overton is old enough to remember the days before petrochemicals. There were no plastic milk and soda containers. They were glass. Desks were heavy wood. There were no computers, cell phones and not much air conditioning.

"It's a much more comfortable life now, much more convenient," Overton

Swift said trying to live without petrochemicals now doesn't make sense, but he added: "it would make a good reality TV



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

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UT and A&M administrators discuss programs' futures

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — With the future of the Big 12 seemingly up for grabs, the presidents and athletic directors of Texas and Texas A&M met Thursday to discuss the future of their athletic programs after Colorado accepted an invitation to join the Pac-10 and with Nebraska weighing a move to the Big Ten.

A person briefed about the discussions said the situation was "still fluid" and the Texas schools could stay in the Big 12. The person, who spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitive nature of the situation, said everyone was waiting for Nebraska's expected announcement

If Nebraska also leaves the Big 12, other schools could follow. The Pac-10 is reportedly interested in inviting Texas, Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Texas Tech to form a 16-team league, while the Aggies could also head to the Southeastern Conference.

Among topics discussed was how the Big 12 could operate with fewer teams, the person said, and the consequences such as possible litigation should there be a mass exodus that could leave some teams behind.

Texas president William Powers Jr., athletic director DeLoss Dodds and women's athletic director Chris Plonsky met with Texas A&M president Bowen Loftin, athletics director Bill Byrne and other university system officials at an undisclosed location. Baylor was also represented in those discussions, but Texas Tech officials said they were not there.

U.S. Rep. Chet Edwards, a Democrat from Waco, the site of Baylor, urged Texas lawmakers to immediately hold public hearings on any potential move by

"These decisions are too important to

be decided solely by a small handful of people behind closed doors without public input," Edwards said. Dodds has said he wants to keep the Big 12 together, and Texas A&M spokesman Jason Cook said the talks Thursday

Colorado's decision to leave. "There are several different scenarios that could play out here," Scott said, adding there have been "no assurances" made to other schools and "no invitations have been issued." Scott even said the Pac-10 could add Colorado and no one else.

Baylor and Texas Tech officials have said that even if the Big 12 breaks apart, they want to remain with Texas and Texas A&M as members of the same conference. Baylor, the only private school in the Big 12, could get left behind.

"Baylor is working feverishly to keep the Big 12 together," athletic director Ian McCaw said Thursday. "It is of special importance to keep the four Big 12 schools from Texas together."

Though there is expected to be political pressure to do so, the office of Texas Gov. Rick Perry denied reports that he asked officials from the four schools to meet with him Thursday to discuss their futures. Perry is running for re-election and was scheduled to attend the state Republican convention in Dallas beginning Thursday night.

Perry spokeswoman Lucy Nashed said Perry did not have meetings with the schools.

"The governor is not involved right now, and he's not going to be involved," Nashed said.

Texas Tech athletic director Gerald Myers said Thursday he had not heard from the Pac-10.

Myers said. Former Texas A&M football coach R.C.

"I haven't talked to the commissioner

out there. We haven't done anything,"

Slocum, who now works as a special adviser to Loftin, said football programs are carrying an increased financial burden to support other sports, so they're drawn to potentially massive TV contracts for more revenue.

The "Pain on the Plains" will include a Sprint Triathlon, Kids-Tri and a 5K Run. The 5K Run has been added for those who want to compete in the running


The Sprint Triathlon will include a 450 meter swim (no walking), a 12.4 mile bike ride and a 5K run.

At some point, Guy said the library would like to host a class on the subject of online library services to patrons with offsite Internet access. Such a class would focus on the following services: Searching the card catalog; placing requests on inhouse library items; renewing items; downloading audio books; and logging onto and utilizing HLC and TexShare databases - all from off-site locations.

However, scheduling a class of this nature, Guy said, would depend on the amount of public interest.

EPA goes to industry to fix faulty Texas permits

HOUSTON

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency offered on Thursday to work directly with Texas' petrochemical industry in an effort to fix permits it says have long violated the Clean Air Act.

The EPA's offer is the latest in a drawn-out, public and politicized battle between the federal agency and Texas. The dispute evolved last month from a debate over pollution permitting into a pitched battle over states' rights, reaching the tipping point when the EPA threatened to remove Texas' permitting authority - a role traditionally filled

The EPA made public on Thursday a proposed voluntary program that would allow the nation's largest refineries to hire independent auditors to correct the problem permits while guaranteeing them legal forgiveness should violations be found. The auditors would determine what the required emission limits should be in each unit of a facility. After the EPA approved the findings, Texas would be asked to include the limits in air and operating permits. A 10-day public comment period on the program began Thursday.

While the program aims to correct a complicated problem by allowing industry to work directly with the EPA, the program gives Texas a rubber stamp status, with the state simply approving requirements after they receive a federal

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality indicated it was not satisfied with the proposal

"While we support innovative approaches, we do have concerns with the efficiency of the audit concept and how it would overlap the state's permitting processes," the state agency said in a statement, but declined to comment fur-

Al Armendariz, the EPA's regional director, said the EPA discussed the program with state officials before going public. He said the concept was also intensively discussed with some of the country's largest petrochemical companies, who "don't like the uncertainty" of operating with permits the EPA believes violate federal law.

"We are going to work with industry to identify what the legally appropriate requirements should be and should have been all along," Armendariz said.

The EPA, he added, would welcome Texas' input in the program, including in reviewing the audits.

The crux of the debate is over Texas' so-called flexible permits, which set a general limit on how much pollutant an entire facility can release. The federal Clean Air Act requires state-issued permits to set limits on each of the dozens of individual production units inside a plant. The EPA says Texas' system masks pollution and makes it impossible to regulate emissions and protect public health.

In meetings and telephone calls held in the last two weeks, it appeared Texas was finally moving to bring its program in line with federal regulation, Armendariz

Still, the EPA will likely officially disapprove the state's flexible permit program at the end of this month, and could still strip its permitting authority completely if it fails to comply with the Clean Air

"To date, I still have not seen a single permit which addresses the major grounds for our objections," Armendariz said. "The final proof that the state of Texas is serious is when the state issues permits that are consisted with the Clean Air Act and they haven't done
