Coach who led Pampa to 1996 state title retires

Former Harvester Boys Basketball Coach Robert Hale was fond of telling his players, "It's a good life if you don't just weaken." He recently decided to retire from coaching and teaching after a long and successful career. Hale coached for 42 years and was a head coach for 36 years, winning 753 games. His head coaching career started at Dalhart (1975-76) and continued at Lewisville (1976-1979), Burleson (1979-1982) and Everman (1982-1986), where he began to shine. "We went 91-31," Hale recalled. "We made a regional appearance in four seasons."

Then Hale came to Pampa in the summer of 1986 to coach the Harvesters for 13 seasons and finish with a 295-120 record. The period in Pampa, he said, was a "great time" for his family. "We had lots of good players

and coaches," Hale said. "There was a lot of support from that town and faculty and administration. It was very neat."

The best run the Harvesters had under Hale came between 1989 and 1996. Pampa won eight district titles in a row, won their regional seven years in a row, played in the regional final four times (winning three) and won the state championship in 1996.

"Winning the state championship in Texas is unbelievable with all the teams you face," Hale said. "We made it to the 'Sweet 16' seven years and the 'Final Four' three years and we won the state title. It was a great time the whole time we were there."

And, of course, winning a state championship (1996) is always a crowning achievement.

"You get to be in an elite group," Hale said. "Anytime you get to do something like that you have to credit the players. Not just the

players on that team but the past ones who helped to make the program where it is."

While at Pampa, Hale earned numerous honors. In 1992, he coached in the Texas High School Coaches Association (THSCA) all-star game.

In 1993 Hale coached in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC) all-star game. Hale won the TABC coach of the year and the Texas Sportswriter coach of the year in 1996.

In 1997, Hale was named Texas Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame coach of the year.

Throughout his time in Pampa, Hale won numerous district coach of the year honors. Hale said it was amazing how the program grew since he first arrived in Pampa.

"My first year we won nine games," Hale said. "To watch this program grow into what it was in those years (1989-1996) was a great blessing. Being around all

those young people who put their heart into what they were doing is amazing."

Current Pampa boys basketball coach Dustin Miller played for Hale from 1986-1989 and said his former coach was concerned with the little things and learned the most about the game from him.

"He would be concerned with how we laced our shoes to how our hair was combed," Miller said. "I learned more about the fundamentals of basketball from Coach Hale than anyone in my life. If you didn't play with fundamentals you couldn't play for him."

Warren Hassee, who was a sports broadcaster during Pampa's basketball championships in the late 50's said Hale was hardworking.

"He was dedicated and had concern for his kids getting scholarships," Hassee said. "He was a great basketball coach and won us

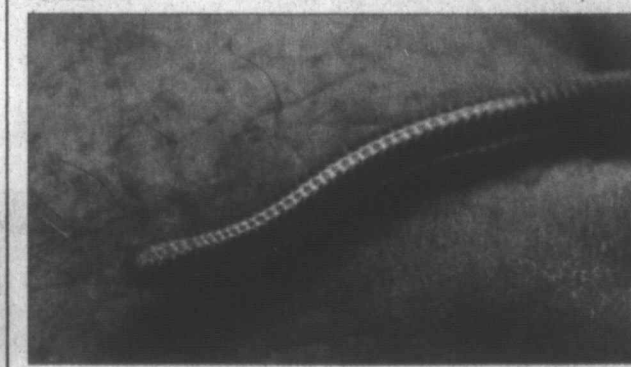
Blind snake found in child's sand box



New Mexico Blind Snake

When he first saw the blind snake, Pampa Animal Control Supervisor Monty Montgomery thought he'd found something unique, but a panhandle herpetologist soon burst Montgomery's balloon.

Mike Boley with the Amarillo zoo explained that the small blind snakes, officially known as Leptotyphlops Dulcis Dissectus, or New Mexico Blind Snakes, are common throughout the panhandle and West Texas.



The reason they appear rare is that they live underground, eating insect larvae and termites, Boley said. They normally don't come out where people can see them.

After doing some more research on the small, thin snake, Montgomery said the New Mexico blind snake, like its cousin the Trans-Pecos blind snake, burrows quite deeply, sometimes several feet below the surface of the ground.

It can be found in sandy terrain, and that makes sense, Montgomery said, considering where it was found.

As the snake made its way like a silver wire over Montgomery's fingers at the city's animal shelter, Montgomery said this one was in a child's sand box in Pampa.

The small snake is not poisonous.

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

Patricia Muniz asked members to volunteer for teams for the Relay for Life Walk June 25-26 at Recreation Park.

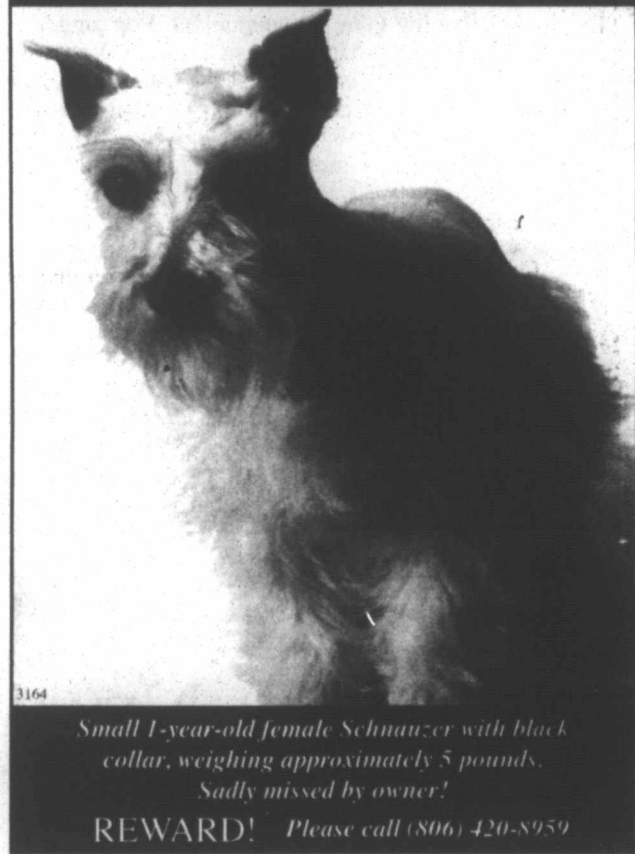

office set in Michigan. Madigan sniffs out several murder cases and what ensues is a cat-and-mouse game with a fictitious killer.

"Suspense seemed to be where the story went once victims began to show up," Conrad explained. "With each new death, I found ways a person could commit a murder without obvious foul play. Once I started, the list seemed endless. Scary endless."

The daughter of Clarence and Faye Swindle, Conrad graduated from Pampa High School in 1981 with honors. She grew up in Pampa, attending Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin elementary schools and later Pampa Junior High and PHS.

"My father operated the airport for most of my earlier school years," Conrad said, "then we lived north on a ranch until I graduated."

In 2005 after her mother died, she returned to the Texas Panhandle, relocating from Oregon. She lived in Pampa a couple of years prior to settling in Amarillo to pursue a bachelor of science in nursing degree from West Texas A&M University in Canyon. She earned her BSN in May.

Conrad served as editor of her PHS newspaper both years as an upper classman.

Conrad described PHS as "large enough to offer opportunities yet still small enough to let students be individuals." As a teenager learning about journalism at PHS, Conrad said she found it difficult to stand back and report traumatic events when her first instinct was to try and help.

Consequently, the author said, she "jumped from journalism to medicine" rather quickly, completing an emergency medical technician course before even graduating from high school.

Conrad described "Blood of Like Souls" as a project 16 years in the making.

Conrad said she even joked with New York Times best-selling author Jodi Thomas, also of Amarillo, "that I've known my main character longer than I've known my own husband!"

After high school, the emergency medical worker cum author entered Odessa College and became a certified paramedic, later working at Northwest Texas Hospital for several years before taking a variety of other jobs in the field of emergency services.

"I worked in the densest urban environments to some very remote settings," Conrad commented. "Living and working in this multitude of locales provided detailed settings for my writing."

According to the writer, she was greatly influenced in her formative years by an assortment of writers and books. Her love of reading is a passion that she has held most of her life.

"I had an adult library card by age 12," she stated. "I remember in third grade the school librarian having to make an exception for me to check out the higher level books. ... I've read some of each genre," she added, "with favorites in each."

Conrad also recognized her father as encouraging her flair for wordsmithing.

"My father urged me as a teenager," she said, "to write when words became shouts, making me find words that had meaning instead of those that just had barbs."

"Someone once said of me that I couldn't sign my name in less than 300 words," Conrad commented. "That's still true. I had to cut 70,000 words from this manuscript. 'Unwriting' is harder than writing."

Of the often difficult task of getting published, Conrad says it "takes a lot of 'the right stuff,'" from finding the "right" agent to hooking up with the "right" editor.

"Getting published, for all new authors," she said, "is difficult. Writing the story is just the first

piece of a puzzle."

Conrad signed with Black Rose Writing out of Castroville.

the state title."

After Pampa, Hale coached at Weatherford High School from 1999-2001 and finished 51-13. His stint in Weatherford was special because Hale got to coach his oldest son, Colby.

"He led the Metroplex in assists and steals in both seasons," Hale said.

Weatherford won district in both seasons under Hale. During Hale's first season they were 4A and in his second season they were 5A.

Jim Vaszauskas, who formerly coached at Brock High School in Weatherford, said one of Hale's drills helped his team make the state tournament.

"I had a really good team at Brock with some good juniors," Vaszauskas said. "We were underachieving some and weren't coming up with loose balls. I heard Hale speak and he introduced me to a drill

called 'pick it up.' The idea of the drill is if you are in a crowd pick the ball up. We (Brock) did that drill every day for two to three minutes. We made it to the state tournament and almost won the whole thing. We lost to Wortham High School and they had Leonard Davis, who is now the starting right guard for the Dallas Cowboys."

Vaszauskas said Hale's teams were very good and kept things simple.

"They (Weatherford) were very good fundamentally and were predictable fundamentally," Vaszauskas said. "They were hard to beat. He (Hale) was a great high school basketball coach."

After coaching at Weatherford, Hale coached at Azle from 2001-2004. The team went 62-35 in those seasons and made it to the regionals in 2004. Hale got to coach his youngest son Clarke, who was first team all-state and

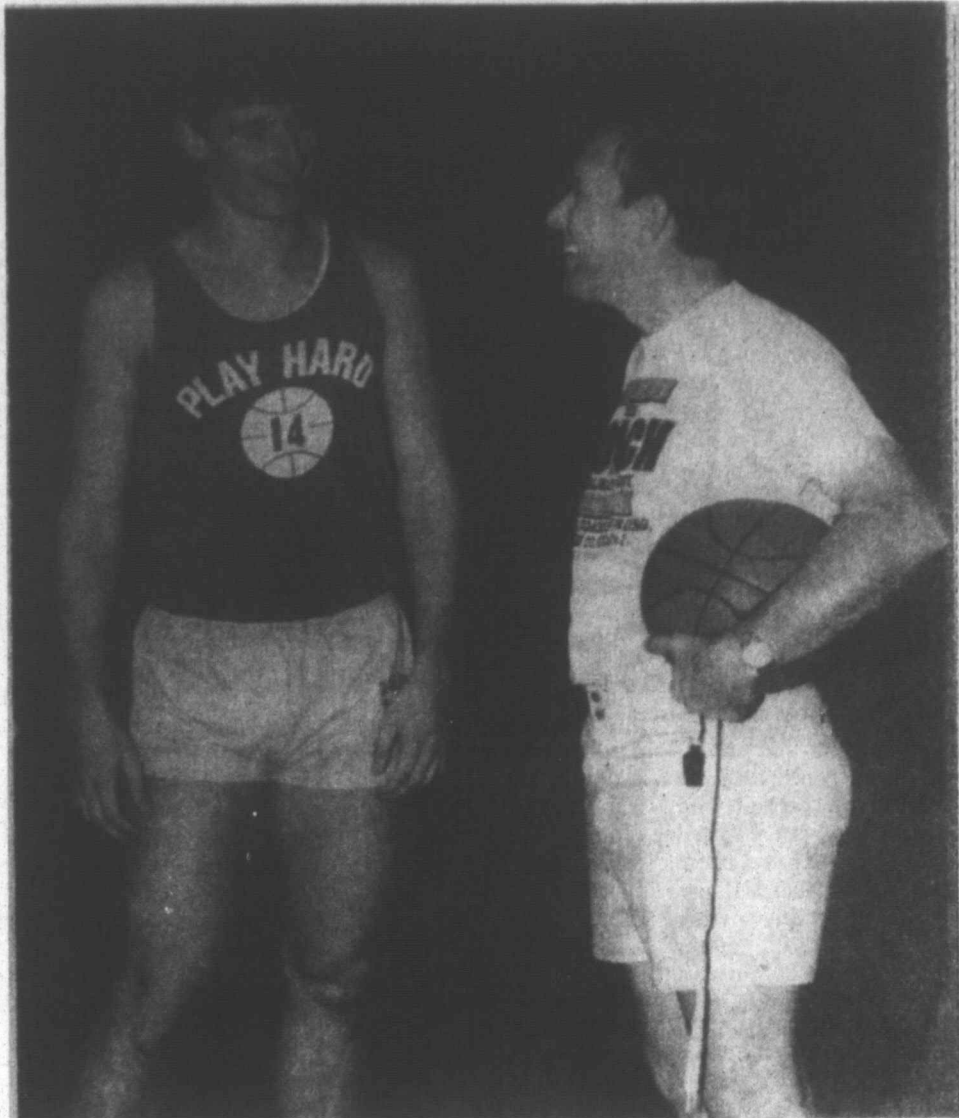
academic all-state.

"For years I got to coach everybody else's kids," Hale said. "Getting to coach my own was a good experience. Both of them were team players and unselfish players. It's not what you expect when your dad is the coach. Hats off to them for that."

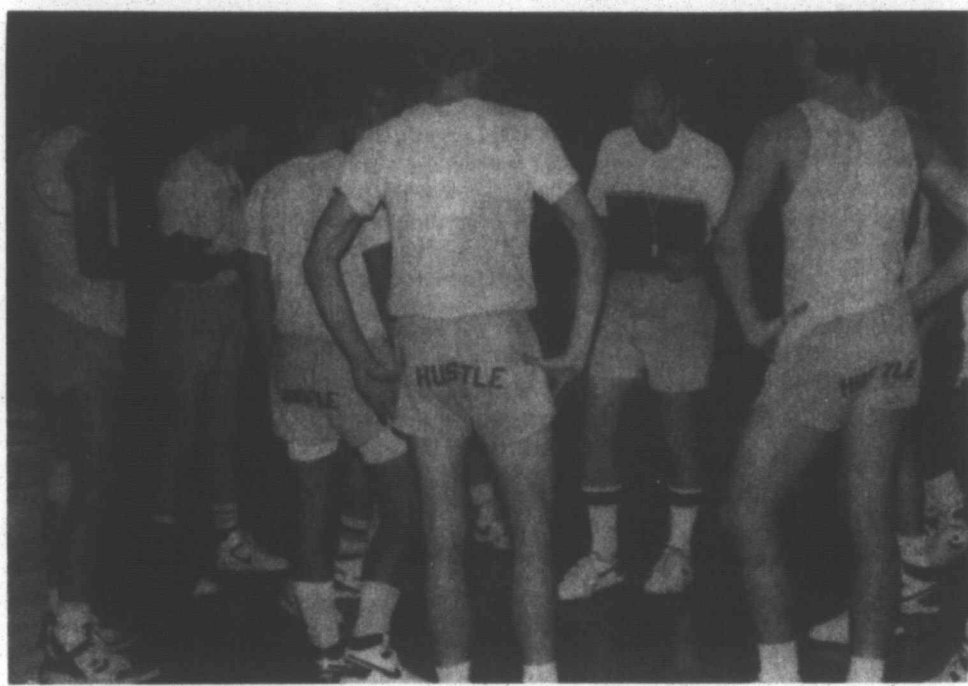
Hale's final career stop was with Crowley, where he coached the last six seasons. Crowley went 148-53 in those seasons, winning three district championships and six tournament championships. Hale said he will miss being around all of the kids the most.

"I'm going to miss going to practice every day and interacting with them and them affecting me," Hale said. "Coaches get a lot back from their kids. Coaching, it's not just the game, it's the life that goes on around the game."

Historians find probable grave of famed Texas Ranger

WACO, Texas (AP) - Famous Texas Ranger James Coryell is a man of mystery. What he looked like, how he died and where he was buried top the list of questions.

Some answers may lie under layers of Falls County soil, not far from the Brazos River and the area he once called home. The Texas Historic Commission is investigating a gravesite that may belong to Coryell, born in Ohio in 1796 or 1803, depending on accounts, and killed in an Indian attack in 1837. Coryell County is named after him.

Most of Coryell's story is a Texas history classic.

It's about a frontiersman, bent on riches and adventure, who made a name for himself protecting settlers and fighting Mexicans and Indians in the land he lived to see declared the state of Texas.

This possible new chapter in the Ranger's story is pure 21st century, complete with computer searches, DNA analysis and even the help of the Smithsonian Institution.

Bringing in the Smithsonian on the investigation underscores how significant this find would be to Texas history, said Jim Bruseth, director of the Texas Historic Commission's Archeology Division.

"We're embarking on a journey," Bruseth said. "We're not sure when we'll get there or what we'll end up with."

The journey began when workers came across large stones while clearing the perimeter of a slave cemetery on private property southwest of Marlin in Falls County.

"They were exactly where you would expect them to be," Bruseth said

about the stones.

He came across a slave's account of James Coryell's grave a few years ago, while researching Bull Hill Cemetery, which is being prepared for the unveiling and dedication of a historical marker July 10.

According to Frank E. Simmons, author of "History of Coryell County," former slave Tom Broadus told of a gravesite near the slave cemetery that he was told belonged to "Mr. Jim Coryell."

After several years, the grave caved in, and some of the slaves fetched rocks from nearby Jones Spring to place on the grave and keep the person's spirit at rest, Simmons wrote.

Bruseth said they dug a trench where the rocks were, to determine if there was a grave shaft. Sure enough, there was - 8 1/2-

by-3 feet and oriented east to west.

Permission to excavate the remains has to come from a Coryell descendant.

Coryell had no children, but Bruseth said he hopes to find a female descendant of Coryell's sisters, someone who may not even know she is a Coryell, so scientists can test the mitochondrial DNA.

"(The DNA is) passed on almost unchanged from generation to generation through the female line," Bruseth said.

He also said if the remains aren't well-preserved, there's a better chance of finding mitochondrial DNA than anything else. Based on Bruseth's experience with remains and the specific soil conditions of the Falls County area, he

said he's expecting the remains to be fairly well-preserved.

The commission is in the process of contracting with someone to take on the search for descendants. Bruseth said he hopes to be able to excavate by January.

"That'll be the clincher that we have, in fact, found the long-lost grave of James Coryell," Bruseth said.

The commission plans to send the remains to Doug Owsley at the Smithsonian Institution for DNA analysis, as well as a skeletal analysis.

Owsley will look for cut marks on the cranium, which could indicate whether the person had been scalped, as Coryell is rumored to have been. The remains also will be examined for any marks suggesting the person was shot with a musket or an arrow. Bruseth said Owsley should also be able to tell what kind of diet the person had.

By most accounts, Coryell was on Texas soil, or land that would shortly become Texas, by 1830. Simmons wrote that Coryell took up with James Bowie, went on expeditions and fell into famous skirmishes with Huaco, Tehuacana and Caddo Indians.

In 1835, he headed to the town of Viesca, later known as Fort Milam, in today's Falls County. This was where he operated with his various Ranger companies and lived with his friend, Andrew Cavitt, and Cavitt's family.

In 1836, Coryell helped cover the retreat of colonists as they fled from the Mexican army in what is known as the "Runaway Scrape."

They returned to central Texas, and by May 1837, Coryell was preparing to go west with his Ranger company and scout for land.

US rig count increases by 21

HOUSTON (AP) — The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. increased by 21 this week to 1,527.

Houston-based Baker Hughes Inc. said Friday that 954 rigs were exploring for natural gas and 561 for oil. Twelve were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago this week, the rig count stood at 876.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, Texas gained 16, Oklahoma gained seven and Wyoming gained one. Alaska and West Virginia each gained two. Louisiana lost four, New Mexico lost three, and California, Colorado and Pennsylvania each lost one. Arkansas and North Dakota were unchanged.

The rig count tally peaked at 4,530 in 1981, during the height of the oil boom. The industry posted a record low of 488 in 1999.

day that May, Coryell and a couple of other Rangers were enjoying the honey from a bee hive about a mile outside the settlement when they were attacked by Indians. His companions got away, but Coryell was wounded and died shortly after. After many years, the location of his gravesite became unknown.

"It's one of those intriguing, historic mysteries," said Byron Johnson, director of Waco's Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum.

You won't find pictures or paintings of Coryell at the museum, and it contains no uniform or standard-issue gun.

"At that time period, Rangers were about the same as Minutemen were in colonial America. They supplied their own clothing, horses," Johnson said.

John Crain, executive director of the Summerlee Foundation, which owns the land where the gravesite is, was at the site when the stones were discovered.

Crain, who also is Texas Historic Commission commissioner, said the finding is a high point for him and a unique opportunity for Summerlee, a nonprofit organization that supports endeavors to protect animals and preserve Texas history.

"It seems like we stumble across a lot of wonderful proposals," Crain said.

But in the case of the Falls County property, the Summerlee Foundation seems to keep stumbling over history itself.

Crain said when the organization purchased the Falls County land, it was as a long-term investment. Finding the slave cemetery, and possibly Coryell's grave, has Summerlee officials rethinking what the land means to them.

"We have no interest in parting with the property at the moment," Crain said.

Man accused of posing as teen pleads not guilty

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — The 22-year-old man accused of posing as a teenager to become a high school basketball star in West Texas pleaded not guilty to the six felony charges filed against him.

A spokesman for Guerdwich Montimer's attorney said Friday that Montimer has waived his arraignment and entered not guilty pleas.

Montimer is accused of two counts of sexual assault, three counts of tampering with government records and identity theft.

Montimer allegedly posed as a teenager using the name "Jerry Joseph" and played basketball last year at Odessa Permian High School - the school whose football team inspired the book "Friday Night Lights."

The alleged fraud unraveled after coaches at an amateur basketball tournament said they recognized Montimer as a 2007 graduate of a Florida high school.

Thank you for letting me get this point across for all insurance agency workers. — TICKED OFF IN TEXAS

DEAR TICKED OFF: You're welcome. The common courtesy you're asking for should not be reserved for employees of insurance companies, but for everyone.

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Black Bears lumbering back into east Texas

CLARKSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Before hunting season began, Don "Dink" Benton set up a motion sensor camera on his east Texas ranch to learn what kind of deer roamed his land along the Oklahoma border. What he saw as he went through the pictures was a shock: a black bear exploring a feeder, then investigating the camera.

"When we got this picture, all of a sudden, it added up," said Benton, who had been wondering how some of the deer feeders on his

3,000-acre ranch had gotten knocked over last summer.

Bears are slowly returning to the woods of east Texas thanks to thriving bear populations in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, wildlife officials say. As a result, sightings in east Texas have been on the rise, up from just five in the 1980s to 54 in the 2000s.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials believe most of the bears that have made their way to Texas are young males. They will roam hundreds of miles to

stake out their own territory away from other males, which can grow to weigh around 350 pounds and stand 6 feet tall. The bears coming into Texas from Oklahoma and Arkansas are the American black bear, while those from Louisiana are the Louisiana black bear.

"Anytime you have bears moving into new country, the first ones to show up are going to be males," said Nathan Garner, the department's wildlife director in east Texas. "It takes longer for the females to show up."

Wildlife officials are hopeful that females, who usually stay closer to their mothers and don't travel as far, will eventually make their way to Texas as well and they'll establish a new breeding population in the state.

"Once they get here in decent numbers, in the next 20 years, we'll have a population eventually. They're expanding," said Christopher Comer, assistant professor of forest wildlife management at Stephen F. Austin State University. The university has joined with the parks and wildlife department to study bears

and their habitat in north-east Texas and is starting a similar project in southeast Texas.

Garner said a combination of unregulated hunting and a loss of habitat caused bears to virtually disappear from Texas by the mid-1940s. The state has two breeding populations in far West Texas, a small population in Guadalupe Mountains National Park, located on the New Mexico border, and a population in Big Bend National Park that was established after bears from Mexico made their way across the border in the 1980s. Some of the Big Bend bears have even ventured into the western edges of Hill Country.

East Texas has the elements for good bear habitat, including food, cover and areas with few humans. There are about 12 million acres of undeveloped private and public land throughout east Texas, ranging from the Red River that marks the state's border with Oklahoma down to the Beaumont area, Garner said.

Many of the bear sightings in east Texas in the past five years have been in Red

River County — with nine sightings last year.

The county is primarily rural and the human population there has been decreasing, going from about 14,300 in 1990 to an estimated 12,800 in 2009. "That may help explain why bears are coming back as well," Garner said.

Bears are primarily vegetarians, feeding on blackberries, grapes, acorns, leaves and other forest goods, and that makes people more comfortable with their return, he said.

Tommy Archer, who has caught pictures of bears on the land in Red River County where he shares a hunting lease, said he isn't afraid of them. "I know what not to do: Don't get between a bear and its food. Don't get between a mother and a cub," he said.

About four years ago, the state parks and wildlife department helped form the East Texas Black Bear Task Force, made up of private and public entities and landowners, to implement a bear conservation plan in east Texas. Goals include research and educating people about bears, which are

protected from hunting by state law.

The task force is also part of the nonprofit Black Bear Conservation Coalition, which promotes restoration of the Louisiana black bear to its historic range in Louisiana and parts of Mississippi, Arkansas and east Texas.

"The bear was really neglected for a lot of years," said Paul Davidson, the coalition's executive director. "What I've seen in 20 years of working on this is bear populations can rebound."

To help the bear population, the coalition encourages landowners to plant trees to create forest corridors where the bears and other wildlife can roam. The cost is shared between the landowner, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Black Bear Conservation Coalition.

Texas wildlife officials are relying on east Texas residents to report any bear sightings in hopes of getting a better picture of the population. Officials say that while people have reported seeing bear cubs, they don't yet have scientific evidence, like a picture of a cub or a cub track, to be certain.

Ricky Maxey, a state wildlife biologist, said there isn't enough data to even make a population estimate.

Gov candidate White: No wrongdoing

HOUSTON (AP) — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Bill White denied Thursday that he has improperly benefited from a profitable investment in an energy company hired to help the Houston area recover from Hurricane Rita five years ago, the same time he was the city's mayor.

White also ripped his Republican opponent, incumbent Gov. Rick Perry, for exploiting what he called a false story. Perry has accused White of "profiteering" from the hurricane, and White said voters should "expect to see more of these personal attacks."

A year after a regional water authority hired the Houston-based and privately held BTEC Turbines following Rita's assault on the Texas Gulf Coast, White invested \$1 million in the company, which he once served as a director. His tax returns, released earlier this week and examined by The Associated Press, showed he has recorded a \$500,000 profit from the investment.

White told reporters Thursday that he left the company's board before taking over as mayor in 2004 and had no financial interest in BTEC at the time the company won a \$1.8 million contract to provide power generators to ensure Houston-area refineries and the city of Baytown could maintain their water supply during storm-caused power outages.

"At no time did I ever benefit from calling BTEC and asking them to help the people in this community in a time of need," White said.

Gov. Rick Perry, speaking on the eve of the Republican state convention in Dallas on Thursday night, ramped up criticism of his opponent, saying White's investment represented a "violation of the public trust."

"To fill your pockets while misery is going on in your city, I can't think you have much of a conscience," Perry said.

White said he was asked by Harris County and public works officials if he knew some way to keep water flowing to the refineries, so they could stay in production and avoid a national fuel shortage. He said he remembered BTEC as a company that had been called to Baghdad by the U.S. military to supply emergency power "after troops rolled in," and he told officials working with the Coastal Water Authority, a state government agency that delivers water to parts of Harris, Chambers and Liberty counties, about BTEC.

"That was the end of my conversations and involvement in the case," White said. "I did not tell them they had to use one firm and only one firm."

Four of the authority's seven board members are appointed by the mayor of Houston.

White made his investment a little more than a year after the storm struck, while he still was mayor and after learning the company was being sold. He denied any conflict of interest, saying the investment was disclosed in previous financial documents and said the company was good at what it did.

"I liked their business plan," White said. "I made an investment in the company. I didn't stop investing because I was mayor."

White fired back at Perry by accusing the governor of using taxpayer money every day to "finance his personal lifestyle to benefit he and his family personally." Last month, the AP reported that Perry is spending \$10,000 a month in public funds to live in a luxury rental mansion in Austin while the official governor's residence is undergoing repairs.

"We deserve better than a governor who lives high on the hog on taxpayers' expense every single day, every single week," White said, adding: "At no time when I was mayor and when I'm governor will I use taxpayer funds in that manner."

White explained his ties to BTEC after releasing his tax returns dating back to 2004. Perry said Thursday night that he would not agree to a series of televised debates with the former Houston mayor unless he releases more tax returns dating back to his service in the Clinton administration in the mid-1990s.

White says Perry is afraid to debate him.

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Texas targets decades of abandoned ships off coast

PORT LAVACA, Texas (AP) - A giant pair of shears descends from a 70-foot crane above the Gulf of Mexico, grasping a chunk of metal and ruthlessly crunching it in clippers with a dinosaur-like six-foot bite.

This massive 300,000-pound machine is part of Texas' attempt to clear its waters of unwanted ships, boats and rigs that have been scuttled there.

Texas used to allow residents to dump unwanted fishing boats, sailboats, or even barges or rigs in state waters, leaving them to rot and sink. The state knows of more than 400 such vessels and has stepped up efforts to enforce its ban on the practice, which was abandoned in 2005.

The scuttled vessels are environmental and navigational hazards to coastal communities and

the fishing public. Now Texas officials are hoping Louisiana also enacts legislation against the practice because residents are crossing the state line to dump unwanted boats and ships carrying fuels, oils and batteries that will harm the environment for years.

William Grimes, a training and response coordinator in the oil division of the Texas General Land Office, has encountered Civil War-era vessels and an entire group of World War I-era ships scuttled by the Navy sometime in the early 20th century.

"It was a different world 100 years ago, and scuttling vessels was not an uncommon thing in that time," Grimes said. "The Gulf of Mexico is filled with hundreds, if not thousands, of vessels that were scuttled by their owners, in some cases even by the

federal government. We realize the impact of that now."

Some evolved into vibrant marine habitats, home to hundreds of fish and wildlife and prime ground for the state's fishing public. Others - especially gargantuan steel barges - sucked life out of the seabed, either trapping crabs and other aquatic life or squandering the oxygen needed for survival.

Hurricanes - from Katrina in 2005 to Ike in 2008 - have carried abandoned vessels into downtown New Orleans or plunked them onto Texas highways.

Then came the recession. "One thing we learned, is when hard economic times hit, the first thing people abandon is their boats," Grimes said.

Texas first made it illegal to scuttle vessels in the water in 2005, then strengthened the law in 2009, providing Grimes with the authority to track down the owners, issue them warnings - kind of like cities do when people abandon unwanted vehicles - and then remove the

vessel if necessary.

Removing the vessels, however, costs a minimum of \$100 per foot - the most expensive removal cost \$2 million - and the state has not dedicated funds to this. So Grimes pairs up with local governments, nonprofits and even scrap recyclers that remove the steel vessels and cash them in.

Extreme Scrap and Recycling is one of those companies; it had the 70-foot, 300,000-pound shears contraption built especially for these projects. Jeffrey Fuller, the company's field superintendent, said the company has helped the state remove some 250 vessels since 2005 within a 250-mile stretch of water from Orange, on the border with Louisiana, west to Port Lavaca. Between 200 and 300 more remain in the 80 miles of water from Port Lavaca to Corpus Christi, he added.

Now Fuller hopes Louisiana will pass similar legislation to prevent Texans from towing their unwanted boats next door

- and to avoid finding abandoned shrimp boats in downtown New Orleans when the next hurricane hits.

"The whole state is just

littered with old, abandoned vessels," Fuller said of Louisiana. "Texas had this problem too, but now we're getting it cleaned up."

Date set for suit against drilling moratorium

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - A federal judge has set a hearing for June 21 on a lawsuit aimed at nullifying the six-month ban on deepwater petroleum drilling in the Gulf of Mexico.

The suit, which names the federal government as defendant, was filed earlier this week by Hornbeck Offshore Services Inc., a Louisiana oil service company that says it expects big losses from the moratorium.

Hornbeck's suit claims the government illegally ordered the moratorium, which many in the industry expect to put a long-term chill on deepwater domestic drilling.

Bollinger Shipyards Inc. and Edisbn Chouest Offshore Services joined the suit on Wednesday.

The hearing will be before U.S. District Judge Martin L.C. Feldman.



Nebraska seeks Big Ten membership

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska fans accustomed to making road trips to Columbia, Mo., better get ready to reset their GPS units for Columbus, Ohio.

Nebraska made it official Friday and applied for membership in the Big Ten Conference, a potentially crippling blow to the Big 12 and the biggest move yet in an offseason overhaul that will leave college sports looking much different by this time next year.

Chancellor Harvey Perlman disclosed the plan during a meeting of the university's Board of Regents, proposing that play in the new conference begin in 2011 after one more year in the Big 12.

The move offers stability "that the Big 12 simply cannot offer," Perlman said, and the regents unanimously approved a resolution supporting a move to the Big Ten.

Nebraska must be accepted by Big Ten presidents and Perlman said he expected that vote to come soon. The Big Ten confirmed it had Nebraska's application but offered no timeline for a decision.

Asked if there was a chance the Big Ten would reject Nebraska, athletic director Tom Osborne said: "I guess there is always a chance. We would be surprised, but you never know."

Adding Nebraska would be the Big Ten's first expansion since 1990, when Penn State joined. Big 12 officials had no immediate comment.

Perlman said he believed Nebraska is much more "aligned" with the Big Ten than the Big 12 when it comes to academics, culture and athletics.

The university issued a statement that said for more than 20 years, Nebraska has compared itself to a list of 10 peer institutions established by the regents. Five of the 10 are Big Ten members; four are former Big Eight schools that joined Nebraska in the Big

12 in 1996.

"The University of Nebraska would have new opportunities with membership in the Big Ten — and I believe the Big Ten would be a stronger conference as well," university president J.B. Milliken said.

Nebraska's move comes at the end of a crazy week in college athletics.

On Thursday, fellow Big 12 member Colorado announced it was leaving for the Pac-10. Texas and other schools in the Big 12 South — Perlman told the regents that the Pac-10 had been in touch with many schools in that division — could be the next to leave. Texas regents scheduled a meeting for Tuesday to discuss the Longhorns' future in the Big 12.

"One school leaving a conference does not destroy a conference," Perlman said. "Nebraska did not start this discussion. After the Big Ten announced it planned to consider expansion, we saw reports that Missouri would want to go to the Big Ten, including a statement by their governor, a member of board of curators and chancellor — comments that weren't clearly supportive of the Big 12."

Athletic director Tom Osborne, the longtime football coach, agreed.

"As we read the tea leaves and listened to the conversations, some of the schools that were urging us to stay, we found some of them had talked to not only one other conference or two but even three, and those were the same ones urging us to stay," he said.

To generations of Nebraska fans, going to the Big Ten at one time would have been unthinkable. The school's athletic tradition is built on more than a century of football games against the likes of Missouri and Kansas, dating to the days the team was known as the Bugeaters.

The Huskers, in fact, have been conference partners with Iowa State, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Kansas State since 1928; with Colorado since 1948 and with Oklahoma State since 1960.

Now the Huskers are on the verge of taking their five national titles in football, three Heisman trophies and enthusiastic fans east. They will look to start building new traditions, like a border rivalry with the Iowa Hawkeyes and regular trips to Ohio State, Michigan and Penn State.

Watching a football camp at Beaver Stadium, Penn State coach Joe Paterno declined comment Friday. Paterno in the past has advocated for enlarging the Big Ten from 11 schools to 14.

"It's just the tip of the iceberg right now," Penn State receivers coach Mike McQueary said of Nebraska. "Unbelievable tradition, the things they've done in that program; academically as well."

At Iowa State, a Big 12 school rarely mentioned in realignment discussions, officials sent an open letter to boosters expressing disappointment in the moves by Colorado and Nebraska. "But as all of the discussions about conference realignment illustrate, the future of college athletics appears to be less about academics and competitive success and more about money, as measured by television viewership and the associated revenues," the letter said.
