FATAL WRECK ON HWY 152

A one-vehicle crash on the Borger highway just west of the city limits resulted in the death of a young Pampa man Monday afternoon.

According to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety, Jacob Albus, 25, was driving a 2003 Chevrolet pickup truck eastbound on State Highway 152 four miles west of Pampa when he lost control of the vehicle.

The truck traveled across the westbound lane and into the north ditch, striking a cement culvert and causing the vehicle to roll end over end. The truck came to a stop after striking an electric pole.

Albus was not wearing a safety belt and was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Joe Martinez.

The accident was called in at 12:08 p.m. Pampa Police, Pampa Fire, EMT, Gray County Sheriff's Department, DPS and Texas State Troopers responded to the scene.

Albus' obituary appears on Page 2 of today's *The Pampa News*.

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PISD trustees to discuss budget

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees will hold a public hearing Wednesday concerning the 2010-2011 budget and proposed tax rate.

The proposed budget is for \$29,254,728, which includes a 2.13 percent average pay increase for teachers.

The total proposed tax rate is 1.3688 cents, the same as last year.

In their regularly scheduled meeting following the public hearing, the school board will consider adopting the 2010-2011 budget and compensation plan.

The board will also consider accepting a gift of a new marquee at the high school and contracts with Region 16 Education Support Center for support services.

It will also hear construction updates on the ag barn and new Pampa Junior High School.

The school board will consider bids on heating and air conditioning systems for the Pampa High School music and vocational buildings.

The board will also consider action to name the Multi-purpose Activity Center (MPAC) between the high school baseball field and football stadium after the late Pampa Coach Dennis Cavalier.

After Coach Cavalier died in 2003, several former Harvester athletes requested that the football stadium be named in honor of Cavalier, but his family did not favor renaming the stadium. The family, however, indicated that the MPAC Center was Coach Cavalier's dream and

Sixteen indicted by Gray Co. grand jury

A Gray County Grand Jury returned 19 indictments against 16 people to 31st District Judge Steven R. Emmert this month.

Adam Scoggins, 31, was indicted on charges of burglary of habitation and injury to a child/elderly/disabled person with intent to inflict bodily injury from an incident on December 21, 2009. Scoggins is accused of entering a residence with the intent to commit Aggravated Assault and striking A.C., a child 14 years of age or younger, with a baseball bat.

Scoggins was previously convicted of another burglary of habitation charge in July of 2007. Bond was set at \$50,000 for burglary and \$50,000 for injury to a child.

Atziri Arit Murgado, 19, was indicted on charges of aggravated assault of a child on Sept. 29, 2009. Bond was set at \$50,000.

Marvin Charles Turner, 52, was indicted on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Turner is accused of striking Robin Ash with a portable heater on March 27, 2010. Bond was set at \$25,000.

Ludwig Bernhard Millhausen, 44, was indicted on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Millhausen is accused of stabbing John Richard Stewart with a knife on Feb. 1, 2010. Bond was set at \$25,000.

Ricardo Rodriguez Perez, 33, was indicted on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Perez is accused of stabbing Johnathon Ahey in the hand with a knife on Oct. 14, 2009. Bond was set at \$15,000.

Kristol Nichole Rodriguez, 21, was indicted on charges of assaulting a public servant. Rodriguez is accused of striking Pampa Police Officer Houston Gass as Gass was attempting to restrain her on Aug. 6, 2009. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Richard Steven Dimarzo, 69, was indicted on charges of possession of marijuana in an amount of 2,000 pounds or less but more than 50 pounds on Jan. 18, 2010. Bond was set at \$50,000.

Toby Francisco Hernandez, 44, was indicted on charges of driving while intoxicated on Dec. 19, 2009. Court records indicate that Hernandez has also been charged with driving while intoxicated on two earlier instances, in 1998 and 2004. Bond was set at \$25,000.

Tammie Mae Young Reames, 47, was indicted on

Alex to become hurricane

VILLAHERMOSA, Mexico (AP) — A strengthening Tropical Storm Alex was expected to become a hurricane Tuesday as it swirled toward the Gulf coast of northern Mexico and southern Texas, where authorities were readying emergency shelters and distributing sandbags.

Forecasters said the storm's likely path would take it away from the site of the huge Gulf of Mexico oil spill off Louisiana's coast, but added that it might push oil farther inland and disrupt cleanup efforts.

Alex had maximum sustained winds near 70 mph (110 kph) early Tuesday, and the U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami, Florida, predicted the storm would grow into a hurricane sometime Tuesday as it headed toward the U.S.-Mexico border at the mouth of the Rio Grande. Landfall seemed likely Wednesday night.

Forecaster Todd Kimberlain said conditions Monday led the center to conclude the storm would be a less powerful hurricane than initially thought.

Texas prepares for landfall

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — Parts of coastal Texas are under hurricane warnings in case Tropical Storm Alex gains strength and heads for the state.

The National Weather Service says a hurricane warning was in effect Tuesday for Cameron, Willacy and Kenedy counties. The coastal warning covered from Baffin Bay, to 100 miles south to the mouth of the Rio Grande.

Gov. Rick Perry on Monday issued a disaster proclamation for 19 Texas counties. The Alamo Regional Command Center has been activated, with 100 buses for evacuation are on standby.

Dallas-based Southwest Airlines on Tuesday offered travel information for Corpus Christi and Harlingen, areas that could be affected by tropical weather. Southwest says passengers holding reservations for travel Tuesday through Friday are eligible to reschedule.

Storm could deter spill efforts

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Tropical Storm Alex could keep away from BP's busted well but still stir up heavy winds, rain and choppy seas that drive the oil deeper inland and bring much of the cleanup to a standstill.

By midweek, boats skimming the sludge from the water may have to return to port for their own safety, and the floating oil-containment booms could be rendered useless by waves slopping over them and may have to be pulled out of the water.

The upside is that the storm could stay far enough away that BP will not have to abandon its efforts to capture much of the crude spewing from the sea floor. Nor is the storm expected to interrupt BP's drilling of a relief well, considered the best hope of plugging the leak.

"We are watching very, very closely," said Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, the government's point man on the crisis. "As it stands right now, absent the intervention of a hurricane, we're still looking at mid-August" for completing the relief well.

Austin cemeteries need work

AUSTIN (AP) — An audit says Austin needs to do a better job overseeing five cemeteries that it maintains.

The Austin American-Statesman reported Tuesday that auditors who visited sites in March, April and June found broken fencing, poor irrigation and some gravestones overrun with weeds.

The Parks and Recreation Department pays InterCare Corp. to maintain cemetery grounds and do administrative tasks. The \$651,000 contract expires in 2016.

Parks director Sara Hensley has agreed to review the contract and devise a better monitoring system.

InterCare president Gene Bagwell said Monday that his company does good maintenance work. Bagwell says he has been working with parks officials to clarify his company's responsibilities.

The audit was sought by City Council member Randi Shade.

Woman cops to 1992 shooting

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A San Antonio woman faces up to 20 years in prison after pleading guilty to the 1992 slaying of her ex-boss.

Investigators say 51-year-old Carmen Hinojosa Najera, who has a history of mental illness, pleaded guilty Monday as part of a plea agreement in the murder investigation. She was found competent last year for trial.

Convenience store manager Darren Holden was found shot to death on Feb. 8, 1992, the day after he fired the woman.

Prosecutor Cliff Herber says authorities are confident that Hinojosa Najera was responsible for the slaying, but her mental illness might have made it a risky case to take to a jury.

Sentencing is expected in July. Defense attorney Joseph Esparza declined comment.

Tech gets hurricane grant

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas Tech University has been awarded a federal grant to study how communities bounce back after hurricanes.

The funding from the National Science Foundation was announced Tuesday by the school in Lubbock.

The \$280,000 project is under the direction of Daan Liang, an assistant professor of construction engineering.

Liang says the funding, meant to study economic resilience, will focus on the long-term impact of hurricane damages. He's previously studied probability models to determine how the construction of buildings affects their vulnerability during windstorms.

Another Norteno singer shot

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Norteno singer Sergio Vega was shot dead in a northern state that has produced many of Mexico's most notorious drug kingpins, joining a recent string of murdered musicians — some of them famous for crooning about the cartel lifestyle.

Unknown assailants intercepted Vega's red Cadillac on Saturday night near Los Mochis in Sinaloa state and riddled it with more than 30 bullets, authorities said. There were no arrests, and police have not identified any suspects or a possible motive.

Vega, 40, was a singer of "narcocorridos" — a subgenre that updates the folkloric "corrido" tradition of ballads about revolutionary heroes to tell the story of, and sometimes lionize, drug traffickers.

Elijah Wald, author of the book "Narcocorrido," said Monday that such singers often get caught up in the violent world they sing about.

PHOENIX (AP) — The Texas and Arizona governors criticized the Obama administration's border security plans Monday, saying not enough National Guard troops are being deployed to their states.

"What we heard wasn't anything what we hoped to hear," Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer told reporters after a 90-minute

briefing by federal officials sent by President Barack Obama.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry, a Republican like Brewer, said the deployment to his state was "insufficient to meet the needs of securing the Texas-Mexico border."

A White House statement said plans to deploy 1,200 additional National Guard soldiers along the U.S.-Mexico

border would "complement the unprecedented resources and additional efforts already devoted by this administration to securing the Southwest border."

Arizona would get 524 National Guard troops, Texas would get 250, California 224 and New Mexico 72, officials said. Another 130 would be at a national liaison office.

Court records show Sanderson attempted to destroy a clear plastic baggie containing suspected narcotics to impair its availability as evidence in an investigation. Bond

was set at \$10,000.

Lionel Ray Nash, 26, was indicted on charges of possession of a controlled substance. Court records indicate Nash was in possession of more than one gram but less than four grams of various narcotics on April 27, 2009. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Renee Danielle Johnson, 26, was indicted on charges of possession of a controlled substance. Johnson, who has a prior drug-related conviction, is accused of possessing more than one gram but less than four grams of various narcotics on April 27, 2009.

Today is Tuesday, June 29, the 180th day of 2010. There are 185 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 29, 1910, composer-lyricist Frank Loesser, who wrote the songs for such Broadway musicals as "Guys and Dolls," "The Most Happy Fella" and "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," was born in New York.

On this date:

In 1776, the Virginia state constitution was adopted, and Patrick Henry was made governor.

In 1946, authorities in British-ruled Palestine arrested more than 2,700 Jews in an attempt to stamp out extremists.

In 1954, the Atomic Energy Commission voted against reinstating Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer's access to classified information.

In 1966, the United States bombed fuel storage facilities near the North Vietnamese cities of Hanoi and Haiphong (HY'-fahng).

In 1967, Jerusalem was re-unified as Israel removed barricades separating the Old City from the Israeli sector.

In 1970, the United States ended a two-month military offensive into Cambodia.

In 1972, the Supreme Court ruled the death penalty as it was being meted out could constitute "cruel and unusual punishment." (The ruling prompted states to revise their capital punishment laws.)

In 1988, the Supreme Court upheld the independent counsel law.

In 1995, a department store in Seoul (sohl), South Korea, collapsed, killing at least 500 people. Actress Lana Turner died in Century City, Calif. at age 74.

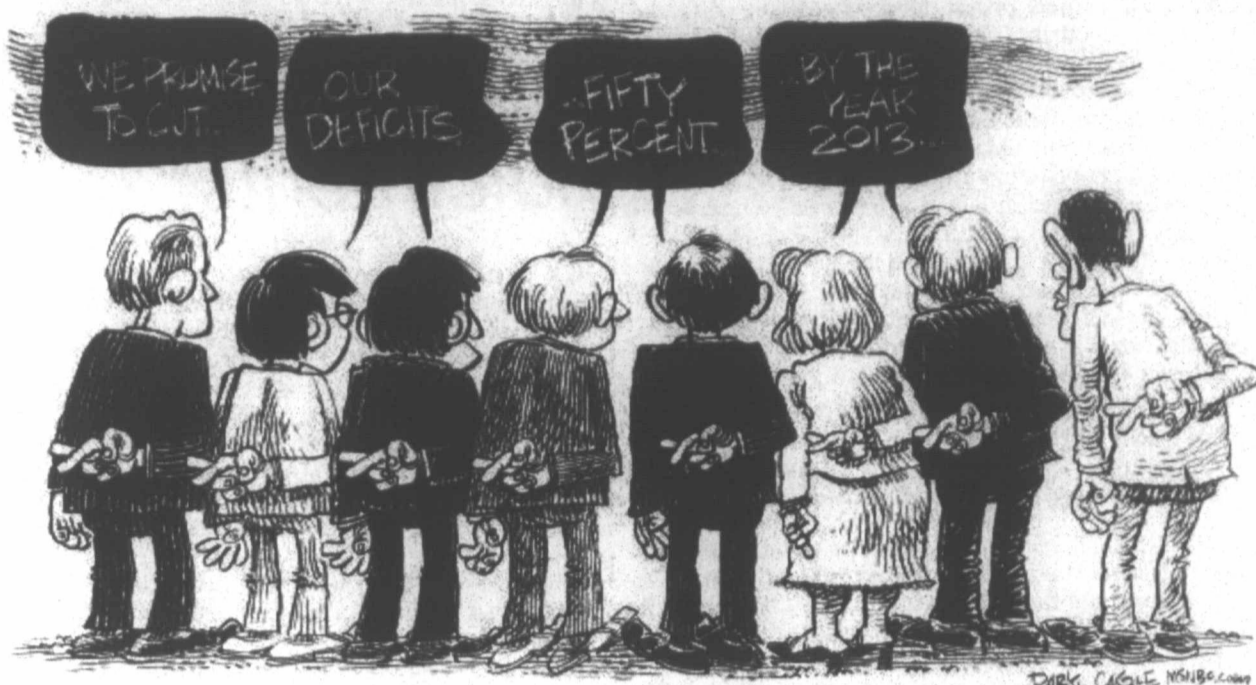
In 2003, actress Katharine Hepburn died in Old Saybrook, Conn., at age 96.

Ten years ago: An overloaded ship carrying some 500 people, many fleeing sectarian violence in Indonesia's Maluku islands, sank, killing all but 10 known survivors. President Bill Clinton nominated former Congressman Norman Mineta to lead the Commerce Department and become the first Asian-American Cabinet secretary. Actor Vittorio Gassman died in Rome at age 77.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, embracing nearly all the recommendations of a White House commission, said he was creating a national security service at the FBI to specialize in intelligence as part of a shake-up of the disparate U.S. spy agencies.

Mexico border is terrorists' moving sidewalk

While Americans march against Arizona's new restrictions on unlawful immigration, hundreds of illegal aliens from countries awash in Muslim terrorists tiptoe across the U.S.-Mexican frontier. New York, N.Y. - According to the federal Enforcement Integrated Database, 125 individuals were apprehended along the border from fiscal year 2009 through April 20, 2010. These deportable aliens included two Syrians, seven Sudanese, and 17 Iranians, all nationals from the three Islamic countries that the U.S. government officially classifies as state sponsors of terrorism.

Federal authorities also track "special interest countries" from which terrorism could be directed against America. Over the aforementioned period, 99 of those nations' citizens also were nabbed on the border. They were: two Afghans, five Algerians, 13 Iraqis, 10 Lebanese, 22 Nigerians, 28 Pakistanis, two Saudis, 14 Somalis, and three Yemenis. During FY 2007 and FY 2008, federal officials caught 319 people from these same countries traversing America's southwest border.

Some such characters were confined in Arizona, which recently adopted a controversial law that lets cops ask the citizenship status of those they suspect of other possible violations. WSB-TV recently publicized an April 15, 2010, "population breakdown" of immigrants detained at a facility in Florence, Ariz. Of the 395 males behind bars, 198 were Mexican, 18 hailed from Afghanistan, Iraq, Iran, Lebanon, Nigeria, Pakistan, Somalia, Sudan and Yemen.

Perhaps these gentlemen simply want to pursue the American dream. Worrisome signs suggest, however, that some may have arrived via blis-



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tering, cactus-adorned deserts so they could blow Americans to smithereens.

Texas Border Patrol agents discovered, along with Iranian currency and Islamic prayer rugs, an Arabic clothing patch that reads "martyr" and "way to immortality." Another shows a jet flying into a skyscraper.

Members of Hezbollah, the Lebanon-based terrorist organization, have already entered the United States across our southwest border," declares "A Line in the Sand," a 2006 report by the House Homeland Security Investigations Subcommittee, then-chaired by Rep. Michael McCaul (R-Texas).

Even more disturbing are the uninvited terrorists and terror suspects that were arrested after entering America through our permeable underbelly:

- Mahmoud Youssef Kourani pleaded guilty in March 2005 to providing material support to terrorists. First, Kourani secured a visa by bribing a Mexican diplomat in Beirut. He and another Middle Easterner then hired a Mexican guide to escort them into America. Finally, Kourani settled in Dearborn, Michigan's Lebanese-immigrant community, and raised cash for Hezbollah.

- Miguel Alfonso Salinas was caught in New Mexico near the international border in 2006. As The Washington Examiner reported, one week of FBI interrogation exposed Salinas as an Egyptian named Ayman Sulmane Kamal. Evidently, he remains in federal custody.

- Then-National Intelligence

Director Mike McConnell said that in FY 2006 and FY 2007, at least 30 potentially dangerous Iraqis were found trying to penetrate America via Mexico. As McConnell told the El Paso Times: "There are numerous situations where people are alive today because we caught them."

- The Department of Homeland Security issued an April 14 intelligence alert regarding a possible border-crossing attempt by a Somali named Mohamed Ali. He is a suspected member of Al-Shabaab, a Somali-based al-Qaida ally tied to the deadly attack on American GIs in 1993's notorious "Blackhawk Down" incident in Mogadishu.

- Captured in Brownsville, Texas, Ahmed Muhammed Dhakane pleaded not guilty on May 14 to federal charges that he "ran a large-scale smuggling enterprise" designed to sneak East Africans through Mexico into Texas, including "several AIAI-affiliated Somalis into the United States." Al-Ittihad Al-Islami is yet another Muslim-extremist organization.

- Daniel Joseph Maldonado also has Somali ties. He was picked up in Somalia in 2007 during terrorist training. He was returned to Houston for prosecution. As Rice University's Joan Neuhus Schaan told KHOU-TV: "They had plans for him to come back to the United States and recruit female suicide bombers."

All this involves only the bad guys who the authorities nailed. Those who have stayed undetected after crossing the border to murder Americans remain, by definition, invisible.

that naming the building after the coach would be appropriate.

The board will also consider workers compensation insurance for September, 2010 through August, 2011, and a rental agreement to allow Clearwire Communications, a wireless provider, to erect antennas at the football stadium. Clearwire Communications would pay the school district \$1,105 for the first year with a three percent increase for each succeeding year.

Also, the school board will look into 2010-2011 fund raising projects and possibly revise the board's operating procedures.

The members of the school board will consider a resolution considering a grant to provide programmable thermostats at Lamar and Wilson Elementary schools.

They will also consider a gift of a sprinkler system for the high school baseball outfield.

The board will hear the year-end arrest report, accident report and enrollment report along with a video of the Pampa High School graduation.

It will also discuss the superintendent's compensation and contracts for new teachers.

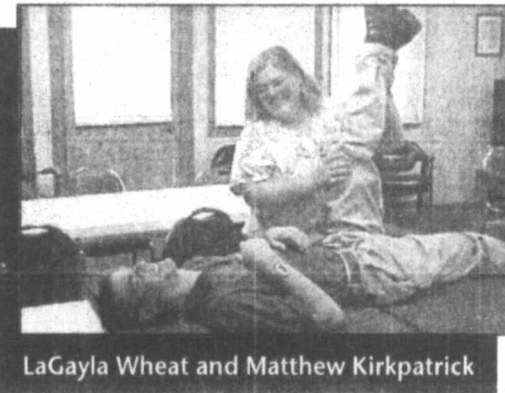

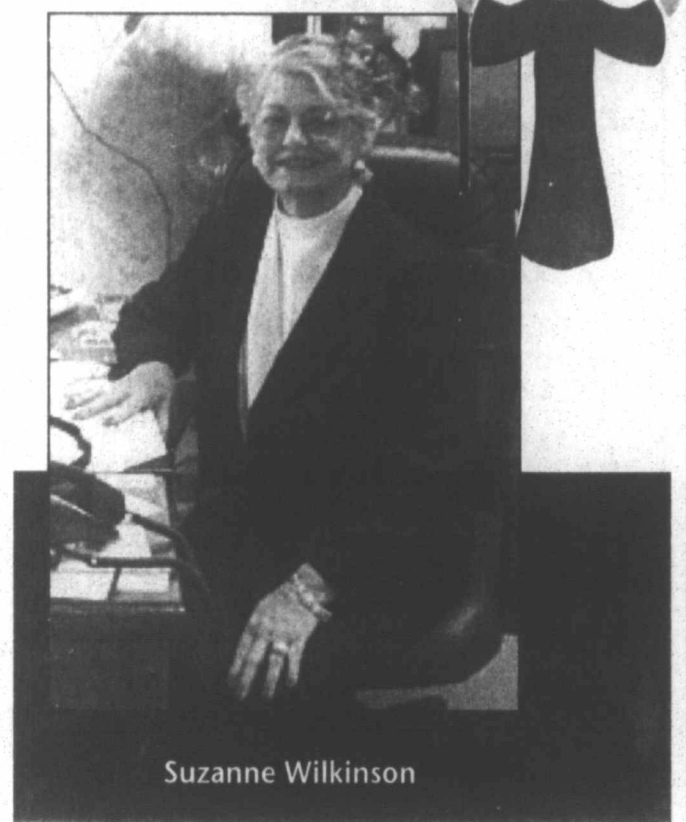

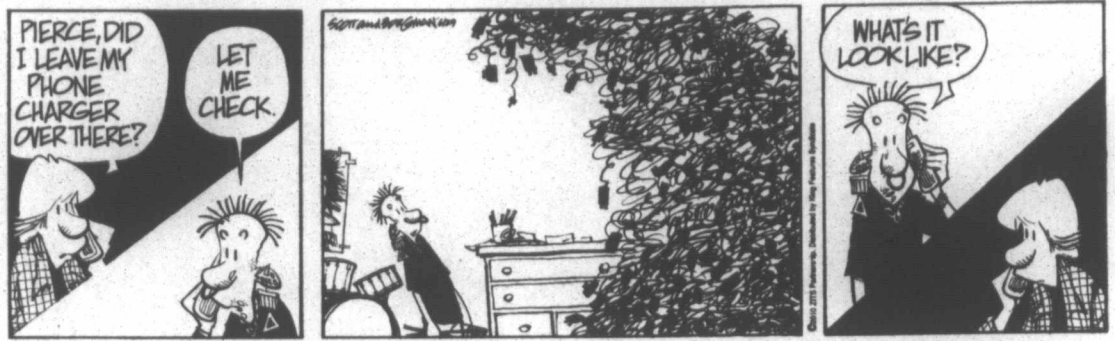

Garrett Ericson started for Pampa and pitched six innings and allowed three runs on six hits for a no decision. Collin Killgo pitched the final third of an inning and allowed one run on one hit, walked two and struck out one in a losing effort.

Brady Eakin, who is coaching the team, said they played well against Borger.

"If we can play like we did today, we will win a lot of games," Eakin said.

Borger led 2-1 after two innings. Mitch Simon

scored Pampa's first run with a home run. Pampa took the lead. In the top of the third. After a ground out, Cole Engle doubled to right-center field. Tyler Malone stroked a single with two outs to score Engle and tie the game at two. After Killgo reached on an error, Brent Green singled and drove in Malone to put Pampa ahead 3-2. Green said he just worked the count.

The teams would remain deadlocked until the bottom of the seventh. Killgo struck out the lead batter but walked the next two. A wild pitch moved the runners in scoring position. Borger got the walk-off hit with a line drive to right.

Malone said playing in the summer has been fun. "It's a lot of extra at-bats," Malone said. "A lot of reps and stuff."

Eakin said things have gone well this summer.

"When we get the plays we need and the effort we need, we're good," Eakin said.

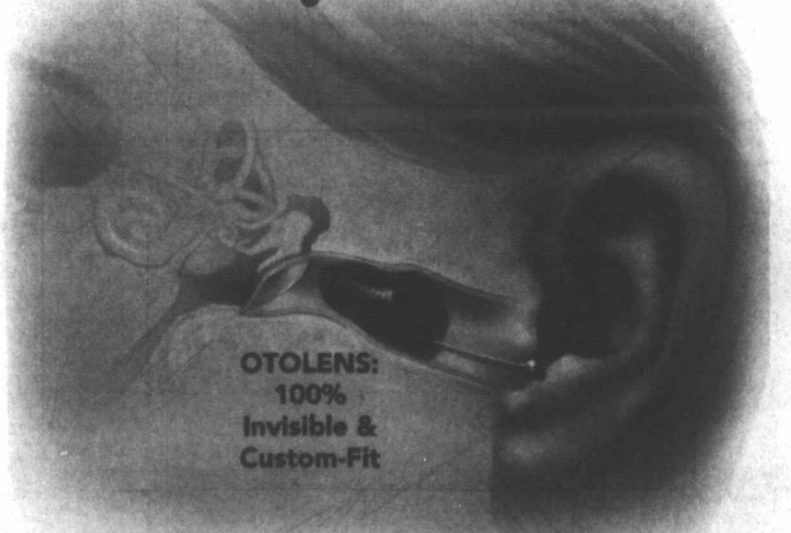

INCREASING NEED

These days, one in six Americans has a hearing loss equal to that of placing a finger in one or both ears, according to a recent Johns Hopkins University study. That's double previous estimates, with the problem growing faster among younger adults, many of whom listen to their iPods and MP3 players with small earbuds worn within the ear and the volume cranked up way too loud. It's a combination of the baby



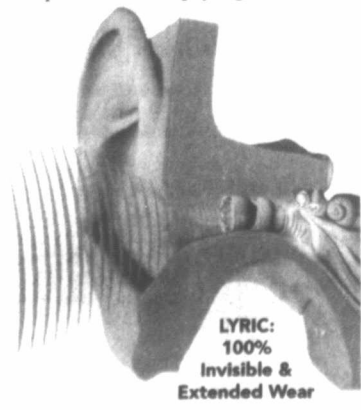
