County prisoners moved due to space limitations Childress County Jail holding Gray County prisoners for \$38 a day

Copeland

Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland is farming prisoners out to other counties and the Gray County Commission is at odds with the Gray County Appraisal District — again.

The Gray County Commissioners Court today approved inmate housing for prisoners in the sheriff's custody in other jurisdictions.

Sheriff Copeland told commissioners this morning that he had sent 10 prisoners to Childress County for housing because of space limitations in the Gray County jail.

Copeland said that although he had some extra beds in the jail, state jail standards required that certain prisoners be segregated so not all the beds could be used.

He said that he had reached an agreement

with Childress County to transport and hold 10 Gray County prisoners at a cost of \$38 a day. Randall County officials had offered to house the prisoners for \$56 a day.

"Every jail our size or smaller," Sheriff Copeland said, "is full."

The commissioners approved the sheriff's request to send the 10 prisoners to Childress County.

In other business:

- The commission approved the refund of about \$41,000 from last year's tax rolls, but asked the Gray County Appraisal District to clarify the circumstances surrounding the over-

payment of taxes by one entity.

Gray County Tax Collector Gaye Whitehead told the commissioners today that tax appraisal officials told her that a clerical error had been made and that taxes were paid twice on a building and land for last year's taxes.

According to Whitehead, a late change in the tax roll showed that in addition to the double payments, the value of the building and land had dropped from \$2.3 million to \$1.4 million.

The property taxes will be refunded from the county, road, water, Pampa Independent School District and Clarendon College for a total of \$41,658.99.

- The commission also approved a lease for a new postage machine from Pitney Bowes for \$5,280 per year.

Rockabilly not just style for Pampa's LeBeau

When up-and-coming pin-up model and native Texan Rowdy LeBeau sees folks in California jumping onto the rockabilly trend wagon, she can't help but smile.

Sure, it may be vogue on the West Coast now, she said, but back home here in the Panhandle, it's always been more than that: It's a way of life.

"Out there, it's just a new trend," said LeBeau (nee Sara Jewett, now Elrod), who now lives in California but grew up in Pampa. "Here, it's so much more than that, you know? It's tradition."

While still a relative newcomer to the pin-up industry, LeBeau has nonetheless seen the trend take shape firsthand. LeBeau, whose career as a pin-up model was kick-started by a photo shoot featured in Pin-Up Perfection magazine, said that it's fun to see small-town style popping up on the SoCal scene. As a Panhandle girl, though, she said that riding

the rockabilly wave is much more significant to her than just being fashionable.

"California is looking to Small Town U.S.A. for their trends, which is great, but it really is just kind of funny when you think about it," she said. "To them, it's just clothes. It's just style.

"But that was our history. It means so much more to me. I guess, because it's where I come from."

That's why LeBeau is hoping to bring back a little slice of home to the pin-up business. Earlier this week, LeBeau had a photo shoot in front of the PIN-UP cont. on page 3

NTSB: Lines weren't marked prior to blasts

A federal official said that a natural gas pipeline near Darrouzett was not marked when it was hit by a bulldozer three weeks ago, killing two Pampa men.

Johanne Mide Renner, 44, and Steven Douglas Odell, 32, were killed when a natural gas pipeline was ruptured June 8, north of Darrouzett. Renner and Odell were killed as they stood 200 to 300 yards away from the bulldozer that struck the pipeline.

The driver of the bulldozer, Dwayne Wood, 32, that struck the unmarked pipeline was airlifted to a hospital in Oklahoma City. Two other men were taken to the Hemphill County Hospital. Another man at the scene of the explosion was uninjured.

National Transportation Safety Board Chairman Deborah Hersman said that neither the pipeline in the Texas Panhandle nor a pipeline near Dalburne that killed a worker south of Dallas the day before were marked.

She said a company failed to seek a permit before doing excavation work prior to the explosion near Darrouzett. LINES cont. on page 5

PISD approves salary increase for new teachers

The Pampa Independent School District approved a new budget during its trustees meeting Wednesday evening, notably raising the base salaries for beginning teachers with no experience.

"It's just something that we did to better compete with Amarillo and some of the other school districts in the area," said PISD Assistant Business Manager Carol Fields.

The PISD salary standard for a new teacher with no experience is \$40,000, up from \$37,800 last year.

Fields said that all of the district's current teachers will also receive a \$1,000 raise from last year's salary.

In other business:
• The board received an update on the construction of the soon-to-be-opened Pampa Junior High School.

Hurricane Alex pummels Texas, Mexico

SAN FERNANDO, Mexico (AP) — Hurricane Alex ripped off roofs, caused severe flooding and forced thousands of people to flee coastal fishing villages before weakening to a tropical storm over northern Mexico.

The Atlantic season's first hurricane largely spared nearby Texas, which had prepared for a possible direct hit. While it brought rain, spawned two tornadoes and caused 1,000 people to evacuate low-lying areas there, state officials reported no injuries or major damage.

Earlier, Alex whipped up high waves that frustrated oil-spill cleanup efforts on the other side of the Gulf of Mexico and delivered tar balls and globs of

crude onto already-soiled beaches.

The storm made landfall Wednesday night on a sparsely populated stretch of coast in Mexico's Tamaulipas state, about 110 miles (180 kilometers) south of Brownsville, Texas, and Matamoros.

Much of Matamoros was flooded Thursday morning, said Saul Hernandez Bautista, the city's director of the Civil Protection. He said at least 400 neighborhoods were flooded, some with 12 inches (30 centimeters) of water and at least 2,500 people were in shelters, mostly people evacuated from low-lying regions outside the city.


Trees were uprooted and electri-

cal posts were down. Hernandez said there were no known injuries or deaths in the Matamoros area but he did not know about the area farther south where the eye of the storm hit.


"The damages are incalculable. The city is practically under water," Hernandez said. "But the most important thing is that there was no loss of life. We took important and opportune measures to evacuate people."

The U.S. National Hurricane Center said Alex was pushing inland early Thursday at 12 mph (19 kph) but had weakened to a tropical storm with sustained winds of 70 mph (110 kph). It was expected to and dissipate within 24 to 36 hours.

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

Probation revocation vacated

AMARILLO (AP) - An appeals court has overturned the probation revocation of a man imprisoned for 10 years after his arrest in the since-discredited Tulia drug buses of 1999.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals granted 32-year-old Mandis Barrow a new court hearing on his revocation in a Wednesday ruling.

According to the Amarillo Globe-News, Barrow was placed on deferred adjudication after a 1996 guilty plea to armed robbery. After his arrest in the drug busts, a judge revoked Barrow's probation and sentenced him to 20 years in prison.

The state's highest appeals court ruled that Barrow's probation wouldn't have been revoked but for former narcotics agent Tom Coleman's since-discredited testimony. Coleman was later convicted of aggravated perjury, sentenced to 10 years of probation and had his peace officer's license revoked.

Barrow was released on parole last year after serving 10 years in prison.

DPS worker accused in scam

HOUSTON (AP) - A Department of Public Safety clerk in Houston faces firing after being accused of selling driver's licenses to people who never took the required tests or who are undocumented.

Gracie Gutierrez of Houston is charged with bribery in the undercover investigation and remained in the Harris County Jail on Thursday. Bond was \$50,000. Electronic jail records for the 27-year-old Gutierrez, who was booked Tuesday, did not list an attorney for her.

DPS spokeswoman Tela Mange (TEE'-luh manj) says Gutierrez was suspended this week and the agency is taking steps to end the clerk's employment.

Also charged with bribery is 20-year-old Saul Ramirez, who's held on \$35,000 bond. No attorney was listed for Ramirez, who was booked Wednesday. Ramirez is not employed by DPS.

Conseco to pay \$10M settlement

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - An Indiana insurance company will set up a \$10 million fund to settle a multi-state investigation into increases in policy costs.

Regulators from California, Florida, Iowa, Indiana and Texas investigated Conseco's handling of more than 12,000 Lifetrend insurance policies after receiving complaints from consumers who had received notices in the fall of 2008 about premium increases.

Investigators say Conseco failed to tell consumers some policies were underfunded and knew products weren't being properly administered but took no action.

The agreement also requires Conseco Life to pay \$1 million to be divided among the investigating states.

Conseco spokesman Tony Zehnder says the company accounted for the settlement at year-end 2009.

Linn signs \$90M Permian deal

HOUSTON (AP) - Linn Energy LLC announced a \$90 million deal has been signed to acquire oil and natural gas properties in the Permian Basin.

Houston-based Linn, in a statement Thursday, said the acquisitions should close by Aug. 16.

CEO Mark Ellis says the acquisition in the Wolfberry formation is an attractive addition to the company's other recently secured assets in the area.

Linn is an independent oil and natural gas development company.

End of shuttle program delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - NASA's space shuttle program will keep going until next year.

The space agency made it official Thursday after weeks of hints of launch delays. Managers agreed to postpone the next-to-last shuttle launch until Nov. 1. Discovery had been scheduled to fly to the International Space Station in September.

The very last mission now has a Feb. 26 launch date. Endeavour will close out the shuttle program by delivering a major scientific instrument to the space station.

NASA says it needs more time to prepare the cargo for those two flights.

As for the possibility of an extra shuttle mission, NASA says no decision is expected before August. NASA would like to fly Atlantis one more time before the fleet is retired.

Racing industry wants slots

AUSTIN (AP) - Racing industry officials told Texas lawmakers Wednesday they want slot machines legalized at horse and dog tracks to revive the state's struggling racing business.

Neighboring states like Louisiana have slots at tracks that draw more customers and build larger purses to pay race winners, and Texas is at a severe disadvantage by not allowing slots, said Andrea Young, president of Sam Houston Race Park in Houston, speaking for all the state's race tracks.

"Regional competition over the last decade has been a disastrous one-way street," Young said. "It is clear that Texas tracks are close to being pushed out of business."

Over the past 10 years, the amount wagered at Texas tracks has declined 50 percent and attendance has dropped 30 percent, said Young, speaking to the Legislative Study Group on behalf of Texans for Economic Development. The group wants passage of a constitutional amendment to allow slot machines at the state's 13 race tracks and three federally recognized Indian reservations.

Slots at tracks could generate about \$1 billion per year for state government, Young said.

Leaders of Indian tribes and proponents of full-fledged casinos also spoke to the legislative group, a caucus of the Texas House that studies proposals and is examining gambling before the 2011 legislative session. The House licensing committee is taking up the subject of gambling next week.

All this discussion shows there may be more appetite than usual for casino gambling among lawmakers, especially with the state facing a potential \$18 billion budget shortfall.

Casino gambling proposals that would have established Las Vegas-style casinos, slot machines at race tracks and casinos on American Indian reservations failed in the 2009 Texas Legislature.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fears that the economic recovery is fizzling grew Thursday after the government and private sector issued weak reports on a number of fronts.

Unemployment claims are up, home sales are plunging without government incentives and manufacturing growth is slowing.

Meanwhile, 1.3 million people are without federal jobless benefits now that Congress adjourned for a weeklong Independence Day recess without passing an extension. That number could grow to 3.3 million by the end of the month if lawmakers can't resolve the issue when they return.

All of this worries economists. As jobless claims grow and benefits shrink, Americans have less money to spend and the economy can't grow fast enough to create new jobs. Some are revising their forecasts for growth in the third quarter. Others are afraid the country is on the verge

Coney Island Cafe on Foster Street, showcasing the restaurant's rustic storefront and a pair of classic cars provided by High Plains Cruisers.

"I want to show them what it's really like to be rockabilly, you know?" said LeBeau with a chuckle. "This is real life rockabilly here. I saw it all the time growing up here in the Panhandle, so I want to do something that shows it as more than just a fashion trend."

Naturally, added LeBeau, the Coney Island Cafe's retro-style facade was a perfect backdrop.

"Actually, the original shoot I had scheduled was down in Borger with some motorcycles," said LeBeau. "That fell through, but I came home here to Pampa and when I saw the Coney, it was like my childhood all coming back to me."

"I can remember when I was a little girl, we would always come in as a family (to the Coney Island Cafe). It's one of the cornerstones of the city, you could say, and it was a big part of my life growing up. I have two boys now and I take them there when I can, and so when I saw it, I thought, 'This is perfect.'"

Just as important as the small town setting, LeBeau said, was the small town hospitality she received upon bringing her act back to Pampa.

"Oh my God, it was unbelievable," said LeBeau. "Like I said, the original shoot didn't work out, but so many people here in town pitched in to make this new one come together."

"As soon as things started falling through, I had people helping me out left and right. I talked to High Plains Cruisers for the cars, and they came through for me so quickly. I went to an antique store to get accessories for the shoot, and two or three of the ladies there, they went home and picked stuff up for me. Can you believe that? It only took literally an hour to get a new shoot going. That's Pampa for you — everyone's like family. You wouldn't ever even dream of having that in California."

Of course, being a Pampa girl herself, LeBeau is looking to pay everything forward. A former tactical air combat controller in the Navy — her pin-up name, "Rowdy," was a nickname she received on active duty — LeBeau is looking to use the photos from this week's photo shoot in a calendar she's putting together as a

fundraiser for the troops in Afghanistan. "This is all for (the troops)," said LeBeau. "I'm hoping that I can put this calendar together and we can use it to raise funds for them. I'm definitely into supporting my brothers and sisters in arms. The military has always supported me, and I can't see not supporting them."

New claims for benefits jumped by 13,000 to a seasonally adjusted 472,000, the Labor Department said Thursday. The four-week average, which smooths fluctuations, rose to 466,500, its highest level since March.

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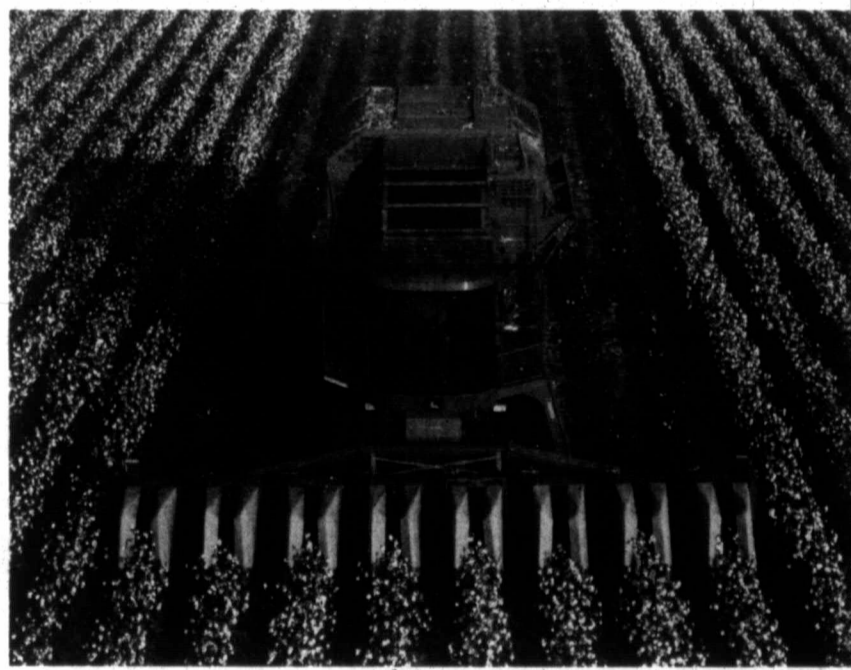
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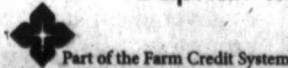

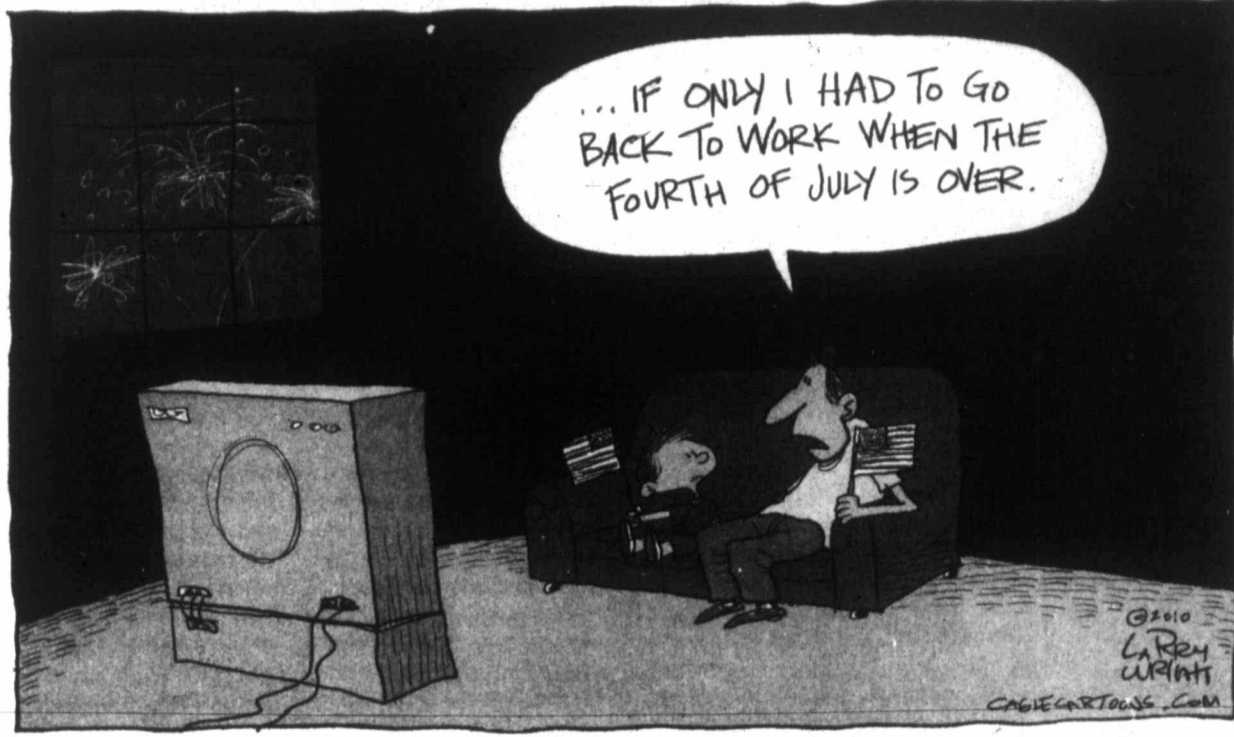
In 1997, Hong Kong reverted to Chinese rule after 156 years as a British colony.

Know your way around software licensing

There was a time when a person could purchase software and it belonged to them. They could use it however they wanted and on however many computers they had.

Oh, how much times have changed. Software licensing has morphed into a complex system that changes as often as the software itself. For instance, how much do you know about Microsoft's licensing policies for its two flagship products, Windows and Office? Licensing issues affect your budget and your ability to qualify for upgrades and support from Microsoft. If you own a business, paying insufficient attention to licensing can earn you a lawsuit and hefty fines. Let's discuss some of the terminology and use a few examples.

Nowadays, software is not generally "purchased," per se. Software is now typically licensed. That means that you are purchasing rights to use it. The type of license you purchase depends on whether you are a home user, a business, educational institution, government entity, or a non-profit organization.

Licenses typically are not transferable from one group to another. For instance, if you purchase a home user license then the software cannot be used in a business. Pricing is usually different for the type of license purchased.

The license also determines how many computers the software can be installed on how many users can use it. Some licenses are for a single computer, some are for multiple computers and some are for volume use.

A license usually involves a key for installation. Without the key, the software may not install.

As a second safeguard, a recent development that software developers have come up with is activation. Activation is a mandatory process that associates the software you purchase with the computers on which you use those products.

You can activate the software electronically over the Internet or over the phone. Activation does get computer information and develops a unique code that allows the software developer to know that it is only used on the appropriate number of

computers. This is the reason why purchasing a license for one computer and installing it on many may not work and is not recommended.

"Appropriate Usage" means that you must use the license in the context that it was purchased. For instance, if you purchased educational software while in school, then that software is not licensed to be used in a business. Software developers give steep discounts (sometimes free) to students in hope that when you get out of school and go to work, the students will purchase their software. If someone purchases the Microsoft Office Student and Home license, then legally they are not allowed to use it in a business.

Read the license details before you purchase the software. If you are unsure, ask a computer professional or call the software developer. Not only will you not receive support if you are not legally licensed, some software can be shutdown remotely, and you could face legal action. Microsoft is well-known for taking business to court.

Something positive out of the Gulf oil spill?

Could something positive come from the disastrous Gulf Oil spill?

How feasible are plans by President Barack Obama and green governors — Arnold Schwarzenegger of California foremost among them — to reduce U.S. dependence on fossil fuels? If you listen to the fossil fuel companies, coal is clean and oil is inescapable. There's a vast difference between reality and these claims. Regardless, becoming fossil-fuel-free is going to be a very long, costly and painful process.

California has been a leader in moving away from oil and coal, under the direction of Schwarzenegger, the outgoing governor. He shepherded through the state assembly and state senate the Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006, or AB 32. The act is so forward thinking, fearful fossil fuel companies are now trying to get California voters to throw it out. But even Schwarzenegger's plan, painful as it is, requires the state to cut back by a mere 30 percent on use of fossil fuels from the rate at which they were used in 1990 — and it gives the state a decade to reach that goal.

On a per-capita basis, that means reducing annual emissions of 14 tons of carbon dioxide for every man, woman and child in California down to about 10 tons per person by 2020, a government fact sheet estimates.

While California's goals are relatively meager but still lofty by today's national standards, SB 32 would

we have no choice but to wean ourselves of one fossil fuel: oil. We have plentiful domestic supplies of coal. But that is not true for oil. We already rely on imports for almost three-fourths of our oil, and domestic production has been slipping for decades. According to the Department of Energy, U.S. oil production peaked in 1970 at 9.6 million barrels per day and today stands at 5.3 million barrels per day.

We currently use less oil than we did five years ago — a drop from 20.8 barrels per day in 2005 to 18.7 now. But as we pull out of the recession, demand is likely to rise. That will make us ever more dependent on foreign sources.

According to Robert Rapier, energy consumption expert and blogger for theenergycollective.com, "that leaves us the option of reducing current consumption by 72 percent from current rates. This is of course why energy independence has eluded the U.S. For all of the talk of getting off of foreign oil, who is willing to cut their oil consumption down to about a third of what you currently use? I am not saying it can't be done, but I am saying it can't be done painlessly and without making some major adjustments. And that is ultimately why our political leaders have not managed to get it done. They are selling a sacrifice-free pipe dream."

Don't let any politician fool you. We must all use less energy and pay more for it during the next two decades, until our transition is completed. Drilling in now-protected areas, such as the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, is not the answer, either. That just postpones the inevitable: making us ever more dependent on a polluting, non-renewable fuel with therefore limited ability to fulfill energy demands in the future.

If we don't get moving on this transition, there are plenty of other nations ready to jump in ahead of us and lead the change. This month the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation forum, meeting in Japan, agreed that the deployment of renewable energy, nuclear energy and power generation involving carbon capture and storage technology should be promoted.

Natural resources prevented us from being the world's leading oil producer, but there's nothing preventing us from becoming the world's leading producer of renewable energy. Nothing, that is, but the lack of political will to do so.

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EPA overturns 16-year-old Texas air permit program

HOUSTON (AP) - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on Wednesday officially overturned a 16-year-old Texas air permitting program it says violates the Clean Air Act, leaving some of the country's largest refineries in a state of limbo.

The move comes after years of backdoor bickering, negotiations and public arguments between the EPA and Texas. The argument recently escalated from a battle over environmental issues into a heated political dispute over states' rights.

Gov. Rick Perry has been using it to drive home his contention that President Barack Obama's administration is overreaching, saying in a statement Wednesday that "Texas will continue to fight this federal takeover of a successful state program."

The EPA's decision, announced in a statement, will force some 125 refineries and petrochemical plants to invest millions of dollars to get new permits.

Many of the plants may also have to invest in updates to comply with federal regulations.

The decision did not come as a surprise to Texas or the industries. EPA regional director Al Armendariz has said for months he would disapprove the permits if Texas did not comply with the Clean Air Act.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's chairman Bryan Shaw insisted Wednesday the state's permitting program complies with the Clean Air Act and has improved air quality in Texas.

However, in an effort to satisfy the EPA's concerns, Shaw said the commission recently changed the rules but apparently the EPA "did not take them into consideration."

Texas can challenge the ruling in court, but a commission spokesman said it hasn't decided whether to go that route.

Armendariz said the proposed rules were in the first stage of a lengthy approval process that could take months or even years.

"I can't wait to take action on these permits. I've got to act soon because these permits are seriously flawed," Armendariz told The Associated Press.

The EPA's move on Wednesday addresses Texas' so-called flexible permits, which set a general limit on how much air pollutants an entire facility can release.

The federal Clean Air Act requires state-issued permits to set limits on each of the dozens of individual production units inside a plant. The EPA says Texas' system masks pollution and makes it impossible to regulate emissions and protect public health.

Texas has been issuing the permits since 1994 even though it never received the required federal approval. The EPA made clear at least five years ago it believed the permits violated federal air laws, warning Texas and the refinery and petrochemical industry it would take action.

The industry, uncomfortable with the uncertainty,

sued the EPA in 2008, demanding the agency take action on this and several other programs that remained in limbo.

The EPA was under a court-ordered deadline of June 30 to either approve or disapprove the flexible permit program. On Wednesday, a federal court rejected a last minute appeal by the industry to extend the deadline.

Armendariz said he has instructed his staff to work closely with Texas and industry leaders to fix the permits.

The EPA has been working with industry leaders to find a way to effectively and efficiently issue new air permits to the impacted plants, including the nation's largest refinery, Exxon Mobil in Baytown, Texas.

The EPA has offered them an independent audit mechanism that would allow them to correctly measure air pollutants to get the new permits, while ensuring they would not be penalized for violations uncovered.

Matthew Tejada, executive director of Air Alliance Houston, one of several environmental groups that has opposed the permits, welcomed the EPA move but said he expects a state and industry-led legal battle against the agency.

I am married to a disabled person. He cannot get off a toilet without the grab bars available in a designated stall. What some individuals may not know is that many disabled people also suffer from bladder and bowel control issues and are desperate to use the facilities when they enter a restroom. A minute or two delay for them can spell disaster.

Finding it "difficult" to squeeze into a tiny stall is not the same as finding it impossible. The same goes for abusers of handicapped parking tags. The only persons entitled to these accommodations are the disabled — not the lazy, not the obese, or even necessarily the elderly. We who are blessed with the gift of mobility should make sure that accommodations are always available for those who are not. — VOICE OF REASON IN OHIO

DEAR VOICE: Thank you for correcting me. I told "Jennifer" I saw nothing wrong with using the larger stall as long as she deferred to a disabled woman needing it at the same time — and not everyone agreed with my reply. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: Not all reasons for needing the special stall are evident. Have you ever tried to fit two adults into a regular stall when one of them is disabled and needs assistance? This happens when someone else uses the bigger stall even though there were other ones available. It infuriates me knowing my parents suffer because people ignore disability-specific setups. — DAUGHTER OF DISABLED

DEAR ABBY: Handicapped parking spaces are legally reserved for people who have a disability. Handicapped restroom stalls are built to accommodate the disabled — not reserved for them. — BARBARA IN SAN LUIS OBISPO

DEAR ABBY: I believe the larger stalls are there for anyone who needs them. If a woman has to change clothes, that stall is helpful, but she should be quick so as not to leave a disabled person waiting.

Women with small children or a baby in a stroller should use this stall and keep the kids in there with her. I was appalled when I saw a

woman leave her baby in a stroller outside a small stall while she used it. — HEDDY, OUT WEST

DEAR ABBY: I use the bathroom stalls for people with disabilities and sometimes get dirty looks. I have a back injury and because the seats are much higher in a disabled stall, it allows me to conduct my business without enduring extreme pain. Please remind your readers that disabilities have many faces. — LADY WHO KNOWS IN EL CENTRO, CALIF.

DEAR ABBY: I also exclusively use the larger stall. I am a perfectly healthy 36-year-old woman with a thin build and no physical limitations. What I do have is moderate obsessive-compulsive disorder. The thought of using the smaller stall makes my heart race and my skin crawl.

I touch most of the outside world with a tissue or handkerchief. In a restroom I need enough space to be sure I will not touch the toilet, door, walls, trash can or paper dispenser. I realize my disorder is quirky, but I adapt. And obviously, I would yield to any person in need. — DENTON, TEXAS, READER

DEAR ABBY: You may have overlooked the real concern of "Jennifer's" mother about her obese daughter's use of the handicapped stall. Jennifer needs to shape up before she is the one in the wheelchair. — VALERIE IN FLORIDA
