# Pampa man injured in Saturday accident

A Pampa man was in critical condition today at an Amarillo hospital after a truck-motorcycle accident Saturday afternoon in Pampa.

Danny Miller, 63, reportedly suffered abdominal injuries in a collision with a pickup driven by Kerry Lee Parsley, 62, on the 200 block of Ballard.

Pampa police officers said Miller's green Suzuki motorcycle was southbound on Ballard when he was hit by Parsley's red 2009 GMC pickup about 4 p.m., Saturday.

Officers said Parsley was backing out of a parking space at the time of the accident.

The accident occurred in the midst of Saturday's Boomtown Block Party celebration. Emergency technicians and Pampa police officers were manning nearby booths during the event and were on hand to assist at the scene.

Miller, the chaplain of the Pampa branch of the VFW, was airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital by LifeStar helicopter.

Parsley was cited for backing without safety.

Although Rushing was born in Freeport, Tex., on Aug. 11, 1977, he considers himself a native of the Texas Panhandle.


"The most time in my life was spent in Shamrock before coming to Pampa," Rushing said.

#### BP robots lowering cap on leak

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Undersea robots maneuvered a mile beneath the Gulf on Monday to delicately lower a new, tighter-fitting cap over BP's busted well, a fix the oil giant hopes can finally stop the leak after nearly three

The new cap, a 150,000-pound metal stack, was about 300 feet from where it's supposed to be installed on top of the leaking well, BP Chief Operating Officer Doug Suttles said in a Monday morning news briefing.

A swarm of remote-controlled robots moved around heavy equipment near the seafloor on live video provided online by BP PLC. It was not clear how close the cap was to the well, but Suttles said the operation was complex and could take longer than they expect.

Oil could still be seen flowing freely from the top of the well where the cap will be attached.

#### Cop slaying trial delayed

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ODESSA (AP) — The trial of a man accused in the 2007 deaths of three Odessa police officers has been postponed indefinitely because he has terminal cancer.

A judge ruled July 8 that Larry Neil White's deteriorating condition would hinder the capital murder trial, which was set to begin next month. The ruling came after arguments on a defense motion for a continuance. Prosecutors, who are seeking the death penalty, opposed the continuance.

The 61-year-old White is accused of shooting the officers during a domestic disturbance call at the Odessa home he shared with his wife.

Cpls. Arlie Jones and John "Scott" Gardner died in the Sept. 8, 2007, attack. Cpl. Abel Marquez died four days later.

#### Dike breaks, homes evacuated

LA GRULLA (AP) — Police in the border town of La Grulla say some people whose homes were threatened by Rio Grande flooding had to be evacuated after a dike broke.

Police Chief Ricardo Trevino told KRGV-TV that the water Monday reached nearly two dozen homes. He says about 15 families voluntarily evacuated after the overnight failure of the dike near a water plant.

Trevino says several roads had to be closed due to

The Rio Grande rose after heavy rain associated with Hurricane Alex, which soaked northern Mexico and south Texas in late June and early July, and other tropical

La Grulla is a town of about 1,800.

#### FBI: Chase, shootings separate

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — The FBI in El Paso says a hitand-run accident and a vehicle that may have ended up in a shootout in Mexico are separate incidents.

FBI spokeswoman Martha Terrazas on Monday told The Associated Press that the incidents are separate and the agency is investigating.

The traffic accident happened early Sunday at an El Paso intersection. Police spotted a sport utility vehicle fleeing and chased it toward the Zaragoza International

Police said gunshots were fired at a U.S. Customs and Border Protection checkpoint before the SUV crossed into Mexico.

The El Paso Times reports a deadly shootout was reported later near a police station in Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, and a burned SUV was found in a ditch near the bridge. Further details were not immediately available.

#### Castro to make TV appearance

HAVANA (AP) - Fidel Castro will appear Monday on Cuba's key public affairs television program, according to a front-page headline in the Communist-party newsletter Granma. It may be the most prominent appearance by the former president since he fell ill in 2006.

Castro, 83, was set to discuss his concerns about the Middle East on the Mesa Redonda — or Round Table - a daily talk show about current events that is usually transmitted live on state media and seen across the island.

'This afternoon, special Mesa Redonda with Fidel," blares the headline.

The announcement did not specify if Monday's program would be broadcast live, and government officials contacted by The Associated Press had no comment. Castro also appeared in videotaped interviews with Cuban television in June and September 2007, but appearances have been extremely rare since a serious illness in July 2006 forced him to step down.

#### Bad planning caused Israeli raid

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Flawed intelligence-gathering and planning led to Israel's botched and deadly raid on a Gaza-bound protest flotilla, with security forces underestimating the potential for violence, said the official report released Monday.

The report, however, praised the commandos who took part in the operation, saying they were justified in opening fire and killing nine after being confronted by violent pro-Palestinian activists on board one of the ships.

The report concluded that intelligence-gathering was deficient and that various intelligence units did not communicate properly with each other. It criticized the operation's planners for not having a backup plan in the event of violence.

It did not recommend any dismissals, though it is possible that some senior officers will be ousted or demoted in an ensuing shake-up.

### Polanski freed in Switzerland

BERN, Switzerland (AP) - Roman Polanski was declared a free man on Monday after Switzerland rejected a U.S. request to extradite him to be sentenced for having sex in 1977 with a 13-year-old girl.

The Swiss government blamed the decision on U.S. authorities, saying they had failed to address defense arguments that the 76-year-old filmmaker had actually served his sentence before fleeing Los Angeles three decades ago.

Nine months after arresting Polanski, the Justice Ministry said U.S. officials should have backed up their request by providing confidential testimony about Polanski's sentencing procedure in L.A.

"Mr. Polanski can now move freely," Justice Minister Eveline Widmer-Schlumpf declared. "He's a free

younger brother, Jason, are both in law enforcement. Jason Rushing, 30, is with the Pampa Police





Today's Highlight in History:

On July 12, 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signed a bill passed by Congress authorizing the Medal of

On this date:

In 1543, England's King Henry VIII married his sixth and last wife, Catherine Parr.

In 1690, forces led by William of Orange defeated the army of James II at the Battle of the Boyne in Ireland. In 1909, the House of Representatives joined the Senate in passing the 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, allowing for a federal income tax, and submitted it to the states. (It was declared ratified in

In 1948, the Democratic national convention, which nominated President Harry S. Truman for a second term of office, opened in Philadelphia.

In 1960, the Etch A Sketch Magic Screen drawing toy, invented by French electrician Andre Cassagnes, was first produced by the Ohio Art Co.

In 1977, President Jimmy Carter defended Supreme Court limits on government payments for poor women's abortions, saying, "There are many things in life that are not fair.'

In 1984, Democratic presidential candidate Walter F. Mondale announced he'd chosen U.S. Rep. Geraldine A. Ferraro of New York to be his running-mate; Ferraro was the first woman to run for vice president on a major-party ticket.

In 1988, Democratic presidential candidate Michael S. Dukakis tapped Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas as his running-mate.

In 1993, some 200 people were killed when an earthquake of magnitude 7.8 struck northern Japan and triggered a tsunami

Ten years ago: In Philadelphia, a WPVI-TV news helicopter videotaped about a dozen police officers kicking and punching Thomas Jones, a wounded carjacking suspect. (Jones later pleaded guilty to carjacking and other crimes, and was sentenced to 18 to 36 years in prison; 13 police officers were later suspended for up to 15 days in connection with the incident.)

Five years ago: Mohammed Bouyeri, a Muslim extremist on trial in the slaying of Dutch filmmaker Theo van Gogh, unexpectedly confessed in court, saying he was driven by religious conviction. (Bouyeri was convicted and sentenced to life in prison.) Prince Albert II of Monaco acceded to the throne of a 700-yearold dynasty. Miguel Tejada and Mark Teixeira led the American League to a 7-5 win over the National League in Detroit for the AL's eighth straight All-Star victory

One year ago: Rebels in Nigeria set fire to an oil depot and loading tankers in Lagos, killing five people in the group's first attack outside the Delta region. Eun Hee Ji of South Korea made a 20-foot birdie putt on the 72nd hole, finishing off an even-par 71 to win the U.S. Women's Open.

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## Congress must quit immigration futbol

If the U.S. government were run by adults bent on problem-solving, Congress would have passed immigration reform by now.

Instead, Republicans and Democrats constantly play political futbol with the issue. In this game, everyone is losing.

The most obvious losers are 12 million illegal immigrants living in constant fear of deportation or family separation and subject to exploitation. But they aren't the only ones.

Because Republicans and Democrats can't agree on reform, thousands of foreign scientists and engineers leave the country after earning degrees here and have to wait years hoping to return depriving this country of their talent and purchasing power.

Cities and states all over the country are burdened with education, health and police costs associated with illegal immigration. A reform law might provide them with federal impact aid and reduce the flow of undocumented workers — but Congress won't pass

On top of it all, the federal government looks incapable of managing one of its bedrock responsibilities trolling the country's borders.

Leaders of both parties look impotent, the immigration issue gets more fractious by the year and, increasingly, state and local politicians decide they have to (or want to) take over what's plainly a federal responsibility.

Even as they battle each other, both parties are losing, too. By demanding ever harsher enforcement measures, Republicans are kicking away support from Latinos, the nation's fastest-growing demographic group.

And Democrats, by insisting on "comprehensive" reform to appease liberal and Latino activists, are losing the chance to enact incremental changes that might build a consensus for full


It appears increasingly likely that President Barack Obama will fail to enact any reform bill this year despite having an overwhelmingly Democratic Congress.

He repeatedly promised Latino voters in 2008 that he'd push for a comprehensive reform bill in his first year in office, including setting most illegal immigrants on a path to citizenship.

Instead, he put priority on health care, jobs and financial reform — and even announced on Air Force One that Congress probably lacked the "appetite" for immigration reform.

This failure — along with a rate of deportations as high as under President George W. Bush — has cost Obama support among Latinos while gaining him no credit among Republicans for stepped-up enforcement.

And what little chance of passing a bill there was this year may have been blown up by the Justice Department's decision to sue Arizona for passing a law making illegal-alien status a state The



show hosts to denounce federal opposition to popular will.

Republicans were dug in before the lawsuit was filed, insisting that "securing the border" has to precede any other immigration reforms. They'll be under even more pressure now.

In his immigration speech at American University last week, Obama asserted that "the southern border is more secure than at any time in the last 20 years," and "we have more boots on the ground than at any time in our history

The administration has a wealth of data to sustain the claim, but a recent Washington Post/ABC poll still showed that 75 percent of Americans don't believe the government is doing enough to keep illegal immigrants out.

And Republicans are constantly raising their enforcement demands including, building a fence across all 2,000 miles of the southern border. That would not stop the 45 percent of all illegal immigrants who entered the country on legal visas, then overstaved.

Amid the toxic atmosphere, a few reform activists have decided to opt for something less than "comprehensive" reform this year.

Frank Sharry, former director of the National Immigration Forum and founder of America's Voice, proposed last week that Congress pass just the DREAM Act and AgJOBS bill and work on comprehensive reform later.

The DREAM bill (Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors), sponsored by Sens. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., and Dick Lugar, R-Ind., would grant legal status to about 1 million young people brought into the United States illegally as children if they are in college or join the military.

AgJOBS, sponsored by Sens. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., and Lugar, would enable long-standing illegal farm workers - about 1 million, including family members - to gain legal status and would expand femporary worker slots for farm labor.

The idea of incremental reform has been advocated for years by the founder of the National Immigration Forum, Rick Swartz, but it has been resisted and still is - by many activists who demand nothing less than earned legalization for most of the country's 12 million illegal immigrants.

Swartz calls for passage of DREAM, AgJOBS, federal aid to states and local-

ities affected by illegal immigration, "green cards for graduates," expansion of high-skill H1-B visas and some enhanced enforcement as a "down payment" on more expansive reform.

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A Swartz ally, Craig Regelbrugge, cochairman of the Agriculture Coalition for Immigration Reform, told me that "you won't secure the border without dealing with the economic migration piece, especially in agriculture.

As many as 75 percent of U.S. farm laborers may be illegal immigrants and, in normal times, as many as 200,000 people a year enter the U.S. illegally to do farm work.

Immigration reform could provide a regulated entry for temporary labor. Without it, there's every impetus for increasing imports of fruits and vegetables, costing jobs to American citizens in farm-related industries.

There's a slim chance that the DREAM bill - possibly joined with AgJOBS — could come up for a vote in the Senate this year.

Some Democrats want to attach one or both bills as amendments to must-pass legislation this fall and dare Republicans to filibuster, risking charges that they are not only "anti-Hispanic" but "anti-

Other Democrats don't favor the ploy, however, fearing Republicans would seek to add harsh enforcement amend-

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., might try to block Republican amendments by resorting to a parliamentary tactic known as "filling the

A "down payment" bill ought to pass this year. After all, 11 Senate olicans have supported immigration reform in the past. But the bottom line is that nothing at all will pass this year. What about next year?

Republican Conference Chairman Lamar Alexander, Tenn., told me that 2011 should be the year for action both on the nation's debt problem and immigration — but he said that "border security first" would continue to be the GOP mantra.

Obama, presumably, will want to push immigration reform hard next year, if only to repair his standing with Latinos who helped elect him in 2008.

You'd like to think that maybe Republicans and Democrats could act like adults, call a truce and agree to compromise reform legislation gradually leading to legal status for illegal immigrants.

You'd like to think it, but it would be utterly - and sadly - out of character for those in power in Washington, D.C.

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

"Most that I talked to felt satisfied with what they accomplished," Weaver said.


Not to rest on their laurels, however, Weaver said that he and the Chamber are already looking forward to next

DEAR ART: Trying to parent one's parents long distance can be frustrating and emotionally draining. Part of the problem may be that when people in their golden years begin to slow down, they often don't re-

alize that it's happening. Please impress upon your father that when your mother falls there may be a reason for it that goes beyond being "clumsy." She may have suffered a small stroke or have an inner ear imbalance and need to be seen by a doctor. Also, when older people fall they can crack a bone, and being lifted by someone other than a professional can cause further injury.

These days there are more "sharks" swimming around out there than ever, poised to take advantage of the gullible and the vulnerable. If you suspect that someone has been asking your parents for information about their personal finances, the police should be informed. Also, if you feel they need protection, then it's time to involve a social worker to help them. Your local Area Agency on Aging or state department of health can guide you.

DEAR ABBY: Many years ago I made a conscious and deliberate decision to leave the dating scene. Whenever I tell a woman I'm not interested or have made other plans, she becomes upset and angry with me. I try to be tactful and diplomatic with women, but it invariably results in acrimonious behavior toward me. I am exasperated with the situation. What's your advice? - NICE GUY IN NEW **JERSEY** 

DEAR NICE GUY: Of course when a woman hears that you're "not interested" she will be offended. A compliment it's not! And a woman who becomes upset and angry if you say you have other plans isn't someone you would want to be involved with anyway. Next time try this: "I'm sorry, but I'm NOT AVAIL-ABLE." It's the truth vou're not!

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## Spain beats Netherlands 1-0 for first Cup

JOHANNESBURG (AP) — They kissed and hugged and held high the golden trophy for all of Soccer games decided by one City and Africa and the goal, Spain always found world to see. The exhaus- a way. tion was gone now for Spain's players, replaced by the exhilaration of winning the World Cup at long, long last.

A testy and often dirty match was won by Andres Iniesta's goal late in extra time Sunday night. The 1-0 victory over the Netherlands before a shivering crowd at Soccer City Stadium gave Spain its first World Cup, and put the European champion Spaniards in elite company

"I remember (Italy captain Fabio) Cannavaro told me that being world champion doesn't happen every day," captain Iker Casillas said. "This really is quite a cup. The European Championship was the most important moment of our lives, but today is much bigger than anything else." For years, Spain has

been a disappointment in the biggest tournaments. Now, it has joined West Germany and France as the only nations to hold the world and European titles at the same time.

It took four straight 1-0 wins the Spaniards scored eight goals, an all-time low for a World Cup champion and the heroics of Iniesta and Casillas to reach the pinnacle so often predicted

for Spain and never before reached. In the tightest World Cup ever, with 31

"We have all done an incredible job," Iniesta said. "I don't think we even realize what we have done.

Well, maybe a little.

The winners struggled but managed to lift their coach, Vicente del Bosque, in the air in celebration.

"We owe this to the 23 players. We've had 50 days without any incident, it makes you proud to be with these players."

Then the players made a quick costume change from their sweat-soaked blue jerseys into their traditional red ones.

Casillas accepted the trophy from FIFA president Sepp Blatter, who was bundled in a scarf because temperatures dipped into the 40s on this chilly winter's night in the Southern Hemisphere.

Casillas, voted the World Cup's top goalkeeper, smooched the distinctive gold award and raised it for all to see while cameras flashed and confetti flew throughout the still-full stadium.

Soon, the entire team and staff gathered at midfield for a group photo. The players bounced up and down to the World Cup theme song, then took a victory lap as the trophy was passed to each mem-

ber of the squad. "It's the most beautiful that there is. It's spectacular," Iniesta said.

The game was anything but spectacular the entire tournament was like that and Spain's victory was marred by a pair of bombings in the East African nation of Uganda. Explosions ripped through crowds watching the game in two places in Uganda's capital late Sunday, killing 64 people, police said. One American was killed and several were wounded. Police feared an al-Qaida-linked Somali militant group was behind the attacks.

The final was a physical test of attrition that sometimes turned filthy a finals-record 14 yellow cards were handed out and the Dutch finished with 10 men. In the end, it was Iniesta breaking free in the penalty area, taking a pass from Cesc Fabregas and putting a right-footed shot from 8 yards just past the outstretched arms of goalkeeper Maarten Stekelenburg with about seven minutes left to play, including injury time.

"When I struck it, it just had to go in," Iniesta said.
