DSHS giving free vaccines tomorrow

The Texas Department of State Health Services will be giving free vaccines from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. tomorrow at the Harvest House, 736 S. Cuyler, in Pampa tomorrow

The DSHS will offer the standard lineup of childhood inoculations, including MMR (measles, mumps and rubella), varicella, DTaP (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis), polio and Hepatitis B.

The vaccines are offered to ensure that, per state mandate, there are no barriers for kids to get the vaccines. Children and youths (from birth to age 18) are eligible for the free shots if they have insurance that does not pay for the vaccines, if they have no insurance, if they are on VACCINES cont. on page 3





PECOS (AP) — Bill White's got the monogrammed cowboy boots, the worn jeans and the ability to appear at ease connecting with Texans he doesn't know but dearly needs in his race to be governor.

The campaign crisis this day, though, is the hat. Actually, the lack of one.

The Democrat's usual cap is forgotten at home in Houston, 500 miles to the east, and the fair-skinned and formerly red-haired White needs something to protect his nearly bald head from hours of unforgiving West Texas sun.

So White forgoes a hat and borrows sunblock to continue his bid for governor by breaking into a run through the streets of Pecos, a legendary Wild West frontier town on the edge of the Chihuahuan Desert.

The results of the greater run - his political marathon to keep incumbent Republican Gov. Rick Perry from a third full term - won't be known until Texans vote in November.

"We don't have too many politicians visit Fort Stockton," businessman Pete Terrazas, 82, says of White's breakfast stop at the Steak House Restaurant in the town along Interstate 10 midway between San Antonio and El Paso. "He's listening to little people.

Texas hasn't had a Democratic governor since George W. Bush defeated Ann Richards in 1994, and state government is fully in Republican hands, so White is expected to have a hard time defeating incumbent Rick Perry.

White, though, is hopeful.

Bank regulation bill has 60 votes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Conservative Democratic Sen. Ben Nelson of Nebraska says he will vote for the overhaul of banking regulations. His support ensures the legislation has 60 votes to clear the Senate.

Nelson had voiced concerns earlier, leaving the timing of the bill uncertain.

His support means 57 Democrats and three 5:30 P.M. Republicans in the Senate are in line to vote for the sweeping legislation, thus overcoming a filibuster. 7:00 P.M. Senate majority Leader Harry Reid said he wants to complete the bill this week.

The House already passed the bill. Senate approval Friday, August 13 would send the bill to President Barack Obama for his signature.

The 2,300-page bill aims to address regulatory weaknesses blamed for the 2008 financial crisis that fueled the worst recession since the Great Depression.

Lew nominated as budget head

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama has nominated Deputy Secretary of State Jacob Lew to serve as his budget director, putting him in charge of a \$1 trillion-plus deficit that's a burden for the economy.

Appearing at the White House, Obama saluted Lew as "somebody who has proven himself already equal to this extraordinary task." He said that if there were a "hall of fame for budget directors," Lew would have earned a place in it for his service as budget director toward the end of the Clinton administration.

If confirmed by the Senate, Lew would serve as director of the Office of Management and Budget.

\$4 million in rain damages

LUBBOCK (AP) — Lubbock County officials say days of rainfall over the Fourth of July weekend caused about \$4 million in damages.

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported Tuesday that the estimate includes damages to roads, infrastructure and to 230 homes inside the city limits.

County and city officials will use their damage report to apply for state and federal aid.

The region's deluge came from the remnants of Hurricane Alex.

A National Weather Service official told the paper that Lubbock rainfall through Sunday - 7.37 inches - is a record for the month of July already. The previous record came in 1976 when the city got 7.20 inches.

HOUSTON (AP) - U.S. Coast Guard officials say test results have confirmed tar balls from the massive Gulf oil spill have been found on a second Texas beach.

Chief Warrant Officer Lionel Bryant said Tuesday that tar balls found on a Galveston beach last week are from the ruptured BP-operated Deepwater Horizon oil well

Tar balls located July 5 on McFaddin Beach, a stretch of coast east of Bolivar Peninsula, were the first confirmation that crude from the massive BP oil spill had

"We've always really had a lot of interest in the teen category," Kemph said. "We're hoping that this year can help spike interest in bringing it back all the way."





Another rig moved from Gulf

HOUSTON (AP) - Diamond Offshore Drilling has pulled another rig out of the Gulf of Mexico due to the deepwater petroleum drilling moratorium.

The Houston-based company said that it has ordered the Ocean Confidence rig to the Republic of Congo. The rig departed the Gulf over the weekend.

Diamond Offshore said it rewrote a drilling contract with Murphy Exploration and Production Co. Its current contract with Murphy was changed to a one-year commitment in the Gulf that will begin when Murphy is confident it can get permits to drill.

In exchange, the companies signed a new agreement to drill off the coast of the Republic of Congo.

Last week, Diamond Offshore said it was moving another Gulf rig to Egypt.

Dead man an Aussie fugitive?

SAN ANGELO (AP) - DNA testing will help determine if a person who died in 2005 in San Angelo was the man sought in a 1970 attack in Australia that left his pregnant wife and three children dead.

San Angelo police on Tuesday said facial recognition experts compared photos of fugitive Elmer Crawford with snapshots of the unidentified man who died. The experts concluded the man who died, after an apparent heart attack while in a store, "is almost certainly" Crawford.

Authorities in Australia are attempting to locate a surviving relative of Crawford's for DNA comparison. Police say a 1971 coroner's inquest found Crawford

guilty of the quadruple slayings in Melbourne. Detectives say the man who died in the west Texas

city had four different pieces of identification. His fingerprints were worn smooth.

Yanks owner Steinbrenner dies

NEW YORK (AP) - George Steinbrenner, who rebuilt the New York Yankees into a sports empire with a mix of bluster and big bucks that polarized fans all across America, died Tuesday. He had just celebrated his 80th birthday July 4.

Steinbrenner had a heart attack, was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Tampa, Fla., and died at about 6:30 a.m, a person close to the owner told The Associated Press. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the team had not disclosed those details.

His death on the day of the All-Star game was the second in three days to rock the Yankees. Bob Sheppard, the team's revered public address announcer from 1951-07, died Sunday at 99.

"He was an incredible and charitable man," his family said in a statement. "He was a visionary and a giant in the world of sports. He took a great but struggling franchise and turned it into a champion again.

Solid rise in exports, but trade gap widens

- The trade deficit rose in May to an 18-month peak as rising imports offset another solid gain in U.S. exports. The surge in imports was a hopeful sign for the economic recovery because it suggested U.S. consumers could spend more in coming months.

deficit The trade increased 4.8 percent to \$42.3 billion, the largest gap since November 2008, the Commerce Department said Tuesday.

U.S. exports of goods and services rose 2.4 percent in May to \$152.3 billion. It was the largest monthly total since September 2008 the

WASHINGTON (AP) ture and electronic appliances. The surge came even though oil imports declined 9.1 percent as both the price and the volume of oil shipments declined.

Economists said the widening trade deficit would likely reduce overall growth, as measured by the gross domestic product, in the April-to-June quarter. But in the long run, analysts hold out hope that the gains in both exports and imports point to higher business investment and consumer spending.

"This will certainly prove supportive to economic growth in the months to come." Martin Schwerdtfeger, an economist at TD Economics, wrote in a research note. Through May, the U.S. trade deficit is running at an annual rate of \$474.8 billion, up by 26.6 percent from \$374.9 billion deficit for all of 2009. That had been the lowest annual trade gap since 2001, another year when the country was in recession. The wider trade gap in

May was a surprise to analysts, who had expected the deficit to decline slightly because of the fall in oil imports.

American manufacturing has been a standout performer during the recovery, benefiting from a global rebound. Those gains risk being diminished by the European debt crisis, which has slowed growth in Europe and raised the value of the dollar 14 percent this year versus the euro. A stronger dollar against the euro makes U.S. goods costlier and less competitive in Europe.

The deficit with the European Union rose 7.5 percent to \$6.2 billion as

imports rose 3.2 percent,

10.2 percent from the same period a year ago. That deficit is putting pressure on the Obama administration and Congress to adopt a tougher stance in trade

disputes with China. "The widening trade deficit is not only an alarming trend, but also represents wealth and jobs heading overseas," said Scott Paul, executive director of the Alliance for American Manufacturing, who called on Congress to pass legislation to impose trade sanctions on China for its currency policies.

oil ban survives

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rebuffed twice by the courts, the Obama administration is taking another crack at a moratorium on deep-water drilling, stressing new evidence of safety concerns and no longer basing the moratorium on water depth. But those who challenge the latest ban question whether it complies with a judge's ruling tossing out the first one.

The new order does not appear to deviate much from the original moratorium, as it still targets deep-water drilling operators but defines them in a different way.

Last week, a federal appeals court rejected the government's effort to restore its initial offshore deep-water drilling moratorium, which was issued following the catastrophic Gulf oil spill in April. The moratorium was first blocked last month by U.S. District Judge Martin Feldman.

Government lawyers on Monday evening asked the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans to lift its order barring the moratorium because the new plan had been filed.


Lawyers also filed papers in U.S. District Court arguing that lawsuits brought by oilfield service companies seeking to block the original moratorium should be dismissed, given the terms of the new moratorium order.

Carl Rosenblum, a lawyer for the plaintiffs who sued to block the moratorium, said they are reviewing the new moratorium and "we have substantial concerns about its consistency with Judge Feldman's order." He wouldn't elaborate or say if they planned to challenge it in court.

Todd Hornbeck, CEO of the Covington, La.-based Hornbeck Offshore Services, said the companies that sued to block the original moratorium are weighing "all options" in the aftermath of the government's filing. Hornbeck said the companies aren't bound by the Justice Department's assertion that the plaintiffs would have to file a separate lawsuit to challenge the new moratorium.

"That's their view," he said Tuesday. "We're trying to figure out what we're going to do."

Interior Secretary Ken Salazar said he decided to put in place a new moratorium because of "evidence that grows every day of the industry's inability in the deep water to contain a catastrophic blowout, respond to an oil spill and to operate safely.



Lott and Czubinski played for the Division II


