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Sunday afternoon fire demolishes local home

Tragedy struck over the weekend for a Pampa family when their home and all of their belongings were destroyed by a Sunday afternoon fire.

The Pampa Fire Department responded to the fire at 330 N. Wells at 11:28 a.m. The house was being rented by Janna Sims and her two sons, aged 16 and 3.

Firefighters fought the blaze for over four hours, finally containing the flames at approximately 3:30 p.m., according to Pampa Fire Marshal Michael Ryan. There were no injuries, but the fire left the house a burnt-out, empty husk

It was a big fire," said Ryan. "It was an old house, a heavy fuel load. It was a

Ryan said that the cause of the fire is still

under investigation, with representatives from the State Fire Marshal's Office coming in later today

"From our preliminary investigation, the cause looks to be accidental," Ryan added. There are no signs of arson.

The Pampa Fire Department, Ryan said,

performed well in containing the fire given the circumstances *Considering the conditions — over 100

degree heat, the size of the residence and the number of people we had on duty they did an outstanding job," Ryan said. "There were some houses close by, so for them to make sure that fire didn't spread, they did real good.

"Everybody chipped in and helped out," Ryan added. "We had DPS troopers blocking traffic, (along with) Sheriff's Deputies and Pampa PD. It could have

"I was going to go through nursing school at WT," he said, "but


decided I didn't want to do that." He wanted more excitement and to make more of an impact on people's lives.

"I decided to go through paramedic school," Waggoner said. He went through Amarillo College and graduated from there.


Waggoner moved to Amarillo in 1993. "I worked at Amarillo Medical Services for five years," he said.

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




Permanent spill fix coming?

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NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Engineers will start shoving mud and maybe cement into the blown-out oil well in the Gulf of Mexico on Tuesday in what could be one of the final steps to plug it for good, BP said Monday.

BP PLC Senior Vice President Kent Wells said crews will likely start the so-called "static kill" attempt Tuesday if tests Monday determine the well can withstand the mud

There's no guarantee of success, and BP PLC engineers still plan to follow up the static kill days later by sending a stream of mud and cement into the bottom of the mile-deep underground reservoir through a relief well they've been digging for months.

GRAPEVINE (AP) — About 60 people attended the dedication of a granite memorial for the victims of the Delta Air Lines Flight 191 crash at Dallas-Fort Worth come. International Airport.

Surviving flight crew members, first responders and family attended the ceremony on Monday, which is the 25th anniversary of the fiery jumbo jet crash.

UT vice president for legal affairs Pitt Ohlendorf says the school believes its admission system is within U.S. Supreme Court guidelines.

Gulf's dead zone one of largest

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Scientists say this year that the "dead zone" area that forms every summer in the Gulf of Mexico is one of the largest ever measured.

The large area of low oxygen that chokes marine life comes in addition to the massive BP oil spill.

Microbes that eat the oil can deplete oxygen in the water. But the researchers who measure the dead zone couldn't say there is a connection between the spill and the dead zone's size.

They say the dead zone is roughly the size of Massachusetts, or at least 7,722 square miles. The largest ever measured was just over 8,000 square miles in 2001.

The dead zone forms every year when bacteria feeds on algae blooms and uses up oxygen. The blooms are caused by the nutrient-rich waters from rivers that carry farm and urban runoff into the Gulf.

Baywatch's Anderson lifeguards dogs

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — About 50 dogs, some of them abandoned by owners after the BP oil spill are on their way to new homes in Virginia, courtesy of an animal welfare group and actress Pamela Anderson.

Anderson, the honorary chairman of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, was among those walking the dogs at a news conference Monday at New Orleans' City Park.

Since the April 20 accident that sent millions of gallons of oil spilling into the Gulf, some southeast Louisiana animal shelters have reported large increases in the number of pets brought in. Many are brought in by people who have lost jobs or income because of the spill.

The shelter in coastal St. Bernard Parish reported 117 animals brought in in June, up from 17 in June 2009.

Indonesian parliament gets porn

JAKARTA, Indonesia - Indonesian lawmakers and journalists got a shock when an online porn video blazed across dozens of computer monitors outside the press room at Parliament. Witnesses say it took security guards 10 minutes to shut

down the computers Monday. The touch-screen monitors are used by visitors to check the Parliament agenda and other political activities.

House Secretary-General Nining Indra said the unwanted interruption was probably caused by someone trying to access a porn site on the computer system.

She said officials would use close circuit TV footage to

That can be a pretty hectic schedule, he admitted, especially since he's married with two children, a three-year-old boy and a two-year-old girl.



Today in History

Today is Monday, Aug. 2, the 214th day of 2010. There are 151 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Aug. 2, 1990, Iraq invaded Kuwait, seizing control of the oil-rich emirate. (The Iraqis were later driven out in Operation Desert Storm.)

On this date:

In 1610, during his fourth voyage to the Western Hemisphere, English explorer Henry Hudson sailed into what is now known as Hudson Bay.

In 1776, members of the Continental Congress began attaching their signatures to the Declaration of Independence.

In 1876, frontiersman "Wild Bill" Hickok was shot and killed while playing poker at a saloon in Deadwood, Dakota Territory by Jack McCall, who was later hanged.

In 1909, the original Lincoln "wheat" penny first went into circulation, replacing the "Indian Head"

In 1923, the 29th president of the United States, Warren G. Harding, died in San Francisco; Vice President Calvin Coolidge became president.

In 1934, German President Paul von Hindenburg died, paving the way for Adolf Hitler's complete takeover.

In 1943, during World War II, Navy boat PT-109, commanded by Lt. John F. Kennedy, sank after being rammed by the Japanese destroyer Amagiri off the Solomon Islands.

In 1974, former White House counsel John W. Dean III was sentenced to one to four years in prison for obstruction of justice in the Watergate coverup. (Dean ended up serving four months.)

In 1980, 85 people were killed when a bomb exploded at the train station in Bologna, Italy.

In 1985, 135 people were killed when a Delta Air Lines jetliner crashed while attempting to land at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

Ten years ago: Republicans awarded Texas Gov. George W. Bush their 2000 presidential nomination at the party's convention in Philadelphia and ratified Dick Cheney as his running mate. Former President Gerald R. Ford was hospitalized after suffering one, possibly two, small strokes. President Bill Clinton postponed the scheduled execution of Juan Raul Garza, a Texas drug kingpin and murderer (Garza was executed in June 2001).

Five years ago: An Air France jetliner from Paris skidded off a runway at Toronto's Pearson International Airport and burst into flames; all 309 people aboard survived. President George W. Bush signed a free trade pact with five Central American nations and the Dominican Republic. American freelance journalist Steven Vincent was found shot to death in Basra, Iraq, after being abducted by armed men

One year ago: A mystery from the 1991 Gulf War was finally solved as the Pentagon announced that the remains of missing Navy pilot Michael "Scott" Speicher (SPY'-kur) had been found. Catriona Matthew won the Women's British Open for her first major title, beating Karrie Webb by three

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Hope exists for immigration 'down payment'

There's not a prayer that comprehensive immigration reform will pass Congress this year, but there's a slim one that a smaller "down payment" measure might. And it should.

Many of the nation's most important Latino groups, plus Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., are now pushing passage of a package to legalize undocumented workers in the farm industry and young people going to college or the military.

What's needed now is some concerted leadership - from President Barack Obama, from Republican presidential wannabes (and maybe former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush) and business groups - plus some gumption (and simple humanity) on the part of GOP senators who have supported immigration reform in the past.

The problem, of course, is lock step GOP opposition to anything Democrats want to do — plus a political atmosphere inflamed by Arizona's effort to sic its police on illegal immigrants.

Republicans are fixed on a "border security first" immigration strategy, while "down payment" involves legalizing the status of about 2 million undocumented immigrants.

There's also resistance in the Congressional Hispanic Caucus, many of whose leaders fear that passing an agriculture bill now will pull a key group — the grower lobby — out of the campaign for comprehensive immigration reform.

There's also fear that Republicans will try to attach harsh enforcement provisions to any "down

payment" bill. Still, it's worth the effort. "A small, good deal is better than no deal at all," says Antonio Gonzalez, president of the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project and a convenor of the National Latino Congreso, a coalition of major Hispanic groups.

"We want comprehensive reform, but right now we need a lifeboat," he told me. "We need to take care of the people we can."

The National Latino Congreso includes the League of United Latin American Citizens and the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

The "down payment" strategy also has been endorsed by a huge coalition of groups organized as Reform Immigration for America, which includes the National Council of La Raza and the National Immigra tion Forum.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., may be interested in pushing only the Develop ment, Relief n d Educa tion for Alien Minors Act, but Feinstein wants the **AgJOBS MORTON** bill, too. **KONDRAKE**

Her staff

counts no more than 56 votes for either measure separately but thinks the farm lobby can pull in enough Republicans to get to 60 for the two measures as a package.

The DREAM Act, cosponsored by Sens. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., and Dick Lugar, R-Ind., would offer legal status to young people brought to the U.S. illegally as children if they go to college for two years or join the military.

AgJOBS, sponsored by Feinstein and Lugar, would offer legal status (a "blue card") to workers with two years' experience in agriculture, and to their families, if they agreed to stay in farm work for another two years.

Each of the measures would legalize about 1 million of the 12 million undocumented people in the United States.

As policy matters, both measures make eminent sense. It's pure madness that the nation is denied the service of illegal immigrants who want to join the military

And it's a waste of human talent — and simple cruelty to depress the life chances of young people because their parents brought them

to the U.S. illegally Meantime, up to 75 percent of the people working on farms in the United States — particularly picking fruits and vegetables are here illegally. It's hot, back-breaking, low-wage work that American citizens almost certainly won't

The AgJOBS bill also would create a channel for foreign farmworkers to enter the United States temporarily. About 200,000 now enter illegally each — and many stay because border enforcement has stiffened.

According to grower organizations, without adequate labor, crops are rotting, farms are closing down and food imports are increasing, costing jobs in farm-related industries.

In the late 1940s and 1950s, when the nation invited temporary farm workers through the bracero program, illegal immigration plummeted. Then it surged when the program was canceled in 1960 owing to union opposition.

In 2004, an AgJOBS bill

had 12 Republicans among its 62 co-sponsors, including Sens. Mitch McConnell (Ky.), Orrin Hatch (Utah), Thad Cochran (Miss.) and John Ensign (Nev.).

This year's bill has only one Republican, Lugar, although there are 11 Republicans in the Senate who have voted for immigration reform in the past. They include retiring Senators such as Judd Gregg (N.H.), George Voinovich (Ohio), Bob Bennett (Utah) and Sam Brownback (Kan.), plus John McCain (Ariz.), Lindsey Graham (S.C.), Susan Collins (Maine), Olympia Snowe (Maine) and Lisa Murkowski (Alaska).

The business community not only agribusiness, but the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the Business Roundtable and high-tech industries — ought to lobby Republicans to make a down payment on wider reform that might include

more H-1B visas for highskilled workers and green cards for science graduates.

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Republican presidential candidates have an interest in getting the divisive immigration issue "off the table" for 2012 and stopping the party's hemorrhage of Hispanic voters. So do party luminaries such as Jeb Bush.

Obama ought to be in the lead working on legislative strategy - partly to repair his own reputation with Latinos disappointed at his failure to push comprehensive reform.

The "down payment" strategy will hardly fix America's broken immigration system, but it's a step in the right direction.

Both teams will play their first season in back, practiced his passes on the field. The 3A after the UIL realignment in February.





ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP)
— Seven of the Angels'
final 14 regular-season
games are against the Texas
Rangers, who lead them by
eight games in the AL West
and are on the verge of
ending Los Angeles' run of

three straight division titles.
What happens over the next six weeks will determine whether those last two weeks will mean anything in baseball's most lopsided

race.

Jered Weaver outpitched Cliff Lee with seven sharp innings in a matchup of the AL's strikeout and ERA leaders, and the Angels took the rubber game of the series with a 4-1 victory over the Rangers on Sunday.

"Every game against those guys is important, and every game for us here on out is important," Weaver said. "This is the first time since I've been here that we've been in this kind of deficit. But we've got guys in this clubhouse that know how to take care of business and know what it takes to win an AL West champion-ship."

The Angels have won eight division titles in their 50-year history — five in the past six years — but have never erased a deficit of more than 5½ games to do so.

"I don't think there's anybody in here who's giving up. I'm certainly not," Weaver added. "That's not why we play this game. We play this game to win, and everybody knows it.

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
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
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
