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
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Pampa man facing federal counterfeiting charges

A Pampa man is facing up to five years in prison and a hefty fine later this month after pleading guilty to counterfeiting charges in U.S. District Court in Lubbock.

Matthew Gilbert Maul, 39, of Pampa, pleaded guilty Thursday to federal counterfeiting charges. He is expected to be sentenced later this month.

Maul admitted in court that he and three others passed counterfeit money at Lubbock businesses. The counterfeit money was created on a printer at local hotels, according to court records.

He could be sentenced to up to five years in prison and fined up to \$250,000. He is also to pay a \$100 mandatory court assess-

As part of the plea agreement, Maul agreed to testify about his part in a counterfeiting ring.

Maul was indicted, with Jaylana Darlene Sain, Angel Mario Garza Jr. and Ashley Deshawn Griffith, by a federal grand jury May, 2010, in Lubbock for conspiracy to manufacture, possess and pass counterfeit cur-

According to accusations made in the indictment, Maul and Griffith made and passed one counterfeit \$100 bill on July 6,

In total, the four were accused of manufacturing and passing four \$100 bills in early July, 2009.

Kathy Colvin with the U.S. Attorney's Office in Dallas said Maul and Griffith pleaded guilty. The trial for Sain and Garza is set for Aug. 16.

According to the indictment, Maul, Sain and Griffith printed counterfeit currency with an all-in-one printer in various hotel rooms that Sain had rented. On one occasion, Garza rented a hotel room using a false identity

Federal investigators accused Garza, Griffith and Maul of passing the counterfeit money.

Officers said the four would make a small purchase using a counterfeit \$100 bill and received genuine currency in change.

Authorities said in court documents that the three would return the change from

Vandalism leaves mess of Super Playground

Pampa police are currently investigating an apparent substantial vandalism case at the Super Playground in Central Park, according to Pampa PD Crime Prevention Officer Stormy McCullar.

The police responded to a call about the playground being in rough shape at noon on Monday. Officers arrived at the playground to find several of its features damaged.


playground fences, as well as damage to stairway boards, a post, the backhoe toy and one of the dice There is currently no estimate on the total dam-

age to the playground. McCullar said that the playground is currently closed until further notice as a safety precaution. "It's just terrible," said McCullar. "This is a place

that our kids go to play. For somebody to do that (to the Super Playground) is just ridiculous.' McCullar said that the police suspect the vandal-

ism was a weekend job. "It had to have happened sometime after 5 (p.m.) on Friday and Monday morning," McCullar said. "Probably late at night."

The incident is the second such occurrence of vandalism around Central Park in the last few



weeks; many tee boxes at the park's disc golf course were also vandalized within the last few weeks, just before this past weekend's inaugural disc golf tournament.

It's also, according to McCullar, becoming an unfortunate recurrence at or around the playground. "We've had previous reports of criminal mischief there," she said. "We had one bad issue that happened a while back. There used to be a rubber VANDALISM cont. on page 5

Xcel elevates Energy Alert until 7 p.m.

AMARILLO - In the wake of an unplanned generation outage, Xcel Energy has declared an Energy Alert in its Texas and New Mexico service territory and is urging customers to cut back on their use of electricity. The alert is in effect until 7 p.m.

Xcel Energy declares an Energy Alert only when a reduction in electricity use is urgently needed to maintain the electricity system and service to customers.

We are making a public appeal to our customers to turn off lights and appliances unless it would harm their health," said Riley Hill, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company. "For example, elderly people or people who have health concerns should NOT turn off their air conditioners.'

Suggestions on how reduce electric load include:

• Either turn off air conditioning or increase your thermostat setting to 85 degrees, slowly lowering the setting after 7 p.m. to a more comfortable setting. This does not apply to customers who depend on air conditioning for health reasons. · Put off household chores that involve electrical

appliances until after 7 p.m. (dishwashers, washing machines, clothes dryers, vacuum cleaners, etc.) · Put off tasks at work, if possible, that would de-

mand electricity (power tools, maintenance equip-

• Turn off televisions and electronic equipment unless they are necessary to conduct business or to ensure your health and safety.

· Turn off unnecessary lighting, leaving on only enough to move about safely indoors.

Xcel Energy forecasts indicate that, unless customers cut back on use, electricity demand will exceed the amount of electricity the company will be able to supply from its own power plants and by purchases from other utilities. Failure to reduce electricity demand could result in controlled outages within the region.


Xcel Energy officials declared the Energy Alert only after all other efforts to reduce electricity demand or to increase supply were implemented. Those include:

• Bringing on line as many power plant generating units as possible and buying as much electricity as possible from other utilities.

· Reducing electricity use as much as possible at Xcel Energy power plants and office buildings.

· Interrupting power to industrial and agricultural customers who signed up for lower interruptible

· Asking other commercial and industrial customers to curtail their energy use.



Only one quarter of Gulf oil left

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal scientists say about one-quarter of the BP oil that spilled out of its broken well remains.

A new government report says nearly three-quarters of the oil — more than 152 million gallons — has either been collected at the well by BP's cap, burned, skimmed, chemically dispersed, naturally deteriorated, evaporated or dissolved.

That leaves about 53.5 million gallons in the gulf. The amount remaining - or washed up on the shore - still is more than four times the size of the 1989 Exxon Valdez spill.

Federal officials say about a quarter of the oil evaporated or dissolved in the warm gulf waters, the same way sugar dissolves in water. Another one-sixth naturally dispersed, because of the way it leaked from the well. Another one-sixth was burned, skimmed or dispersed using controversial chemicals.

Texas accuses BP of poor operations

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas environmental regulators are accusing BP of showing a pattern of "poor operation and maintenance practices" at its Texas City refinery, the same plant where a 2005 explosion killed 15 workers.

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The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality made the accusation after investigating an incident at the refinery that led to a nearly 40 day release of toxic and cancer-causing chemicals. The commission's findings were passed along to the state attorney general on July 23.

The release began April 6, days before a BP-operated rig blew up in the Gulf of Mexico. BP did not immediately comment Wednesday.

A lawsuit filed Tuesday seeks \$10 billion in damages for the same incident. The lawsuit says BP's release exposed people to toxic and cancer-causing chemicals.

Hurricane's effect on oil unclear

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) — Colorado State University forecasters say a hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico could affect the direction of the oil spill, but they say little is known about the interaction between storms and oil.

Forecasters Phil Klotzbach and William Gray said Wednesday if a hurricane goes west of the spill, the storm's counter-clockwise flow could push some of the oil to the U.S. coast. A storm east of the spill could send the oil farther offshore.

They made similar projections in June.

The forecast they released Wednesday calls for 10 Atlantic hurricanes this season, five of them major. That's also unchanged from their June forecast.

Klotzbach and Gray say they expect this year's season to be more active than average.

Storm junk becomes folk art

SABINE PASS (AP) — Junk from Hurricane Ike has become folk art in a Texas community still recovering nearly two years after the storm.

Michael "Cappy" Deslatte of Sabine Pass collected storm debris and started a collection of tongue-in-cheek creations in his front yard.

The 51-year-old tug boat captain and fisherman says he took a break after Ike made landfall, in Galveston, on Sept. 13, 2008. Deslatte says he "had too much time on my hands" and began cruising for interesting debris

The Beaumont Enterprise reported Wednesday that his creations include an election sign urging voters to choose Godzilla for a county job. A stuffed bear guides a personal

Friends have been leaving junk on his doorstep in an effort to bolster the eccentric art display.

Levee project saves trees

DALLAS (AP) — Thousands of trees will remain as part of the Trinity River levee project that eventually could lead to a sprawling park in the Dallas area.

A decision by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has spared nearly 4,000 trees.

The corps last year decided the levees were unacceptable for basic flood protection and told Dallas to remove all trees within 50 feet of the toe of the levces. City officials argued against removal of so many trees.

The Dallas Morning News reported Wednesday that a compromise means the corps agreed to reduce the distance to 15 feet, meaning only about 180 trees face removal.

Assistant City Manager Jill Jordan said Tuesday, at a meeting of the city council's Trinity project committee, that the argument "went all the way to (corps) headquarters."

Comment on license plates online

AUSTIN (AP) — Fans and foes of the Dallas Cowboys and the Houston Texans can comment on proposed specialty license plates recognizing the NFL teams.

The public comment period runs through the end of the business day Tuesday on the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles Web site.

The plates include two new full-color designs for the Cowboys, and one each for the Texans and soccer's Houston Dynamo. NASCAR has three proposed designs for Texas.

New license plates are proposed recognizing Texas Tech, the University of Texas at San Antonio and Baylor.

The Texas Trophy Hunters Association design is black

and features a skull. The new designs could be available by October via myplates.com, at a one-year cost ranging from \$55 to \$195.

No more parasailing for donkey

MOSCOW - The parasailing donkey will never fly again and can look ahead to a life of luxury.

The female donkey Anapka arrived in Moscow on Wednesday after her brays of terror over a southern Russian beach last month prompted a British newspaper to step in

and buy her. A recreation company had sent Anapka up into the sky for about 30 minutes for a promotional stunt and the YouTube video of her trip made headlines around the world. Upset readers of the The Sun had urged the newspaper to rescue her.

"Our readers were deeply moved," Sun correspondent Garry O'Shea told the Associated Press. "We were contacted by thousands of readers. They wanted us to ensure the well-being of this animal."

Anapka traveled from her small town by the Azov Sea to the Kremlin riding school outside Moscow, where her arrival was filmed by news cameras. The donkey was quickly surrounded by reporters and onlookers eager to stroke her.



Democrats attack GOP on Tea Party link

WASHINGTON — With their poll numbers plunging in a jobless recovery, skyrocketing budget deficits, an unpopular health care plan, and their majority teetering on the edge of defeat, Democrats have switched to a novel election strategy: attack the Republicans.

In a campaign strategy that comes directly from the White House high command, Democrats are ditching President Obama's 2008 campaign promise of political reconciliation and attempting to smear the GOP by tying it to the Tea Party movement.


announced The decision, Wednesday by Democratic National Committee Chairman Tim Kaine, has failure and desperation written all over it.

The tea party movement, which is not a party and has no central organization, was born in the fiery debate over the health care bill in the summer of 2009 as thousands of dissident voters showed up at town hall meetings to express their opposition. It grew over time as Obama's budget deficits grew to \$1.4 trillion last year, then to \$1.5 trillion this year. Their common sense response: Enough is enough!

Their chief complaints: The government borrows and spends too much and has gotten too big. The national debt and tax rates have gotten out of control and threaten the country's solvency. Needless agencies and programs should be cut back and some even eliminated. And the Democrats think these people are a threat to the country?

What the White House can't fathom is that many Americans agree with the tea party's message. Listen to what the editors at National Journal's Hotline say about them:

"Many independent voters sympathize with the tea party's broad message of cutting government spending, lower taxes and disaffection with all things Washington. Polls show about one-fourth of voters sympathize with the movement, and nearly all of them say they're planning to vote this fall. The tea party still has a much

est Quinnipiac poll." But Obama's top political strategists have poll tested a variety of their own issues and found them wanting.

They can't run on the Republicans blocking their agenda. It was passed by Democrats on party-line votes, and voters are strongly opposed to most of it — from health care, which passed, to cap-and-trade energy taxes, which didn't because the Democrats could not agree on it in the Senate. And a growing number of Democrats in the House now rue the day they supported it.

They can't run on Obama's popularity, because he is unpopular in a number of midterm election battleground states. A recent poll for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch found that Missouri voters disliked the job he was doing by 57 percent to 34 percent. A whopping 63 percent of independent voters disapproved of his performance. Democrats in major battleground races have avoided appearing with him in their campaigns. Ohio Lt. Gov. Lee Fisher, the party's Senate nominee, was nowhere to be seen when Obama made two trips to the state earlier this year, though he appeared briefly with him at a party event last month.

In Texas, Democratic gubernatorial nominee Bill White flatly says he will not appear with the president when he comes to the state next week because it might hurt his candidacy.

They can't run on the success of his economic policies, because his \$800 billion spending stimulus has been a conspicuous failure at worst and mediocre at best. Obama insists the economy is moving "in the right direction" but a majority of voters disagree; after all, the national unem-

ployment rate is nearly 10 percent higher net favorable rating than and in places like Nevada and elsewhere it's hit 14 percent since the both Democrats GOPers, stimulus took effect. 33/31 in the lat-With 15 million Americans unem-

ployed and millions more forced to work part-time, the Democrats cannot talk about the economy with any credibility. So that issue is off the table for them — but not for the Republicans, who will pound the Democrats with it from now until Nov. 2.

So with nothing else to run on, Democratic party leaders are going on the attack, trying to tie Republicans to the tea party activists whom they say are "out of the political mainstream" and made up of radical elements. But if Democrats think that opposing staggering deficits, tax increases in a recession and healthcare mandates that will drive up costs is radical, then which party is really out of the mainstream now?

In fact, Obama and his strategists are now being criticized by some in their own party for abandoning his campaign pledge to tone down divisive rhetoric and seek political reconciliation.

"Rather than being a unifier, Mr. Obama has divided America on the basis of race, class and partisanship," say two pollsters who served former presidents Jimmy Carter and Bill

"Obama has also cynically dividthe country on class lines. He has taken to playing the populist card time and time again," Patrick H. Caddell and Douglas E. Schoen wrote in a blistering op-ed column in Wednesday's Wall Street Journal.

Such criticism comes in the wake of growing complaints by Democrats in Congress that after making them take the political heat back home for supporting Obama's unpopular agenda, the White House is now letting them hang out to dry.

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NWS meteorologist Drillette moves up to Brownsville office

Longtime Amarillo warning coordination meteorologist Steve Drillette has been appointed meteorologist-in-charge of the National Weather Service forecast office in Brownsville, Texas. Drillette replaces Nezette Rydell, who transferred to the forecast office in Denver.

"A meteorologist-in-charge is the front line officer carrying out the National Weather Service's highest calling of protecting lives while helping to mitigate the economic losses during hazardous events," said Bill Proenza, southern regional director of the U.S. National Weather Service. "Steve Drillette, with his experience, leadership and communication skills, will continue to assure the best weather services for the residents of south Texas.

In his new position, Drillette will be responsible for ensuring the residents, and the marine community, receive timely and accurate weather warnings, forecasts and climate information. His responsibilities also

include maintaining close working relationships with partners in the emergency management community and the media, and providing severe weather awareness, preparedness and safety education to the public.

Drillette launched his National Weather Service career as a meteorologist intern at the National Weather Service forecast Office in Amarillo, Texas in 1993. He also served as a service hydrologist in Lubbock (1995-1998) and as a senior forecaster (1998-1999) in the Midland, Texas office. He then returned to Amarillo where he was promoted to the position of warning coordination meteorologist. Prior to joining the National Weather Service, Drillette also worked as a high school science and mathematics teacher and head basketball coach, and broadcast meteorologist.

In addition to his duties with the National Weather Service, Steve has served as a board member for the past 7 years and is the current president of the Amarillo Highland Park School District. He has also served as a board member of Leadership Amarillo and Canyon

and the local chapter of the American Red Cross.

Drillette is a member of the American Meteorological Society, the National Weather Association, the Association of Contingency Planners, and the Texas Floodplain Management Association. He earned a bachelor's degree in meteorology from Texas A & M University in 1983.

"It's been an honor to serve the residents of the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles for the past 11 years," said Drillette. "I will miss the friendly Panhandle people and the many friendships developed over the past

28,000 killed in Mexico violence since '06

MEXICO CITY (AP) President Felipe Calderon said he would consider a debate on legalizing drugs Tuesday as his government announced that more than 28,000 people have been killed in drug violence since he launched a crackdown against cartels in 2006.

Intelligence agency director Guillermo Valdes also said authorities have confiscated about 84,000 weapons and made total cash seizures of \$411 million in U.S. currency and \$26 million worth in pesos (330 million pesos).

Valdes released the statistics during a meeting with Calderon and representatives of business and civic groups, where attendees exploring ways to improve Mexico's anti-drug strategy called on the government to open a debate on legalization.

Calderon said he has taken note of the idea of legally regulating drugs in the past.

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"It's a fundamental debate in which I think, first of all, you must allow a democratic plurality (of

opinions)," he said. "You have to analyze carefully the pros and cons and the key arguments on both sides."

Three former presidents Cesar Gaviria of Colombia,

Ernesto Zedillo of Mexico and Fernando Cardoso of Brazil urged Latin American countries last year to consider legalizing marijuana to undermine a major source of income for cartels. And Mexico's congress also has debated the issue.

But Calderon has so far said he is opposed to the idea.

'I'm not talking just about marijuana," analyst and writer Hector Aguilar Camin said in proposing the debate Tuesday, "rather all drugs in general.

The most recent official toll of the drug war dead came in mid-

June, when the attorney general said 24,800 had died. Valdes did not specify a time frame for the new statistics.

The government does not regularly break down murder statistics, but leading newspapers who kept their own counts say last month was the deadliest yet under Calderon: According to national daily Milenio, 1,234 were killed in July

The Mexican government says most victims were involved in the

Some attendees criticized the government for lacking consistent statistics on the drug war and an effective way to communicate its successes. They also said the government needs to do more to combat the financial arm of organized crime.

"There's no systematic policy for investigating or seizing the assets of organized crime," said Jose Luis Pineyro of Mexico's Autonomous Metropolitan University, "nor a system of locating the properties of organized crime.

Basketball is something that Pampa High School junior Latigo Collins loves. In fact, he's played basketball year round since he was six years old.

Favre and other athletes should be more considerate of teams

Tuesday, legendary quarterback Brett Favre again said he is going to retire. Now whether he sticks to that decision, we will find out if Super Bowl XLV is played in Dallas and Favre hasn't suited up for any of the franchises.

Now, this is a game that Favre has played since the end of the 2007-2008 season. I don't have a problem with him deciding to play or retire, but what I do have a problem with is the timing of his decisions, because they haven't been considerate of his teams.

Let's go back in time when Favre first decided to retire in March 2008. There wasn't anything wrong with that decision, as Favre had a great career, owning all the passing records and winning Super Bowl XXXI. The problem was, a few months later, Favre decided that he made the wrong decision and wanted to come back. However, when that decision was made, the Packers have already gone forward with Aaron Rodgers, who backed up Favre for three seasons, as their quarterback. This led to the

ugly divorce between the Packers and Favre.

Of course, Favre felt like he was the victim. This is something I found pretty childish. Favre had from the day he decided to retire until to July to decide and come back and the Packers would have welcomed him back. The future Hall of Famer did not take advantage of those opportunities. Green Bay had to make a decision, which, short term, didn't work out great but could have long term benefits.

After spending 2008 with the New York Jets, Favre retired again. There was nothing wrong with that decision as he made his decision early enough. In the April 2009 draft, the Jets drafted Mark Sanchez and moved forward. However, Favre decided that he still wasn't done playing and returned to the NFL with the Vikings. Despite what Favre said, this move was clearly to get revenge against the Packers for what happened a year before, but that's another column in itself. Again the problem I have with this decision

is Favre's timing. Favre decided to come back after the Vikings broke training camp. Just like the first retirement, Favre had plenty of time to make a decision and could have made that decision to play in time for training camp. Now as we watched last season, Favre did just fine for not coming to training camp, but should he have different rules than everyone else? His other teammates all reported to training camp, including running back Adrian Peterson who is working on being legendary. Being a Houston Texan fan, I felt bad for ex-Texan Sage Rosenfels last year as he had a decent chance to be the starting quarterback before Favre returned.

Other quarterbacks that ended up in the Hall of Fame that played with Favre had better timing with their decisions. Denver Broncos quarterback John Elway retired in May, plenty of time before training camp. Granted the Broncos knew he was probably retiring before the 1998-1999 season, which is why they drafted Brian Griese in the 1998 draft. Dallas Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman retired in April 2001 and 49ers quarterback Steve Young retired well before the 2000 and 2001 season. Those retirements were due to injury, but both players made their intentions known well before the 2000-2001 season.

To give Favre a break, he isn't the only one that couldn't decide whether to stop playing or not. Michael Jordan retired three times. In 1993, 1999 and 2003. His retirements in 1993 and 1999 happened a month before the season started. Jordan, though, had some different circumstances around those decisions. He was coming off his father's murder in 1993

and in 1999 the NBA was in a lockout. The Wizards definitely didn't expect Jordan to stick around for a long time after he came back in 2001.

Probably the closest case to Favre is Roger Clemens. In 2003, Clemens said he was going to retire at season's end, however he signed with the Houston Astros in 2004, which was something I was excited about. That excitement would fade quickly. After the 2005 season, Clemens spent seven months trying to decide whether to come back or retire. About halfway through the 2006 season Clemens decided to return. Granted his return helped the Astros to nearly grab a third consecutive berth in the playoffs. If Clemens would have come back in March and played the first three months of the season, Houston might have easily clinched a playoff berth. The Rocket played the same game again after the 2007 season, but signed with the Yankees a couple months into the season. At first, as an Astro fan I was upset by this. After some time,

I was actually glad he left because the Astros didn't have to deal with that headache again. The

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To bring this locally, the star athletes on Pampa's football and volleyball teams and the star Lefors athletes all had to report to two-a-days Monday, just like the incoming freshmen and everyone else on their team. None of those players are given exceptions. So why should future Hall of Fame athletes be given exceptions?

Now back to Favre. So if this time he is truly retiring, he has put the Vikings in a tight spot. Minnesota didn't draft a quarterback and most of the top free agent quarterbacks have already been signed. Now, maybe the Vikings should have prepared a little more for Favre not coming back. Yet again, Favre has had ample time to decide whether he wants to come back for a 20th season. All and in all, professional athletes need to be more considerate to their teams that have given them the opportunity to play profes-

sionally.
