Skellytown Fire plans fundraiser

Skellytown Volunteer Firefighters and EMS Association are planning a fall fundraiser in order to buy an ambulance.

Clayton White, Skellytown fire chief, said the city lost its ambulance in 2003, when the EMTs in town left.

Since then, White said, interest in acquiring an ambulance has been renewed because one EMT moved to Skellytown and four volunteer firefighters, including the chief, are going to school to get certified.

White said the fire department has joined with the City of Skellytown to split the ambulance's costs.

They are going to purchase a used ambulance from White Deer. The vehicle will be available because White Deer is upgrading its ambulance service and selling its old ambulance, he explained.

The money from next month's fundraiser will go toward the purchase of the ambulance and training the EMS crews.

""It's very expensive to send somebody to school," he acknowledged.

White said the fall fundraiser will be Saturday, Sept. 4, at the Skellytown football field following a 10:30 a.m. parade.

There will be a barbeque cook off, featuring chicken, ribs and brisket. The barbeque will be served to the public at the community center beginning at 4:30 p.m. Two bands, Casey Berry and the Live Texas Mosquitoes and the Tommy Gallagher Band, will take the stage beginning at

White said there will be a Kid's Zone set up starting about 11 a.m. with face painting and blow up facilities.

The fire department will have games including water volleyball and horseshoes in the afternoon. White said.

House approves border security

WASHINGTON (AP) - In a rare moment of bipartisanship Tuesday, the House approved \$600 million to pay for more unmanned surveillance drones and about 1,500 more agents along the troubled Mexican border.

Getting tougher on border security is one of the few issues that both parties agree on in this highly charged election season. But lawmakers remain deeply divided over a more comprehensive approach to the illegal immigration problem, and it's unclear if Congress will go beyond border-tightening efforts.

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The House passed the bill by an unrecorded voice vote after brief debate. The Senate passed an identical bill last week by unanimous consent. But senators must act again, for technical reasons, before sending the bill to President Barack Obama for his signature.

Some House members urged the Senate to act quickly, without waiting for Congress's summer recess to end in mid-September. It was unclear Tuesday whether that would happen.

Murder for customs officer

EDINBURG (AP) — A U.S. Customs officer is scheduled to be charged with murder over the shooting death of the owner of a south Texas bar while the lawman was off duty. The Hidalgo County Sheriff's Office says Jose Elizondo faced arraignment Tuesday in the death a day earlier of Fermin Limon, owner of the Punto 3 Night Club in Mission.

Authorities say Elizondo and his brother were thrown out of the club for fighting with another man.

Elizondo allegedly went to his truck, returned with his government-issue weapon and shot Limon twice. Elizondo told investigators he thought the 49-year-old Limon had a gun.

Houston bus crashes into building

HOUSTON (AP) — Both drivers suffered minor injuries after the front of a Metro bus in Houston ended up lodged in a vacant building following a collision with an SUV.

The front of the bus remained stuck in the former day care center early Tuesday.

Houston police are trying to determine whether one of the vehicles ran a red light in the accident around 7 p.m. Monday. Metro spokeswoman Raequel Roberts says both drivers had non-life threatening injuries and they were talking at

Roberts says a city building inspector was expected to check the structure before the bus, which did not have any passengers on board when the wreck happened, is removed.

Four get prison for mailed weed

McALLEN (AP) — A federal judge in McAllen has sentenced four illegal immigrants to prison for using the U.S. Postal Service to mail marijuana.

The U.S. Attorney's Office on Tuesday announced the sentences for 42-year-old Leopoldo Perales-Rodriguez, 22-year-old Juan Carlos Hernandez, 27-year-old Victor Hugo Mares and 46-year-old Margarito Gallardo. All four

Each pleaded guilty last summer to conspiracy to distribute marijuana through the postal system.

Chief U.S. District Judge Ricardo Hinojosa on Monday sentenced Perales-Rodriguez to 42 months in prison. Hernandez received a 27-month term. Prison terms of 30 months were ordered for Mares and for Gallardo.

Prosecutors say the packages mainly were mailed from south L. Texas to Connecticut, New York, Florida and Puerto Rico.

Afghan war casualties spike

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — The number of civilians killed in the Afghan war jumped 21 percent in the first half of 2010 compared with the same period last year, with insurgents responsible for the spike, the United Nations said in a report Tuesday.

Shortly after the U.N. released its report in Kabul, two gunmen with explosives strapped to them tried to storm the office of an international security company in the capital. When guards fought back, the men detonated their explosives, killing two Afghan drivers.

The U.N. report showed a reduction in civilian casualties from NATO action, but the overall rise in deaths indicated that the war is getting ever-more violent undermining the coalition's aim of improving security in the face of a virulent Taliban insurgency.

"The human cost of this conflict is unfortunately rising," said Staffan De Mistura, the top U.N. envoy in Afghanistan. "We are very concerned about the future because the human cost is being paid too heavily by civilians. This report is a wake-up call."

Death toll rises in Asia disasters

ZHOUQU, China (AP) — The death toll from landslides in northwestern China more than doubled to 702 Tuesday, as rescue crews in three Asian countries struggled to reach survivors from flooding that has imperiled millions.

Rescuers digging by hand through mud found a 52-yearold man who had been trapped for more than 50 hours inside a leveled apartment building in the remote town of Zhouqu, where more than 1,000 other people were still listed as missing.

Pakistan's President Asif Ali Zardari returned home to a storm of criticism after visiting Europe as his country was gripped by the worst floods in its history. His arrival Tuesday came as thousands of people fled a major city in central Pakistan as rivers threatened to submerge the area.

And rescuers in the desert mountainsides in Indiancontrolled Kashmir recovered more bodies, with the death toll rising to 165 from flash floods. Thousands of army and paramilitary soldiers continued clearing roads and removing the debris of hundreds of homes flattened in the Ladakh region.

Groom accidentally kills guests

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - The state-run news agency says a groom has killed his father and two aunts after opening fire into the air with an automatic weapon to celebrate his wedding.

The Anatolia news agency says eight other relatives were injured during Sunday's celebration in the southeastern province of Gaziantep. It says the groom lost control of the weapon and acci-

dentally aimed at guests. He was arrested.

It is tradition in Turkey to shoot into the air to celebrate weddings, circumcisions or sports victories. Turkey has failed to curb the practice despite imposing harsher punishments to cut down on stray bullet accidents.

more than two miles beneath the sea floor and three Australia to hit the target. miles from the surface, trying to hit a target less than half the size of a dartboard. The drill is about as wide as a grapefruit, and the target now lies less than 100 feet

If John Wright misses, other BP engineers will pull the drill bit up, pour concrete in the off-track hole and then try again. Wright is 40-for-40, though, having helped capped wells across the world in four decades of engineering work. And he seemed confident in a June video put out by BP that he could make it 41-for-41

"Out of 40 relief wells that I've drilled, we've never missed yet," said Wright. "I've got high confidence we will take care of this problem as soon as we can get there.

Work began during the weekend to finish drilling the well, and company and government officials say they could hit their target as early as Friday. If it hits, engineers will perform a "bottom kill" by pouring in mud and cement to permanently seal the blown-out well that's spewed an estimated 207 million gallons since April.

In three months, the relief well has been run more than 17,900 feet from its rig. But drilling the final stretch, a section slightly longer than the distance from third base to home on a baseball field, will be a time-consuming and careful process.


Crews dig about 20 to 30 feet at a time, then run electric current through the relief well. The current creates a magnetic field in the pipe of the busted well, allowing engineers to calculate exactly where and how far they need to drill.

A "static kill" last week pushed mud and cement into the top of the crippled well, leaving very little chance oil could leak into the Gulf again, said retired Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, the government's point man overseeing the cleanup operation. Neither he nor BP officials



Sifting through the unemployment news The new unemployment numbers

were released Friday by the US Bureau of Labor Statistics and on the surface the rate is unchanged at 9.5 percent. However, there's a lot that can be discerned about what's really going on by looking just below the surface.

Total non-farm payroll employment declined by 131,000 jobs this past month. That means the figure doesn't include consultants or freelance people, like myself, who aren't part of a regular payroll, as well as people working on a farm of any kind. However, private sector payroll employment jumped up, which is great news, by 71,000

The difference between those two figures is all of the federally employed census workers whose job expired. They were artificially raising the employment rate through the spring and summer, which we knew was going to happen and we knew that it would come to an end.

So, the rate of unemployment by the federal government for long-term hires stayed the same. However, the private sector of small to mid-size businesses and corporations hired some new people. Since that's the place most of us will find a new job that's great news. The

rock is rolling in the right direction. The numbers for people who have been out of work for 27 weeks or more and are still searching, long-term unemployed, remain unchanged as well as those who involuntarily switched from full time to part time employment. Those who have been out of work the longest are still not getting hired, which means it's probably time to get help with the resume, the howto's of a job interview and to open

up the spectrum of jobs a bit

wider. At some point we have to face the possibility that it's a bad economy but we may be playing a part in it too. We can ask for

some help and guidance and then be willing to just do it without all of the blather about why we can't change.

There is also some good news buried in that 9.5 percent unemployment rate. Manufacturing added 36,000 jobs mostly in the car industry, which is also good news for the rest of us because manufacturing jobs tend to have a nice roll-

out affect for the rest of us. People buy news cars, which spurs the industry to hire people to build something who then have money to spend at other businesses who then have to order more stuff for their shelves who then turn back

to manufacturing. The hardest part of recovering from a recession is getting that cycle to just start. The fact that it's starting mostly in one of the hardest-hit areas, automotive, is even further reason to believe that the deepest parts of the recession are over. That doesn't mean the climb

out isn't going to take awhile. This is a lot like eating greasy, sugar-filled food till you're a hundred pounds overweight and then devoting another year or more of hard work to lose the extra poundage. The slide into obesity probably took longer but we didn't have to take contrary actions that required work so we never noticed the time slipping away from us. Same deal

Other sectors showing signs of recovery are healthcare, which added 27,000 jobs and warehousing and transportation, which added 56,000 new employees since February.

The sector that is still lagging behind is professional and business services, which makes sense because the more highly skilled people aren't as needed until there's more money to spend. As mericans cut back further and

further just trying to stay afloat they whittled away till there was nothing left but the basics and they've been slow to start spending much since. Frankly, considering what our baseline was for percentage of income devoted to spending that's probably a good thing.

Here's where part of the hard work is going to have to happen so we can all get back to work. Things aren't going to return to where they were in December of 2007 regardless of who we elect because we were out of control and operating on a system of mortgage and financial lies, both on the big level of Wall Street and the personal level of our own household budgets.

Therefore, we're going to have to accept that our disposable income, the splurge and acquire portion, may always be smaller. We may actually have to learn how to get our happiness fix from the relationships around us because they're free and within our budget.

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Mexico, US question legalization proposal

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A former Mexican president's proposal to legalize drugs as a way of breaking drug cartels' economic power is stoking debate in Mexico and opposition in Washington.

When former President Vicente Fox wrote in a blog Sunday that "we should consider legalizing the production, distribution and sale of drugs," it was the most far-reaching and high-ranking stand for legalization yet in Mexico. More than 28,000 people have died during the current administration's war against drug cartels.

One thing most experts agree on is that the idea is unlikely to prosper without similar moves to legalize or regulate the sale of drugs in the United States, the main consumer of drugs from Mexico.

The U.S. State Department said Monday "the question of debating the legalization of drugs is for Mexicans to decide." But a State Department spokeswoman also said that the department's position is that "we don't believe legalization is the answer."

If my suspicions are wrong and Ray is on the up and up, tell him you need him to set a definite timeline. You have been patient long enough.



Conditioning plan prepares alumni team for Borger

When Pampa alumni team captain Ramon Martinez was playing at West Texas A&M in 2003, he was introduced to a conditioning plan. This workout plan, he said, has turned around college teams like the Arizona State Sun Devils and NFL clubs like the Philadelphia Eagles.

When it came to coming up with a workout plan for Saturday's game against Borger's alumni team, then, Martinez knew which one he wanted to use.

Martinez said it's basically a lot of run-

"We run a mile on Mondays, hundreds on Tuesdays... two miles on Thursdays and forties on Friday," Martinez said. "As the weeks progress, more increments are added. The mile and the two mile stay the same but more hundreds and forties will be added.'

Alumni team member David Robinson said the plan has worked well for the team and has helped them get back in shape.

keep running and in shape. Nine times out of ten you don't. You go to the couch and that's as far as you go. When he (Martinez) introduced this workout, not only is it good for this game, it's good just in general."

Martinez said the workout will help them keep their stamina for a whole game.

"The best thing of the workout is training for four quarters and be in tip-top shape to last four quarters," Martinez said. "It's not just one quarter, you've got to play for four full quarters.'

Robinson said the workout has helped the team's endurance in practice on Saturdays.

"If you see us practice early on, we had guys bailing out for some reason after 30 to 45 minutes of practice," Robinson said. "Now we have bigger numbers staying

Marques Long said it's tough for the team to only have one practice per week but the workout plan has helped.

"Things have gone better," Long said. "The workout plan has been good. It's good to stay in shape whether you're prepping for something like (the alumni game) or




