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## City commission walks budget tightrope

Pampa's new budget was the dominant theme of the City Commission meeting on Tuesday, with city officials looking to strike an agreeable balance to square the books for the next fiscal year.

City Manager Richard Morris and Finance Director Robin Bailey had initially crafted a budget that keeps the city's compensation plan intact and allows for a 20 percent increase in health insurance, but hinged on a property tax increase from the current 62.693 cents per \$100

valuation to 65 cents.

That hike, coupled with proposed increases to water and sewer rates, drew comments from some of the commissioners.

"We can't keep asking our city to sacrifice with a higher water bill, a higher sewer bill and a higher tax rate," said Ward 2 Commissioner Bill Allison.

"I don't want to see a budget balanced on the backs of the people by raising taxes," echoed




Ward 3 Commissioner Robert Dixon, who added that Pampa's tax rate is already approximately double that of nearby communities such as Borger and Dumas.

Upon further dialogue amongst the Commission, a motion proposing the City's intention to raise the tax rate was denied.

The Commission then agreed to re-examine CITY cont. on page 3

## Pampa police, FBI warn of offshore fraud

Recently, an elderly woman in Pampa wired several thousand dollars to a person in Jamaica

"This person is not going to get her money back," said Pampa Police Officer Stormy McCullar.

The officer described the woman as wanting to help a caller in distress

"Her heart was in the right place," McCullar said.

While Officer McCullar said the case is still under investigation and the details aren't clear yet, McCullar said she suspects there are others in town that have fallen prey to similar scams.

In most cases, McCullar said the caller

promises money in return. According to the FBI, which keeps track of offshore mail and telephone fraud, callers

often tell the person who answers the phone that the caller has won several million dollars FRAUD cont. on page 3

## Hampton Village sets target date

The head of the group behind the Hampton Village housing development hopes to have an opening ceremony for the new Pampa housing development before Thanksgiving.

Ronnie Hodges, executive director of New Life Housing Foundation, said this week that they are taking reservations for the 76 singlefamily homes being built off Alcock.

"We're part of the Tejas Housing Group," Hodges said. "We have been building com-

munities across the state for the past 10 years." The actual opening date of the development depends upon the weather and construction progress, she said.


Hodges said the new homes in the 1500 block of West Alcock will include two, three and four bedroom houses that will rent from \$225 to \$715 a month.

## White: Ethics reform needed

FORT WORTH (AP) — The Democratic candidate for governor, Bill White, says Texas needs ethics reform.

White says if he's elected, senior staff members in the governor's office will be required to file personal financial statements every year. If they leave, they'll be banned from lobbying the governor's office for two years. Perry's office does not have similar policies.

White, a former Houston mayor, also says e-mails and other records in the governor's office will be preserved.

White says 42 of Gov. Rick Perry's appointees to boards or other positions each have contributed \$100,000 to Perry. White says appointments should be based on experience instead of connections or contribu-

He discussed his ethics reform plan Wednesday in Fort Worth. White is trying to stop Perry from being elected to an unprecedented third full four-year term.

## TWC lawyer reassigned

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HOUSTON (AP) — A lawyer with the Texas Workforce Commission has been reassigned after apparently offering tips on ways for companies to avoid paying unemployment benefits to departing employees.

The Houston Chronicle reported Wednesday that Jonathan Babiak, at the time of a June 25 conference, was overseeing appeals involving decisions to grant or deny unemployment benefits.

Babiak's comments, quoted July 8 by the newspaper, suggested that employers give workers they intend to terminate the option to resign. Babiak said the workers might assume they are not eligible for benefits if they leave voluntarily and "chances are they won't file a claim."

Babiak, formerly deputy director of appellate services, referred questions to the commission. Spokeswoman Ann Hatchitt says Babiak has been reassigned to human

## Six arrested on drug charges

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — Six people from Vernon have been arrested on drug distribution charges.

Prosecutors say all six defendants appeared Wednesday before a federal judge in Wichita Falls and remain in custody, pending detention hearings next week.

U.S. Attorney James Jacks says five defendants are charged with conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine and cocaine, plus distribution of the drugs. Another defendant is charged with conspiracy to distribute crack cocaine, plus four counts of distributing

Jacks says all six suspects, ranging in age from 22 to 47, were arrested Tuesday.

The two indictments were returned last week by a federal grand jury in Dallas and unsealed Wednesday.

## Ninth DWI lands man life in prison

GEORGETOWN (AP) — A judge in Georgetown has ordered life in prison for a Round Rock man on his ninth conviction for driving while intoxicated.

Bobby Joe Stovall was sentenced Tuesday over a 2009 DWI wreck that left his passenger hurt. Round Rock police says the 52-year-old Stovall, who was convicted last month, had a blood alcohol level four times the legal limit for driving.

His previous DWI convictions were in Collin, Dewitt, Nueces, Galveston, Jackson and Goliad counties.

Williamson County authorities say Stovall was convicted of burglary of a habitation in 1994 and credit card abuse in 1987 and ordered to prison. He was convicted of possession of a controlled substance in 1994 and put

Stovall also has convictions for theft and making alcohol available to a minor.

time people on duty at the development plus someone to coordinate after school events and holiday events for the residents of the gated facility.

"We love to think we're instrumental in creating oldfashioned neighborhoods where everyone knows each other," Hodges said.

She said there will be many amenities and the family homes will be energy efficient.

"We have a lovely community center in front for not only for our community but also for people to come and have events," Hodges said.

She said they are taking reservations for the homes. "This is an affordable housing community," Hodges said.

The rents, she said, are based on the income of the person wanting to live there.

"We have to qualify everyone and make sure that they are eligible," she said. "We do a background check. We do a criminal background check in addition to a credit check. We want to know that we have some good residents that are going to take care of the homes and good families and good neighbors. We do have a lot to offer."

She said that the addition will have a number of handicapped equipped homes. "We try to have a well-rounded community," Hodges

said. "I think it's going to be a real asset to Pampa. We hope to be full-fledged community members. We'll have a grand opening later this year."

She said she hopes they can have it before Thanksgiving, but that will depend on the weather.

in a lottery, but they need a few hundred to pay the administrative fees. "Don't do it," McCullar said. "Do not give money over

the phone.

She explained that once the money leaves the country, there is not much that can be done to retrieve it. It's gone. McCullar said many of the calls, according to federal investigators, originate in Area Code 876 and the phone number begins with a 585 or 570 prefix. That is the

the budget to see if further adjustment can mitigate or eliminate any rate increases.

"What we're going to do is meet again with the directors this week," said Morris. "We'll look at the budget again and have some recommendations.'

Morris said this morning that the lengthy discussion process is typical of the budgeting period.

"It's something we just have to go through," said Morris. "It's a budget

"We're going to continue to work with the commission on it. The interesting thing with this budget is that this is the first time in several years that it's been balanced, so we've actually felt better about it this year than in the past."

Morris was optimistic that any changes to the budget will not be overly complex.

"(The changes) won't be what you'd call full-scale," he said. "We've spent three or four months on the budget already. Everyone is fairly familiar with it. The things that we'll have to go back and look at hopefully won't take that long."

The budget must be completed by the end of September, before the new fiscal year begins on Oct. 1.

In other business:

 The Commission adopted on second and final reading Ordinance No. 1524, annexing territory adjacent to Pampa's present corporate limits. The territory covers the property occupied by the new Pampa Junior High School, approximately 40 acres to the northwest of the previous city limits.

 The Comission adopted on second and final reading an ordinance amending requirements for animal adoptions, outlining the preferential rights of Humane Societies and similar organizations to adopt impounded animals and waiving the adoption fees for such groups.

 The Commission adopted a resolution authorizing the submission of an application for the Community Development Fund with the Texas Department of Rural Affairs.

The application would be for \$275,000 of grant funds to carry out water system improvements in Pampa. If the application is granted, the City would commit \$55,000 from its own General Fund toward such improvements.

 The Commission heard budget presentations from Andy Epps of the Freedom Museum, John Curry and Joe Weaver of the Tourism Committee and Gary Sutherland of the PEDC.

 The Commission heard an update from Faustina Curry regarding the de facto volunteer organization formed to address volunteer involvement in the animal shelter. Curry said that the group will hold its next meeting at 6 p.m. on Tuesday at the Lovett Memorial Library.

their best to raise her, but nothing is working. When she was growing up she never lied, and I mean never. I have told her

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

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Obama Afghanistan policy tracks Bush

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#### President Barack Obama is an unremitting critic of George W. Bush. but in Afghanistan he's walking in Bush's shoes. How ironic. But also,

how encouraging. Ironic, of course, because as a senator, Obama was among the strongest critics of Bush's 2007 troop "surge"

He predicted that additional troops would actually worsen the sectarian violence raging in that country though by September 2008, he acknowledged that "the surge has been successful," but "in ways that not even President Bush expected."

Obama's stance is encouraging because, like Bush in Iraq, he believes in the policies he's pursuing in Afghanistan and is willing to buck

opposition. "We now have a strategy that can work. We've got one of our best generals today, (David) Petraeus, on the

ground," he told CBS on Monday. "I've been very clear that we're going to move forward on a process of training Afghans so that they can

provide for their own security. "Then, by the middle of next year, we're going to start thinning out our troops and giving Afghans more responsibility.

"If I didn't think that it was important for our national security to finish the job in Afghanistan, then I would pull out today, because I have to sign letters to ... families who have lost loved ones."

Opposition to Obama's Afghan policy comes primarily from within the Democratic Party, of course, though there is also opposition from members of the U.S. foreign policy 'establishment.'

So it was for Bush in Iraq. When the going got rough, prominent Democrats such as Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (Nev.) declared the war "a lost cause" and a "quagmire," and a majority of Congressional Democrats supported measures to curtail funding.

Congressional Democrats are turning against the Afghanistan War in increasing numbers, though oppo-

nents are still short of a majority. Last week, 102 of the House's 255

Democrats (plus 12 Republicans) voted against funding the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Obama, who's

a nonstop critic of Republicans for opposing his domestic poli-cies, owes GOP members at least some thanks for

supporting his Afghan policy. But Democrats are not about to humiliate a president of their own party, and he is getting expressions of support from figures such as Senate Armed Services Chairman Carl Levin (Mich.) and Foreign Relations

Chairman John Kerry (Mass.). They would almost certainly be denouncing the Afghan war effort if Bush were pursuing it — as would Vice President Joseph Biden. The three not only opposed Bush 43 on Iraq but his father's 1991 decision to go to war when Iraq invaded Kuwait.

In this case, Biden is forecasting that when Obama's "thinning out" process commences next July, it probably will involve "as few as a couple thousand" soldiers. Biden, of course, argued against Obama's "surge" when the policy was being formulated.

Obama also is sticking with his policy against mounting public dissatisfaction and expressions of doubt by "establishment" figures - most recently by Richard Haass, an official in both Bush administrations and now president of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Haass wrote in Newsweek last month that "It is time to scale down our ambitions there and both reduce and redirect what we do." Haass does not favor a full-scale or sudden withdrawal, which "would almost certainly result in the collapse of the Karzai government and a Taliban takeover of much of the country."

Rather, borrowing an idea from Robert Blackwill, a former U.S. ambassador to India, Haass favors "decentralization" — what amounts to partition - of Afghanistan, handing over Pashtun areas to the Taliban and equipping other ethnic groups to

This idea parallels ideas floated by foreign policy experts as alternatives to Bush's Iraq surge - including a partition plan proposed by Leslie Gelb, Haass' predecessor at CFR, and "redeployment" proposals by the

defend themselves.

Study Group. The latest Gallup poll shows that no doubt because of mounting U.S. casualty levels — a growing number of Americans (43 percent) believe that the United States made a "mistake" sending troops to Afghanistan, even though the question stipulated this first happened in October 2001.

That, of course, was a month after al-Qaida, then based in Afghanistan, toppled the Twin Towers. The memory seems to be fading.
Since then, some 1,220 U.S. ser-

vice personnel have lost their lives in Afghanistan. Last month, 66 died, the highest monthly toll in the war.

However, that's far short of the 4,400 who have died in Iraq and the record month, with 131 deaths, in May 2007.

As U.S. commanders have explained, the rising death toll is the result of increased military action to defeat the enemy. By 2008, the monthly average in Iraq was down to 26 deaths as the surge succeeded.

Of course, Iraq and Afghanistan are different countries. Petraeus' counterinsurgency strategy may not work as well in Afghanistan as it did in

And yet, it has to be tried. The United States has abandoned Afghanistan and its nuclear-armed neighbor, Pakistan, again and again - too many times to maintain our credibility as a superpower, should we do it again.

Obama is not giving up, much as Bush didn't. We can only hope that both are vindicated.

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

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
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
