"We started doing it last year," she said. "In years past, we did a three-day camp. Last year, we tried (a luau) and had a lot of fun with it, so we're doing it again.


"It didn't totally wear us out as much as the day camp," Dodson laughed.







Mr. Lemmons was born January 3, 1919 in Hamilton to William Arthur Lemmons and Grace Hitt Lemmons. He attended Southwest Texas State University where he received his Bachelors Degree in chemistry in 1939, and his Masters Degree in 1940. He taught school in Marble Falls for one year, from 1940-1941. Prior to Pearl Harbor, Bob enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps, serving during World War II, and achieving the rank of Captain. During much of the war, he was in charge of the communication centers at bases in Peru, British Guyana, Dutch Guyana and the Canal Zone. After his discharge, he went to work for Celanese Chemical Co. in Kingsville in February of 1946, transferring to Pampa in November of 1953, and retiring after 37 years of service. He married Rita Faye Moss on November 4, 1950 in Kingsville. She preceded him in death on January 4, 1986. He was a member of the Exchange Club of Pampa in the 1950's, a member of First United Methodist Church, and an emeritus member of the American Chemical Society. He was an avid golfer. Bob took great pride in feeding the neighborhood birds and squirrels. He was a loving father and grandfather.

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

## Pantex cleanup to be \$60 million

AMARILLO (AP) - U.S. Energy Secretary Steven Chu says federal officials estimate it will take \$60 million to fix flood damage to the Pantex nuclear weapons facility and resume full operations.

Chu on Wednesday visited the Amarillo-area facility where nuclear weapons are assembled, dismantled and modified. He inspected some damage after about 10 inches of rain swamped parts of Pantex on July 7.

Chu says the Energy Department is seeking federal funds for the Pantex flood cleanup.

## Perry defends race record

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican Gov. Rick Perry, who's criticizing Democrat Bill White over language he used with a black audience, says he's used the power of his office to improve race relations in Texas.

Perry pointed out Thursday that he appointed Wallace Jefferson, a descendant of slaves, to the Texas Supreme Court as the first black justice. Perry also noted he appointed Latina justice Eva Guzman.

Perry's campaign criticized White on Wednesday for having said he wants to be a "servant" to Texans while Perry wants to be a "master."

White's campaign said he's used that language many times before and that it's not racial. Black legislators came to White's defense.

Perry addressed a Texas Association of Broadcasters event, where White was scheduled to speak later Thursday.

### CAT to build in Texas

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Caterpillar Inc.., the world's largest maker of construction and other heavy machinery, said Thursday it will build a hydraulic excavator manufacturing facility in Victoria, Texas, that will employ more than 500 workers.

The facility will triple Caterpillar's hydraulic excavator production capacity in the U.S., and double the number of Caterpillar's U.S. employees making excavators. Construction on the 600,000-square-foot structure will begin next month, with production expected to start in mid-2012.

"Based on our comprehensive review of possible locations, Victoria's proximity to our supply base, access to ports and other transportation, as well as the positive business climate in Texas made this the ideal site for this project," said Gary Stampanato, Caterpillar vice president with responsibility for excavators.

Caterpillar received a \$1.18 million grant from the Texas Enterprise Fund as part of its commitment to build in the state, Governor Rick Perry said Thursday. Since its creation in 2003, the TEF has invested more than \$397 million in securing job-creating projects in the state.

### BP agrees to pay penalties

WASHINGTON (AP) — Beleaguered oil giant BP has agreed to pay a record \$50 million fine for failing to correct safety hazards at its Texas City oil refinery after a 2005 explosion killed 15 workers.

Texas attorney general sued the Obama administration Wendesday over its new deep-water offshore drilling moratorium, claiming it is unjustified and federal officials did not contact the state before issuing the ban.

Attorney General Greg Abbott filed the 18-page suit in federal court in Houston against Department of the Interior Secretary Ken Salazar. The ban halted the approval of any new permits for deepwater projects and shut down drilling at 33 exploratory ocean wells in the wake of the BP spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

In his lawsuit, Abbott called the ban "an unjustified, arbitrary and capricious policy that will inflict harm upon coastal communities.'

Also, the suit said, federal officials did not coordinate with the state or consider the economic impacts before issuing the moratorium. Texas is one of the nation's most active oil refinery states. State figures show there were 86,900 jobs in oil and natural gas extraction in April and an additional 107,800 in support industries.

The new ban does not seem to deviate much from the original moratorium in that it still argets deep-water drilling operators while defining them in a different way.

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston police say two men are charged with capital murder over last weekend's shooting death of a 14-year-old girl during an apparent robbery

Police say 22-year-old Melvin Alvarado and 18-yearold Jonathan Lopez-Torres remained in custody Thursday with no bond set. No jail information was immediately available on whether the men have attorneys.

Police say both were arrested Wednesday over the killing of Shatavia "Tae" Anderson. The teen's body was discovered last Saturday in a field near the family's partment complex.

## Today in History

Today is Thursday, Aug. 12, the 224th day of 2010. There are 141 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:** 

On Aug. 12, 1960, the first balloon communications satellite - the Echo 1 - was launched by the United States from Cape Canaveral.

#### On this date:

In 1859, poet and English professor Katharine Lee Bates, who wrote the words to "America the Beautiful," was born in Falmouth, Mass.

In 1867, President Andrew Johnson sparked a move to impeach him as he defied Congress by suspending Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton.

In 1898, fighting in the Spanish-American War came to an end.

In 1944, during World War II, Joseph P. Kennedv Jr., eldest son of Joseph and Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy, was killed with his co-pilot when their explosives-laden Navy plane blew up over England.

In 1962, one day after launching Andrian Nikolayev into orbit, the Soviet Union also sent up cosmonaut Pavel Popovich; both men landed safely Aug. 15.

In 1970, President Richard Nixon signed the Postal Reorganization Act that abolished the U.S. Post Office Department in favor of the independently run United States Postal Service.

In 1978, Pope Paul VI, who had died Aug. 6 at age 80, was buried in St. Peter's Basilica.

In 1985, the world's worst single-aircraft disaster occurred as a crippled Japan Air Lines Boeing 747 on a domestic flight crashed into a mountain, killing 520 people. (Four people survived.)


Ten years ago: The Russian nuclear submarine Kursk and its 118-man crew were lost during naval exercises in the Barents Sea.

## Dems claim to like GOP's primary choices

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hard pressed for good news this election season, President Barack Obama's Democrats claim to see a silver lining in the Republicans' choice of political novices, sometimes mistake-prone, for critical Senate races.

Snubbing the GOP establishment's recruits, Republicans this week chose Ken Buck in Colorado, a county prosecutor who insulted his tea party backers and talks about significantly reducing the Education Department, and Linda McMahon in Connecticut, a former World Wrestling Entertainment executive shown on video kicking her performers in the crotch. Those two join tea partypreferred candidates Rand Paul in Kentucky and Sharron Angle in Nevada, campaigners who have struggled with embarrassing missteps and cableready gaffes. "Whatever folks say about the general atmospherics, the tea party takeover of the Republican Party is really producing real millstones for them," Democratic Party Chairman Tim Kaine said in an interview Wednesday. He called Buck, McMahon, Paul and Angle "wacky" with "ideas about the role of government that are way outside of the mainstream, that are just going to be offensive to people."

argue their experienced candidates have the upper hand in general election match-ups with these untested folks.

Sen. John Cornyn, the head of the GOP Senate campaign committee, doesn't buy it.

"That's wishful thinking on their part," he said in an interview. "This election's going to be about jobs, spending and debt." And on those measures, Cornyn said, Democrats will lose because it's Obama's policies that are "outside of the mainstream and extreme." He accused Democrats of trying to change the subject by tearing down GOP candidates who were nominated. "Every single one of them is on the side of the American people," said Cornyn. This is no ordinary year. An anti-establishment fervor has swept the country. Voters are down on lawmakers of all political stripes. In a June Associated Press-GfK poll, only a little over a third said they'd like to reelect their own congressman, while more than half said they want someone else. Just a quarter of the public approved of the Democratic-controlled Congress. Other surveys show support in the teens. At a time of animosi-

Republicans voted in Colorado's Senate primary while 338,184 Democrats cast ballots in their contest, sobering numbers for Democrats looking ahead to November when turnout will be critical.

As they did earlier to Paul and Angle, Democrats wasted little time Wednesday in portraying both McMahon and Buck as extreme.

Sen. Robert Menendez of New Jersey, who leads the Senate Democrats' campaign effort, disparaged McMahon as "a corporate CEO" who "built an empire peddling violent, sexually explicit material that glorified the exploitation of women and the mentally disabled." In turn, Cornyn of Texas called McMahon a selfmade businesswoman and a "political outsider with a fresh perspective." He castigated Democratic state attorney general and rival Richard Blumenthal as a "career politician."

Organizing for America made 11,500 calls and knocked on nearly 3,500 doors in the final four days on behalf of the senator. Democrats plan a unity rally in Denver on Thursday that includes defeated primary candidate Andrew Romanoff.

Democrats insist that because of the candidates the Republicans are nominating, Obama's party now has an excellent chance to hold onto or, in the case of GOP-held Kentucky, pick up seats that were considered in jeopardy or out of reach at the start of the year.



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# Critics: Dems' new jobs bill will cost Texas schools

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Democrats in Congress reject- Dewhurst, a Republican, said last week he would file a ed state Republicans' pleas - and the threat of a lawsuit on Tuesday and helped pass a jobs bill that critics say will cost Texas schools more than \$800 million.

President Barack Obama then signed the \$26 billion jobs bill intended to protect 300,000 teachers and other nonfederal government workers from layoffs.

A state-specific provision requires Gov. Rick Perry to promise Washington that Texas will maintain certain state education spending levels through 2013. Perry has said the requirement is unconstitutional because the Texas Constitution prohibits him from committing future state spending.

He issued a statement Tuesday, saying he would continue to work with state leaders "to fight this injustice."

"It is unfortunate that Washington continues to play partisan games with Texans' tax dollars and the very future of our children," Perry said. "Texas will not surrender to Washington's one-size-fits-all, deficit-spending mindset or let Washington do to the Texas budget what they have done to the federal budget."

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst issued a statement saying he has "asked the attorney general's office to explore all legal options to ensure Texas is treated fairly."

lawsuit against the federal government if the language was not removed.

A spokesman for Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott called the legislation "constitutionally flawed."

"The attorney general's office is continuing to coordinate with the leadership as we weigh the state's options," said Abbott's spokesman, Jerry Strickland. "But Texas taxpayers can rest assured that we are prepared to take whatever legal action is necessary to ensure that our schools do not suffer financially from the Doggett amendment's discriminatory - and constitutionally questionable - provisions."

U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, the Austin Democrat who crafted the amendment, called the protests "phony legalistic arguments."

He and other Democrats say the provision isn't unconstitutional and Perry should simply agree to the terms so schools can get an estimated \$800 million intended to spare them from layoffs.

The Texas constitution says no "appropriation of money be made for a longer term than two years."

Doggett's amendment has been endorsed by Texas Association of School Boards and other statewide educator groups.


Democrats in Congress said they put forth the provision, which also would bypass state lawmakers and send the federal aid directly to school districts, because of the way the state handled federal stimulus dollars last year.

Texas lawmakers used \$3.2 billion in federal stimulus money to replace state money and ended the legislative session with billions in the state's Rainy Day Fund, Doggett said.

"You can be sure that Texas is singled out by this legislation — it was singled out by the governor who grabbed \$3.2 billion of federal aid to education to bailout a mismanaged state government," he said. "We didn't send that federal aid for education to Texas to plug a mismanaged state budget. We sent it to help our schoolchildren.

He said the provision in the jobs bill was intended to ensure state officials didn't divert education dollars to other parts of the budget if they received more federal aid.

"Today, in order to avoid history from repeating itself, we demand accountability, we demand support for quality public education and local control of education and not more mismanagement and interference from the state of Texas."



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
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


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

# Coach Cavalier inspired many in coaching career

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Former Harvester David Robinson first met former Pampa Head Football Coach Dennis Cavalier during a high school practice when he was in 6th grade.

"I was over on the practice field and I was dreaming that I could play for him (Cavalier) one day," Robinson said. "I came over their with my own ball, working on my stutter steps and jukes. Practice was over and he walks up to me and was like, Who are you?'

"I told him that I was David Robinson. He said 'Good to meet you. Are you going to play for me one day.' I said 'Yes sir, I am.

Robinson is one of the many alumni team members who played for Coach Cavalier during his time as PHS football coach. Cavalier died of a heart attack on May 24, 2003 while he was mowing his lawn.

Robinson wanted to play the best he oould for Coach Cavalier and did the necessary work to do so as he entered the program at 5'2 and 128 pounds.

"I got to the point if I was going to play this sport it was time to hit the weight room and take this program seriously," Robinson said. "Let this program not only develop me but help me develop in the program."

Robinson said Coach Cavalier also helped him off the field. Coach Cavalier inspired all of his players. Though he has passed, his players are still touched by him today

Robinson said he always felt better after he visited Coach Cavalier's office then before he went in.

"He helped me personally to get bigger, get tougher and get mentally tougher," Robinson said. "Helped me stay on top of the books. Coach Cav is a coach, but he was more of a father.'

Pampa strength and conditioning coach Scott Lewis, who started coaching with Cavalier in 1981, said former players always came back and visited him.

'Year after year, players from 10 years and 20 years came back because he developed that relationship with them," Lewis said. "They never forgot him and he never

#### forgot them."

Ramon Martinez, the team captain of the Pampa alumni team, said Cavalier was a down-to-earth coach and was inspired to play his hardest

"I had a very great relationship with him," Martinez said. "It took a while for him to trust me because from the beginning he didn't think I had what it took. That's what gave me the drive and energy to prove myself that I did have what it took and I was proud to be a Harvester... After he saw what I had to do, he was all about ready to see me play."

Martinez said he was honored to be the first Hispanic starting running back in Harvesters history.

"It's really an honor and privilege that carries me today," Martinez said. "I've always wanted to give the Hispanic community someone to look up to. That we still have the athleticism to come in and compete and bring in the best effort we can do to win games.

Luis Martinez said Coach Cavalier was a great motivator and is the reason for this team to form.

"If it wasn't for Coach Dennis Cavalier being in Pampa for the football program, I don't think this team would be here today," Martinez said. "Not only was he a great man, he was a great motivational talker. He had a way with words that would light a firecracker on your butt and make you get up and do something."

Head football coach Heath Parker played on Cavalier's first three teams (1987-1989) and said they developed a bond right away.


"So many things I do as a coach are what learned from him (Cavalier)," Parker said. "You got to do it with your own style, but the roots and essence of what I believe in is what he taught us as players and the coaches underneath him."

Lewis said Cavalier cared about his coaching staff.

"He and his wife helped my wife and I during a tough time," Lewis said.

Kathy Cavalier, widow of Coach Cavalier said he was an amazing man and it was a privilege to be his wife.

"When we would go out he would introduce me to people as Coach Cavalier's wife," Kathy Cavalier said. "I never got tired of that and never felt that it affected

my identity. We had many years of being involved in a career he loved."

Parker, who would succeed Cavalier as coach, said that the season after Cavalier's passing was hard.

"It was such an emotional time for everyone in the program," Parker said. "It was such a feeling of we didn't want to let our coach down. Nothing changed from what we were doing from a program standpoint, we were just missing our leader."

Lewis said Cavalier's death was very hard because he knew him for many years and his impact on his family

"I had been with Coach Cavalier since 1981," Lewis said. "We were probably best friends. We traveled to basketball games together, baseball games together. anything involved with Pampa athletics. It was hard for me and my family because 2003 was my son's senior year and Coach Cavalier and his family had been there for the birth of my son. His wife helped care for my son in preschool when my wife was teaching. So they had an active role in raising my son and daughter." Kathy Cavalier said their daughter was a senior when Cavalier passed away a week before school was out and the whole community was devastated. But Cavalier knew where they had to have the funeral. "We had his service at Harvester Field because there wasn't a church big enough to hold it," Cavalier said. "The home section was packed with 2,000 people. 100 coaches from Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas were there who worked with him or were friends with him. It was very uplifting. We gave him his final game and pep rally."

- Cavalier created the "El Norma" phrase for the football program. It's a Latin phrase meaning the standard that Cavalier wanted his first class to do. Cavalier also

"He brought the best out of all of us," Ramon Martinez said. "Made us boys to men and it was really something special to be a part of. It's something to reflect back on again and do it all over. Show everyone how special it is."

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

## Meet the Harvesters Friday at Pampa HS




The community is invited to meet the 2010 football players 7:30 p.m. Friday in the High School commons for the annual Meet the Harvesters event.
