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

NLHF's Hodges touts Hampton Village

Ronni Hodges, president of New Life Housing Foundation, a non-profit organization that is

part of the Tejas Housing Group out of Austin, was in Pampa this week to talk to local real estate companies and the Pampa Chamber of Commerce concerning the non-profit group's latest development, Hampton Village.

The Tejas Housing Group, she said, is a group of builders, developers and non-profit organizations that have joined together to provide affordable housing.

"It's so complicated," Hodges said of the scope of the proj-

She said that over the years, they have accumulated groups of architects and engineers that help the organization to get through the system.

"It's a very complicated system," Hodges admitted.

She said that since Pampa has never had affordable housing like this, the group feels they were fortunate to be the first to bring it to the community

"It was wonderful that we could be the first one here," Hodges said, "because there's a lot of misconceptions about the project."

ect, "that you almost have to Hodges, a seven-year veteran have experts in a lot of different of providing low cost housing, Hampton Village s finished by the end of October, depending upon the variable fall panhandle weather.

"We may have a big rain, and it could be postponed," she said.

The first group of houses will be rented in early November. The second group will be available in late November. The next groups will be available for rental in December.

Others will be available in January, February and March.

When completed, the Hampton Village addition will consist of 76 houses.

Update: Harvester Field paint cleared

The worst case scenario regarding the vandalism at Harvester Field never materialized, avoiding heavy expenses for the Pampa High School athletic department.

Sometime late Sunday night or very early Monday morning, vandals had painted a large red "BB" over Pampa's logo at midfield. The fear, Pampa Independent School District Athletic Director Stuart Smith said, was that the paint was oil-based, which meant that the affected panels of turf would need to be removed and replaced.

Such a process would have cost at least \$30,000 (\$10,000 for each of the three panels), Smith said. According to Smith, though, workers spent all day Tuesday on the field getting rid of the red

"We used a chemical solution that we use on the soccer lines," Smith said. "It was getting it out. We will have a cleaning crew that will get the rest out."

EMS classes a draw for Clarendon Anstey expects program to attract from all over

Emergency Medical Services Profession courses will be offered at Clarendon College in Pampa this month, according to Joe Anstey with the EMS Foundation of Texas, who will be one of the instructors.

"The only reason it's happening here," he said, "is because they were able to have a cooperative agreement between Amarillo College and Clarendon College. It is a terrific partnership, and it's one that will benefit thousands of people because this is going to impact lives all over the panhandle.

Anstey said people from all over the Northeast Panhandle will come to Pampa for the courses at Clarendon College. Starting with the EMT classes, Anstey

said students can following through with the entire Paramedic program.

"When they graduate with an Associate's Degree in Applied Science in Paramedicine," he said, "they'll be eligible to sit for the National Registry Paramedic Exam."

He said the new program at Clarendon College's Pampa Campus is a way to address a need for medical help in rural communities in the panhandle.

Anstey said that once such programs were inaccessible to parts of the panhandle

simply because of geography. "If you live in Higgins," he said, "it's almost impossible to commute to Amarillo four or five days or nights a week for classes.'

Anstey said the coursework at Clarendon College's Pampa campus will be aimed at people who may already have day jobs and want to improve their situation.

"People may want to attend EMT school as an enhancement to the job they already have or use it as a spring board for jobs to come," he said.

In addition, it means local jobs and EMS cont. on page 3





Regret, apology not part of BP report

long-awaited internal report on what it believes went wrong when a rig exploded and started the massive Gulf oil spill never mentions the words blame, regret, apology, mistake or pollution. The word fault shows up 20 times, but only once in the same sentence as the company's name.

BP took some of the blame, acknowledging among other things that it misinterpreted a key pressure test of the well that blew out and eventually spewed 206 million gallons of oil into the Gulf. But in a possible preview of its legal strategy, it also pointed the finger — and plenty — at its partners on the doomed rig.

The highly technical, 193-page report released Wednesday attributes the worst offshore oil spill in U.S. history and the deadly rig explosion that set it off to a complex chain of failures both human and mechanical. Some of those problems have been made public over the past 4½ months, such as the failure of the blowout preventer to clamp the well shut

The report is far from the definitive ruling on the cause of the catastrophe. For one thing, government investigators have not yet begun to fully analyze the blowout preventer, which was raised from the bottom of the sea over

Labor Day weekend. But it does provide an early look at the company's probable legal strategy

spreading the blame among itself, rig owner Transocean, and cement contractor Halliburton - as it deals with hundreds of lawsuits, billions of dollars in claims and possible criminal charges in the coming months and years.

For Billy Nungesser, president of oil-soaked Plaquemines Parish, the report doesn't change the fact that in his mind the time that has passed since the disaster hasn't made offshore drilling

"If they believe painting the rigs yellow would make them safer, stop delaying, give us a bucket of paint and let us get started," Nungesser said of those

Critics of BP called the report self-

"This report is not BP's mea culpa," said Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., a member of a congressional panel investigating the spill. "Of their own eight key findings, they only explicitly take responsibility for half of one. BP is happy to slice up blame as long as they get the smallest piece."

The disaster began when the Deepwater Horizon exploded off the coast of Louisiana on April 20, killing 11 workers. BP's well spewed oil into the Gulf for three months before a tempo-

rary cap stopped it in mid-July. Members of Congress, industry experts and workers who survived the blast have accused BP's engineers of cutting corners to save time and money on a project that was 43 days and more than \$20 million behind schedule at the

time of the blast. Nearly 24 hours before the explosion, Halliburton was using cement to seal the gap between the well casing and the hole drilled in the seafloor. It was also cementing the bottom of the well shut until the day BP was ready to begin extracting oil and gas from it.

In its report, BP said that it was a bad cementing job that contributed to the blowout and that the design of the well was probably not to blame. It also said "more thorough review and testing by Halliburton" and "stronger quality assurance" by BP's well team might have identified weaknesses in the plan for cementing.



Perry activates rescue teams

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AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry is activating military personnel and rescue teams to help flood victims hit by the remnants of Tropical Storm Hermine.

Perry announced the activations Wednesday after heavy rains prompted evacuations across a wide swath of central and North Texas. Among the resources being deployed are 48 Texas Military Forces personnel, 10 high-profile vehicles, two Blackhawk helicopters and four swift-water rescue teams from the elite Texas Task Force 1 team,

In a statement issued by his office, Perry urged "all Texans to realize the dangers of crossing flooded roadways and respect the barricades put in place by officials to protect Texans lives."

Search on for missing in flood

NEW BRAUNFELS (AP) - Authorities are set to resume their search for two men swept down a central Texas river by floodwaters fueled by the remnants of Tropical Storm Hermine.

New Braunfels police Lt. John Wells said the search would resume Thursday for 28-year-old Nikos Paraskevopoulos of Alexandria, La., and 23-year-old Derek Joel-Nelson Clemens of Baldwin, Mich.

Wells says the men were swimming in the Guadalupe River on Wednesday when they got caught in a fastmoving current and were swept over a dam. Clemens was later seen being carried toward an Interstate 35 overpass. The search was suspended Wednesday night and will

First ladies team up for fundraiser

SHANKSVILLE, Pa. (AP) — Former first lady Laura Bush will speak at a National Park Service fundraiser in Pittsburgh on Friday, a day before joining Michelle Obama in rural Pennsylvania to remember the victims of Flight 93, which crashed there in the Sept. 11 attacks.

Bush's appearance is part of a wider effort to raise money for the memorial to the 40 passengers and crew who died after they fought back against their hijackers.

A memorial plaza is under construction in these rolling hills, part of a long-awaited 2,200-acre national park that will eventually honor the victims. The finished memorial will include a 93-foot tower at the entrance with wind chimes for each of the victims and a grove of trees.

Just \$40 million of the \$58 million needed for the memorial has been raised. The project's planners say they hope Bush's and Obama's efforts help bring attention and much-needed cash to the project.

Racist firefighters fired

HOUSTON (AP) — Three Houston firefighters have been fired after they were accused of entering a racial epithet into a patient's electronic emergency medical report.

Acting Fire Chief Rick Flanagan said Wednesday the men were fired after an investigation into the March 7 incident. Fire officials identified them as 33-year-old firefighters Spencer Allred and Randal Ricks and 27-year-old engineer/operator Ryan J. Smith.

The head of the firefighters union tells the Houston Chronicle the firings are a "travesty" and says the department failed to determine who actually was responsible.

Last year, the lockers of two female firefighters were scrawled with racial and sexual slurs. It wasn't determined who was responsible for the graffiti.

Waste-to-biogas plan in the works

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Packaging company MeadWestvaco Corp. says it is teaming up with two other companies to build a plant where organic waste streams can be converted into biogas and other products.

The Richmond company says VOW Resources, an organic waste management and resource recovery company, will design and test the process used at the plant, while Zera Energy will build and operate the facility.

The companies plan to complete building a demonstration plant next to MeadWestvaco's Evadale, Texas, mill in November. Initially, the biogas facility will create approximately 30 construction jobs and provide 12 fulltime positions, MeadWestvaco said.

MeadWestvaco will determine the commercial viability of the biogas generation process and, if successful, apply the technology to its waste treatment operation.

San Antonio officers suspended

consumption and create organic fertilizer.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A San Antonio police officer was indefinitely suspended and another received a 60-day ban for what authorities called harassment of a female

The San Antonio Express-News reported Thursday that the male officers were accused of putting trash in the woman's work mailbox and sending derogatory message to her and about her on patrol car computers.

Police Chief William McManus signed an indefinite suspension notice for 31-year-old Officer Aaron Terrazas last month. Officer Eric Rubio initially was indefinitely banned as well, but the 39-year-old's punishment was reduced after he met with McManus.

The police union president said Terrazas planned to appeal and request arbitration. Documents say the incidents took place between Feb.

24 and April 13.

More turtle releases planned

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Federal officials say they're stepping up plans to release sea turtles that were stranded and rescued during the Gulf oil spill and study how they've been affected.

Barbara Schroeder, sea turtle coordinator for NOAA's fisheries division, said Thursday no turtles needing treatment from oil exposure have been found since early August. Two groups were released last month.

A total of 1,086 sea turtles have been collected offshore and along shorelines.

Scientists have released more than 14,000 hatchlings from nests moved from the northern Gulf of Mexico to the

east coast of Florida. The next step will be inspecting areas heavy with sargassum, a marine algae that draws creatures on which the

turtles feed. Surveys begin in two or three weeks, followed by long-term monitoring.

Feds reject school fund application

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The U.S. Department of Education has rejected Texas' application for \$830 million in federal money for schools.

Federal officials say in a letter to Texas Education Commissioner Robert Scott that they could not award the money to Texas because of "conditional assurances" included in the state's application.

Texas Republicans have balked at a provision in the federal law that requires Texas to make additional assurances to the feds about how Texas schools will be funded for the next three

Gov. Rick Perry says complying with the provision he would violate the state constitution.

The letter from the Department of Education asked Scott to resubmit the application without the conditional language.



The 'what' of wares: a common suffix

We get calls asking about different computer "wares" every day. This article will be about the two general computer wares and their many subcategories.

The first is easy to describe and is the general category of hardware. Hardware are the physical pieces that make up your computer.

Some examples of hardware include the hard drive, monitor, and cpu. Peripherals such as printers, scanners, and external drives are also hardware.

Hardware is dependent on drivers (a kind of software) to work properly with your computer. Let's start looking at the different type of

Unlike hardware, software is intangible — it "cannot be touched" and is made up of instructions that tell the computer to perform different tasks.

The most well-known software includes Microsoft's operating systems such as Windows XP, Windows Vista, and currently Windows 7. Software comes in many types and perform different functions.

I will spend a little more time describing the different software

types.

Spyware is software that is designed to "spy" or track computer usage. Some examples of spyware include keyloggers, hijackers, and Trojans. A keylogger is a program that captures (logs) the keys that are pressed and stores them. Keyloggers are often used to steal passwords and send them using the internet. Other well-known software developers such as google also has been considered as spyware because they track and send usage reports to google.

Malware



either takes over your machine or prevents it from working prop-This is erly. the most common type of problem that requires computer support. The malware typically disables features in Microsoft

software that is

"malicious" and

Windows that allow the detection and removal of the software. The longer that malware runs on a computer, the more difficult it becomes to remove. Examples of malware are popups and fake security programs that act as Windows itself and wants permission to remove viruses and Trojans. Malware programs have evolved into rootkits which operate at the operating system level and are undetectable by conventional antivirus/anti-malware programs.

Trialware is software that is designed to be used on a "trial" basis. When you purchase retail computers, they are typically loaded with tons of trialware. Trialware comes in two different types. The first type of trialware has a time limit in which the program will have all the functions available and then deactivates the software unless it is purchased. The second type of trialware has limited functions and must be purchased to

allow all the features of the program to work correctly. When we get computers, we typically remove unnecessary trialware to optimize the performance of the computers.

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Shareware is similar to trialware and is designed to be "shared". Most shareware is free and allowed to be distributed without any modifica-Mature shareware is often referred to as "open source" and have teams of non-paid developers that improve the programs and resolve bugs. The major disadvantage of shareware is the fact that there is often little to no support since there is no cost involved. The developers of shareware often design the programs to meet their own needs and then distribute it for use by others.

What kind of software do we recommend and use? The software that performs best and has the best support is the kind that involves a cost. This cost is used to provide product development and support. Malware, Spyware, and Trialware typically slow the performance of a computer and could possibly render it unusable or unstable. A lot of times after we clean up a computer, the user no longer feels the need to purchase a new computer. If you are unsure of how to remove a program or it doesn't remove cleanly, take it to a computer professional. It is easier to repair a computer that is functioning, than to revive one that has crashed.

Study: Texas Enterprise Fund companies struggling

AUSTIN (AP) — Two-thirds of the Texas Enterprise Fund companies that had to meet job-creation goals in 2009 in exchange for millions of dollars in taxpayer money failed to bring in the jobs they promised, according to a report released Wednesday.

That percentage is up from the previous year, when Texans for Public Justice also issued a study on enterprise fund companies and found that 42 percent of those it reviewed were failing to meet their job-creation tar-

Gov. Rick Perry, a Republican seeking re-election against Democrat Bill White, points to the fund as an effective tool to help lure companies to the state. The fund is a deal-closing account created by the Legislature at Perry's urging. The governor frequently credits the fund for helping to create some 53,000 new jobs in Texas and generating billions of dollars in capital investment.

Perry spokeswoman Katherine Cesinger said in response to the report Wednesday that the Texas Enterprise Fund was "a national model for attracting

"Texas cannot control national economic trends or individual business pressures, but TEF contracts demand job creation in return for funding," Cesinger said. "If companies don't meet contracted job creation numbers, they are required to return TEF money to the state, which can then use that money for new job-creating

White's campaign called again for an audit of the enterprise fund and said Perry is diverting tax dollars paid by small businesses to "give handouts to companies he chose."

"When will Perry stop stonewalling and be accountable to taxpayers by welcoming an independent audit of all the money he's spent?" said White spokeswoman

The new study looked at compliance reports filed by 50 enterprise fund companies and the job creation targets

Thirty-three of those projects failed to deliver on their job promises for 2009, the study found. Six contracts were canceled. Some companies had their contracts with the state amended to lower their job-creation goals or to postpone deadlines, changes reported on earlier this year by The Associated Press.

"These amendments had a crippling impact on the number of new jobs that the affected companies were required to produce during the recession," the study states.

Perry's office awarded \$368 million to the 50 fund recipients to create or maintain 49,581 jobs, according to the report. In their 2009 compliance reports, these companies said they had delivered 30,381 jobs.

As of June, 17 enterprise fund recipient companies were fined \$2.8 million by Perry's office for failing to meet goals. That amounted to 2 percent of the \$116 million in state money they had received from the fund so far, the report states.

Cesinger noted that every legislative session since the enterprise fund was formed in 2003, Texas lawmakers have reauthorized it.

Obama joins others in decrying Quran burning

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama is exhorting a Florida minister to "listen to those better angels" and call off his plan to engage in a Quran-burning protest this weekend.

Obama told ABC's "Good Morning America" in interview aired Thursday that he hopes Rev. Terry Jones of Florida listens to the pleas of

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people who

have asked him to call off the

plan. The president called it a

"stunt." "If he's listening, I hope he understands that what he's proposing to do is completely contrary to our values as Americans," Obama said. "That this country has been built on the notion of freedom and religious tolerance."

"And as a very practical matter, I just want him to understand that this stunt that he is talking about pulling could greatly endanger our young men and women who are in uniform," the president

Said Obama: "Look, this is recruitment bonanza for Al Qaida. You could have serious violence in places like Pakistan and Afghanistan." The president also said Jones' plan, if carried out, could serve as an incentive for tetrorist-minded individuals "to blow themselves up" to kill

"I hope he listens to those better angels and understands that this is a destructive act that he's engaging in," the president said

On Wednesday, the State Department has ordered U.S. embassies around the world to assess their security ahead of the planned weekend demonstration in Florida.

Officials said U.S. diplomatic posts have been instructed to convene "emergency action committees" to determine the potential for protests over the congregation's plans to burn the Quran to commemorate the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. The posts are to warn American citizens in countries where protests may occur.

Hopes rise as jobless claims fall

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of people signing up for unemployment benefits dropped to the lowest level in two months, an encouraging sign that companies aren't resorting to deeper layoffs even as the economy has lost momentum.

The Labor Department reported Thursday that new claims for unemployment aid plunged last week by a seasonally adjusted 27,000 to 451,000. Economists had predicted a much smaller decline of just 2,000.

In a second hopeful sign, the government said the trade deficit narrowed significantly in July as exports climbed to the highest level in nearly two years. The narrower gap reflected big gains in exports of U.S.-made airplanes and other manufactured goods.

Together, the two reports eased fears that the economy might slide back into recession.

"At the moment, we can rule out a double-dip for the economy," said Chris Rupkey, chief economist at Bank of Tokyo-Mitsubishi. "The economy is not out of the woods with today's data, but things look better than they have in several week, and there is no danger of a new downturn in activity."

On Wall Street, the news lifted stocks. The Dow Jones industrial average was up around 60 points in morning trading.

Concerns about a possible new recession had arisen after a batch of downbeat reports in August. For example, new applications for jobless benefits shot past the half-million mark in mid-August, the highest level since November. Since that spike, though, they have drifted lower. New filings for benefits are now at their lowest level since July 10.

Meanwhile, the four-week moving average of new claims, which smooths out weekly fluctuations, also fell last week, dropping by 9,250 to 477,750. So did the number of people continuing to draw unemployment aid.

Even with latest decline, new filing for obless benefits are still much higher than they would be if the economy were healthy. When the economy is growing strongly and companies are hiring, requests for unemployment benefits fall below 400,000.

The July trade deficit fell 14 percent to \$42.8 billion, the Commerce Department said. That was much lower than economists had forecast. The lower trade deficit should give a boost to overall economic growth.

Iran to release jailed American hiker

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran announced Thursday that one of the three Americans jailed for more than a year will be released Saturday to mark the end of Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

Reporters were told by text message from the Culture Ministry to come to the same hotel where the Americans' parents were allowed to meet them recently to witness the release.

"Offering congratulations on Eid al-Fitr," the message said referring to the holiday marking the end of the fasting month. "The release of one of the detained Americans will be at Saturday, 9 a.m. at the Estaghlal hotel."

It is common in the Islamic world to mark the Eid al-Fitr holiday by showing clemency and releasing prisoners.

Ali Reza Shiravi, the head of the foreign media office at the ministry confirmed that he had sent the message summoning reports to the hotel.

The high-rise Estaghlal hotel near Evin prison is where the three Americans' mothers were allowed to visit them in May in a highly publicized trip.

The detained Americans — Sarah Shourd, 31; her boyfriend, Shane Bauer, 27; and their friend Josh Fattal, 27 — have been held in Iran since July 2009, when they were arrested along the Iraqi border.

Iran has accused them of espionage; their families say that the three were hiking in Iraq's largely peaceful mountainous northern Kurdish region and that if they crossed the border, it was accidental.

Their detention has become entangled in the confrontation between the United States and Iran. Iranian leaders have repeatedly suggested a link between their jailing and that of a number of Iranians by the United States whose release Tehran demands.

Nora Shourd, the mother of Sarah Shourd, said Thursday morning that the U.S.-based families of the hikers had seen the news reports out of Iran but had no idea if they were true or not.

'We don't know anything," Shourd told the AP. "We're trying like crazy to see what we can find out. I hope it's true — that's all I can say for sure. But I don't know if it is."

"Our kids look more at Canyon as being our biggest rival game because they live just down the road," Wood said. "However, our team understands the importance of this particular game no matter who it is. I hope we will be ready."

Head coach Heath Parker said this year's game with Randall is like last year's Borger game.

"Randall is a rivalry of ours," Parker said. "Every one in Pampa felt that way about it. Things change a little bit when you are not in the same district as they

Pampa and Randall were in district 3-4A for several years until Pampa moved down this year. Last season the Harvesters got their first win of the season against Randall 35-23 at Randall. Senior Brenden Rice said everyone came to practice ready to work.

"The intensity is twice as good as it was last week," Rice said. "We worked hard on Monday and that's what started the week good.'

Rice said he thinks they match up better with Randall than they did with previous opponents.

"They are more like the first team we scrimmaged against, Bushland," Rice said. "We did well against Bushland. They are not as fast as Estacado which helps us out quite a bit. Some of them are pretty young and they make mistakes."

Junior Miguel Pacheco said the defense will have to stop Scheve and their quarterback.


"They got a good running quarterback and I think if we can stop those two guys we'll be good," Pacheco said.
