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

Local real estate agents optimistic

With home sales down across the country and mortgage fore closures happening at record rates, one would assume that people who make a living selling homes would be pretty down-

However, despite all the gloom and doom at the national level, local real estate agents are surprisingly optimistic.

"If you have a job and are financially able to do it, now is a great time to buy a house,' said Jim Davidson of Pampa Realty. "A lot of people are refinancing right now.'

'Interest rates are low right now," echoed Linda Laycock of Househunters Realty. "There are a lot of houses on the market for prices ranging from \$40,000 to

\$400,000. Laycock said her company's

better this year, than last year already.'

That sentiment is shared by Judi Edwards at Quentin-Wiliams Realty: "Things are still pretty slow, but it looks promising. We have more houses listed right now than we have had in a long time and in all price ranges. A year and a half ago, we had just under 50 listings. Now there are about 160."

"The market is off about 40 percent of what it was, say, three years ago," Davidson said. "There is money available to buy a house right now, but it so difficult to get a loan.

In fact, Laycock said, there are FHA loans available at 3.5 percent. The catch for some is that it also requires at least a 620 credit score.

In the past couple of years,

sales have been "a whole lot Pampa has seen Celanese close down (at one time the town's largest employer) and layoffs She added: "I think the market at National Oil Well Varco and some of the community's smaller oil field support companies.

However, the agents insist, it isn't as though Pampa hasn't seen this situation before.

"We've had some really great 'ups' and some slow times," said Edwards. "This one has just lasted longer.'

"I think people are just afraid to turn loose of their money right now," Davidson said. "They don't know what is going to hap-

"I've dealt with a lot of couples recently. I was showing them 25-30 houses each and I could not get them to commit," said Laycock. "They live here. Some of them were renting. Some needed a bigger house, but they couldn't bring themselves to ESTATE cont. on page 12

Cross Texas gets OK for new lines

Cross Texas Transmission received some good news last week when its proposed Gray to Tesla 345 kV transmission line received formal approval from the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

For CTT, the approval is the culmination of about a year and a half of preparation for the Gray to Tesla project. Development for the line initially began in early 2009, with CTT asking for input from landowners en route to submitting a proposal for PUCT review.

The approved proposal will be approximately 109 miles and will cross four counties, branching eastward from the Gray County substation and into Wheeler County before turning south, bisecting Collingsworth and Childress Counties and finally terminating at the Tesla substation southeast of Childress.

The line will be the first of many planned transmission facilities in the Panhandle as part of the Competitive Renewable Energy Zone (CREZ) initiative. According to a release from CTT, the company's "planned investment of hundreds of millions of dollars will generate tax revenue, create significant construction, operation and maintenance jobs and enable the connection of new renewable energy resources throughout the region."

"We're very excited to get the approval," said CTT media contact Cameron Fredkin. "(We got it) probably six weeks earlier than planned, and we're looking forward to getting started.

Fredkin said that CTT currently has a "rough estimate" for the project's timetable. The next nine to 12 months will be a preconstruction stage, during which CTT will be acquiring real estate easements from landowners along the route, as well as completing surveying and engineering work.

Site mobilization, Fredkin said, will then begin late next CTT cont. on page 12

He said that in talking with other law enforcement officers, he's found that to be true among most police officers.


"You've done something," Jernigan said. "You've accomplished something."



Economic panel: Recession ended in 2009

WASHINGTON (AP) — The longest recession the country has endured since the Great Depression ended in June 2009, a group that dates the beginning and end of recessions declared Monday.

The National Bureau of Economic Research, a panel of academic economists based in Cambridge, Mass., said the recession lasted 18 months. It started in December 2007 and ended in June 2009. Previously the longest post World War It downturns were those in 1973-1975 and in 1981-1982. Both of those lasted 16

The NBER decision makes official what many economists have believed for some time, that the recession ended in the summer of 2009. But it won't make much difference to most Americans — especially the nearly 15 million without jobs.

Americans are coping with 9.6 percent unemployment, scant wage gains, weak home values and the worst foreclosure market in decades.

President Barack Obama saw little reason to celebrate the group's finding that the recession had ended. Appearing at a town-hall meeting sponsored by

CNBC, Obama said times are still very hard for people "who are struggling," including those who are out of work and many others who are having difficulty paying their bills.

"The hole was so deep that a lot of people out there are still hurting," the president said. It's going "to take more time to solve" an economic problem that was years in the making, he added.

The economy started growing again in the July-to-September quarter of 2009, after a record four straight quarters of declines. Thus, the April-to-June quarter of 2009, marked the last quarter when the economy was shrinking. At that time, it contracted just 0.7 percent, after suffering through much deeper declines. That factored into the NBER's decision to pinpoint the end of the recession in June.

Any future downturn in the economy would now mark the start of a new recession, not the continuation of the December 2007 recession, NBER said. That's important because if the economy starts shrinking again, it could mark the onset of a "double-dip" recession. For many economists, the last time that happened was in 1981-82.

To make its determination, the NBER looks at figures that make up the nation's gross domestic product, which measures the total value of goods and services produced within the United States. It also reviews incomes, employment and industrial activity.

The economy lost 7.3 million jobs in the 2007-2009 recession, also the most in the post World War II pe-

The Great Depression lasted much longer. The United States suffered through a 43-month recession that ended in 1933. Then, it slid back into recession, which lasted for 13 months. That ended in 1938.

The NBER normally takes its time in declaring a recession has started or ended.

For instance, the NBER announced in December 2008 that the recession had actually started one year earlier, in December 2007.

Similarly, it declared in July 2003 that the 2001 recession was over. It actually ended 20 months earlier, in November 2001.

Its determination is of interest to economic histori-– and political leaders. Recessions that occur on their watch pose political risks.

In President George W. Bush's eight years in office, the United States fell into two recessions. The first started in March 2001 and ended that November. The

NBER's decision means little to ordinary Americans now muddling through a sluggish economic recovery and a weak jobs market. Unemployment is 9.6 percent and has been stuck at high levels since the recession ended.

Many will continue to struggle.

Unemployment usually keeps rising well after a recession ends. Four months after the 2007 downturn ended, unemployment spiked to 10.1 percent in October 2009, which was the highest in just over a quarter-century. Some economists believe that marked the high point in joblessness. But others think it could climb higher — perhaps hitting 10.3 percent by early next year.

After the 2001 recession, for instance, unemployment didn't peak until June 2003 — 19 months later.

Word of the recession's official end comes just two months before Election Day. But the decision isn't likely to play a big role in November's congressional and gubernatorial elections.

Some Democrats might hail it as a sign of progress. but voters are guided by gut reactions far more than economists' pronouncements.

With unemployment still hovering just below 10 percent, some Democrats have urged Obama to stor boasting about any economic progress at all. They fear it annoys people who feel things are not getting better for themselves and their neighbors, and it makes politicians seem out of touch with ordinary Americans worries.

Making the tapes public could them emotional harm. Talk to a lawyer. Have genetic tests run to determine your children's paternity, but do not make the tapes public.


DEAR ABBY: I'm 17. My girlfriend of eight months and I have an incredible relationship, but something is eating at


Lifetime Recovery Center supported by Chamber





Today is Monday, Sept. 20, the 263rd day of 2010. There are 102 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 20, 1519, Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan and his crew set out from Spain on five ships on a voyage to find a western passage to the Spice Islands in Indonesia. (Magellan was killed en route, but one of his ships eventually circled the world.)

On this date:

In 1870, Italian troops took control of the Papal States, leading to the unification of Italy.

In 1884, the National Equal Rights Party was formed during a convention of suffragists in San Francisco; the convention nominated Belva Ann Bennett Lockwood for president.

In 1958, Martin Luther King Jr. was seriously wounded during a book signing at a New York City department store when Izola Curry stabbed him in the chest.

In 1962, black student James Meredith was blocked from enrolling at the University of Mississippi by Gov. Ross R. Barnett. (Meredith was later admitted.)

In 1973, in their so-called "battle of the sexes," tennis star Billie Jean King defeated Bobby Riggs in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, at the Houston Astrodome.

In 1984, a suicide car bomber attacked the U.S. Embassy annex in north Beirut, killing at least 14 people, including two Americans and 12 Lebanese.

Ten years ago: Independent Counsel Robert Ray announced the end of the Whitewater investigation, saying there was insufficient evidence to warrant charges against President and Mrs. Clinton.

Five years ago: The number of U.S. service members killed in Iraq topped 1,900. Rapidly strengthening Hurricane Rita lashed the Florida Keys and headed into the Gulf of Mexico.

One year ago: Blanketing most of the Sunday TV news shows, President Barack Obama said requiring people to get health insurance and fining them if they didn't would not amount to a backhanded tax increase.








Head coach Sarah Corse said her team played well especially her new mixed doubles pairing.


The 7th grade "A" Team went 1-2 also for the tournament in Borger Sep. 11. The

However, she also noted the Panhandle has had far fewer foreclosures than other parts of the nation.

"(Prospective buyers) are just nervous about the economy," Edwards said.

While local realtors understand that nervousness, they also think people should pay attention to what is happening locally.

"Everything is in a positive mode right now," said Davidson. "I think things are coming back around. I know the oil field is picking back up.

"Nearly all the empty industrial/commercial buildings we had listed have been leased by the oil field service industries, but they haven't yet brought many people into town.

"Shamrock is getting a FedEx warehouse and that is bringing people into the area. The rent there has gone sky high and we are showing some of those employees some properties in McLean. It hasn't gotten to Pampa yet, but I'm sure it is just a matter of time.

"If we can get some jobs back here, we won't have any trouble in the real estate market."

"People are rebounding now," Laycock said. "They had lost jobs, but they are bounding back, getting their credit rating back. I think it will stabilize soon.

"Let's see what happens in the next couple of months," Edwards said., citing talk of hirings at Haliburton and the Smith family's rehab unit proposal. "I'm definitely an optimist about what our

From here, Jernigan said the door is wide open in the field of law enforcement.

In October, Jernigan will celebrate his first wedding anniversary. It was about a year ago that he married a girl from Samnorwood in Collingsworth County, near his hometown of Shamrock.

Both personally and professionally, Jernigan's future looks bright, he said.

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
