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
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

City Commission approves new (old) tax rate

It's official: Pampa's 2010-2011 property tax rate will stay the same as the 2009-10 figure.

At Tuesday afternoon's regular City Commission meeting at City Hall, the City Commission (minus Mayor Lonny Robbins, who was absent from the meeting) voted unanimously to adopt a tax rate of 62.693 cents per \$100 valuation of property.

Of that 62.693 cents, approximately 51 cents on each \$100 valuation will go into the City's general fund, with another 9 cents going into interest and sinking funds and the remaining 3 cents slotted for maintenance of the Lovett Memorial Library (under a Special Revenue While the rate itself will not change, the text

of the tax rate ordinance states that the rate will still raise more taxes for maintenance and operations than last year's tax rate. The tax rate will effectively be raised by 8.49

percent, resulting in an increase for maintenance and operations for the average home by about \$12.83.

The new tax rate does not change the exemption for disabled individuals or those 65 years or older. Such individuals are eligible to be exempt from taxation of \$15,000 of the appraised value of their residences.

In other business: · The Commission authorized City staff to submit an application to the State Energy Conservation Office for a grant in the amount of \$400,000.

According to Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes, the City is applying for the grant in hopes of building four new wind turbines two each at the water treatment plant and the wastewater treatment plant - to help offset CITY cont. on page 3

Concerns on drug rehab unit persist

While supporters of putting a rehab center at the old Pampa Junior High contend that security would not be an issue, a group of concerned citizens claims that it has found evidence of multiple incidents from other drug treatment units.

Zed Richards said he found news reports from nine communities where that's happened.

Richards, his mother Mary Ann Richards and his grandmother Paulette Hinkle said they searched the internet and, within 10 minutes, found nine reports of people escaping from drug rehab centers from California to New York and Montana to Florida.

The reports the trio found involved escapees from drug rehab centers breaking into people's homes.

It's the latest salvo from Pampa residents who oppose putting the facility in a residential neighborhood. Richards, speaking at Monday night's school board meeting, said the rehab facility should be built away from homes and schools.

"I am not opposed to a rehab facility for Pampa," Richards said Monday night. "In fact, I fully support construction of one outside of the city limits and not in my neighborhood."

"It is a very big concern," Mary Ann Richards said, adding that she is worried about the effect the center would have on surrounding property values.

"I would encourage anyone to drive down my neighborhood," she said. "The house across the street from me, I have to call the city to come mow it, and I live in the 2500 block of Aspen. REHAB cont. on page 3


The big Homecoming victory wasn't the only thing the Harvester crowd had to cheer on Friday night. They also witnessed a fitting tribute to one of Pampa athletics' most beloved

The impact center directly behind and to the west of the home stands at Harvester Field was dedicated and named the Dennis Cavalier Activity Complex during halftime, honoring the late Harvester coach who has meant so much to the team and to the community. Cavalier died of a heart attack in 2003.

"It's appropriate that we're dedicat-ing the impact center to Coach Cav," said school board president Derrell DeLoach to the crowd on Friday, "because he had such an impact on so many of these kids.'

"He was beloved by the community and respected by the team," agreed Pampa Independent School District Athletic Director Stuart Smith. "There was an outpouring of sentiment after his passing, and many people wanted us to rename Harvester Field after



Margaret Palmitier, 92, died September 16, 2010, in McLean.


Services are pending with Carmichael-Whatley Funeral Directors





Obama on health reform stump

FALLS CHURCH, Va. (AP) - President Barack Obama is touting benefits taking effect this week under the health care law he signed six months ago, including provisions allowing young adults to stay on their family's health plans until they turn 26.

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Polling shows the law remains unpopular with much of the public and that many people don't know what's in it. With crucial midterm elections six weeks away, the White House is undertaking an effort to tell people what's in the law that will help them.

Obama held a health care discussion Tuesday with about 20 people gathered in the sunny backyard of home in suburban Falls Church, Va. He said he sought the new law because rising health care costs were "bankrupting families, companies and our government."

Israel violence clouds peace efforts

JERUSALEM (AP) — Crowds of Palestinian youths went on violent rampages in east Jerusalem on Thursday, stoning buses, overturning cars and facing down Israeli riot police at the holy city's most sensitive religious site following the shooting death of a local man.

The sudden burst of violence immediately clouded fragile peace efforts, even as the Palestinian president signaled he may back away from threats to walk away from the negotiations next week if Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu proceeds with plans to resume settlement construction in the West Bank.

"I cannot say I will leave the negotiations, but it's very difficult for me to resume talks if Prime Minister Netanyahu declares that he will continue his (settlement) activity in the West Bank and Jerusalem," Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas said in an address to U.S. Jewish leaders late Tuesday in New York, according to a transcript of the event obtained by The Associated Press.

The violence was a vivid illustration of how sensitive and combustible — the situation in east Jerusalem can be. The competing Israeli and Palestinian claims to the area, home to key Jewish, Muslim and Christian holy sites, have frequently escalated into clashes and intense fighting.

Ike-damaged schools want help

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - School districts affected by extensive property damage caused by Hurricane Ike in 2008 have seen their insurance premiums skyrocket and want the state to help pay for it.

District officials in Galveston County have had discussions with state Reps. Craig Eiland of Galveston and Larry Taylor of Friendswood, according to the Galveston County Daily News.

"There are a lot of us in the same boat south of Interstate 10," Paul McLarty, Clear Creek's chief financial officer, said. "We've got concerns here in Galveston County that districts in Montgomery County, for example, don't have to worry about when you look at our premiums."

Clear Creek in 2009 spent \$3.6 million on property casualty insurance, which is driven up by windstorm coverage, McLarty said.

bility at \$80,000 in either cash or labor.

"What we're proposing is two 20-kilowatt turbines at each facility," Stokes said. "Based on the current rate of about 13 cents a kilowatt, we'll save enough in three years for it to pay back our portion of the grant.

"The typical life of a turbine these days is somewhere around 20 years," Stokes continued, "so we'd be looking at 17 years of usage after payoff."

Stokes added that City Manager Richard Morris has been in talks with Clarendon College regarding the school's use of the turbines as a training tool for its wind technology program should the grant money be awarded.

The Commission approved on first reading an ordinance amending budget appropriations and expenditures for the current fiscal

The ordinance is essentially a housekeeping measure, according to City Finance Director Robin Bailey.


'We had some projects that were delayed or changed, and we had some savings that were realized," said Bailey. "We don't want any of those amounts to just sit out there... The auditors want us to adjust it out."

 The City adopted a resolution authorizing Morris and Bailey to proceed on the possible refunding of City of Pampa Revenue Bonds, Series 2001 Certificate of Obligation.

The C.O. was issued primarily for street renovations, Bailey said. The city owes about \$1,500,000 on it, and this move would reduce the rate and save the City between \$70,000 and \$75,000.

"Tell me how a drug rehab facility is going to enhance my home," Mary Ann said.

"There's still six or seven houses that haven't been sold on my block (on Crane Road)," added Zed. "I question how appealing those homes will be to potential buyers if they know that just down the street there's going to be a drug rehab facility. Those houses have been on the market for two years already."

Mary Ann said that the concerns of the citizens need to be addressed.

She said that some of the men who spoke at the school board meeting in support of the drug rehab center haven't

lived in Pampa for three months.

"I've lived here 47 years," she said. "They don't know the town. They don't know how we operate.' Hinkle said that her family has lived in

Pampa all their lives and that they still believe in the community, but feels that the drug rehab center represents a wrong direction.

"We run a business here," Hinkle said. "We love Pampa. We have faith in Pampa, but our expectations of Pampa are higher than low-income housing and drug rehab."

"The city's goals need to be higher. We've got bigger problems."



On Sept. 22, 1776, during the Revolutionary War, Capt. Nathan Hale, 21, was hanged as a spy by the British in New York.

Ten years ago: President Bill Clinton directed the release of 30 million barrels of oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, the government's emergency stockpile.


Five years ago: Hurricane Rita, weakened to Category 4 status, closed on the Texas coast, sending hundreds of thousands of people fleeing on a frustratingly slow, bumper-to-bumper exodus. John Roberts' nomination as U.S. chief justice cleared the Senate Judiciary Committee on a bipartisan vote of 13-5.

Will big tobacco's ex-bagman inherit the House?

With their loud voices and antic style, the "Tea Party" activists may lead voters to expect something new and different if the Republican Party returns to power. But observing the man who would wield that power if his party wins a midterm majority should swiftly dispel that illusion.

There is nothing fresh or surprising about Rep. John Boehner, R-Ohio, the would-be speaker, a figure so closely associated with corporate special interests that he looks, sounds and behaves exactly like a lobbyist. He golfs, drinks, smokes and maintains an unusually bronzed complexion thanks to company jets that whisk him away to his favorite Florida resorts. He seems as if he could have stepped straight out of "Thank You for Smoking," Christopher Buckley's classic spoof of Washington's cynical, morally empty K Street.

cynical, morally empty K Street.

Smoking and K Street, of course, evoke the memory of Boehner's first big moment in national politics almost 15 years ago, when he performed a cameo as the tobacco industry's bagman. Back then, ascending the leadership ladder as chairman of the House Republican Conference, he was spotted handing out checks from the Brown & Williamson tobacco company on the House floor. This spectacle of corruption was so blatant that even some members of Congress were outraged and demanded that

Following a blast of bad publicity, he apologized, sort of. "I thought: 'Yeah, I can imagine

why somebody would be upset. It sure doesn't look good.' It's not an excuse, but the floor is the only place you get to see your colleagues," he told The Associated Press. "It was a

matter of convenience. You make a mistake, admit it and go on. I just feel bad about it."

Not bad enough to change his convenient, highly profitable relationships with lobbyists and their clients.

Yet while other Republicans became notorious for their political promiscuity — and sometimes paid a heavy price - Boehner somehow escaped censure. His fellow Ohioan and former House colleague Bob Ney went to prison as a casualty of the corruption scandal that sank super-lobbyist Jack Abramoff, but Boehner actually received more money from the Abramoff operation than Nev. Tom DeLay, the former House majority leader, was renowned for his prowess in squeezing money from lobbyists, but Boehner raised more money than "the Hammer" did during a critical period in 2006. He even rented a Capitol Hill apartment from a lobbyist who had been hired to influence him — a blatant conflict of interest that the House Ethics Committee somehow failed to notice under Republican control. TF

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When his party held the majority, Boehner chaired the House Committee on Education and the Workforce, which sounds innocuous but attracts lobbyists like a cowpie draws flies. Overseeing a broad array of issues, from the minimum wage to student loans, he made the most of their interest in his legislation. He achieved a kind of masterpiece with the passage of a bill that favored the private student loan industry over direct government lending - at an estimated cost to taxpayers of 9 cents on the dollar. Students, families and taxpayers lost in that deal, but Boehner's banker pals made out like ... bankers. Over the past two decades, he has collected more than \$120,000 from Sallie Mae, the mammoth student loan outfit — and enjoyed several trips to Florida golf destinations in the Sallie Mae corporate jet.

Boehner's career is a litany of such pay-for-play scams, which is what pass for achievements in his world. That the Republican caucus would elect him as its leader reveals the stale reality behind the populist rhetoric. Every Republican congressional candidate represents a vote to elect Speaker Boehner — and to restore the same old policies and attitudes to a ruinous decade of misrule.

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

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

"It felt pretty good," Gage said. "I'm glad Coach Corse told me after the match and not before.'




