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

Honor designation no small school board feat

Ask Superintendent Barry Haenisch about the Pampa Independent School District Board of Trustees and he'll tell you they are the best school board in Texas.

At the annual Texas Association of School Administrators and Texas Association of School Boards convention in Houston this past weekend, the board came within a hair of having the state of Texas agree.

While the board came up short of being named 2010's best (the honor instead went to Los Fresnos ISD in the Rio Grande Valley), Haenisch and School Board President Derrell DeLoach said that it doesn't diminish the board's accomplishments.

"There are 1,024 school districts in Texas, and we were in the top five," said DeLoach. "We had a great interview. I'm very proud of our board and everything we've been able to do, and for us to be in the top five, that's a big achievement."

"We (at the PISD) are all proud of everything they've done," agreed Haenisch. "This doesn't happen very often and it doesn't happen to very

DeLoach credited the PISD's nomination committee — Dr. Tom Lapacka, Miranda Bailey, Gloria Harris, Tami Freelen and chair Chris Nies — for putting together a proposal that really emphasized the board's merits.

"I'm very proud of our people who put our nomination together," he said. "The nomination committee put together a packet that was superior. Many people commented on it on a state level."

DeLoach said that the honor board designation is indicative of the passion and dedication that the school board has continually shown for HONOR cont. on page 3

PISD board to discuss sale, traffic

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees will meet Tuesday evening to discuss the sale of the old Pampa Junior High School and address the traffic problems at the new junior

They will open their meeting with a public hearing concerning a report on the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas, FIRST.

The board will consider Tuesday night a resolution authorizing the sale of the old junior high school to the highest acceptable bidder, consider purchase of other real estate and discuss PISD's administrative facility.

They will also discuss and may take action to approve potential traffic flow solutions at the new junior high.

Trustees will consider the purchase of school busses.

They are expected to adopt a statement regarding school finance.

The board of trustees is expected to take action on a special education due process settlement agreement.

The board will hear a construction update on the tennis building at the high school and consider construction drawings for the Clearwire site at the Pampa High football field.

The school board will also consider options for the concrete fence at Pampa High School.

They will consider a dual credit agreement between the school district and Clarendon College.

Fire department's Tomaschik ready to jump into action

Capt. Jerry Tomaschik, 47, said he's not ready yet for a desk job.

Originally from Catawissa in the coal region of Northeastern Pennsylvania, Tomaschik heads the A Shift of the Pampa Fire Department. When the fire alarm goes off, he's one of the first to the fire engine.

Following years fighting fires in Pampa, Tomaschik knows the town inside out, but he came to Pampa by a circuitous route.

After serving in Beirut, Lebanon, in the 1980s while he was in the Marine Corps, Tomaschik was stationed in Hawaii. It was there that he met Mike Lane, a Pampa native who was in the U.S. Air Force.

"He was getting ready to get out Marine Corps.



in the fall of 1985," Tomaschik said. Tomaschik was to get out of the Marine Corps in December, 1985.

Lane asked Tomaschik what he was going to do when he got out of the Marine Corps

Tomaschik said he didn't know. The economy in Pennsylvania at the time was bad, so Tomaschik said he felt he couldn't go back to his home. TOMASCHIK cont. on page 3



Southwest to buy AirTran

NEW YORK (AP) - Southwest Airlines has agreed to buy AirTran in a \$1.42 billion deal that will combine two of the nation's biggest discount carriers.

The two airlines primarily overlap in the Baltimore and Orlando markets. Passengers traveling to and from those cities could face higher ticket prices because less competition traditionally means higher airfares.

The acquisition moves Southwest into 37 new cities. The largest of those is Atlanta, where Delta Air Lines is based. Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson International airport is the nation's busiest, and a primary hub for business travelers, a group that Southwest has increasingly been targeting because they tend to pay higher fares.

The acquisition also gives Southwest a bigger slice of the market in cities like Boston and New York, major East Coast cities, where it has been expanding. The deal is also a boost to Southwest's plans to expand internationally. The Dallas carrier gains routes to Mexico and the Caribbean, where fellow discount airline JetBlue Airways has a big presence.

Deaf inmate wrongly convicted?

DALLAS (AP)- A deaf man imprisoned for sexual assault of a child, despite a crime-scene fingerprint that matched a convicted child rapist, could have his guilty verdict overturned.

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Stephen Brodie is expected to be exonerated during a hearing Monday at the Dallas County courthouse in Dallas. The county district attorney's office is supporting the 39-year-old man's claims of innocence.

There was no physical evidence linking Brodie to the 1990 sexual assault of a 5-year-old girl. His attorney, Michelle Moore, says prosecutors failed to notify Brodie's lawyer about forensic testing on hair found at the crime scene excluding him as the source.

After Brodie was convicted, police in the Dallas suburb Richardson learned the fingerprint matched a man who pleaded guilty to the sexual assault of a 15-year-old

Texas voters back Arizona ban

AUSTIN (AP) - A poll published Sunday in five major Texas newspapers shows that more than half of the registered voters surveyed support legislation similar to a new Arizona law that cracks down on illegal immigrants.

According to the poll, 53 percent of 1,072 registered Texas voters said they supported passage of such legislation in Texas. That number is less than in previous polls. Pollster Mickey Blum said the addition of the ques-

tion of possible "racial profiling" as a consequence of such legislation might be the reason for the decrease. But, Blum said, "even having said those words - 'racial profiling' - in the question, you've got majority support

Thirty-eight percent were opposed to such legislation, while eight percent were uncertain and one percent refused to answer.

Ten states sell half of crime guns

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly half of the guns that crossed state lines and were used in crimes in 2009 were sold in just 10 states, according to a report being released Monday by a mayors' group.

Those states accounted for nearly 21,000 guns connected to crimes in other states, said the survey by Mayors Against Illegal Guns, an association of more than 500 mayors led by New York's Michael Bloomberg and Boston's Thomas

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives traced more than 145,000 guns used in crimes in 2009 and found that more than 43,000 of those weapons were sold in

Forty-nine percent of those guns were sold in Georgia, Florida, Virginia, Texas, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, California or Arizona.

States were also ranked by the number of crime guns exported per 100,000 inhabitants. Mississippi led that list, followed by West Virginia, Kentucky, Alaska, Alabama, South Carolina, Virginia, Indiana, Nevada and Georgia.

Man dead after high-speed pursuit

AUSTIN (AP)- A man died after leading authorities on a high-speed pursuit in what the police chief described as a likely "suicide by cop."

The Austin American-Statesman reported that the man waved guns at officers during the early morning chase on Saturday that covered much of the city. An officer fired a single shot at the man after he raised his gun at two other people during a carjacking attempt. Chief Art Acevedo said the man "immediately dropped" and then appeared to shoot himself.

Acevedo said he is not sure whether the shot fired by the officer struck the suspect, and that he awaits the medical examiner's ruling

Acevedo said the incident began as a confrontation between the man and his ex-girlfriend. The man was not immediately identified.

Drivers getting lower pump prices

HOUSTON (AP) - Drivers can thank the slower driving season and a glut of supply for the continuing slide in gas pump prices.

The national average for a gallon of regular was \$2.694 on Monday, according to AAA, Wright Express and the Oil Price Information Service. That's 3.2 cents lower than it was a week ago and 19 cents higher than a year ago.

The highest prices are still in the West and Illinois, ranging from \$2.825 a gallon to \$3.513 a gallon. The lowest prices are in Texas - and parts of the South and the Midwest - from \$2.499 a gallon to \$2.573 a gallon. Louisiana drivers paid slightly higher prices, from \$2.582 a gallon to \$2.652 a gallon.

Fire rescue delayed by sinkhole

NORCROSS, Ga. -- The Gwinnett County Fire Marshal blames a sinkhole for firefighter's delayed response to at a deadly apartment fire.

As time ticked away Saturday and a woman was inside a burning apartment building, Gwinnett County firefighters faced an unexpected problem: a sinkhole at the main entrance of Barrington Hills apartments.

Lt. Eric Eberly, spokesman for the Gwinnett County fire department, said, "It required our units to have a delayed response."

"I was kind of jumping around," Tomaschik said. "I worked for Davis Electric for a little bit. I worked for a carpet layer here in town, Eddie Beecher."

He said times were hard in Pampa in 1986.

"There was an ad in the paper for the Pampa Fire Department,' Tomaschik said. "I just kind of went from there.

He said he'd never had any aspirations to be a firefighter, but the ad was there and things just fell together.

That was in May, 1986.

Tomaschik said there are a lot of rewards to being a firefighter, and they are not necessarily money.

"There's not a day," he said, "that I don't wake up and can't wait to get here."

Tomaschik said he likes his job because of the rewards he gets everyday

"It could be something as little as a smile from somebody we've helped," he said, "or a hug."

in his future, Tomaschik said He insisted that he's not suited for an administrative post, at least for right now.

Tomaschik said a lot of it comes down to having a good crew and trying to continually to improve as a team.

Tomaschik said there will come a point in his life where he'll have to let the other firefighters take the lead, but then an administrative position will look more attractive.

He's served in the fire department's training office a couple of times, he said, and each time he was just chomping at the bit to get back on a fire truck.

"I do love the training end of the job," Tomaschik said.

He said when he was in the training office, he got to be around all three shifts, but he missed fighting

"These guys are my family," Tomaschik said.

"(The board's seven members) really see themselves as a group of eight with the administration,' Haenisch said. "They do a great job of keeping the administration informed of the pulse of the community."

DEAR ABBY: Now is the time of year your readers should get vaccinated against influenza to protect themselves and their loved ones throughout the 2010-11 flu season.

This year, our nation has a new and very simple recommendation to keep our population safe: Everyone 6 months of age and older should get vaccinated! Doing it now will protect you throughout the entire flu season, which can run into the spring months.

The influenza vaccine is safe - you cannot get influenza from it. In addition to getting vaccinations in doctors' offices, people can receive them in pharmacies, supermarkets, senior centers and schools. Parents should be aware that children younger than 9 years old may need two doses.

"I think since we won in the beginning it will help when we go over to their place," Kuhn said. "We know we can do it. We can beat them 25-12 like the second game."


Garza was very appreciative of the crowd, especially the student section.


"We played really well together," Barker said. "We played better today."



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
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
