

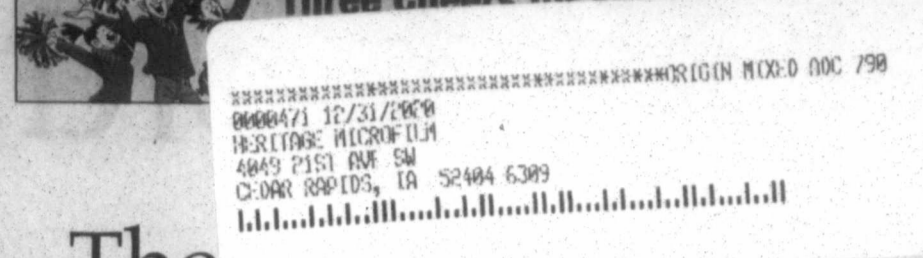

Industrial development committee formed

The City, County, Economic Development Corporation and Industrial Foundation have joined together to form an industrial development committee.

The Gray County Commissioners Court met Tuesday with representatives from the City of Pampa, the Pampa Economic Development Corporation and the Pampa Industrial Foundation to discuss

the water needs of Halliburton at Pampa Industrial Park.

Dick Stowers, head of the Industrial Foundation, explained to the group that Halliburton is expanding their operation on the east side of Pampa

in the industrial park, but the facility needs more water.

Jay Fitts with Halliburton said they need about 50,000 gallons a month. Their old well became clogged with sand, but they have been able to come up with a temporary solution.

Halliburton officials said they need a permanent water supply.

Bob Pendergraft, manager of Halliburton's Pampa facility, said the company has already hired about 50 of more than 100 people

in its expansion and expects that number to grow on into next year.

The Pampa facility serves the Texas Panhandle, Southern Kansas and Western Oklahoma, and the facility is expected to grow, Pendergraft said.

Stowers said preliminary estimates by Parkhill Smith and Cooper Engineering showed a cost of \$575,700 to provide just a new water system to the industrial park.

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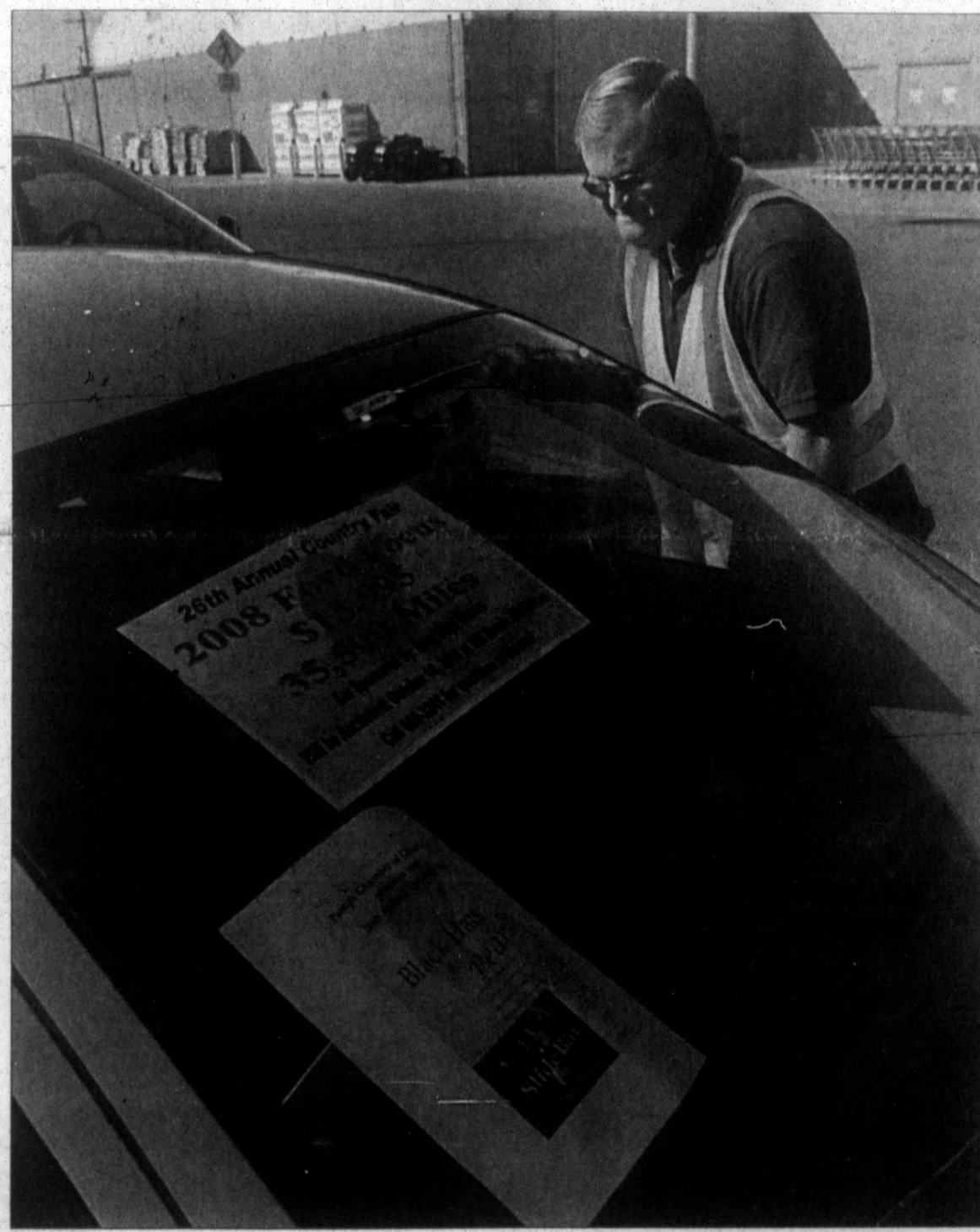

Bolin trial postponed to January

Originally set for November, 2007, the trial was postponed. The latest date set for the trial has been set for Jan. 10, in 31st **TRIAL** cont. on page 3

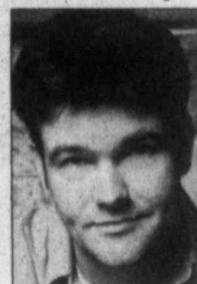
Nashville's Moore to sing tonight

Meals on Wheels a blessing, 'lifesaver' for patrons

(Editor's Note: Our United Way helps fund many local groups, which in turn use those contributions to make our community a better place to live. The Pampa News will continue to spotlight each of these organizations over a series of issues, with stories and testimonials from the people who know them best.)

A Pampa husband and wife team have been Meals on Wheels patrons for 18 years. They have been married 63 years, with their 64th anniversary in December of this year.

She was 16 and he 21 when they were wed. They were married ten years when their first of three children was born. That child, a daughter,

died in 2008 with Lou Gehrig's disease. They have a son and daughter that live in Pampa.

Mr. Patron worked restoring cars for 45 years. A portion of that time was for Ford Body Shop. He also did cowboy work for ranchers on weekends; this was what he really enjoyed.

He was quite a cowboy, having won two saddles and several belt buckles in team roping, the last in 1993 when he was 68 years old.

In October of 1996, he was diagnosed with diabetes, and, as a result, had to have all of his

toes and a portion of his left foot removed. He also had a horse fall with him which caused damage to his right leg. He had bypass surgery in October of 2004, and in 2008, he was diagnosed with lung cancer. However, he continues to have a wonderful outlook on life.

Mrs. Patron is Mr. Patron's No. 1 nurse. She monitors his medications and cares for him until home health care comes in. She almost lost him with pneumonia in April of this year, but nursed him back to where he could return home and enjoy his family.

She, however, has her own medical problems. She has lived with arthritis and high blood pressure for many years. She has spent her life being a homemaker and taking care of her family. She loves to garden, but is no longer **MEALS** cont. on page 3

Poll shows Perry leading White

AUSTIN (AP) — The nonpartisan Texas Lyceum poll shows that Republican Gov. Rick Perry is leading Democrat Bill White with 48 percent support among likely voters to White's 43 percent.

The telephone poll was released Wednesday. It surveyed 416 likely voters. The pollsters found that most Texans have made up their minds in the race for governor. Only 3 percent were undecided.

While White has the edge among voters who say they are moderates or independents, Perry has a significant lead among conservatives.

The poll was conducted Sept. 22-30. The margin of error is plus or minus 4.75 percentage points.

Houston channel partially reopens

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Ship Channel reopened Wednesday after an electric tower that had teetered over the waterway since a weekend barge accident was lowered to the ground, the Coast Guard said.

The channel reopened to all traffic about 7 a.m. Wednesday, about 4½ hours after part of it was opened to outbound tug and barge traffic only, Coast Guard Petty Officer Richard Brahm said.

The channel initially was to reopen late Tuesday, restoring access to one of the nation's busiest ports. The waterway is also the main point of access to the country's largest petroleum refineries.

Around 6 a.m. Sunday, a tug pushing three barges crashed into the tower. "Big John," one of the largest cranes in the country, was brought in Monday to help prop the tower up as CenterPoint Energy crews cut 14 power lines.

Perry seeks aid in probe

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry said Wednesday he has asked Mexico's president to call him in the next 48 hours to say that the body of an American reportedly shot to death on a border lake has been recovered.

"If not, we're not looking hard enough," Perry told The Associated Press.

Tiffany Hartley of Milliken, Colo., says her husband, David, was shot by Mexican pirates on Falcon Lake last week as they were returning to the United States on Jet Skis. Falcon Lake is a dammed section of the Rio Grande that has been plagued by pirates who rob boaters and fisherman who wander into Mexican waters. Hartley's death would be the first killing on the lake.

The Hartley family has complained that Mexican authorities are not doing enough to find David Hartley's body. Tiffany Hartley said that her husband was shot in the head by three men chasing them in speedboats and that he fell off his Jet Ski and into the lake. His body has not been recovered.

GOP spent millions on donuts?

ROUND ROCK (AP) — Republicans must love doughnuts — or so it would seem from a glance at the latest finance report filed by the Republican Party of a suburban Austin county.

But Williamson County Republican Party officials say it's only by a clerical foul-up that it reported spending \$5,272,010 at Round Rock Donuts on Sept. 20 and \$9,082,010 at Applebee's restaurant in Georgetown on Sept. 8.

Party Treasurer Jon Jewett said that in the Applebee's case, the date was entered as expenditure. He told the Austin American-Statesman the party dropped about \$60 that time. He said he doesn't know how the mess-up happened with the doughnut expenditure, which he said should have been \$13.99.

Jewett said he'll file a corrected report with the Texas Ethics Commission.

Brewer against Mexico appeal

PHOENIX (AP) — Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer is opposing a court ruling that lets other countries file a friend-of-the-court brief in her appeal of a decision that put parts of the state's new immigration law on hold.

Mexico and 10 other Latin American countries were granted permission by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to present their viewpoints.

Brewer's lawyers told the appeals court that the opinions of foreign countries have no bearing on whether the law is constitutional.

The governor says she was offended that foreign governments were meddling in a domestic legal dispute.

Mexico was joined in its brief by Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Costa Rica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Paraguay and Peru.

Commerce chief: Gulf seafood OK

PASCAGOULA, Miss. (AP) — U.S. Commerce Secretary Gary Locke said Tuesday he has complete confidence in the safety of seafood caught in Gulf of Mexico waters that have been reopened since BP's underwater well blew out, spewing millions of gallons of oil into the sea.

However, he recognizes the region has an ongoing image problem, and that fishermen are having a tough time selling their catch even after federal scientists have deemed it safe for consumption.

"We're not trying to hide anything," Locke said during a tour of a federal seafood testing lab in Mississippi.

"The seafood is safe," he said. "We've just got to get the word out ... I have confidence, the president has confidence, the restaurants and fishermen have confidence. We just need to keep repeating that message."

Bush, Cheney address group

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Former President George W. Bush and former Vice President Dick Cheney spoke at the same Colorado venue on separate days this week, though it's not clear whether they saw each other.

Cheney spoke Monday and Bush spoke Tuesday before the Council of Insurance Agents & Brokers at the Broadmoor hotel in Colorado Springs. The events were closed to the public.

Bush's spokesman, David Sherzer, said he didn't know what Bush's topic was. A spokesman for Cheney didn't immediately return a call. A spokeswoman for the insurance group confirmed Cheney appeared as scheduled.

Bush and Cheney met for coffee in the Washington, D.C., area in February. It was believed to be their first reunion since leaving office.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Desperate for jobs and cool toward President Barack Obama, working class whites are flocking to Republicans, turning a group long wary of Democrats into an even bigger impediment to the party's drive to keep control of Congress.

An Associated Press-GfK poll shows whites without four-year college degrees preferring GOP candidates by twice the margin of the last two elections, when Democrats made significant gains in the House and Senate. The poll, conducted last month, found this group favoring GOP hopefuls 58 percent to 36 percent — a whopping 22 percentage-point gap.

In 2008, when Obama won the presidency, they favored GOP congressional candidates by 11 percentage points, according to exit polls of voters. When Democrats won the House and Senate in 2006, the Republican edge was 9 percentage points.

Compared with better-educated whites, working class whites tend to be older and more conservative — groups that traditionally lean Republican and are uneasy with the young president's activist governing. Their wariness is reinforced by a prolonged economic funk that has disproportionately

hurt the working class and shown scant signs of improvement under Obama and Congress' majority Democrats.

Though accustomed to trailing among working class whites, Democrats can hardly afford further erosion from a group that accounts for about 4 in 10 voters nationally. Their GOP preference is in contrast to whites with college degrees, who the AP-GfK Poll shows lean slightly left, and to minorities, who decisively back Democrats.

Many of these working class voters were dubbed Reagan Democrats in the 1980s, when some in the North and Midwest who had previously preferred Democrats began supporting conservative Republicans. Many never warmed to Obama during the 2008 presidential race, when he said some bitter small-town residents cling to guns and religion for solace. They preferred Hillary Rodham Clinton, his rival for the Democratic nomination, by 2-1 and in the general election backed Republican nominee John McCain by 18 points.

"They try to make everybody think the economy is better, and it isn't," Jennifer Moore, 40, a school bus driver from Amherst, Va., said of Democrats. "Gas prices are

going up, food is going up and people working for the minimum wage can't make it."

In the AP-GfK poll, working class whites were likelier than white college graduates to say their families are suffering financially and to have a relative who's recently lost a job. They are less optimistic about the country's economy and their own situations, gloomier about the nation's overall direction and more critical of how Democrats are handling the economy.

"Democrats are more apt to mess with the middle class and take our money," said Lawrence Ramsey, 56, a warehouse manager in Winston-Salem, N.C.

They are likelier than better-educated whites to dislike Obama personally and are more negative about his leadership. Over half say he doesn't understand ordinary Americans' problems. They are also likelier to disapprove of Obama's performance as president, including more than two-thirds who are unhappy with his stewardship of the economy.

"The country hasn't come up the way it should have under Obama," said Barbara Schwickrath, 64, a clothing store employee from Brooksville, Fla.

sewage was estimated to cost \$2.4 million and take about a year to complete, but Halliburton said they need the water quickly.

"If we can't get water," Pendergraft said, "we're in a bind."

While the \$2.4 million water system would be sufficient for Halliburton and the businesses in the industrial park now, Pampa City Manager Richard Morris said if many more businesses move in, the water system would have to be expanded.

The tentative plan is to use city wells near the prison north of Halliburton's facility and build a loop that could be used not only by Halliburton but also by others in the industrial park.

Clay Rice with the Pampa Economic Development Corporation proposed providing a system that would supply both water and sewage

to the industrial park.

Gray County Judge Richard Peet said he didn't want to do the project in a piecemeal fashion. He wants a long-term plan and solution.

"We ought to do a good job and do it right," said Gray County Commissioner James Hefley.

The problem is where is the money going to come from to build a new water or water and sewage system.

Stowers said he has talked to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo, and they indicated they could come up with grants amounting to \$750,000 to \$775,000.

Gray County Commissioner Gary Willoughby wanted to leave the PRPC out of the project.

Both the city and the county have adopted their budgets for next year and both indicated that those budgets are tight.

Willoughby said that the county had spent \$125,000 on a new road in the industrial park last year.

"We would be willing to help," said Gary Sutherland, head of the PEDC.

Judge Peet suggested a bond issue, but the question is who would stand behind it. The industrial park is in the county, but the city would be providing the water.

In the end, the assembled group decided to form a committee to study the problem.

Willoughby is chairman of the committee, tentatively named the Industrial Development Committee.

The committee includes Stowers, Rice, Dwight Fiveash of the Industrial Foundation, Pampa City Commissioner Robert Dixon, Morris, Halliburton's Jay Fitts and Pendergraft.

Delays in the trial have been attributed by court officials to scheduling expert witnesses.

Today in History

Today is Wednesday, Oct. 6, the 279th day of 2010. There are 86 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 6, 1927, the era of talking pictures arrived with the opening of "The Jazz Singer," starring Al Jolson.

On this date:

In 1683, thirteen families from Krefeld, Germany, arrived in Philadelphia to begin Germantown, one of America's oldest settlements.

In 1884, the Naval War College was established in Newport, R.I.

In 1939, as remaining military resistance in Poland crumbled, Adolf Hitler blamed the Poles for the Nazi-Soviet invasion of their country.

In 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed the Mutual Defense Assistance Act, providing \$1.3 billion in military aid to NATO countries. U.S.-born Iva Toguri D'Aquino, convicted of treason for being Japanese wartime broadcaster "Tokyo Rose," was sentenced in San Francisco to 10 years in prison (she ended up serving more than six).

In 1958, the nuclear submarine USS Seawolf surfaced after spending 60 days submerged.

In 1960, the historical drama "Spartacus," starring Kirk Douglas and directed by Stanley Kubrick, had its world premiere in New York.

In 1973, war erupted in the Middle East as Egypt and Syria attacked Israel during the Yom Kippur holiday.

In 1979, Pope John Paul II, on a week-long U.S. tour, became the first pontiff to visit the White House, where he was received by President Jimmy Carter.

In 1981, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was shot to death by extremists while reviewing a military parade.

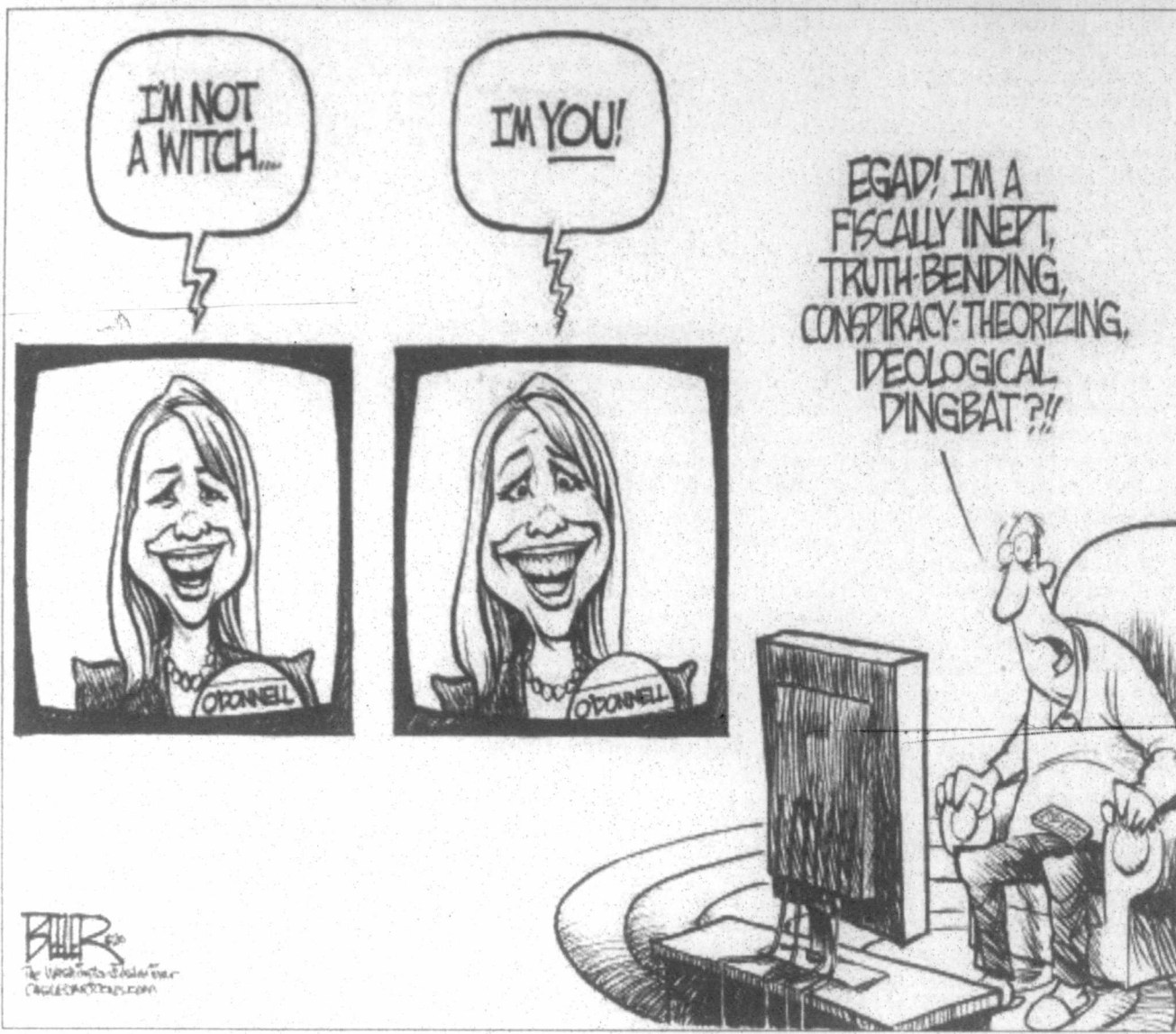
In 1989, actress Bette Davis died in Neuilly-sur-Seine, France, at age 81.

Ten years ago: Slobodan Milosevic finally conceded defeat to Vojislav Kostunica in Yugoslavia's presidential elections, a day after protesters angry at Milosevic for clinging to power stormed parliament and ended his 13-year autocratic regime. Stuntman-turned-actor Richard Farnsworth died at his New Mexico ranch at age 80. "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation" premiered on CBS.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush sought to rally flagging public support for the war in Iraq, accusing militants of seeking to establish a "radical Islamic empire" with Iraq as the base.

One year ago: President Barack Obama said al-Qaida had "lost operational capacity" in Afghanistan after a series of military setbacks and vowed to continue the battle to cripple the terror organization. George Papandreou was sworn in as Greece's new Socialist prime minister. Americans Charles K. Kao, Willard S. Boyle and George E. Smith won the Nobel Prize in physics.

Perfect time to maintain your smoke alarms

As the country marks National Fire Prevention Week from October 3-9, the American Red Cross Eastern Texas Panhandle Chapter is urging everyone to help save lives by making sure their home is protected by smoke alarms.

The largest percentage of home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or alarms that don't work. Smoke alarms provide a few minutes of advance warning in the event of a home fire, and that extra time can save lives.

People who do not have smoke alarms in their home should have them installed, and those with smoke alarms should make sure they have been properly maintained and updated.

Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of the home, as well as inside bedrooms, and outside sleeping areas of the home. People should test their smoke alarms once a month by pushing the test button, and replace alarm batteries at least once a year. Other smoke alarm safety recommendations include:

Installing a new smoke alarm battery immediately if an alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low.

Teaching children what the smoke alarm sounds like, and what they should do when they hear it.

Keeping the alarm clean by vacuuming over and around it regularly. Dust and debris can interfere with the alarm's operation. Do not paint over the smoke alarm.

Moving the alarm farther away from the kitchen or bathroom if the device is sounding nuisance alarms. Never disable a smoke alarm.

The Red Cross also recommends that families create and practice a home fire escape plan, which should include at least two escape routes for every room in the home. Families should choose a convenient meeting place outside of the home and practice their escape plan at least twice a year with all family members.

Nationally, the Red Cross responds to thousands of local fires throughout the country every year. Last year, the Eastern TX Panhandle Chapter responded to 38 fires across our 11 counties.

The Red Cross reminds people of the following fire safety tips they should take:

- Keep all sources of fuel (paper, clothing, bedding, and carpets or rugs) at least three feet away from all heat sources when cooking, or using alternative heating like a space heater.

- Don't leave the kitchen while frying, grilling or broiling food, and don't leave home while cooking.

- Keep matches and lighters away from and out of the reach of children.

- If a fire occurs, get out and stay out. Call the fire department from a cell phone or neighbor's home.

- If smoke or fire blocks the first escape route, use a second way. If someone must exit through smoke, they should crawl low under the smoke to the exit. If escaping through a closed door, feel the door before opening it. If the door is warm, get out a different way.

- If smoke, heat, or flames block the way out, stay in the room with the door closed. Signal for help using a brightly colored cloth at the window. If there is a telephone in the room, call the fire department and tell them the location.

JAMRS? How about something for our troops?

The government sent my son a \$2 bill. And they promised him another \$5 if he would spend 15 minutes filling out a survey.

If you ask me, they should spend the money on young men and women with untreated Traumatic Brain Injuries.

The envelope said JAMRS. I thought it must be some engineering school we'd never heard of. My son is a senior in high school. He scored at the very top on all the math tests and checked engineering as his interest. He gets more mail than you could imagine. My daughter did equally well in English, but never got this kind of mail. Now that he's narrowed down his choices, most of it gets tossed.

JAMRS? I looked at both sides of the envelope. No explanation. When he opened it, the \$2 bill fell out. Forget about a penny for your thoughts.

The survey was a dead giveaway. Had he considered a career in the military? Did he come from an area with high unemployment? Was he concerned about the cost of a higher education? Was he worried about his job prospects? What would his parents say if he told them he was interested in the military? If he were interested, which branch would it be?

Me, I kept looking to see who JAMRS was. They never said. Not on the front, not on the letter to give to your parents if you were under 18, nowhere.

It all rubbed me wrong. The

government doesn't need to pay my son \$7 for his opinion. Frankly, they can't afford to. They don't need to ask him what I think. I'll tell them. For free.

When I got to my computer and Googled JAMRS, I learned that it was the "Joint Advertising Market Research and Studies." But of course.

How about some English and some honesty here? If you want kids to put their lives on the line, tell them who you are.

JAMRS "conducts marketing efforts — under the Today's Military brand — to enhance and extend the individual Services' communications efforts with a variety of branding and advertising initiatives."

The "Today's Military brand"? Is serving your country a brand? Do we need branding initiatives to "market" service? Are these people trying to turn us off, or is it just by accident?

I have nothing but respect for young people who choose to serve in the military. In my experience, it's a choice that is certainly affected by economic conditions and educational opportunities (the primary subject of the survey). But at its core — and the reason I respect

it so much — it's a choice to serve this country. It's about patriotism and love of country.

Why is it being "sold" behind an unknowable acronym for an organization that makes it sound like what's involved is a choice between soaps or cereals?

Where is the dignity in paying kids seven bucks to check off some answers?

Where is the pride, the respect?

If the Department of Defense has cash to burn in sending out who knows how many \$2 bills to young people, why not spend it taking care of the young people who already said yes and came home suffering serious long-term injuries that, according to media reports, are going undiagnosed and untreated? If the JAMRS folks want to enhance the conversation with parents about service, which is what their website says, why not do so by promising to treat our kids as the precious and irreplaceable lights of our lives that they are?

On the other hand, if they think they're better off hiding behind some marketing acronym, not to mention throwing cash money around, then all the branding in the world won't help our military fulfill its mission.

JAMRS? No thanks.

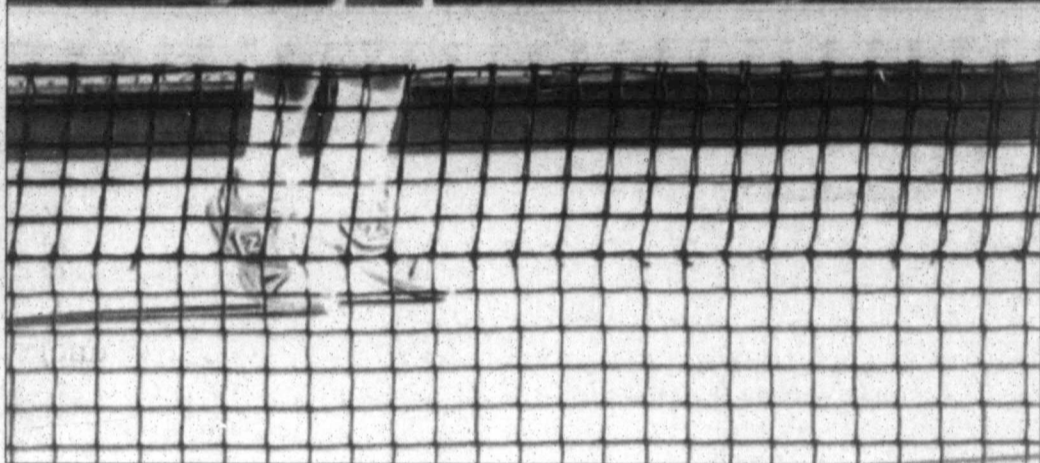
The Harvesters (8-3) have beat two out of three district opponents in non-district. Mayhew said it's a good confidence builder for the team.

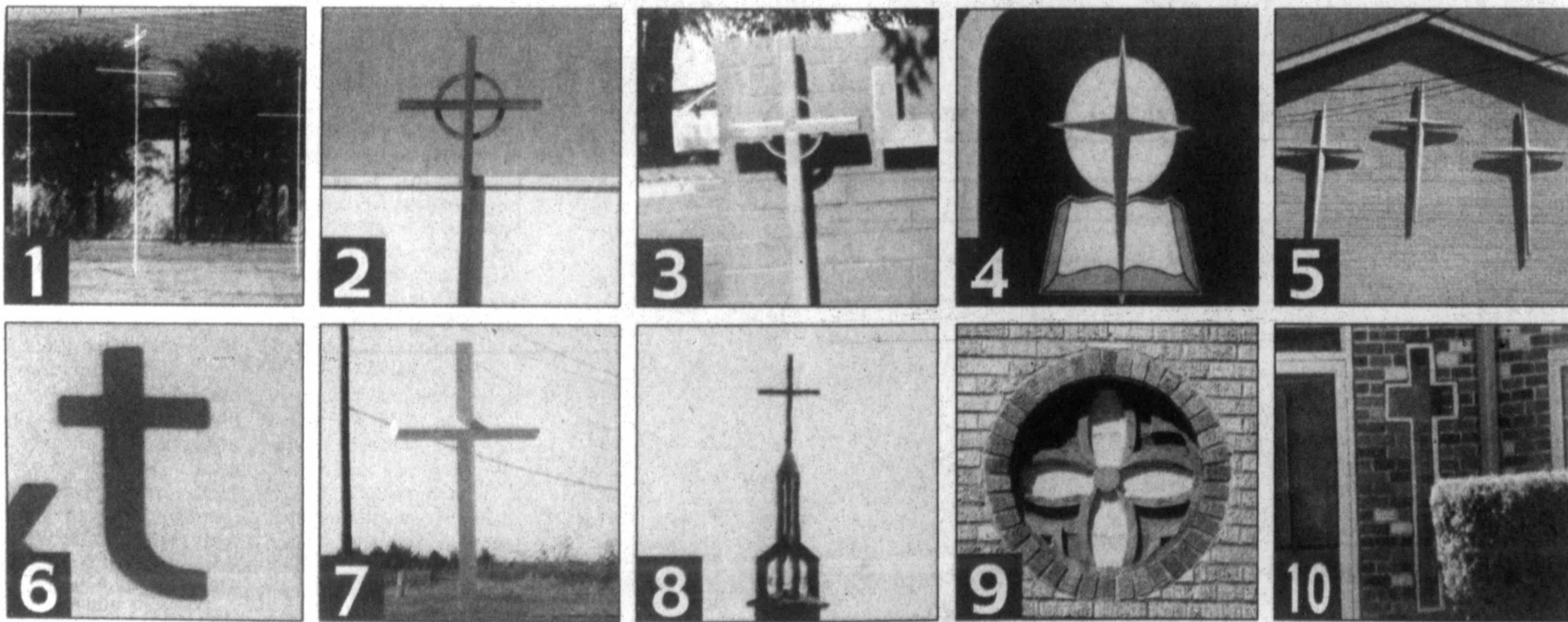
