





Wagner card sells for \$262,000

BALTIMORE (AP) - A rare Honus Wagner baseball card that was bequeathed to an order of Roman Catholic nuns has sold at auction for \$262,000.

The Baltimore-based School Sisters of Notre Dame put the card up for sale after inheriting it from the brother of a deceased nun. The sale price exceeded the expectations of auctioneers at Dallas-based Heritage Auction Galleries.

The nuns will receive \$220,000 from the sale. The total sale price includes a 19.5 percent buyer's premium. Sister Virginia Muller, who was entrusted with the card, says the proceeds will go to the order's ministries in more than 30 countries around the world.

Collector and card shop owner Doug Walton bought the card.

About 60 of the T206 Honus Wagner cards, produced, between 1909 and 1911, are known to exist. One in nearperfect condition sold in 2007 for \$2.8 million.

Film Commission head guits

AUSTIN (AP) — The head of the Texas Film Commission is quitting and he denies allegations of sexual harassment brought by an employee.

Bob Hudgins was still listed Friday, on the commission's website, as director of the organization. The commission operates under the auspices of Gov. Rick Perry's office.

Hudgins on Thursday confirmed he plans to retire Nov. 30 and cited family reasons. He also says a sexual harassment complaint against him is without merit. Further details on the investigation were not immediately available.

Perry spokeswoman Katherine Cesinger declined comment, citing personnel matters.

Mistrial in trooper steroids case

KERRVILLE (AP) — A mistrial has been declared for and football teams will a former Texas trooper accused of selling steroids after a juror decided he was guilty before hearing evidence.

Judge Rex Emerson on Thursday declared a mistrial in the case of Jeff Jerman, then set a Feb. 1 date for his next trial in Kerrville. The unidentified juror indicated to Emerson that she believes Jerman is guilty.

Jerman, who's charged with manufacture and delivery of a controlled substance, declined comment.

Prosecutor Amos Barton says no alternates were chosen ment. when the 12-member jury was seated Wednesday because the trial was expected to last only two days.

Jerman is accused of selling steroids to an undercover Kerrville police officer in September 2009. The Department of Public Safety fired him three months later.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy generated a net gain in jobs for the first time in five months in October, as businesses stepped up their painfully slow pace of hiring.

But the unemployment rate, measured by a separate survey of households, remained stuck at 9.6 percent for the third straight month.

The Labor Department said Friday its survey of employers showed a net gain of 151,000 jobs last month, the first increase since May. Private employers hired 159,000 workers, the best since April.

Economists welcomed the report, which showed much stronger job gains than Wall Street analysts had expected.

This is not a gangbusters report but it is very important," said Carl Riccadonna, an economist at Deutsche Bank. "It shows us that the momentum in employment is building."

Employers also extended the average work week to 34.3 hours, up by one-tenth. The additional jobs and longer work week should boost Americans' incomes and provide fuel for more consumer spending, which drives about 70 percent of the economy

The additional income, combined

with the Federal Reserve's decision Wednesday to pump more cash into the economy and the potential extension of the Bush tax cuts. could "jump start a virtuous cycle," Riccadonna said. More income may encourage more spending, leading to more hiring by healthier companies, he added.

The department also revised August and September's payroll figures higher. The private sector added 103,000 more jobs in those two months than previously estimated.

So far this year, the economy has added 874,000 jobs and over a million in the private sector. But that comes after the nation lost more than 8 million jobs in 2008 and 2009.

And about 14.8 million people say they were unemployed, a figure that hasn't improved much since the beginning of the year.

The job gains were concentrated in relatively few sectors: retailers added 27,900 positions, likely in preparation for the holiday season. Temporary agencies added 34,900. Restaurants and bars hired 24,400 people.

Government at all levels shed only 8,000 jobs, a much better showing

The construction industry added a small number of jobs, while the manufacturing sector shed 7,000 positions. Factory employment has been roughly unchanged since May,

The economy needs to add at least 100,000 net new jobs a month just to keep up with population growth. It will need to generate many more than that to cut into the unemployment rate, which has now topped 9.5 percent for 15 months.

The economy is growing, but at a weak pace. The Commerce Department said last month that gross domestic product, the broadest measure of the nation's output, increased by 2 percent in the July-September period. That isn't fast enough to encourage much hiring.

High unemployment helped < stoke voter anger in congressional elections earlier this week. The Republican Party took control of the House and made significant gains in the Senate.

On Wednesday, the Federal Reserve announced a plan to buy \$600 billion in Treasury bonds in an effort to accelerate economic growth. Those purchases are intended to lower interest rates on mortgages and other loans and spur more borrowing and spending.



AUSTIN (AP) - Texas authorities have set 2011 execution dates for two men who were condemned for killing teenagers.

State District Judge Maria Teresa Herr on Thursday set a July 7, 2011, execution date for a Mexican national condemned in the 1994 rape and killing of 16-year-old said. Adria Sauceda in San Antonio.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals on Feb. 10 help send the team off to refused to reconsider additional DNA testing requested by 37-year-old Humberto Leal of Monterrey, Mexico. Sauceda's body was found on a road near a party they both had attended.

Separately, State District Judge Sharen Wilson on Thursday ordered the execution of Michael Wayne Hall on Feb. 15, 2011. Hall was condemned in the torture and killing of Amy Robinson, a 19-year-old mentally impaired woman, who was shot with arrows, a pellet gun and a rifle.

Fort Worth Star-Telegram said the proposed execution date is 13 years to the day since Robinson's death.

Another man convicted in the killing, Robert Neville, was executed in 2006. Both men worked with Robinson at a grocery store.

Halloween holdup arrests made

PANTEGO (AP) - Four teenage suspects have been caught as police in Pantego investigate the robbery of about 30 people at a Halloween eve party.

Police Chief Joel McKinney says three suspects were captured Wednesday night at an apartment complex. Fort Worth police say the fourth teen was caught after authorities found a loaded gun in his car.

The suspects, who are 17 and 18, face multiple counts of aggravated robbery.

Police say four young men, including two with guns, wore costumes when they crashed the party Saturday night. The father of one of the partygoers, who arrived to pick up his child, was beaten by the suspects and required medical attention.

Police have said most of the partygoers attend Arlington High School.

Texas gas prices dip slightly

IRVING (AP) — The average price of gasoline in Texas dipped slightly to \$2.63 this week.

The weekly AAA Texas price survey released Thursday shows the Texas price fell an average of 2 cents per gallon, while the national average held steady at \$2.81.

Despite crude oil prices rising to the \$85-a-barrel range, the auto club says a larger-than-expected supply of gasoline and oil is stabilizing prices.

The cheapest prices in Texas are in Fort Worth and San Antonio at \$2.59 per gallon, 3 cents less than last week in Fort Worth and 2 cents less in San Antonio. The costliest gasoline is in Amarillo, where the average price fell a nickel to \$2.68.

Today in History

Today is Friday, Nov. 5, the 309th day of 2010. There are 56 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 5, 1940, President Franklin D. Roosevelt won an unprecedented third term in office as he defeated Republican challenger Wendell L. Willkie. On this date:

In 1605, the "Gunpowder Plot" failed as Guy Fawkes was seized before he could blow up the English Parliament.

In 1872, suffragist Susan B. Anthony defied the law by attempting to vote for President Ulysses S. Grant. (Anthony was convicted by a judge and fined \$100, but never paid the fine.)

In 1935, Parker Brothers began marketing the board game "Monopoly."

In 1946, Republicans captured control of both the Senate and the House in midterm elections.

In 1960, silent film producer Mack Sennett, best known for his "Keystone Kops" comedies and introducing Charlie Chaplin to the screen, died in Los Angeles at age 80.

In 1968, Richard M. Nixon won the presidency, defeating Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and American Independent candidate George C. Wallace.

In 1974, Ella T. Grasso was elected governor of Connecticut, becoming the first woman to win a gubernatorial office without succeeding her husband. In 1985, Spencer W. Kimball, president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, died at

age 90; he was succeeded by Ezra Taft Benson. In 1990, Rabbi Meir Kahane, the Brooklyn-born Israeli extremist, was shot to death at a New York hotel. (Egyptian native El Sayyed Nosair was con-

victed of the slaying in federal court.) In 1999, U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson declared Microsoft Corp. a monopoly. (Judge Jackson later ordered Microsoft broken up into two companies, but the Justice Department subsequently said it was no longer seeking a breakup.)

Ten years ago: Abdelkhader El Mouaziz won the New York City Marathon, finishing in 2:10:09 and becoming the first Moroccan champion. Ludmila Petrova became the first Russian champion, winning the women's division in 2:25:45.

Five years ago: Pirates attacked a cruise ship off the coast of Somalia, but the ship changed course and sped away to escape.

One year ago: A shooting rampage at the Fort Hood Army post in Texas left 13 people dead; Maj. Nidal Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, was charged with premeditated murder and attempted murder for the worst mass killing on a U.S. military base

The Internet has created so many opportunities for businesses and individuals to communicate more effectively

As the popularity has grown exponentially, so have the risks of fraudulent criminal activity. As mentioned in a previous article, social networking is where most of the criminal activity takes place.

A social network is a social structure made up of individuals (or organizations) which are connected by interdependencies such as friendship, kinship, or common interests. Most people would not open an e-mail from a stranger, but would not think twice about the e-mail from their sister or coworker. Most people would not install a program given to them from a stranger, but they would click on a pop-up they get while browsing the Internet. Let's take a look at a couple of techniques used to trick the user into giving up sensitive information or installing malicious software. We are going to look at spoofing and phishing.

We get calls frequently from orgazations claiming to be supporting the local community only to find out that they are actually call centers that have nothing to do with the community. Have you ever received a letter from a lottery organization claiming to have won and they need your banking information so they can send you the money? We often get calls from clients saving their computer is compromised because people on their contact list are getting spam messages from them. In reality, they are a victim of spoofing. Spoofing is the practice of masquerading or impersonating as another individual. The more wellknown you are, the more likely that you will be spoofed. I get e-mails sometimes that are addressed from me. I know that I didn't send them. So what happened? Let me explain using a more traditional example. This example involves David, Sally (David's girlfriend), Sally's parents, and Becky (Sally's friend that moved to another town). Suppose that David wanted to send a love letter to his girlfriend Sally. Sally's parents have grounded her because she spends too much time with David and her grades are suffering.



with the return address of Becky. Both Sally and her parents think the letter is from Becky but in reality it came David. from Sally reads the love letter and wonders why Becky sent it to her. Since David

forgot to put his name in the letter, Sally calls Becky and asks her about the letter. Becky tells Sally that she didn't send the letter.

Now, let's take a look at this situation. Only David knows that he sent the letter. Can Becky stop David from sending letters using her return address? No. Sally opens the letter without hesitation because Becky is

spoofed e-mail that appears to be sent from a bank. The e-mail often says that there is a problem with the account and immediate action is required. The e-mail asks the user to click on a link to login to their account to fix the problem. In reality, when the user clicks the link, the user is redirected to a fake website that is appears to be legitimate.



When the user tries to login using their username and password, their confidential information is collected and the criminal now has access to the real bank website.

These fake websites are usually short-lived, so that it is very difficult to track down the source. Often, these fake websites are set up in compromised web servers and compromised user accounts.

The best way to defend yourself against phishing attempts is to contact the bank directly and ask them about the e-mail. You can also open up a browser and go to the website directly and not use the link provided in the e-mail. Phishing is not limited to banking and is often used for online shopping sites and networking sites such as facebook and myspace. As you can see, there are many ways that criminals can get personal information from unsuspecting users. If you feel that you have been a victim of spoofing and phishing, change your password to your accounts and notify the banks, etc. Forward the spoofed e-mail to the business so they can be aware that it is happening. Keeping your system up-todate and having good anti-virus/antimalware will also help. Ultimately, we have to be cautious of when we enter sensitive information and we must be careful when opening e-mail. If you feel your computer has been compromised, contact a computer professional. You do not want your computer systems traced back to these criminal activities. Some malicious software is very difficult to detect and sometimes it is difficult to remove.

This happens every day in the Internet world. It is very easy to change the reply address in an e-mail. Spammers use this technique to trick people into opening e-mails because they think it is from a trusted source. Often, the e-mail contains an attachment or a link which can install malware or viruses. The spammers get e-mail addresses from many sources including company directories, websites, social sites such as Myspace and Facebook, or from compromised computers.

Phishing is similar to fishing in that bait is used to try and catch it's victim. Spoofing is often used by criminals as part of their phishing schemes. As you can see in the example above, spoofing is very easy to do and happens every day. The most common phishing attempts involve logging into secure websites.

Phishing is similar to spoofing in that it uses the practice of masquerading or impersonating. Phishing is typically carried out by e-mail and it often directs users to enter details at a fake website whose look and feel are almost identical to the legitimate one. A common phishing attempt is a

Replacing a kitchen range hood

Dear Pat: My kitchen smells when I cook fish or onions, but the range hood is too noisy to use. I would like to build a decorative wood one myself. Is this a good idea, or is a stock range hood better? - Jes S.

Dear Jes: People often don't realize how important it is to use a range hood when cooking. Odors are the least of the concerns. Without a range hood running, vaporized grease eventually will coat the kitchen walls. During the summer, the heat and moisture from cooking also make your air conditioner run harder.

Although range hoods are fairly simple devices with a fan and a light, their interiors have special details that would be difficult for you to duplicate. The screens and airflow passages inside the range hood are designed to capture and condense grease vapors before they build up in the duct. A grease-filled duct may become a fire hazard.

There are many very decorative designs of stock range hoods available to complement any kitchen decor. Most home center stores carry good-quality, attractive models for between \$100 and \$200. They are also much quieter than your old one. Some very ornate range hoods can cost as much as \$2,000. Some even have built-in automatic fire extinguishers to put out a grease fire.

The first step in replacing an old range hood yourself is to switch off the electric power at the circuit breaker box. Turn the range hood on. You will know you switched the proper circuit breaker when it stops running. Examine the wires with a circuit tester just to doublecheck the power is off to the range hood.

Remove the old range hood and measure the location of the duct opening, the electrical wiring to it and any other items or cabinet protrusions that need to be avoided. You should have a helper during this step to support the range hood while you loosen the mounting screws. Take a photo of the cabinet area with the range hood removed and take it to the home center with you.

When selecting your new range hood, look for ones with a height so the bottom surface will be between 24 and 30 inches above the range top. It would be ideal if it extends about 3 inches over the front edge of the range. The new range hood width will be determined by the space between your cabinets. Most range hoods have selectable duct openings at the top and back. Open the required duct and electrical knockout holes.



its keyhole mounting holes on the wall. The mounting screws are usually included with the range hood. Remove the range hood and drive the mounting screws about halfway into the wall. Place the range hood back over the screws to make sure they are properly located.

Push the range hood tightly against the wall and check for any large unattractive gaps between it and the cabinets. You may have to remove it again and nail up some thin trim strips for a good fit. With the range hood loosely mounted, attach the wiring to it and test to make sure it works. Tighten the mounting screws.

Garza said the key to victory will be taking care of their side.


"We need to be confident, pass well and just get past our first time jitters," Garza said.

#3 Kirsten Kuhn, Jr.


Kuhn led the team in digs all season long and also found herself leading in serve aces in some
