Habitat seeks families who need homes

Karen Price is looking for families that need homes.

The head of Habitat for Humanity in Pampa, Price said this week that they are looking for families in Pampa this fall that will qualify for homes under the program.

"We are taking applications," Price said. "We're going to select families for habitat homes."

She said the selection committee would like to make the selections this month.

Price said applicants can go online and get an application at www.pampahabitat.org and read the guidelines.

Price said families will be considered if their present housing is not adequate, and the people are unable to obtain adequate housing through conventional means.

She said lack of adequate housing may include problems with structure; water, electrical or sewage systems; heating systems, or failure to meet city property maintenance standards. Price said the organization's selection committee will also take into consideration the number, ages and gender of children compared to the number of bedrooms in a present home.

Team returns PHS to sport's map



You almost couldn't have plotted it any better. At the beginning of the 2010 season, the Pampa Lady Harvesters volleyball team was struggling with issues like team chemistry that had plagued them in previous seasons. By year's end, though, the team corrected course in spectacular fashion, finishing the season ranked in the Top 10 and having the whole town behind them during their playoff run.

The Lady Harvesters finished 27-14, won their first district title since the early 1990s, qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1999 and was ranked as high as 10th in the state poll. 

was reported at Brown-Oil drops below \$86 a barrel as rally cools

NEW YORK (AP) — A two-week rally in oil prices was put on hold Friday on concerns that China would take steps to cool off its economy.

China, the largest energy consumer in the world, is expected to increase oil consumption by 400,000 barrels per day in 2011 and drive world oil demand for years to come. But analysts say that appetite for crude could be reduced if Beijing moves to control economic growth after inflation

hit a 25-month high in October. Benchmark oil for December delivery dropped \$2.28, or 2.6 percent, to \$85.53 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange


"You've seen a push all week to get this market moving higher, but we're kind of stalling right now," oil trader and analyst Stephen Schork said.

Schork said oil will continue to be heavily influenced by the U.S. dollar. Oil is priced in dollars, and it tends to move opposite the dollar in commodities markets. When the dollar falls, for example, investors look to park their money in safer investments like energy commodities, and this pushes the price of oil higher.


That's been the case as the Federal Reserve takes steps to stimulate the U.S. economy. The Fed is pumping \$600 billion into a bond-buying program, effectively reducing already low interest rates. Oil prices jumped more than \$14 per barrel, nearly 20 percent, since September, when the Fed first indicated that it would make such a move.

As oil prices increased, they pushed retail gasoline prices higher as well. Many East Coast cities are now seeing pump prices above \$3 per gallon.

The national average for regular unleaded gas increased more than a penny overnight to \$2.876 a gallon, according to auto club AAA, Wright Express and Oil Price Information Service. A gallon of regular unleaded is 5.6 cents more expensive than it was last month and 22.6 cents higher than it was last year.

MILFORD, Iowa (AP) - A Texas businessman has died after crashing a kit airplane near Milford in northwestern

The Star Tribune of Minneapolis reports aviation officials identified the man as 67-year-old Geary Gearn of Hereford, Texas. The Iowa State Patrol tells KTIV-TV the single-engine plane crashed Wednesday afternoon in southern Dickinson County.

Gearn has had the cattle feed mill business Gearn Industries Inc. for about 40 years. Office manager Deena Richards says Gearn took a commercial flight to Minnesota to pick up the plane. It was there for maintenance.

Richards says Gearn intended to fly about 1,000 miles from Air Lake Airport in Lakeville, Minn., to Texas. The plan was a Swearingen SX300. Federal authorities are investigating the crash.

Crash shuts down I-30 in Dallas

DALLAS (AP) - Six people are hurt after a chain of collisions on the Interstate 30 bridge over the Trinity River west of downtown Dallas.

The sequence began when a tractor-trailer rig slammed into the rear of a cement truck. The impact flipped the cement truck over the center barrier and crashing into an oncoming 18-wheeler and four passenger vehicles.

Dallas County sheriff's spokeswoman Kim Leach says the Thursday afternoon crash shut down the vital Dallas freeway interstate in both directions. She didn't expect it to reopen till after rush hour.

Leach says the injured were in the passenger vehicles. Six were taken to Dallas hospitals, two in critical condition. She said they are still investigating what caused the

Porpoises rescued Dick Van Dyke

LONDON (AP) - On screen, Dick Van Dyke has been rescued from untimely death by flying cars and magical

70 whooping cranes reach Texas

AUSTWELL (AP) - At least 70 endangered whooping cranes have flown from Canada to a refuge in Texas.

Tom Stehn with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services says the ground survey was done at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge. Sten on Thursday also said that last week's cold snap apparently led more whooping cranes to head south

The Victoria Advocate reports six of 10 birds fitted with radio transmitters, for tracking, have arrived in

Stehn says there were 263 birds in the flock when they migrated north last spring. Biologists expect 285 to 290 cranes this fall in Texas.

The flock summers in Wood Buffalo National Park in the Northwest Territories of Canada. Stehn says there was plenty of water this year at the breeding grounds, meaning improved conditions for survival.

UNT turbine plans proceed

DENTON (AP) - The Mean Green is going greener. University of North Texas regents on Thursday approved hiring an architect or engineer and the budget for a campus wind turbine project.

The turbines are planned at Mean Green Village, which is part of the school's football stadium project.

The Denton Record-Chronicle reports the plan is for three 125-foot-tall wind turbines. The devices will help provide electricity for the stadium, which is under construction and scheduled to be ready for next season.

The State Energy Conservation Office has offered a \$2 million grant. UNT administrators say a feasibility study, done this year, produced positive results.

Vice Chancellor Richard Escalante says the project is expected to provide savings for the school.

Stadium short \$5M payment

HOUSTON (AP) - The Harris County-Houston Sports Authority, for the first time, is turning to its \$56 million reserve account to make a debt payment on Reliant Stadium.

The Houston Chronicle reported Friday that the authority is short \$5 million on a payment due this week on the venue, which is home to the Houston Texans.

The debt payments surged in 2009 after the downgrade of its bond insurer and then a bank's demand that the authority pay off, in five years, debt that had been due by 2030.

Sports Authority chairman J. Kent Friedman says it's a short-term "cash-flow crunch" and he's not concerned. The authority must pay \$12 million twice a year to cover payments on \$125 million in variable rate bonds. This month's installment is the third of 10 inflated pay-

Man forced to eat own beard

LAWRENCEBURG, Ky. -- A central Kentucky man said he's waiting for justice to be served after two men shaved his beard, then made him eat it.

Harvey Westmoreland and his brother got into a fight with James Hill and Troy Holt in May.

The dispute was over a tractor Westmoreland was try-

ing to sell to one of the men. Westmoreland said the men felt like they were being

ripped off and that's when the fight started. Troy offered to buy it from me for \$250 dollars. I paid twenty bucks for it. He thought I was trying to cheat him," Westmoreland told WLEX-TV. "One thing led to another, and before I knew it, there were knives and guns

and everything just went haywire." "(Then) they cut my beard and forced me to eat it,"

he said.

Hill and Holt pleaded guilty. It's expected they'll be fined and sentenced to supervised diversion.

Victory could boost gas drilling

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - The Republicans' big election victories in Pennsylvania and on Capitol Hill could be Christmas-come-early for the drilling companies that are rushing to exploit the Marcellus Shale, the biggest known deposit of natural gas in the nation.

Republican Gov.-elect Tom Corbett is seen as a lot friendlier toward the industry than outgoing Democrat Ed Rendell, who has clashed with natural gas companies over both taxes and tougher new cleanwater regulations.

Also, the GOP takeover of the U.S. House will almost surely doom efforts in Congress to impose federal regulation over gas drilling.

Among many Republicans, there is elation. GOP strategist Karl Rove told participants in an oil and gas industry conference in Pittsburgh last week that they can now expect "a period of sensible regulations."

"As a signal, is it good? Yes," said a more cautious-sounding William Garner, a Houston lawyer and former investment banker who specializes in the natural gas industry. "But will it make a difference? Time will tell."

Among other things, the incoming governor opposes any attempt to slap gas-extraction tax on the industry. Pennsylvania is the largest gas-drilling state without such a tax, and Rendell tried and failed to persuade the Legislature to approve one. Corbett has also said he will lift Rendell's executive order preventing the issuing of any more drilling leases in state forests.

A drilling boom has been under way since 2008 in the Marcellus Shale, a vast underground geologic formation that extends from West Virginia and eastern Ohio through Pennsylvania into southern New York. Some geologists estimate it could yield enough natural gas to supply the entire East Coast for 50 years.

Its huge commercial potential was underscored earlier this week when oil giant Chevron struck a \$4.3 billion deal to buy Atlas Energy, a major Marcellus Shale driller.

Combining a new process of horizontal drilling with a technique known as hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, drillers are unlocking vast deposits there and in other formations around the U.S. such as the Barnett Shale in Texas - a boom that could ensure cheap and plentiful natural gas for many years to come for homeowners, factories and power plants.

The drilling frenzy in the Marcellus Shale is also credited with enriching landowners and pumping new life into trucking companies, short-line railroads, quarries and steel-pipe makers, as well as the restaurants and hotels hosting out-of-state - sional approval. drilling crews. An industry-financed study by Penn State projected that the boom would generate tens of thousands of jobs and hundreds of millions of dollars in state and local taxes in the coming years.

However, the use of fracking - in which

millions of gallons of water, sand and toxic chemicals are injected into each well to break apart the shale and release trapped gas - is raising pollution concerns across the Northeast.

While the industry maintains that fracking has been proved safe over the decades, homeowners are coming forward with tales of wells producing brown, foulsmelling water or water polluted with methane and chemicals.

In the northeastern Pennsylvania town of Dimock, a hotspot of Marcellus Shale exploration, some residents no longer use their polluted well water and can light their taps on fire because of methane they say seeped into their wells because of drilling.

The Rendell administration intends to bill Houston-based Cabot Oil & Gas Corp. the \$12 million cost of installing a water line to serve 14 families in Dimock. Cabot denies the methane is connected to its

The gas drilling business got what it wanted in the election of Corbett, who received nearly \$1 million in donations from the industry. Among his first actions this week was to name Christine Toretti. a national GOP committeewoman and owner of a Pennsylvania drilling company, as co-chair of his transition team.

-Without giving specifics, Corbett on Wednesday promised a "reasonable" regulatory stand that protects the environment. He will be able to appoint a new head of the Department of Environmental Protection, which under Rendell has tried to aggressively deal with the problems brought by the gas rush.

"I look at this as an industry that's going to be here long after all of us in the room are gone," Corbett said. "It is going to be a great industry and we need to develop it properly. We need to develop it protecting the environment and growing jobs in

Congress exempted fracking from federal clean water regulations in 2005, but some lawmakers have been pushing to

Sen. Bob Casey, D.Pa., sponsor of a measure that would subject fracking to regulation by the Environmental Protection Agency, predicts a bleaker landscape now for his bill.

"If anything, there are more votes against it," he said Tuesday

Whether events ultimately unfold to the industry's liking remains to be seen.

The election doesn't affect a web of state and federal regulatory bodies that could stand in the way of drilling, industry analysts said. The EPA, for example, could try to regulate fracking without congres-

Rolf Hanson of the Associated Petroleum Industries of Pennsylvania, an industry lobbying group, said: "I for sure don't see this as, 'All of a sudden things are going to be rosy for the industry and we're going to get a free pass.""

Ground broken on Xcel addition AMARILLO - Xcel development and more jobs project cost is approxi-

Energy has broken ground on a planned addition to the Jones Generating Station near Lubbock, to accommodate a growth in regional power demand.

In April, Xcel Energy's Amarillo-based subsidiary, Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS), sought permission from the **Public Utility Commission** of Texas to add a third unit to Jones Station that would be operational by the summer of 2012. A rebounding regional economy, which will lead to greater demand for electricity in 2011, prompted Xcel Energy to move the expansion up by one year.

"Our regional oil and gas industries have expanded even as the national economy slumped, and we know that these and other industries are planning more over the next few years," said Riley Hill, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company.

"We need to be prepared to meet this accelerated growth with an expedited construction schedule of our own."

Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock, is a natural gas-fueled, steamelectric generating station with two operating units - Jones Unit 1 completed in 1971 and Jones Unit 2 completed in 1974. The plant currently has a generating capacity of 486 megawatts. The new unit will be a Siemens Energy gas combustion turbine with a summer capacity rating of approximately 168 megawatts - enough to power more than 126,000 typical homes in this region. Total

mately \$107 million. Initially, Xcel Energy

expects to use the additional power to help meet summer demand, traditionally higher than any other period of the year. "Another benefit is the new turbine will help us

respond more quickly to

changes in the region's growing wind generation output. This type of technology makes sense at this time," Hill added. Xcel Energy's Texas and New Mexico service area covers more than 50,000 square miles, including most of the Texas

Panhandle, the Texas South Plains region, and eastern and southeastern New Mexico. Peak electricity demand in this region is currently about 5,000 megawatts.



G20 refuses to back U.S. push on China

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Leaders of 20 major economies on Friday refused to back a U.S. push to make China boost its currency's value, keeping alive a dispute that raises fears of a global trade war amid criticism that cheap Chinese exports are costing American jobs.

A joint statement issued by the leaders including President Barack Obama and China's Hu Jintao tried to recreate the unity that was evident when the Group of 20 rich and developing nations held its first summit two years ago during the global financial meltdown.

But deep divisions, especially over the U.S.-China currency dispute, left G-20 officials negotiating all night to draft a watered-down statement for the leaders to endorse.

"Instead of hitting home runs sometimes we're gonna hit singles. But they're really important singles," Obama told a news conference after the summit.

Other leaders also tried to portray the summit as a success, pointing to their pledges to fight protectionism and develop guidelines next year that will measure the imbalances between trade surplus and trade deficit countries.

The G-20's failure to adopt the U.S. stand has underlined Washington's reduced influence on the international stage, especially on economic matters. In another setback, Obama also failed to conclude a free trade agreement this week with South Korea.

would be an impossible task turned out to take just four evenings, thanks to a big helping hand from the community

Add stained glass panel to an entry door

Dear Pat: Our raised panel wood front door is in good condition, but I would like to install a stained glass window in it for more light. Is it possible to add a large window in the door? — Lorna G.

Dear Lorna: Adding decorative glass to your front door can make a dramatic improvement to your home and provide additional natural light. If your door faces any direction other than north, the stained glass will be beautiful when the sun shines through it.

Installing glass in place of one or several panels in a wood door is not a difficult project. It just requires patience and a steady hand. Most of the cutting will be done with a circular saw (fine-toothed blade), but a small amount of hand sawing or use of a chisel will be required.

First, measure the size of the opening you plan to cut. Measure from the solid edge of the rail and stile where the taper for the panel begins. Have your glass sections made to dimensions one-quarter inch smaller than the opening to provide one-eighth-inch clearance all around.

For energy efficiency and security, it will probably be best to install a thin, clear double-pane insulated panel first with the stained glass indoors. This will also protect the stained glass from possible damage and the weather.

You should be able to find a glass fabricator in the Yellow Pages who can make both the stained glass and insulated glass panels for you.

Once the glass panels have arrived at your house, you can begin the panel removal process. The ideal removal method is to saw along the indoor edge of the rails and stile to a shallow depth, about three-fourths inch. You will have to use a wood chisel or hand saw to finish-cut the corners.

You want to saw just deep enough to remove the indoor tapered edge and the panel, but not the outdoor edge. The glass panels will rest against the outdoor edge so the trim around the glass will still match the other panels.

HOW-TO


Brush some sealer or primer on the bare wood. When dry, lay a fine bead of silicon caulk along the edge of the opening and place the insulated glass panel into it. Place several small lumps of silicone caulk on the edge of the insulated panel and place the stained glass against it.

Don't place a continuous bead of caulk between the insulated glass and the stained glass panels. This

would make it difficult to remove the stained glass panel at a later time and it may trap moisture in between them. In colder climates, this could result in fogging between the panes.

Purchase some screen-type trim molding to finish off the indoor side of the glass. You should be able to find some that resembles the other panel trim profiles. Use a miter box to cut 45-degree angles and nail the trim in place over the stained glass. Be careful when using the hammer near the stained glass.

"We want to recognize them for what they did and it's an honor for us," Owens said. "We will never know everything they went through. It was difficult for them but they won us so many important freedoms."




