

Honorary TX Ranger for Norris

GARLAND, Texas (AP) - Actor Chuck Norris for years played a Texas Ranger on television. Now he's going to become one in real life.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry is scheduled to present the actor and executive director of "Walker, Texas Ranger" with a designation as an honorary member of the famed law enforcement group Thursday.

Ceremonies to honor the 70-year-old martial arts star and entertainment action hero, who is known for doing good and going after bad guys and gals in the long-running TV series, will take place at a Texas Rangers office in suburban Dallas.

SA appeals water rights lawsuit

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The San Antonio Water System has asked an appeals court to reinstate its \$1.2 billion water-rights lawsuit against the Lower Colorado River Authority.

A three-judge panel of the Texas 3rd Court of Appeals on Wednesday took the request under advisement.

SAWS claims breach of a water-sharing contract. A judge in February rejected the lawsuit.

The Austin American-Statesman reports the appeal hinges on whether San Antonio can convince the judges that LCRA had waived its right to sovereign immunity.

The arrangement would have sent water from the Colorado River to San Antonio for 80 years. In return, the Colorado River basin would get money to fund longterm storage projects and conservation. LCRA dropped the deal in April 2009, saying it did not

have enough water to share with San Antonio

Nueces ME to get \$75,000 raise

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - Nueces County commissioners have approved a \$75,000 raise for the county's medical examiner.

(AP) - Decked out in clothing straight out of a spaghetti Western, Richard Branson climbed down from Virgin America's first flight to Texas on Wednesday, marking the start of a showdown with American Airlines.

Virgin America has carved a niche for itself offering amenityby rich service at low fares between California and the East Coast. But Virgin has never flown anywhere in the middle of the country, and it's never entered a fortress hub like Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, where AMR Corp.'s American controls more than 80 percent of the flights.

Branson said it's precisely American's dominance that provided an opening for Virgin to come in with lower fares, newer planes and more passenger amenities

"We can get our fair slice of the market," said Branson, who wore leather chaps, a pearl-button Western shirt, red bandanna and cowboy hat for the occasion.

Within four or five years, he predicted, Virgin will command 8 percent of the U.S. air travel market ГÇö or about what US Airways Group Inc. and Continental control now. That's a bold forecast for a three-yearold airline that, according to its own CEO, barely survived the 2008 surge in fuel prices. Virgin will start small in Dallas, offering two daily nonstop flights between DFW and Los Angeles, and two to San Francisco. It plans to add at least a third flight to each city, but even six flights would pale compared to the hundreds flown by American and its regional affiliate, American is already fighting back ГÇö cutting fares, offering double frequentflier miles and handing out freebies such as \$100 gift cards aboard some flights on the Dallas-Los Angeles and Dallas-San Francisco routes. American spokesman Tim Smith declined to discuss Virgin specifically, but said, "At DFW, there are a total of 18 different airlines . we compete vigorously with all of them." Robert Mann, an aviation consultant in the New York area, said American "will undoubtedly make it very punishing for Virgin to serve the market, which Virgin may ultimately conclude isn't worth pursuing.


"This is how flying becomes fun again," Seaney said. "Southwest has the style but not the product, and American is trying to improve their product.

Seaney believes plenty of Dallas leisure travelers will try Virgin but business travelers will be reluctant because of the scarcity of flights. He said American's huge frequent-flier program will give it another advantage over its new rival.

Virgin CEO David Cush, a former American Airlines executive, acknowledged that Virgin must add at least a third daily round trip on both California routes to lure business travelers but gave no timetable for doing that. American has about 16 daily nonstop flights to Los Angeles and nine to Dallas and New York or San Francisco from Dallas. Cush said, however, that Virgin doesn't plan to launch service between to do that.

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Commissioners on Wednesday unanimously approved the salary bump for coroner Ray Fernandez, bringing his annual pay to nearly \$239,000.

Fernandez, who before the raise was already the county's highest-paid employee, said he sought a salary more comparable to other medical examiners.

The average pay for coroners in Harris, Travis and Bexar (bayr) counties is almost \$258,000.

County Judge Loyd Neal said he supported paying Fernandez more and put the item on Wednesday's agenda. Fernandez, who's from Corpus Christi, has worked for the county since 2003.

The money for the coroner's pay hike is expected to come from \$144,000 set aside to pay a jail physician, whose contract has been canceled.

Students protest liberal arts cuts

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - About 150 students and faculty protested at the University of Texas in Austin as liberal arts programs face possible budget cuts.

Texas legislators who convene next month will write American Eagle. the next two-year state budget amid a shortfall that some estimates have put as high as \$24 billion.

The peaceful campus protest Wednesday included students concerned that ethnic, women's and gender studies will be among the programs trimmed.

Some demonstrators held signs that said: "These budget cuts are racist."

Police say nobody was arrested.

Socorro voters consider recall

SOCORRO, Texas (AP) - Voters in Socorro will decide whether to remove indicted Mayor Guillermo "Willie" Gandara Sr. and a city councilman arrested in a drug case.

The city council Wednesday night approved holding a recall election. The ordinance says the criminal charges damage the reputation and public image of Socorro.

Gandara, who is accused of conspiracy to commit mail and wire fraud when he was a school board member, says the citizens should decide whether they want him as mayor.

Councilman Luis Varela was arrested Nov. 16 and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Varela was not at Wednesday's meeting.

USS Fort Worth to be christened

MARINETTE, Wis. (AP) - The U.S. Navy will break out the champagne this weekend to help christen a battleship in northeast Wisconsin.

The USS Fort Worth is a littoral combat ship. That's a new class of warship designed to conduct water combat just off an enemy's shore.

Navy officials will christen the ship Saturday at the Marinette Marine Corp. shipyard. Former deputy Defense Secretary Gordon England will carry on the Navy tradition of cracking a champagne bottle across the bow.

The Navy says the ship was named in honor of the Texas

city's history of supporting the armed forces. Littoral combat ships can be used to defend ground troops and hunt submarines. They're also designed for quick modification. For example, a ship's anti-submarine package could be quickly swapped out for a mine-warfare package.



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

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Dec. 2, the 336th day of 2010. There are 29 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 2, 1970, the newly created Environmental Protection Agency opened its doors. (Its first director was William D. Ruckelshaus.)

On this date:

In 1804, Napoleon crowned himself Emperor of the French.

In 1823, President James Monroe outlined his doctrine opposing European expansion in the Western Hemisphere.

In 1859, militant abolitionist John Brown was hanged for his raid on Harpers Ferry the previous October

In 1927, Ford Motor Co, formally unveiled its second Model A automobile, the successor to its Model T

In 1939, New York Municipal Airport-LaGuardia Field (later LaGuardia Airport) went into operation as an airliner from Chicago landed at one minute past midnight.

In 1942, an artificially created, self-sustaining nuclear chain reaction was demonstrated for the first time, at the University of Chicago.

In 1954, the Senate voted to condemn Wisconsin Republican Joseph R. McCarthy for conduct that "tends to bring the Senate into disrepute.

Leach says he hasn't heard from any schools

Mike Leach would love to be back on the sidelines next season. He says he just hasn't heard from anyone interested in hiring him yet.

The former Texas Tech coach is getting some lobbying help for the open job at Miami, though.

Donald Trump sent a letter to university President Donna Shalala this week, suggesting the Hurricanes hire Leach to replace the departed Randy Shannon. Leach and Trump have been friends for several years.

"It'd be fun" to coach at Miami, Leach told The Associated Press.

After all, it's just a threehour drive to Miami from Key West, Fla., where Leach moved his family from Lubbock shortly after his dismissal last December.

Besides Miami, there are Big Ten coaching vacancies at Indiana, which fired Bill

Lynch over the weekend, and Minnesota, which dismissed Tim Brewster during the season. Speculation abounds about the future of Rich Rodriguez at Michigan, which ended the year 7-5, and Pac-12bound Colorado fired Dan Hawkins, too.

"I think most folks know where to find me," Leach said.

The fact that he hasn't heard from any schools with openings, "further illustrates the damage" the firing has had on his reputation, Leach said.


Texas Tech fired Leach on Dec. 30, 2009, two days after suspending him amid allegations he mistreated Adam James, a receiver with a concussion. James, the son of former NFL player and ESPN analyst Craig James, has said Leach twice ordered him to stand for hours while confined in a dark place during practice.

Leach has denied he mistreated the player and suspects an \$800,000 bonus he was to have received Dec. 31, 2009, was the reason he was fired. He has sued the university for wrongful termination and filed a separate libel suit last week that accuses ESPN and a Dallas PR agency of slander.



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


