

"All of the families are from Pampa," said Post Service Officer Alvin Johnson. "And all of them are single mothers. In all, there are 26 children in these families."


A committee of VFW members, headed by George Collingsworth, was formed to sort through the names of families submitted by other members and from the community.

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

DALLAS (AP) - Operations have returned to normal at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport after officials evacuated a portion of Terminal D because of suspicious package, an airport spokesman said Friday.

Authorities, who responded with bomb-sniffing dogs and other security measures, used a robot to safely remove the package and take it off site, airport spokesman David Magana said.

The package was not immediately opened as officials were trying to reach the sender or recipient, he said

The package, which was in a shipping company's drop box inside Terminal D, was making a vibrating noise. Magana said authorities were alerted "to take every available precaution."

An area of about five gates near the center of Terminal D was evacuated.

The incident lasted a little more than two hours. Officials sounded the all clear at 1:30 p.m.

Houston store owner recovering

HOUSTON (AP) - A Houston jewelry store owner remains in critical condition after he was injured during an attempted robbery of his business where he shot and killed three armed men.

Police say 52-year old Ramon Castillo was in a Houston hospital on Friday, recovering from wounds to his stomach, shoulder and legs suffered a day earlier during the failed robbery of his east Houston store.

Police said Castillo fatally shot the three suspects after they went into his store and tied up his wife Eva during the robbery attempt.

Authorities identified two of the dead suspects as 21-year-old Nelson Wilfredo Tambora-Ramiro and 38-year-old Onilton Bolanos Castillano. The identity of the third dead suspect is pending.

Police say they are looking for a possible fourth suspect, the getaway driver.

Convicted Flores to stay in office

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Texas state Rep. Kino Flores gets to stay in office until his term expires despite his conviction on felony ethics charges, because there is no law or rule that prohibits convicted felons from serving in the state House if they are convicted while in office.

Flores, a Democrat from Palmview in South Texas, can still collect his taxpayer-funded \$600-a-month state salary, receive state benefits and control a legislative office budget.

It won't last long. Flores' term expires Jan. 11, the first day of the 2011 legislative session, and his felony conviction prevents him from voting or running for public office while on probation. But he would be allowed to vote on House matters if the Legislature was in session.

Flores, 52, had faced up to two years in prison but was sentenced to five years probation on Monday and ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine and serve 40 hours of community service in Hidalgo County. Flores was convicted on 11 felony and misdemeanor counts of tampering with government records and perjury.

Us rig count down by 14

signed into law a huge, holiday-season tax bill extending cuts for all Americans on Friday, saluting a new spirit of political compromise as Republicans applauded and liberals seethed. The benefits range from tax cuts for millionaires and the middle class to longer-term help for the jobless.

The most significant tax legislation in nearly a decade will avert big increases that would have hit millions of people starting in two weeks on New Year's Day. Declared Obama: "We are here with some good news for the American people this holiday season."

"This is progress and that's what they sent us here to achieve," Obama said as a rare bipartisan assembly of lawmakers looked on at the White House.

The package retains Bushera tax rates for all taxpayers, including the wealthiest Americans, a provision Obama and congressional liberals opposed. It also offers 13 months of extended benefits to the unemployed and attempts to stimulate the economy with a Social Security payroll tax cut for all workers

At a cost of \$858 billion over two years, the deal contains provisions dear to both Democrats and Republicans. It represents the most money that Obama was likely to have been able to dedicate over the next year to the slowly recovering economy. Yet it also increases the federal deficit at a time when the country is growing increasingly anxious about the red ink

Dramatic both as an economic and a political accomplishment, the agreement sets the stage for Obama's new relationship with Congress in the aftermath of a midterm election wave that devastated Democrats and stripped them of control of the House.

Obama called for maintaining the spirit of cooperation, declaring he was hopeful "that we might refresh the American people's faith in the capability of their leaders to govern in challenging times."

He conceded that the White House and Congress face a difficult challenge when it comes to controlling the deficit and tackling the nation's debt

to have to make next year," he said.

Conspicuous by their absence at the ceremony were House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., a reflection of the sharply divided sentiment about the bill in the Democratic caucus

For Obama, the deal completes the biggest agenda item he has placed before Congress during the postelection lame duck session. In addition, the White House is increasingly optimistic that he will also win Senate ratification of a nuclear arms deal with Russia and the repeal of the military's ban on openly gay service members.

Obama, who is delaying his vacation to Hawaii until Congress completes its work, now is expecting to leave Washington as early as next Wednesday, said spokesman Robert Gibbs.

Friday's bill signing marked a remarkably swift conclusion to a bargain struck 11 days ago between the White House and Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky.

To complete the deal, Obama set aside his vow-to extend tax cuts only for the middle class and lower wage earners. The measure also enacts an estate tax that is more generous to the wealthy than Obama had sought.

Since his campaign for president in 2008, Obama has said income tax rates should rise for single taxpayers with gross incomes over \$200,000 and married couples with incomes over \$250,000. His first budget, submitted a year ago, included plans for those tax hikes.

The extended tax cuts in the negotiated package include rates lower than those that would have gone into effect Jan. 1, a \$1,000-per-child tax credit, tax breaks for college students and lower taxes on capital gains and dividends. The bill also extends through 2011, a series of business tax breaks designed to encourage investment that expired at the end of 2009.

Social Security taxes would be cut by nearly a third, from making \$50,000 would save \$1,000; one making \$100,000 would save \$2,000

But the payroll tax cut also means that workers will face an increase in 2012 if the full 6.2 percent rate is restored. And by scheduling President George W. Bush's 2001 and 2003 tax rates to expire in two years, the law ensures that taxes will be a top issue in the 2012 presidential election.

The tax code is filled with dozens of cuts that expire each year, and not all of them made it into the package. Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., tried to include a property tax deduction for people who don't itemize, but it was left out. The provision would have saved taxpayers about \$1.5 billion a year

Republicans boasted that their success in extending tax cuts for all was a sign of things to come.

"The American people are seeing change here in Washington; they can expect more in the new year," said McConnell, who was singled out for praise by Obama and shook hands with the president after the signing.

Indeed, McConnell was directed to stand right next to the presidential desk where Obama was signing the bill, ensuring he would be prominent in the photos.

Liberals, unable to alter the plan, were left bristling. They argued Obama should have bargained harder, and they especially objected to the new estate tax, which will allow the first \$10 million of a couple's estate to pass to heirs without taxation. The balance would be subject to a 35 percent tax rate.

Obama signed the bill less than half an hour after meeting with a dozen labor leaders, some of whom were vocal critics of the agreement. A day before the session, AFL-CIO president Richard Trumka praised the union-sought jobless benefits but said passage of the legislation came "at a terrible price."

Rep. Anthony Weiner, D-N.Y., another critic of the bill, said Obama and lawmakers will face enormous election-year pressure in 2012 to extend the cuts again or make them permanent. Weiner said the Republicans turned out to be "better poker players" than Obama.

Obama conceded that the prospect of tax increases on all taxpayers helped prod an agreement that otherwise would have been difficult, if not impossible to achieve.

What's more, Obama's praise for Republicans, and his heralding of an overdue bipartisan moment in Washington, came after he himself spent the better part of 2010 bashing the GOP leadership as an obstructionist party of no.

The White House cautioned Republicans that Obama was not going to extend his hand in every case. "There will be times when we will draw the line and have big fights," Gibbs said.





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HOUSTON (AP) - The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. dropped by 14 this week to 1,709.

Houston-based Baker Hughes Inc. said Friday 941 rigs were exploring for natural gas and 756 for oil. Twelve were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago this week, the rig count stood at 1,193.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, Pennsylvania gained three rigs, Louisiana and New Mexico each gained two and North Dakota and West Virginia each increased by one rig. Wyoming lost the most rigs, dropping by six. Texas and Oklahoma each lost four rigs. California, Colorado and Alaska each lost one. Arkansas remained unchanged.

The rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981 at the height of the oil boom. It posted a record low of 488 in 1999.

NM bus crash injures 20

CORONA, N.M. (AP) - State police say 20 people were injured, none seriously, when a bus crashed with a cattle hauler in southern New Mexico.

Lt. Eric Garcia says the bus driver had a broken arm and others were treated at nearby hospitals for cuts and bruises

The crash closed U.S. 54 south of Corona in Lincoln County for about four hours Friday morning.

The bus is owned by the Los Paisanos company. Garcia says it was full but couldn't immediately say how many passengers were aboard.

A woman who answered the telephone at the company's office in El Paso, Texas, says executives are gathering information and had no immediate comment. According to the company's website, the bus line offers service between Mexico and several U.S. cities.

It wasn't known if weather contributed to the accident.

Dallas developer headed to jail

DALLAS (AP) - The developer of low-income apartment projects whose bribes were at the center of the Dallas City Hall public corruption case is headed to prison.

Brian Potashnik received his 14-month sentence in federal court Friday. He was fined \$50,000 and must forfeit \$1.25 million.

Potashnik's wife, Cheryl, was sentenced Friday to six years of probation and a \$50,000 fine.

Both Potaskniks pleaded guilty to a conspiracy to bribe charge. Brian Potashnik agreed in his plea deal to cooperate with prosecutors.

Authorities say the scheme involved developers bribing city officials in return for votes on their low-income housing projects. Former Dallas Mayor Pro Tem Don Hill, the No. 2 public official in City Hall, was sentenced earlier this year to 18 years in prison in connection with the scheme.

Today in History

Today is Saturday, Dec. 18, the 352nd day of 2010. There are 13 days left in the year

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 18, 1865, the 13th Amendment to the Constitution, abolishing slavery, was declared in effect by Secretary of State William H. Seward. On this date:

In 1787, New Jersey became the third state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1892, Tchaikovsky's ballet "The Nutcracker" publicly premiered in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In 1915, President Woodrow Wilson, widowed the year before, married Edith Bolling Galt at her Washington home.

In 1940, Adolf Hitler ordered secret preparations for Nazi Germany to invade the Soviet Union. (Operation Barbarossa was launched in June 1941.)

In 1944, in a pair of rulings, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the wartime relocation of Japanese-Americans, but also said undeniably loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry could not continue to be detained.

In 1957, the Shippingport Atomic Power Station in Pennsylvania, the first public, full-scale commercial nuclear facility to generate electricity in the United States, went on line. (It was taken out of service in 1982.)

In 1958, the world's first communications satellite, SCORE (Signal Communication by Orbiting Relay Equipment), nicknamed "Chatterbox," was launched by the United States aboard an Atlas rocket.

In 1969, Britain's House of Lords joined the House of Commons in making permanent a 1965 ban on the death penalty for cases of murder.

In 1972, the United States began heavy bombing of North Vietnamese targets during the Vietnam War.

Ten years ago: The Electoral College cast its ballots, with President-elect George W. Bush receiving the expected 271; Al Gore, however, received 266, one fewer than expected, because of a District of Columbia Democrat who'd left her ballot blank to protest the district's lack of representation in Congress.

Five years ago: In a televised speech, President George W. Bush declared that Iraq's parliamentary elections signaled the birth of democracy in the Middle East.

One year ago: The infamous iron sign bearing the Nazis' cynical slogan "Arbeit Macht Frei" ("Work Sets You Free") that spanned the main entrance to the former Auschwitz death camp in Poland was stolen. (The sign was later recovered and several suspects arrested.)







"We want (the community) to know that we're going to have extra officers out at night," McCullar said. "There's a zero tolerance policy with drinking and driving, even during the holiday season."

McCullar is also asking for the community's help in keeping intoxicated drivers off Pampa's streets.

"If any citizens suspect drinking and driving, please call the police department," said McCullar.

"There are some indications to know as far as possible drinking and driving: Swaying across lanes, driving really slow, randomly stepping on the brakes, driving erratically. If you're on the road and you see another driver doing those things and you suspect they might be a drunk driver, please go ahead and call us.

McCullar said that any people calling in to report a potential drunk driver should note the vehicle's license plate number, location and direction of travel, as well as a short description of the vehicle in question.

McCullar, however, was quick to mention that potential drunk drivers should be followed at a safe distance.

"We don't suggest getting anyone in danger," McCullar said.

Drunk driving, McCullar said, isn't any worse of a problem in Pampa that in many other communities. However, she added, that doesn't mean that the issue should be ignored.

"It's not a particularly bad issue, but it definitely happens," she said. "It's still something that we want to have less of. It's something that you can never have enough control of, because when you do that, you can save lives.'

McCullar added that if you do plan on partaking in alcohol outside of your home, take the necessary precautions before you leave.

"If you do plan on drinking, take that time and get a designated driver first," she said. "It doesn't take long, but that little time that you do take could keep you out of jail or even save your life."

McCullar stressed that it's better to have a ride ready or call someone to pick you up rather than walking home, as doing so could earn you a separate violation.

"That's actually public intoxication," McCullar said. "It's always just better to have a ride. Better safe than sorry."



No amount of campiness SPLIT-SCREEN On video: 'Despicable Me' can save clichéd 'Burlesque'

In theory, "Burlesque" probably should have worked.

It has bankable headliners in Cher and Christina Aguilera. It has a great supporting cast. And with a public hungry for nostalgic pleasures and the revival of burlesque in live entertainment (well, not around here, but still), it seemed like as good a time as any to bring it to the big screen.

"Burlesque," though, can't bring it all together. It's just bad. It's so bad, in fact, that circles right around and becomes compellingly awful.

This is the first musical for writer-director Steve Antin (who you might recognize as "Jessie" in Rick Springfield's "Jessie's Girl" music video - I couldn't make that up if I tried), and you can tell. A genre already burdened with stereotypes and bad writing, "Burlesque" is big on inspiration but never gets past the camp and clichés that spawned it. The film is the story of Ali (Aguilera), a spunky Midwestern girl who heads to Los Angeles to follow her big city dreams. Those dreams apparently lead her to the Burlesque, a revue theater owned by the hard-boiled Tess (Cher), where Ali learns to shed her small town image and unleash her inner diva. Along the way, she falls in love with an artistic bartender whose own dreams are hampered by his dead end job and strikes up a rivalry with the vindictive dancer who ruled the roost before she happened to prance through the door

Oh, and the theater is hemorrhaging money and is on the verge of being bought out by a greedy businessman.

Sound familiar? The premise is so overdone that no amount of campy spectacle and saucy rear end wiggling can hide the banality. It's a thorough waste of a very good supporting cast, who all perform admirably as the one-dimensional

in time to stop Vector. Some of the best parts of "Despicable Me" comes from Gru's Minions, an assortment of small, yellow, pill-shaped beings, who were presumably created to do Gru's bidding. The Minions comes in various sizes and personalities, and although they are mostly speaking gibberish they are always hilarious.

The villain-turned hero of "Megamind" is "Megamind" (voiced by Will Ferrel), a blue, bald genius of alien descent, who dreams of defeating his arch-nemesis, Metro Man (Brad Pitt). When he finally gets his wish he realizes a super villain needs a super hero and sets out to create Titan (Jonah Hill). Because its an animated kids movie "Megamind" comes to love Metro City and reporter Roxanne Ritchie (voiced by Tina Fey) and eventually changes his ways in time to stop Titan.


Amazingly both movies are very different from each other, despite their similar plots. Where "Megamind" relies heavily on pop culture references, "Despicable Me" relies more on sight gags. But the main difference is the love stories at the center of each film. 

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Immigration enforcement won't shift if DREAM fails

WASHINGTON (AP) - Immigration officers are unlikely to take extraordinary steps to arrest young people in the country illegally should the DREAM Act fail in the Senate.

Assistant Homeland Security Secretary John Morton said Friday in a conference call with reporters that immigration officers will continue their focus on immigrants who have committed crimes or are a threat to the public. He said they will handle cases of noncriminal immigrants on a case-by-case basis.

The Senate has scheduled a vote Saturday on the DREAM Act which would give provisional legal status to illegal immigrants brought to the country as children. The House approved the bill last week. Many young illegal immigrants have been pressing Congress to pass the bill in public demonstrations.

"Were the DREAM Act not to pass we would handle the situation as we do now," Morton said. He said the DREAM Act would be "entirely consistent" with the Obama administration's immigration

enforcement policies.

Many young illegal immigrants have asked Congress to pass the bill, going public with the fact they are in the country without permission in the hope that their stories would help get the 60 votes needed Saturday to move the bill forward.

Opponents say the legislation is "backdoor amnesty" that encourages more people to come to the country illegally or overstay their time-limited visas. They also argue it rewards law breakers.

"This bill simply 'incentivizes' and rewards more illegality. And, if it passes, what principle would lawmakers cite to object to another amnesty, for another group, and another one after that?" Alabama Sen. Jeff Sessions, ranking Republicans on the Senate Judiciary Committee, asked at a news release.

Morton joined Alejandro Mayorkas, director of Citizenship and Immigration Services, and David Aguilar, deputy commissioner of Customs and Border Protection, in endorsing the DREAM Act as good for border security.





Humanitarian Bowl in Boise one of NCAA's kickoff bowls

BOISE, Idaho (AP) - On a Friday night in Detroit two weeks ago, Northern Illinois saw what would have been its first Mid-American Conference title in nearly 30 years slip away.

By Sunday, its head coach was headed for the Big Ten and a job at Minnesota.

"It was rough. We got our hearts ripped out on Friday and we lost our coach on Sunday," NIU interim coach Tom Matukewicz said. "You're sitting there looking at each other and no one knows what to do on Monday, and all of a sudden that clutter gets in about what-ifs.'

So for the past two weeks, it's been Matukewicz's job to settle the Huskies' turbulence and try to get their focus on capping what could be the most successful season in NIU's history if they can beat Fresno State on Saturday in the Humanitarian Bowl He won't be the head guy when next fall arrives. That job is going to Wisconsin defensive coordinator Dave Doeren, who will take over the Huskies program after the Rose Bowl. But Matukewicz is sticking. around, returning to his job as linebackers coach next season following the Huskies' third straight bowl appearance.

old has tried to do during the past two weeks to bring in a little bit of normalcy during this rough stretch.

"The transition has been a lot better than a lot of us expected," NIU quarterback Chandler Harnish said.

Northern Illinois (10-3) probably should be playing in a different bowl as the MAC champion. All they needed was to stop a fourth-and-20 against Miami (Ohio) in the conference title game with less than 2 minutes left and the Huskies could have claimed their first league crown since 1983.

Instead, Miami QB Austin Boucher found Chris Givens for 31 yards and two plays later hit Adrian Robinson on a 33-yard touchdown strike to give the RedHawks a 26-21 victory and end the Huskies' ninegame win streak.

It was a gut-wrenching dagger, only amplified by coach Jerry Kill's departure a unit that was averaging 46 points during a nine-game streak that was stymied by the RedHawks in the biggest game of the season.

Running back Chad Spann saw his streak of a touchdown in 11 straight games snapped against Miami when he was held to 54 yards rushing, his second-lowest total of the season. Illinois was the only other team to stop the 5-foot-9, 200-pound back, holding him to 15 yards rushing back in September."

Still, Spann finished with 20 rushing touchdowns this season, tied for second in the country behind Oregon's LaMichael James, and was the MAC offensive player of the year. He has 39 rushing TDs the last two seasons.

"They're a very good rushing offense.

They've put up some great numbers and they've got some phenomenal athletes," Fresno State defensive end Chris Carter said. "We have small running backs ourselves, so I'm not going to judge anybody on their size. If they can run the ball, that's all that matters.'

Returning to the blue turf in Boise might bring back some ugly memories for the Bulldogs, who were here just a month ago and were shut out for the first time in a dozen years in a 51-0 loss to Boise State.

But Boise's been good to Fresno State (8-4) in the postseason. The Bulldogs, working on a streak of 11 bowl trips in 12 years, are 2-0 in the Humanitarian Bowl ,Aî and it's other name incarnations beating Virginia in 2004 and Georgia Tech in 2007


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


