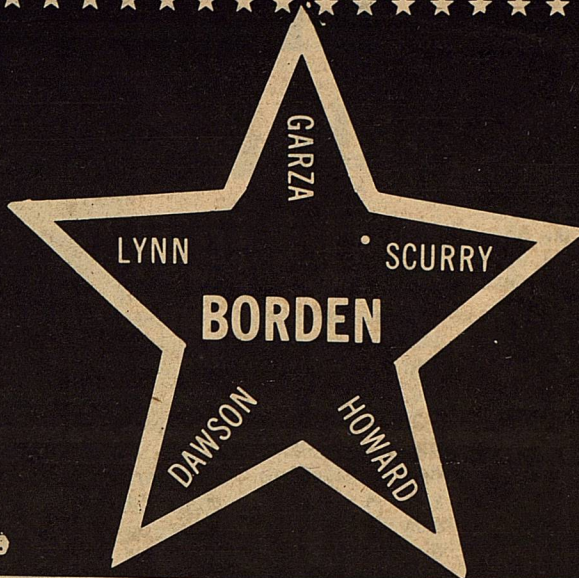

**Board Minutes**

The Board of Trustees met on June 18, 1973 at 8:00 p.m. in a regular session.

The meeting was called to order by President John R. Anderson at which time the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The June bills were considered for payment. The motion carried to pay the bills.

The Equalization Board of the Borden County Independent School District met with the Board of trustees for the purpose of discussing the proposed budget and tax rate for the 1973-1974 year. Pat Hensley was elected chairman of the Equalization Board.

The following bus bids were opened: Commercial Body Corp. at \$7215.00, model 1974, delivered Jan. 1974---Superior Coach Sales at \$7585.00 model 1974, delivered Jan. 1974.---- Bush Distributing Co. at \$7380. model 1974, delivered Oct. 1973 --Searcy Bus Sales, at \$7597.00 model 1974, delivered in 6 mo. The motion carried to purchase three 48-passenger school buses from Bush Distributing Company.

The following bids were opened on a 10-passenger suburban: Mal Donelson Chevrolet co. at \$5116.75 list, \$4179.51 bid. Snyder Motor Company at \$6231.75, list, and \$4600.00 bid. The motion was carried to purchase the 10-passenger suburban from Snyder Motor Company for \$4600.00.

President Anderson called for a report from Superintendent McLeroy. A year to date financial report was given and a copy was presented to each board member. The financial report was approved.

We regretfully accepted the resignation of Travis Barnes. Mr. Barnes accepted the position of high school Science teacher at Dublin.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

**Meat**

Alivestock and meat marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service believes that meat processing plants in the state are doing the best job in history in supplying customers with top quality meat. Changes effected by the Texas Meat Inspection Law of 1969 have resulted in the remodeling of some processing plants and new plants being built. Also, many have gone out of business, leaving communities without a slaughtering facility. Thus, there is a potential in such communities for new plants, and the Extension Service can provide informational assistance.

**New Grasses**

Forage producers in Texas now have several new pasture grasses available to fit a variety of conditions, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service agronomist. Kleingrass 75 is a warm-season perennial bunchgrass for southern and western areas. TAM Wintergreen harding-grass is a perennial cool-season grass for calcareous soils. Anew South Texas grass is Higgins buffelgrass. Another warm-season perennial bunchgrass is lovegrass, Renner lovegrass being the newest variety. Midland and Coastal bermudagrasses are also popular.



**Bob Bullock For Comptroller**

I am today, June 21, 1973, announcing my candidacy for the Democratic Party nomination to one of the most important, but unfortunately one of the least noticed, offices of responsibility in Texas--The Office of Comptroller of Public Accounts.

I believe in calling things as I see them. Rarely, if ever, have I been accused of being reluctant to express my opinion or to speak out on the issues. Today and the months ahead will be no exception.

Officeholders and candidates avoid talking taxes. They feel that it is politically dangerous. But that is what the Comptroller's job is all about. The Comptroller is generally and specifically responsible for the collection, allocation, and accounting of all State funds. He is the State's tax collector and administrator and is required by law to fairly and efficiently collect all of the sales taxes for our cities and the State, taxes on natural resources and utility companies, the corporate franchise tax, gasoline taxes, the automobile sales tax and taxes on cigarettes as well as any other taxes that are or may be imposed.

The law gives the Comptroller regulatory authority which may result in the gain or loss of millions of tax dollars to the responsible taxpayers of Texas and broad rule-making power to determine how and when these taxes are collected.

The Comptroller is required to recommend plans for the improvement of taxation, tax col-

lection and the management of the State's monies. It is his duty to recommend improvement and revision of our present tax laws and to suggest, from an objective standpoint, new sources of money as additional revenues become necessary.

No spending bill passed by the Legislature may become law unless first approved by the Comptroller and until he certifies that revenues will be sufficient to fund the appropriations. The Comptroller alone can keep Texas out of debt if he exercises this authority without regard to fear or favor.

And, of great importance is the fact that the Comptroller is required to audit and approve the spending of every State Dollar by every agency of State government. In other words, the Comptroller has the last word in avoiding or preventing unauthorized and illegal State spending.

If elected, I will add vitality and new dimensions to the office. Mine will not be an office of excuses or avoidance of responsibility. If mistakes are made, I will admit them and correct them. The job will be done properly and thoroughly.

There was no groundswell of support for my candidacy and no public clamor for my entry into this race. No one asked me to run. I am entering this campaign because I sincerely care about the financing and operation of our State government. I care about how the taxpayers money is collected and spent.

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J.L.Cantrell, Mary (Cantrell) Saunders and Dick Cantrell.

Floyd J. (Dick) Cantrell was the fifth child of A. J. and Cora Cantrell, and was born in Moody, McClennan County, Texas, November 11, 1906. The family came to Borden County in 1910, settling at Gail in 1927.

Dick finished high school at Gail, completed a business course at Draughton-s Business College in Abilene, and attended West Texas State College of Canyon, at that time, West Texas State Teachers' Normal. He was first employed in banking, in La Feria, Texas, where he was residing when all banks were closed, and the country later plunged into the big depression. He returned to Gail, where he has continued to make his home. Dick entered into the employ of ASCS in 1939, becoming office manager in 1942, the position from which he is presently retiring.

Dick has two sons, Richard of Redbank, Ohio, and Tom of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and three grandchildren.

It is noted, and not ficticiously, that Dick's main hobby in life has been W O R K! After office hours, week-ends, holidays, he spent either farming, attending his cattle, building fences and corrals, carpentry, house painting, plumbing, or assisting a neighbor with some chore--name the job, Dick has at least attempted it! Until only a few years ago he spent his annual vacations working at cattle roundups on various ranches over the county. To say that he is fond of work is truly an understatement! ## Antelope

AUSTIN--The antelope population in Texas' Trans-Pecos area has shown a healthy increase, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists, but antelope in the Permian Basin haven't fared so well.

In the nine-county Trans-Pecos area, adult antelope buck numbers are up by six to seven percent, and doe numbers are up by 11 to 12 percent.

But in the Permian Basin, the population has dropped by 13 percent and biologists are blaming poor range conditions. Trans-Pecos biologists say with normal reproduction the antelope population would be the highest in 20 years--more than 12,000 animals.

Permian Basin biologists are hoping fawn production there will offset this year's drop in the number of animals. Biologists counted 2,860 antelope in the Permian Basin.

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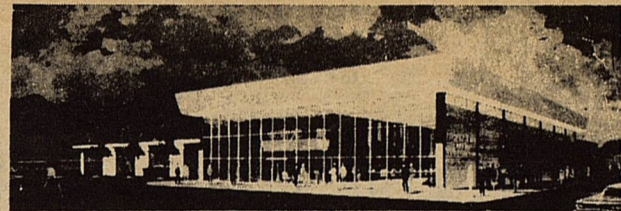
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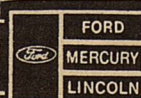

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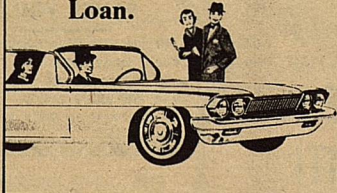
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
