Bolin baby COD: Blunt force trauma to head

The pathologist that did the autopsy on Kenzee Renee Bolin, the six-week-old baby that died in May, 2007, said the cause of death was blunt force trauma to the baby's head.

Dr. Thomas Beaver, now a forensic pathologist in Bakersfield, Calif., was serving as coroner for several counties, including Gray

County, at Texas Texas Medical School in Lubbock when the baby died.

In testimony Friday morning in Judge Steven R. Emmert's 31st District Court, Dr. Beaver

described the autopsy and explained his findings.

He said there appeared to be no outward injuries to the infant, but he found a large amount of blood inside the cranial cavity when he opened up the skull.

Kenzee Renee Bolin died about 2 a.m., May 21, 2007, after arriving at the Pampa Regional Medical Center by ambulance.

The baby's mother, Mary Lee Bolin, 30, is on trial for murder

in the baby's death.

Dr. Beaver testified Friday that during his autopsy in Lubbock about 3 p.m., May 21, 2007, he found no bruises or abrasions on the baby's body and that she appeared to be completely normal, but in examining the baby's head, he found the brain swollen and blood pooling in the cranial cavity.

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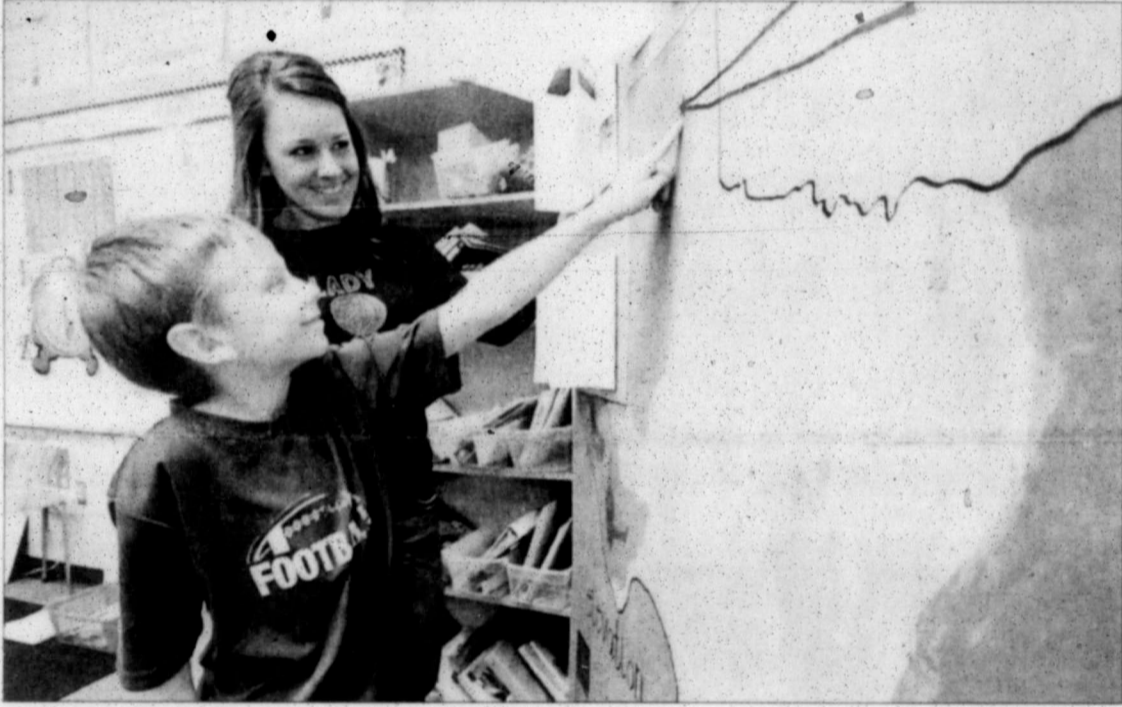

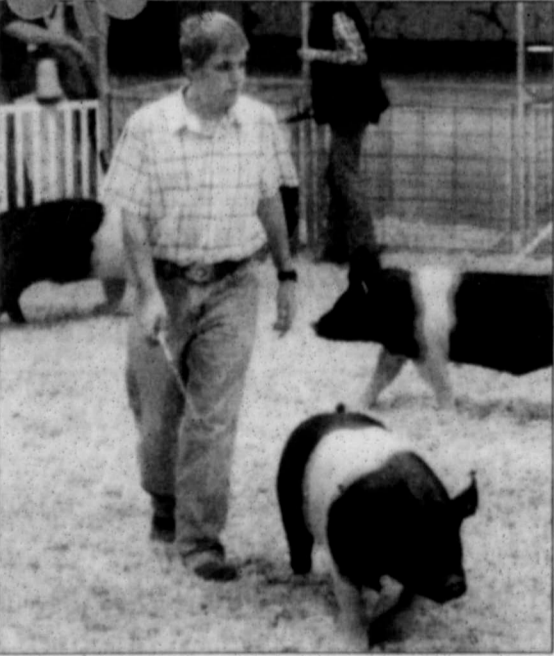

Patterson wants to move up

AUSTIN (AP) — Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson is talking about moving up the political ladder — to lieutenant governor.

The announcement came a day after current Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst moved closer to running for the Senate in 2012, a seat being vacated by longtime U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. Patterson wouldn't be able to run for the lieutenant governor post until 2014, but he said Friday he wanted a new way to put his "experience and passion to work for the people of Texas."

Patterson, a former state senator from the Houston area, said he wanted to publicly announce his interest in a race that is sure to draw lots of contenders.

Ineffective border fence ended

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration officially has ended a high-tech southern border fence boondoggle that cost taxpayers about \$1 billion.

Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano says proven technology will be used in the future. She says technology will be tailored to local terrain and population density.

Napolitano said Friday there is no "one-size-fits-all" solution to the country's border security needs.

Congress ordered the high-tech fence in 2006 amid a clamor for more border security. The project yielded only 53 miles of protection.

due to Shaken Baby Syndrome.

He said that the baby would have had to have been shaken quite violently to achieve such a result. Simply lifting the baby without supporting its head would not have been enough.

"It would have taken violent force," Beaver said.

Rough handling would not have caused such damage.

"CPR can cause some injury," he said, "but not like that."

Beaver also testified that there was hemorrhaging in the retina and optic nerve, which he said was also an indication of Shaken Baby Syndrome.

He said there was no injury to the airway or esophagus.

On Thursday, the court saw an interview of Mary Lee Bolin by Pampa Police Officer Fawnswa Burrows video taped after the baby's death.

Bolin described how she took turns with her husband, Tyrel Bolin, sitting up with the baby the night of May 20, because the baby had slept all day.

Her husband woke Bolin up about 12:30 a.m., Monday, May 21, to take care of the baby while he tried to sleep, Bolin said.

Bolin said she gave the baby a bottle and tried to burp her, but the baby apparently couldn't burp, and then Bolin couldn't get the baby to sleep.

Bolin said the baby suddenly quit crying and went limp. The baby had phlegm coming out of her nose.

Bolin said she woke her husband and told him to call 911.

She cleaned the phlegm from the baby's face and began performing CPR on the baby.

"That's when the firemen got there," Bolin said.

Bolin told Burrows that the baby had suffered acid reflux since the Wednesday or Thursday the previous week. On Sunday, the baby hadn't initially wanted to take her bottle, but at 6 p.m. took the whole bottle, something she'd never done before.

Bolin said that her mother-in-law, Toni Bolin, kept the baby Saturday night so Bolin and her husband could get some sleep because they hadn't had any sleep for several nights.

Sunday night, Bolin said she and the baby went for their nightly walk, but the baby threw up and cried.

"Usually, she doesn't cry when we go on our walk," Bolin said, "but this time she cried the whole entire time we were out walking."

Bolin said the baby was on a medicine for her acid reflux. She said the doctor also suggested putting the baby on soy formula in an effort to keep her from throwing up.

Burrows told Bolin that the medical examiner had found blood on the baby's brain and blood behind her eye.

"I would never hurt my child," Bolin said.

Bolin admitted that she was frustrated because she hadn't gotten much sleep due to the baby's crying.

Bolin denied shaking the baby or throwing her.

Sobbing, Bolin told Burrows, "I don't know what to do."

Bolin said she may have been rough when she picked up the baby, and

she didn't have her hand behind the baby's head.

Bolin said that the baby's head bounced against her chest as she picked the baby up early that Monday morning.

Thursday afternoon, Toni Bolin, the defendant's mother-in-law, and Brandy Ketchum, the defendant's sister-in-law, testified concerning the defendant's actions.

Toni Bolin testified that Mary Lee Bolin was singing a hymn along with the choir during Kenzee's funeral.

"I thought that was strange," Toni Bolin said.

While Toni Bolin told the court that she thought that the defendant loved her daughter, she said the mother and daughter had not bonded.

Toni Bolin also objected to Mary Lee Bolin allowing Kenzee to be passed around at a gathering in Colorado about a week after the baby's birth.

Under cross-examination by defense attorney Harold Comer, Toni Bolin admitted that she objected to her son marrying Mary Lee.

"I didn't think it was going to last," Toni Bolin said.

She said she also objected to Mary Lee Bolin's decision to let someone keep a baby that was only three or four weeks old overnight.

The baby had stayed with Toni Bolin, its grandmother, the Saturday night before it died early Monday morning.

"Certainly, she could trust a child with you," Comer challenged.

Toni Bolin testified that she had talked with her son, Tyrel, about how Mary Lee Bolin cared for the baby.

Ketchum said she had objected to the marriage because Mary Lee Bolin was older than Tyrel Bolin, Ketchum's brother, but

said that her brother told her it was none of her business.

Ketchum said she was devastated when she found out that Mary Lee Bolin was pregnant with Kenzee, but her brother was happy about it.

She testified that she knew of a flier that had been circulated around town saying that anyone with knowledge concerning Kenzee's death should

notify the district attorney's office, but that she had not prepared it. She testified, however, that she posted it on the internet.

When asked if she thought Mary Lee Bolin loved her daughter Kenzee, Ketchum said, "I don't know."

When asked if Ketchum thought Mary Lee Bolin was a good mother, Ketchum said, "In my opinion, no."

Monday at Pampa High School. The culmination of almost a year of preparation, Superintendent Barry Haensch said that there's nothing left to do but raise the curtain and let the kids show off what they've learned.

"We're kind of in a Nike mode now," he said. "You know, 'just do it.' It's been a long time coming and we're very excited that it's finally here."

Modeled after a successful showcase-style program held yearly in Midlothian, Haensch promised that the event will give parents and other community members a unique firsthand look at what Pampa's kids and youth experience daily in their classrooms.

"One of the things about Pampa is that they always support their children," Haensch said, "and in that way, the whole community is all very comfortable about the extracurricular activities they kids get in schools. Football, sports, band — that sort of thing."

"What they're probably not as familiar with is the curriculum itself, what's going on in class every day. We want to provide everyone an idea of what's involved in that curriculum, and that idea is going to come from the kids themselves, so (the parents) are really going to get a sense of what their kids get in school daily."

The kids, Haensch said, will be passing their lessons along to showcase guests in a comprehensive and interactive way. Kids of each grade level will be manning booths organized by field. That way, Haensch explained, a parent could walk down an aisle and see a child's progression in an academic area (science or math, for example) from kindergarten through high school graduation.

Each display will give guests the chance to be "taught" by a PISD student in a similar fashion that the kids are taught in the classroom.

"We've encouraged the kids to present the material the way they've learned it themselves," he said. Performance groups from each campus will also demonstrate their talents at the showcase, and other elective study areas such as art, physical education and foreign languages will also be represented.

Doors on the Harvester Street and Randy Matson Avenue sides of the high school will be open for visitors to enter and exit. A shuttle service will also be provided, Haensch said.

"Our planning has tried to provide a complete look at the work of our schools with convenience and in comforts," Haensch said.

"It promises to be a powerful and dynamic evening."

failure. Her mother, Diana, opened the account to help defray the medical expenses not covered by Medicaid, as well as the cost of bringing Brenda to Dallas for her treatments.

Brenda has been seeing a doctor in Amarillo for three years, Diana said, but her condition has recently taken a turn for the worse.

"The doctor told us in August this past year that she only had a year to live if we didn't find a heart," said Diana.

Doctors have told the Tidwells that the wait for a new organ could take up to a year, Diana added. For now, Brenda's heart is being kept beating at a normal rhythm by medications.

Brenda has two children, Robert, 16, and Lacey, 19. "She's just living one day at a time," said a tearful Diana of her daughter. "You never think about losing your child before you. I wake up and thank God every day she's still here."

Today in History

Today is Saturday, Jan. 15, the 15th day of 2011. There are 350 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 15, 1961, a U.S. Air Force radar tower off the New Jersey coast collapsed into the Atlantic Ocean during a severe storm, killing all 28 men aboard. (The structure was known as "Texas Tower 4" because of its resemblance to an oil platform.)

On this date:

In 1559, England's Queen Elizabeth I was crowned in Westminster Abbey.

In 1777, the people of New Connecticut declared their independence. (The tiny republic later became the state of Vermont.)

In 1844, the University of Notre Dame received its charter from the state of Indiana.

In 1929, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was born in Atlanta.

In 1943, work was completed on the Pentagon, headquarters of the U.S. Department of War (now Defense).

In 1947, the mutilated remains of 22-year-old Elizabeth Short, who came to be known as the "Black Dahlia," were found in a vacant Los Angeles lot; her slaying remains unsolved.

In 1967, the Green Bay Packers of the National Football League defeated the Kansas City Chiefs of the American Football League 35-10 in the first AFL-NFL World Championship Game, retroactively known as Super Bowl I.

In 1971, the recently completed Aswan High Dam in Egypt was dedicated during a ceremony attended by President Anwar Sadat and Soviet President Nikolai Podgorny.

In 2009, US Airways Capt. Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger ditched his Airbus 320 in the Hudson River after a flock of birds disabled both the plane's engines; all 155 people aboard survived.

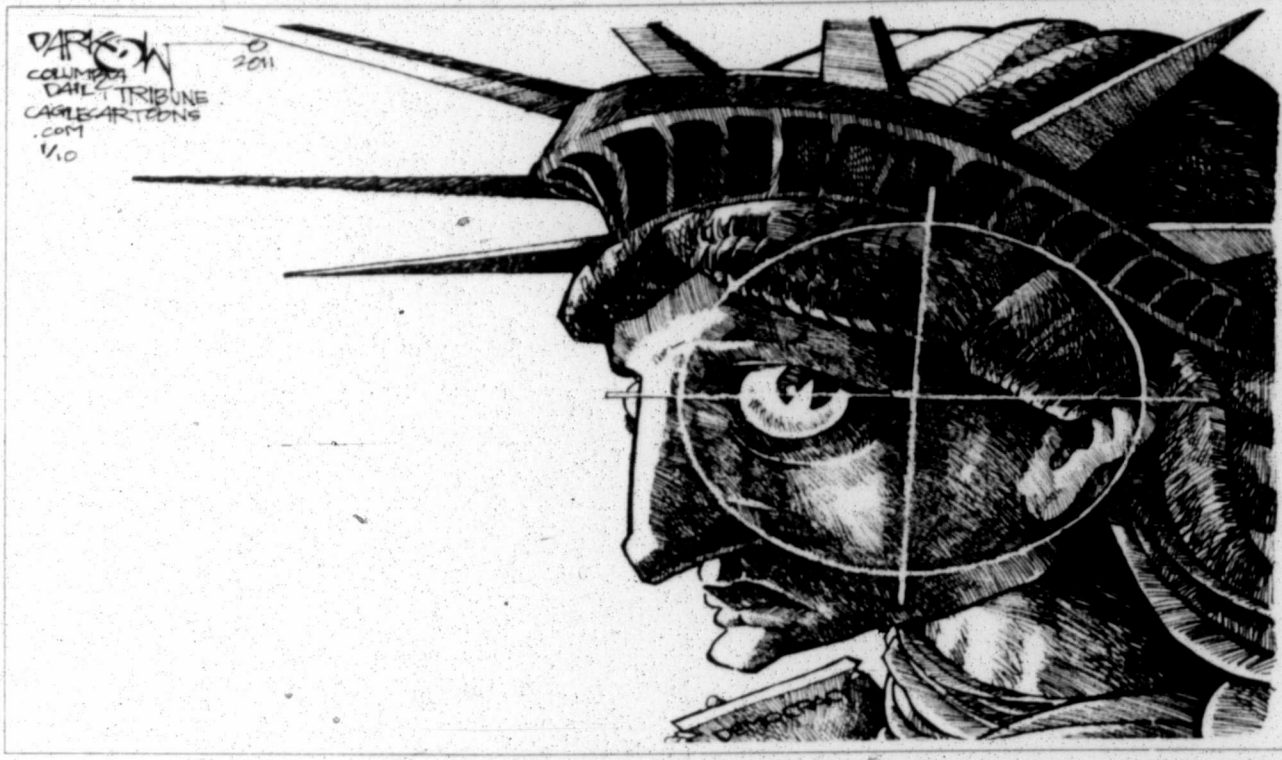
Ten years ago: President-elect George W. Bush marked the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday at an elementary school in Houston, where he promised black Americans, "My job will be to listen not only to the successful, but also to the suffering."

Five years ago: After a seven-year journey, a NASA space capsule, Stardust, returned safely to Earth with the first dust ever fetched from a comet.

One year ago: United Nations humanitarian chief John Holmes appealed for more than \$560 million to help three million victims of the earthquake in Haiti, calling it "a huge and a horrifying catastrophe." Washington Wizards star Gilbert Arenas pleaded guilty to carrying a pistol without a license in the District of Columbia, a felony. (Arenas was sentenced to a month in a halfway house and suspended until the end of the season by the NBA.)

Can we for once just learn a lesson?

In the wake of the emotional and impressive memorial service to honor the six killed and 13 wounded in Tucson at the hands of a deranged gunman, the conventional wisdom is that despite pleas for civility, we will return to the pre-shooting days of yelling, screaming and highly charged partisanship.

In his speech to the nation, President Barack Obama, acting as the healer in chief, called on all Americans to rise above the nonsense of making politics a rhetorical blood sport and instead have a civil debate on the issues.

"I believe we can be better. Those who died here, those who saved lives here — they help me believe," said President Obama. "We may not be able to stop all evil in the world, but I know that how we treat one another is entirely up to us. I believe that for all our imperfections, we are full of decency and goodness, and that the forces that divide us are not as strong as those that unite us."

The knee-jerk reaction from many in the call for civility is to say that the First Amendment gives them the right to say what they want and when they want. But the right to freedom of speech also gives all of us the right to say "no" and "you're not going to talk to me that way." We can probe and debate yet we can do so without all the rant and bitterness.

I found it laughable to listen to my media colleagues talk about this need for civility, yet many of us fan those flames by booking, promoting and giving more airtime to those who rant and scream at the top of their lungs. In the world of TV and radio, you'll hear someone say, "Now that was a hot discussion! Can you come back tomorrow

from a fight where no one benefits. I've never been one who has shied away from being passionate about an issue, but as a responsible individual, I always accept the reality that what I say matters. People do listen. Folks form opinions based on what is said. And we can ramp up their blood pressure higher and higher or we can say, "That was a spirited debate. Now let's go and get a drink."

If we want to embrace the notion of civility and humility in our discourse, it means not falling into our old habits. I was impressed that Roger Ailes, head of Fox News Channel, relayed to Russell Simmons' GlobalGrind.com what he told his staff after the Tucson shootings: "I told all of our guys, shut up, tone it down, make your argument intellectually. You don't have to do it with bombast. I hope the other side does that."

Who knows if this edict will be photocopied and posted in the office of every Fox talk show host — and throughout its newsroom — to serve as a reminder to everyone when the nation moves further away from the shooting.

And Ailes is correct that those who

vehemently oppose the views of Fox News and conservative radio hosts must also adhere to the president's call for civility. Maybe we should all make "Remember Gabby and the Tucson 6" buttons, T-shirts and bumper stickers, as a way to stop someone in their tracks that chooses to become out of control.

It was the attempted political assassination of the moderate Arizona Democrat Rep. Gabrielle Giffords that ended up costing six people their lives and leaving another 12 wounded.

In an e-mail a day before the shooting, it was Giffords herself who openly discussed the toxic political dialogue that resulted in death threats against her.

"After you get settled, I would love to talk about what we can do to promote centrism and moderation. I am one of only 12 Dems left in a GOP district (the only woman) and think that we need to figure out how to tone our rhetoric and partisanship down," Giffords wrote to Republican Kentucky Secretary of State Trey Grayson to congratulate him on being named director of Harvard's Institute of Politics.

Yes, we know the actions of the mentally ill shooter weren't tied to the heated political rhetoric played out on radio, TV and online, but it still isn't a healthy environment.

But as she heads for a long recovery from being shot in the head, "Remember Gabby and the Tucson 6" should constantly ring in our ears.

Let's have vigorous debates over the issues. But let's do so as adults, not as petulant and out-of-control children.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 16, 1991, the White House announced the start of Operation Desert Storm to drive Iraqi forces out of Kuwait. In an national address, President George H.W. Bush declared, "The battle has been joined."

On this date:

In 1547, Ivan IV of Russia (popularly known as "Ivan the Terrible") was crowned czar.

In 1883, the U.S. Civil Service Commission was established.

In 1920, Prohibition began in the United States as the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution took effect, one year to the day after its ratification. (It was later repealed by the 21st Amendment.)

In 1935, fugitive gangster Fred Barker and his mother, Kate "Ma" Barker, were killed in a shootout with the FBI at Lake Weir, Fla.

In 1942, actress Carole Lombard, 33, her mother and about 20 other people died when their plane crashed near Las Vegas, Nev., while returning from a war-bond promotion tour.

In 1944, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower took command of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in London.

In 1969, two manned Soviet Soyuz spaceships became the first vehicles to dock in space and transfer personnel.

In 1978, NASA named 35 candidates to fly on the space shuttle, including Sally K. Ride, who became America's first woman in space, and Guion S. Bluford Jr., who became America's first black astronaut in space.

In 1981, in Northern Ireland, Protestant gunmen shot and wounded Irish nationalist leader Bernadette Devlin McAliskey and her husband.

Ten years ago: Confirmation hearings for Attorney General-designate John Ashcroft opened in Washington with Senate Democrats throwing jabs at him over abortion and civil rights. Laurent Kabila, president of the Democratic Republic of Congo, was mortally shot and wounded by a bodyguard at his home. Dave Winfield and Kirby Puckett were elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame on their first try.

Five years ago: A U.S. military helicopter crashed north of Baghdad, killing the two crew members; it was the third American chopper to go down in ten days. Africa's first elected female head of state, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, was sworn in as Liberia's new president.

One year ago: Precious water and food began reaching parched and hungry earthquake survivors on streets of ruined Haitian capital Port-au-Prince. U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton met with Haitian President Rene Preval and promised that U.S. quake relief efforts would be closely coordinated with local officials.

Now we are wracked with guilt. Did I do the right thing? My siblings didn't want her because of her long history of abuse. I'm in no hurry to visit her at the home, either. Why couldn't she be the kindly grandma and parent that many children have? — **GUILT-RIDDEN IN TUSTIN, CALIF.**

DEAR GUILT-RIDDEN: Probably because she was modeling behavior she learned from her own mother and possibly because she is

demented.

Frankly, it was unrealistic to expect that she would suddenly change from the person she has been for the past 92 years into a Disney character — and I don't mean Cruella De Vil.

Did you do the right thing? All things considered, yes. However, you should not abandon your mother. As a loving daughter — which you have tried to be — I'm advising you to try a little harder. Visit her. Bring her something to distract her. If she's able to be moved, take her out for a meal. When she's gone, you, unlike your siblings, will have nothing to regret.

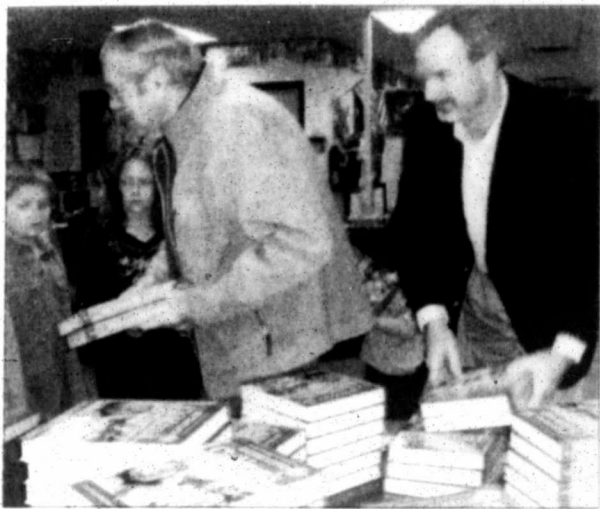

"We weren't hitting the shots we needed to," Troxell said. "We missed a few free throws at the end we needed to make."

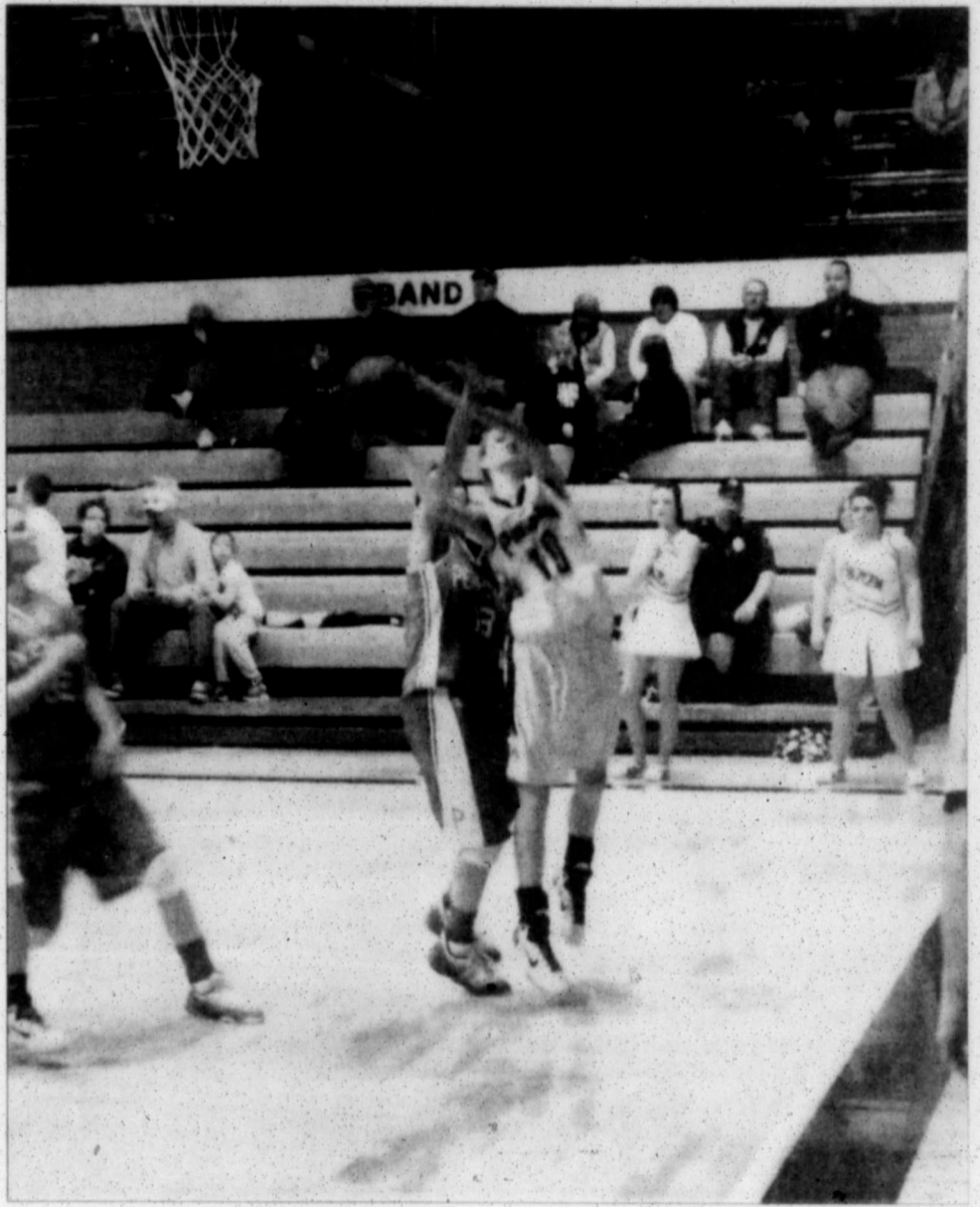

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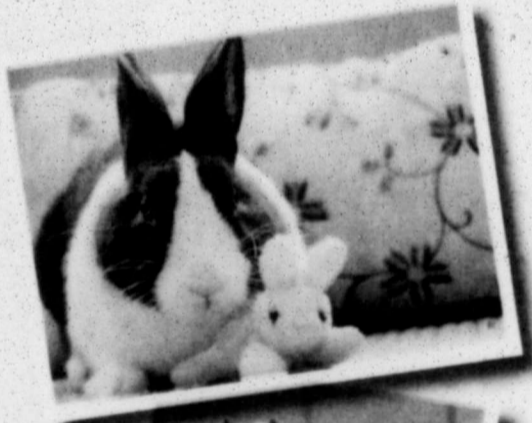

Armstrong ponders about last ride

ADFLAIDE, Australia (AP) — Lance Armstrong's countdown toward retirement will reach a significant marker Sunday when he begins his last race outside the United States.

The seven-time Tour de France winner will ride in a criterium prologue to the Tour Down Under,

and when the race ends seven days later and after 500 miles around South Australia, the end of his celebrated career will loom larger.

Reflecting upon his career Saturday, the 39-year-old Armstrong acknowledged the comeback he began in the same race three years ago had

not lived up to his expectations, "but that's what happens in sport."

When Armstrong ended a two-year retirement in the 2009 Tour Down Under, it was in the hope that it would lead to his eighth win in the Tour de France.

"I thought I'd win another tour, I really did,"

Armstrong said. "It was different than I expected — that's just the reality. I'm not going to make any excuses. I did everything I could. ... No regrets though, none at all."

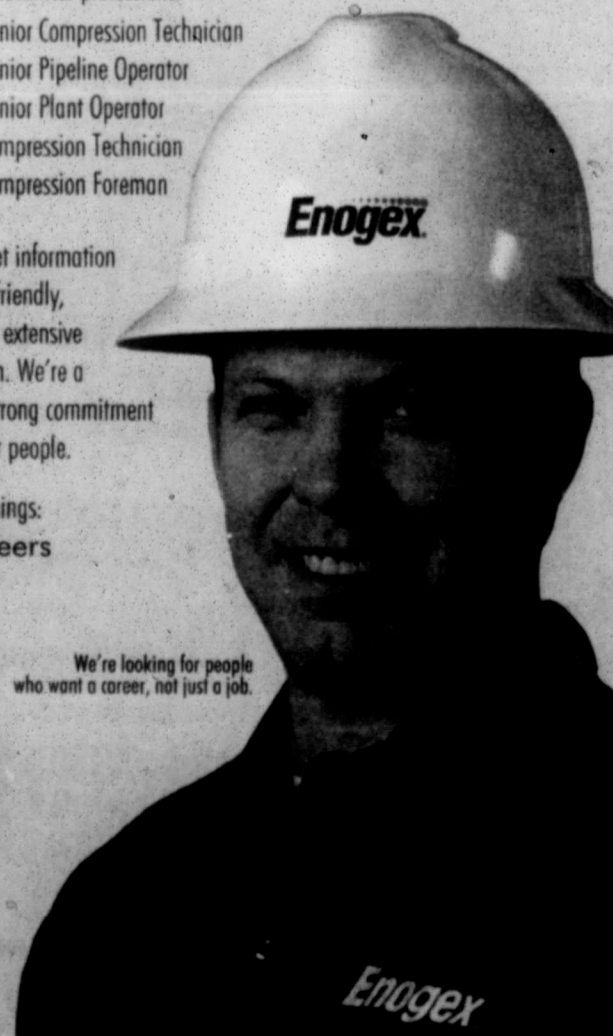

Wahlberg, Bale captivate in gripping "The Fighter"

Essentially, if you've seen one boxing movie, you've seen them all: Plucky unknown steps into the ring with no one in his corner, only to beat overwhelming odds, capture everyone's hearts and maybe win a belt or two.

But while the fight scenes are usually the stuff of trailers, the trick to the whole thing is everything outside the ropes. Boxing, infinitely, is a sport that mirrors the human condition: You get a few hits in, you get knocked down and ultimately, it's about picking yourself back up or throwing in the towel.

It's that human core that "The Fighter" hits square on the nose. Headlined by a pair of captivating performances by Christian Bale and Mark Wahlberg, "The Fighter" explores the emotional depths of family, drug abuse, competition and love with a flesh-and-blood emotional quality that both intrigues and inspires.

"The Fighter" takes us into the turbulent family of real-life boxer Micky Ward (Wahlberg), managed by an overbearing mother (Melissa Leo) and trained by his brother Dickie (Bale), who himself had his moment in the boxing sun by knocking down Sugar Ray Leonard years before. Living on his former glory and addled with a crack addiction, Dickie is a shell of his local legend, harboring pipe dreams of a comeback between puffs of smoke.

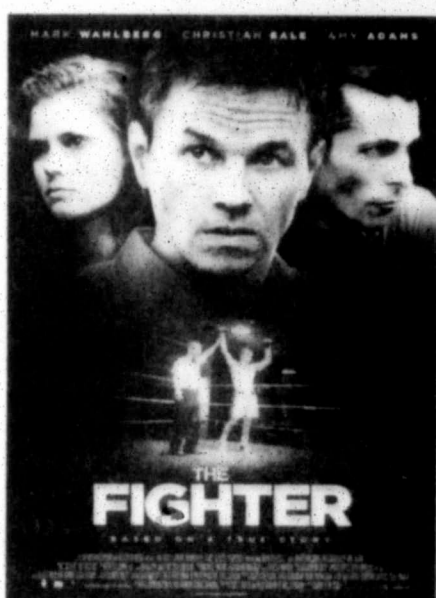
Swimming upstream with his loved ones holding him back, Mickey must make a decision that impacts not only his success as a boxer but also the family ties he's had all his life.

Wahlberg shines as an everyman, passive and dutiful to his family and to the woman he loves (Amy Adams, who also impresses). It's perhaps Wahlberg's best big screen performance yet, eschewing the over-the-top seriousness he's often been typed as and instead coming through with poignant composure amidst the chaos around

him. Wahlberg's restraint only magnifies Bale, an electric whirlwind of movement and swagger who's charismatic and pitiable all at once. Once again, Bale's preparation for his role is mind-blowing: one look at his gaunt physique in this film and it's hard to believe that he was tabbed to be Batman twice.

The boxing scenes are tremendous, with Wahlberg making the physical commitment needed for the role. They're the icing on the cake for this intense drama, one that's an early title favorite for the best film of 2011.

"Green Hornet" succeeds despite critical pessimism

This weekend, the first superhero film of the year hits theaters. It's not "Thor," "Captain America," or "Green Lantern," but rather another emerald-tinged hero, "Green Hornet."

Unlike those other heroes, all of whom will be hitting the big screen sometime this year, Green Hornet doesn't have a large, built-in fan base, as its last well known incarnation was the 1966 television series starring Bruce Lee.

The movie has been in and out of development since the 90s, with actors as varied as George Clooney, Mark Wahlberg, Nicolas Cage and Jake Gyllenhaal all being linked to the film in some way. Various directors including Kevin Smith, Stephen Chow, and the films' eventual director, Michel Gondry, came and went.

Finally, Sony tapped Seth Rogen to play the star and co-write, but their troubles didn't stop there. From strong negative reactions to the casting of Rogen to bad fan reaction to footage shown at this last year's Comic Con, most were speculating the film would be dead in the water.

Despite all of that, "Hornet" is not only a successfully made film, but one of the best action-comedies of the last couple of years. Rogen plays Britt Reid, the spoiled son of a successful newspaper owner. When Britt's dad dies suddenly, he is left in charge of everything, which introduces him to his father's mechanic, Kato (Jay Chou). Together, the duo proceed to get drunk and inadvertently find themselves fighting off a gang of thugs. Luckily, Kato also happens to be a martial arts master, a fact that saves their lives.

After their victory Reid convinces Kato that they should become heroes who pose as villains in order to take down real villains, like Russian mobster, Benjamin Chudnofsky, played brilliantly by Christoph Waltz. If this all sounds convoluted, don't worry, it's pretty easy to follow onscreen.

Everyone in the cast does a fantastic job including those who appear in small cameos. But most of the movie rests on the shoulders of Rogen and Chou, who have an amazing back-and-forth. I could honestly watch these two go on for hours.

I originally assumed this would be a pretty straightforward action movie, with a few jokes thrown in now and again. Instead what I got was a genuinely hilarious movie that balances the humor and action in a way few films are able to pull off. With Green Hornet, Rogen and writing partner Evan Goldberg prove that their previous collaboration, Pineapple Express, was no fluke, and the action-comedy genre is their forte. I look forward to seeing what they pull off next.
