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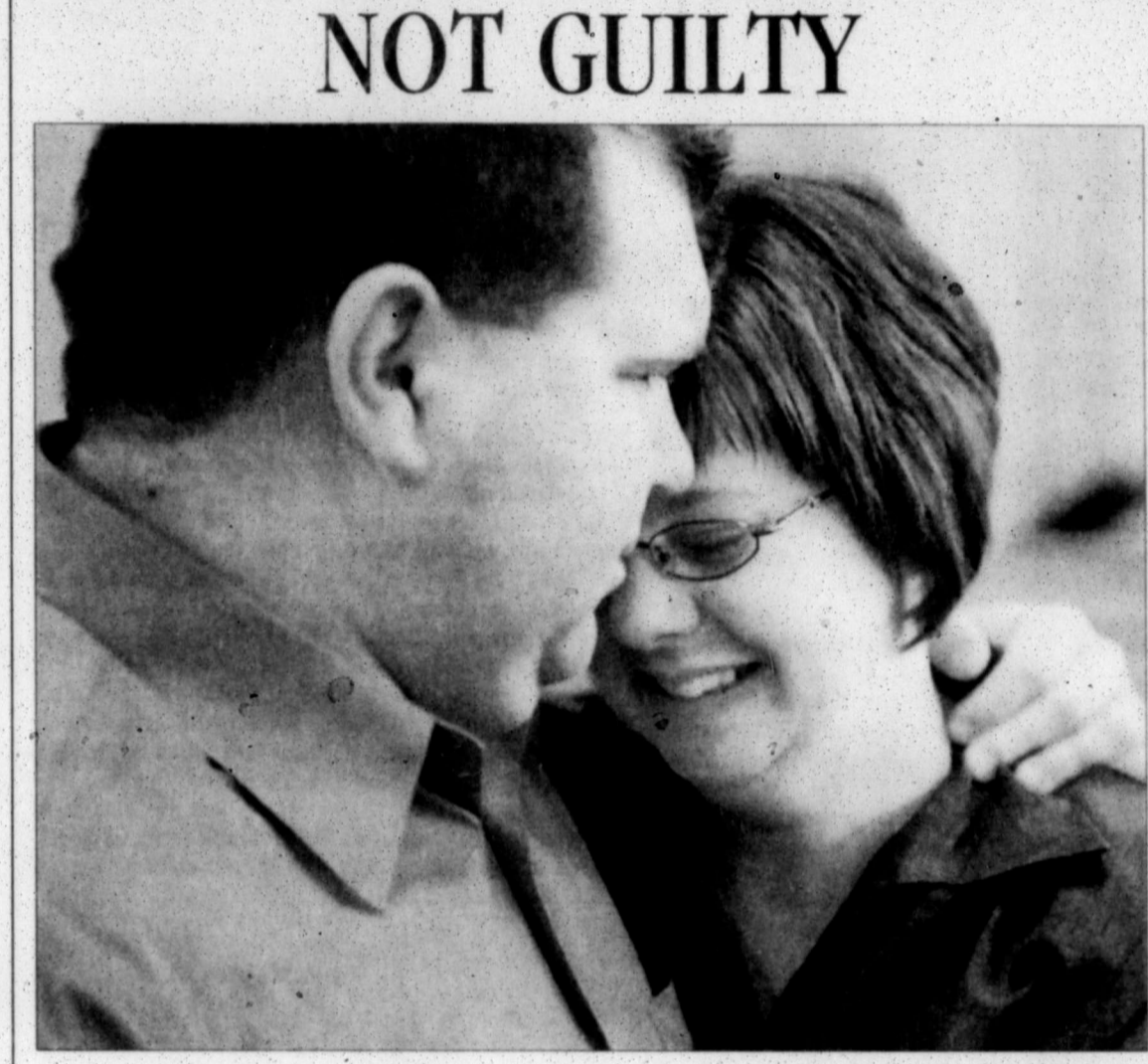

**Bolin cleared of capital murder charges**

Mary Lee Bolin woke up this morning a free woman.

For the first time in more than two-and-a-half years, the 30-year-old Pampa woman woke up without the dark cloud of capital murder charges hanging over her.

A six-man, six-woman jury found Bolin not guilty of killing her six-week old daughter, Kenzee Renee Bolin, shortly before 7 p.m. on Thursday. Kenzee died in the early morning hours of May 21, 2007 of blunt force trauma to the head.

A Gray County grand jury indicted Bolin for the death of her infant daughter, and after several false starts, the case went to trial on Jan. 12 in Judge Steven Emmert's 31st District Court atop the Gray County Courthouse.

After a week-and-a-half of testimony, the case went to the jury at 2:20 p.m. on Thursday. The jury briefly returned to a cleared courtroom later in the afternoon to review evidence, including a videotaped interview by Pampa Police Officer Fawnsua Burrows.

Bolin's pastor, Johnny Funderburg of First Baptist Church, led a prayer service of her supporters one floor below as the jury sat in the courtroom.

At 6:45 p.m., Judge Emmert received a note from the jury indicating that a verdict had been reached. Five minutes later, a celebratory roar was stifled in the courtroom when the judge announced the jury's decision.

Bolin turned to hug one of her defense attorneys, Harold Comer.

The jurors were thanked and dismissed, and as Judge Emmert left the courtroom, the crowd of Bolin's supporters

**Search on for missing Pampa man**

A Pampa family is seeking help in the search for their missing loved one, last seen leaving the area for Oklahoma on Friday.

Michael P. Haddock, 50, left Pampa at about 6 a.m. on Friday for a 10:30 a.m. doctor's appointment in Oklahoma City.



He was last seen wearing a long-sleeved gray shirt and blue jeans, a light brown coat and a dark blue baseball cap. He was driving a white 1998 Ford F150 pickup with slight damage to the right front bumper. The truck's license plates read "698-BYE."

According to Michael's doctor, Michael never made it to the office. "He's been trying to get disability because of a shoulder injury on his last job," said Greg Haddock, Michael's brother. "He ended up having two surgeries, so he's been really struggling to get disability. The doctor was set up through Social Security, so this was a really important appointment."

Greg said that the family had no contact with Michael after he left Pampa. Calls to his prepaid cell phone go straight to voice mail, leading Greg to assume that the phone has been turned off or that the batteries have died.

Greg and his family filed a missing persons report on Saturday. The Gray County Sheriff's Office, Department of Public Safety and Oklahoma Highway Patrol have been involved in the search, but so far, there is still no indication of Michael.

**School board to seek old junior high rezoning**

The Pampa Independent School district agreed to have the city seek to rezone the property of the Old Pampa Junior High for commercial use at their board meeting Thursday in the high school library.

The school board went into executive session for an hour approximately 20 minutes after the meeting was called into session. The board discussed with their Pampa ISD attorney zoning options for the former Pampa Junior High School Facility and considered possible action to purchase real property on the 1200 block of N. Hobart.

When the board emerged from executive session, they explained the zoning options for the property: office, commercial, a mix of the two, or no rezoning.

Board member Lee Porter moved for approving that they seek to zone it commercially. The city will have to approve the zoning at a future commission meeting.

In other business:

- The board approved expanding the parking at the current Pampa Junior High to 521 spaces with 40 spaces in the front lot.

Junior high principal Paul Nies said it would help with traffic after school.

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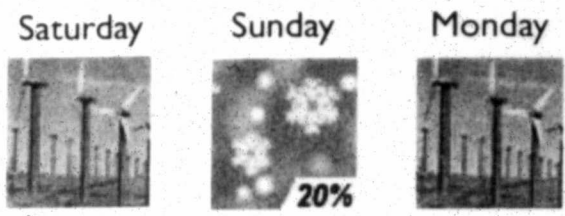

mobbed the defense table. Bolin's husband, Tyrel Bolin, jumped the barrier separating the court from the spectators' seats and tightly hugged his wife.

As well-wishers crowded around, Mary Lee Bolin announced that she was going to go and get her other daughter, Kaylee.

Testimony during the trial indicated that the baby cried a lot and the parents got very little sleep.

District Attorney Lynn Switzer charged that Bolin had shaken her crying baby that night out of frustration and caused the baby's brain to bleed, killing the infant.

No injuries were found on the baby's body, but there was evidence of hemorrhaging inside the skull.

The defense said the baby's problems stemmed from the time of its birth or soon after. Comer pointed out that the defense experts that testified that Kenzee Bolin died from a chronic subdural hematoma that she suffered at least 30 days before her death.

"Most of her life," Comer said, "she had this chronic subdural hematoma that finally killed her."

"Mary Lee Bolin is innocent. Not only did the jury find her legally not guilty, but she is factually innocent."

Defense co-counsel Mark Buzard credited the jury for being attentive and patient.

"We are pleased with the jury's verdict," Comer said. "It was

the only verdict they could have reached based on the evidence."

Switzer was not directly available for comment, but her office released a statement on Friday morning.

"We at the 31st District Attorney's office appreciate the hard work and dedication displayed by the jury in the Bolin trial," said the release from the D.A. office. "It was an extremely difficult case with a considerable amount of medical evidence for the jury to absorb."

"We were also glad to see the courtroom was occupied by interested persons. We believe it is important to have people present in the courtroom to listen and form their own opinions based upon the evidence."

that back end," Nies said. "That's an easy walk. Having the buses on the north side opens up the front and back for drop off and pick up."

Porter expressed his concern about the bad weather and traffic stacking up on 70.

"One of my concerns is moving the cars off of Highway 70," Porter said. "My greatest fear is (if we have) the forecast we had this morning. By 10 a.m., we got a raging blizzard, and we cancel school, we got 200-300 cars stopped on highway 70."

Nies explained the extra parking in the back would help that.

"That whole back parking lot would be set up for parent parking," Nies said.

David Teichmann said that if it were up to him, he would only expand one lot because of the money issue, but will go with the board.

"Money-wise, I would have him pick one lot and see

how that goes," Teichmann said. "I will do the will of the board."

The board decided to reject the February 2010 asbestos removal bids and approved awarding asbestos abatement and demolition bids to AAR inc.

Superintendent Barry Haenisch said the abatement of asbestos and demolition of the Baker School would be \$264,850. The cost to abate-asbestos and tear down the original part of Mann Elementary is \$145,150. The old Pampa Junior High School would cost \$999,900.

Porter said they should try selling the old junior high again and see if they can get a bid for the property.

"With the amount of money, I would like to see someone bid on the building as is before we abate it," Porter said.

Board president Derrell DeLoach expressed his concern about trying for a bid.

"My greatest fear is 30 years from now, when I'm driving on 23rd and Perryton Parkway with my grandchildren, I can show them the old junior high is still standing," DeLoach said.

Haenisch and Teichmann agreed with Porter, but said they shouldn't put off demolition.

"I don't think it's time to tear down the old junior high school until we find out if it can sell as it is," Haenisch said.

"I'm not opposed to trying one more time, then after one more time it's gone," Teichmann said.

## Hope fades for missing teen

COLORADO CITY (AP) - Some volunteers in the search for a missing West Texas teen are doing so with purpose and dread.

Kevin Bowman and his brother joined about 20 other volunteers Thursday to look for Hailey Darlene Dunn. The middle school cheerleader was reported missing Dec. 28 from Colorado City, about 240 miles west of Dallas.

Bowman wiped tears away as he spoke about the teenager, saying there is "less and less hope" each day that Hailey is alive.

Hailey's mother, Billie Dunn, reported her missing. The mother's former live-in boyfriend, Shawn Adkins, said he last saw the youngster a day earlier.

No arrests have been made, but Adkins has been named as one of several people of interest in the case. Adkins has denied involvement in Hailey's disappearance.

## Court rules against Leach

LUBBOCK (AP) - An appeals court has thrown out former Texas Tech coach Mike Leach's breach of contract claim against the school over his 2010 firing.

But the ruling, released early Friday, allows Leach to try to prove that the university's reasons for firing him were false.

The school in Lubbock fired Leach on Dec. 30, 2010, two days after suspending him amid allegations he mistreated a player with a concussion. Leach has denied mistreating the player.

The 7th Court of Appeals upheld Tech's sovereign immunity claim.

The ruling allows Leach to try to show Tech's reasons for firing him were wrong, but without monetary relief.

Leach's attorney plans to appeal the breach of contract claim to the Texas Supreme Court.

A Tech attorney did not immediately comment.

## Harris Co. workers face layoffs

HOUSTON (AP) - Harris County has begun notifying employees of layoffs in an effort to trim its \$1.3 billion budget for the fiscal year that begins March 1.

A Houston Chronicle analysis of payroll records shows about 700 county employees, about 1 in 22 full-time workers, were paid at least \$100,000 last fiscal year, including doctors and attorneys. Others are department heads.

The newspaper reported Friday that the county's Architecture and Engineering Department last week notified 14 employees that they would be out of work Feb. 25 unless the budget situation improves.

Budget officer Dick Raycraft has asked each department to submit a plan for how it would achieve a 10 percent cut. Budget hearings are scheduled next week.

Harris County, about 18 months ago, began a money-saving hiring freeze.

## Voter ID, spending fast tracked

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry gave fast-track status Thursday to legislation tightening voter identification laws and another measure aimed at restricting federal spending.

Perry declared a legislative "emergency" for the items in a message to legislators. That means they can bypass normal procedures and be debated more quickly, in the first 90 days of the session.

A few hours later, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst announced that senators would begin considering the bill Monday, making it the first substantive legislation that lawmakers will debate in the nascent session.

Republicans are making strengthened voter ID laws, which they say are necessary to prevent fraud, a top priority. Democrats say it's a partisan bill designed to increase GOP margins at the ballot box.

Perry also gave the Legislature the green light to quickly join a national effort to pass a new balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting deficit spending by Congress.

## Ryan to speak for GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans have selected House Budget Committee chairman Paul Ryan to deliver the party's speech after President Barack Obama's State of the Union address Tuesday night.

A Wisconsin Republican, Ryan will play a key role in the GOP drive to cut federal spending this year. Party leaders say his selection was intended to emphasize that objective.

Ryan's selection was announced by Speaker John Boehner and Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell.

Obama will deliver the State of the Union address Tuesday night before a joint session of Congress and a national television audience.

Ryan became chairman of the Budget Committee earlier this month. In a dozen years in Congress, he has consistently sought to reduce federal spending and rein in the cost of benefit programs such as Social Security and Medicare.

## Mexican singer arrested in Texas

EL PASO (AP) - Mexican pop singer Kalimba has been arrested by U.S. Border Patrol agents in El Paso, Texas, for immigration violations.

Border Patrol spokesman Ramiro Cordero confirmed the arrest of Kalimba Thursday. He offered no further details on the case.

A judge in Mexico's Caribbean state of Quintana Roo had issued an arrest warrant against the singer.

Prosecutors allege Kalimba raped a 17-year-old girl at a hotel in the state capital of Chetumal on Dec. 19.

Kalimba has denied the accusations in a case that has received front-page coverage in Mexican newspapers.

The singer's full name is Kalimba Kadjaly Marichal Ibar. He is 28. He formerly performed with the group OV7.

EL PASO (AP) - A Mexican journalist who said he fled across the border with his 15-year-old son in 2008 after receiving daily death threats while covering the country's bloody drug war was scheduled Friday to finally plead his case for U.S. asylum before a federal immigration judge.

Emilio Gutierrez Soto and his son showed up at a border checkpoint in New Mexico and declared their intent to seek asylum. Gutierrez said he received near daily death threats after writing a series of stories accusing the Mexican military of abusing civilians.

Since crossing the border 2 years ago, Gutierrez's wait for an asylum hearing included seven months at a federal detention center in El Paso, separated from his son. His court date comes four months after another Mexican journalist, Jorge Luis Aguirre, claimed similar threats and had his U.S. asylum request granted, making him the first reporter to receive

asylum since Mexico's bloody drug war erupted and cartels began targeting the media to silence coverage.

Aguirre fled across the border after Gutierrez, but pleaded his case through an application rather than in court. The September decision to grant Aguirre asylum was heralded by supporters as a potential indication that the U.S. was recognizing the country's reporters as a targeted group.

Gutierrez did not answer calls to his cell phone Thursday night. His attorney, Carlos Spector, declined comment through his staff, citing a heavy workload preparing for the closed-door hearing. But he scheduled a Friday evening news conference following the proceedings set to take place in El Paso's federal courthouse. The judge may not immediately make a ruling.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokeswoman Leticia Zamarripa said she could not comment, or even confirm whether a hearing

was taking place. Asylum proceedings in the U.S. are not public, and federal officials routinely decline to even acknowledge individual cases, citing the need to protect applicants.

Gutierrez was a reporter in Ascension, Mexico, where he said he received death threats nearly every day for more than two years as he wrote stories about the Mexican army's rough treatment of civilians in its search for drug cartel members. He said that in June 2008, men identifying themselves as soldiers ransacked his house and he was told they were planning to kill him.

Gutierrez headed with his son to a border crossing in New Mexico, about 170 miles west of El Paso.

Since being released from an immigration jail following 7 months detention - without explanation to the public or Gutierrez himself - the reporter has supported himself by working odd jobs around Las Cruces, New Mexico. Mexican asylum-seekers face long odds. The U.S. receives nearly 3,000 asylum requests from Mexico each year, but just 252 of those cases were granted between 2005 and 2009.

Despite the violence gripping Mexico, fear of being hurt isn't sufficient grounds for asylum. Cases hinge on proving that a person is being persecuted because of race, religion, political views, nationality or membership in a particular social

## State jobless rate up

AUSTIN (AP) - The state's employment agency says the jobless rate in Texas has increased for the second straight month despite continued improvement in the number of jobs.

The Texas Workforce Commission said the unemployment rate for December was 8.3 percent, up from 8.2 percent in November.

The agency said the state also had its fourth consecutive month of job growth, adding 20,000

positions. The state's jobless rate remains below the national rate of 9.4 percent, and Texas job growth is outpacing the U.S. as well.

Commission figures indicate Texas has added 230,800 jobs since December 2009 and has an annual growth rate of 2.3 percent compared to 0.9 percent nationally.

The strongest growth was in construction, which added 8,700 jobs in December.

## Today in History

Today is Friday, Jan. 21, the 21st day of 2011. There are 344 days left in the year.

### Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 21, 1861, Jefferson Davis of Mississippi and four other Southerners whose states had seceded from the Union resigned from the U.S. Senate.

### On this date:

In 1793, during the French Revolution, King Louis XVI, condemned for treason, was executed on the guillotine.

In 1911, Sen. Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin announced creation of the National Progressive Republican League with the goal of promoting "popular government and progressive legislation."

In 1915, the first Kiwanis Club was founded, in Detroit.

In 1924, Russian revolutionary Vladimir Lenin died at age 53.

In 1950, former State Department official Alger Hiss, accused of being part of a Communist spy ring, was found guilty in New York of lying to a grand jury. (Hiss, who proclaimed his innocence, served less than four years in prison.)

In 1954, the first atomic submarine, the USS Nautilus, was launched at Groton, Conn. (However, the Nautilus did not make its first nuclear-powered run until nearly a year later.)

In 1968, the Battle of Khe Sanh began during the Vietnam War as North Vietnamese forces attacked a U.S. Marine base; the Americans were able to hold their position until the siege was lifted 2 1/2 months later. In Greenland, an American B-52 bomber carrying four hydrogen bombs crashed, killing one crew member and scattering radioactive material.

In 1970, the Boeing 747 went on its first commercial flight as Pan Am passengers traveled from New York to London.

In 1976, the supersonic Concorde jet was put into service by Britain and France.

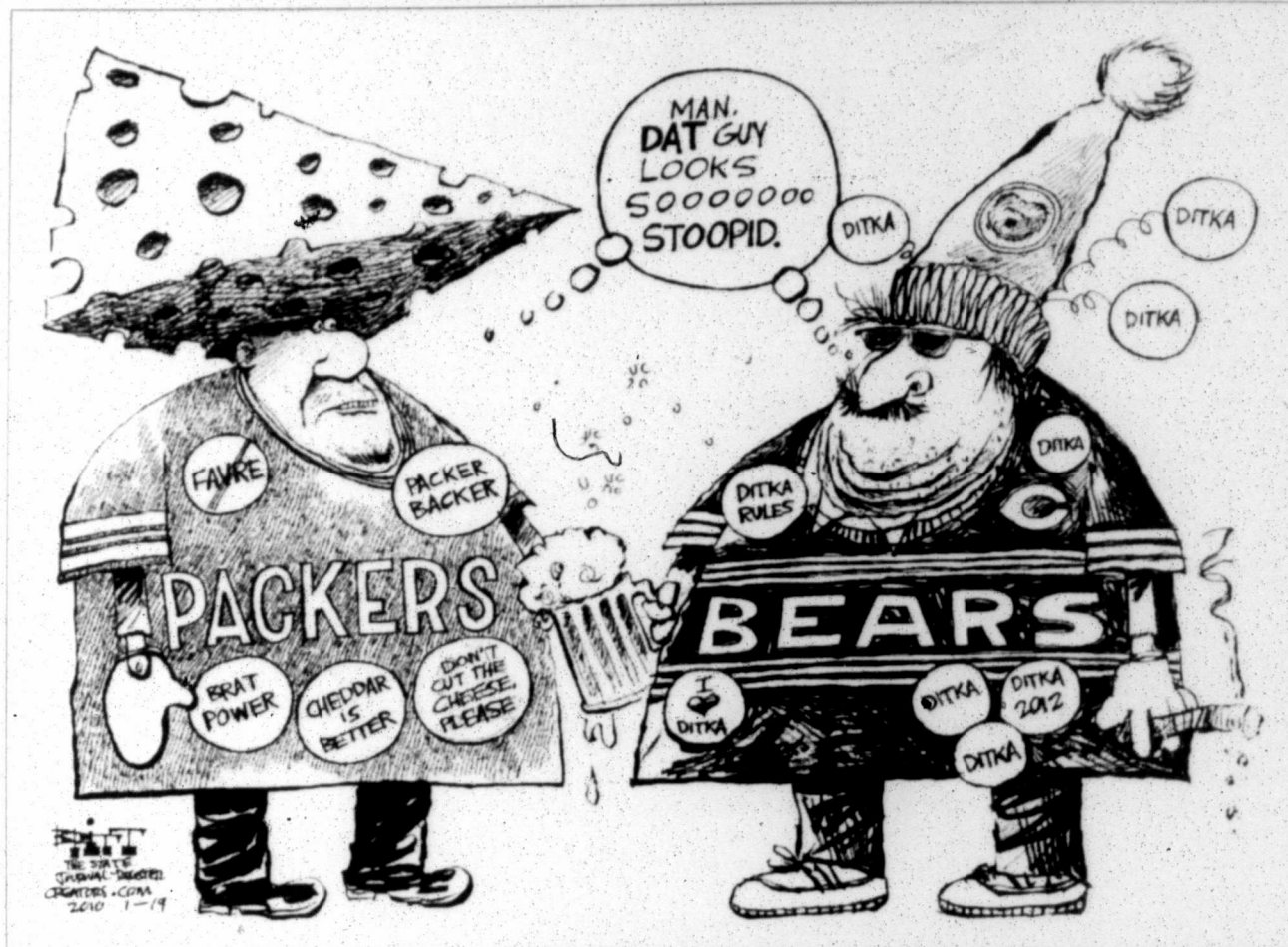
**Ten years ago:** Byron De La Beckwith, a white supremacist convicted of assassinating civil rights leader Medgar Evers, died in Jackson, Miss., at age 80.

**Five years ago:** Rescuers in West Virginia found the bodies of two miners who'd disappeared after a conveyor belt caught fire deep inside a coal mine.

## President seeks to highlight economic successes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama wants to cast some light on economic success stories in the shadows of a slow recovery. And he is looking to find some more.

Today the president travels to Schenectady, N.Y., birthplace of the General Electric Co., to showcase a new GE deal with India and announce a restructured presidential advisory board to focus on increasing employment and competitiveness.

Obama is naming GE CEO Jeffrey Immelt as the head of a Council on Jobs and Competitiveness. The panel replaces Obama's Economic Recovery Advisory Board, which had been chaired by former Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker. Obama announced late Thursday that Volcker, as expected, was ending his tenure on the panel.

Obama, in a statement after midnight, said the council's mission will be to help generate ideas from the private sector to speed up economic growth and promote American competitiveness.

"We still have a long way to go, and my number one priority is to ensure we are doing everything we can to get the American people back to work," the president said.

A new Associated Press-GfK poll shows a public skeptical of Obama's economic policies. More than half of those surveyed disapprove of how he's

handled the economy, and just 35 percent say it has improved on his watch. However, three-quarters do say it's unrealistic to expect noticeable improvements after two years; they say it will take longer.

For Obama, the visit to upstate New York is also an opportunity to claim credit for tax, trade and energy policies pursued by his administration as the nation attempts to recover from the worst recession since the 1930s. It's the first of many treks during the second half of his term that the president is expected to take to put a more hopeful countenance on the economy amid stubbornly high unemployment.

The GE plant is benefiting from a power turbine contract with India announced during Obama's Southeast Asia trip in November. Immelt also has been an advocate of alternative forms of energy, and the GE facility, the company's largest energy plant, is the future site of GE's advanced battery manufacturing program. New battery technology has become something of an Obama pet project as a symbol of innovation, clean energy and job creation.

"This is a company that has brought jobs from overseas back into the United States," Obama spokesman Robert Gibbs said.

The White House said GE completed a \$755 million agreement with India's Reliance Power Ltd. to supply gas and steam turbines for a power plant expansion in India. The deal will allow for about \$500 million in exports from the

United States, the White House said, and help support 1,200 manufacturing and 400 engineering jobs in the Schenectady plant.

Obama also plans to take note of GE employees as examples of middle class Americans who are benefiting from the payroll tax cut he negotiated with Republicans in a December economics package that retained Bush-era tax rates for all taxpayers. And he is expected to make a pitch for new business incentives and renewable energy tax credits contained in that compromise deal. GE and GE customers would benefit from those provisions.

In Immelt, Obama has a useful corporate ally. As chief executive of a multinational company, Immelt was one of 20 CEOs who met with the president during a daylong summit at Blair House last month. He was one of 14 U.S. business leaders invited to meet with Chinese President Hu Jintao this week at the White House and was among the guests for the lavish state dinner that followed.

In an opinion piece in the Washington Post, Immelt said the restructured council under his leadership would focus on manufacturing and exports, trade and innovation.

"The president and I are committed to a candid and full dialogue among business, labor and government to help ensure that the United States has the most competitive and innovative economy in the world," he wrote.

His appointment adds another corporate insider

to the White House orbit, underscoring the administration's efforts to build stronger ties to the business community. Earlier this month, Obama named former Commerce secretary and JPMorgan Chase executive William Daley as chief of staff.

The change also signals Obama's intention to shift from policies that were designed to stabilize the economy after the 2008 financial meltdown to a renewed focus on increasing employment, a vexing task that could affect his re-election efforts. The White House says the board's mission will be to help generate ideas from the private sector to speed up economic growth and promote American competitiveness.

The advisory board has included past government officials and representatives from labor and the corporate community. Volcker has been a regular White House adviser, though the board itself has met infrequently with the president.

Immelt has been supportive of Obama since the start of his presidency, though his political contributions tend to be bipartisan and he financially supported Hillary Rodham Clinton and Republicans John McCain, Rudy Giuliani and Mitt Romney during the 2008 presidential campaign.

General Electric employees and their spouses, however, supported Obama over any other presidential candidate.

GE is a conglomerate with interests in diversified technology, media and financial services.

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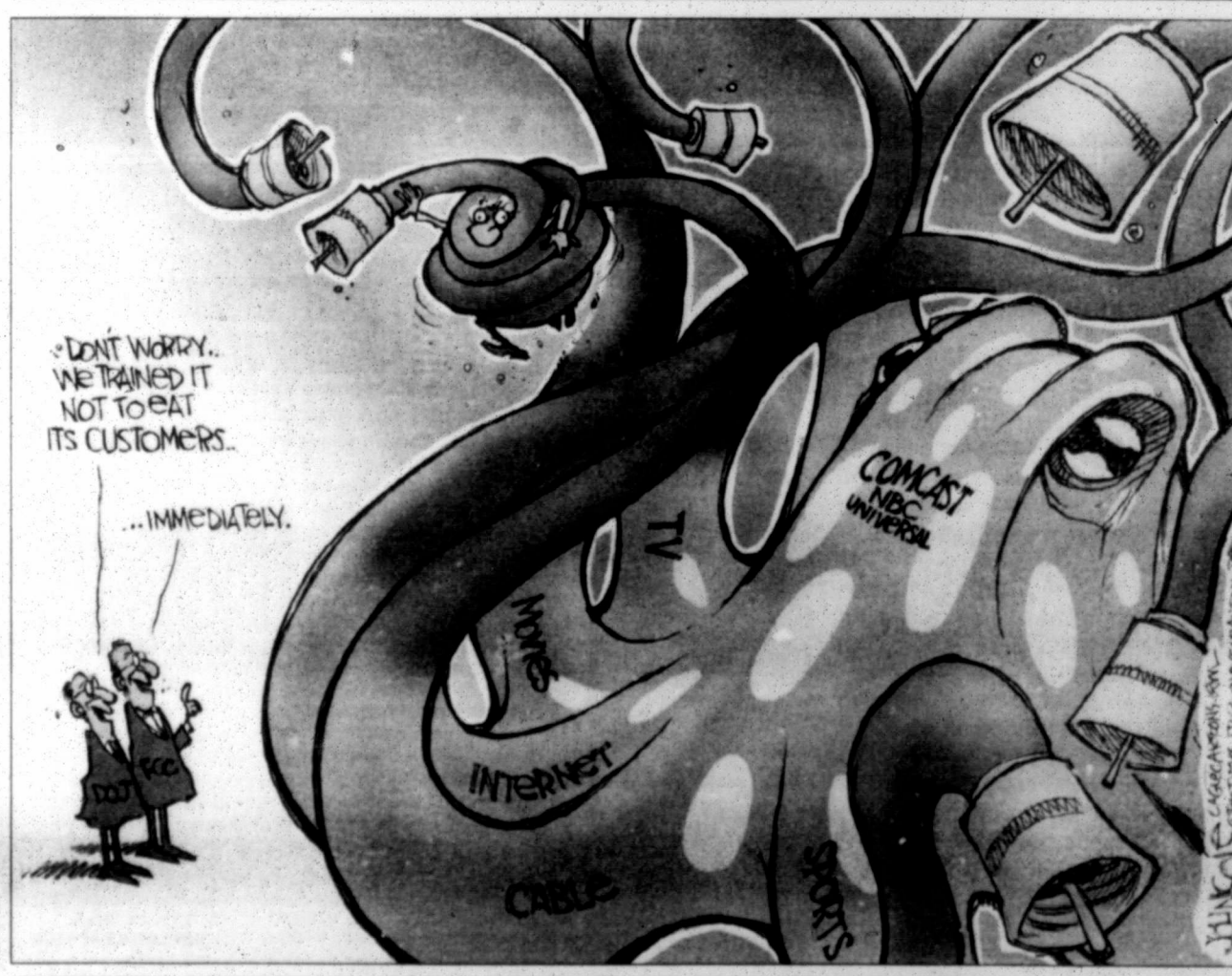
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# Worship

## How do you show worship to God?

"To worship God is paying attention to nobody else but God," says Pruitt, 11. "If you don't do it, it sort of messes you up. You can worship him anywhere."

"It sort of messes you up" is a great way to describe our preoccupation with ourselves. God wants to take us into a larger place where he's in control, and we can relax by trusting in him.

Pruitt also says we can worship God anywhere. Although this is true, don't try to pass off a round of golf on Sunday morning as a worship experience.

God accepts worship from Christians meeting in houses, fields, caves and even beautiful cathedrals. In countries like China and Saudi Arabia, Christians meet secretly because authorities could break in and arrest them for worshipping God.

God is more concerned about the condition of our hearts than the appearance of buildings where worshippers meet. Jesus once told a woman at a well, "True worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth." (John 4:23)

The "how" and "whom" of worship is more important than the "where." Pilgrims travel thousands of miles because they imagine that a so-called holy place will bring them closer to God. Others spend millions on ornate church buildings for the same reason.

The idea of connecting God's presence to a building is an Old Testament concept. The temple in Jerusalem was destroyed in A.D. 70. God now dwells in the hearts of his people as foretold by the prophet Jeremiah (Jeremiah 31).

"When you worship God, you invite Him to come and fill you with the Holy Spirit," says Kaylee, 12. "You pray and sing to him through your heart. You read your Bible and just let him speak to you: When you worship God, you honor Him and give Him glory. That's the whole reason we are even here on Earth."

"Worshipping God means to spill our heart out to God and let him receive it so that he can fill it with the love of his presence," says Natalie, 13.

Jesus spilled his life out to God to

pay for our sins. All who have received the Lord's life by faith alone in Christ alone can experience a life filled with God's love. There's a realm where God is all in all. In order to be filled with God's spirit, there must be an emptying of oneself.

Jesus told his disciples that by losing their lives in following him, they would find their lives. Worshipping God in spirit and truth allows us to see him and what he is doing. When we make adjustments to be a part of his plan, he takes care of our life's itinerary and accommodations. His plan for us, however, might not be the easiest because it's full of challenges and adventures.

Life with God is never boring when we trade the certainty of our small life for the uncertainty of a faith-adventure. Worship allows us to walk in communion with a loving God who knows how to take us beyond our frailties and fears.

"We rise into the presence of God through a contemplation of Him in His goodness, beauty, and truth, and especially His redeeming acts."

Memorize this truth: "True worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth." (John 4:23)

Ask this question: Are you living in that larger realm where God is all?

Gray County Sheriff's Office," said Lt. Joe B. Hoard. "But so far, we don't have any leads."

Michael's route to Oklahoma has repeatedly been scoured by both the authorities and Michael's family and friends, said Greg. "I drove 700 miles between here and Elk City," Greg said. "I drove every secondary road there is to drive, personally. The police are doing the same thing. The OHP's made that route. Guys that work for me have made that route. Nothing."

"The thing about it is he's been on pain meds because he's had struggles with a degenerative neck disc," added Greg. "He has migraine headaches. I have not known him to go half a day without any pain medication."

"He left without any medication, without a change of clothes, without any money... He's not one to twist off like this and not take anything with him."

Greg said that Michael, who is divorced, had been going through some slight depression, but wasn't suicidal.

"We'd just appreciate any and all support in looking for him," Greg said. "If you have any contact or if you have people in Oklahoma that can keep a lookout for his white '98 Ford. Any and all support would be appreciated."

# Indoor air pollution concern for remodeler



**Dear Pat:** I am planning to do some remodeling on my house. With children, I am concerned about indoor pollutants such as lead, formaldehyde and asbestos. What should I know about these before starting? — Chris V.

**Dear Chris:** You have identified three common indoor pollutants in homes. The period that your house was built is often a good indicator of which of the above are likely present, but not always. Your builder may have kept some old building materials around or used some materials salvaged from an older house.

Lead exposure is dangerous, especially to children and pregnant women. Lead poisoning can cause irreversible brain damage in children and can stunt fetal growth in pregnant women. It may also cause elevated blood pressure, impaired muscle coordination and damage to the nervous system in adults.

The primary source of lead in a house is from lead-based paint. Lead was used as a drying agent and pigment in oil-based paint. Modern water-based latex paints do not contain lead. If your house was built before 1960, there is better than a 50 percent chance that heavily leaded paint was used.

The best method to test paint you suspect of containing lead is to send a sample of the paint to an EPA-approved laboratory. Contact your local health department for the names of approved laboratories. There are some do-it-yourself test kits available, but they may miss low lead levels.

The laboratory will tell you the size of paint sample it needs for testing, but a 2-inch-square piece is typically required. The lab will send a bag and sample collection procedures to you. Generally, you use a clean putty knife to scrape off the sample piece.

If the test results show that lead is present, there are several remedies. If it is woodwork that can be removed, do that and replace it with new wood. If not, the best method is to contact a professional trained in removing lead-based paint. Just painting over it with non-lead-based paint is not a long-term fix.

Formaldehyde is used in many building materials, furniture, carpeting, etc., in homes today. The formaldehyde gas emissions are

highest in new building materials so it is most likely not a major problem in an older home. If you have just remodeled, though, the gas levels can be elevated.

Formaldehyde gas is more of an annoyance than a serious health threat. The emissions from the new building materials or furniture will decrease over time. Increasing the fresh air ventilation in your home can help until the materials age a little and the formaldehyde outgassing subsides.

Asbestos is particularly dangerous. Exposure to it can lead to lung cancer and skin, eye and respiratory irritation. Asbestos was commonly used in older homes for duct insulation, pipe coverings, textured paints and floor tiles.

If the asbestos containing material is not deteriorating, it is probably not a current threat. You should still have any materials suspected of containing asbestos-tested by an approved lab. It is best to let professionals remove

the sample to avoid exposing your family to it.

If asbestos is found, the professionals will either seal or cover it. It can be sealed with materials that bind the asbestos fibers together. Pipes and other smaller items can be covered by wrapping with a protective film.

## HOME HOW-TO

### Lead Paint

Before 1978, paints containing high levels of lead were used in many houses. Even small amounts of dust or chips of paint containing lead can be a health hazard.

#### EXISTING LEAD PAINT

Lead-based paint in good condition is usually not a problem and should not be removed unless appropriate measures are followed.

#### PROFESSIONAL REMOVAL

Do not remove lead paint yourself. To permanently remove lead hazards, you must hire a lead "abatement" contractor. Never sand or burn off paint that may contain lead.

#### PLAY AREA

Keep areas where children play as dust-free and clean as possible.

#### COOKING

Many homes built in the early 1900s used lead pipes for plumbing. The only way to know if there is lead in drinking water is to have it tested.

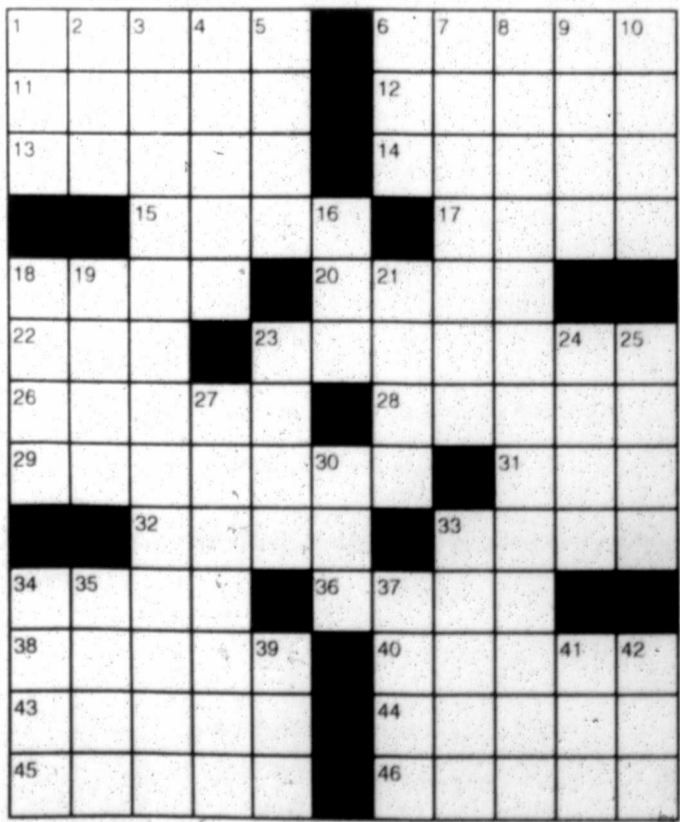

However, you need to heal as best as you can in your own way from the death of your son. Thank them for their constant support, and explain that you need some time to be alone and cope with this without a crowd around. They will understand.

Working your way through the grieving process can be exhausting. But if your "tiredness" persists, I'm advising you to discuss it with your doctor because it can be a symptom of chronic depression, which is a medical condition.

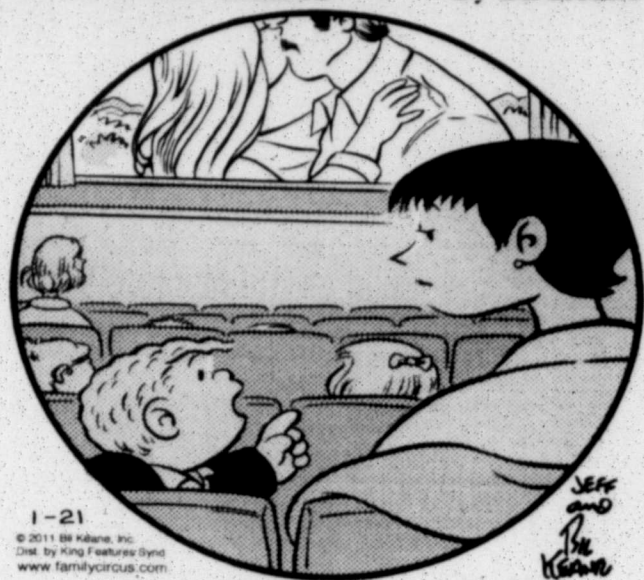

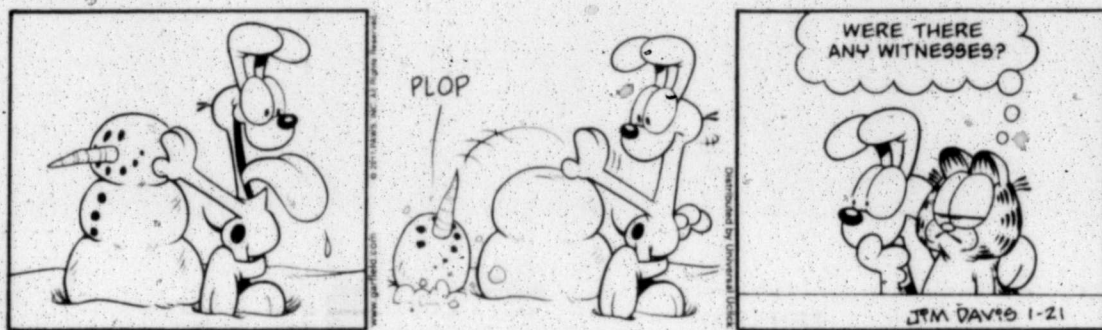

to meeting some of those players.

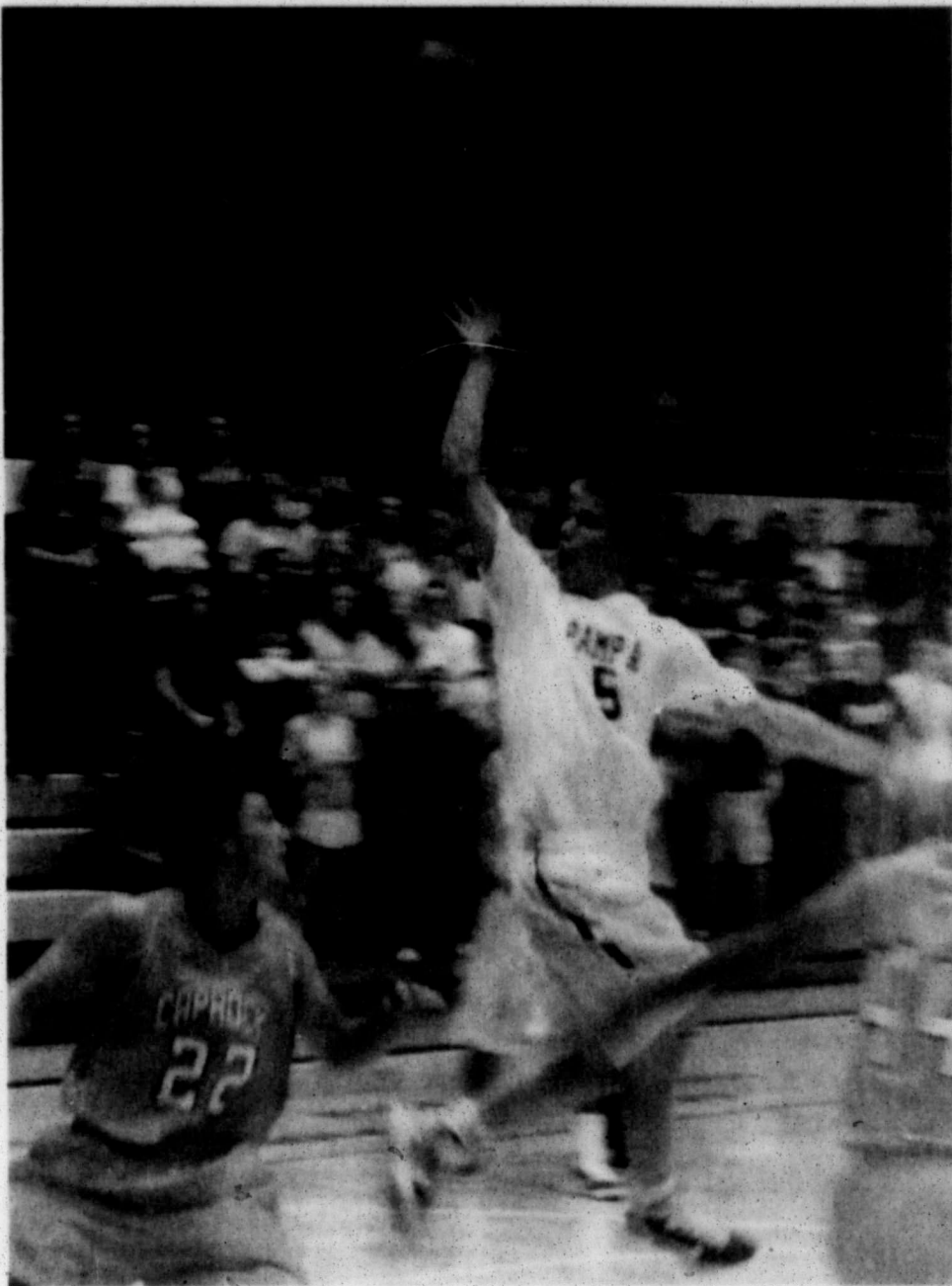
"I will be able to," Collins said. "Mainly I just want to get Pampa basketball back to what it used to be."

### BURNING ISSUES

► The Golden Globe "arrivals" reminded us of the garden-variety NASCAR rain-delay show on TV. Special emphasis on quality of interviews.

► Slightly more restrictive plates will convert into slightly slower speeds, and it will be slightly harder to pass in the Daytona 500.

► To those watching the race, the new pavement at Daytona will have an effect far less noticeable than drivers would have us believe.

► Yes, new pavement affects the racing, usually for the worst, at most tracks. Where it shouldn't have much effect is where restrictor plates are in use. Adhesion isn't nearly as important at tracks where drivers are running wide-open all the way around.

► Assuming the track has been considerably smoothed out, as drivers tell us, then the elimination of the old bumps will have a greater effect on the racing than the mere presence of a new surface.

► Is this the year Juan Pablo Montoya blossoms into stardom? A Daytona 500 victory would certainly serve notice, at least in the publicity blitz that follows the race.

► In reality, of course, the outcome of the 500 has little to do with the rest of the season. Since the turn of the century, only Jimmie Johnson, in 2006, has followed up a 500 win with a championship.

## A few late-breaking items for the fans

► A foreign website fretted about "U.S.-Australia speedway relations" after two-time Sprint Cup champion Tony Stewart reportedly had a scrap with Sydney Speedway co-owner and former driver Brett Morris. The disagreement may have been over the condition of the dirt track. Parramatta police detained and questioned the American star, who was later released and allowed to fly home to the U.S. Stewart allegedly hit Morris with his helmet ... but came away from the fracas with a black eye himself.

► Sam Hornish Jr., as it turns out, won't compete in the Daytona 500 for Penske Racing. Earlier reports suggested that Hornish would run the first five races of the season while Penske continued its attempts to secure sponsorship. Hornish does reportedly have an agreement to race 10 times for Penske in the Nationwide Series but reportedly won't be racing during Speedweeks at all. That, of course, could change.

► The Eastern Motorsports Press Association has renamed its "writer of the year" award for Jim Hunter. The award was previously named for writer Frank Blunk. Hunter,

a longtime NASCAR official, died in 2010.

► Kevin Swindell won the Chili Bowl in Tulsa, Okla., for the second consecutive year. He won the prestigious Midget feature by a half length over his father, Sammy Swindell.

► Camping World Truck Series champion Todd Bodine will attempt to compete in all three major NASCAR series during Speedweeks at Daytona.

► Furniture Row Racing, which fields Chevs in Cup for Regan Smith, has farmed out its pit-crew duties to Stewart-Haas Racing, which will train and provide over-the-wall personnel in 2011.

► NASCAR chairman Brian France is in the midst of meetings with major teams concerning the upcoming season.

► All systems appear to be "go" after Brian Vickers tested for the first time at Walt Disney World Speedway in Orlando, Fla. Vickers is returning to Team Red Bull after missing most of last season due to medical issues.

► Micro-Sprints are racing in Atlantic City, N.J., on Jan. 28-29 in the ninth-annual Gambler's Classic at Boardwalk Hall.

# The Machine Keeps Running

### Owner making crew-chief moves to keep success going

Jimmie Johnson isn't actually perched alone at the top of NASCAR. His car owner, Rick Hendrick, has also won five consecutive championships.

While five straight championships as an owner doesn't rival such attainment in a driver, it's instructive to note that Hendrick Motorsports' Chevys have won a total of 10 titles: five with Johnson, four with Jeff Gordon and one with Terry Labonte. The total equals the all-time record of 10, also won by Petty Enterprises with Richard (seven) and Lee (three) Petty.

Hendrick, whose other business interests include an empire of automobile dealerships, never sits still. Johnson was the only one of his four drivers who won races last year. This led Hendrick to order an off-season shuffle of crew chiefs among the teams of Jeff Gordon, Mark Martin and Dale Earnhardt Jr.

The team shuffle pairs crew chiefs Alan Gustafson with Jeff Gordon, Steve Letarte with Earnhardt and Lance McGrew with Martin.

"I think we just got complacent, and other teams were getting stronger and stronger," said Hendrick. "We

were not really where we needed to be, so we started to really try to step up our program in every area."

The decision was based, Hendrick said, on a desire to "pair up people that I thought would be better together."

Describing the changes in terms of only crew chiefs is incomplete. The actual change is in drivers linked to the respective teams. Gordon, who drives No. 24, is now aligned with the entire team, not just crew chief Gustafson.

"We are not changing the people in the shops," said Hendrick. "The people in the '24' and '48' (Johnson) shops will remain the same. The only thing that will change is Jeff Gordon's seat becomes Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s seat. The cars, the people, will remain the same. The same is true in the other two shops (Earnhardt, Martin). The only things changed were the seat, the driver, the sponsor and the number."

Just having one team at the top isn't enough to please Hendrick.

"We have to work a lot harder and a lot smarter," he said. "I'm confident that the guys can and will do it. They're really energized, so we'll just see."

## NASCAR tightens the restrictor plates for Daytona

NASCAR officials are trying out smaller restrictor plates — the openings, that is — for next weekend's preseason testing at Daytona International Speedway.

"When we tested during the Good-year tire test at Daytona, I could see the speeds of two cars that got together being high," said 2000 Winston Cup champion Bobby Labonte. "When you get to actually racing, things always go a little faster. I think making the restrictor plate smaller is a deal where NASCAR was foreseeing that speeds would be really high."

"The handling effect will be gone. The throttle response will be a little less for us, and it might be harder to complete the pass. ... I think fans will see the race coming down to cars being bunched up in the right line, getting the right push from somebody, clearing the pass and blocking, more like we see at Talladega."

The openings in the plates will be reduced from 15/16ths of an inch to 29/32nds, a reduction of 1/32nd of an inch.

**He's slightly back** — Mark Martin, who has won more Nationwide Series (48) races than any other driver, is

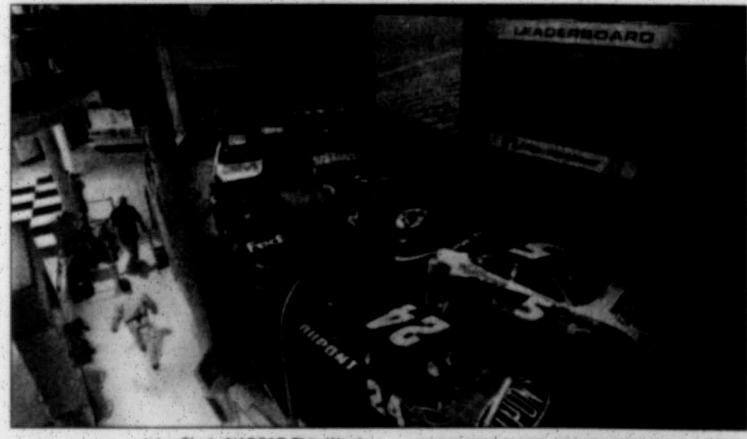
diving back into the top support series for four races with Turner Motorsports during the coming season.

Kyle Busch, who won a record 13 races in the series last year, now has a career total of 43.

Martin, 52, will compete at Las Vegas, Auto Club (Fontana), Michigan and Kentucky in Turner's No. 32 Dollar General-sponsored Chevy. He will also run Camping World Truck Series races at Michigan and Pocono for the team.

Lorenzen won 26 times and was the first driver ever to earn more than \$100,000 (\$122,587 in 1963) in a season. Lorenzen drove Fords in every victory. He finished in the top 10 in 53 percent of his races.

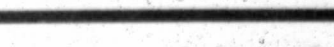

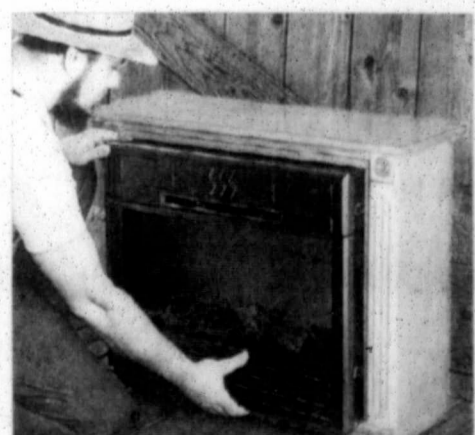
