PISD absentee figures 'typical' of flu season

With several area children being sidelined with flu-like symptoms across town, it's officially safe to say that there's something going around.

Still, the Pampa Independent School District nurse coordinator said that, despite increasing absentee numbers, this is typical of flu season in Pampa.

Chris Kirkpatrick, who is also the nurse at Pampa Junior High School, said Friday afternoon that influenza symptoms are being reported for students in schools all across the state.

"It's widespread," she said.

Kirkpatrick said schools were

asking parents to keep students who might be running a fever at home until they've been fever-free for 24 hours or more without any medication.

She said student absenteeism at Pampa schools was running about 7.8 percent.

Parents with students that exhibit flu symptoms should contact their family doctor, Kirkpatrick said. They can also go to www.texasflu.org on the internet to find out more.

Kirkpatrick said that the flu shot, that were given last fall for the 2010-2011 flu season should help protect students from three types of flu, including the H1N1 flu.

Travis Elementary sends waffles to troops in Iraq

Chad Sublett and his platoon in Iraq are about to get battered — in a good way.

The students of Travis Elementary recently raised \$425 to send waffle mix and beef jerky to Sublett, an Army sergeant stationed with First Brigade 101st Battalion A Company in Kirkuk, north of Baghdad.

Waffle batter and jerky may not sound like much, but to Sublett and his men, any comfort of home is very welcome, given their surroundings.

"It's just something we did to help make them feel a little more at home," said Kay Pittman, music teacher at Travis Elementary, who spearheaded the project.

Sublett used to enjoy waffles regularly

as a breakfast tradition in his household. As a way to bring a small slice of home with him to Iraq, Sublett instituted "Waffle Saturdays," during which he and his unit would get together to enjoy waffles every weekend.

"His mom's a waffle freak," said Mike Sublett, Chad's father and the pastor of Pampa's Hi-Land Christian Church.

"She would fix waffles all the time for the kids for breakfast, and they all got addicted to waffles. When we sent (some waffle mix) over, he decided to share with everybody, and they all decided to do it every week."

Originally, the soldiers concocted the "once

a week" plan to stretch the waffle mix supply for as long as possible. Now, thanks to the kids at Travis Elementary School, Chad will be able to keep his friends' fed a little while longer.

"The last couple of weeks, I just asked the kids to make a donation if they wanted to, and they just ran with it," Pittman said. "We bought 18 cans of waffle mix and about 50 packages of beef jerky."

Jerky is Chad's favorite snack, Mike said. Hi-Land Christian is already collecting money for a "waffle fund" ("We send one every month or two," Sublett said), but Sublett said he was floored when he heard that the kids at Travis wanted to get involved.

"One of our ladies at church used to be a helper at Travis, and she was talking to

I want to strongly discourage anyone sending money through Western Union or MoneyGram unless you know the person accepting the money personally.

If you do receive a check or money order through the mail there are a few things you can do. First, contact the company who issued the money order, such as the post office, Wal-Mart or Allsup's. The company that issued the money order will know if it is fraudulent. If you receive a check contact the bank from which the check came from. Second, never send money through Western Union or MoneyGram to someone you do not know personally. YOU ARE the number one person who can stop the criminals from scamming you!

Plane crashes in yard

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston area authorities say a small plane has crashed in a backyard in the northwest corner of Harris County.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says some minor injuries have been reported. It did not have information on how many people were onboard the plane.

The sheriff's office told the Houston Chronicle the plane crashed after missing a runway at Weiser Airpark near Huffmeister and Jelge and nearly went into a bayou. The aircraft caught on fire, but firefighters extinguished it.

The crash happened about 8:30 a.m. Saturday.

Protesters voice Egypt concerns

HOUSTON (AP) — Dozens of people held a peaceful protest outside the Egyptian consulate in Houston Friday chanting, "Free, free Egypt now."

The demonstrators came as protesters in Egypt engulfed the country in chaos and President Hosni Mubarak fired his cabinet. Pouring onto the streets after Friday noon prayers, protesters ignored extreme government measures that included cutting off the Internet and mobile-phone services in Cairo and other areas, calling the army into the streets and imposing a nationwide nighttime curfew.

In Houston on Friday afternoon, on the sidewalk outside the consulate, many waved Egyptian flags or held up signs that read "No Justice No Peace," "Constitutional Reform" and "Democracy."

Giffords case moves to Tucson

PHOENIX (AP) — Prosecutors and defense lawyers have agreed that the federal case against the suspect in the shooting of Rep. Gabrielle Giffords will be held in Tucson, at least for now.

The case against Jared Lee Loughner was moved to Phoenix after federal judges in Tucson recused themselves because a fellow judge died in the attack.

Loughner was arraigned Monday in Phoenix. Prosecutors then requested the move so victims and witnesses would not have to drive there.

The deal doesn't prevent future requests for moves.

Loughner pleaded not guilty to federal charges of trying to assassinate Giffords and kill two of her aides. He also faces federal charges in the deaths of an aide and the judge.

He likely faces state charges in the Jan. 8 rampage at a Giffords event that wounded 18 and killed six others, including a 9-year-old girl.

His next court is set for March 9.

Committee leaders appointed

AUSTIN (AP) — There were no surprises Friday when Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst announced his picks to head Senate committees this legislative session, with the panels largely remaining in Republican hands.

Dewhurst named 12 Republicans six Democrats as committee chairs, and the composition of the 18 committees remained virtually unchanged from Dewhurst's summer 2010 appointments.

Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, was re-named chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, while Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, was again tapped to lead the influential State Affairs Committee.

Sen. John Whitmire, a Houston Democrat and the longest-serving member of the Senate, was re-appointed chairman of the Criminal Justice Committee.

Dewhurst shuffled around a few members but otherwise made minimal changes.

Newly elected Sen. Jose Rodriguez, D-El Paso, was named vice-chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, replacing Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Houston.

Another newcomer, Sen. Brian Birdwell, R-Granbury, was appointed vice-chair of the Senate Higher Education Committee, where longtime Sen. Judith Zaffirini holds the position of chairwoman.

"Texas is fortunate to have 31 hardworking and talented state senators, and the makeup of our Senate committees reflects their considerable leadership skills and depth of experience," Dewhurst said. "From balancing the budget to redistricting, we have a lot to accomplish this session in a relatively short period of time, but I'm confident that our Senators and our Senate Committees are up to the challenge."

Two dead in house fire

EL PASO (AP) — A 55-year-old woman and her 9-year-old grandson died after an overnight fire in El Paso, and two other grandchildren were critically injured.

Inspector John Concha said the fire also severely burned the woman's 50-year-old husband.

The El Paso Times reported that fire crews were called to a home just before 1:30 a.m. Friday and found the house engulfed in flames.

The woman, who suffered smoke inhalation, died while being flown to a Lubbock burn center. The 9-year-old died at the center.

A 14-year-old and 10-year-old were both in critical condition at University Medical Center of El Paso on Friday evening.

The man suffered second-degree burns to his hands and feet.

Man gets probation in oil scheme

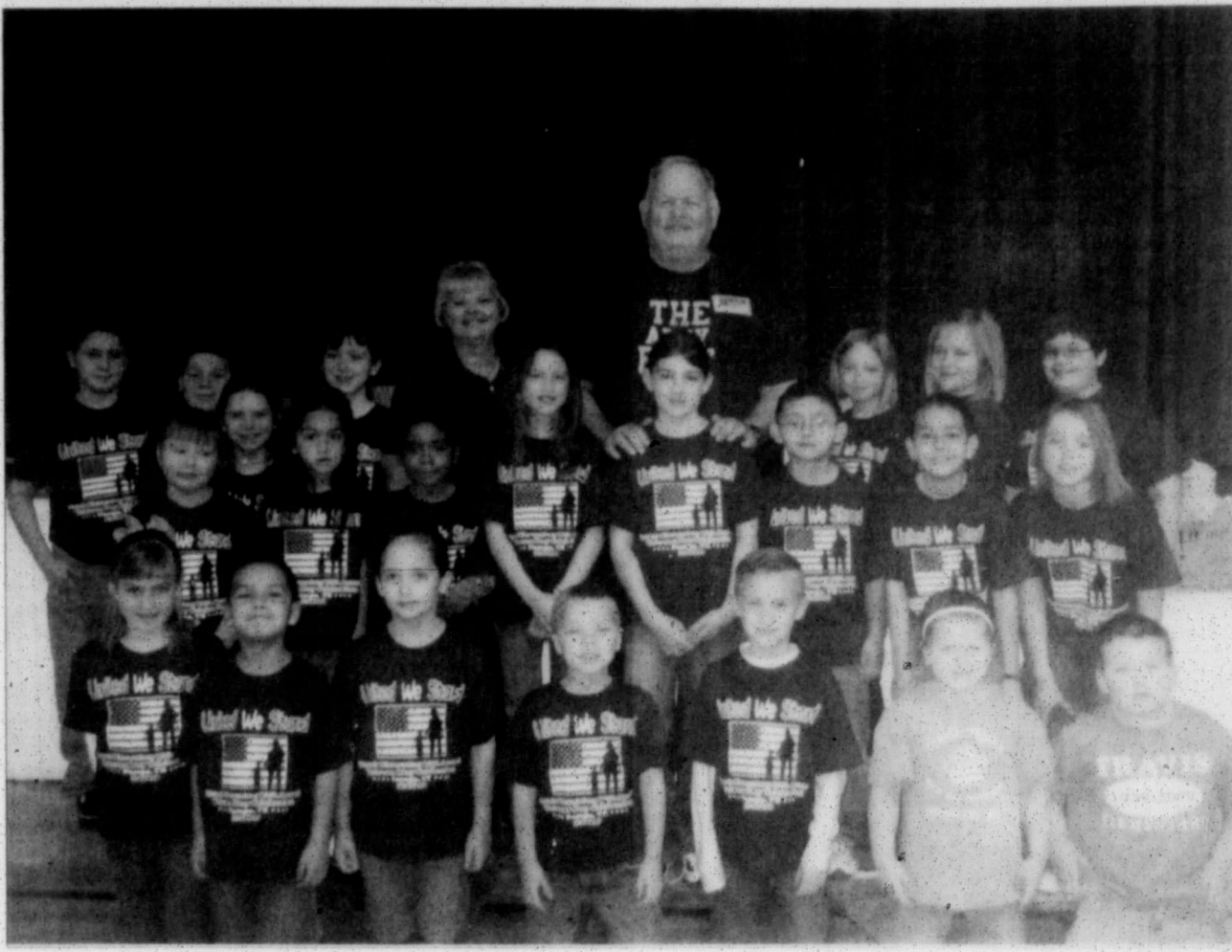
HOUSTON (AP) — A former Texas oil company official was sentenced to probation Friday for his role in the sale of petroleum products stolen from Mexico.

Tim Brink, the former president of Continental Fuels in San Antonio, was the last of five executives and oil brokers at Texas-based companies to be sentenced in the case, which resulted from a binational probe into smuggled oil that was stolen from Mexico's state oil monopoly Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, transported across the border and sold to U.S. refineries.

Brink had previously pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to receive stolen goods which carried up to five years in prison.

Instead, he received three years of probation, along with six months home confinement, said Angela Dodge, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in Houston.

U.S. District Judge Ewing Werlein also fined Brink \$10,000 and ordered him to perform 200 hours of community service.

(Pittman), Sublett said. "Kay went, 'That's a really good idea.'"

"Next thing I know, I get a phone call and she says, 'I think they're going to do a thing at Travis for Chad.' Next thing I know, it's a fourth and fifth grade project, wheels were turning and it was really exciting."

The Subletts came to Travis on Wednesday to thank the kids in person. They presented the kids with an army flag and a t-shirt emblazoned with the slogan, "Half of my heart is in Iraq."

"Needless to say, it was real emotional. My wife and I went over there to tell them that for us to care about our kid, it's a good thing, but we're supposed to care about him. For you guys to do that, you guys don't even know him. It was just absolutely awesome."

The flag is currently hanging in Pittman's music room at Travis. The kids, Pittman said, were very excited to receive the gift.

"They said, 'Oh, we want you to hang it up,'" said Pittman. "One of them wanted to hang it up on the flagpole. I said, 'I don't think we can do that,' but I told them we can hang it up in the music room so when they came in, they can think of Chad."

Pittman mailed the waffle mix and jerky — six boxes full — to Iraq on Friday. It usually takes between a week and 10 days to get to the soldiers.

"He hasn't gotten it yet, but when it gets there, it'll knock him on his socks," said Chad's father, Mike Sublett, the pastor of Hi-Land Christian Church. "We

haven't said a word to him about it. They're just going to show up."

She also recommends following basic hygiene practices such as hand-washing.

Other precautions include maintaining a healthy diet and getting adequate rest. Failure to do so can effect the immune system and make one more susceptible to the virus.

Texas celebrates 150-year anniversary of secession

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Sam Houston, tried to tell Texans secession and joining the Confederacy wouldn't work.

He warned of "rivers of blood," a generation left dead or crippled by war and ultimate defeat of the South at the hands of the industrial superior North.

"After enduring civil war for years, will there be any promise of a better state of things than we now enjoy?" Houston wrote in a November 1860 letter preserved among documents at his namesake museum in Huntsville.

A secession convention that assembled in Austin 150 years ago this weekend rejected the Texas governor's advice.

"I think everybody pretty much knew what was coming," Mac Woodward, curator of collections at the Sam Houston Memorial Museum, says.

"Here you have a governor, Sam Houston, who continues to say the Union must be preserved, that Texas is better off in the Union," said T. Michael Parrish, a Baylor University history professor whose spe-

My wife and I attended "Evening on Broadway" on Thursday night a production of the PHS choir to raise money for their upcoming trip to New York during Spring Break.

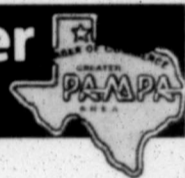

Today's Highlight in History:
On Jan. 30, 1948, Indian political and spiritual leader Mohandas K. Gandhi, 78, was shot and killed in New Delhi by Nathuram Godse (neh-too-RAHM' gahd-SAY'), a Hindu extremist. (Godse and a co-conspirator were later executed.)

On this date:
In 1649, England's King Charles I was beheaded.
In 1882, the 32nd president of the United States, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, was born in Hyde Park, N.Y.

In 1931, the Charles Chaplin feature "City Lights" had its world premiere in Los Angeles.

In 1933, Adolf Hitler became chancellor of Germany. The first episode of the "Lone Ranger" radio program was broadcast on station WXYZ in Detroit.

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy delivered his first State of the Union address before a joint session of Congress.

In 1964, the United States launched Ranger 6, an unmanned spacecraft carrying television cameras that crash-landed on the moon, but failed to send back images.

In 1968, the Tet Offensive began during the Vietnam War as Communist forces launched surprise attacks against South Vietnamese provincial capitals.

In 1972, 13 Roman Catholic civil rights marchers were shot to death by British soldiers in Northern Ireland on what became known as "Bloody Sunday."

In 1981, an estimated two million New Yorkers turned out for a ticker-tape parade honoring the freed American hostages from Iran.

Ten years ago: Republicans pushed John Ashcroft's attorney general nomination to the Senate floor by a

narrow 10-8 Judiciary Committee vote; all but one Democrat voted against him.

Five years ago: Coretta Scott King, widow of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., died in Rosarito Beach, Mexico, at age 78. Exxon Mobil posted then-record profits for any U.S. company at \$10.71 billion for the fourth quarter of 2005 and \$36.13 billion for the year. Video aired by Al-Jazeera showed American journalist Jill Carroll, kidnapped while in Iraq, wearing an Islamic veil and weeping (she was released on March 30, 2006).

One year ago: China suspended military exchange visits with the United States in protest over \$6.4 billion in planned U.S. arms sales to Taiwan. (Those exchanges were reinstated in Jan. 2011.) Thousands of demonstrators from across Japan marched in central Tokyo to protest a U.S. military base on the island of Okinawa.

Still some drought in Texas, but wetter spring predicted

COLLEGE STATION — Eastern Texas received rain in the last week, somewhat alleviating the drought conditions that have been the rule for the last several months, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service personnel.

According to the Palmer Drought Index, much of East Texas remains in a moderate drought situation. The Palmer Drought Index is based on precipitation, temperature and historic data, and is the main drought index used by the U.S. government.

Conditions varied county-to-county, according to AgriLife Extension county agent reports.

"We are getting some rain. Wood County got 1/2 to 3 inches this past week," said Clint Perkins, AgriLife Extension agent for the county, located north of Tyler. "It has helped. We are still short from last year's deficit, but on track for this year."

"Cold temperatures again," said Chad Galle, AgriLife Extension agent for Nacogdoches County, north of Lufkin. "Soil moisture has improved with the cold fronts bringing rain lately, but we are still not out of the drought. Winter storage is growing with the recent rains."

"Cattle are beginning to show the effects of hay shortages and colder temperatures," said Aaron Low, AgriLife Extension agent for Cherokee County, south of Tyler. "Recent rainfall has helped improve the drought conditions some."

"We've had some timely rains in north central Texas, but it's still falling well below what we should get this

time of this year," said Mark Fox, climatologist with the National Weather Service, Dallas Ft. Worth region.

But considering it's a La Niña year, precipitation has been "right on target" with what is expected, he said.

However, a La Niña year also usually means a warmer-than-normal winter, and that has not been the case this year, Fox said.

There is a lot of conjecture as to what's causing the colder than normal temperatures for a La Niña year, Fox said, but it's just that — conjecture.

But as far as the droughty winter, "we've seen this pattern many times before," he said.

"The temperatures start to cool down out in the Pacific Ocean, and this gives us a lot less precipitation across Texas. Pretty much right now, it's falling right in line with what we would see with a normal La Niña year."

Fox noted that precipitation patterns are already starting to return to normal.

"We're definitely going to be looking at a wetter pattern coming up March, April and May," he said.

AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summaries:

Panhandle: The region was dry and windy with isolated reports of snow. Soil moisture was mostly short. Producers were preparing for spring plantings. Wheat varied from very poor to good with most reporting fair to poor. Rangeland and pasture were

in very poor to good condition, with most counties reporting poor condition. Cattle were in fair to good condition. Temperature swings stressed livestock producers continued supplemental feeding. The danger of wildfire remained high.

Rolling Plains: The region remained extremely dry. Temperatures warmed up in the middle of the reporting period but cooled off at the end. The cotton harvest was completed with good yields and high prices reported. Many producers kept busy shredding stalks and plowing fields. Small-grain fields needed moisture. Despite the cold conditions, greenbug populations were building in some counties. Livestock

were in fair to good condition as ranchers were providing supplemental feed daily and weaning calves earlier than usual, hoping to take some stress off mother cows. Stock-tank levels continued to drop. Wildfire danger was very high. Feral hogs in Dickens County were targeted by plane and helicopter. Approximately 200 head were killed.

South Plains: Dry conditions continued across the region with brisk winds and low temperatures. The region has had no measurable precipitation since October. Soil moisture was very short to short. Because of low soil-moisture conditions, there has been limited field work done to prepare land for spring planting. Winter wheat was in poor to fair condition and continued to struggle due to lack of moisture. Pastures and rangeland were in poor to fair condition. Livestock were in mostly good condition and supplemental feeding continues.

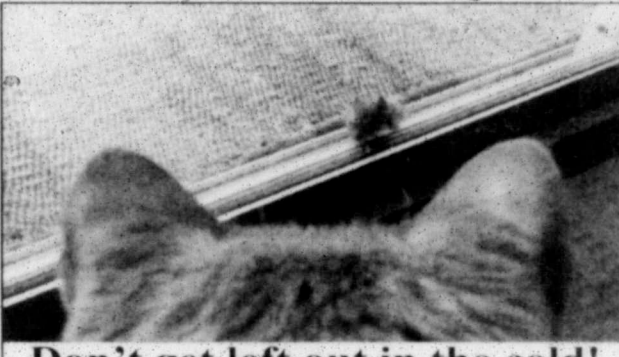

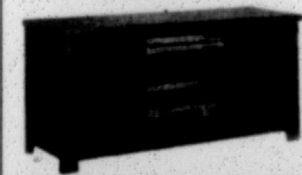

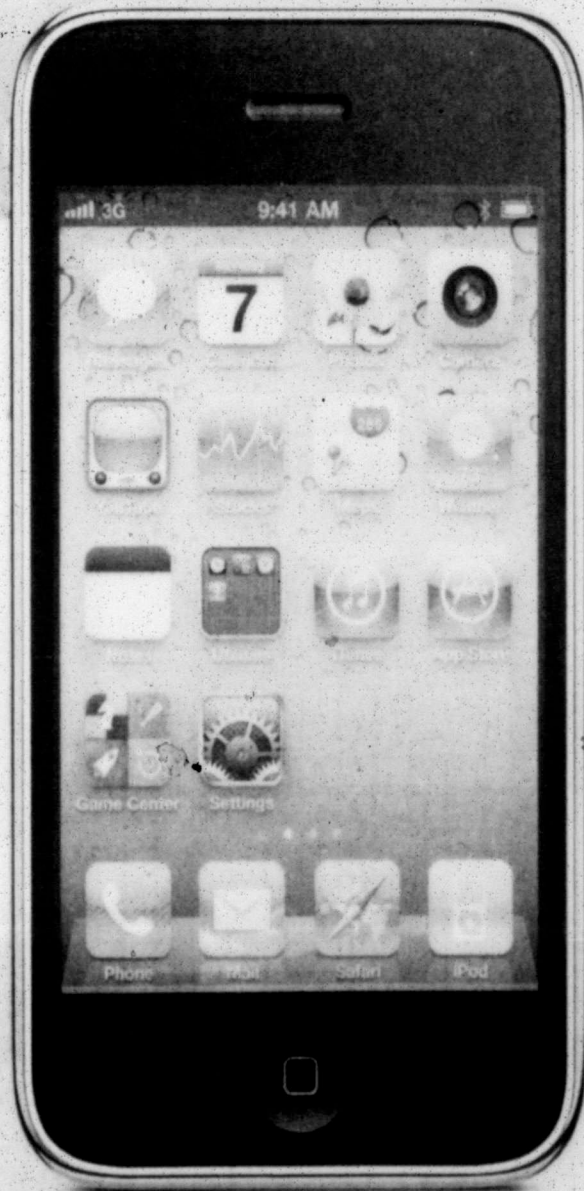

Harvesters' three-point shooting nails Golden Wolves

The Pampa Harvesters got good looks against the Dalhart Golden Wolves in the first half but couldn't hit. In the second half, though, the Harvesters outside shooting heated up and pulled away from the Golden Wolves in a 55-38 victory at McNeely Fieldhouse Friday.

The Harvesters made 10 of 25 three pointers including five for eight in the second half.

Head coach Dustin Miller said they got good looks early but hitting them late was key.

"We had so many good looks and uncontested shots that we normally hit," Miller said. "At halftime, we said our offense is fine, we are getting good shots. It's just we need to knock them down and separate this thing. We did that and it proved to be true."

Dalhart (14-7, 1-3) made shots early in the game and jumped out to a 7-3 lead. Noah Jesko scored the first points of the game with a three-pointer. Pampa took control the rest of the quarter. Senior forward Garrett Ericson hit two three pointers and scored 10 points in the first. Senior point guard Zach Murray hit two threes. The Harvesters led 16-11 after the first.

The Harvesters (13-10, 3-1) struggled with shooting in the second, as they were zero for seven from three-point territory. The Golden Wolves started the quarter strong, outscoring Pampa 9-4 to tie the game at 20. The Harvesters finished the quarter strong starting a 17-0 run that would end in the third quarter. Pampa led 26-21 at halftime.

Miller said they played well defensively the whole game.

"We really know how to pressure those guys a little bit to get some turnovers," Miller said. "Our defense is our offense. If we can get some turnovers

we can get out on a run."

Pampa opened things up in the third quarter, continuing their run from the second. Junior guard Latigo Collins, junior Cole Engle, junior post Reid Miller and Ericson all hit three-pointers. Dalhart didn't get on the board until 4:11 left in the third. Gabe McGaugh made a layup cutting Pampa's lead to 39-23. The Harvesters outscored the Golden Wolves 20-9 and expanded its lead to 46-30.

Ericson said penetration was key to their successful outside shooting.

"We set each other up with good looks," Ericson said. "When we attacked the rim, we got a good shot inside or we hit from outside."

In the fourth quarter, the Harvesters were more concerned with running out the clock then putting points on the scoreboard as they only scored nine. Though Pampa only allowed Dalhart eight points, the Golden Wolves didn't get closer than 15.

Harper Scofield led the Golden Wolves in scoring with eight. McGaugh and DaVonte Burks followed with six each. Ericson led the Harvesters in scoring with 22 points. Collins followed with 15, scoring 13 in the second half.

The junior varsity (6-11, 1-3) lost 51-31. Pampa trailed 32-18 at halftime. Coach Matt Embry said they didn't handle the press well.

"We had too many turnovers tonight," Embry said. "We will recover. This is a resilient group of kids."

The Harvesters visit Borger (11-9, 1-3). Pampa won the first meeting 64-35 January 21 in Pampa. Ericson said they have to be ready to take on the Bulldogs at their place.

"(Borger) won at Dalhart and lost to Perryton by two," Ericson said. "We had a big crowd here when we played them and they will probably have one there and gave us a taste of our own medicine."

In the first quarter, turning the ball over 12 times. The Lady Golden Wolves scored the first 32 points of the game. Brynn Dunham led Dalhart's offensive attack with 11 points. Pampa didn't get on the board till sophomore Taylor Morgan hit a jumper with 4:23 left in the quarter. The Lady Harvesters played even the rest of the quarter but faced a 23-8 deficit going into the second.

In the second quarter, Pampa settled down and only turned the ball over three times. Dalhart had eight turnovers in the quarter. The Lady Harvesters outscored the Lady Golden Wolves 15-10 in the second. Senior guard Cori Cook powered the Lady Harvesters offense with eight points. Cook consistently drove to the basket and was rewarded with trips to the free throw line, where she was five-for-eight.

Valentine said Cook stepped up big for her team.
