PISD absentee figures 'typical' of flu season

With several area children being sidelined with flu-like out any medication. symptoms across town, it's officially safe to say that there's something going around.

Still, the Pampa Independent School District nurse coordinator said that, despite increasing absentee numbers, this is typical of flu season in Pampa

Chris Kirkpatrick, who is also the nurse at Pampa Junior High School, said Friday afternoon that influenza symptoms are being reported for students in schools all across the state.

"It's widespread," she said. Kirkpatrick said schools were

asking parents to keep students who might be running a fever at home until they've been feverfree for 24 hours or more with-

She said student absenteeism at Pampa schools was running about 7.8 percent.

Parents with students that exhibit flu symptoms should contract their family doctor, Kirkpatrick said. They can also go to www.texasflu.org on the Internet to find out more.

Kirkpatrick said that the flu shot that were given last fall for the 2010-2011 flu season should help protect students from three typesof flu, including the HINL flu.

Travis Elementary sends waffles to troops in Iraq

Chad Sublett and his platoon in Iraq are about to get battered - in a good way:

The students of Travis Elementary recently raised \$425 to send waffle mix and beef jerky to Sublett, an Army sergeant stationed with First Brigade 101st Batallion A Company in Kirkuk, north of Baghdad.

Waffle batter and jerky may not sound like' much, but to Sublett and his men, any comfort of home is very welcome, given their surroundings.

"It's just something we did to help make them feel a little more at home," said Kay Pittman, music teacher at Travis Elementary, who spearheaded the project.

Sublett used to enjoy waffles regularly

as a breakfast tradition in his household. As a way to bring a small slice of home with him to Iraq, Sublett instituted "Waffle Saturdays," during which he and his unit would get together to enjoy waffles every weekend.

"His mom's a waffle freak," said Mike Sublett, Chad's father and the pas-

tor of Pampa's Hi-Land Christian Church. She would fix waffles all the time for the kids for breakfast, and they all got addicted to waffles... When we sent (some waffle mix) over, he decided to share with everybody, and they all decided to do it every week.

Originally, the soldiers concocted the "once

a week" plan to stretch the waffle mix supply for as long as possible. Now, thanks to the kids at Travis Elementary School, Chad will be able to keep his friends fed a little while

The last couple of weeks, I just asked the kids to make a donation if they wanted to. and they just ran with it," Pittman said. "We bought 18 cans of waffle mix and about 50 packages of beef jerky.

Jerky is Chad's favorite snack, Mike said. Hi-Land Christian is already collecting money for a "waffle fund" ("We send one every month or two," Sublett said), but Sublett said he was floored when he heard that the kids at Travis wanted to get involved.

"One of our ladies at church used to be a helper at Travis, and she was talking to WAFFLES cont, on page 3



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HOUSTON (AP) - Houston area authorities say a small plane has crashed in a backyard in the northwest corner of Harris County.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says some minor injuries have been reported. It did not have information on how many people were onboard the plane.

The sheriff's office told the Houston Chronicle the plane crashed after missing a runway at Weiser Airpark near Huffmeister and Telge and nearly went into a bayou. The aircraft caught on fire, but firefighters extinguished

The crashed happened about 8:30 a.m. Saturday.

Protesters voice Egypt concerns

HOUSTON (AP) — Dozens of people held a peaceful protest outside the Egyptian consulate in Houston Friday chanting, "Free, free Egypt now.

The demonstrators came as protesters in Egyptengulfed the country in chaos and President Hosni Mubarak fired his cabinet. Pouring onto the streets after Friday noon prayers, protesters ignored extreme government measures that included cutting off the Internet and mobile-phone services in Cairo and other areas, calling the army into the streets and imposing a nationwide nighttime curfew.

In Houston on Friday afternoon, on the sidewalk outside the consulate, many waved Egyptian flags or held up signs that read "No Justice No Peace. "Constitutional Reform" and "Democracy.

Giffords case moves to Tucson

PHOENIX (AP) Prosecutors and defense lawyers Tucson, at least for now,

The case against Jared Lee Loughner was moved to Phoenix after federal judges in Tucson recused themselves because a fellow judge died in the attack.

Loughner was arraigned Monday in Phoenix Prosecutors then requested the move so victims and witnesses would not have to drive there.

The deal doesn't prevent future requests for moves. Loughner pleaded not guilty to federal charges of try ing to assassinate Giffords and kill two of her aides. He also faces federal charges in the deaths of an aide and

He likely faces state charges in the Jan. 8 rampage at a Giffords event that wounded 15 and killed six others. including a 9-year-old girl.

His next court is set for March 9.

Committee leaders appointed

AUSTIN (AP) — There were no surprises Friday when Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst announced his picks to head Senate committees this legislative session, with the panels largely remaining in Republican hands.

Dewhurst named 12 Republicans six Democrats as committee chairs, and the composition of the 18 committees remained virtually unchanged from Dewhurst's summer 2010 appointments.

Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, was re-named chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, while Sen Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, was again tapped to lead the influential State Affairs Committee

Sen John Whitmire, a Houston Democrat and the longest-serving member of the Senate, was re-appointed

chairman of the Criminal Justice Committee. Dewhurst shuffled around a few members but otherwise made minimal changes.

Newly elected Sen. Jose Rodriguez. D-El Paso, was named vice-chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, replacing Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Houston.

Another newcomer, Sen. Brian Birdwell, R-Granbury. was appointed vice-chair of the Senate Higher Education Committee, where longtime Sen. Judith Zaffirini holds

the position of chairwoman. "Texas is fortunate to have 31 hardworking and talented state senators, and the makeup of our Senate committees reflects their considerable leadership skills and depth of experience," Dewhurst said. "From balancing the budget to redistricting, we have a lot to accomplish this session in a relatively short period of time, but I'm confident that our Senators and our Senate Committee Q

Man gets probation in oil scheme

HOUSTON (AP) - A former Texas oil company official was sentenced to probation Friday for his role in the sale of petroleum products stolen from Mexico.


Tim Brink, the former president of Continental Fuels end rejected the Texas in San Antonio, was the last of five executives and oil brokers at Texas-based companies to be sentenced in the case, which resulted from a binational probe into smuggled oil that was stolen from Mexico's state oil monopoly Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, transported across the border and sold to U.S. refineries.

Brink had previously pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to receive stolen goods which carried up to

five years in prison.

Instead, he received three years of probation, along with six months home confinement, said Angela Dodge, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in

U.S. District Judge Ewing Werlein also fined Brink \$10,000 and ordered him to perform 200 hours of community service.



On this date:

In 1845, Edgar Allan Poe's poem "The Raven" was first published in the New York Evening Mirror. In 1856, Britain's Queen Victoria introduced the Victoria Cross to reward military acts of valor during the Crimean War.

In 1919, the ratification of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution, which launched Prohibition, was certified by Acting Secretary of State Frank L. Polk. In 1929. The Seeing Eye, a New Jersey-based school which trains guide dogs to assist the blind, was incorporated by Dorothy Harrison Eustis and

Still some drought in Texas, but wetter spring predicted

COLLEGE STATION lexas received rain in the last week. omewhat alleviating the drought conhtions that have been the rule for the ast several months, according to Texas Agril ite Extension Service personnel:

According to the Palmer Drought index, much of East Texas remains in a moderate drought situation. The Palmer Drought Index is based on accepitation, temperature and historic data, and is the main drought index used by the U.Se government.

Conditions varied county-to-county, according to Agril ite Extension coun- O. There is a lot of conjecture as to is agent reports.

We are getting some rain. Wood aunity got 15 to 3 inches this past week." said Clint Perkins, AgriLife Extension agent for the county, located north of Tyler. "It has helped. We are still short from last year's deficit, but on track for this year.

"Cold temperatures again," said Chad Gulley, Agril ife Extension agent for Nacogdoches County, north of Lutkin. Soil moisture has improved with the cold fronts bringing rain lately, but we are still not out of the drought. Winter forage is growing with the

Cattle are beginning to show the effects of hay shortages and colder temeratures," said Aaron Low, AgriLife: Extension agent for Cherokee County. south of Tyler. "Recent rainfall has helped improve the drought conditions

We've had some timely rains in north central lexas, but it's still fallng well below what we should get this



time of this year," said Mark Fox, climatologist with the National Weather Service, Dallas Ft. Worth region.

But considering it's a La Niña year, precipitation has been "right on target" with what is expected, he said.

However, a La Niña year also usually means a warmer-than-normal winter, and that has not been the case this year, Fox said.

what's causing the colder than normal temperatures for a La Niña year, Fox said but it's just that - conjecture. But as far as the droughty winter,

we've seen this pattern many times before," he said.

The temperatures start to cool down out in the Pacific Ocean, and this gives us a lot less precipitation across Texas. Pretty much right now, it's falling right in line with what we would see with a normal La Niña year. Fox noted that precipitation patterns

are already starting to return to normal. We're definitely going to be looking a wetter pattern coming up March April and May," he said.

AgriLife Extension district reporters

compiled the following summaries: Panhandle: The region was dry and windy with isolated reports of snow. Soil moisture was mostly short. Producers were preparing for spring plantings. Wheat varied from very poor to good with most reporting fair to poor. Rangeland and pasture were

to good condition, with most counties reporting poor condition. Cattle were in fair to good condition: Temperature swings stressed

animals. Livestock producers continued supplemental feeding. The danger of wildfire remained high.

ton harvest was completed with good yields and high prices reported. Many producers kept busy shredding stalks and plowing fields. Small-grain fields needed moisture. Despite the cold conditions, greenbug populations were building in some counties. Livestock

Stock-tank levels continued to drop. Wildfire danger was very high Feral hogs in Dickens County were targeted by plane and helicopter. Approximately 200 head were killed.

Harvesters' three-point shooting nails Golden Wolves

The Pampa Harvesters got good looks against the Dalhart Golden Wolves in the first half but couldn't hit. In the second half, though, the Harvesters outside shooting heated up and pulled away from the Golden Wolves in a 55-38 victory at McNeely Fieldhouse Friday.

The Harvesters made 10 of 25 three pointers including five for eight in the second half.

Head coach Dustin Miller said they got good looks early but hitting them late was key

The Harvesters (13-10, 3-1) struggled with shooting in the second, as they were zero for seven from theepoint territory. The Golden Wolves started the quarter strong, outscoring Pampa 9-4 to tie the game at 20. The Harvesters finished the quarter strong starting a 17-0 run that would end in the third quarter.
