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

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Documentary crew looks into Skinner case

With the north wind spitting snow, a video documentary crew stood outside a frame house in Southeast Pampa, discussing camera angles this week.

The crew was in Pampa for filming a television program on Henry Watkins "Hank" Skinner, convicted in the bludgeoning death of Twila Busby and the stabbing deaths of her two mentally impaired sons, Elwin "Scooter" Caler, 22, and Randy Busby, 20, on New Year's Eve.

Skinner, 47, was convicted of

the murders by a Fort Worth jury in 1995. He is now on death row while the U.S. Supreme Court decides if Skinner can have access to DNA evidence from the crime scene.

"This is a program that's being done by the Investigation Discovery Channel, called HERZOG cont. on page 3

Z. Skinner trial jury deadlocked

Zachery Skinner was in Gray County jail today awaiting the next step in his legal odyssey after a Pampa jury deadlocked on his guilt or mnocence on an aggravated kidnapping charge.

Judge Steven Emmert Thursday afternoon thanked the jurors for their efforts, then dismissed them after they announced they had reached an impasse and could not agree on a

Jurors first notified the judge about 1 p.m. Thursday that they had split on

Emmert called them back into open court and urged them to continue their deliberations, but an hour later, the five-woman, seven-man jury told the judge they were deadlocked.

As the jurors and the judge left the courtroom, Skinner turned to his mother, Crystal Fuller, and hugged her.

Skinner stands accused of aggravated kidnapping, a charge that could send him to prison for life if con-

Under questioning by 'Assistant District Attorney Jeromie Oney Chantyl Martinez, 28, Skinner's girl friend testified that she called Skinner in the early morning hours of March 27, 2010, to ask for a ride home from a friend's house, telling him that she

She testified that Skinner was angry with her and slapped her before taking her to where he was staying and SKINNER cont. on page 5

Twenty-three indicted in Gray County District Court

A Gray County grand jury has indicted 23 people on 34 offenses, ranging from endangering a child to driving while intoxicated in 31st District Court.

Aaron Andrew Heiskell, 28, was indicted on five charges, three of endangering a child, one of burglary of a habitation with intent of committing another felony and one of possession and transportation of chemicals with the intent of manufacturing a controlled substance.

He is accused of having anhydrous ammo-

nia with the intent of making methamphet-

amine in June, 2009.

Shayla Lynn Smith, 24, was indicted on three counts of endangering a child, one count of burglary of a habitation and one count of possession of chemicals with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance.

She is accused of possessing anhydrous ammonia with the intent of manufacturing methamphetamine in June, 2009.

Richard Dale Stinnett, 53, was indicted on three charges, one count of possession and transportation of a chemical with the intent of manufacturing a controlled substance and

two counts of possession of a controlled substance.

He's accused of possessing anhydrous ammonia and manufacturing methamphetamine in April, 2009.

Stinnett was convicted of aggravated assault and aggravated robbery in March, 1978.

Mark Jeffries, 19, was indicted on two charges of burglary of a habitation.

He was charged with stealing a bed from Summer Morris in September, 2010 and stealing an X-box controller from Michael Maxwell in July, 2009.

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AUSTIN (AP) — Comptroller Susan Combs says sales tax revenue for last month jumped more than 10 percent compared to a year ago as the Texas economy improves. Combs on Wednesday reported the January sales tax figure was \$1.83 billion.

She says sales tax revenues have improved for the last ten months, reflecting increased activity in almost all major economic sectors.

Combs reports the strongest growth was from sectors fueled by business spending, such as oil and gas activity. She says tax collections from retail trade were also up last month.

Campaign targets gun sales

HOUSTON (AP) — A campaign to reduce the illegal sale of firearms that often end up in the hands of drug cartels in Mexico has returned to Houston.

Federal officials announced Wednesday that they've partnered with a trade association for the firearms industry to promote the "Don't Lie for the Other Guy"

The effort, which will feature billboards and public service announcements, is targeting "straw purchases," where individuals buy guns for others.

Officials say guns bought in this manner are often smuggled into Mexico for use by drug cartels

Officials with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, the U.S. Attorney's Office and the National Shooting Sports Foundation say the campaign will also distribute educational materials to Houston area gun retailers to help them spot straw

The federal lawsuit filed Tuesday in Dallas alleges breach of contract, fraud and deceptive sales prac-

It was filed two days after fans were prevented from having seats at Sunday's game between the Green Bay Packers and the Pittsburgh Steelers at Cowboys Stadium because of a problem with temporary seats.

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) — A former Indiana mayor who won four terms in the 1930s and 1950s is proving less popular with modern-day city leaders, who say they probably won't name a new government center for him because of the jokes his moniker could inspire.

Harry Baals is the runaway favorite in online voting to name the new building in Fort Wayne. But Deputy Mayor Beth Malloy said that probably won't be enough to put the name of the city's longest-tenured mayor on

Supporters said it's unfair that the former mayor can't be recognized simply because his name makes some people snicker. But opponents fear that naming the center after Baals would make Fort Wayne the target of latenight television jokes

the 'ID Channel' for Discovery," said producer Robert

The production, Erickson said, is based on German filmmaker Werner Herzog's idea of wanting to look at unlawfully carrying a weapon in place that sold alcoinmates on death row who know their execution dates.

Erickson said the crew had interviewed one inmate, Michael Perry, 28, eight days before he was executed.

The purpose of the show is to look at the humanity that you might find, even in the most despicable people,'

He said that they talked with Skinner about 10 minutes concerning his case when Herzog asked Skinner what he dreams about.

"The other question that was really interesting was that he said to Hank Skinner, 'You've been close to death row, how do you look at life now?" Erickson said.

Skinner was only minutes away from death last March when Justice Antonin Scalia of the U.S. Supreme Court stayed the execution until the high court could hear Skinner's request for testing of DNA evidence in the

"Our purpose is not to prove guilt or innocence," Erickson said of the film.

He said the purpose is to introduce the character of those accused of such crimes.

"I think the newspaper here is a competent source for the Hank Skinner case, which took place in Pampa," Herzog said.

He noted that as he spoke a jury was deliberating the fate of Hank Skinner's son, Zachery Wade Skinner, 25; in the Gray County Courthouse.

The younger Skinner has been charged with aggravated kidnapping. A Gray County jury split on his guilty or innocence Tuesday afternoon, and 31st Steven Emmert

ruled a mistrial "It's a weird feeling for me to know that Hank Skinner is on death row waiting for execution," Herzog said. "I think his appeals are pretty much exhausted, and now his

son is in very deep trouble. Herzog is a German filmmaker who started in the late 1960s

"He's made 50 features," Erickson said. "He really sprang onto the world scene with 'Aguirre: the Wrath of God.

Herzog also made the film 'Fitzcarraldo.'

"They're independent films," Erickson said. "They go to the film festivals.

Herzog is at the Telluride, Colo., Film Festival every

"This year, he premiered a film called 'The Cave of Forgotten Dreams," Erickson said. "It's currently playing in Germany at the Berlin Film Festival. It premiered last September in Toronto."

AFTERNOONRUSH Education can prevent dog bites

Three calls in three days, each the same: two parents, their offspring and one growling, biting dog. The difference is only in the

One family is dealing with a Rottweiler that growls when they pet him on the head. One is confronted with a Beagle that "goes for the kids' throat." And one is relatively content with the fact that their dog is "just a growler."

But "just a growler," left to his own devices, could easily become a biter. And the big problem here is that children are involved.

One of the things I do with my free time is go to schools and educate children on how to handle dogs. Kids are kids, and dogs are dogs, and neither is educated on the other unless someone knowledgeable steps in to bridge the gap. This is largely the job of the parents, but parents unfortunately don't always know what they're doing when they combine child and canine under one roof.

Children want to hug dogs, to wrap their pudgy arms around their furry necks and squeeze in a display of affection. They'll toddle



right on up to a dog and greet him head-on, literally

face to face. They yank on ears. tug on tails, hop on board for a 'pony" ride. They shriek and flail. their arms around a dog, even hit a dog, not knowing any better

→ Some parents, on the other hand. are under the misguided impression that dogs should be able to tolerate anything. And so they allow their children to engage in what is, by my lights, animal abuse.

I start my "class" by giving the kids a general introduction to the dog, the dog's anatomy and the unique features of this very special companion animal. I talk about the dog's phenomenal sense of scent. and how they use that first and foremost to learn about the world. I discuss the dog's sense of hearing, and how they hear five times to 10 times better than we do, making them especially sensitive to loud music and voices - including yelling the word "no."

Then I give them some general instruction in handling dogs, familiar and otherwise. I teach them how to approach strange dogs always getting permission from the owner to approach and keeping their face away from the dog's jaws. I show them how to use their hands when greeting a new dog - the old, "knuckle sandwich" technique. And I demonstrate how not to use their hands and feet hitting, pulling, punching, pinching, kicking, strangling, stepping on paws - explaining that those negative behaviors can hurt the dog and can lead to dog bites:

The real-time statistics are that kids under the age of 12 are bitten the most, and boys are bitten more often than girls. This makes sense. Boys are rougher, and children under 12 have little ability to understand the consequences of their actions.

'The key to dog bite prevention is education - of all dog owners, regardless of age.

Dog trainer Matthew "Uncle Matty" Margolis is co-author of 18 books about dogs, a behaviorist, a popular radio and television guest, and host of the PBS series "WOOF! It's a Dog's Life!"



PC military failed to detect Ft. Hood shooter

When he was in his residencv. studying psychiatry at Walter Reed Army Medical Center from 2003 to 2009, Nidal Hasan gave a lecture in which he defended Osama bin Laden, justified suicide bombers and suggested that Muslim Americans in the military -- like him -- could be prone to fratricidal attacks against fellow

He was "a chronic poor performer," wife often failed to show up for work and was often on probation: His program director considered him "very lazy" and "a religious fanatic.

His superiors described the first complete his residency as "not scientific," "not scholarly" -- but a rehash of Quranic verses with no mention of a single medical or psychiatric term. Another presentation -- in which he charged that U.S. operations abroad were part of a war against Islam -so angered his colleagues that an instructor stopped the speech. And vet the Army consistently gave Hasan positive evaluations and promoted him to major in 2009.

So says the Senate Homeland Security and Government Oversight Committee in a report released last week by Chairman Joe Lieberman and ranking Republican Sen. Susan Collins of

report also slams the FBI for failing to interview military superiors and colleagues when intelligence revealed that Hasan had been in draft of a presentation needed to stouch with Yemeni cleric Anwar al-Awlaki, Sadly, the committee found, the Defense Department and the FBI "collectively had sufficient information to have detected Hasan's radicalization to violent Islamist extremism but failed to understand and act on it.

By the way, the emphasis of the report is not to marginalize Muslims, but to alert the military to the signs that an officer was radicalizing. The right policies, the report notes, will protect "the thousands of Muslim Americans who serve honorably in the military from unwarranted suspicion arising from their religious prac-

Unfortunately, the report found

that military culture was -- and I would add, is -- unprepared to take on the challenge. The fear of being accused of anti-Muslim discrimination, bureaucratic lethargy and even the Army's insistence on keeping a poor candidate in a fellowship program rather than lose the slot, all worked to shield an officer whom an instructor and colleague branded a "ticking time bomb.

Political correctness clearly reigns in the military after this bloody lesson. Last year, the Pentagon released a report, "Protecting the Force: Lessons from Fort Hood," which never once referred to Islamist extremism. The report instead concentrated on workplace violence, even touting the U.S. Postal Service's program to end workplace violence as the sort of program that could prevent another attack.

Army Secretary Togo West explained, "Our concern is with actions and effects, not necessarily with motivations.

In short, the Pentagon's reaction was to hail the opposite of intel-
