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



2011 a disastrous year for Texas wheat

COLLEGE STATION --- Wildfires continued to breakout in many areas, but even without fires wheat farmers were feeling burned, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service personnel.

With dry conditions, heat and wind, the crop continues to deteriorate, according to Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension economist specializing in grain marketing and policy.

"It's bad and getting worse," Welch said. "It looks like the 2011 crop, in terms of production and yields, is going to look like the 2009 crop perhaps even as bad as the 2006 crop; just disastrous wheat years in Texas."

This year's poor crop comes on the heels of a bumper crop in 2011. Also, wheat prices are at record highs, he noted.

"This year's crop condition ratings show about 40 percent of the Texas crop in very poor condition, which compares with 65 percent very poor in March of 2006 and 53 percent very poor in May of 2009," Welch said.

On an average year, Texas farmers will produce 100 million bushels of wheat, but this year it looks like it's going to be a third of that, he said.

Much but not all dryland wheat is at risk, though there are areas, such as the Winters area between San Angelo and Abilene, along U.S. Interstate 35 in Blacklands, that "look pretty good," Welch said.

Irrigated wheat is a different story, Welch said. In an average year, about 20 percent of Texas wheat crop is irrigated. The higher wheat prices should compensate the higher pumping costs irrigators are facing due to the drought.



But in many areas, farmers have given up on dryland wheat. Many have already accepted crop-insurance adjustments, according to reports from AgriLife Extension county agents. Where possible, farmers were putting cattle out on wheat, hoping to offset pasture and rangeland grazing lost to the drought or wildfires.

As of the morning of April 19, the Texas Forest Service reported there were 20 uncontained fires from previous days. The largest uncontained fire was in Stephens and Palo Pinto counties, estimated to have burned 147,000 acres to date. Other fires near Possum Kindom Lake, Caddo and Strawn are smaller in acreage, but have burned 31 homes. Another 600 homes were at risk.

Of the state's 254 counties, 198 were under burn bans as of April 18, according to the Forest Service.

AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summary:

PANHANDLE: Dry and windy conditions continued, and soilmoisture levels were very short to short, with most counties reporting very short. Wheat was in very poor to fair condition, with most counties reporting poor. Rangeland was in very poor to good condition, with most reporting poor. Farmers continued preparing land for spring plantings. Cattle were in good condition. Mite, Russian aphid and green bug numbers were increasing in wheat in some areas. Wildfire danger remained high.

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ROLLING PLAINS: Conditions remained horrific, with high winds, fires and no rain. Parker County received 0.5 inch to 2 inches of rain a week ago. However, high winds quickly dried out a lot of the moisture. Fires were raging in several counties. Dickens County producers shipped hay to those ranchers and producers affected by the fires in other counties. Ranchers were providing supplemental feed on a daily basis to try to keep cattle in decent condition until rain comes. With excellent cattle prices and a shortage of grass, some producers were culling herds. Producers who have given up on winter wheat producing grain were allowing cattle to graze the crop. Several producers cut wheat for hay that they normally would have harvested as grain. Stock tanks reached critically low levels.

SOUTH PLAINS: Extremely dry conditions persisted throughout the district, along with warm temperatures and high winds. Most counties were still under burn bans, and some counties were reporting wildfires. In Garza and Crosby counties, wildfires burned more than 55,000 acres. Although some houses were threatened by fire, so far losses were limited to livestock, fencing and outbuildings. Producers were pre-watering fields in hope of being able to plant, on schedule. Dryland fields were, left unplanted, and producers hoped for at least enough rain to minimize wind erosion. Winter wheat was heading. Much wheat, however, has been insurance-adjusted and released for whatever salvage grazing can be had. Pastures and rangeland were in dire straits.

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

Minorities gain in suburban TX

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AUSTIN (AP) - Suburban counties in Texas are becoming more racially diverse, fueling a changing political and ethnic landscape.

Fort Bend County, one of the state's wealthiest, has seen a huge shift in demographics through the years. In this suburban Houston area, minorities now account for almost two-thirds of its population. In 1950, about three-fourths were white.

Fort Bend is a convenient microcosm for what's happening across America, where 85 percent of the growth comes from minorities over the last decade.

Rather than take over neighborhoods abandoned by whites, minorities are increasingly the first-time home buyers in neighborhoods drawing multiple ethnicities.

In Texas, the booming minority population is bringing the state more representation in Congress. Much of that growth is centered in places like Fort Bend and other counties surrounding large metropolitan areas.

Suspect in slaying arrested

PLANO (AP) - A man accused in the death of his ex-girlfriend, a North Texas fitness instructor whose body was found a day after she went missing, was arrested Friday in Arizona after authorities say he jumped over an edge at Grand Canyon National Park and had to be rescued.

Terrance Deering Black, 48, of the Dallas suburb of Frisco, fell about 25 feet, authorities said. He was taken into custody and transported by helicopter to Flagstaff Medical Center.

Park officials say once he's released from the hospital, he will be taken to Coconino County Detention Center and remain there until Texas Rangers arrive in-Arizona.

Earlier in the day Friday, police in Frisco issued a capital murder arrest warrant for Black in the death of 40-year-old Susan Loper, also of Frisco.

Loper, the mother of an 8-year-old son, was reported missing Tuesday from a country club in Plano where she worked. Her body was found Wednesday in a wooded area near Dallas North Tollway in Frisco.

Two shot outside day care

ARLINGTON (AP) - Arlington police are investigating after they say a man picking up his 3-year-old from day care was shot to death by a man who then killed himself.

Arlington police say the two men were found shot outside the day care Friday at about 5:45 p.m. Police found a man in 20s dead. A man believed to be in his 40s was taken to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead. Police believe the man in his 20s was the shooter and the man in his 40s was picking up his daughter.

Neither man has been identified.

Employees told officers that they heard the gunshots just after the man and his daughter walked outside.

Police say the girl was not injured. No other children were there at the time.

Texas to receive education funds

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas will receive \$830 million in public education funds that had been stalled political wrangling, the U.S. Department of Education announced Friday

HONOLULU (AP) - Lost in the renewed scrutiny into President Barack Obama's birth records is the fact that anyone can walk into a Hawaii vital records office, wait in line behind couples getting marriage licenses and open a baby-blue government binder containing basic information about his birth.

Highlighted in yellow on page 1,218 of the thick binder is the computer-generated listing for a boy named Barack Hussein Obama II born in Hawaii, surrounded by the alphabetized last names of all other children born in-state between 1960 and 1964. This is the only government birth information, called "index data," available to the public.

So far this month, only The Associated Press and one other person had looked at the binder, according to a sign-in sheet viewed Wednesday in the state Department of Health building. The sheet showed about 25 names of people who have seen the document since March 2010, when the sign-in sheet begins.

Those documents complement newspaper birth announcements published soon after Obama's Aug. 4, 1961 birth and a "certification of live birth" released by the Obama campaign three years ago, the only type of birth certificate the state issues.

So-called "birthers" claim there's no proof Obama was born in the United States, and he is therefore ineligible to be president. Many of the skeptics suggest he was actually born in Kenya, his father's home country, or Indonesia where he spent a few years of his childhood.

Possible Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump has repeatedly stoked the birther fires recently, and last month called on Obama to "show his birth certificate." Trump said he has investigators in Hawaii searching for more information.

"Nobody has come in and said they're investigating for Donald Trump," said Department of Health spokeswoman Janice Okubo, who acknowledged they could've come in without identifying themselves as representing Trump.

What the would-be sleuths won't find is Obama's "long-form birth certificate," a confidential one-page document containing his original birth records kept

Those original birth records typically include additional birth details, such as the hospital and delivering doctor, said Dr. Chiyome Fukino, the state's former health director who twice looked at and publicly confirmed Obama's original long-form birth records.

But those documents are state government property that can't be released to anyone, even the president himself, said Joshua Wisch, special assistant to the state attorney general. Obama would be able to inspect his birth records if he visited the Health Department in person, but original records of live birth are never released, he said.

Fukino, who served as the state's health director until late last year under former Republican Gov. Linda Lingle, said in an interview with The Associated Press she's convinced the long-form document is authentic. She issued public statements in 2008 and 2009 saying she had seen the original records.

"It is absolutely clear to me that he was born here in Hawaii," Fukino told the AP. "It should not be an issue, and I think people need to focus on the other bad things going on in our country and in our state and figure out what we're going to do about those things.

Crews battle canyon blaze

FORT DAVIS (AP) - West Texas firefighters are trying new tactics to stop a 202,000-acre wildfire since it raced out of a canyon.

Fire crews in Jeff Davis County will start a controlled burn near some roads to destroy parched grass and shrubs in a 70,000-acre area.

Then there won't be anything left to burn - and the wildfire should be under control when it reaches the roads in a few days.

C.J. Norvell, a spokeswoman for a team of federal firefighters and officials helping in West Texas, says the fire is not headed toward any towns.

The blaze started nearly two weeks ago and destroyed about 40 homes in the Fort Davis area before moving north.

Wildfires have scorched more than 1 million acres in Texas the past two weeks.

Corruption defendants sentenced

DALLAS (AP) - The last two defendants convicted in the Dallas City Hall corruption case have been sentenced.

A U.S. district judge Friday sentenced Denton developer Ronald Slovacek to seven years in prison. Andrea Spencer, who owned a contracting firm, was sentenced to two years probation.

Slovacek was convicted last year of conspiracy to commit bribery, bribery and conspiracy to commit money laundering.

Spencer pleaded guilty in 2008 to conspiracy to commit bribery.

The U.S. attorney's office says Slovacek conspired with former Dallas Mayor Pro Tem Don Hill and others including Spencer to use Spencer's minority business certificate to solicit overpriced construction contracts.

The Dallas Morning News reports that in all, 14 defendants were convicted. Seven pleaded guilty, seven were budget from the state first,' convicted by juries. Hill is serving 18 years in prison.



As a practicing — and an obviously very imperfect — Catholic, I have had more than a few disagreements with the leadership of my church. For example, I still find it both irrational and indefensible that talented, magnanimous and charismatic women are denied the opportunity to serve as priests. (It is not as though there is an overflow supply of male candidates with similar qualities.)

The church hierarchy's widespread failure to stop criminal sexual acts by priests against defenseless children and then, when made aware of those crimes, to give priority and resources not to comforting and making whole the victims, but instead to damage control of the institutional church and to covering up for the clerical abusers is unforgivable. The toll: thousands of lives tortured and broken, surrendering of much of the church's moral authority, and a price tag in settlement of abuse claims and legal fees of nearly \$2.7 billion. But I cherish and admire much about the church. The late Cardinal James Hickey was archbishop of Washington, where he increased tenfold the number of people being fed, clothed, sheltered and counseled by the archdiocese. When there was grumbling from some of the more affluent in the pews that too much of the church's limited revenues was going to people and neighborhoods who were not even Catholic, Hickey offered this by way of rebuttal: "We serve the homeless not because they

Catholic. If we don't care for the sick, educate the young, care for the homeless, then we cannot call ourselves the church of Jesus Christ.'


recent letter from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to every U.S. House member on the human dimensions of the federal budget debate that has preoccupied Washington. Signed by Bishops Henry Hubbard of Albany, N.Y., the chair of the Bishops Committee on International Justice and Peace, and Stephen Blare, chair of the Committee on Domestic Peace and Human Development, the letter was clear and unambiguous that "a central moral measure of any budget proposal is how it affects 'the least of these' (Matthew 25). The needs of those who are hungry and homeless, without work or in poverty should come first.

Tomorrow is Easter Sunday, April 24, the 114th day of 2011. There are 251 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 24, 1961, in the wake of the failed Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba, the White House issued a statement saying that President John F. Kennedy "bears sole responsibility for the events of the past few days."

On this date:

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In 1792, the national anthem of France, "La Marseillaise," was composed by Captain Claude Joseph Rouget de Lisle.

In 1800, Congress approved a bill establishing the Library of Congress.

In 1898, Spain declared war on the United States. (The United States responded in kind the next day.)

In 1915, what's widely regarded as the start of the Armenian genocide began as the Ottoman Empire rounded up Armenian political and cultural leaders in Constantinople.

In 1916, some 1,600 Irish nationalists launched the Easter Rising by seizing several key sites in Dublin. (The rising was put down by British forces almost a week later.)

In 1953, British statesman Winston Churchill was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II.

In 1960, rioting erupted in Biloxi, Miss., after black protesters staging a "wade-in" at a whites-only beach were attacked by a crowd of hostile whites.

In 1970, the People's Republic of China launched its first satellite, which kept transmitting a song, "The East is Red.'

In 1980, the United States launched an unsuccessful attempt to free the American hostages in Iran, a mission that resulted in the deaths of eight U.S. servicemen.

In 1986, Wallis, Duchess of Windsor, for whom King Edward VIII had given up the British throne, died in Paris at age 89.

Ten years ago: A New Zealand air force plane rescued four ailing Americans at an Antarctic research station. Reformer Junichiro Koizumi was chosen president of Japan's ruling party, guaranteeing his election as the country's next prime minister. The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that police can arrest and handcuff people for minor traffic offenses.

Five years ago: Terrorist bombings killed at least 23 people at a beach resort on Egypt's Sinai Peninsula. Speaking in Irvine, Calif., President George W. Bush said those calling for deporting all of the nation's estimated 11 million illegal immigrants back to their home countries were being "unrealistic."

One year ago: The policy-setting panel of the International Monetary Fund, with a nervous eye on Greece, pledged during a meeting in Washington to address the risks posed to the global recovery from high government debt. A dozen people were killed by a tornado system that bumped down in Louisiana before plowing into Mississippi and then Alabama.



Fifth inning propels PHS softball to district perfection

The Pampa Lady Harvesters entered the 2011 season with three goals: win district, win district undefeated; and make the state tournament. On Friday, they made a statement and accomplished their second goal in an 11-1 run-rule victory over the Dalhart Lady Wolves in Dalhart. Head coach Bobbi Gill said they were

dedicated to accomplishing their goal. "I think they knew what they wanted,"

Gill said. "They went out and got it."

The Lady Harvesters (25-7, 9-0) broke the scoreless tie in the second inning. Juniors Alanna Stephens and McKinlee Stokes singled and sophomore Martecia Alexander walked to load the bases. Senior Madi Shults cleared the bases with a double to the left field wall. Shults stayed at second as junior Heather Coffee and sophomore Claire Hopkins popped out.

The Lady Wolves used a different starting pitcher with senior Sarah Hammett. Courtney Dovel who pitched the first two games, started at second Friday. Hammett kept Pampa off balance in the first four innings with three scoreless and only gave up five hits with three coming in the second.

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Coffee was pitching well also in the first four innings only allowing four hits and all of them singles. The junior retired the first five batters she faced. Gill said it was another good game for her.

"She threw well," Gill said.

In the fifth inning the Lady Harvesters solved Hammett. Hopkins led off with an infield single and stole second. Sophomore Bailey Beck followed with an infield single and scored Hopkins, who advanced on the throw to first. Beck advanced to second on the throw home. Senior Jordan Mayhew hit a RBI ground ball single into left field. Stokes drove her in with a single to center and ended Hammett's outing.

Dovel finished the inning on the mound. Hopkins capped the inning with a two-RBI triple down the right field line: Pampa scored eight runs on six hits and sent 12 batters to the plate.

The Lady Wolves scored their only run of the game on an error by Beck but weren't able to extend the game as Dovel grounded out to Stokes to end the game.

The Lady Wolves (23-11, 3-6) concluded their regular season but advance to the playoffs as the third seed with Borger (19-17, 5-4) beating Perryton (15-15, 2-7) 9-8. Borger earned the second seed and along with Dalhart will play in the bidistrict round April 29 and 30.

The Lady Harvesters concluded their regular season 1 p.m. Saturday against former district foe Canyon. The two teams were supposed to play March 1 in Pampa but the game was snowed out. Pampa has a bye and will face either Midland Greenwood, El Paso Presido or El Paso Mountain View in the area round May 6 and 7.



Dodgers GM talked with MLB

CHICAGO (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers general manager Ned Colletti is operating under the same budgetary guidelines he had before Major League Baseball seized control of the team and said Friday he reports to owner Frank McCourt until an administrator is appointed by Commissioner Bud Selig.

Colletti talked with a league official Thursday but declined to identify the person. MLB spokesman Pat Courtney told The Associated Press that Colletti has been in contact with multiple people with the commissioner's office during the past couple days, including Rob Manfred, baseball's executive vice president of labor relations.

"All I know is from the baseball perspective, that we're operating under the same guidelines we were before," Colletti said before the Dodgers' 12-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs. Asked about the previous instructions, Colletti responded: "Just budgetary guidelines."

Selig told Dodgers owner Frank McCourt on Wednesday he will appoint a representative to oversee all aspects of the business and the day-to-day operations of the club.

Mets' Pagan out with oblique

NEW YORK (AP) — Mets centerfielder Angel Pagan was placed on the 15-day disabled list Friday because of a strained left oblique, and the team was not certain when he would return.

The Mets made the move a day after left fielder Jason Bay returned to the lineup. Bay missed the first 18 games with a strained ribcage.

"After they put the ice pack on your rib and after you wake up, I felt a little more sore than last night," Pagan said. "That's not a good sign so they decided to put me on the DL."

Jason Pridie was recalled from Triple-A Buffalo and was in the starting lineup Friday night against Arizona. Manager Terry Collins said Pridie was brought up because of his defense and was starting over Willie Harris with flyball pitcher Mike Pelfrey on the mound for New York.

Wade guts out injuries

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Dwyane Wade slammed to the floor and the Heat were on edge.

Wade, Miami's co-captain, slowly stood up, held his left shoulder and momentarily wondered if the pounding was enough to knock him out of Game 3.

"I felt it immediately," Wade said Friday. "Any time something happens to my shoulder, obviously I get nervous because of the grueling surgery I went through and the six-month rehab."


Pampa is very capable of acheiving that as they have good hitters, pitching and fielding.

Everyone one through nine can hit the ball, as three batters are hitting over .500 for the season and five hitting above .400. The Lady Harvesters have three batters — junior McKinlee Stokes and sophomores Claire Hopkins and Martecia Alexander — that can slap the ball and run fast on the base paths. If they are able to get on base and get power hitters Jordan Mayhew, Alanna Stephens and Madi Shults to the plate, watch out: A big inning awaits. In district, Pampa has had at least one inning where they have scored at least four runs. If the offense is hitting, the Lady Harvesters are almost impossible to beat. If this team wants to advance it will be key. Opponents may put several runs on the board and the offense will have to be strong.

A good offense is great, but if you aren't keeping the opponent off the scoreboard it makes winning difficult. The Lady Harvesters have four pitchers who are more than capable of doing that. Junior Heather Coffee developed into a solid pitcher by the end of district, being the winning pitcher in seven of eight of the Lady Harvesters last victories. Sophomore Tiffany Britton is also strong as she posted a 2-0 district record and is 8-2 on the season. Senior Jordan Mayhew has put in several solid outings and won the season opener. Freshman Alexa O'Brien has posted a 2-1 record and pitched three strong



The Lady Harvesters have been good at fielding. With the exception of the last two games against Perryton and April 16 at Borger, Pampa has done a good job of this. Hopkins, Alexander and senior Shanna Keown can run down any ball in the outfield. Opponents should think twice about going for an extra base or tagging up because all three have solid arms. Stokes has been intelligent at second and covering first when she needs to. Shults has caught a number of line drives and have turned them into double plays. Anyone of Pampa's pitchers are capable of fielding a ball and throwing to first.

There are couple of things that Pampa needs to avoid to advance. One, they cannot allow the opponent to have a big inning because it will put the Lady Harvesters in a hole or erase a good start. The last two times against Perryton and the last time against Borger, Pampa allowed a lead to slip. In the playoffs they will face much better teams than its district opponents and may not get back in a game as easily. The Lady Harvesters have to be smart on the field and not shoot themselves in the foot. It's rough to lose game when the other team outplays you, it's even harder when your mistakes cost you the game. Pampa just needs to make the play that's there. The bats must stay hot, if they struggle it's going to put more pressure on the defense and raise their loyal fans' blood pressure. That's a dangerous combination.

The Lady Harvesters have all the elements to be a team to advance far in the playoffs. It just all has to stay together. Plus, Austin is due for a green-and-gold invasion, because it's been far too long.

Grizzlies chomping at bit to get at Spurs

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Grizzlies guard Tony Allen says the sellout crowd Saturday night can expect Memphis' FedExForum to be turned into the Grindhouse.

The series is tied with top-seeded San Antonio, and Allen says the plan is to make the Spurs work for everything they get in Game 3.

"I like how the referees have been calling the games the last two games," Allen said after practice Friday. "They've been letting us actually go out and you know play backyard basketball. Surprised me, but I love it, so it could be a physical game again. I'm looking forward to joining in."

Allen defines backyard basketball as pulling, grabbing and scratching. He can point to his left forearm where someone's nail dug into his flesh. Fans are hoping to see the Grizzlies add to their first postseason win with their first playoff victory at home. Allen said the Grizzlies must focus on correcting their mistakes and getting the loose balls they missed in Wednesday night's loss 93-87 in San Antonio. That includes doing a better job keeping Spurs guard Manu Ginobili off the free throw line. Ginobili scored 17 points Wednesday night in his first game back with a sprained right elbow, and he was 7 of 13 at the line.

"We've just got to be more disciplined down the stretch and take care of the ball," Allen said.

If this already physical series ramps up even more, guard Tony Parker insists the Spurs are ready for what should be a lot of fun.

"It's going to be a great game with a lot of intensity," Parker said. "It's going to be very physical, and they play very well at home. It's going to be a great challenge for us."

Kings' move still up in the air

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Sacramento Kings co-owner Joe Maloof said Friday that his family is still deciding whether to move the franchise to Anaheim or stay in California's capital city.

Maloof told The Associated Press that no decision has been made and he's "as anxious as anybody" to find out if Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson can deliver on his promises for more sponsorship support and finally finance a plan for a new arena.

"There's been no decision made," Maloof said. "As far as we're concerned, we're still looking at our options."

The Kings have until May 2 to request permission to relocate, and a majority vote by owners are needed to approve the move. While Johnson has become increasingly optimistic that the team will remain in Sacramento next season, the Maloofs still want to know more information about the region's proposals.

Lobos hire women's coach

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The University of New Mexico didn't have to look far to find the next head coach of the women's basketball program.

After three weeks of searching the nation, the university hired associated head coach Yvonne Sanchez on Friday. She replaces her mentor, Don Flanagan, who announced his retirement earlier this month after 16 seasons.

Sanchez has big shoes to fill. Flanagan was the most successful coach in the program's history having finished with a 340-168 record. He also led the Lobos to the NCAA tournament eight times and his teams earned six conference tournament titles.

Sanchez said in a statement issued by the university that she's thrilled to be the next head coach.

"Coach Flanagan has been such a mentor and positive influence in my life and has prepared me for this opportunity," she said. "Being a native New Mexican, the passion and pride I have for this university and athletic department is tremendous."

Larranga takes Miami job

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Jim Larranaga has taken the Miami Hurricanes' basketball job after 14 years at George Mason, including an improbable run to the Final Four in 2006.

Larranaga called George Mason athletic director Tom O'Connor on Friday morning to say he accepted Miami's offer. Larranaga met with his George Mason players, then flew to Miami for a news conference.

The 61-year-old coach said he took the Miami jou because of the chance to coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference, which he considers the best basketball league in the country.

'Insidious' a glimmer of eerie SPLIT-SCREEN light in long-suffering genre

The horror movie genre has kind of lost its way lately, with most recent scary cinema fare falling somewhere between low production value slasher rubbish to outright torture porn.

Enter "Insidious," which shines to us like a (haunted) beacon of light among the murk.

"Insidious," from the makers of "Saw" and "Paranormal Activity," gives us a glimpse into the lives of a husband and wife (Patrick Wilson of "Watchmen" and Rose Byrne of the upcoming "X-Men: The Last Stand") whose boy has fallen off of a ladder and lapsed into a coma. With the boy unconscious, days turn into months, and freaky events start to happen inside the house: doors opening and closing, scary voices coming from baby monitors, the boy's brother claiming he gets up and walks around at night, so on and so forth.

I won't spoil the spooky details for you, but suffice to say, they're quite satisfyingly cerie (and coming from somebody who rarely gets chills from a horror movie, that's saying a lot).


With creep factor escalating around the house, the couple decides to move, only to find out that the freak occurrences have seemingly followed them to another house. They consult a paranormal expert, and with that comes the chilling tagline that we saw in the movie trailer: "It's not your house that's haunted. It's your son." Director James Wan and writer Leigh Whannell (who moonlights in the film as half of a perfectly quirky ghost hunting duo) clearly have the chops to steer a horror film. The success of "Saw" showed that the duo understands the psychological aspect of horror, and in that respect, "Insidious" is Exhibit 1A; instead of repeatedly going for cheap, what's around the corner" scares, "Insidious" works around escalating tension to a terrifying crescendo. Sinister music, weird camera angles and washedout color work together to create a great.

scary atmosphere. Sure, there's the requisite shock moment here and there, but it fits well within the framework of the film.

If there's anything to nitpick about, it's that the movie's

a little derivative. There are definite shades of "Saw" and "Paranormal Activity" within the script, but not enough to be downright imitative. If you're looking for something to chill you to your bones for an evening - or if you're a jaded fan of the genre looking for a little hope -- "Insidious" is definitely worth giving a go.



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

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
