motivated to lash out. In their wounded rage, al-Qaida ideologues fed that concem. "By God, we will avenge the killing of the Sheik of Islam," one prominent al-Qaida commentator vowed. or weakened, I tell them: Let us wait a little bit."
In that vein, U.S. officials warned that bin Laden's death was likely to encourage attacks from "homegrown
violent extremists" even if al-Qaida is not prepared to respond in a coordinated fashion now.
