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# Hall: Time of the essence in hospital buy

Dr. Jim Hall needs \$7 million to buy a hospital, but the money isn't his biggest problem.

Hall, president of Emergency Services Foundation of Texas, a non-profit organization that established the Pampa EMS ambulance service and Genesis Clinic next to Pampa Regional Medical Center, is asking the community to support making' Pampa's hospital a home-owned and home-operated medical facil-

Signature Hospital which owns Pampa Regional Medical Center has announced plans to sell the hospital by the end of this sum-

The time factor may be a bigger problem than coming up with the money, Hall said during a pub-

lic meeting Thursday evening at Pampa Junior High School.

PRMC has been through four for-profit owners. Hall wants to preserve the hospital as a nonprofit community hospital for the

Dave Clark, a consultant hired to review the possibilities for PRMC, told about three dozen people gathered at the new junior high Thursday that once a community hospital closes, it's rare that it will reopen.

"If the hospital closes here," Clark said, "it won't come back."

There is concern that PRMC will be bought by one of the Amarillo hospitals and reduced to an emergency room. Other hospital services would be moved to Amarillo.


Clark said that both hospitals in Amarillo are reducing staff. HOSPITAL cont. on page 2

In a few years, local high school athletes will have a new option to continue their athletic careers, as Clarendon College Pampa Center is planning to add athletics on their campus.

Clarendon College athletic director John Green said the school is looking to add men's and women's wrestling and men's and women's soc-

cer, though plans for both are still in a formative phase. The main priority for Pampa Center, according to the university, is the addition of dormitory facilities for students.

"We are in the very early stages of researching it," Green said. "We are going to have several meetings to determine where housing is going to be built."

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

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# Plains aquifer's level fell less in 2010

LUBBOCK (AP) — The water levels in a large Texas chunk of the High Plains' biggest aquifer saw its smallest drop in 2010 than in any year in six years, according to the region's water managers.

The Ogallala Aquifer water level fell by an average of 0.05 foot in 2010, according to the Lubbock-based, 16-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. The average drop in 2009 was 1.50 feet, and the average annual drop in the district's service area has been 0.77 foot since 2006, according to a district

Measurements during the winter saw increases in the aquifer water level in five of the district's 16 counties.

District General Manager Jim Conkwright credits "timely rainfall" in 2010 for the relatively stable water level. Amarillo recorded 26.54 inches of rain in 2010, compared with 21.13 inches in 2009; while Lubbock saw 26.46 inches of rain in 2010, compared with 12.87

Indeed, above-average rainfall from winter through summer of 2010 sharply curtailed the use of water from the aquifer by the farmers and ranchers of the Texas Panhandle and South Plains, said Steve Verett, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers. It also increased the

recharging of the aquifer's water supply, he said.

"You have to say it comes from somewhere," he told the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. "It takes some pretty extensive rainfall to help with recharging, and we saw a lot of rain with last year's July 4 flooding."

A Lubbock County report to the state said that 5 to 10 inches of rain fell over the area in three days during the Fourth of July holiday, causing at least \$8,624,033 in emergency response costs and damage to area roads, infrastructure, agriculture and governmental or nonprofit agency buildings.

The Ogallala Aquifer is one of the biggest underground water reservoirs in the world, spreading about 174,000 square miles across all or part of eight states from South Dakota to the Texas Panhandle and High Plains.

About 95 percent of the water pumped from the Ogallala is for irrigation, with the High Plains area accounting for 65 percent of the total irrigated acreage in the United States.

The measurements taken by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 included the portion of the aquifer generally covering 16 counties between Lubbock and Amarillo.

# Ariz. shooter kills five, then takes own life

YUMA, Ariz. (AP) — The report of the shooting came in around dawn from a town in southwestern Arizona - the opening salvo in a rampage that left six people dead over the next six hours.

statement issued Thursday.

The toll included the suspected gunman, 73-year-old Carey Hal Dyess, and the prominent Yuma attorney who represented his ex-wife in their divorce, Jerrold Shelley.

Police said Dyess also wounded one person in the shootings around Yuma, a city of about 91,000, before he was found dead of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Shelley was killed while packing up his office on his last day of work.

"This is not a random act," Yuma Police Chief Jerry Geier said. "These victims were targeted."

Yuma County Sheriff Ralph Ogden said the first shooting was reported shortly after 5 a.m. in Wellton, about 25 miles east of Yuma. The woman was in critical condition at a Phoenix hospital.

He said Dyess then fatally shot four people around town before driving to Yuma and killing Shelley at about 9:20 a.m. The bodies in Wellton were found between 8:20 and 9:45 a.m.

Police believe Dyess drove back toward Wellton, pulled over and fatally shot himself. His body was found at 10:47 a.m. inside a vehicle. Neither police nor the sheriff

would identify the other four dead. Shelley was killed in his down-

town law office. Shelley represented Dyess' ex-wife in their 2006 divorce, which was Dyess' fifth.

Vida Florez, a Yuma attorney who knew Shelley, said she learned of the shooting after leaving court. She said she heard from a witness who spoke to the police about what happened inside the office.

"They said the shooter came in and told the secretary to 'Get out of here," Florez said. "She did, and he shot Jerry Shelley and he left."

Shelley also was one of the lawyers representing seven young men three sets of brothers — who sued the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tucson after accusing a priest of repeatedly raping them when they were

"Why would Amarillo want a good hospital in Pampa?" Clark asked. Hall said Pampa needs to expand services, not reduce them.

PRMC is the only major hospital in the Panhandle outside of Amarillo. Right now, Clark said, the 115-bed

hospital is only about half full. "It hasn't had 115 people in a long

He said the hospital has lost money for the last three years, but it can be

turned around. While there was talk of creating a hospital district and using tax money to keep the facility afloat, Hall said he didn't think that was necessary.

Hall has led community support for the hospital. County Judge Richard Peet, Pampa Mayor Brad Pingel and Gary Sutherland of the Pampa Economic Development Corporation were among those at Thursday

evening's meeting. Clark and Hall estimated that it

would cost about \$16 million to buy the existing hospital. It would take another \$4.5 million for new equipment and \$1.5 million for renova-Their proposed budget calls for \$4

million in financing charges and \$7.5 million for working capital.

That totals about \$34 million. With a 20 percent down payment, Hall and his group needs about \$7 million.

Hall said there is money available through a variety of sources, government programs and foundations, but they would all take time - several months to several years — to line up. In order to buy PRMC, Hall indicated that the group needs to raise

the \$7 million by the end of June. They envision funding through local philanthropic money and taxexempt revenue bonds.

Hall said there needs to be community support for the project, he said. A strong hospital in Pampa, Hall and Clark said, will strengthen the

community. If the main medical activities at the hospital were moved to Amarillo,

Clark said many of the medical services that support the hospital would leave Pampa. The main question, Clark said, is

whether Pampa wants local control of their hospital. The next question, he said, is

whether local philanthropic funds whether are available and whether local businesses are interested in supporting the project.

Most importantly, he said, is how quickly support for the project can be pulled together.

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# AFTERNOON RUSH

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AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Senate is expected to vote out a school financing bill, a major issue in the special legislative session.

The Finance Committee approved the legislation and the full Senate is meeting Friday afternoon. The Republican majority is expected to move the bill on to the House for their consideration next week.

The Legislature is meeting in special session after a Democratic filibuster killed a bill that would slash \$4 billion from public schools. That measure is necessary to balance the state budget.

Gov. Rick Perry has called on lawmakers to also consider cuts to health care spending and to redraw the maps for congressional seats. Republicans hold majorities in both the Texas House and Senate, ensuring passage of the bills once they work through the legislative process.

#### Health care revamp considered

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers are listening to testimony on a plan to revamp how health care is provided to the poor and disabled.

Republican Rep. Lois Kolkhorst (COAL-korst) laid out a plan to ask federal authorities for a waiver to experiment with a new payment and incentive system for Medicaid. Once passed by the committee, the measure will go to the full House for consideration.

Medicaid provides health insurance to people with disabilities, the poor and the elderly who need longterm care. The federal government matches state spending, if the state follows federal guidelines.

Kolkorst has proposed an alternative system. She says it will be more efficient and will save the state money. But critics say the bill is vague and worry it could lead to fewer people receiving fewer services.

#### Lawmakers mull class sizes

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas House lawmakers are considering bills to make it easier for schools to increase elementary school class sizes and streamline firing teachers to ease budget strains.

Those ideas were considered during the regular session but did not pass. They have resurfaced in the special session that convened this week.

School districts say they need flexibility to deal with the unknowns of what their budgets will be under pending cuts and changes in school funding formulas.

One of the bills before the House Education Committee Friday allows larger classes in kindergarten through fourth grade.

The current limit is 22 students and has been state law for nearly 30 years.

Lawmakers are considering plans to raise the limit to 25 or allow districts to average 22 students per class in

#### Life term over toddler death

FORT WORTH (AP) — Life in prison has been ordered for a man convicted over the 2009 fatal beating of his girlfriend's toddler son.

Prosecutors in Fort Worth did not seek the death penalty against 29-year-old Kimball Hailey II, who was convicted Monday afternoon of capital murder, then sentenced by a judge.

Investigators say 2-year-old Eba Chapple died in March 2009 after sustaining brain injuries while alone

The mother, LaQuanta Williams, testified she was upset that Hailey suggested to police that she was responsible for her son's death.

#### Slain deputy to be honored

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Law enforcement officers and other mourners will attend the funeral for a sheriff's deputy shot in his patrol car at a San Antonio stop light.

The service for Bexar County sheriff's Sgt. Kenneth Vann is Friday morning at the St. Joseph Catholic Church in the Hill Country community of Honey Creek, just north of San Antonio. The 48-year-old's burial will be in the church cemetery with military and sheriff's office honors.

Sheriff Amadeo Ortiz has said Vann's death last Saturday is being investigated as an apparently random act of violence against a peace officer. No arrests have

#### Nearly \$1 million confiscated

HOUSTON (AP) - Law officers in Houston have confiscated nearly \$1 million in two bags that a man abandoned after denying that he knew anything about

The Houston Chronicle reported Friday that the money-filled rolling suitcase and gym bag were seized from a man from Mexico staying at an upscale hotel.

Federal agents received a tip about possible drug money laundering and monitored the man's comings and goings, then confronted him May 26 as he prepared to check out. Investigators say the man, who had a valid U.S. visa, said he was given the bags for delivery in Houston. No further details were provided.

The man was not arrested and left the hotel, abandoning more than \$995,000.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement says the forfeited cash will be used to fight crime.

#### State goes to court over prayer

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Texas and the valedictorian of a San Antonio-area school have gone to court to allow prayer at Saturday's graduation ceremony despite an agnostic couple's opposition.

Attorney General Greg Abbott on Thursday filed a brief with the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals seeking to lift a federal judge's ban against prayer at the Medina Valley High School ceremony.

The judge Tuesday granted a temporary restraining order against public prayer sought by Christa and Danny Schultz, whose son is graduating. The family is backed by Americans United for Separation of Church

Valedictorian Angela Hildenbrand joined the fight Thursday, saying her free speech rights would be violated if she's not allowed to thank God during her graduation speech. A motion has been filed on her behalf by the Liberty Institute.

# Retractable screens improve view

Dear Pat: I hate removing and installing window screens, but I like a clear view outdoors. I thought about installing retractable screens instead. Are they effective and durable, and can they also be used on doors? - Sandi R.

Dear Sandi: It is nice to have a clear view outdoors during the times of the year when you are heating or air-conditioning and the windows stay closed. Screening blocks more of the view and light than most people realize. Some of the durable fiberglass screens can block as much as 30 percent of the view.

During the summer, the shading effect from the screens can be welcomed. If your screens are indoors, as on casement windows, much of the glare will be reduced. If your screens are outdoors, as on other types of windows, the screens will also block some of the sun's heat.

Retractable screens would be an excellent and attractive option for your windows. When they are retracted, the screen totally disappears. When you want screens, you just pull it out and you have window screens in about five seconds. Since they will be retracted much of the time, they will not need much cleaning.

The retractable screen kits made for windows have a narrow housing into which the screen retracts. This housing is mounted at the top of the window opening, so it is often totally hidden by the curtains or valance.

The housing is spring-loaded so the screen rolls quickly into it. The spring also keeps the proper tension on the screen when it is opened over the window. The exposed edge of the screen has some type of mechanical or magnetic latch to hold it open over the window. The sides of the screen slide in tracks so no insects can get indoors.

Retractable screen kits are also available for doors, especially sliding glass patio doors where a clear view is desirable. When installed on doors, the housing is mounted vertically on the side of the door

able screen kits for windows and doors at your local home center store. If not, try contacting some of these manufacturers for local sources: Dreamscreens, (888) 757-0929, www.dreamscreens.com; and Phantomscreens, (888) 742-6866, www.phantomscreens.com.

It is a fairly easy do-it-yourself project to install a retractable screen kit on either a window or a door. The kit includes every part, even the fasteners, you will need to install the retractable screen.

For window installation, mount the housing in the top of the window opening. If your window opening is considerably out of square, you can flush mount a retractable screen kit on the wall over the window opening. This will require a slightly wider kit. Install the side tracks per the instructions and the job is complete.

For hinged-door installation, the housing and pull rail are normally mounted on the same side as the hinges. For sliding glass patio doors, the housing is usually mounted at the end of the fixed glass panel. Since the kits used on doors are large, it is critical that the housing is mounted perfectly vertical. Special shims are available if the door opening jamb is not vertical.

rockets and sky rockets. Millican said the high humidity and scattered thunderstorms that have passed through the Pampa area the last few days have helped by lowering the threat of wildfires, but the winds are still drying the prairie grasses quickly.

"The 14-day forecast is not promising," Millican

He said the county has gone from a hot, dry spring directly into a hot, dry summer.

That's not a good thing without moisture," Millican said.

The area normally gets much-needed rain in May and June, Millican added. This year, Gray County got little moisture.

Millican said it certainly wasn't widespread.

Crops are stunted and the grass is turning brown due to lack of moisture.

"It's going to be a long, hot summer," Millican said.

Weather forecasters are calling for sunny skies over the weekend and temperatures in the mid-90 degree range. While the wind is expected to subside somewhat over the weekend, forecasters said it is expected to pick up next week.

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



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
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# Always cherish faith, traditions, unity

YONCORD N.C - Once upon a time what Ricky Stenhouse Ir. did in Newton, Iowa, wasn't so uncommon. Newton, Iowa, huh? Did he raise com? Did he hum the Hawkeye fight song? Did he go cow tipping?

Ah, Midwestern stereotypes. Southerners get assaulted with so many that there must be some unconscious inclination to strike back. But Stenhouse isn't from Iowa. He's from Olive Grove, Miss. Iowa has produced more stellar stock car racers than Mississippi, and Stenhouse used to race sprint cars, which makes him even more inclined to

do well, one supposes, in Iowa. Michael Annett and Landon Cassill are also from Iowa. Bygone days saw Iowans Johnny Beauchamp, Emie Derr, Dick Hutcherson, Shawna Robinson, Ramo Stott and Don White build noteworthy careers in stock car racing. DeWayne (Tiny) Lund was more often cited as being from Cross, S.C., but he, too, was originally from Iowa.

About the only other recognizable name from Mississippi was Lake Speed. Mississippi is much more known

for civil rights leaders than stock car racers.

On May 22, at Iowa Speedway, Stenhouse did what no Nationwide-only driver had done in the Nationwide Series since March 2010. He won a race. As astonishing as that seems, it's

become a rarity, a feat, a peg to hang a helmet on. Stenhouse followed up his Iowa victory with a fourthplace finish in Charlotte Motor Speedway's Top Gear 300, won by teammate Matt Kenseth. Stenhouse now trails Elliott Sadler by only point at the top of the Nationwide

Series points standings. Because Trevor Bayne remains sidelined with illness, Stenhouse made his Sprint Cup debut in the Coca-Cola

600, finishing 11th. "I feel like it is a little more of a reality to go in there and not have to compete with Kyle Busch and Carl Edwards for the championship," said Stenhouse. "The way we're running this year, though, I feel like we could be in the

hunt with those guys a little more than we were last year. "A year of experience definitely helps. . . . I feel like I'm focused a lot more, and have more confidence, and am just trying not to make the mental mistakes that can kill you."

### Biffle discusses Goodyear's difficult balance

Biffle had no criticism of Goodyear, the exclusive supplier of tires in NASCAR's three major series. He discussed how the tire manufacturer has such a balance to

"What's changed in our sport, I'm not going to say the old days, but about five years ago, if you had too much camber in the right-front, the car is too tight, you were too hard on the right-front tire, it would blow out." said Biffle. "You would have problems or issues. The driver had more responsibility inside there behind the wheel. We cannot make it to where it is absolutely childproof inside that car, where you can do anything you want and nothing is going to happen. I understand we kind of painted and

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

"We get to compete with other high schools and you get to look at them more," Douglas said.


Junior James Thompson said playing in the summer is fun.
