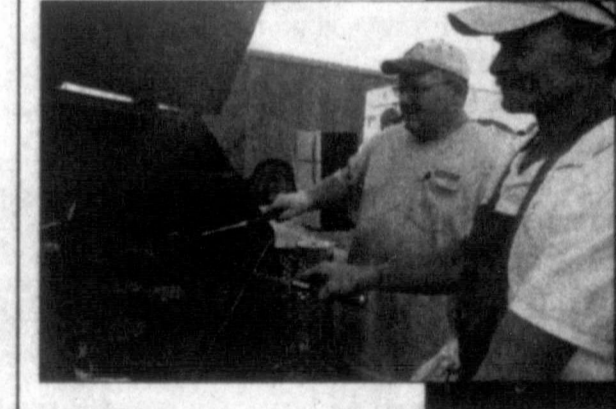

Pampa hosts presbytery gathering

Pampa is hosting about 100 people from around 40 different regional churches this weekend, as the 119th meeting of the Palo Duro Presbytery convenes at the First Presbyterian Church.

The presbytery — the church's regional body — meets three times a year, said First Presbyterian head pastor Kenny Rigoulot. Delegations made up of representatives from both clergy and laity met yesterday and today to study scripture, worship and attend to church business.

"We're a connectional church, so we think it's important to maintain ties with other Presbyterian churches in our area," Rigoulot said. "We gather for Bible study, worship, prayer and to discern where God is taking our local congregations, our presbytery and our denomination as a whole."

It has been over a decade since Pampa has been selected to host a meeting, according to Rigoulot.

One of the prevalent topics of discussion during the meeting, Rigoulot explained, will be a potential addition to the Presbyterian church's Book of Confessions, containing historical statements of the beliefs of the church in companion with scripture.

The Belhar confession was written by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church of South Africa in the early 1980s to proclaim unity in Christ and denounce racism, which was rampant in South Africa at the time in the form of apartheid and other segregative practices. Now, decades later, Rigoulot said that the Palo Duro Presbytery is joining presbyteries across the nation in deciding whether or not the confession merits inclusion within the church's official book.

"During apartheid, there were a number of people who felt that separating the church based on

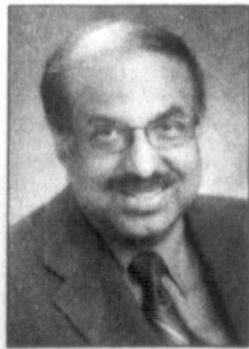

Debbie Hoover at Triangle Well Service, Bob Hogan at Parts in General, Mark Reed of Napa Engine Parts, and Joe and Kathy Reed from Roberta's Flowers.

Many other businesses and groups contributed by donating supplies to the effort, Addington said, including Walmart, the Harvest House, Tralee Crisis Center and The Unit, a Christian men's group that meets on Tuesday evenings at Hudson Tires. And that's not counting the anonymous donors he received from all over Pampa, according to Addington.

The result, Addington said, was ex-

traordinary: 175 cases of water, 104 boxes of assorted diapers, 2,200 pairs of pants, 1,700 shirts, and various other items were taken to Joplin last weekend, where they were then distributed to needy families.

Addington, who drove a truck of supplies to Joplin himself to help in person, said that seeing people come together to help each other was an example of the strength of human spirit.

"Things are going remarkably well over there," Addington said. "They had 10,000 volunteers when we got there (last) Friday night, and supplies are overwhelming. You know, you

couldn't go out to the disaster area and work for two or three minutes without somebody walking up to you and asking if you need water, if you need food. You saw how much people wanted to help."

"Seeing people in Pampa so willing to help their neighbors in Missouri, Addington said, only added to the sense of good will.

"It made me feel real good," Addington said. "It's very humbling to be able to help, to get as many people to be able to help me in the short time we had to pull stuff together to make something happen."

No crime is ever 100 percent preventable, but there are many things we can do to deter, detect and delay criminals from obtaining our property. Every day, citizens are getting burglarized by criminals that are

getting into their vehicles and homes. Most of these burglaries could have been prevented if just a few steps were taken. The Pampa Police Department wants to provide you with the information and tools needed to help you not become a victim but it is up to you to read it and apply it.

- **Always mark your property** — Mark your property so that if it is stolen you can identify it. NEVER put your Social Security Number for your marking. Instead use a driver's license or some other marking that you can identify.

- **Always keep track of serial numbers** — The best way to identify your property is through the serial number.

- **Never leave personal items in car** — Leaving personal items such as purse, wallet, cell phone and cash in view will just attract thieves.

- **Always take keys out of car** — Most cars are stolen because people leave their keys in their car.

- **Don't display items through your home windows** — Displaying items such as guns and very expensive equipment can attract home burglars. If you have blinds, close them so burglars can't scope out your property.

- **Alarm system** — If at all possible get an alarm system. This is a good deterrent. If burglars see that an alarm system is installed, they will be less likely to try to break into your home.

Immigration legislation filed

AUSTIN (AP) — Houston Rep. Debbie Riddle has filed legislation that would criminalize illegal immigrants and those who employ them.

The Republican's first bill would allow police to arrest those suspected of being in the country illegally on the charge of criminal trespass. Another would make it a felony to knowingly hire a worker who does not have permission to work in this country. Her last measure would require state agencies to report how much state money is spent on illegal immigrants.

Riddle has made such legislation her signature issue. Gov. Rick Perry has not put illegal immigration on the agenda for the current special session, but that could change.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, has asked Perry to allow lawmakers to take up immigrant-related legislation.

Suppliers restricting water usage

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Water suppliers across parts of Texas have begun restricting customers' use as more than half the state has slipped into the worst drought stage.

Experts say water use increases significantly during summer months and that many more of the state's 4,700 public water suppliers will soon be placing restrictions on users. So far, only 175 suppliers had either voluntary or mandatory restrictions, many of those clustered in central Texas.

In the San Antonio area, the agency that regulates the Edwards Aquifer has asked users of the underground water source to reduce usage by 30 percent.

The Lower Colorado River Authority, which supplies Austin and surrounding areas, has asked its suppliers to voluntarily reduce pumping by 5 percent. And for the first time, Midland and Odessa imposed restrictions on outdoor watering.

Woman taken in near Bush home

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police say a woman was taken into custody for an evaluation near the home of former President George W. Bush and former first lady Laura Bush.

Sr. Cpl. Melinda Gutierrez says the woman was not arrested Friday. She would not give details on the evaluation.

Gutierrez says the woman did not get past the gate that leads to the Bush's home on a cul-de-sac. She was taken into custody about 2:40 p.m.

Secret Service spokesman George Ogilvie says that the woman was stopped by Secret Service agents. He says, "No one was in any danger."

He would not comment on where she was stopped. Bush's spokesman says the Bushes were not home at the time.

LaBelle sued for assault

HOUSTON (AP) — A West Point cadet and former Army football player is suing veteran R&B diva Patti LaBelle, saying she ordered her bodyguards to beat him up as he waited for a ride home outside a Houston airport terminal.

The lawsuit alleges the cadet, Richard King, was waiting for his brother and father to pick him up outside one of the terminals at Bush Intercontinental Airport on March 11, when three of LaBelle's bodyguards attacked him. King was in Houston, his hometown, while on spring break from West Point.

"Apparently, defendant LaBelle believed King was standing too close to her (no doubt expensive) luggage, even though he was oblivious to her presence and the danger he was in," according to King's lawsuit, which was filed in Houston civil court on Wednesday and also names the bodyguards, the airport and a taxi dispatcher as co-defendants. "LaBelle lowered the window of her limousine and gave a command to her bodyguards. They sprang into action."

Storm insurance added to session

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry has added retooling the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association to the call of the special session.

Perry had already kept state lawmakers in Austin to work out critical budget matters, including a school finance bill. He added the insurance issue to the agenda late Friday afternoon.

The windstorm agency is the primary insurer for those living in 14 coastal counties prone to hurricanes. Lawmakers could not agree during the regular session whether policy holders whose claims are denied can win punitive damages if they challenge the decision and win.

Many property owners in those areas cannot get regular insurance, so the state requires insurance companies to contribute to the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association, which then writes the policies.

Thousands honor slain deputy

SPRING BRANCH (AP) — Nearly 3,000 mourners attended the funeral Friday for a sheriff's deputy shot in his patrol car at a San Antonio stop light.

The crowd honoring Bexar County sheriff's Sgt. Kenneth Vann spilled outside the St. Joseph Catholic Church in this Hill Country community just north of San Antonio. Many were law enforcement officers with black tape covering their badges as a sign of mourning.

Rev. Jimmy Drennan told Vann's widow and his three children that the crowd represented the slain officer's extended family and that his death in the line of duty would never be forgotten.

Sheriff Amadeo Ortiz has said Vann's death last Saturday is being investigated as an apparently random act of violence against a peace officer. No arrests have been made.

Ten-year-old ticketed for seatbelt

AUSTIN (AP) — A "scared" 10-year-old Central Texas boy who stuck his head out the passenger's seat window to get some fresh air says he was ticketed by police for improper seat belt usage after it slipped off.

Marshall May, a fourth-grader at Jim Plain Elementary School in Leander, just north of Austin, was on his way home in a minivan when he stuck his head out the window and his seat belt slipped, he said.

any ethnic or racial line was un-Biblical," Rigoulot said. "They used numerous scripture passages to support their interpretation, including Ephesians chapter 4, which talks about the oneness of the church and the unity that we have in Christ."

"They lifted out these things and spoke out about the evils of racism in particular. It's a confession that was written in a specific time and place to address a specific issue, but our church is trying to decide whether it can speak in America in our context for today."

The regional presbytery, as well as presbyteries around the nation, will be voting on whether or not to include the Belhar confession within the Book of Confessions as a whole. The confession must be passed by two-thirds of all presbyteries within the country; if approved, it must be passed during a 2012 general assembly meeting in Pittsburgh before it officially becomes part of the Book of Confessions.

"It's a significant vote," Rigoulot said. "Changes don't occur very often. The last change happened in the early 90s. A lot of people think the time is right for a new statement of faith to address the concerns of our country today. There's some debate whether a confession that was written in the 80s in South Africa is really what we need to use for today. A lot of people think it's a very good confession. The debate is whether or not it's the one we want to use as our statement of faith today."

Other church matters are also on the agenda, he said, including the presentation of a potential new pastor to the presbytery.

"It's very uplifting to see who God is calling into the ministry," Rigoulot said. "That's always one of the highlights of these meetings."

The meeting presents a unique opportunity for the church and the community to be a focal point for a regional body, he added.

"It's always a joy to get together with other Christians around the area," Rigoulot said. "It's

very cool for Pampa and for our church that we were selected to host this meeting. One of the reasons we had asked to host the meeting a year ago was because we had recently renovated

our Christian education building, and we wanted to show our presbytery not only how we had remodeled our building, but also how we had restructured the way we do Christian education

for our children. "It gives us a chance to highlight our church, to welcome our brothers and sisters in Christ, and to showcase our local community here in Pampa as well."

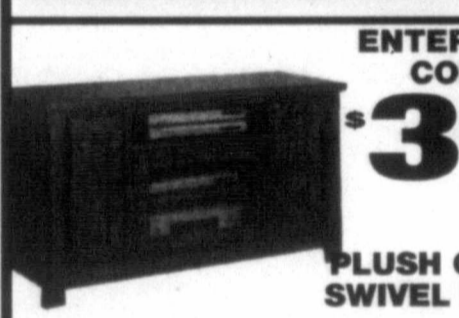

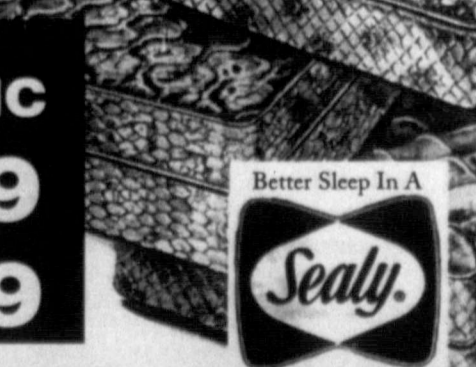

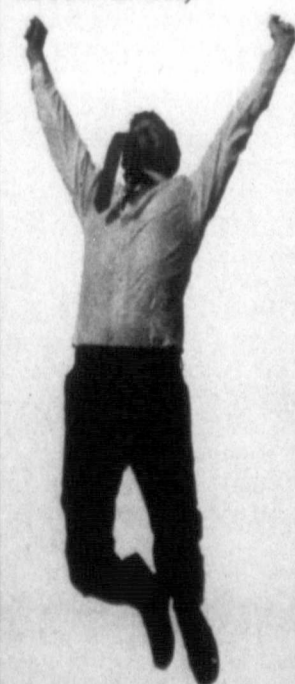

Today in History

Today is Saturday, June 4, the 155th day of 2011. There are 210 days left in the year.

Today's highlight in history:
On June 4, 1940, during World War II, the Allied military evacuation of more than 338,000 troops from Dunkirk, France, ended.

On this date:
In 1783, the Montgolfier brothers first publicly demonstrated their hot-air balloon, which did not carry any passengers, over Annonay, France.

In 1892, the Sierra Club was incorporated in San Francisco.

In 1910, the Ballets Russes premiered its dance adaptation of the Rimsky-Korsakov suite "Scheherazade" in Paris.

In 1919, Congress approved the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution guaranteeing citizens the right to vote regardless of their gender, and sent it to the states for ratification.

In 1939, the German ocean liner St. Louis, carrying more than 900 Jewish refugees from Germany, was turned away from the Florida coast by U.S. officials.

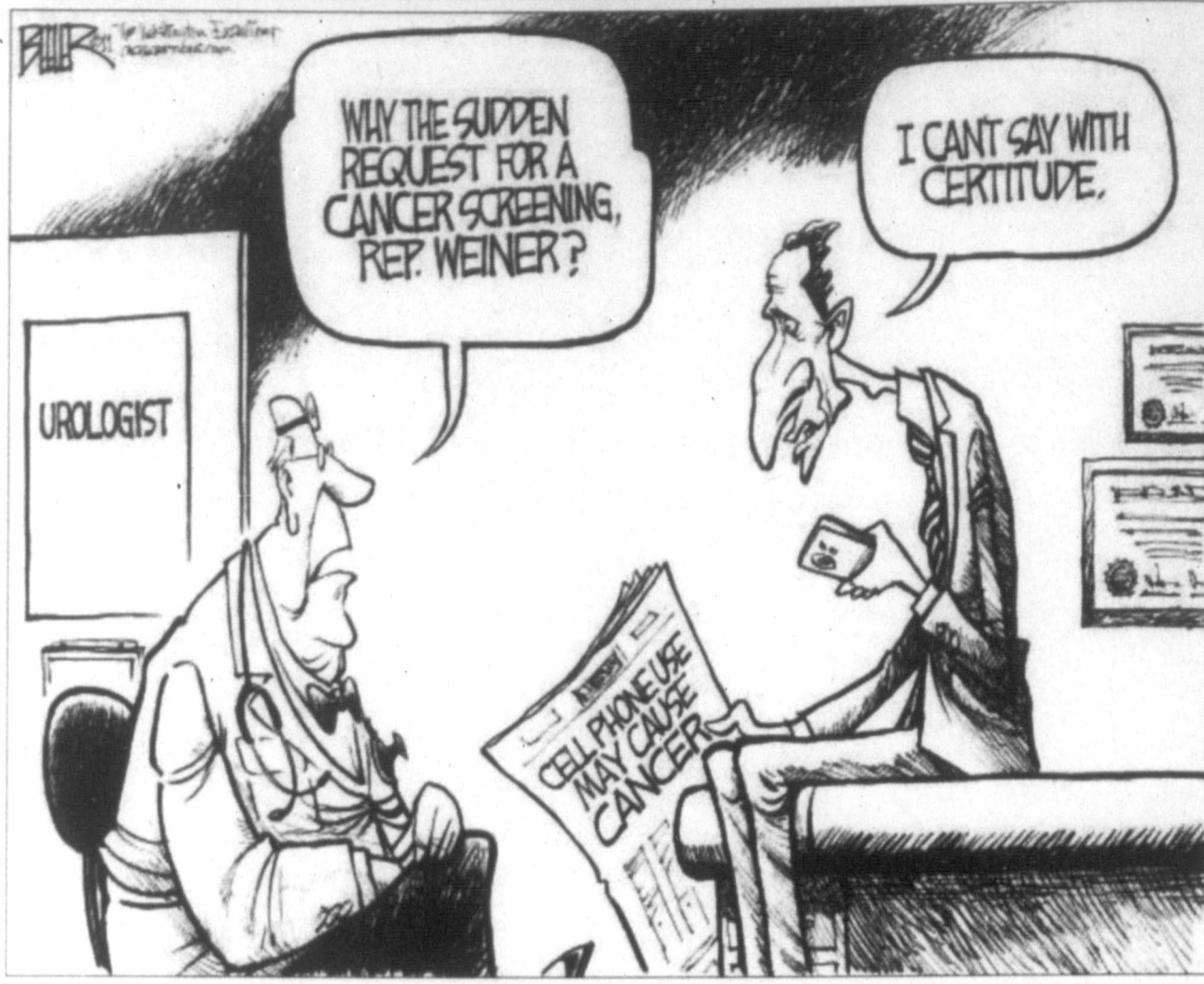

Red Cross: Stay safe during wildfire season

The American Red Cross urges everyone to take steps today to help reduce damages and save your life in the event of a wildfire. Talk with family members on how to prevent a wildfire and what to do if one occurs. Here are a few ways to prepare.

- Make sure your driveway entrance and your house numbers are clearly marked.
- Select building materials and plants that resist fire.
- Keep firewood stacks away from buildings.
- Plan ahead and stay as safe as possible during wildfire. Plan to have two ways out of your neighborhood. Identify someone who is out of the area to contact if local phone lines are not working.

What to do if there is a fire in your area: Be ready to leave at moment's notice. Listen to local radio stations for updated emergency information. Always back your car

into the garage or park it in an open space facing the direction of escape. Confine pets to one room so you can find them quickly if you need to evacuate. Use the recycle or re-circulate mode on home air conditioning. If you have asthma or other lung disease, follow your health care provider's advice and seek medical care if symptoms worsen.

Returning home after a wildfire: Use caution as hazards may still exist including hot spots and downed power lines. Watch animals closely and keep them from hidden embers and hot spots that may burn paws and hooves. Follow public health guidance on safe cleanup of fire ash

and use dust particle masks. Wet debris down to minimize breathing dust particles. Wear leather gloves and heavy soled shoes to protect hands and feet. Discard any food exposed to heat, smoke, or soot. Do not use contaminated water to wash dishes, brush teeth, prepare food, wash hands, make ice or make baby formula.

Supplies to take with you if you evacuate: Water (one gallon per person per day), nonperishable food, flashlight, battery powered or hand crank radio, medications, sanitation and personal hygiene items, copies of personal documents, cell phone with chargers, family emergency contact information, blankets and pillows, and extra cash.

Wildfires often begin unnoticed. They spread quickly. In wildfire every second counts. Prepare!

Kids bombarded with obnoxious curricula

Elementary school curriculum isn't just about the three R's anymore. Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic now have to make time for lessons in gender diversity and for nosy questionnaires that lead kids into teen sex and illegal drug usage.

Students in all grades at Redwood Heights Elementary School in Oakland, Calif., were given two days of gender diversity lessons designed to teach them that gender is not confined to the "binary concept" of two options. The lessons promoted "gender neutrality," the concept that no distinctions between male and female should be legally allowed.

These lessons were taught by an anti-bullying group called Gender Spectrum and paid for by a \$1,500 grant from the California Teachers Union. The course featured all-girl geckos and transgender clownfish.

The major message was that "gender identity" means people can choose to be different from the sex assigned at birth and can freely "change their sex." According to Gender Spectrum, "Gender identity is a spectrum where people can be girls, feel like girls, they feel like boys, they feel like both, or they can feel like neither."

Kindergartners were introduced to this new subject by asking them to identify toys that are a "girl toy" or a "boy toy" or both, and whether they like the color pink. They were read a story called "My Princess Boy."

Fourth-graders were told that if someone were born with male "private parts" but identified more with being a girl, he should be "accepted" and "respected." They were taught "gender fluidity," which means a boy might be a boy one day and a girl the next.

The Oakland School District personnel were apparently proud of this course because they allowed Fox News to audit and report on these lessons. District spokesman Troy Flint said that gender identity les-

sons are required by school board policy and supported by federal, state and local law as a means to support "equity" and a safe classroom environment. The lessons seem more likely to confuse the kids about who they are, and indeed, Gender Spectrum boasted that its goal is to confuse the children and make them question traditional ideas about who is a boy and who is a girl. It is not surprising that many parents were upset when they heard about the two-day course.

Some of the bills now pending in the California State Assembly indicate that these gender neutrality notions may become the new normal curriculum in California public schools. Gender Spectrum is determined to make children think that boy and girl don't mean anything anymore, and that it's no longer normal to believe people are born male or female or have different roles.

The California State Assembly is considering changes to 34 statutes by redefining gender to include a person's own "gender expression," and passed AB 887 on May 17, which prohibits any discrimination against the "transgendered." Among its predictable effects is that employees can be forbidden to require men to dress like men.

We wonder why anyone is surprised at this Left Coast nonsense, because university women's studies courses have for years taught that the obvious differences we observe between males and females are not a natural occurrence but are a social construct due to conditioning by parents and traditional social norms. It's a misunderstanding of the feminist

movement to think it was ever about equality for women; it always advocated the interchangeability of men and women and an end to what they lambaste as gender "stereotyping."

Memorial Middle School in Burg, Mass., featured another type of classroom atrocity: requiring pupils to answer nosy questions that are not only intrusive but designed to lead the kids into unacceptable behaviors. The survey, called the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, was created by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which also provided the funding for it to be administered.

One question asked: "The last time you had sexual intercourse, what one method did you or your partner use to prevent pregnancy? ... A. I have never had sexual intercourse; B. No method was used to prevent pregnancy; C. Birth control pills; D. Condoms; E. Depo-Provera (or any injectable birth control), Nuva Ring (or any birth control ring), Implanon (or any implant) or any IUD; F. Withdrawal; G. Some other method; H. Not sure."

Here are a couple more leading questions: "During your life, how many times have you used meth-amphetamines (also called speed, crystal, crank, or ice)?" "During the past 30 days, how many times did you sniff glue, breathe the contents of aerosol spray cans, or inhale any paints or sprays to get high?"

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment makes such interrogation of students illegal without prior parental consent, which the school did not have. Some parents have appealed to the Rutherford Institute, and we wish them success in stopping the school from asking elementary school children such nosy questions.

'Kung Fu Panda 2' as fun, entertaining as original

Don't get me wrong, I really enjoy Jack Black as an actor.

The more I think about it, though, the more I think that if he ever felt like hanging up the live action boots and going into voice acting full time, I'd totally be OK with it. He's that good as a voice actor.

Black shows off his versatile vocal cords again in "Kung Fu Panda 2," the second installment to 2008's surprisingly entertaining original. Flanked by an absolutely stellar voice cast, Black propels the franchise to an entertaining, if not entirely original, second act.

Black's titular panda, Po, returns to the big screen as the Dragon Warrior, under the tutelage of wise red panda Master Shifu (Dustin Hoffman). Just as in the last film, he's accompanied by fellow kung fu masters The Furious Five: Tigress (Angeline Jolie), Monkey (Jackie Chan), Crane (David Cross), Mantis (Seth Rogen) and Viper (Lucy Liu).

During a quest to find inner peace, Po and his friends foil a group of baddies looking to steal metal to build a weapon of mass destruction for their master, evil albino peacock Lord Shen, voiced by Gary Oldman. [Note: When I started writing, I never thought I'd ever have to type the phrase "evil albino peacock." Ever. I stand corrected.]

Shen, as it turns out, is deathly phobic of pandas, as it was prophesied that he would be killed by one. Years ago, in fact, he ordered a genocide (pandicide?) attempt of the kingdom's whole panda population. Naturally, finding out that the Furious Five was led into battle by a panda didn't sit too well, and so we find ourselves a plot.

Black again shines as Po, infusing the character with a lovable, energetic spirit. The talents of Black's well-known supporting cast are likewise appreciated, but the master stroke here was the addition of Oldman, whose voice instantly

instills Shen with a sinister malevolence you've never before found in well-plumed flightless birds. Oldman's performance will make you look over your shoulder the next time you see a shock of feathers strutting your direction.

The movie also benefits from the introduction of a slight bit of backstory. Po's animal-populated world is fleshed out even more, and he even gets a little hint of romance with Jolie's Tigress. Don't ask how it would even work. Just go see "Kung Fu Panda 2," and then maybe go to the zoo and learn something.

'X-Men: First Class' shines among comic book films

Comic book movies seem to fall into one of three categories: The flop, usually a bad idea which leads to disappointment to both the general audience and to the fanboys at large (see "Catwoman," "Ghost Rider," "Watchmen");

The origin story, which is usually pretty good, but has to spend a lot of time setting up things for the next films in the potential series ("X-Men" and "Spider-man"); and the truly great film that captures something magical from the comics and brings it to life ("Batman Begins," "The Dark Knight," "X2").

This summer has already brought us "Thor," which falls into the second category, although at a slightly elevated level than most. While it was an origin story with lots of

setup, it also strived to be part of the third category without quite getting there. This weekend brings another movie based on a Marvel comics franchise, "X-Men: First Class."

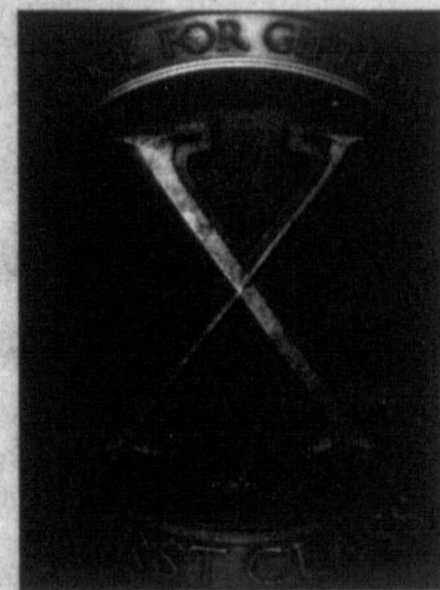
Like "Thor," "X-Men: First Class" strives to be a part of that elusive third category, giving us a brilliant storyline, that's well paced, rife with comic book references for the fanboys, great small cameos from amazing actors for the movie geeks, and some of the best acting ever brought to a comic book movie. A few things will likely keep it from becoming one of the true greats.

Director Matthew Vaughn brings us the story of how a young Charles Xavier (James McAvoy) and Erik Lehnsherr (Michael Fassbender), a.k.a. Magneto, meet, become friends, form the precursor to the X-Men, stop the Cuban Missile Crisis, and ultimately part ways. The setting couldn't be more perfect as the distrust between America and Russia is a perfect backdrop for the human/mutant conflict that arises. Fassbender and McAvoy both knock it out of the park bringing some of the best performances ever seen in a Marvel movie.

Possibly the boldest move the movie makes is that it chooses not to stick to the established comic book canon, or even the canon set by the previous films in the series, instead establishing its own. While this may anger some in the fanboy community, it actually works extremely well and gives the filmmakers leeway to go off in a new and interesting direction, while also sticking closely to the original in many ways.

As I mentioned, though, there are a couple of things which bring the movie down. One of the biggest problems with the film is the inclusion of January Jones as Emma Frost. I honestly do not know how Jones makes it as an actress, as a mannequin has more emotion than she does. She manages to bring down every single scene she is in. The other problem with the movie is some of the effects choices, with Beast's makeup being one of its biggest flaws.

Overall "X-Men: First Class" is a good film, which with a little polish, could have

After the Lakers entered a rough stretch after Shaquille O'Neal departed and Phil Jackson retired, Kobe Bryant wanted out and had to deal with the Laker faithful booing him. Ultimately in the end, Bryant was smart and stuck with his team and led them to three more Finals appearances winning two of them. I highly doubt we will see Bryant wearing any other colors than purple and gold.

Now, back to Nowitzki and James. While James took the easy way to success and disowned his team, city and fans, Nowitzki stuck remained loyal and

stuck by his team and fans.

James will still receive his accolades when his career is over, and if his team wins the Finals it will be a great victory for him and Miami. Let's be serious, I'm sure if Michael Jordan, Larry Bird and Magic Johnson all played on the same team I'm sure they would do the same as the Heat.

Mavs not speedsters or leapsters — they're just resilient

DALLAS (AP) — Their best player can hardly jump. Their fastest player hasn't played a minute all postseason.

So it's not breathtaking athletic ability that's gotten the Dallas Mavericks three wins from the NBA title.

Their strength is their resolve.

The Mavs are a collection of guys in their 30s who haven't won a championship, but clearly know what it takes. They have the determination to keep fighting in every game, no matter how out of it they might seem — such as trailing by 15 points with 7:14 left on the road against a Miami Heat team waiting to be crowned NBA champions since LeBron James and Chris Bosh joined Dwyane Wade last summer.

Instead of continuing on their runaway path to an 0-2 deficit, the Mavericks

sloughed off 7½ underwhelming quarters in the NBA finals and scored 22 of the last 27 points. Their astonishing display of veteran poise and savvy completely changed the outlook of this series just in time for the action to shift to Dallas. Game 3 is Sunday.

Maybe the Heat's youth and athleticism will still rule. But the mettle of these Mavericks — it's as much of a constant this postseason as Dirk Nowitzki's step-back, one-legged jumper — means it won't be the coronation many were expecting. And it could produce the first title in the club history.

"We just understand what we're playing for," said center Tyson Chandler, the least-experienced of Dallas' starters yet in his 10th season. "Some of the guys are on their last legs. We've got a lot of guys

who may not be here next year. We've got a lot of guys that come from situations where they've never been this far. We just want to win it for one another. We're never going to give up."

The importance of the next game can't be underestimated. All 11 times an NBA finals has been tied 1-1 under the 2-3-2 format, the Game 3 winner has gone on to win it all.

The best-case scenario for Dallas is to win the next three games and not even return to Miami. Only two teams have won the middle three games at home on their way to a title, the Pistons in 2004 and the Heat in '06, against the Mavs.

"You cannot get a split and get a huge emotional win in Game 2 and then go home and lose Game 3," said Nowitzki, who scored Dallas' final nine points,

getting the winning basket on a layup using his injured left hand. "Hopefully our crowd will be rocking. They've been great to us and carried us throughout the playoffs so far."

Dallas' comeback was the biggest in an NBA finals since Michael Jordan and the Bulls wiped out a 15-point deficit in Game 6 in 1992, beating Portland and claiming their second title.

For the Mavericks, it was their biggest comeback win in ... 10 days.

That was the night the Mavs wiped out a 15-point deficit with 5:06 left to beat the Thunder in overtime in Oklahoma City in Game 4 of the conference finals.

Three weeks before that, they erased a 16-point, third-quarter deficit to beat the Lakers in Los Angeles in Game 1 of their second-round series.

Texas still blanketed with 'extreme,' 'exceptional' drought

ued to be hot and dry with high winds, which adversely impacted all crops. High wildfire danger continues to be the major concern across the

region, with all counties needing moisture. Producers were busy irrigating summer crops, planting of corn and cotton, and haying wheat and alfalfa. Some producers were unable to switch irrigation from corn to other crops because soils were drying faster than water could be applied. In some areas, blowing sand added to the stress on corn and cotton. Livestock producers continued to feed cattle. Some producers were culling their herds. Though in some areas cotton had barely emerged, producers already were forced to spray for thrips. The winter wheat crop continued to lose ground, and growers were concerned about the drying and early maturing of kernels.

ROLLING PLAINS: The region received some much-needed rain, but sustained high winds and temperatures meant more was needed soon for cotton and forage planting. All forage growth seemed to be at least two weeks to a month behind due to the drought conditions and an unusually cool spring. Cotton began to emerge in irrigated fields, and producers continued to plant. Dryland acres may not be planted until moisture is received or the insurance planting deadline is imminent. Peanut producers were nearly finished planting. Wheat producers were harvesting and reported yields way below average. Some producers did not bother to harvest wheat at all. Ranchers needed rain to fill livestock watering tanks and improve pasture conditions. Cattle were being worked and some were being shipped due to lack of grazing.

SOUTH PLAINS: The region remained very dry and windy with high temperatures in the triple digits. Producers were planting irrigated and dryland fields to meet insurance deadlines. Early corn showed symptoms from the spring cold snap. Seedling corn was showing symptoms of water stress during the day in spite of irrigation. Range and pasture conditions remained dry with the threat of wildfire high. Ranchers reported dangerously low water tank levels. They were scrambling to buy any hay available as grazing was non-existent in native-grass pastures.

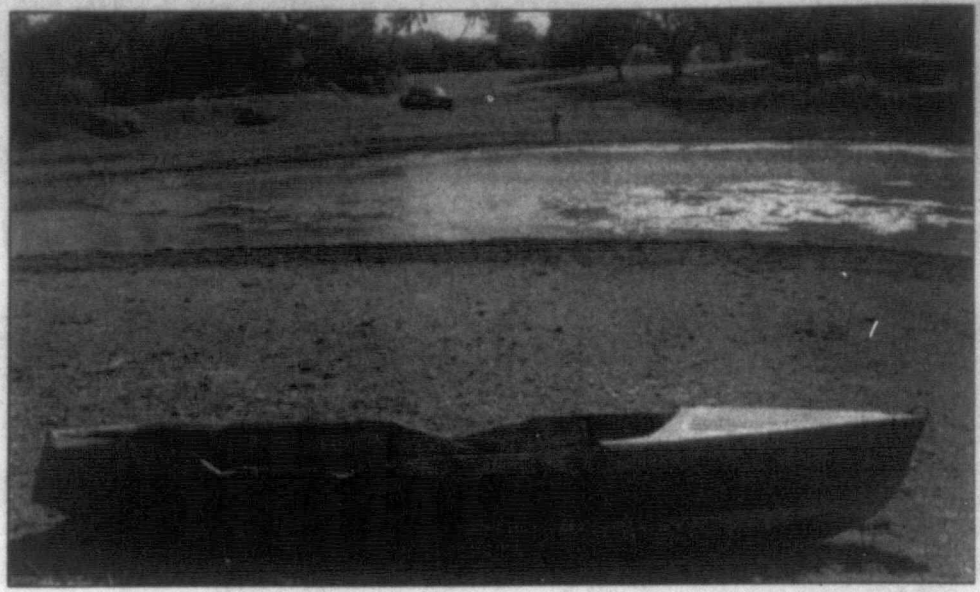

As the drought continued in most of Texas, livestock producers were concerned about loss of water sources.

COLLEGE STATION — A few areas received rain, but except for parts of north-central and extreme northeast Texas, the state continued to suffer from moderate to exceptional drought, according to the U.S. Drought monitor.

Even where the drought had lifted, Texas AgriLife Extension Service personnel reported shortages of hay and damaged crops from lack of rain earlier.

All of the Panhandle remained in a severe to exceptional drought. A report from Mike Bragg, AgriLife Extension agent for Dallam County, northwest of Amarillo, was typical of agent reports from the region for the last week of May.

"Two fires up at reporting time. ... One that consumed 15,280 acres — cause unknown. The other burned 600 acres and was caused by downed power poles due to extreme winds," Bragg said. "Critical fire danger weather conditions are likely this weekend. Farmers were busy irrigating summer crops, completing planting of corn and cotton, and haying wheat and alfalfa."

Eikewise, the report from Pasquale Swaner, AgriLife Extension agent for Falls County, east of Temple, typified Central Texas conditions.

"Some rainfall fell across the county this past week," Swaner said. "Temperatures are 95-plus, with high humidity levels. Farmers are harvesting the last of the wheat and oats this week. Corn and milo are stressed due to the lack of rainfall throughout the growing season. Stocker operators are shipping cattle out to feedlots. This week should be the last of cattle to be shipped out by stockers."

Conditions varied considerably across East Texas, but the report from Blaine Jernigan, AgriLife Extension agent for Rock County, mirrored the common themes.

"The weather is dry with no significant rainfall occurring during the reporting period," Jernigan said. "Winds continue to be high, depleting soil moisture. There was very limited hay production occurring at this time."

The report by Arlan Gentry, AgriLife Extension agent for Ward County, southwest of Odessa, was similar to many of those by Far West county agents.

"No change," Gentry said. "No rain, temperatures in the 90s and 100s, and still breezy to windy. Producers are making choices to sell cattle versus continued feeding. A couple of brush fires this week, but luckily nothing large or really damaging."

In South Texas, extremely hot weather was rapidly drying out areas that received rain earlier in the month.

"Any improvements from mid-May showers have dried up with prolonged triple-digit weather," said Caleb Eaton, AgriLife Extension agent for Zapata County. "Water levels at Falcon Lake continue to drop at a staggering pace."

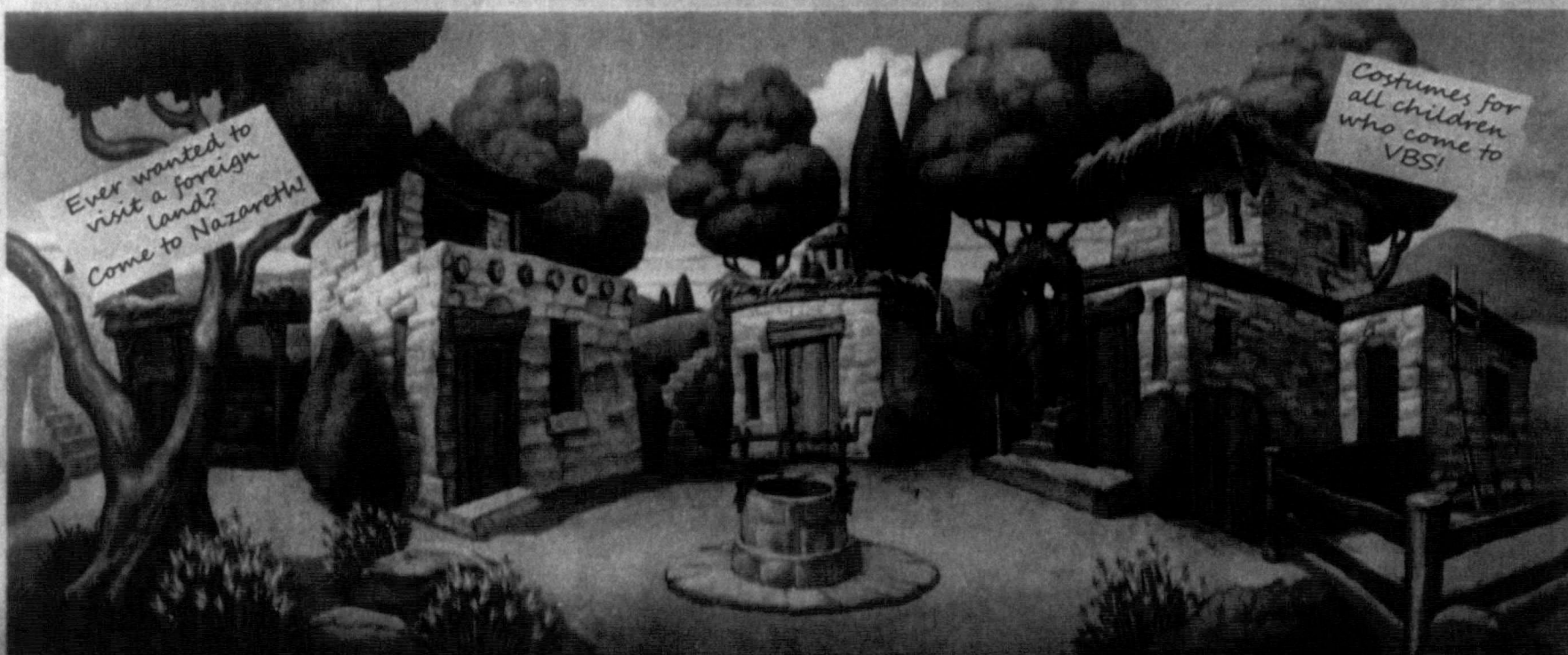

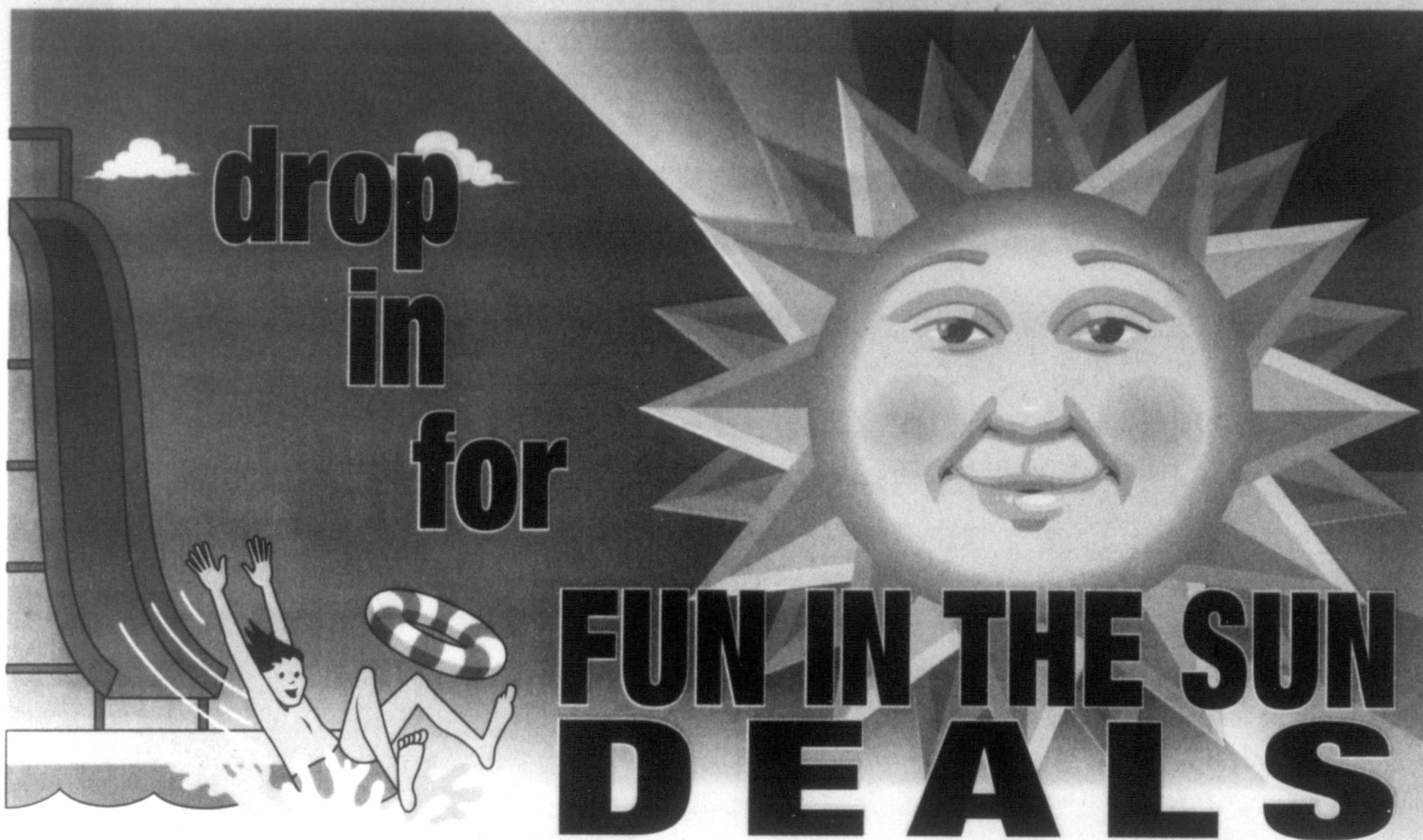
